THE nineteen-year wait for a local derby home league win continues but Watford fans will happily forego the opportunity of taking the Luton fans up on their sarcastic "we'll see you all next year" chant for a season of Premiership football.

Sunday's draw may have made the prospect of that being achieved through the automatic route remote, but the Hornets can now approach the four - probably six and potentially seven - remaining games of the season knowing a golden opportunity is there to be seized after guaranteeing their play-off place.

The end-of-season extravaganza means nothing unless you win it. Even so, it is still an achievement for a club that was supposed to be embroiled in a relegation battle to reach the play-offs, and to do so with matches to spare. Yet that accomplishment was not greeted with the acclaim one might have expected on

Perhaps that was because a top-six finish has increasingly looked a foregone conclusion in recent weeks. Perhaps that was because the chances of automatic promotion diminished still further, or perhaps that was because Boothroyd narrowly failed to become the first manager since Graham Taylor to lead Watford to a long-awaited home victory over their rivals.

The truth probably lies somewhere between all three statements, but there is no doubt the post-match atmosphere would have been markedly different had it not been for a dubious offside decision when Malky Mackay thought he'd snatched the winner or a fine last-gasp save by Marlon Beresford to deny Marlon King. To that extent the Hornets were unfortunate not to beat Luton 2-1 for a second time this season but to suggest a victory was merited would be a tenuous argument at best.

Mike Newell's men looked particularly effective when they broke from, and through midfield and they forced the home defence into a couple of uncertain moments.

But once King had deftly lobbed Beresford to become the first striker, since Luther Blissett 21 years ago, to score 20 league goals in a season, Watford were in a position to assert themselves further.

A second goal before half-time would have helped in that regard, and Chris Eagles so nearly got it, but what happened to the players after the break is difficult to fathom.

The expectation was they would emerge for the second half and seek to cement their advantage but that only occasionally looked like happening before the 73rd minute. While it would be unfair to suggest Watfod switched off completely, the high-energy, pressurising approach that has been so key to their campaign was temporarily and strangely absent.

Luton gradually took charge and following two close calls it was no real surprise when the visitors equalised with the latest entry in the Hornets' season-long catalogue of defensively poor goals.

Thankfully, Ahmet Brkovic's unmarked close-range effort did have the desired effect and there was only one team who looked like taking maximum points after that. But quite why Watford got themselves into such a position in a game where the stakes were so high can only be explained by those on the pitch.

Individually, some tried to lift their side but if one player summed up the inconsistent nature of the performance it was Foster.

The keeper's reaction block to keep out Showunmi's powerful half-volley was top drawer. However, his kicking was erratic and he survived one near heart-stopping moment in the first-

work but, by the same token, their tactic of closing the on-loan keeper down was a distinct nod of acknowledgement to what a potent attacking weapon his long clearances can be.

The warning message was not heeded after Steve Howard charged down one Foster clearance and shortly before the break the keeper rapidly had to retreat towards his own goal when the ball cannoned back off Edwards.

In fairness to the 23-year-old, he had received Jordan Stewart's back-pass on his weaker foot but there has always been a nagging doubt that one day Foster would be caught out. Sunday was nearly such an occasion.
