ADRIAN Forbes' brace condemned Bradford to more FA Cup misery as Second Division Luton caused a third round upset with a 2-1 victory at Valley Parade.

The magic of the cup is not something Bradford have enjoyed in recent years having now crashed out at the third round every season since they beat Crewe in December, 1999 on their way to a fourth round exit.

Mike Newell's men outmanoeuvred and outmuscled their Division One opponents in every department from the first whistle. Chief tormentor was Forbes whose superb individual display reaped its reward with goals in the 20th and 48th minute.

Andy Gray's late penalty turned out to be nothing more than a consolation although manager Bryan Robson three times an FA Cup-winning captain with Manchester United - will claim his side have more pressing matters to address given their perilous position in the league.

But on this evidence, Robson faces a huge task if his side are to address their defensive problems in time to stave off relegation.

After a frenetic opening, the visitors thought they had opened the scoring after 11 minutes when Steven Howard latched on to a hopeful punt upfield and slammed the ball into the back of the net from 10 yards. However, the linesman deemed Howard to be in an offside position and the goal was ruled

The home side were all at sea and were punished for such a sloppy start when Forbes scored nine minutes later. The impressive Howard waltzed past two defenders before flighting a superbly weighted ball in to the penalty area for Forbes to sweep home from close-range.

Matthew Spring's 30 yard rocket called City goalkeeper Alan Combe into action with a stunning fingertip save while Steve Robinson's deft free kick forced Combe into another tidy stop just before half time.

But three minutes after the interval. Combe could do nothing as Forbes scored his second of the afternoon.

Robinson's cross from the right flank caught Bradford cold and Forbes made no mistake with an incisive finish from six vards.

Shell-shocked, Bradford went about trying to drag themselves back in to the game and laid siege to the Luton goal.

"We have come to a First Division club, we have won the game and now we are looking for a good draw in the fourth round. If you are drawn away to one of the big clubs that is a pay day."
