The Town's back line were under pressure from the start as the home side chased the win they needed to avoid relegation. Chesterfield's direct, routeone style resulted in Boyce challenging for many balls challenging for many balls in the air rather than on the ground as shown by his high number of headed duels and low number of tackles, above. But Boyce showed his strength in the air against front pair Glynn Hurst and David Reeves by winning 83 per cent of the winning 83 per cent of the headers he competed for. And while the home fans invaded the pitch to celebrate another Houdini act, Hatters followers were left to applaud the end of a season that has exceeded many expectations with the club in administrative receivership.

Another special show of apprecia-tion preceded the action on the field when home and away supporters gave an ovation to retiring Luton Town pro-gramme editor and former Luton News sports editor Brian Swain.

Saturday's action saw Town top-scorer Steve Howard missing through

injury; Enoch Showunmi stepped in. Chesterfield knew they needed to win and that Rushden and Grimsby needed to lose for them to stay up.

Forbes efforts that cleared the bar.
After the break the hosts laid siege to close in the 46th, 48th, 55th, 64th, 66th and 76th minutes

Despite the home side's aerial bombardment, Luton should have scored with their only shot on goal when Robinson's drive deflected into Show unmi's path in the 59th minute, but the striker's shot from eight yards was pushed wide by Carl Muggleton.

Instead Hurst sparked wild home cel ebrations by latching on to Sol Davis backheader and slotting past Brill.

MIKE NEWELL'S VERDICT

"I FELT we defended very well considering the pressure they were putting us under, particularly in the second-half.
"We knew it was going to be like that, but I just felt we didn't show the composure to relieve the composure and create chances ourselves.
"I can't fault the lads

effort and commitment wise. They defended well for 80 minutes, but it sums our season up with us conceding another late one. "It's a difficult one because there was nothing to play for yet they did well to compete with Chester-field who were fighting for their lives at the end of the day."
