NOT even Steve Howard's 100th goal in a Luton shirt could rescue a point for Town

Leeds United inflicted Hatters' 12th away defeat of the season, harsh on Mike Newell's men.

They should have had a penalty seconds before Robbie Blake grabbed United's opener when Sean Gregan handled in the box.

The referee waved away the protests and refused to discuss the decision after the game - much to the annoyance of Newell.


"Everyone in the ground knew it was a penalty," he said. "We all make mistakes but it seems referees don't have the same onus upon them to explain.

"The linesman was 15 yards away so why couldn't he have given it? The lad's arms were waving in the air. To top it all it was a double whammy as they went up the other end and scored."

Eddie Lewis got Leeds' second before Howard scored his momentous goal six minutes from time – how else but from where many of his previous 99 had come from - a trademark bullet header.

Newell admitted it counted for little: "It won't mean a lot to Howie to be honest. It's a fantastic achievement, especially as he's done it in such a quick who took the skipper's armband. time but I was willing him on to score his 101st."

cause was not helped by the absence of captain Kevin Nicholls and Markus Heikkinen – two of the most influential players this season - out with a hamstring injury and 'flu respectively.

Back from the treatment room came Paul Underwood who moved into the centre of midfield alongside converted full back Kevin Foley and Chris Coyne

They may have been missing some key personnel but Hatters started the

and with their makeshift midfield looking composed, Luton should have created more chances in front of goal.

Instead it was the home side who had the first effort of any note when USA international Lewis tested Marlon Beresford with a stinging low drive from just outside the box which Luton's veteran shot-stopper did well to palm around the post.

Had Foley seen Rowan Vine's cross earlier Luton would have taken the lead on 35 minutes. Vine had done the hard work on the left wing, twisting and turning before crossing into the

Foley's run was not quick enough to meet the ball and the stretched effort

Hatters were almost made to pay for Foley's miss two minutes later when Blake's overhead kick teed up Rob Hulse from six yards out. But Beresford was quick to dive at the feet of the Leeds forward and prevent him from striking the ball.

The last chance of the half fell to Brkovic on 37 minutes when the Croatian spurned the time he had on the ball on the edge of the box by rushing his shot which fizzed past Neil Sullivan in the Leeds goal but went inches wide.

Leeds' right back Gary Kelly, making

his 500th appearance for the Yorkshire club, carved out an opportunity almost straight from the restart. His marauding run got him to the bye-line before he crossed for an un-marked Blake whose header went way off target.

But Blake did find the back of the net on 49 minutes – although his goal came in controversial circumstances. Inside United's box Howard lobbed the ball over his marker - and the last man -Gregan who appeared to handle the ball. The crowd fell silent expecting a penalty but the referee and his linesman thought otherwise allowing play to

To rub salt into the wounds at the other end Blake cut inside and slotted home from 18 yards to put Leeds one

If Luton felt harshly treated with Leeds' first - they had no-one to blame but themselves for United's second four minutes later.

Hulse was allowed to bully his way into the penalty box brushing aside his marker Leon Barnett with ease. The burly striker then managed to squeeze his cross in-between Barnett and his goalkeeper and Lewis was allowed to slide the ball into an empty net as Hatters were left dumbfounded.

After seeing his side capitulate, Newell made a double substitution on 64 minutes, introducing Enoch Showunmi and ex-Leeds player Warren Feeney to liven up an attack that had produced precious little in the second half.

Feeney nearly broke free of the defence on 80 minutes when he latched on to a Vine through ball but as he shaped to shoot from 25 yards he was cynically hacked down by defender Jonathan Douglas who was rightly

Justice was done moments later when Hatters pulled a goal back through

The pressure had been building as Luton flooded forward in numbers and with men in the box to aim for Underwood swung in a cross for Howard who crept between two markers to head in his 12th of the season.

Celebrations were muted as Hatters picked the ball out from the back of the net and hurried back for the restart.

But all hopes of snatching a point vanished in the final minute when Sol Davis saw red.

Kelly knocked the ball past the Luton left back and looked to have him beaten for pace before Davis blocked him in full flight earning his second yellow card with which he can have no
