

# From the Chairman Bill Tomlins





Bill Tomlins Luton Town FC Chairman

Good afternoon and a warm welcome to all our supporters to
Kenilworth Road, and to our
Championship visitors Birmingham
City and their Directors, Management,
Players and Supporters.

Due to the international break our last match was on the 30th September against Barnsley. These two week breaks can impact on fixtures, as our remaining October games show, especially when you add on our Carling Cup Third Round tie at Goodison Park. We will be playing six matches in eighteen days, averaging a game every three days.

The real concern for many clubs is the impact it may have on limiting player's recovery time in between matches. Of course, we need to assist the national teams our players represent and our own national side. We are always proud when our players are selected. However, in achieving this many observers believe that under the present arrangement it can possibly impact on the very competition supporters follow each and every week.

One thing is certain, though, the final game prior to any two week break always adds an additional focus on the result due to the gap between matches. Our three points away at Barnsley was assured in the last minute of the match because of the alertness of Ahmet Brkovic, taking advantage of a mistake by Barnsley's young on-loan goalkeeper from Arsenal. I felt for the 'keeper, as he played his part in what was an exciting football match. However, as we have also experienced a goal against us just before the final whistle which changed the result, I, like many of our travelling supporters to the Oakwell ground, accepted the three points with open arms.

The invitation to the Directors to attend a supporters open forum, chaired by Roberto Perrone, has been well covered by the town's local BBC Three Counties Radio station, and

also by The Luton News and Herald and Post Newspapers. Three Counties recorded the open forum live on the night and was replayed on the following Saturday and Monday, creating an outcry from supporters because of the attempted disruption to the evening. Despite on the night the stage-managed entrance by a previous owner with a separate agenda, I have received on behalf of the Board many emails and phone calls from supporters frustrated by the events that unfolded, and I thank those fans for their supportive letters, calls and emails.

I completely understand football is nothing without passion. However, when that passion stops the majority from airing their views without interruption and their opportunity to put questions, it achieves very little other than leaving everyone frustrated. The informal discussions after the meeting were constructive and helpful and I believe we all went away better informed.


As always your support does make the difference so get behind the lads and enjoy the game.

# From the Manager Mike Newell

Hello and welcome to Kenilworth Road for today's game against Birmingham City. Welcome also to Steve Bruce, his Staff, Players, Directors and Supporters from St Andrew's. They have been able to keep a lot of their Premiership squad, as well as replacing the players they lost in the summer, and so today will probably be our sternest test so far at home.

On Thursday night I listened to a programme about football managers on Radio 4 (don't worry I haven't lost my marbles yet, I was advised it was on. Thankfully, I am still down with the kids when it comes to entertainment). It was packed full of managers, both old and young, employed and unemployed, telling everybody about the pressures involved, how hard it is and therefore how valuable the applied man-

agement course at Warwick University is, or could be.

Unfortunately, somebody, somewhere, along the line decided recently that football was a complicated game or, maybe, even a science where degree-like qualifications were required to hold down positions. This has allowed people with absolutely no idea about what the game entails to kid on the ordinary man in the street, that without these pieces of paper you are somehow not worthy or capable of understanding football. Are the so-called experts that everyone listens to pontificating before and after every game, dissecting every incident over and over again, also required to have the UEFA Pro License?

Why weren't Matt Busby, Jock Stein, Bill Nicholson, Bill Shankly, Bob Paisley, Brian Clough - absolute legends as managers (and forgive me if I have missed any) - and more recently Howard Kendall, Kenny Dalglish, George Graham, Alex Ferguson, Arsene Wenger and even 'The Special One' asked for proof of education? The common denominator in the managers I have mentioned is not just trophies, but one trophy in particular - the league title.

They have all won it, some with more resources than others, and most on more than one occasion.

Winning the league is the ultimate test and without question the hardest thing to achieve. Every one of these managers was, or is blessed with an understanding of the game and its simplicity, a degree in common sense and an ability to demand and get the best out of a group of young men. They have also had a built-in defence mechanism that would see them deal with the inevitable criticism that is unique in professional sport, and especially our national game. But, most importantly, all had a strength of character and inner belief in their ability that would not allow them to contemplate or suffer interference or meddling of any sort.

Not one of those managers ever tried to suggest that he had some secret or revolutionary method or that they were ahead of their competitors. They looked for and found the best players to play in their team. It is that simple.

The majority of football supporters are men or boys. A large proportion have played the game at some level. There are a few who have no idea what is going on, but it is only a few. To suggest it is beyond the average bloke's intelligence is not only arrogant, but bordering on contemptible. You can talk all day about systems and tactics and you can carry clip boards and make incomprehensible signals and gestures with as many fingers and hands as you like but you will never kid the ordinary man in the street.

I know that for a fact because I am

# From the Club Secretary

# Cherry Newbery





Good afternoon and welcome to everyone.

It is certainly good to be back playing football here at Kenilworth Stadium after the international break. Whilst appreciating the break is essential, it does upset the pattern of regular first team football, and puts pressure not only on the team but also the supporters pockets when you count how many matches we have to play before the end of the month.

However, we took full advantage of the free Saturday and arranged a full table top safety exercise here at the Club. This is when all of the emergency agencies - the police, fire and ambulance services - came together with representatives from Luton Borough Council, Environmental Health, St. Johns Ambulance, the Club stewards and senior staff, who were given a possible disaster scenario here at the stadium. They were

then asked to come up with a plan of how they would deal with the situation.

The main factor that came out of the exercise was that in order to evacuate the stadium as quickly as possible, the co-operation of supporters is paramount. Therefore, in the event of an emergency please listen carefully to the tannoy announcement and comply with the directions given by the police and stewards. The nature of the stadium means that in any emergency evacuation the pitch area would have to be used, although supporters should remember the pitch is not a safe area to remain in, and onward evacuation away from the stadium is vital to ensure the safety of all.

I am pleased to inform supporters that following the success of the Hatters Bars under the Kenilworth Stand we have been able to open up the area between the two bars, which will give a lot more space for supporters, particularly at half time.

We also have permission to move the refreshment kiosk under Block F of the Main Stand, Again this will assist supporters, although there is some work to be carried out for the new facility, so we anticipate that the new kiosk will be available for the O.P.R. match.

Today we are pleased to welcome back Daniel Magness, the football freestyler, who will again entertain us with his skills before the match and at half time.

With our Carling Cup match at Everton taking place on October 24th our Reserve match with Oxford United, previously scheduled for the same day, will now take place on Tuesday 27th February 2007, kick-off 2.00 p.m. at the Kenilworth Stadium.

The official Luton Town Supporters Club has arranged another of their Meet the Players evenings, this time with Chris Coyne and Markus Heikkinen here at the Club on Monday 20th November at 7.30 p.m. Also, their annual Christmas Quiz will take place again here at the Club on Monday 11th December at 7.30 p.m. Tickets for both events will shortly be available from the Supporters Kiosk in Kenilworth

Today will be the last match for Paula Kane, the Ticket Office supervisor, who is leaving to take up a new position at Northampton Town F.C. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Paula for all her hard work over the last year and wish her every success as she returns to her roots. At the same time we also extend a welcome to Mike Hooker who has worked part time in the Ticket Office as Paula's assistant, and now takes over the full time role.

As always, enjoy the match and we will see you again next Saturday.





# Welcome to **Birmingham City**

As well as being favourites with the bookies, Birmingham boss Steve Bruce has had to cope with the ongoing expectations from the club's supporters as the Midlands club look for an instant return to the Premiership. STEWART CURTIS introduces today's visitors to Kenilworth Road.

Having started the season as 4/1 favourites for the title, the pressure is on Steve Bruce's Birmingham to bounce straight back to the Premiership at the first opportunity. The Blues have not disappointed, losing only 2 of their opening 10 games, propelling themselves into 2nd position, and staking an early claim for automatic promotion.

Birmingham's history is almost identical to that of Luton's, having spent lengthy spells in English football's topflight, lifting major silverware just once in process, the 1963 League Cup. However, the Blues were the first English club side to compete in Europe, representing their country on four occasions between 1956-62, with notable results including a 2-1 win away at Inter Milan.

Having secured promotion to the Premiership via the play-offs in 2002, the Blues consolidated the following

year, settling for a comfortable 13th place finish back in the big-time. Successful times continued for the West Midlands club, with mid-table security following for the next two years. However, last season's campaign never really got going, and with only three wins by Christmas, relegation looked inevitable. As the season came to a close, manager Steve Bruce's job was under question, a matter not helped by the 7-0 home drubbing by Liverpool. Despite finishing on a high losing only two of their final eight games, a goal shy Blues side were eventually relegated at Newcastle in late April.

A busy summer in the transfer market has seen no fewer than 12 players depart St. Andrew's, including bigmoney moves for Emile Heskey and Jermaine Pennant. Having said that, Steve Bruce has bolstered his Championship squad with six quality signings, securing deals for two of the

country's brightest stars in the form of Neil Danns and Cameron Jerome. These arrivals also included Stephen Kelly from Tottenham, defensive strength in the form of Bruno N'Gotty and Rahdi Jaidi, and ex-Hatters striker Gary McSheffrey in a £4 million move from Coventry. The influx continued with a triple coup of Arsenal youngsters arriving on loan, with Nicklas Bendtner's goal scoring ability catching instant headlines with a debut strike against Colchester. The 18-year-old has since made his international debut for Denmark, again finding the net in his first appearance, leading the Danish fans to dub him the new Brian Laudrup.

This afternoon's sides have not met since 1996, with the Blues winning the majority of the previous 57 meetings. The two teams have found the net 29 times between them this season, setting up an exciting fixture.




player-manager of Sheffield United, bringing in John Deehan as his assistant. The Blades could not manage anything more than a mid-table finish in 1998-99. Bruce played his last competitive game at the end of the 1998-99 season, bringing down the curtain on an illustrious playing career stretching back more than 20 years. Bruce was then appointed Huddersfield manager and in his first season they narrowly missed out on the Division One play-offs. The Terriers finished in eighth place, with only a dismal end to the season costing them a place in the play-offs. However, the 2000/01 season saw Huddersfield make a disastrous start, winning only one of their first 13 League and Cup games. Bruce was sacked in October after a disappointing defeat at Grimsby Town sent them to the foot of the table. In March he was appointed Wigan Athletic manager. They reached the Division Two play-offs but lost in the semi-finals. After just seven weeks with Wigan, Bruce was appointed manager of Crystal Palace and finally appeared to be on the road to success in management when a strong start to the 2001-02 season saw most people tip Palace for promotion to the Premiership. After just four months at Palace, Bruce moved to Birmingham City as manager. On his arrival, Birmingham were midtable in Division One and the realistic target for the 2001-02 season was to consolidate rather than push for promotion. But he guided them into the playoffs and they beat Norwich City on penalties in the final to end a 16-year absence from the top division. In 2002-03, Birmingham finished 13th in the Premiership and the following season climbed to 10th place in the final table. In 2004-05, they finished in 12th place. The following season, Birmingham were in some trouble in the league, and on 21 March 2006, they were beaten 7-0 at home by Liverpool in the FA Cup Quarter-Finals. Despite mass calls for his resignation by supporters and fans of the club, Bruce insisted that he would fight on as manager. Following a 3-0 defeat at former club Manchester United, Bruce's side managed a highly creditable 0-0 draw with Chelsea, followed by a 1-0 home win against Bolton Wanderers, which lifted Birmingham out of the relegation zone. However, it was not to

last, and the team were relegated before the

choice goalkeeper MAIK TAYLOR (pictured) is currently in his third full season at St Andrews. Taylor has gone on to make more than 100 Premiership appearances for Blues, prior to the club's relegation in 2006, and was widely regarded as one of the top division's leading goalkeepers. Taylor began his career at Farnborough Town before moving into the Football League with Barnet. After impressing in the lower divisions with the Bees, he earned a move to the Premiership with Southampton before switching to Fulham. Waiting in the wings are youngsters COLIN **DOYLE** and **ADAM LEGZDINS**, both players who have progressed through the club's Academy programme. Both players have yet to make a first team appearance for the club but have promising futures in the game. Doyle has gained first team experience whilst on loan at Nottingham Forest and Millwall, with Legzdins enjoying a short spell with Halifax Town.

After initially signing on loan from Fulham, first



#### <sup>™</sup>Defenders

Former Hatters defender MATTHEW **UPSON** (pictured) is unlikely to be involved in the Birmingham line-up this afternoon, with the England international currently recovering from a long term Achillies injury that has kept him out for the entire season. Upson joined Blues from Arsenal in January 2003, in a package totalling a possible £2.5 million. Upson had joined Arsenal in 1997 in a £1 million deal from Luton Town, and ironically made his debut for the Gunners against the Blues in the League Cup. He made a total of 57 appearances for the North London side, before making the switch to St. Andrew's. Upson made an immediate impact at Blues and his impressive performances in the centre of defence earned him a call-up to the England squad. Blues signed 22-year-old defender STEPHEN KELLY from Spurs in June 2006. Dublin-born Kelly joined Spurs as a professional in 2002, before making his breakthrough into the first team at the end of the 2003-04 season. During his time at White Hart Lane, he spent time out on loan at a number of clubs including Watford, QPR and Southend. **BRUNO N'GOTTY** is a player with a vast



experience having played for Lyon, AC Milan, PSG and Marseille, and has become a firm favourite with the Birmingham faithful, having arrived from Bolton. **MATTHEW SADLER** and **MARCOS PAINTER** are both players who have progressed through the club's youth academy whilst central defender **SAMUEL OJI** is a youngster signed from Arsenal who made his Birmingham debut last season. **RADHI JAIDI** became the first Tunisian player to join an English top flight club when he joined Everton in July 2004, before moving to Birmingham in the summer on a four-year deal.

#### Midfielders

SEBASTIAN LARSSON arrived at Birmingham with team mate NICKLAS **BENDTNER** from Arsenal on season long loans. Larsson made his Blues debut as a substitute against Colchester United and scored the winning goal in 2-1 victory. The 18-year-old Copenhagen-born forward is highly rated by the Gunners and appeared in three first team games for the London club in last season's Carling Cup. DAVID DUNN and STEPHEN **CLEMENCE** (pictured) were two players that Birmingham were able to hold on to after their relegation to the Premiership last season. With others moving on to pastures new, both Dunn and Clemence decided to help Birmingham in their bid to return to the top flight. Dunn joined Blues on a fouryear-deal from Blackburn Rovers in the summer of 2003, making an immediate impression at St. Andrew's, scoring twice in his first three games, but they proved to be his only goals of the 2003/04 season. Since then, Dunn's career has been

blighted with injuries and is hoping to stay injury free this time around. Clemence is the son of England legend Ray and signed from Premiership side Tottenham in 2003. The Liverpool-born player clocked up a century of games for Blues in his final appearance of the 2005/06 season against Newcastle. JULIAN GRAY is a former Arsenal trainee who came through the youth ranks at Highbury, but made just one substitute appearance in the Premiership for the Gunners against Newcastle on the final day of the 1999/2000 season. Gray moved to Palace that summer and was a regular in the Eagles line-up. In his four years at Selhurst Park he clocked up 144 appearances and scored 14 goals, before moving to Birmingham. MEHDI **NAFTI** is the second Tunisian player is the squad, having signed from Racing Santander on the final day of the January 2005 transfer window, FABRICE MUAMBA is another player on-loan from Arsenal and NEIL DANNS, a target of Luton last summer, joined Birmingham from Colchester United in a £500,000 deal.




#### Strikers

The name GARY McSHEFFREY is very familiar with Luton fans. The nippy striker was an instant hero during two loan spells at the club, scoring tens goals in his 24 appearances for the Hatters. McSheffrey joined Blues from Midlands neighbours Coventry in August 2006 for a substantial fee. He finished the 2005/06 season as top scorer for Micky Adams' Coventry side with 17 goals from the left flank. McSheffrey is a product of Coventry's Academy and prior to moving to St. Andrew's had spent his entire career with his hometown club, except for loan spells with the Hatters and Stockport County. CAMERON **JEROME** (pictured) was Steve Bruce's first big summer signing in June 2006 from Cardiff City. He made his debut from the substitutes bench against Colchester United in August 2006, but was red carded just three minutes after coming off the bench. He was Cardiff's top scorer in the 2005/06 season, netting an impressive 20

goals for the Welsh outfit, a feat which

earned him a call-up to the England under-21 squad. MIKAEL FORSSELL is a Finnish international who became a firm favourite with the St. Andrew's faithful due to his prolific goal scoring form in the 2003/04 season - he netted 19 times in 37 games. Forssell initially joined Blues from Chelsea on a four-month loan deal in August 2003, before the deal was then increased until the end of the 2003/04 campaign, before being extended yet again for a further season in April 2004. The deal became permanent in the summer of 2005, signing for £3.5 million. **DUDLEY 'DI' CAMPBELL** was a surprise transfer deadline signing for Blues in January 2006, arriving for an initial sum of £500,000 from Brentford. Campbell only became a professional after joining the Bees in the summer of 2005 from Ryman League side Yeading, where he had netted an incredible 83 times in just 109 appearances. He hit the back of the net 12 times in 28 games for Brentford, including a brace in a 2-1 FA Cup victory over Sunderland that brought him to the attention of Steve Bruce.





# Remember

Roger Wash takes a look back at five classic encounters between Luton Town and Birmingham City

#### 17th September 1955 Birmingham City 0 Luton Town 0 Attendance: 31,013

The Town enjoyed a great start to their first ever season in the top flight, winning four of their first seven games and creating headlines along the way for their all out attacking play.

They made headlines of a different sort on the way to St Andrews, though, as their coach was involved in accident outside Warwick and ended up in a field.

Bruised and battered, the Town players elected to take on the Blues and earned a standing ovation for doing so. Newly capped England goalkeeper Ron Baynham, back in his home city, denied the Blues attack several times but the Town also had their chances

#### 3rd April 1971 **Luton Town 3 Birmingham City 2** Attendance: 25,172

After three seasons of success, the Town's tilt at promotion from Division Four to Division One in record time seemed to be coming off the rails as winter turned to spring in 1971.

Birmingham, who had gone 14 games unbeaten, were now only a point behind the Town and 8,000 Blues supporters swelled the crowd to a figure that has not been bettered in the league since.

They were in good voice as their team took a two goal lead after 20 minutes but the Hatters, realising that this was a must win game, gradually clawed their way back and two goals from Viv Busby before the interval levelled the score. It was left to Alan Slough with a 30-yard rocket to complete the turnaround in a

#### 19th April 1975 Birmingham City I Luton Town 4 Attendance: 28,755

The Town were clinging on to their Division One place by their

fingernails, and with only two games to go needed to win both and hope for others to slip up.

Given their poor away form the Hatters amazingly went goal crazy with Jim Ryan opening the scoring with a 25 yard free-kick and Adrian Alston netting either side of the interval. Trevor Francis managed to pull a goal back for the Blues before Jimmy Husband, with a clever chip, seals an emphatic victory and earns the Town a

The game ends on a sour note when little Jim Ryan is dismissed for clashing with the hulking Kenny Burns.

#### 12th April 1983 **Luton Town 3 Birmingham City I** Attendance: 12,868

After a run of four straight defeats the Town moved back to winning ways with a last gasp 2-1 win over Aston Villa at Kenilworth

Three days later it was the turn of Birmingham to face the newly confident Hatters in a basement battle and, starting where they left off the previous Saturday, tore into the Blues from the start.

Ricky Hill, with a shot and a header, and Brian Horton from the spot after Paul Walsh was tripped, put the Town into a commanding interval lead and Robert Hopkins second half reply was too little, too late.

#### 6th April 1986 **Birmingham City 0 Luton Town 2** Attendance: 8,836

Blues, struggling at the wrong end of the Division One table, were up against a Hatters side that was in a comfortable position in the top ten, but it was difficult to tell which was the relegation threatened team in the first half, as only solid work from skipper Steve Foster and goalkeeper Les Sealey kept the home side at bay.

It all changed in the second period, though, as ex-Blue Mick Harford, anxious to impress the watching England manager Bobby Robson, netted twice to bring the points back to Kenilworth Road and send the majority of the first ever Sunday crowd at St Andrews home unhappy.

# Attack

Simon Pitts takes a look at some interesting stats between this afternoon's two sides.

There have been 25 league meetings at Kenilworth Road between the sides and the away team have the upper hand with 11 wins to Luton's six. The Hatters have scored 29 goals to Birmingham's 32.



The only player to have moved in the opposite direction is Bobby Brennan who, during 1947-49, made 76 appearances and scored 30 goals for the Hatters

before his move to Birmingham.There is however a current Blues player who has previously featured for the Hatters, albeit one

start and one substitute appearance! Matthew Upson was sold to Arsenal for £2million in May 1997 after only two minutes of League football! That came as a substitute at home to Rotherham in August 1996, with his only other appearance at Cesena in the Anglo-Italian Cup during the previous season. Upson hasn't played yet this season though as he tore his Achilles tendon earlier in the year.

Gordon Turner scored five times against Birmingham City in the League, and three of these goals came during the 1957/58 season. He scored twice in the 3-0 win at Kenilworth Road in November, and then netted a penalty in the 1-1 draw later in the season. This was a rare season when the Hatters remained unbeaten in the League against the Blues.

The most common result is a 1-1 draw, or a 1-0 away win, both occurring four times. Strangely, the next most common result in this fixture is a goal less draw!

The biggest attendance for this fixture was on 3rd April 1971, when 25,172 saw the visitors take a 2-0 lead with only 22 minutes on the clock. The 10,000 strong visiting crowd were expecting their side to extend an unbeaten run to 15 games, however by the interval the Hatters were level courtesy of a brace from Viv Busby. Early in the second half Alan Slough put Luton into a 3-2 lead, and they held on through to the final whistle.

The last player to be transferred from St Andrews to Luton was a certain Mick Harford who joined in December 1984. "Big Mick" went on to make 216 appearances, and scored 92 goals in his Luton career, during two spells at the Club. An interesting statistic is that Mick scored on his Luton debut in a 2-2 draw at Leicester, and then scored twice against Oldham in the first game after his return to the Hatters in 1991/92!



Back in the 1890's Birmingham City were known as Small Heath, and they won all three of the fixtures at Luton. The name change didn't affect the results, as four more wins and a draw were to follow before the Hatters won at the 9th time of asking!! It was September 16th 1953, and George Cummins opened the scoring before a Johnny Downie penalty secured the points. Luton ended the season a place and a point above the Blues at the end of the season. The following season saw both sides promoted on the same number of points, although it was Birmingham who took the Second Division title. Luton won the home encounter though, courtesy of a solitary goal from Jimmy Adam.

Despite the poor home record, and only four league wins at Birmingham, there have been two seasons where the Hatters have taken maximum points. The first happened during the 1982/83 season, and Luton scored three goals in both meetings. First it was the trip to St Andrews where Brian Stein, Paul Walsh and David Moss were all on target in a 3-2 win, with a Ricky Hill brace and a Brian Horton penalty securing the points in the return meeting. In 1985/86 it was former Birmingham player Mick Harford who was the Hatters hero, as he scored three times against his former Club. Brian Stein had scored the first at Kenilworth Road, before Harford beat David Seaman from 25 yards to confirm the victory. Birmingham were relegated at the end of the season, and Harford ensured they took no points from the visit of the Hatters as he scored both goals in another 2-0 victory.




For the second home game in succession, the Hatters set siege on the visitors goal but frustration resulted in chances going begging as Luton had to settle for a share of the spoils.



#### Stoke extend Griffin stay


Stoke City have extended the loan deal of Portsmouth defender Andy Griffin into a second month.

"I cannot afford to let any of our young players move out on loan," said Roeder.


"We are competing on four fronts this season, and we have a few injuries at the moment."

# Man on fire

If it continues unabated, Rowan Vine's electrifying form so far this season may give the Club yet another headache when the January transfer window opens. However, things haven't always been sweetness and light for the Basingstokeborn striker, as he revealed exclusively to today's matchday programme.

Rowan Vine-Vine-Vine may be the familiar sound of the crowd at Kenilworth Road these days.

However, Rowan was a little less popular in these parts just three-and-a-half years ago when his spectacular effort for Brentford gave the West London outfit a 1-0 win in Luton, triggering a slide in form that eventually resulted in the Hatters falling out of contention for the League One playoffs

At the time, Rowan was a 20-year-old rookie forward playing regular league football for the first time in his career.

"I was at Portsmouth when I was younger and I got my first professional contract there. I made my debut there – a couple of sub appearances, things like that. I went out on loan after that and that eventually brought me here."

The Portsmouth trainee had been given a handful of chances in a struggling team in the Championship in the 2001/02 season, but the Redknapp renaissance at Pompey was another season away. And, at that time, the likes of Peter Crouch, Steve Claridge and Lee Bradbury were more adept at handling life in English football's second tier.

It was a sign of the club's instability that Rowan's thirteen appearances for Portsmouth came under three different managers. But however disappointed he was to be loaned out to a lower division club it done him the world of good, as the subsequent decent run of games allowed his game to develop.

Rowan has fond memories of his time at Fratton Park and still vividly recalls the moment when the charismatic player-manager Steve Claridge finally gave him the nod to cross that precious white line in a home Championship match against Sheffield United.

"I was in the squad for a couple of games and I was getting

nervous. We were at home at Fratton Park. I'd been warming up all game trying to get on then Steve Claridge has given me the nod with about 20 minutes to go.

"I just ran on and it was brilliant. There was a full crowd of nearly 20,000."

Claridge is one of football's great wanderers (he even spent four months of his busy 23-year playing career at Kenilworth Road) and now offers equally good value as a media pundit. But what was he like running a football club?

"What you see of him is what you get. He's exactly like he is on the TV now. That was his style as a player and as a manager.

"When I was there he was player-manager and he's a 110percenter in whatever he does. And he's a good laugh as well, a top man!"

Vine's had to wait four months for his next appearance, and by that time Graham Rix had taken over the reigns from Claridge.

Money was being pumped into the club and, with the likes of Croatian World Cup star Robert Prosinecki coming in, Vine's first team chances became increasingly limited.

Having failed to score in a further eleven appearances in the 2001/02 season, the new broom Harry Redknapp decided to move Rowan on to Brentford in a bid to find his goalscoring touch.

"I'd been asked if I wanted to go there on the Wednesday. I arrived there on the Thursday but was told that I probably won't be playing because it was only two days before the season started.

"They threw me in and I scored in the first half hour, so it was just perfect"



Things went pretty well for Rowan at Griffin Park, the goals were coming and he was playing every week. Then a goal drought kicked in. Rowan scored just one goal in his last 20 games for Brentford - An unwelcome 20-yard cracker against the Hatters!

"It was a I-0 win. I think I hit it with my left foot and then it hit the post and went in! It was a decent goal as well to be fair, so that sowed the seeds"

It was to be his last goal for the London club.

Rowan spent the next season at Colchester United, playing regularly and scoring goals at first, but ended the season with that déjà vu feeling this time with one goal in his last 15 league matches.

Fortunately for Rowan, and for that matter Luton Town, his barren spell had been punctuated by a stunning hat-trick against Coventry City in an FA Cup fourth round replay, which had not gone unnoticed by the Luton scouting staff.

Having secured his services on loan, Rowan was swept along on the Hatters tidal wave that engulfed League One that season.

His freestyle, serpentine style of play was the perfect foil for his strike partner, the legendary battering ram Steve Howard, and with such a wealth of quality playing behind them on the pitch, it was no surprise that the Hatters won the league so emphati-

As he lifted the League One Champions trophy high into the sky on that sunny late April Saturday afternoon at Kenilworth Road, Rowan Vine knew he had finally found his spiritual

Manager Mike Newell was determined to keep the squad together for an assault on the Championship, and sought to secure Vine's services on a permanent deal.

#### Did you know?

Rowan Vine progressed through Portsmouth's youth ranks to go on and make 13 appearances for the club's first team. However the striker never scored for Pompey and never appeared on the winning side throughout his stay at Fratton Park.

However, there was a problem. Fortyseven games had taken their toll on Rowan's body, and physically struggling past the finishing post came at a price.

"I'd always had a nagging back problem, stiffness in the back and stuff like that. All through the season when we got promoted I was struggling with it, from about Christmas time until May.

"I went back to Portsmouth to try and get it sorted and then the permanent move to Luton came along. I obviously jumped at it, even though I knew I was still struggling. I didn't know the extent of it so I had to see a specialist."

With such slow progress being made, his dream was starting to become a nightmare. The whole town was still on a high and everyone at the Club

couldn't wait for the season to start. Self-doubt and anxiety were feelings exclusive to Rowan at this moment in time, and the Manager was doing some shopping in the transfer market.

"We'd just won the league and we'd kept the same squad and just added a couple of people.

"You think 'I've signed but I'm injured but I can't do anything for a good two or three months'. Then you start wondering, especially with the team doing so well at the time, 'Am I going to get back in? If I'm not fit are they going to sign someone else?""

Eventually, his back responded to treatment, and a 150 chin-up-old-boys later a light appeared at the end of the tunnel, which had nothing to do with the maintenance guys changing

some bulbs.

"But you have to just keep going and when you do get fit just try your best, and that's what I've done since then."

After the trauma and frustrations of this time last season, Rowan has become the rare breed of footballer that actually now looks forward to pre-season training.

"I got a really good pre-season behind me this time to make sure I was fighting fit and my form's carried on. I'm nicking more goals now so I'm more than pleased.

"Touch wood I hope I don't get injured like that again."







# A to Z of Luton Town

Roger Wash looks back on every post war player to have appeared for Luton Town

#### John BRAMWELL

Tough tackling full-back John came to Luton as part of the deal that took Billy Bingham to Everton in October 1960.

Starting off with Wigan, John then moved to Goodison Park where he enjoyed a good run in the Toffees Division One side. On coming to Kenilworth Road he was virtually ever present for five seasons and was even watched by the England selectors on one occasion such was his form in a struggling Hatters side.

John left Luton as the club slid into Division Four in 1965 and joined Rugby Town for a brief stint before emigrating to Australia

#### **Terence (Terry) George BRANSTON**

Northampton Town finally got their man in October 1958 with the reluctant centre-half joining at a time when the Cobblers were about to sweep from Division Four to Division One in five years.

When Northampton started to fall back just as rapidly, Luton manager Allan Brown stepped in and brought Terry to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1967. A born leader and as hard as nails, terrace favourite Terry skippered the Hatters to the Division Four title in 1968 and further promotion

After a short spell at Lincoln, Terry retired to his established driving school in Rugby and is still an occasional visitor to Kenilworth Road.



#### **Timothy (Tim) Sean BREACKER**

Tim joined Luton from school in St Neots and made his Hatters debut in a 0-3 defeat at Ipswich in March 1984 while still only 18.

A fast and strong full-back who loved to overlap, Tim soon made the right back position his own, as well as picking up England u-21 caps, and was the only player to turn out in all 58 league and cup games in the momentous 1987/88 season which ended with the Hatters lifting the Littlewoods

Finances dictated that a reluctant Tim was sold to West Ham for £600,000 in September 1991, but he enjoyed eight years at Upton Park before finishing his career at QPR where he is still on the coaching staff.

# BEDFORD

#### Friedrich Johann BREITENFELDER

A summer 2000 signing by Luton Town manager Ricky Hill, this tall, right sided midfielder bizarrely let it be know that he liked to be called 'Ratz Fetz'!

Previously with NCN St Polten, the Vienna born 'Ratz' was beset with injury and made only two starts (against Wrexham and Wycombe Wanderers at Kenilworth Road) and three substitute appearances in a struggling Hatters side before returning to Austria in 2001. A year later he came back to England to sign on for Enfield before moving to German side Eintracht Bad Kreuznach. Subsequently, he has been with Rapid Vienna since August 2003.

#### **Dean James Gary BRENNAN**

Dublin born Dean joined Sheffield Wednesday from the exotically named Stella Maris Youth Club but found it impossible to fight his way into the side at Hillsborough.

When Ricky Hill became manager at Luton in the summer of 2000 he went back to Wednesday, where he had been coaching, and brought back Dean along with Peter Holmes.

A hard running left sided midfield player and occasional striker, Dean did not make much impact in an, admittedly, poor Hatters team and left to join Hitchin in 2002.

Since then Dean has been with Stevenage, Hendon, Grays, Lewes and AFC Wimbledon before linking up with Hitchin once

#### **Matthew (Matt) Hyland BRENNAN**

Spotted by Luton Town scouts while playing for St Roch, a junior club in his native Glasgow, Matt signed on at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1962.

Getting his chance at the back end of the following campaign, as the Town were slipping out of Division Two, Matt put in some impressive performances and scored one of the goals of the season in the 3-0 home win over Plymouth before injury

Sadly, Matt had to drop down to non-League level firstly with Chelmsford and later with Cambridge City and Bury Town.

Matt worked for Whitbread in Luton and now lives in Kempston.

#### **Robert (Bobby) Anderson BRENNAN**

It was a smart piece of business for Luton Town when they brought the clever inside forward over from Belfast Distillery in October 1947 for £2,000.

Once he had established himself in the Hatters side, his quality and opportunist goalscoring was plain to see and it was with regret that a record offer from Birmingham two years later was too good to refuse although it caused much anger amongst the supporters at the time.

He did not settle well at St Andrews or at his next club Fulham but then went on to enjoy seven years with Norwich, for whom he turned out against the Town, and scored, in the 1959 F.A.Cup

He settled in Norfolk where he remained until his death in 2002.

#### **Gordon Harry Joseph BRICE**

Bedford born Gordon signed on for the Hatters during the war but was called up to the Marines almost immediately.

In the first post-war season Gordon made only 13 appearances for the Town, mostly as understudy to centre-half Horace Gager, and it came as a surprise when mighty Wolves paid out £11,000 seeing him as the successor to Stan Cullis.

It did not work out at Molineux and in March 1948 he signed for Reading where he became a terrace favourite. Moving up a grade to Fulham in 1952, Gordon had four years at Craven Cottage before being transferred to Ayr where he also ran an

Gordon was also a county cricketer for Northants and was living in Bedford at the time of his death in 2003.

#### Dean Michael BRILL

Local lad Dean signed on for the Hatters from school and made his Luton debut in a Division Two game at Oldham in September 2003, whilst still only 17, coming on in goal for Robert Beckwith who had been dismissed for handling outside the area.

Dean played four more times that season, none in the next, and five in 2005/06, including the first three games of the campaign when the Town took the Championship by storm. Although regarded as understudy to the experienced Marlon Beresford, the young shotstopper is highly regarded at Kenilworth Road and has recently signed a long term contract with the club.

#### **Ahmet BRKOVIC**

The 'Croatian Sensation' came to England after meeting a Romford girl who was on holiday in Croatia. The former Dubrovnik midfielder had trials at both Millwall and Luton before accepting a contract with Leyton Orient in November 1999.

In East London he starred as the 'O's won through to the 2001 play-off finals, where they lost 2-4 to Blackpool, before signing for Luton that summer on a 'Bosman' free transfer.

Since that time he has been a regular in a Hatters side that has climbed from the basement to the Championship and has won the fans over with his clever footwork, intelligent use of the ball and occasional spectacular goals from overhead kicks!





# Away with the Faroes



With the opposition provided for the better teams in the European Championship qualifiers diluted to the point of boredom, GEOFF KNOX asks isn't it about time to get rid of the cannon fodder nations and get straight down to the nitty gritty? Insightful, investigative journalism or opinionated rubbish? You decide.

ootballing life returns to normal again this afternoon after the latest round of European Championship qualifiers.

The participating players are now back at their respective clubs and, in most cases, fit and ready for the bread and butter real live action stuff we're used to seeing here at Kenilworth Road on a Saturday afternoon.

Both Luton Town and today's visitors, Birmingham City, were affected by international call-ups to some of their players.

Warren Feeney (Northern Ireland), Markus Heikkinen (Finland) and Kevin Foley (Republic of Ireland) were all absent with leave from the Luton Rugby Club training ground over the last fortnight.

The Blues also suffered depleted ranks during the international break as Maik Taylor and Damian Johnson (both Northern Ireland), Stephen Kelly (Republic of Ireland), Nicklas Bendtner (Denmark), Mikael Forssell (Finland), Sebastian Larsson (Sweden U21), Cameron Jerome (England U21) and Fabrice Muamba (England U19) all served their respective countries

The second international break of the season (and we're still only in October) may be a blessing for some clubs, but is a curse to many others – particularly when their star players return to the club, do not pass GO and head straight into the treatment room to nurse an injury acquired on national team duty.

The question is, do we need to play so many international games in the first place?

For a start, the debate about playing friendlies rages on and on mainly due to two reasons - the inept way that the football authorities time them and the equally careless handling of the fixtures by national team managers.

The decision to play a friendly against Greece three days before the Premiership season even started (and for that matter, only a week or so after the Championship campaign began) incurred the wrath of many Premiership managers.

For example, having spent the whole summer organising and preparing for the new Premiership season, West Ham manager Alan Pardew not only lost players for the vital last few days before the big kick-off, but also, most damagingly, lost his star



striker for most of this season when Dean Ashton broke his ankle in an England training session for a nothing match.

During the game against Greece, England fans were, thankfully, spared from the substitute debacle that typified international friendlies under Sven-Goran Eriksson, as it was Steve McClaren's first game in charge and a result against a decent side was important.

'Only' six substitutions were made, and the majority of these were in the last quarter of an hour.

Now that the European Championship qualifiers are well underway a familiar pattern is emerging at the top and bottom of the group tables.

Critics of this competition justifiably argue that, depending on which group you're in, it can take up to fourteen

games to conclude the qualification process, and that is something worth moaning about.

Why should teams like England, Italy and France have to keep playing the likes of San Marino, Andorra and Crapteamistan twice every two years?

Not only do these games unnecessarily break up the domestic season, they do the recipients of these constant poundings no good whatsoever.

In sport in general, there is an argument that you have to test yourself against better opposition to improve. This rings true, to a degree, if you're taking on opponents a step or two higher up the ladder.

However, the minnows of European football used to be the likes of Albania and Cyprus, but countries like these are now basking sharks compared to the plankton currently floating around at

the bottom of the pool.

San Marino's opening two games have been high scoring affairs, yielding 20 goals. The only problem is, they didn't score any of them. They lost 13-0 to Germany and 7-0 to Czech Republic.

Andorra's record would not look good compared to any team other than San Marino. Comparatively, they have conceded just 16 goals in their opening three matches, and even managed to score one themselves – a late consolation effort in a 4-1 defeat in Israel

The fact that Azerbaijan only lost to Serbia by a single goal in Group A is seen as a triumph for a nation ranked 117 in the (admittedly flawed) FIFA Coca-Cola World Rankings, and had the Serbian press calling for the head of national coach Javier Clemente.

The Faroe Islands and Luxembourg have been around the qualifying scene for years taking hammering after hammering, so the argument that eventually their games would develop to the point of them being competitive is not a strong one.

The Faroes opened their qualifying campaign with two 6-0 defeats - not against the big hitters but against Scotland and Georgia.

The argument is now stronger than ever to reduce the amount of teams involved in a competition the size of the European Championship qualifiers.

Surely now European teams outside the, say, top 100 of the FIFA Rankings (as a marker, Equatorial Guinea are 90th) should have to pre-qualify for major tournaments, such as the lower ranked countries in the CONCACAF, Oceania and Asian territories have to do for the FIFA World Cup.

This would avoid potentially exciting qualifying tournaments being diluted to the point of boredom, as they are now.

And it would avoid embarrassing situations such as the predicament the FA found themselves in (which was recently avoided by yet more setbacks to the longest building project ever) when at one stage of proceedings it looked as if the inaugural competitive match at the new Wembley Stadium was going to be England versus Andorra.

Hardly fitting opposition for such a major event.

The youngsters then make the



espite fielding a strong team, Luton's Reserve side were well beaten by Southend United in a disappointing display at Roots Hall.

Some questionable defending from the visitors contributed to two of Southend's goals as the impressive Gary Hooper grabbed a brace for the home side, either side of a strike from defender Spencer Prior.

Adam Boyd had given Luton the perfect start with a 16th minute strike, however, the visitors fell apart after the goal and Southend could have added further humiliation to the Hatters, but wasted some good openings.

Southend started brightly and created the better chances. They should have taken the lead on nine minutes when Hooper beat the Luton offside trap.

Racing towards goal, Hooper stepped inside the challenge of Michael Leary and instead of laying off a ball to Ricketts the striker went for glory, shooting straight into the arms of Dean Brill.

Luton almost hit Southend on the counter attack when Brill's long throw found Shaun Ross. The defender played a neat ball, which released Stevens through the centre, who dragged a 22yard shot wide.

The deadlock was broken on 16 minutes as Boyd grabbed his second goal for the reserves this season.

The striker raced onto a through ball by Stevens and calmly placed a sidefooted shot beyond the reach of Southend goalkeeper Steve Collis from the edge of the area.



## Leeds United

Leeds have had a turbulent time of late, with disappointing results and continued financial problems. Their hope of a speedy return to the top flight is proving to be more of a challenge than expected. After a poor start to the season with only one away win against Sheffield Wednesday (1-0) and lying in 20th place in the league table, the board decided to sack Luton man Kevin Blackwell as manager and has temporarily installed John Carver as caretaker manager. After relegation from the Premiership two seasons ago, Leeds were hoping to spring back to the top flight at the first attempt, but were thwarted in the play-offs last season with a 3-0 drubbing from Luton's arch-rivals Watford.

This fixture last year ended in stalemate, with a 0-0 draw at home. The Hatters lost the away fixture at Elland Road 2-1. After a disappointing first half the game sprung to life with two goals in five minutes from Leeds, an unsuccessful penalty claim for Luton just before the first goal, and a missed opportunity from Kevin Foley from six yards. Some excellent goalkeeping from Marlon Beresford and Steve Howard's 100th goal kept Luton's hopes alive, but the Yorkshire men collected the points and diminished the Hatters' chance of a play-off place.

The Leeds strike force includes Northern Irish international David Healy, who recently scored two goals against Spain in the European Championship qualifiers. He notched up 14 goals last season, but has had a slower start this season with four so far, three from the penalty spot. Robbie Blake had an impressive tally last season with 11 goals, and Geoff Horsfield, on loan from Sheffield United, has netted twice so far during his tenure at Elland Road.


After his £700,000 move to the Whites in August, ex-Luton Town captain Kevin Nicholls will not be making the trip south after damaging his knee, getting his studs caught in the turf at West Bromwich Albion. He is expected to be out until December. Leeds will still have ex-Pompey player Steve Stone in the midfield after his planned hernia operation for his groin strain was postponed, along with Icelandic-born Gulfi Einarsson.

There have been several rumours regarding Blackwell's replacement at the helm at Elland Road, including ex-Charlton boss Alan Curbishley and recently departed West Brom boss Bryan Robson. Leeds chairman Ken Bates, formerly Chelsea chairman, has his work cut out to steady the ship. He will be hoping that his team can play colourful football once again when they make the trip to Kenilworth Road. Reminiscent of their old nickname – The Peacocks!
