Twice they halved a two-goal deficit but in the end they couldn't breach the Hatters' defence to score the goal that would have rescued a point.

Ahead of the clash King had received a boost as Sammy Igoe shrugged off a tired hamstring to take his place in the starting

Town carved open the first real chance on two minutes. Howard sprang the offside, to his surprise it seemed, but he played a poor ball across the area to Igoe.



The little midfielder should have taken it on his left foot, chose to switch to his right and his eventual shot was blocked.

Luton swiftly began to take control of proceedings though and Town had keeper Rhys Evans to thank as the Hatters threatened to take a fifth-minute lead.

Rowan Vine raced in from the left edge of the box and his shot looked destined for the bottom right hand corner. Thankfully for Town, Evans got a hand to the ball and

deflected it on to the post.

The ball was hacked out for a corner and from the resulting set piece Curtis Davies got up well at the near post but headed powerfully over the top.

The visitors looked far livelier, more composed and showed terrific movement off the

seemed lethargic and both the passing and decision-making was frequently poor.

Steve Howard headed weakly at Evans from close range after diving to meet a Davis cross

from the left but the goal the Hatters richly deserved arrived on 24 minutes.

O'Hanlon was penalised for tugging at Vine inside the box and referee Mr Leake had no hesitation in pointing to the spot.

Luton skipper Kevin Nicholls stepped forward and thumped the ball into the bottom left-hand corner, Evans guessing right but unable to reach the shot.

Town responded briefly and Gurney whistled a free-kick just wide of the left post from 22 yards on 26 minutes.

Paul Underwood should have doubled Luton's lead 10 minutes later, striding in
