WEIR'S INJURY CASTS SHADOW OVER VICTORY FOR EVERTON

AN INJURY to Everton captain David Weir knocked the shine off Everton's comfortable victory last night.

The 36-year-old Scotland defender was was taken to the neurological ward of a nearby hospital for a scan after being knocked cold in a clash of heads with Leon Barnett just before half-time.

Earlier Tim Cahill had dived in to head the opener for Everton and they were gifted a second 11 minutes later with an own goal from Keith Keane.

Then James McFadden made sure of victory with a third goal in the 53rd minute and Victor Anichebe added the fourth seven minutes from time.

The sixth goal of the season from the Australian Cahill, a nominee for European Player of the Year, confirmed just how seriously Everton were. taking the competition. Apart from young Scottish goalkeeper lain Turner, manager David Moyes fielded a side packed with experience. Turner was given his chance as American Tim Howard was given a rest on the bench after starring in Saturday's 2-0 win over Sheffield United even though he was unwell. For Luton manager Mike Newell it was a return to the ground where he scored two goals in an Everton League Cup win over his present club 19 years ago. By picking 10 of the starters from Saturday's 5-1 beating of Leeds, Moyes also made it clear he wasn't treating the competition lightly despite his side's Championship ambitions.

Andy Johnson was the first to threaten for Everton. The £8.6million England striker with six goals to his name already this season looked sharp from the start and in the fifth minute moved into the penalty area before hitting a low shot that was blocked by Marlon Beresford

Beresford.
Luton, with the confidence of a six-game unbeaten run, were not content to sit back and after 10 minutes their top scorer Rowan Vine hit a long shot that was saved by

Turner.
But the visitors were forced on to the back foot after that. Cahill looked set to score after 14 minutes but Barnett just managed to beat him to a cross from Simon Davies to head behind. Leon Osman met another cross from Davies five minutes later only to see Beresford dive to his left

But there was no denying Everton and it was no surprise when they went ahead. Joleon Lescott rose
