



The Manager's Message

WELCOME back to Kenilworth Road. We are obviously delighted with the start we have made, and the win away to Stockport was the icing on the cake after a very pleasing first week.

Without being too greedy, we felt we could probably have won even more convincingly had we been a bit more ruthless at 2-0. We have some good players who have hit form early, and the fact that we have six different scorers on the sheet already is an indication of the confidence in the side at the moment.

Our win in the Carling Cup against Yeovil appears now to be an even better result than we thought after the start they have made in Division Three. They have had two convincing wins, and will be a force to be reckoned with.

It gave us an away trip to Charlton and a chance to see how we fare against Premiership opposition.

Our bread and butter, however, will always be the league, and today we face a Grimsby side who have held their own at Division One level for a good while until their relegation last season.

All we can ask is that our players are as fully committed as they have been so far. It has been a difficult time for them, with so many distractions, and until the club comes out of administration and is in the hands of new owners I don't think anyone will be completely settled.

I have said recently that we would like to add to the squad, as any manager would, but it also must be said that I desperately want to keep the players we already have

here, and who we are sure

If we get into situation where our best players are allowed to



leave for next to nothing things will become very difficult.

Success is achieved by good players, not managers or coaches, and we have some very good players at this level. Keeping them is a must.

One thing that annoys me is the attitude of agents who seem to think there are no rules any more. I believe in being up front and honest with people. But the majority of agents don't play by the same rules, and it makes things very difficult.

They will argue that they are looking after their clients' interests but it appears to me that it's more in their own inter-



EVACUATION PROCEDURE

IN THE event of any emergency in the stadium, Luton Town FC and the emergency services have agreed on an evacuation procedure which is designed to ensure the safe and controlled evacuation of the crowd, and to ensure their safe dispersal from the area, to allow the emergency services to carry out their tasks.

In the event of evacuation from all or part of the stadium, you will receive instructions over the public address system on how you should leave. In an evacuation of the main stand you will be instructed to use the pitch. Stewards will direct you to the nearest exit. It may be that your normal exit route will not be available. On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrians, to enable swift and unobstructed access for the emergency services. Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.

From The Chief Executive

AFTER the dramatic summer, what a magnificent start to the season we have had – we all deserve it! news of Ray passing. He

I cannot imagine what the players must go through actually playing in the tremendous heat we have experienced over the past weeks, and whilst we shouldn't complain, a little rain would be good for the pitches.

Hot weather or not, Mike Newell and the lads have done us proud – it makes such a difference when you get off to a good start in the season, and we couldn't ask for more than three wins in eight days.

The Yeovil result, of course, put us through to the second round of the Carling Cup, and while it would have been nice to have another home tie, it's great to be drawn against a Premiership club, and I expect we will have plenty of support at The Valley.

Following my last programme notes it has been pleasing to hear from supporters, not only with complaints, but constructive comments.

One complaint we have continually received however is regarding the price of the tickets for Monday's match at Brighton, and on taking this up with them we have received the following reply:

"The price Brighton have to charge relates directly to the considerable charges for the hiring of the council-owned stadium, the very limited capacity (just under 7,000) and the lack of hospitality facilities and advertising opportunities that are available.

"The price of the match ticket also includes the cost of a travel voucher to encourage supporters to leave their cars at home and use public transport, as there is a very strict no-parking zone around the stadium, which is one of the conditions of the club's agreement with the council.

"Prices for away supporters equate to the lowest price charged to home supporters, most of whom it must be said also sit in stands exposed to the inclement weather."

As always the one minute's silence at the Yeovil match was impeccably observed by both sets of fans. In line with his wish, we are holding a collection here today in his memory, and I know our supporters will want to give to this worthy cause and show our respect for Ray. Our thanks to the official Luton Town Supporters Club members for their help with the collection today.

We would like to pass on our condolences to Dave Kirby, our former physio, and his family on the death of his mother. Florence Kirby was a former member of the Century Club, and a stalwart supporter of Luton Town.

Finally, this afternoon, our thanks go to the Loyal Luton Supporters Club and the Hitchin Town Supporters FC for their fundraising match at Offley last week. As a club we are still going through difficult times, but the reaction from so many people and organisations has been superb. With so many sharing such a depth of feeling for our club, we are certain to get through our present troubles.

Hatters Away o The Seaside



BANK holiday traffic and strict parking restrictions around the stadium could mean problems for Town fans heading for Brighton on Monday. Our advice is to use the official coach services, or Thameslink's rail service -Withdean Stadium is a tenminute walk from Preston

station, the stop before Brighton. Football parking is banned in the residential area around Withdean, but there is a free park and ride scheme.

The Bobbers Travel Club will take you to Brighton for £11, £9 for senior and junior citizens, and their coaches leave Cranfield at 9.30 and Luton an hour later. The Town on Tour service sets off from Bletchley at 9.30 and Luton at 10.30. Fares are £12 for adult members of Luton Town Supporters Club, £10 for junior and senior members, and £14 for others.



If You Must Drive


IN normal traffic conditions you can motor to Brighton in two hours or less, but the bank holiday complicates things on Monday. Leave Luton on the M1 south, then take M25 west, towards and beyond Heathrow. Leave M25 at junction 8, taking the M23 towards Brighton. That becomes the A23, London Road, and at the first roundabout on the outskirts of Brighton turn right under a small railway bridge and you will see the Mill Road park and ride entrance.

BOOKINGS for away games travel can be made at the LTSC or Bobbers kiosks in Kenilworth Road, before or after home games. Paul Deason on 01234 750996 will take phone bookings for the Bobbers, whose service includes pick-ups at Cranfield, Marston Moretaine, Ampthill, Flitwick, Westoning and opposite the Travelodge Motel in Dunstable Road, Luton, close to the M1.



However, he was spotted by York City and spent four seasons on their books, playing in 90 games, before being brought to Grimsby by Alan Buckley. Buckley famously said of Pouton, "I'll pay that lad's wages myself if it's the only way we can get him!" Now in his fifth season with the Mariners, Alan's style is 'combative', and he forms a fearsome partnership with Stacy Coldicott. He plays mostly in central midfield, but has also had games on the right and left flanks.

In early December 2001, he suffered a broken ankle

in the final minute against Wolves, but had recovered by the beginning of February to help in Town's successful fight against relegation.

By the beginning of the 2002-3 season, 'Pouts' was close to making his 100th Town League appearance. He was injured again in mid-December, in a remarkable parallel to the previous season, and returned in mid-February against Stoke, inspiring the team to a vital win.

Injury again struck this pre-season and Alan could be out until November 2003.

Blast From The Past

Lennie When Lawrence took over as Luton Town manager December 1995 he knew he had a job on his hands. The Hatters were rock bottom of

Division One with only four wins recorded from 22 starts and with a team thoroughly lacking in confidence.

Lawrence fully realised the enormity of his task but was prepared to give the existing players the benefit of the doubt before attempting to make changes. He was therefore content to take a watching brief as the Town took on Huddersfield at Kenilworth Road in his first game in charge.

As so often happens when a new manager takes the helm, the team shows hidden reserves of talent and effort that were not being seen only a few days before and the Town ripped into Huddersfield and would have won had Steve Davis not been dismissed for an innocuous challenge on Andy Booth. As it was, the Hatters managed to claw their way back to level the scores after being 1-2 down with a fighting performance that made a mockery of their early season form. Lawrence had plenty of time in which to get to

know the players as the next three games were all postponed. Matches at Crystal Palace and Port Vale and a home clash with fellow strugglers, Sheffield United, all went with the freezing weather but Lawrence, although frustrated, was happy to play the games later on in the campaign when the pitches would be less of a lottery.

Having taken stock of the players at his disposal, Lawrence took his new charges to Grimsby for an F.A. Cup tie in early January and was distraught to witness a 1-7 thrashing. Grimsby seemed to score almost at will with the Town unable to control the Mariners strike force of Steve Livingstone and Jamie Forrester. The ultimate humiliation was manager Brian Laws' cheeky triple substitution shortly before the end "to give them a run out" with two of the 1996. three scoring!

Reflecting on one of the shortest honeymoon periods on record. Lawrence could only say. "Grimsby are a good First Division side but they are not A.C.Milan. We made them look like A.C. Milan." Privately, he probably wondered what he had let himself in for.

One week, some hard talking and four team changes later the Town took on Southend, at Kenilworth Road. The Shrimpers had not lost in nine league games but they were swept aside by a Luton side showing far more effort and determination than at Grimsby with Bontcho Guentchev, recalled to the league side, scoring the first goal in a welcome 3-1 victory.

Guentchev kept his place in the side for the following weeks trip to Carrow Road, Norwich where, in a turgid game, he scored the only goal for another valuable three points. Scampering free on to a long through ball from Richard Harvey the Bulgarian was caught and upended by John Polston, just as he was about to shoot, for a cast-iron penalty. Guentchev picked himself up and stroked the spot kick past Bryan Gunn in the Norwich goal and then showed the delight of all ex-lpswich players scoring at Carrow Road!

Next up was the re-arranged home game with Sheffield United and on a cold night the Blades resorted to pumping long balls into the Luton area where they were gobbled up by the defence in which Davis was outstanding.

Victory over the Mariners is sweet revenge

Guentchev was the unlikely hero, bending a freekick around the United wall for the only goal of the game. Three wins in a row finally lifted the Town off the foot of the table.

Leicester City had a new manager in Martin O'Neill who had been appointed at the same time as Lawrence. He was struggling with no wins in his first seven games in charge and was actually being barracked by the Filbert Street faithful. It was therefore seen as a good time to pay them a visit and a good number of optimistic Luton supporters made the short trip to see the Town make all the early running.

With three enforced changes through injury the makeshift Hatters side finally took the lead in the 55th minute when Tony Thorpe, back at the club who rejected him as a teenager, coolly rounded the goalkeeper to slip the ball home.

Leicester levelled within five minutes but the Town forced all the late pressure and were desperately unlucky not to snatch a winner with Des Linton's glaring miss in the closing minutes the worst of a host of spurned opportunities.

35 days after the debacle at Blundell Park, the Hatters had the opportunity to show the Mariners that they were a much improved side when welcoming them to Kenilworth Road for our next league fixture.

Graham Alexander opened the scoring with a 20

yard drive after only seven minutes, his first goal for the club, but gradually Grimsby clawed their way back and two opportunist efforts from Forrester put the Mariners into the lead after an

Lawrence, who was probably thinking that the 'Manager of the Month' award presented to him before the start was the normal poisoned chalice. had to make some swift changes if the unbeaten record was not to continue.

Replacing Thorpe and John Taylor with the hard running David Oldfield and Dwight Marshall had the desired effect as the Grimsby defence suddenly developed the jitters which got worse when Guentchev fired in the equaliser on 68 minutes.

The Town were now in full flow and the crowd of 7,158 was on its feet six minutes later when Marshall, latching on to an astute Oldfield through pass, beat two defenders for pace to sweep the ball home for the winner and a place outside the bottom three.

Apparently, in the Luton dressing room afterwards, Grimsby boss Brian Laws worked himself up into such a rage at losing to a side that were hammered only a few weeks before that he launched a plate of chicken legs at Ivano Bonetti causing injury, subsequent court cases and much mileage for the media. The Hatters produced their normal, colourful programme for the visit of Grimsby in February 1996, an issue which was as good as anything else in the division at the time.

Bontcho Guentchev was pleased that his successful run in the Luton side had earned him a recall to the Bulgarian national squad due to play England the following month. Guentchev had played seven times for his country with two of them in the quarter and semifinals of the 1994 World Cup in the U.S.A.!

Lennie Lawrence was to be awarded the Division One 'Manager of the Month' award for January 1996 before the start of the game but he was looking on it as a "kiss of death". As if to show how fickle the game is, the other divisional awards were Archie Gemmill of Rotherham and David Moore of Scunthorpe.



Farewell to Our Cup Final Winner

SOME of the biggest names in football gathered at a church in Surrey on Wednesday to bid farewell to Ray Harford, one of the game's most respected and best-liked coaches, who died from cancer at 58.

Some Town supporters might be surprised at just how popular he was, because in PR terms he never did himself justice in his time at Kenilworth Road.

He was not comfortable giving interviews to tape recorders or TV cameras, but as a coach, tactician and judge of players he was an absolute whizz. Never was that better illustrated than in April 1988 when against all the odds he guided the Town to the only major trophy they have ever won, the Littlewoods Cup, the latest incarnation of which is the Carling Cup.

A journeyman player at Charlton, Exeter, Lincoln, Mansfield, Port Vale and Colchester he rapidly excelled as a coach, starting at Layer Road. A succession of good judges hired him to be their assistant, starting with Malcolm Macdonald at Fulham and John Moore at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1986. Moore, Mick Harford (no relation) and Mike Newell are among many who paid heartfelt tributes to Ray as the shock of his early death sank in.

Moore and Ray Harford led the Town to their best-ever league season, seventh in what is now the Premiership. John decided that management was not for him. He enjoyed coaching but not the "up front" role of a manager, and he walked away to allow Ray to take the job.

Ray also found some aspects of management tricky. For journalists he could be a nightmare to interview. A deep thinker, he was so concerned not to say the wrong thing that he often ended up saying almost nothing. But switch off the tape recorder and camera, and talk football, and he was a wonderful conversationalist.

Those of us who got to know him shared his sorrow when he was sacked in January 1990. The board spoke of him being a dour character, which he often was in public. But the real Ray Harford, the one the fans could not see or hear, was a delightful, happy family man, and a real soccer nut.

He teamed up with Kenny Dalglish at Blackburn, and they took the Ewood Park side from the Second Division to the Premier League championship in five years. Mike Newell looks back on those days with huge pleasure, as he and Ray shared glory days for the second time in their careers.

When Dalglish "moved upstairs" to allow Ray to become manager, it didn't work out and he lasted barely 18 months.

He was later manager of West Brom and QPR, with limited success, before returning to coaching, and was working in that capacity at Millwall, winning more friends and respect, when he died.

Kevin Nicholls, playing on the right, dragged a defender out wide as Kevin Foley attacked in the inside-right channel, swapped passes with Paul Hughes, and stroked in his first senior goal with a carefullyplaced drive from the edge of the box.

Courtney Pitt enjoyed a field day on the left flank, and at the interval Yeovil took off their two wing-backs, who had been embarrassed rotten, and switched to a 4-4-2.

Briefly they made a game of it, lifted by Boyce's misdirected clearance into the top corner from a cross by Lee Johnson.

But the Town came back, on a night when 6ft 8in defender Hugo Rodrigues was run ragged by Tony Thorpe and Steve Howard. Thorpe took him apart to run through and poke in his more goals, but you can't get too greedy!"

FOR their second victory in four days, to get third goal of the season on 56 minutes, and the luckless Rodrigues helped provide the clincher eight minutes later. He fouled Pitt five yards outside the angle of the penalty area, was booked, and then, like the rest of his mates, stood watching as Pitt struck the free kick into the net through the crowded area, with Paul Hughes helping to spread confusion with a lunge towards the ball.

> Rodrigues was subbed shortly after that, and the Town's romp was completed with the third goal in 13 minutes, with Johnson claiming that Howard was lucky with an under-hit volley which bounced up and over the goalkeeper.

> Mike Newell said: "It was good that we could bounce back after conceding the equaliser so early in the second half, because Yeovil looked very lively for a spell. They played some good football, but that suits us, because we are always likely to do well against footballing sides.

> "We won't be carried away by two home victories: one was against a team that had just come out of the Third Division, and this one was against a side who were in the Conference last year. But even so I was very pleased with our performances in both games. We showed character, and I was not that disappointed about the own goal - I was more disappointed about the way we let their lad in. Rob Beckwith made a good save, but we gave them a second chance to get the ball in.



IT WAS a bit of a steal as the Town made it and as heads went up, Alan Neilson claimed three wins in eight days to take top spot in the season's first league table. Even Mike Newell admitted that Steve Howard's clincher was probably offside, but his cheerful acceptance of football's fates was in marked contrast to Carlton Palmer's.

The County boss was furning with the ref and his assistant, and, to a lesser degree, with his toothless attack on a day when Chris Coyne was a giant among attacking pygmies, with Emmerson Boyce running him close for man of the match honours.

Doday winner or not, the Town deserved it for being strong at the back, competitive in midfield, and always threatening at the front. It was a decent game to watch, with both sides prepared to move forward, but Coyne's excellence was the major difference. Stockport's defence was never as comfortable, as Tony Thorpe and Howard threatened so much more than their opposite numbers.

The Town had to bring in lan Hillier because Matt Spring was hit by a migraine. It made midfield more defensive until Ahmet Brkovic was sent on in place of Hillier soon after Howard made it 2-0. And that substitution should have brought two more goals.

For a bunch of players facing pay cuts, the team spirit, togetherness and general professionalism has to be admired.

Rob Beckwith made an early save from Aaron Wilbraham before the Town settled down to contain comfortably and attack with menace. A dipping volley by Howard was inches too high before the Town stole a 33rd-minute lead. Kevin Nicholls whipped in an angled free kick,

the touch for his first Town goal.

Palmer dumped the ineffective Wilbraham at the interval, and Jon Daly looked more promising. although Stuart Barlow looked a shadow of his former self against Coyne and Boyce.

Howard and Thorpe both looked offside when the lead was doubled on 56 minutes. Thorpe was running back towards his own goal as Howard surged forward in pursuit of a clearance by Boyce. Stockport were hopelessly stretched. and Howard took the ball round the keeper and slotted in his second goal of the season.

Stockport rallied briefly, with defender Robert Jones showing his powder-puff attack how it should be done when he headed in a right wing cross by John Hardiker. That was with 18 minutes to play, but the Town stood firm, and should have had two more goals, with Thorpe shooting over at the end of a nice move involving Courtney Pitt and Brkovic, and Howard having a header well saved following another opening made by the Croatian midfielder.


Afterwards, the big talking point was the offside goal. The Town boss thought Howard probably was offside, but said he believed in accepting decisions whether they go for or against you. Palmer was furious. "Their two lads were at least ten yards offside," he said. "The linesman's explanation that Ricky Lambert headed the ball towards them is an absolute disgrace."

But he was honest enough to admit that a crucial factor was that Coyne and Boyce snuffed out Wilbraham and Barlow. It might have been different, he reckoned, if Wilbraham had taken the early chance that was denied by Beckwith.








Chattering

DEAN Crowe is putting his shirt on a change of luck this season. You may have noticed that he has reverted to number 34 in our squad list, after switching to No. 15 last season.

"It's because I am superstitious," said the 24year-old striker. "I was given number 34 when I came here from Stoke, and had a pretty good first season.



"The club changed my squad number last season, and you will know that I didn't have much luck. So I asked if I could go back to number 34, and I hope it will be a lucky number again."

Crowe certainly made an impact in the 34 shirt. After signing on loan from Stoke he scored on his debut, at Plymouth, and the loan was turned into a permanent deal after he netted

four in his first five appearances. By the end of the season he had scored 15 goals in 32 starts. But last season, as number 15, he was bedevilled by injuries, and started only 19 games, scoring two goals.

Born in Stockport, he was particularly keen to be involved at Edgeley Park on Saturday, but had to sweat it out on the bench for the whole 90 min-

"I was a bit disappointed for myself and my family, who were at the game," he said. "But I enjoyed the match - the lads did brilliantly, and winning is all that is really important."

It was their first league win since March, 13 matches ago, and that too was against Wycombe. Down in Division Three Mark Ovendale and Liam George were in the York City side that beat Northampton 1-0. The goal was scored by Lee Nogan, whose brief Luton Town career will for ever be remembered for a late penalty conceded against QPR in the FA Cup. It brought tears to his eves, as well as ours.




