STEVE Howard thundered home his 10th goal of the season to set Hatters on their way to victory against Peterborough United.

And the big striker admitted it was nice to get back on the scoring trail after his double at Grimsby made it

three goals in two games.

Howard's strikes took him into the top 10 Luton Town post war scorers list

at the expense of former fans' favourite Malcolm Macdonald.

They also saw him pass the 100 league goal mark, taking him to 110 career goals in all competitions.

The 27-year-old's latest effort was one of his more spectacular – a first time drive from the edge of the area that slammed against the underside of the Posh bar and bounced powerfully up into the roof of the net.

That 25th minute strike coupled with Ahmet Brkovic's second-half header ensured the Town held on for three points despite a late Posh fight-back.

Howard said of Saturday's goal: "The ball just dropped to me and I managed to put my foot through it.

"It was nice to see it go in and that makes it three in two for me. I've passed my 100th league goal and it was also nice to get into the top 10 Luton scorers, espendent.

But he was not pleased by a controversial second-half decision that saw Hatters Director of Football Mick Harford banished to the London Road stands. Posh defender Sagi Burton launched into a hard but fair tackle on Enoch Showunmi in front of the dug-outs in the 69th minute. But as the pair picked themselves up off the floor, Burton appeared to kick Showunmi in the head. When no action was taken, Harford took issue with the fourth official, only for referee Phil Crossley to order him from the touchine. Newell said: "What
