

Indeed, one of the privileges of being a professional footballer is that it gives you sufficient status to be able to really make a difference when it comes to worthwhile and charitable causes.


Last week, I merely visited the Healthy Schools Bus, conducted a question and answer session with some of the children, presented some certificates and signed some autographs.



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INTERVIEW JIMMY HUSBAND

Once a Blue ...

He started and finished his playing career for two different Evertons and he also turned out for tonight's opposition. ALAN JEWELL caught up with our former striker and winger, JIMMY HUSBAND

J IMMY Husband may be living near Luton but he will be firmly in the blue corner tonight.

The Geordie, who celebrated his 59th birthday on October 15, settled in Bedfordshire after his playing career ended in the late 1970s but remains, first and foremost, an Evertonian.

A skilful striker and winger, he played for the Blues between 1964 and 1973, moving on to Luton Town for his final years in English football before a spell in the North American Soccer League.

He was one of Everton's scorers when the Blues hammered Luton 5–1 in the League Cup in 1968 at Goodison, a game from which he has a permanent memento.

Husband recalled: "The pitch was as muddy as hell. Now it doesn't matter what time of the year it is, the pitches are like bowling greens. In the old days you could be playing on a skating rink, or something that was as dry as hell with three blades of grass sticking out, or it used to be a mudbath. It was a mudbath that night. I've got a fantastic photograph of myself with the Luton goalkeeper, Tony Read; he's spread out and I'm standing over him. He's covered in muck and all kinds and I'm relatively clean with a grin on my face."

He has affection for both clubs but Everton are always number one.

"I was at Luton for four years but I was at Everton for a lifetime. I met my wife, had a child. It's different. I came to Luton as a mature 27-year-old whereas with Everton I grew up there."

The scorer of 44 goals in 165 Everton appearances, his best season came in 1968/69 when he managed 19 in 36 league games, although he was also influential in the '69/70 championship team.

Since retiring he has run a pub and also

worked as a sales executive. In January he took voluntary redundancy after five years as a delivery driver for Parcelforce, although he considers himself "a bit young to retire".

He likes the "nice little villages, country pubs and restaurants" in mid–Beds. One of those tiny villages is called Everton and back in 1984 Husband played his final football games for their team after a group of locals approached him and suggested it would be appropriate if he turned out for them.

Husband readily agreed. "I didn't know the place existed but I had kept fit and they persuaded me to play a few games for them. That was the last time I played football but it seemed right to end at Everton as that's where I started my career."

The last time he was in Merseyside was for Brian Labone's funeral in May. "It was a sad day but a great send-off. Brian was a great mate of mine, even if I only saw him two or three times a year. I'm the president of Everton's Northamptonshire supporters' club and Brian and Gordon (West) used to come down to their annual do, and I'd see the two of them when I went up to Liverpool. It was a sad loss."

Husband is an occasional visitor at Kenilworth Road and Goodison Park. He has been pleased by Everton's start to the season but not surprised.

"They have a smaller squad than the top teams but they're very workmanlike and they all know their roles. It seems to me that Everton know exactly what they've got and how to play it. They play to that system superbly.


"Any team that's going to do any good needs a player who is going to pop you in at least 15 goals a season. Andy Johnson looks like he is well on his way there. You're not going to win anything without somebody who is going to do that. It looks like a good start for Everton."

Below: Husband turned out for a local team called Everton in Bedfordshire



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





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


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COME IN NUMBER 11 JAMES McFADDEN INTERVIEW

> Everton have made a fast start but James McFadden has been left in the blocks. He tells ALAN JEWELL how eager he is to catch up

Tt has been a contrasting start to the season for James McFadden with club and country. Before Saturday's game against Sheffield United, he had been restricted to just three substitute appearances for the Blues because of an untimely hamstring injury, which he picked


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Lithuania at the start of September and he wasn't fit to play again until that France game. Buoyed by his

experience there, he is desperate to build up his match fitness. It's an ongoing process. "I'm getting there," he told us. "The two games for Scotland helped me get a bit of match fitness and getting on at Middlesbrough helped. It's just a case of getting back into it. My hamstring feels fine, I just need to be training

been both a blessing and a curse. "It has been frustrating because of how well the team have started. It would have been nice to have been part of it but it's great that the team have been winning."



For him, it has been especially galling because the second half of last season was the most creative and productive of his Everton career to date.


"Last year I really enjoyed the final part of the season, getting games and scoring goals. I was hoping to keep that going into this year but obviously I didn't start the season in the team. I was trying to force my way in but I got injured. These things happen but I am over it now and I want to be involved in the games coming up."

He knows that is easier said than done. It has been a long time since there was such a level of competitiveness within an Everton squad.

"We all want to be part of the team and when you get in, you have to make sure you stay part of the team. You know there is somebody waiting for their chance if you're not doing it. It's good competition and it's good for the team."

Defeat at Middlesbrough was the first of the season but McFadden is optimistic that progress has been checked rather than halted.

"The mood is still very positive. You're going to be beat sometime. I think if we'd played badly and got beat, that would have been a different story, but we played well. The confidence is still





high."

Tonight attention turns to the Carling Cup. It was in this competition three years ago that McFadden made his first Everton start, a very impressive performance at home to Stockport County.

He now wants to be part of a Blues' team that finally makes a significant impact in the League Cup after 45 years of largely abysmal failure. However, there is no room for complacency if another let-down is to be avoided.

"It's been a good draw in terms of having a home tie but I don't think it's going to be an easy game. Luton did well last year in the Championship, they're a good side and we know it's going to be a tough game. They always are, no matter who you play in this cup. Hopefully, we can get through this, get another kind draw and go further in the competition than we have done in the past."

The Carling Cup may offer further opportunities to James Vaughan and Victor Anichebe. The latter was impressive at Peterborough in the previous round while the former is just finding his feet after 12 months ruined by injury. The pair are combining well in the reserve team and McFadden says they are not far away from progressing further.

"Vaughany and Victor have been training with us for a while now and it's not come as a surprise that they have come through and will try and force their way into the team. They're very talented young players. Vaughany is all-action, strong and quick. He doesn't stop running. Victor's strong and holds the ball up. They can both score goals and they've both got great potential. They are starting to realise some of that at the minute and are close to being involved."

McFadden's spirits would probably have been quite low if it wasn't for Scotland's form. Three wins and an unlucky defeat in Ukraine is an astonishing turnaround after a dismal period since the turn of the century. TT'S PROBABLY THE BIGGEST RESULT OF MY CAREER -NO DOUBT ABOUT THAT ACTUALLY. IT WAS THE BEST TEAM IN THE WORLD AND WE MANAGED TO HUMBLE THEM!

"It was good because before the [France] game we weren't expected to do anything. We would have taken a point and that would have been a fantastic result. To actually get a win was unbelievable and to be part of it was special because it will always be remembered. We beat one of the best teams in the world, if not the best team. It's a result that will go down in history as far as Scotland are concerned.

"It's probably the biggest result of my career – no doubt about that actually. It was the best team in the world and we managed to humble them. We had to defend for the 90 minutes but we did that well and I felt we got what we deserved.

"We've got a tough double header coming up next, Georgia at home and Italy away, so if we can take three or four points from them, then we will be in good shape. It's positive for the Scotland camp as well as Everton."

He credits former Blues' manager Walter Smith with improving the mood north of the border after a strained and fractious time when Berti Vogts was in charge.

"It's really relaxed and composed and there's a good atmosphere amongst the squad of players. We know exactly what we're doing, we have a formation and when players come in and fit in, it works well for us. We work hard for each other. It just seems to be working. There seems to be more solidarity in the squad as well and all those factors have helped greatly in getting these results."

If Scotland can progress from a group featuring Italy, France and Ukraine it would be one of their greatest achievements. McFadden says the players will be giving it their best shot.

"We have the ability to beat teams, whether we can be consistently solid remains to be seen. It's going to be tough but it's a tough group for the other teams as well. They have to play against each other and they'll be dropping points. We need to win as many games as possible and get as many points as possible. If we get points against the big teams then you never know."

cause cup shocks and came very close to knocking Liverpool out of the FA Cup in a thrilling third round tie last January, having led 3-1 with 25 minutes left. The Blues must avoid complacency tonight.



LIKE their geographic neighbours Watford, we have played relatively few games against Luton, but the contests have been memorable and full of incident.

We first encountered the Hatters in 1933 on the way to our first FA Cup final victory at Wembley, and we hammered the Third Division side by 6-0 at Goodison in the quarter-final in front of 55,000. We had to wait for our relegation in 1951 for our first league meeting and it was historic for all the wrong reasons - a 1-1 draw sent us to the depths of 19th in Division Two, our lowest position ever.

We played Luton regularly during the 1950s but they were forgettable affairs apart from their keeper Ron Baynham putting through his own net in the last minute in December 1959 for the only goal of the game. Luton went back down in 1960 and our only match, until their reappearance for one season only in Division One in 1974/75, was a 5-0 thrashing by the Toffees at Goodison in the League Cup in September 1968.

Luton were promoted under David Pleat in 1982 and we welcomed them by scoring five goals in both league matches, the last time the Blues have achieved this feat in the top-flight. A 5-0 win at Goodison was memorable for a tremendous performance by the on-loan Terry Curran whilst at Kenilworth Road in the penultimate game of the season we ran out 5-1 victors after trailing 1-0.

The following season we won 3-0 at Luton with Mal Donaghy sent off. Season 1984/85 was memorable for that dramatic semi-final at Villa Park, and the following campaign saw us again dump Luton out of the FA Cup. We were two goals down in the guarter-final until we drew level thanks to a Mal Donaghy own goal and a strike from sub Adrian Heath.

The replay in front of 44,000 at Goodison was decided by a Gary Lineker lob. But the next week we lost 2-1 in the league on the plastic pitch at Kenilworth Road, a defeat equally damaging as the one at Oxford later on.

There was a better tale in the league in 1986/87, as we lifted the crown here following a 3-1 win over Luton, thanks largely to two Trevor Steven spot-kicks. After defeating Luton again in the League Cup here in 1989 by 3-0, they stayed in the top flight until 1992. There were two memorable moments in that time: Tony Cottee's goal in May 1991 was the last in front of a standing Gwladys Street end and a clash of colours meant we wore their orange away kit at Kenilworth Road six months later!

CARLOS **EDWARDS** Trinidad and

Tobago international midfielder, who celebrates his 28th birthday today, Carlos was a member of the Soca Warriors' squad who did so well in Germany in the summer. He became the first Luton player to play in the World Cup finals since Mal Donaghy starred for Northern Ireland in Spain in 1982. Edwards spent five seasons with Wrexham, who he helped to the LDV Vans Trophy in 2005, before making the switch to Luton at the start of last season. Manager Mike Newell had tracked him for some time and tried to sign him during his time in charge of Hartlepool United.

KEVIN FOLEY

Foley is a talented full-back who has come through the junior ranks at Kenilworth Road. He made his debut for the Hatters in October 2002 and has since gone on to make well over 100 appearances for the club. A Republic of Ireland Under-21 regular, he scored his first

international goal in the summer of 2006 in a two-legged UEFA U-21 European Championship preliminary round match against Azerbaijan. His performances in that game prompted Steve Staunton, the Republic of Ireland manager, to call him up to the senior game and Foley was named as a substitute in a friendly international against Chile. He was also part of the squad for the recent European Championship qualifiers against Cyprus and the Czech Republic.

MIKE NEWELL After a successful playing career which included a two-year spell with the Blues, scouser Newell was given his managerial chance at the end of November 2002 at Hartlepool.

Newell had previously been a reserve coach at Doncaster and reserve team boss at Tranmere Rovers before joining Hartlepool but despite guiding the Victoria Park club to runners-up spot in Division Three and automatic promotion, his contract was not renewed. He was not out of the game for long as he topped an

unprecedented vote to become Luton's new manager on June 22, 2003, beating off competition from Joe Kinnear and Steve Cotterill. After taking his UEFA coaching badges, he duly took Luton forward - guiding them to the Coca Cola League One title and promotion to the Championship with a record points total.


steady decline. A poor 1959-60 season saw them finish bottom and relegated after five years at the top. Things went from bad to worse and by 1965, Town were in the Fourth Division - just six years after their FA Cup final appearance. The recovery began with promotion in 1967-68 but the sacking of Allan Brown shocked the football world.

Under Alec Stock, Town won promotion back to Division Two in 1970, aided by the goalscoring exploits of a £17,500 signing from Fulham, Malcolm Macdonald. In 1973/74 promotion was achieved and the Hatters were back in the top-flight but the yo-yoing continued with immediate relegation. In 1978, manager Harry Haslam left for Sheffield United and was replaced by David Pleat.

After a couple of near misses, a return to Division One was secured in 1982. In 1985, Town reached the FA Cup semi-finals but were beaten by Howard Kendall's Blues. An artificial pitch was installed in the same year. In 1988 they won their first major trophy, overcoming Arsenal 3-2 to win the Littlewoods Cup. They lost in the final of the same competition to Notts Forest 12 months later.

They were relegated to the football basement as the club's fortunes dived, even enduring two periods in the hands of receivers. The appointment of Mike Newell as manager in 2003 breathed new life into the club and promotion from League One was secured in 2005 as Luton amassed 98 points and finished 12 points clear of their nearest rivals Hull City.



Back for glory

Last time around he was the man responsible for putting Luton out of this competition. Now Mike Newell is delighted to be returning to Goodison in a bid to reverse history by knocking out the 'best club he ever played for'

A s featured in the Golden Vision section of this programme, the last time Everton and Luton met in this competition, Mike Newell was the Blues' matchwinner with two goals in a 3–0 win.

He is back tonight as the Hatters' manager, seeking to reverse the outcome from 1989.

Newell, who was brought up in Woolton and retains a family home on Merseyside, spent just over two years at Goodison from '89–91.

He made a fast start to his Everton career with nine goals in 13 games but injury and loss of form lessened his influence thereafter.

However, he thoroughly enjoyed his time at the club and was delighted when the draw brought him back. It offered him the opportunity to tell his young sons about his past exploits.

Newell explained: "When I was sat with the boys. I said 'Eh, guess what happened the last time Luton went to Everton in the cup?"

"To pull Everton out this year is fantastic. It will be nice to go back there. I went as a player with Blackburn but, apart from to watch games, it will be the first time since. It will be one to look forward to for me."

Brought up a Liverpool supporter, Newell didn't hesitate when he was offered the opportunity to sign for Everton 17 years ago.

"Colin Harvey rang me up and he said: 'Do you want to play for Everton?' I said: 'I'll be up there in about an hour'. Honest to God, I said I'd love to play for Everton Football Club.

"It was without doubt the biggest club I played for. We had more success at Blackburn but Everton was a massive club."

Reluctantly, Newell left the Blues for Ewood

Park in November 1991 after accepting that his chances of winning a regular first team place were limited. He was part of a Premiership–winning squad at Blackburn in 1995 but regrets he did not achieve on the same scale at Goodison.

"It would have been lovely to enjoy the same sort of success I enjoyed at Blackburn at Everton. It's still the best club I played for and I still get a great feeling when I go back there. There's nothing like the place when it's full and bouncing."


Newell has been in the headlines recently because of matters away from the football field. His comments about the amounts of money agents are making from the sport, while also alleging that illegal payments were going on, were the catalyst for an ongoing official investigation into transfers involving Premiership clubs.

He wasn't expecting to cause such a stir but has no regrets about speaking out.

"Once the original fuss had died down, I didn't regret anything I'd said. I thought 'I'm going to stand by that and until somebody proves me wrong, I'll dig my heels in.' I know I'm right so I'm not worried one little bit.

"Anybody who has got nothing to hide has been fine. I'm not really bothered if I've upset anybody because I've got nothing to hide, I'm just voicing my opinion and I'm entitled to that. If anybody wants to fall out with me or blank me I'm not really that bothered.

"If you get frustrated about it and you let it build up and build up and say nothing, I'm not being true to myself, am I?"

6. Hunter Hart

(1922–1930, 301 appearances, 5

Glasgow-born Hart joined Everton from Airdrie for £4,000 in 1922. He overcame adversity to enjoy a career at the top as he lost an eye in a childhood accident. He made most of his

Everton appearances at left-half but switched to the centre of defence towards the end of his career. He was a regular in the 1927-28 Championship winning team, missing just one game but, as the team slipped towards relegation two years later, Hart was forced to retire just after Christmas


He had two spells as captain, either side of Warney Cresswell's stint in the role. His first period as captain came between 1922 and 1927 and his second from 1929 until his retirement in 1930.

After hanging up his boots, he ook on a role as club coach.

It took his tally to nine goals in 13 appearances since signing for the Blues – both headers past former Everton goalkeeper Alec Chamberlain.

Neil McDonald crossed for the first and Pat Nevin created his second goal as Newell punished the club he played for between 1986-87 (and would later manage, of course).

Nevin completed the scoring with a low shot across Chamberlain five minutes before the end.

The picture shown here isn't actually of one of Newell's goals. Chamberlain saved this attempt to prevent Newell from scoring a hat-trick of headers.

It's fair to say that Mike's Everton career went downhill from this point as injury and loss of form compromised his effectiveness after a brilliant start. He joined Blackburn in 1991 where he won a Premiership winners' medal in 1995 (one of only two scousers to have achieved the feat). A Luton player from 1986-87, he returned to Kenilworth Road as the club's manager in 2003, leading them into the Championship in his second season in charge. His comments about the money-making activities of agents have recently put him in the spotlight.

Our record in this competition, under its different sponsors, is patchy to say the least. We first appeared in its inaugural season in 1960/61, when we reached the 5th Round only to be knocked out at Shrewsbury, 2-1, with Alex Young scoring his first goal for the club. Everton, like other clubs, then ignored it for several years. In 1971/72, we lost 2-1 at Southampton on September 7, 1971. The significance of the date? It was Brian Labone's final game in

mid-70s were not exactly a golden period. We failed to impose ourselves on the League Cup until 1976/77, when we lost to Aston Villa after a second replay at Old Trafford, the only time a domestic final has gone to three games We again failed to do ourselves justice until 1983/84. After scrapinthrough against Chesterfield. Coventry, West Ham and Oxford, we then faced our Nemesis from seven years earlier, Aston Villa, in the semis. This time, with a bit of good fortune, we ran out 2-1 victor on aggregate to set up the first all-Merseyside showdown at Wembley. A rousing goalless game was followed by an equally hardfought one at Maine Road, when our narrow 1-0 defeat showed everyone we were a force again The rest of the 1980s were a mixed bag, getting to the semi-finals in 1988 only to lose to Arsenal, after overcoming Liverpool 1-0 at Anfield in one of our finest derby match performances. Gary Stevens' late goal was the reward for a dominant display

Since then the highlights, in truth, have been few and far between. Let's hope our luck changes this season.





The tower which features so prominently on the club crest is an old lock-up that is still located on Everton Brow, in Netherfield Road.


Popularly known as Prince Rupert's Tower, or The Roundhouse, it has also been referred to as "Stewbum's Palace" or the "Stone Jug". It was built in 1787 and used to hold wrong-doers until they could be hauled before a magistrate the following day.

Legend had it that the tower was the area from which Prince Rupert looked down on Liverpool during England's Civil War.

It was only partly true. Prince Rupert did take the city with his Royalist army and almost certainly viewed the challenge from Everton Ridge but that was in 1644 - 143 years before the tower was built.

Everton gave a nod to the famous landmark when the Megastore incorporated the tower design into its facade.

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
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Stadium Tours...

EVERTON make the trip to North London on Saturday for our first visit to the Emirates Stadium. The match at Arsenal will be our 13th trip to a new ground in England since the Taylor Report triggered the building of new stadia in the late 1980s. With a visit to Reading's Madejski Stadium before Christmas also on the horizon, we look back at how we have fared on our other dozen 'inaugural' fixtures.

BOLTON WANDERERS

Ground: Reebok Stadium Opened: 1997 First visit: September 1, 1997 Bolton Wanderers 0 Everton 0

Everton were the first visitors to the £25m Reebok Stadium when it was opened nine years ago and secured a share of the spoils amidst plenty of controversy.

Bolton were left feeling aggrieved when television replays confirmed that a header from Gerry Taggart had dropped six inches behind the goalline before Terry Phelan hooked it clear and referee Stephen Lodge failed to give the goal.

John Oster clipped the bar with the Blues' best chance but the referee's earlier decision proved particularly important come the end of the season. Both Bolton and Everton finished the season on 40 points with the Trotters relegated due to an inferior goal difference.

MIDDLESBROUGH

Ground: Riverside Stadium Opened: 1995 First visit: March 2, 1996 Middlesbrough 0 Everton 2



The Blues triumphed on their first visit to the Cellnet Riverside Stadium as it was then known having signed off from Ayresome Park with a 2-1 win a couple of seasons earlier. Goals from Tony Grant and an Andy Hinchcliffe penalty gave the Blues another enjoyable trip to Teesside.

WIGAN ATHLETIC

Ground: JJB Stadium Opened: 1999 First visit: January 31, 2006 Wigan Athletic 1 Everton 1

Last season's trip was the Blues' first to Wigan for a senior fixture as the sides never met at Springfield Park. An incident-packed game saw the Blues earn a point while Duncan Ferguson and Jason Roberts were both dismissed.



The Blues' first visit to Leicester's new base was overshadowed by the tragic death of Everton fan Bernard Murphy before kick-off.

The game itself ended all-square with Marcus Bent's last-minute equaliser cancelling out a goal from Wayne Rooney 15 minutes earlier. Moyes joins Beefy on charity walk

avid Moyes joined Ian Botham in pounding the streets of Liverpool during the cricket legend's latest charity walk.

The Everton boss met up with 'Beefy' outside Alder Hey hospital and accompanied him as the route passed close to the club's Bellefield training ground. Moyes then had to wave goodbye to Botham before overseeing a training session. Former Liverpool players Ian Rush and Alan Kennedy also joined in the walk.

Botham hiked through 17 cities in nine days, covering 200 miles in the process, and travelled between

regions in a specially donated helicopter.

It was Botham's 11th charity walk and this one has raised approaching £500,000 for Leukaemia Research and the Teenage Cancer Trust.

In total, he has raised £4.5million since his first charity walk in 1985.

Botham, who was born in Heswall, in Wirral, was delighted by the reception he received in Liverpool.

He said: "The people of Liverpool have been extremely generous and I'd like to thank them all.

"I have been involved with these charities for 21 years. When I first

started supporting them, patients had a 20% chance of survival and now there is an 80% chance.

"That's why it's so important that we raise as much money as possible for the charities.

"Fortunately, no one in my family has been affected by leukaemia but it is something that I feel very strongly about. I hope we raise a lot of money but what's even more important is raising awareness.

"It was brilliant to see support from old friends and sporting celebrities who gave up their time to come and walk with me."







I think most Luton Town fans over the age of, say, 25 will recall with horror the day in 1985 when we somehow contrived to throw away our FA Cup semi-final against Everton at Villa Park . . .

Without any hint of bias (!), I would say we were magnificent that afternoon, only for Everton to snatch it cruelly with a goal in extra-time. Shattering, particularly for my eldest son, Andy, who was seeing a football match for the first time!

But my memories of Everton cup matches go back a lot further than that wretched FA Cup semi. Back to the days when Luton Town were an average Third Division outfit and we found ourselves with a big one - a trip to Goodison Park in the third round of the League Cup in September 1968. My friend Ian and I travelled on the supporters' coach only to see us thrashed 5-1 by an outstanding team.

Somehow, we felt privileged to be there! Joe Royle seemed to be on the end of everything, and scored twice. Ian and I stood outside the players' entrance afterwards and loads of Everton fans thought we must be Luton players. We signed autographs for about half an hour. I signed most of mine Geoff Hurst!

For a current connection with Everton you need look no further than our manager Mike Newell, who was a popular striker at Kenilworth Road. He's done a tremendous job for us after taking over when the club was in deep crisis and could have folded. Apparently, he's a lifelong supporter of another club on Merseyside but I wouldn't want to dwell on that. He's hit the headlines recently with his strong stand on bungs and the disproportionate amount of money going out of the game to agents. He's upset a few with his opinions and could have risked his job and standing within the game, but he's stuck to his guns and Luton fans really respect him for that. We also respect the exciting, attacking football we play under his leadership.

Our greatest wish now is for a new stadium to take the club forward and establish Luton Town amongst the elite. The political wranglings and machinations over land and money over the years have driven us near crazy, but, hopefully, we are creeping slowly closer to the day when we'll have a brand new home. As far as tonight's match is concerned, let me just say we have a pedigree in this competition. We won the old Littlewoods Cup in a thriller against Arsenal back in 1988 at a place you may remember called Wembley. The Luton Town Supporters Club was founded that year and I am proud to

have been President since day one.
