ROCHDALE 0 HATTERS 2

AFTER seeing off Third Division Rochdale with a professional performance in Lancashire, Hatters fans and management were praying for a plum tie against a Premiership giant in the FA Cup round three

So when the Town were drawn away to Bryan Robson's First Division strug-glers Bradford City, it may have all seemed like a bit of an anti-climax.

But while Luton boss Mike Newell
admitted it "wasn't very exciting when
the name came out", he did stress it
was a game his side could realistically
win. Newell said: "We're away again,
but it's not one that's beyond us. I know
Bradford have struggled so far this season and we'll go there with a chance.

The January 3 trip to the newlynamed Bradford and Bingley Stadium in Valley Parade will be Luton's seventh away cup tie already this season after the Carling Cup trip to Charlton, LDV Vans visits to Stevenage, Rushden and Southend and the two previous FA Cup rounds at Thurck and Rochdale.

Saturday's well-earned 2-0 win at Rochdale took the Hatters to nine games unbeaten. And while it looked as though Steve Robinson's spot-kick drama at Spotland might cost Luton in the second-half, the clash was eventually settled by Lee Mansell's 77th

minute strike.

Robinson had earlier put the Town ahead from the spot after Simon Grand

tripped Adrian Forbes. But when Forbes won a second penalty nine min-utes later, Dale keeper Neil Edwards dived low to his left to push Robinson's

identical kick around the post Robinson's busy day continued when he was booked in the 28th minute for a ne was booked in the 28th minute for a foul on Chris Beech. And after the home side rallied in the second-half, it was Robinson who again popped up to play a one-two with Ahmet Brkovic and see his cross deflect off Edwards into Mansell's path for the 21-year-old to sidefoot home from eight yards.
