IF STOKE were concerned about what would happen

when Sammy Bangoura heads to the African Nations Cup next month, they need not worry.

Guinean forward Bangoura, who had scored seven times in the last six games, was missing yesterday because of suspension and the outcome was just the same: a thrilling, last-gasp victory achieved with a never-say-die attitude that could well take Stoke into the Premiership

Luton had been one of the strongest teams in the division, but their slide has been mirrored by the climb of a Stoke side who have

now won away from home seven times.

Bangoura's goals have been the foundation but without him, Paul Gallagher, the Scottish Under-21 striker, seized his moment.

In the first half, he miskicked the ball from a great chance but that knocked him into a shape* where he scored twice and was a constant threat.

In the end, it was an own goal in the 92nd minute from Chris Coyne which gave Stoke the points and the celebrations as they confirmed their position in the top six.

It was a dull match which exploded with drama in the final seven minutes, when Stoke took the lead, lost it and then regained it again to provide themselves with a major fillip as the holiday season games beckon.

Instead of thinking about defending when Luton hit back at 2-2, they sensed a victory in the cold Bedforshire air and they achieved it, to the delight of manager Johan Boskamp.

While there has been talk of him not staying with the club because of internal rows, the job he is doing might be proof they are more than on the right

. He has acquired one of the best strikers in the country in Bangoura. But behind him, he has a strong squad - from the experience of Michael Dubbery in defence to the hard-working midfield player Dave Brammer.

Boskamp said: "We were much better as a team after the break and the ball went for us more.

When these sides met at the Britannia Stadium in August, Stoke won 2-1 — with a goal in

the final minute. "It must be our speciality to beat them like this," said Boskamp.

But it did not look like it would end this way, especially after Luton had taken the lead in the 20th minute.

Steve Simonsen, the Stoke goalkeeper, had seen his punch not travel as far as he would have liked and when the ball was sent back into the box, Steve Howard flicked in it on.

Rowan Vine tried and failed with an overhead attempt, but Croatian Ahmet Brkovic was on hand to drive the loose ball home from 10 yards.

Stoke drew level in the final minute of the first half. Luton goalkeeper Dean Brill sped from his line as Mamady Sidibe burst in, an error of judgement as the striker took the ball

Even with the empty goal, his shot was not good, going across the six yard box where Gallagher met it to score.

Simonsen made a superb save to tip over Kevin Nicholls' free kick before Gallagher popped up to drive Stoke in front with seven minutes left.

But three minutes later, Howard was brought down in the area under a challenge from Karl Henry and Nicholls smashed home the penalty.

Stoke were not finished yet and their pressure paid off when Coyne turned the ball past Brill in the 92nd minute.

Angry Luton manager Mike Newell said: "It is a travesty because we did enough to win and played some decent stuff."
