## Luton

LUTON maintained their impressive unbeaten start to the season but in an even contest at Kenilworth Road neither side could provide the cutting edge.

Both sides had ample opportunity to win the game but were unable to break the

deadlock

Steve Howard fired a close-range shot against the post in the first half as Luton went in search of a third straight win, but Leeds created several openings of their own in their bid to return to winning ways. Newly-promoted Luton were

unchanged for the third successive game, while Leeds boss Kevin Blackwell made two changes to his starting

line-up

Goalkeeper Ian Bennett, a summer signing from Birmingham, made his competitive debut for the visitors due to Neil Sullivan's thigh injury and Michael Ricketts was preferred to David Healy alongside Robbie Blake in attack

Leeds began in determined mood as they looked to bounce back from their midweek defeat at Cardiff and with Eirik Bakke and Shaun Derry bossing

midfield they dominated early possession.

Bakke fired over the crossbar early on and Jermaine Wright headed wide from an Eddie Lewis corner as Leeds pressed, but prompted by Kevin Nicholls in midfield, Luton came back at the Yorkshire side and squandered the game's best chance midway through the first half.

Howard raced unopposed onto Curtis Davies' ball into the penalty area, but with Bennett beaten, saw his close-range shot hit the post.

The bustling Howard created another opening for the home side, Ahmet Brkovic this time blazing a shot wide before Leeds responded via a curling free kick from Lewis that just missed the target, while Ricketts skewed his shot after being played in by Blake.

Bakke came to the fore again after the restart and unleashed a venomous long-range drive that Luton goalkeeper Dean Brill did

well to hold.

Warren Feeney failed to connect properly with

Brkovic's cross and Blake dragged his shot across the face of goal as the game flowed from end to end. Healy replaced Blake in the

66th minute and soon after Frazer Richardson came on for Wright, with the former's extra mobility giving Leeds

more options.

But Nicholls threatened for the Hatters, testing Bennett with a fine free kick that the former Birmingham goalkeeper parried for a corner, before Blackwell replaced Ricketts with Norwegian Gylfi Einarsson and Feeney made way for Luton substitute Enoch

Clear-cut chances were few and far between, but both sides went in search of winner in the closing stages with Bennett saving well from Kevin Foley and Brill clinging onto another whipped in cross from Lewis on the left.
