Sheff's icing on the cake

GARY McSheffrey stepped off the bench to seal unbeaten Luton's sixth home win on the trot with a fine opportunist goal on Friday.

And Town manager Mike Newell has admitted that he would now love to secure the services of 'The Sheff' on a permanent basis at Kenilworth Road.

McSheffrey spent three months at Hatters last season on loan from parent club Coventry City. But his current month loan deal expires after Saturday's home game against Huddersfield.

And while McSheffrey's chances of first team football have been limited by the partnership forged by leading goalscorer Steve Howard and September's League One Player of the Month Rowan Vine, Newell is keen to see McSheffrey becoming part of his squad.

Town chairman Bill Tomlins last week revealed McSheffrey had turned down six other clubs, including Sunderland and Tranmere, to return to Luton.

And Tomlins himself told of his conversations with the Sky Blues' chairman about making the 22-year-old's move to Bedfordshire a full-time one.

Boss Newell said: "McSheffrey looked sharp when he came on and we all know what he's capable of here.

"It was a very difficult decision for us to have to leave him out. But we brought him here with the intention of seeing him play games and we'd love to make it a permanent deal - we just don't know what's possible at the moment.

"It's frustrating for him being on the bench, but he came on and helped himself to a very good goal."

McSheffrey's first Luton goal since the 1-1 draw at Bristol City last November came six minutes from time against Newell's former club Hartlepool.

A neat turn on the half-way line from The Sheff saw two Pools defenders crash into each other, but the danger seemed to be over when McSheffrey mis-placed his pass. However, the Coventry man didn't give up and capitalised on indecision in the visiting defence to win the ball, sprint clear and sidefoot home.

McSheffrey's goal followed Steve Howard's opener in the 36th minute when he crashed home Steve Robinson's corner at the far-post for his sixth of the season on his return after suspension.

Ahmet Brkovic hit his fifth of the campaign six minutes after the interval when Sol Davis crossed for Vine, whose shot was parried by Jim Provett, only for Brkovic to slam home the rebound.

But Luton's goals followed a nervy opening period where Hartlepool created numerous openings.

Alan Pouton, Eifion Williams and Joel Porter all went close in a five minute spell and Williams should have scored when Dino Seremet misjudged a long throw and the Pools winger put wide from 15-yards with the goal at his mercy.


