## Nico's back after a 21 week gap

COMBATIVE midfielder Kevin Nicholls made his first Hatters appearance in nearly five months against Tranmere Rovers on Saturday.

The 25-year-old last turned out for Town in their 2-0 August Bank Holiday defeat at Brighton.
And Nicholls has been side

lined since then, after undergoing major knee surgery.

# Mellon cuts up Town

#### HATTERS OTRANMERE 1 REFEREE Matt Messias was

public enemy number one in Luton for turning down a second-half Town penalty appeal as Hatters crashed out of the FA Cup at the weekend.

Keane played a one-two with Peter Holmes and raced into the box, only to be bodychecked by defender Gary Jones. Hatters were missing Steve Howard and Steve Robinson through suspension and Matthew Spring and topscorer Adrian Forbes through injury. With Dean Crowe not training all week and only passing a fitness test on the day of the game, Enoch Showunni was Town's lone forward with five men packed into midfield.

Hatters did welcome back Kevin Nicholls in midfield and Emmerson Boyce at the back, who had another solid game alongside skipper Chris Coyne at the heart of the home defence. Boyce himself was first to threaten

when his hooked shot from Holmes' corner was deflected over the bar by Mansell in the opening minute. But after long range shots from

Showunmi and Nicholls, Mansell did register the first effort on target after half-an-hour when his far post header from Holmes' cross was tipped over by Tranmere keeper John Achterberg.

The Hatters pressure continued and

ming the bar in first-half stoppage time But Tranmere tightened up after the interval and with the game seemingly heading for a replay Mellon fired the winner after being given time in mid-field. Danny Harrison beat Nicholls to a loose ball inside the centre circle and Mellon carried the ball 30 yards unchallenged before drilling home.

Mellon could have made it two when he ran clear on goal in injury time. But Marlon Beresford pushed the ball past the post on his last Hatters appearance. STAR HATTER: Kevin Foley. Showed composure beyond his 19 years.

#### **NEWELL'S VERDICT**

"We're disappointed. We had the majority of the

had the majority of the game, but just didn't have that cutting edge. "It was always going to be difficult with players missing through injury and suspension.

"But I can't fault the lads for their effort - it was just the lack of cut-ting edge and having that

difference that can win

you a game.

"We would have been happy to go up there in a replay and bring some of our players back, but it wasn't to be.

"Tranmere set their stall out and made it very difficult for us with five at the back and it worked for them at the end of the day."
