Transmere upped their work-rate in the second period and soon levelled pro-ceedings. A teasing cross from Gareth Roberts deceived Coyne and Perrett allowing Simon Howarth to strike a shot that was turned home by Dagnall.

Emmerson Boyce had a header cleared off the line on the hour before he set off on a driving run for Luton's second after 64 minutes. From Boyce's one two with Hughes, McSheffrey nipped in to flick the ball in off the post with the outside of his left boot. Robert Beckwith saved well from Danny Harrison's header three min-
