Forbes gets back into the action

HATTERS leading goalscorer Adrian Forbes returned to the Luton starting 11 for the first time in three months against Bristol City on Saturday.

Fit-again Forbes, 25, came in for Enoch Showunmi as boss Mike Newell aimed to stop the rot of seven league games without a win.

Battling Luton raced into a two-goal lead against third-placed Bristol City thanks to strikes from Steve Howard and Emmerson Boyce

But the Robins pulled back to 2-1 through Christian Roberts' volley to set up an unforgettable last four minutes

With Town fans howling for the final whistle, Danny Coles headed City level a minute into injury time and it appeared that Hatters had fallen to their

But with the three minutes of added on time having already passed, Keane popped up with his late, late winner to

send Luton fans wild and keep the Town's slender play-off hopes intact. On conceding another late goal, Hat-ters Director of Football Mick Harford said: "I think everyone thought it was over. There were a few people starting to leave the ground as I looked around.

"I thought everyone had given up, but we deserved it over the 90 minutes. "It was a fantastic save by the goal keeper from Howie's header and Keith

eight games there have been a lot of turning points, but I think there will be a lot of twists and turns over the

goodbye to Luton's promotion hopes after the Coles goal, Town boss Mike Newell certainly hadn't.

He said: "I had a funny feeling after they scored that we could still win it. There are times you think 'we're never going to score today', but even as late as it was I still thought we had a chance.

"The lads have taken so many knocks in the last months with not just late goals, but goals at the death that I felt we deserved that little bit of luck.

Further fortune to go Luton's way on the day was referee Michael Jones' deci-sion to rule that Boyce's 56th minute

sion to rule that Boyce's 56th minute header had crossed the goal-line after the ball had rebounded off the post. While Newell admitted he couldn't see the incident clearly, Bristol boss for-mer Hatter Danny Wilson was more-vocal. He said: "Any sort of ball player

will know the bounce and spin of a ball and the trajectory it came back off the post it's impossible it crossed the line."

Hatters made three changes from the Swindon defeat; Adrian Forbes, Ahmet Brkovic and Keane in for Michael Leary,

City started much the better with Tony Rougier outstanding on the right. He set up Roberts and Mickey Bell for efforts saved by Morten Hyldgaard in the first minute and 15th minute. And Rougier's dangerous 11th minute cross almost sparked a spectacular own goal from Sol Davis, but the ball flew over.

Lee Peacock also headed just over for Bristol in the fifth minute, but it was Luton who took the lead when Steve Robinson's inswinging 26th minute free-kick was flicked home by Howard.

Brkovic then lobbed wide after being sent clear by Forbes eight minutes later. Howard went close after the break before another Robinson free-kick saw Chris Coyne head across goal and Boyce

nod in off the post before City keeper Steve Phillips cleared behind the line. Roberts latched on to Tom Doherty's chip and as Boyce stood off, volleyed home from 15 yards in the 59th minute. City levelled when Coles headed in

Brian Tinnion's injury time corner. Boyce then cleared off the line from Marc Goodfellow before Howard's header from Robinson's free-kick produced a superb save from Phillips and Keane mis-hit his volley into the ground and up and into the net off a post.
