





Football is a sport that is driven by belief and passion, whether that is for one team or



GOOD AFTERNOON and welcome to everyone.

Several supporters contacted me regarding the price of tickets at the Swindon match. The pricing of Swindon's tickets has been brought to the attention of The Football League by many clubs and supporters, but as the same prices are offered to their own supporters for the same type of facility, Swindon do meet the criteria laid down in the regulations.

As I advised you in the last home programme there are several changes to the disciplinary procedures for players for this season, the main one being the new "Fast Track Procedure" and full details relating to this can be found on our website www.lutontown.co.uk. One of the main changes is the immediate suspension of a player who is dismissed from the field of play from the next first-team competitive match or matches depending on the offence, unless an appeal is lodged under the new procedures laid down.

The following suspension dates will apply with regards to accumulated bookings, five recorded cautions in first-team competitive matches before the 29th February 2005 will carry a onematch suspension, ten recorded bookings before 10th April 2005 will carry a two-match suspension.

The F.A. Cup regulations have also seen a major change in that the player qualification date has changed from seven days to one day. Players are now required to be registered by twelve noon on the Friday prior to each round.

I was very surprised to receive confirmation that the World Cup qualifier match for England when they play Wales on Saturday 9th October has a 3.00pm kick-off, the same time as our own home league match with Hartlepool, not only will this affect our own match, but the whole of football throughout England, from grass roots to the professional game. At the time of writing I am in dialogue with Hartlepool to play the match on Friday evening so that everyone has the opportunity to watch the England match on the 9th. I will advise you as soon as possible.

As many of you are aware our Rev Catherine Moss is unable to continue in her position as Club Chaplain due to the amount of time her young family now take up. We would like to take this opportunity to thank Catherine and her family for all the support they have given the club and wish them every happiness in the future. We hope to be able to advise you of the new Club Chaplain very shortly, which leads me to advise you that although December seems a long way away the Club's 8th Annual Carol Service will take place on Thursday December 16th at St Mary's Church, Luton at 7.30 pm.

Finally, just another reminder that due to a misprint we did advertise the AFC Bournemouth match on Bank Holiday Monday as having a 7.45 pm kick off, it does kick off at 3.00 p.m. Please accept our apologies.

Welcome to the start of the 2004/05 football season.

TODAY'S OPPONENTS



Head Coach - Leroy Rosenior

LEROY ROSENIOR wasn't ever considered by his playing-days team-mates as a possible future manager. He is best remembered as a West Ham striker, and one who scored the winning goal in the FA Cup against Arsenal, but he also figured for Fulham, Charlton, and QPR before ending his career in the West Country at Bristol City.

After a short spell in caretaker charge at Ashton Gate he left the club to begin building a managerial career in the game. He went first to Chippenham Town and then to Merthyr Tydfil, before Torquay United chairman Mike Bateson took a massive risk and opted to replace Roy McFarland with a rookie boss.

Rosenior had been on Bateson's list of three (with lain Dowie) when McFarland had been appointed the year before - and took his second chance in style. From the moment he arrived at Plainmoor he set about a revolution.

He built on the team that McFarland had half-created and by the end of his second season in charge had guided the South Devon club to their first automatic promotion from the basement division in 38 years. The Gulls spent their one and only previous season outside the bottom flight since England won the World Cup in 1991/92.

Rosenior has battled with a tight budget throughout his time at Plainmoor and is now considered one of the most watched managers outside the Premiership. Nowadays Premiership chairmen only seem interested in hiring from abroad - much to the continued relief of Gulls fans.

GOALKEEPERS

KEVIN DEARDEN

The Luton-born stopper began his football career at Tottenham in 1988, although he only ever made two senior appearances for the topflight club before embarking on what must have seemed like a round-the-country loan spell that lasted three and a half years. His journeys on loan saw him play between the sticks for Cambridge, Hartlepool, Oxford, Swindon, Peterborough, Hull, Rochdale, Birmingham and Portsmouth before he left White Hart Lane for good in the summer of 1993 to sign for Brentford. Over 200 appearances and loan spells with Barnet and Huddersfield preceded his switch to Wrexham. After two seasons with the Red Dragons he joined Torquay and now has over 500 appearances in all competitions under his belt.

ARJAN VAN HEUSDEN

An experienced goalkeeper who was brought to Torquay by Leroy Rosenior in November 2002. The Dutch-born 'keeper had previously played for neighbours Exeter, but came to United as cover during a goalkeeping injury crisis. He has also played for Mansfield, Cambridge, Oxford and Port Vale, the latter of which paid Dutch side Norrdwijk for his services in 1994.

DEFENDERS

LEE CANOVILLE

Graduated through the youth ranks at Arsenal and was a part of England's youth set-up at Under-18's level. After one appearance for the Gunners and a loan spell at Northampton Town he was invited for a trial at Plainmoor. He impressed then manager Roy McFarland, and the club took him on non-contract terms, before awarding a full contract later. His 2003/04 season was slightly marred by an injury that caused him to miss a quarter of the matches but when he played he consistently demonstrated exactly why he is regarded as a player with a good future ahead of him.


MATTHEW HOCKLEY

A hard-tackling midfielder who followed in his older brother's footsteps and progressed through the Gulls' youth ranks. The uncompro-

mising player demonstrated what he is made of during the 2002/03 season and under head coach Leroy Rosenior, he is becoming a very useful midfielder. He appeared 44 times during last season's successful promotion campaign.

BRIAN McGLINCHEY

loined Torquay on a free transfer from Plymouth Argyle in October 2003 after he had spent a short time on loan with Gulls when injury had forced him out of the Argyle side. He is a tough tackling leftback and has gained International honours with Northern Ireland Under-21's. There is every chance he could go on and receive full senior side recognition in the coming season if he continues to play in the



same vein that saw him help the Gulls win promotion.

GARETH OWEN

The 6'I" defender will be spending the 2004/05 season on loan with the Gulls having signed from Stoke City. No stranger to football at this level, he spent the tailend of last season on loan with Oldham Athletic, making fifteen appearances.

CRAIG TAYLOR

The dominating centre-half started out as a trainee with Exeter City, before dropping out of the professional game to play for Dorchester Town. Whilst at Dorchester he was spotted by Swindon Town, who signed him for £25,000 in April 1997. He first went on loan to Plymouth in October 1998, but it was another year before Argyle paid Swindon £30,000 for his services. He joined Torquay on loan at the end of the 2002/03 season, a move he made permanent that summer. He was a vital part of the team that gained automatic promotion last year and playing alongside Steve Woods, Craig proved to be

one of the club's key players and signed a oneyear extension to his contract during the closeseason.

MATT VILLIS

Currently on a loan from Championship side Plymouth Argyle, he is considered by them as one for the future, but has joined the Gulls for the season with a view to gaining some valuable first-team experience.

STEVE WOODS

Roy McFarland brought the strong centre-back to Torquay on a free transfer from Chesterfield in 2001. He began his career as a trainee at Stoke City and made 38 league and cup appearance for the Potters, before he had a loan spell with Plymouth Argyle. Ten months later he made the cross-country switch to the Spireites and in August 2001 he arrived at Plainmoor. He recently made his 100th appearance for the Gulls at the beginning of a new contract that will tie him to the Club until 2006.

MIDFIELDERS

ALEX RUSSELL

The experienced midfield player was one of Roy McFarland's first signings when he came to the club during the 2001/02 pre-season. Alex began his career with non-league outfit Burscough, after he was released by Liverpool's youth set-up, and then moved to Rochdale in 1993, where he made over 100 appearances. During his time at Rochdale, he had a loan spell at Irish club Glenavon before moving to Cambridge United on a free in 1998. It was at Cambridge that Russell linked up with McFarland and he spent three years with the U's before leaving to follow his ex-boss to Torquay. Alex built on his fine first season by

being instrumental in United's midfield in the 2002/03 season, which ended with him being selected in the PFA's Third Division Team of the Season, and voted Torquay United Supporters' Player of the Year. He is regarded by fans as one of the best ball-players to grace Plainmoor in many a year.


JASON FOWLER



lason came to Plainmoor midway through the 2001/02 season, after losing his place at Cardiff following a yearlong illness and although he wasn't back to complete fitness, the midfielder became a crowd favourite almost immediately. He began his career at Bristol City where he played alongside his current boss Leroy Rosenior.

He then moved to Cardiff City in June 1996 and established himself as a regular in the side before an overactive thyroid gland saw him miss almost a year's worth of football. He has a dominant presence in the centre of the park and last season he proved that he was one of the best Third Division midfielders around. He was rated very highly by Cardiff fans before his illness and he now seems to be living up to his early-career promise.

KEVIN HILL



team man since he made debut Torquay at the start of the 1997/98 season after he signed from local nonleague outfit Torrington. He came into the professional game late but after playing Saturday football from an early age, he found he was pretty well prepared soon became a first-team regular. Kevin is known for his ability to out jump even the tallest of defenders to win head-

BRUNO MEIRELLES

Bruno is a cultured Portuguese midfielder who has previously been on the books of Benfica. He has always wanted to play in England and jumped at the chance of a trial with the Gulls, during which he did enough to secure a month-to-month contract. He missed the start of the season because of international clearance problems.

MARTIN PHILLIPS

Made a big enough impression at the start of his career with Exeter City for Manchester City to be persuaded to part with half-a-million pounds for his services. A naturally left-sided player, equally at home in midfield or pressing forward, he joined Portsmouth three seasons later after loan spells with Scunthorpe and back at Exeter. Frustrated by a lack of first-team opportunities at Fratton Park he signed for Plymouth in 2000 where he spent four successful seasons prior to his summer switch to Torquay.

STRIKERS

ADEBAYO AKINFENWA

A forward that Leroy Rosenior has had an eye on for sometime, 'Bayo' joined the Gulls in the summer of 2004 from Doncaster Rovers. It is hoped he will add some extra strength up-front as the Gulls look to justify their newly obtained League One status.

KAIN BOND

The exciting, young striker made his debut in Torquay's 2-I defeat at Boston United in November 2002 season and was rewarded with a professional contract at the end of that season. A combination of injury and the superb form of his team-mates conspired to keep him out of the first-team picture throughout all of last season however Leroy Rosenior has given him an extended chance to impress with a short-term contract.

TONY BEDEAU


The club's longest serving player who made his debut for the Gulls in 1995. Head coach Leroy Rosenior really seems to have brought the best out of him by using him as an attacking winger and having spent the summer of 2004 playing World Cup qualifiers for Grenada he will be looking forward to testing himself at this level after previous trials with Sunderland and Barnsley earlier in his career didn't come to anything.

MARTIN GRITTON

After a short loan period at the start of the 2002/03 season, Martin signed for the Gulls from neighbours Plymouth Argyle and finished the season as Torquay's top goalscorer with 16 goals and became a real favourite with the United fans. Last season his partnership with fellow Scottish striker David Graham helped the Gulls secure an automatic promotion spot.

JO KUFFOUR

A quick and tricky striker who can also play on the wing, Jo joined the Gulls on non-contract terms in November 2002 after leaving Arsenal at the end of the previous season. Following the major part that he played in the successful 2003/04 successful promotion campaign, he has put pen to paper on a two-year deal and with the departure of David Graham it is likely that Leroy Rosenior will look to Jo to assume the mantle of leading scorer.



Torquay haven't made the start they wanted to in this division in the games that they have played so far this season. Since I've been here we've always played well against the top teams but


we've struggled against the lower placed teams and I don't mean any disrespect to Torquay when I say this, but this is one of those games today. We need to make sure we get

THREE years ago the Town started their first season in the football basement since 1968 rather tentatively and, as September drew to a close, although a position in the top six had been maintained the performances had been nothing to write home about and were not those of a team that hoped to bounce straight back to Division Two.

On top of this, striker Steve Howard had upset manager Joe Kinnear by defying him at York when insisting on taking a penalty, which he missed, after instructions to the contrary. Howard had been dropped for the visit of Lincoln to Kenilworth Road which ended in a dismal 1-1 draw with his future in some doubt.

Torquay were next up at Kenilworth Road and the talk in the stands before the game was of the recall of Howard to the side after patching up his differences with Kinnear. Little notice was taken of the inclusion of a French left sided player to the team. After all, we had not seen a decent foreign player at Luton since the days of Lars Elstrup and the cynics amongst the supporters were not expecting much from Jean Louis Valois or whatever his name was!

The supporters were soon made to bury their cynicism, however, as from his first touch of the ball it could be seen that he possessed skills that were completely out of keeping with Division Three.

Before Valois could display his total repertoire of tricks though, Howard opened the scoring when he was quickest to react to a Carl Griffiths shot that had come back off a post. Howard was mobbed by his team mates – he had been forgiven.

Valois then set up Matthew Taylor for a cross to the head of Griffiths before Kevin Nicholls gave Torquay a lifeline when heading past a bemused Mark Ovendale in the Luton goal. The ex-Challney schoolboy produced brilliant saves from Howard and Griffiths before Valois brought the house down with a shot from 35 yards that arrowed into the top corner of the net.

Taylor then crossed for Griffiths to complete his hattrick with a diving header before Valois left the field to a standing ovation before being substituted by Stuart Douglas.

Torquay manager Roy McFarland said of Valois afterwards, "I was glad to see the back of him when he came off towards the end. He tore us apart and teased us all afternoon. He will be a revelation in this league if he stays."

Kinnear purred, "I do not like to make comparisons but he is like David Ginola. He's got two wonderful feet and can turn up anywhere on the pitch. He puts bums on seats!"

LUTON TOWN BELLES

WHEN a small group of 11 year old girls began training together in the Spring of 1997 it could not have been envisaged that seven years on most of that team would now form the basis of the current first-team squad and that by 2004/05 there would be a further ten squads who now constitute Luton Town Belles. In that short time tremendous progress has taken place with major successes, both on and off the field, and we are now one of the largest and most successful clubs in the country.

A trail of glory and trophies followed during an unbeaten four years in youth football and those first Belles made their bow in senior football as a team of 14 and 15 year olds in 2001. They made rapid progress against older and more experienced opponents and following two near misses they stormed to promotion last-term suffering just a single league defeat en-route and begin the new season in the Southern Premier League. However, the crowning glory occurred last year when we received the FA National Charter Standard Club of the Year award in preference to 950 other similar clubs nationwide. The experience of receiving the award on the pitch during an England international at Old Trafford was a very proud moment and a credit to all the volunteers and players of our club.

The forthcoming season brings yet further expansion within our youth development program and we will be fielding squads in every year group from Under-10 to Under-15, competing in different leagues every weekend. Because of the success that the Belles have enjoyed to date many assume that we are an elitist club. Nothing could be further from the truth and recruitment is ongoing with girls of all abilities welcome to join. We currently have a small number of vacancies in all age groups especially for a newly formed Under-12 squad, playing eleven-a-side football on Sundays.



IT'S the start of a new season. There's a new board in place at Luton Town FC. After the lunacy of last summer, and the turmoil of the year just gone, the future is looking bright. Not only do the new directors have big plans for the club, they want to get supporters actively involved – it was very encouraging that they decided to continue with a supporters representative on the board, in addition to offering a 10% shareholding to the Trust.

All of the new TiL committee are dedicated to the aims of the Trust and representing all supporters: basically, serving the best interests of Luton Town Football Club is the priority for all. As you may recall, Goalden Hatter was launched by TiL and Banks & Taylor brewers in August 2003. ALONG with the Hatters, Colchester United maintained their 100% winning start to the season after coming from a goal down to defeat Peterborough United 2-1 at Layer Road.

Peterborough took the lead after 10 minutes when David Farrell struck, only for the U's to turn the match on its head with two second half goals, as Wayne Andrews levelled matters from the penalty spot on 58 minutes. Phil Parkinson's side made it three wins out of three when a Craig Ireland own-goal six minutes later gave the Essex-based club victory.

Hull City, one of the league's big spenders during the summer, suffered their first defeat since promotion after a dramatic 3-2 reverse at Port Vale. Former Tottenham midfielder Nicky Barmby opened the scoring for Hull on 14 minutes before Sam Collins equalised for the home side mid-way through the half. Stephen Brooker put Vale ahead six minutes after the break for 2-1 before two more goals were scored in injury time. Hull thought they had earned an away point when Stuart Elliott made it 2-2, but Brooker became Vale's hero with his second goal moments later to give Martin Foyle's side the points at Vale Park.

Brentford scored with five minutes remaining through Kevin O'Connor to hand Wrexham their first defeat of the new season at Griffin Park whilst Eugene Dadi's strike three minutes before half-time gave Tranmere Rovers a I-0 win over Chesterfield at Prenton Park.

Sheffield Wednesday got the upper hand over

Torquay United to win a six-goal thriller and record back-to-back away victories. The Owls took the lead through a Steven MacLean penalty on eight minutes, but Jo-Osei Kuffour brought the Gulls level a minute before the break. Wednesday took the lead through Graeme Lee on 51 minutes before Martin Gritton made it 2-2 on the hour mark. Chris Turner's side, however, took the points with late goals from Lee Peacock (74) and Paul Heckingbottom (80) for the 4-2 scoreline.

Troubled Bradford City won the Yorkshire derby clash with Doncaster Rovers with two first-half goals from Mark Bower and Lee Crooks. The visitors finished the match at Valley Parade with ten men, as Adriano Rigoglioso was sent off for violent conduct in the dying stages.

Oldham Athletic won a thrilling eight-goal contest to defeat Walsall 5-3 at Boundary Park with new signing Rodney Jack picking up his first goal of the season and David Eyres bagging a brace. Blackpool boss Colin Hendry is still searching for his first point of the season as Stockport County recorded a 4-0 thrashing of The Seasiders at Bloomfield Road.

Swindon Town earned their first win of the season with a 2-I success against Milton Keynes Dons at The County Ground.

Finally, Bristol City picked-up their first away point of the season with a 2-2 draw at Bournemouth.




EVACUATION PROCEDURE

In an evacuation of the main stand you will be instructed to use the pitch. Stewards will direct you to the nearest exit. It may be that your normal exit route will not be available. On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrians, to enable swift and unobstructed access for the emergency services. Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be most appreciated.

HOW TO GET TO BOSTON UNITED

HOW TO GET TO BLACKPOOL



By Road: Exit M55 follow signs to Car Parks and South Shore, head down Yeadon Way and you will see ground to your right.

By Rail: Blackpool North is the main station in Blackpool and is about twenty minutes walk from the ground but Blackpool South is nearer to the ground and is five minutes walk away.

By Tram: A trip to Blackpool wouldn't be complete without a ride on a tram. The nearest tram stop to the ground is Manchester Square.

By Coach with Town on Tour: Leaving Maple Road at 8:00am (the coach will make a stop at Milton Keynes Coachway about 30 minutes later). The fare for LTSC members is £20, £17 for junior and senior members and £23 for non-members. 
