GARY McSheffrey made his final loan appearance for Luton Town against Chesterfield at Kenilworth

Road on Saturday.

The 21-year-old has spent three months at the Hatters scoring nine goals in 19 starts and becoming a firm favourite with the fans. He was determined to

LUTON TOWN'S impressive recent run of form may have coincided with the introduction of Marlon Beresford between the sticks, but the experienced goalkeeper is not claiming any of the

The 34-year-old, who last week agreed to another month's contract at Kenil-worth Road, has yet to be on the losing side since joining the Hatters at the end of October.

The experienced number one was brought in to steady the ship after Luton conceded 10 goals in two successive away games at Brentford and Bournemouth.

And the former Sheffield Wednesday and Middlesbrough player has done just that, helping the Town climb up the league table and progress to the second round of the FA Cup with a string of commanding performances.

But while Luton's eight-match unbeaten run stretches back to Beres-ford's debut in the 1-1 draw against Peter-borough United, he is deflecting talk of him being the Town's lucky talisman.

He told the News-Gazette: "We all know how football's a funny game and that

things can change so quickly, so I'm not

thinking about that at all.

"I've just come in and am doing exactly what I've done for the last 16 or 17 years and that's keep goal as well as I can for the team. Other people have said 'oh, it's down to the experience you bring', but I like to think I'm still quite young!"

Beresford's career has seen him amass more than 350 league and cup appear-ances at 10 different clubs. But he admits he would love to stay at Luton on a permanent basis should the club's owner-ship situation be resolved.

He said: "I'm really enjoying my foot-

ball here and was pleased to sign for another month.

"The last year has been a little bit unsettling moving from one club to another and getting a permanent con-tract and some permanent work is what

"Mike (Newell) first rang me when he was at Hartlepool about signing me then. With me living in that area it would have been ideal, but it wasn't to be.

"I spoke to him again on the day I signed for Bradford so we had to leave it for another month, but now I'm here and it's going really well, especially with the

mbeaten run we're on. "He added: "I actually came to Luton on trial 20 years ago under John Moore and walked through the door this time and saw him again! He didn't remember me, but if were a rice recovery."

Beresford enjoyed a relatively quiet afternoon's work on Saturday, with Chesterfield failing to muster one attempt on target during the 90 minutes.

Luton welcomed back Chris Coyne and Sol Davis after suspension, while Lee Mansell and Peter Holmes dropped to the bench. Ten-goal Adrian Forbes started that set up Luton's goal after two minutes

Howard rose to send a looping header over Spireites keeper Carl Muggleton. who could only push the ball on to the underside of the bar and into the net.

Muggleton produced close range saves from McSheffrey and Howard in the 14th and 26th minutes respectively. And the veteran custodian repeated his act after half-an-hour when the pair fired in separate shots from the edge of the penalt rate shots from the edge of the penalty area. Steve Robinson and Howard both went close with further long-range efforts in the final 10 minutes, but in the end Heters settled for another three points.

## **NEWELL'S VERDICT**

"WE had four chances in the first-half and while you don't expect to score all of them it would have been nice to go in a couple

"Two months ago we might have thrown the lead away and made it dif-ficult for ourselves.

"It was a struggle, but we're happy with the three points and we'll look at the table and say 'we're
