# It's another clean sheet for Marlon

HATTERS goalkeeper Marlon Beresford claimed his fourth clean sheet from his last five games with another competent performance at Bloomfield Road.

Beresford has been in fantastic form for the Hatters since joining the Town on a month-to-month contract from Bradford.

The 34-year-old was helped by a strong defensive showing by Luton against Blackpool, but still needed to be on his toes at times.

Just seconds after swapping his trou-blesome left shoe, the hard-working midfielder let-fly with his right foot to claim a spectacular 20-yard winner at

The dipping 35th minute effort marked the 29-year-old's third goal in his last seven starts for the Hatters.

And Robinson told the News-Gazette: "I'd just changed my boots and that was probably my first touch after running back on again. I hit it with my right though, not my left. I don't think I can

kick it that far with my left foot! Robinson has been in fine form for the Town since slotting into his favoured central midfield role along-side Matthew Spring.

With Paul Hughes resuming training, Kevin Nicholls now fit again and Peter Holmes and Michael Leary also available, boss Mike Newell will have a variety of options open to him for the

two coveted central midfield slots. Robinson added: "There's going to be a lot of competition when we get everyone back, but I'm sure the manager knows what his best side is."

Robinson's rasping effort was set up after Steve Howard laid off a Matthew Spring pass on the edge of the area. And the goal was enough to win Luton a vital three points thanks to a resolute team performance that shut out a Blackpool side who had won eight of their previous nine games. Howard threatened with three close range headers in the first half-an-hour as Luton soaked up the hosts' pressure and then

struck on the break. Three minutes after Robinson's goal, Blackpool hit the bar when veteran Mike Sheron swivelled to shoot from 10 yards. More impressive defensive work in the second half saw Luton restrict Blackpool to two efforts from on-loan youngster Simon Johnson, one saved by Beresford the other flashing wide from 30 yards in the 88th minute.
