found Coyne just eight out, but he blazed wildly over the bar. And it took the hosts 25 minutes to create their first chance. David Healy's pass was flicked into the path of Lewis by Douglas but the American inter-

national had his shot turned behind by Marlon Beresford. But the Hatters were always a threat and Kevin Foley was the next man to fluff a great

chance. Vine's cross Rowan found the young midfielder unmarked but he failed to keep his header down and it went over the bar.

100th goal past Neil Sullivan. Luton's frustrations finally boiled over in the final minute when Sol Davis was sent off for a second bookable offence.
