## Super sub Williams strikes again

TWENTY minutes from time, Millwall manager David Tuttle made a double substitution. The second of those saw Colin Cameron replaced by Barry Cogan — and the booing began. Cameron, on loan from Wolves, had been Millwall's best player and the home fans could not see why he had been taken off. But the arrival of Marvin Williams made all the difference.

A minute into stoppage time, Williams latched onto a Carl Asaba flick-on from Matt Lawrence's deep pass to touch the ball home for Millwall's first win in more than two months, and a repeat scenario of their last triumph.

Williams was the match-winner when they beat Derby 2-1 at the start of January, but since then a run

of four defeats and four draws has brought the prospect of relegation ever closer. They began this match five points adrift of safety, but the Williams effect provided more than just a battle cry.

"We are now only two behind Sheffield Wednesday," said Tuttle."We have to go after them."

How fickle fans can be. Their protests began before the game when leaflets were distributed about chairman Peter de Savary and proposed building plans around the Bermondsey area when the supporters were hoping for more investment in the team. And when Cameron was brought off, the abuse was directed towards Tuttle.

"The fans are not happy?" he asked. "I did not hear them booing. Colin came off because he also played on Thursday and we do not want to tire him out. I brought Marvin and Barry on to liven it up."

The way Luton took hold of the match at the start of the second half, equalising within a minute, an away victory seemed the likely outcome. But Millwall are a strange side. Anything but spectacular,

they can also be a difficult team to breakdown.
