





## Life goes on whatever our status

As I write this article our Division Two status has yet to be secured despite a season long struggle against the odds and a nerve jangling win over Blackpool two weeks ago. If we get through the battle a great deal of thanks will be due to you the supporters that have stuck by us in our time of need and particularly in recent months provided deafening noise at both Saltergate and away from home.

Our task has been made so much harder by having the second lowest level of support in the division which, when added to our lack of opportunities for other income streams, was always going to make success so much harder top achieve.

However we're not the only club with problems and at least we're determined to be financially cautious ñ just look at a few crazy examples.


The nice Sam Hammam, that sold Plough Lane from under the feet of Wimbledon and then managed to strike a deal with some very naive Icelandic businessmen to walk away with many millions having handed over a financial disaster and a club that had no ground of its own, took over Cardiff City four years ago. Latest financial figures reveal a debt of £23m that now probably exceeds £30m, all owed to Sam; he's also given a commitment to build a new £60m stadium which in the short term must worsen their financial stability. Was'nt:it great to see AFC Wimbledon win their League title having risen from the tawdry ashes and did an Arsenal by remaining unbeaten?

Nearby Sheffield Wednesday are currently deciding whether or not to embrace genial Ken Bates. Now I;m no supporter of Dave Allen but it seems to me his pragmatic and structured approach to clearing the Owls' debt is viable whereas the concept of creating a Hillsborough Village is just the sort of tosh we all fell for at Saltergate not too long ago.

OPR and Derby County are both in terrible financial messes despite both being likely to secure Division 1 status for next season. First QPR entered into an arrangement with a faceless Panamanian company that sees them pay £83,000 per month in interest alone. They may have got rid of a basketful of assorted loans and replaced them with a nice neat one but when you sign up to a worse interest rate it does make you wonder why. Derby duly followed suit just a few months later and entered into a similar arrangement with the same company. Both clubs desperately need a major influx of benign cash and there's no sign of it happening. I don't suppose the Panamanians will worry though because if QPR goes bust the foreign company picks up a piece of priceless West London real estate that they could never have afforded to buy.

At least Leeds United can thank their lucky stars that the master of financial wizardry, Geoffrey Richmond, stepped in to

mastermind their turnaround. Yes that's the same Geoffrey that turned Bradford City into a financial disaster and the ground into a white elephant, pocketed a few £m in dividends and turned tail pretty quickly only to turn up as the saviour of Elland Road. Despite the consortium's protestations expect to see Elland Road sold and leased back and many other zany ideas tried (Bradford City currently feel morally but not legally obliged to honour Geoffrey's 25 year season tickets). Just over two weeks ago Geoffrey walked away from Leeds after confirming that the fans had less than 100% support for his involvement, he left his son holding the fort.

Even Champions League over-achievers Monaco were £63m in debt a year ago and in danger of being demoted until Prince Rainier went around the principality with the proverbial begging bowl and produced £39m in a matter of days to secure their future; if only we could match that ease of fund raising. To add a little more perspective Italy top the debtors in Europe with Roma at least £250m in debt and Serie A clubs totalling over £1.5b debt.

Supporters may not like it but there rarely is a sexy way out of problems. We'd all like to wish our reckless credit card bills easily away but the reality is that only sensible stewardship solves individuals and clubs' problems. Our guests today, Luton, know as well as us the horrors of administration and will be just as determined not to return.

Whatever our fate is just look back to the last day of the Conference season and note that Exeter and Hereford both had attendances in excess of 7,000. Both seemed to be in terminal decline but hard work and good housekeeping got them through just as it will us!

Enjoy Euro 2004 and see you back in August when Ken Foster and John Taylor will start the season with a couple of reports from Portugal.



### In the Hot Seat

## Mike Newel

Mike Newell's second managerial appointment came less than a month after his first taste of life in the hot-seat had ended on a sour note despite the fact he had led his team to promotion. Mike was not given a new contract by Hartlepool United, who finished runners-up in Division Three in May 2003, after taking the helm at the end of November following Chris Turner's departure for Sheffield Wednesday. However, he was not out of the game for long as he topped an unprecedented vote to become Luton Town's new manager in June 2003, beating off competition from the previous incumbent Joe Kinnear and former Cheltenham and Stoke boss Steve Cotterill.

Hartlepool chairman Ken Hodcroft took something of a risk on the inexperienced Newell (39), giving him the job with the Victoria Park club placed at the top of the league at the time. The former Leicester, Everton and Blackburn striker's only previous managerial experience was at Tranmere Rovers, where he was reserve team boss, and Doncaster Rovers, where he coached before accepting the post at nearby Hartlepool.


Newell's career began with his hometown club, playing for Liverpool juniors before moving to Crewe Alexandra, where he would return in the twilight of his career. He only made three appearances for Crewe during his first spell, but managed to secure a move to Wigan Athletic where he established himself as a professional. He signed for Luton in 1986 and made 63 league appearances for The Hatters, scoring 18 goals before moving on to Leicester in 1987.

After two seasons with The Foxes, he returned to Merseyside to play for Everton before making the move to Blackburn where he helped take Kenny Dalglish's side into the Premier League and then to the title. Although Mike's close friend Alan Shearer and Chris Sutton became the first choice strike pairing in the championship winning season of 1994-95, Mike made a

telling contribution and played regularly as a substitute.

He also set a new record in the Champions League the following season scoring the fastest ever hat-trick in the competition with his quick-fire ten-minute treble against Rosenborg. In total Newell played over 500 league games for 14 clubs in a 19-year professional career that saw him compete at every level. After leaving Blackburn he signed for Birmingham then Aberdeen - after loan spells with West Ham and Bradford - then returned to England with Crewe and played out his career at Doncaster and finally Blackpool. He also played international football for England's under-21 and 'B' teams.

Having moved into coaching and now management, Newell will be hoping he can use his brief experience at Hartlepool to good effect as he looks to take Luton forward. Mike continues to take his UEFA coaching badges and also began the Certificate of Applied Management at Warwick University in the summer 2003 as he further develops his knowledge and experience in a profession that he is still relatively new to.



The last year in Luton Town's History will be one that will be looked at in Year's to come as an eventful one! Chairman Mike Watson-Challis decided to call it a day last Summer and sell the Club on to a chap by the name of John Gurney, not a person considered by many Luton fans to be an ideal steward of their beloved Hatters. He hired front men Roger Terrell and Lee Power to run the Club but they declined to take up their positions when Luton supporters, in no uncertain terms, made it clear that such a team wasn't wanted at Kenilworth Road. Fans watched open mouthed as popular Manager Joe Kinnear was sacked, apparently by someone who didn't even have any association with Luton Town, there was the infamous "Manager Idol" style vote for the new Boss, "won" by Mike Newell, though the Electoral Reform Society weren't hired to count the votes! Such was the turmoil, that the "Trouble at the Top" TV Documentary last Month featured the Bedfordshire Club's Summer of Madness.

Administrative Receivership was the result of the farce, Barry Ward, who worked briefly with Chesterfield during our own farce (he was a Good Guy!), took over the reigns of the Club and guided them through the financial quagmire. The hoped for rubber stamping of the League for a consortium headed by Bill Tomlins has been dragging on for weeks now, but Ward and his Solicitor have both expressed hope that the deal would be finalised this week. Trust In Luton, the fans' Trust, has played a massive part in ensuring the Club comes through this travesty, Barry Ward has ensured they've played a meaningful part in the future life of the Club, indeed he was a Trust pioneer, working with Northampton Town many years ago when the Trust movement first began.

Meanwhile, on the field, it's been a pretty good, though ultimately disappointing, season for Luton, their play off dream was extinguished a couple of weeks ago, but a certain top half finish (last season saw them in 9th) is testimony to the work Newell has done in very difficult working conditions, with a long standing transfer embargo and little money to play with.

Congratulations to everyone at Kenilworth Road who's ensured the Club's still here to fight another day, mind you, we hope they don't fight too hard this afternoon!



### 7. Adrian Forbes (25)

Winger or striker who started the season with a goal glut but his rate of return has slowed later in the season, though he has got 14. Only 5'8". Adrian suffered a cruciate ligament problem last season but it didn't seem to stifle his electric pace. Began with Norwich and cost Luton £60,000.

### 11. Steve Robinson (29)

A Northern Ireland International, formerly with Spurs, Bournemouth, Preston (£375,000) and Bristol City (loan). Joined Luton for £50,000 in the summer of 2002. An attacking midfielder with great ball

### 12. Chris Coyne (25)

Australian born in Brisbane who moved to West Ham for £150,000 from Perth in 1996, had loan spells with Brentford and Southend before moving north to Dundee. Luton invested £50,000 to bring his back

to England in 2001. Player of the Year last season, he's missed just two games this term. Centre half.

### 16. Enoch Showunmi (20)

The find of the season for Mike Newell, having played non league for Willesden Constantine, where Barry Hayles is a former player, he joined Luton on trial after completing his University course. Was unable to sign pro due to Luton's transfer embargo, so played for free before signing a two and a half year contract earlier this year. Scored a hat-trick against Brentford but still needs his raw talent fione tuning.

### 18. Ahmet Brkovic (29)

Croatian midfielder who joined Luton in 2001 from Leyton Orient. Played for HNK Dubrovnik prior to that. A versatile midfielder, he can also turn out up front, though he's managed only 1 goal so far this season.

### 21. Paul Hughes (28)

Chelsea, Stockport (loan), Norwich (loan) and Southampton have been this excellent utility man's previous employers. Capable of playing equally well in virtually any position, but a creative midfielder is his best position. Appeared in only half of Luton's games this term, he has suffered with injuries in his Kenilworth Road career.

### 23. lan Hillier (24)

A former Spurs youngster, Ian's been with Luton for almost 3 years. He's another versatile player, full back, centre half or midfield have all been places he's occupied. However he's yet to make a first team place his own, just31 starts in 3 seasons is his League tally.

### 24. Soi Davis (24)

A left back who cost £600,000 from Swindon two years ago. Crossing and tackling come naturally, though goalscoring doesn't, no goals in over 200 senior appearances! Has been a regular in his two seasons at Luton.





### The Keeper 33. Dean Brill (18)

A first year pro, Dean made his debut at Oldham last September after Robert Beckwith was red carded. Has started three League games since, including last weeks 3-2 win over Sheffield Wednesday, when he was drafted in to replace Morton Hyldgaard, who'd been having a tough time since his signing in January. Brill is a local lad who's been with the Club since the age of 9.





### **The Creator**

28. Kevin Nicholls (25)

Injury has meant that Kevin has played in less than half of Luton's games this season but his dynamic, Captain's performances have been impressive when available. Combative in midfield with a dead ball skill, he's always involved, often too much according to referees, he began with Charlton Athletic, was borrowed by Brighton before a £250,000 fee took him to Wigan. After two years there a tenth of that fee was paid by Luton and if he plays, it will be his 99th League appearance for The Hatters.



### The Stopper

17. Emmerson Boyce (24)

Can play at either full back or centre half, Emmerson was named Player of the Year at the start of the week having played in 41 of the 46 League games to date. Luton has been the Aylesbury born defender's only Club. Has developed his concentration over the last couple of years and is less likely to get stranded upfield as he often did in his early days.



### The Hotshot

19. Steve Howard (28)

Steve will celebrate his birthday in two days time, this season he's celebrated his 3rd consecutive season as Luton's top scorer (16 goal) including one goal against us earlier this season to add to one scored last term at Kenilworth Road too. A tough centre forward of the old school, Steve joined Hartlepool United from Tow Law Town in 1995 before a move to Northampton Town (£120,000) in 1999, he joined Luton on deadline day three years ago for a bargain £50,000 fee. Scored two last week against The Owls including the injury time winner.



### 31. Curtis Davies (18)

Young centre half who's made a few appearances this season. A Wimbledon schoolboy, he initially joined Luton on trial. Is in his final year as a scholar.

### 32. Lee Mansell (21)

Came through the ranks at Luton, the central midfielder had a spell on loan at Nuneaton Borough last term and has made a dozen starts this season in Div 2 after failing to get the call at all last term, other than in LDV games.

### 37. Keith Keane (17)

First year scholar and a Rep of Ireland U17 International. Despite his tender age, Keith has started around a third of Luton's games this season. Midfielder born in Luton.

### 38. Michael Leary (21)



One of the great attractions about football is the uncertainty of it all, although things do not feel very comfortable for us right now; as for the third season in a row we await our fate on the final day.

It is a miracle we have managed to stay in the Second Division with the £183,000 debt per annum that needs to be repaid on top of our normal day-to-day running expenses. September, however, sees us paving our final instalment and we shall then be able to compete on the same basis as other clubs, i.e. income generated.

Although money helps, it is not the be all and end all. Football is after all a team game and team spirit, together with prudent financial management can move mountains. We can be ambitious without putting the clubis future at risk.

Charlton Athletic are in my view a current example of a club that consistently beats the odds.

In 1991 they had a burnt out stadium on a derelict site, now they have a stadium with 27,000 capacity (nearly full for most home matches), have been competing for a place in Europe for most of the season and have a team that includes International players.

They have achieved this by all pulling together. They are a communityorientated club offering a wide range of affinity marketing, including areas not normally associated with a football club. They have realised that by investing in the community they will get in return a commercial gain. They have increased turn over (the life blood of a club) during the last ten years from £4 million to over £35 million per annum and last season

The legal agreement empowering vour Directors to run the football club on behalf of the society is working very well and I believe could become the blue print for other supporter

owned clubs.

- We have a settled experienced management team who are now in a position to reassess their playing
- The School of Excellence continues to make progress and finished runners up in the Merit League.
- Last, but not least, work towards the new stadium is progressing and outline planning permission will be requested in the near future.

So fingers crossed that the results go for us today. There will be more ups and downs to come between repaying our debts and building Wheeldon Mill but whether you have thrown a coin into a bucket, joined the Society or invested thousands of pounds, together we will do it - believe me the only way is up!





### **BRENTFORD** v Bournemouth

The Bees lost their first game under Martin Allen at Grimsby Town last Saturday, a 1-0 defeat bringing them back into the fold and taking The Mariners out of the bottom four. Prior to that, four wins and four draws had threatened to take Brentford away from the Drop Zone before the nervy finale. Away wins at Hartlepool and Barnsley show that under Allen, the London outfit can get unexpected points, so their fans will be expecting they'll get the win they need. A draw will mean we can't realistically catch them, but Rushden, who have a better goal difference, could, so The Bees will be all out for a win.

Bournemouth, in 8th spot but out of the play offs, have had some bizarre results recently, but just 1 win in 7 has meant they'll not make the top six. Since winning 3-0 at Nene Park, they've only won at Peterborough, just a week after losing 5-1 at home to Tranmere. Last week they drew 0-0 at home to Stockport, a point for the visitors being enough to confirm their Division Two status. Sean O'Driscoll's side will be disappointed to have missed out on a season's extension, and are too unpredictable of late to be able for us to rely on them.





### Tranmere Rovers v GRIMSBY TOWN

Nicky Law's Grimsby Town beat Brentford to leapfrog us and escape from the trapdoor meaning that a win for them and safety is assured. A draw or worse, combined with either us or Rushden winning, will mean a second straight relegation for The Mariners and a second Club relegated (following Bradford City) managed by Law this term. Grimsby haven't won away since November, a statistic we hope isn't broken as the failure to get three points from Prenton Park will mean, with goal difference taken into account, a win for us will definitely see us ahead of the Cleethorpes Club, who've won 3 in the last 12 attempts.



Tranmere have won four of their last five games, a defeat at play off chasing Port Vale (2-1) last time out their only loss since losing to us and subsequently going out of the FA Cup to Millwall, Brian Little's men will surely want to end the season with a flourish and cement a top ten position. They look a fairly good bet to get at least a point, which is all we need them to do.





### **RUSHDEN & DIAMONDS** v Port Vale

Hartlepool and Swindon's losses last Saturday, coupled with Vale's win over Tranmere, mean that The Valiants could still make the Play Offs, and that's good for us. They must win and hope that either Swindon or Hartlepool lose again, a draw's no good, so they'll be all guns a blazing at Nene Park. Since drawing with us, Vale have won both subsequent games and look a good bet to get something from their trip to Northamptonshire, we need them to get at least a point.

As for Rushden & Diamonds, they've plummeted in recent weeks from a top half position at the end of February to a position that sees them, like us, needing a win to survive. They've lost their last three games and not scored in four, their last three home games have all been lost and new Manager Ernie Tippett seems to have inherited a side that seems to have accepted its fate following the moving on of several key players on transfer deadline day. Just 1 win in 13 indicates The Diamonds may have a tough and ultimately disappointing day, if we're to survive, we need them to.





## Percy Summers

### For Spireites & Hatters:

When the full-time oil salesman and part-time ëkeeper Harry Sewell was injured at the start of the 1910-11 season, Chesterfield Town turned to Percy Summers, a recent recruit from the mining village of Wales, just over the border in Yorkshire. He became an immediate hit and, in an era when playing staffs were often replaced almost en masse at the end of every season, Summers stayed for four.



Percy became highly popular with the fans in his four years at Saltergate with the Town club's Midland League side: indeed, there were protests when Percy was overlooked for the captaincy after Sam Strettle left in 1913. Consistent and reliable, there were no theatricals in his game; anticipation and timing were features of his ground work. Perhaps his stature caused a lack of effectiveness in the air, but that wasnit such a problem in the days of heavier footballs. Summers kept 45 clean sheets in something

like 146 games for Chesterfield, developing a fine reputation before moving on. He enjoyed one good season in the Football League with Grimsby in 1914-15: as the only non-league Spireite keeper to achieve such a feat with another club, he deserves a small corner in the Spireite Hall of Goalkeeping Fame. War broke out just after he signed, though, and he found himself in a French trench at 7.30am on July 1st, 1916, a day of unparalleled slaughter for the British Army.

Wounded by a rifle grenade on the Somme, he recovered to make wartime appearances for Reading and Sheffield Wednesday before succeeding Joe Mitchell (himself a future Spireite) in Luton's goal for their last season of Southern League football. He played 32 times for the Hatters that year, but left as they joined the Third Division of the Football League and finished his playing career at Margate.







Our record against Luton Town here is an encouraging won seven, drawn five, lost four, with the goal count standing 22-16 in our favour. This, despite our having gone almost fifty years without a win against them here, between 1949 and 199. Much of that was down to our playing in different divisions, of course, and of the seven games that took place in those fifty years, five were drawn.

Our most recent five meetings have produced one win for the Hatters, two for us and two drawn games. Luton last won here by three goals to one in 1999-2000. Gary Doherty (now at Tottenham) gave them a first-minute lead, and Watts and George added two more before half-time. Jon Howard (released this week by Burton Albion) pulled one back. Portsmouthis Matty Taylor was in their side that day, and Nathan Abbey was on the bench.

Last time out we won 2-1 with both goals, from Hurst and Reeves, coming in a four-minute spell after Brkovic had given them a 1-0 half time lead. Only five of the side that won that day will be on duty today. The dizzy heights of ninth place that we achieved with that win seem but a distant memory! The rot set in after that game; a run of ten without a win followed to leave us down among the strugglers. Perhaps todayis fixture will see the pendulum stop at the end of its arc, and begin to swing back the other way?achieved by The Spireites.

### Past **Seasons**

## 1930-1931 Division Three North

### **By Alan Harris**

The thirties was an exciting time to be a chesterfield supporter and 1930-31 was no exception. The Spireites were not run away champions. The facts are they preserved and entertained with a side of maturity.

- They attained top spot with 58 points, runners up Lincoln City on 57 and Wrexham and Tranmere on 54, two points for a win in those days. Hopefully the present attempts to maintain second division football this season will mirror the 30-31 sides fighting spirit. They certainly had to strive to the very end to gain reward under Mr Teddy Davidson as secretary manager in his fist spell at Saltergate.
- The Spireites worst defeat was 5-1 away to Darlington- their highest score win was 8-1 at home to Gateshead, the Spireites also scored seven on two occasions.
- 21 players involved during the season. Notable departures included G Peake, H Wightman, R Dennison, S Taylor, and Charlie Bicknell who signed from Tupton Ivanhoe, playing 85 games fro

the Spireites he left for Bradford City later moving to West Ham. I saw him Captain West Ham at Saltergate in a second division game which the Spireites won 3-1, on the 14th September 1946 aged 4.

- Jimmy Bullock, who scored 32 goals in 45 games was transferred to Man U during the season.
- Amongst the newcomers to the squad were S Binns, J Holmes, D Robb, S Abel, T Bell, A Pyngar.
- Ever present was goal keeper Bill Dolman.
- Top scorer Albert Pynagar with 26 goals in 29 games- the best performances was beating Lincoln City 3-2 at Saltergate in the penultimate end of season game with over 20,000 present.



- Programme from that season
- The average home gate was 6,200 and away 6,100.
- In the F.A Cup the Spireites went out in round one to Notts County who were 30/31 season champions of the third division south.



## # 22 Tcham N'Toya

As transfer deadlines go, Thursday 25th April 2004 saw plenty of moves but few to truly whet the appetite. Nationwide League Division Two watchers probably though Onandi Lowe leaving Rushden & Diamonds for Coventry or Jermaine McSporran joining Walsall from Wycombe Wanderes were two of the more intriguing moves, there were few eyebrows raised when Mark De Bolla joined The Spireites from Charlton Athletic, after his loan spell and much talk of a possible move there was no real "surprise" for Saltergate watchers.

Jamie Fullarton had joined us 24 hours earlier after being freed by Southend, but the move that captured everyone in North Derbyshire's imagination was the signing of 20 year old Democratic of Congo born Frenchman Tcham N'Toya, once of Troyes, ironically Chesterfield's Twin Town, who'd apparently been recommended to us by Portsmouth's Jim Smith, one of the games' longest serving and most respected coaches. "Although we know very little about the lad he comes highly recommended and we hope he realises his desire to make a name for himself in English football. We think it is a risk worth taking and I appreciate the backing given by the Board to such an unusual move," commented Roy McFarland on his signing, unusual in Chesterfield's modern history, a

player signed on without being seen in action by the Manager.

Possibly one other such signing was another Frenchman, Oliver Bernadeau, who joined Chesterfield in 1986 after trials at Watford and Leeds United. He spent a season in North Derbyshire after playing for Chateauroux in France and moving to England to study. Incidentally, he is now Commercial Director at top French Club Olympique Lyonnais. He was only the second Frenchman to play League football in post war England after Villa's Didier Six.

Tcham had packed his bags to try his luck in England feeling his style would suit the hustle and bustle of the domestic game after a handful of appearance for Troyes, he made his first team debut last August in a 0-0 draw at Clermant-Ferrand and made

two other League appearances, both as a sub, both against Laval in France's second level.

Born on 3rd November 1983, Tcham moved to France as a young boy, got the football bug as France became a World Power in the game, but felt that his best chance to make the grade came in this Country, so after a trial at Portsmouth, whom he impressed but not quite enough to sign, he packed his bags for Chesterfield, showed up well in training, and found himself on the bench for the Grimsby game, though he didn't make it onto the pitch.

With money from CFSS's Player Wage fund helping to pay for the young striker, fans who




The Stockport home game saw another Tcham start, Marvin Robinson replaced him after 69 minutes in a game which could easily have seen the first ever Spireites goal from a man from the other side of La Manche, but he slid an acute angled effort just wide of the post when it was still game on.

His versatility was demonstrated at Port Vale when he played wide right to Hurst and Reeves front two, he almost made 90 minutes then, De Bolla taking over on 83, since then N'Toya's roles have been confined to that of a sub, as he was in the 2-2 at Bournemouth, he was again buzzing around against Blackpool but had a much less influential spell last week at Oldham.

The Manager will have had enough time to have weighed up the player now and will be evaluating whether he will be a member of next season's squad, whatever Roy's decision is, we wish the likeable striker all the best.



Sincere condolences from everyone at Chesterfield Football Club have been sent to the Duchess of Devonshire on her sad loss.






