LUTON TOWN boss Mike Newell complained that Southampton should not have been awarded their penalty as his side lost at St Mary's to extend their miserable losing sequence to seven matches.

Newell, who must now fear for his job after the Saints withstood some late pressure to win comfortably, insisted it was not Leon Barnett who handled the ball but a Southampton player.

Grzegorz Rasiak slotted home the spot-kick to make it 2-0 but Newell blasted: "The goal that decided the game was a penalty given for handball, but it was not handball by one of my players.

"I believe the ball hit the Southampton striker's hand and we have four or five players in our dressing room who will swear on their lives that Leon was not to blame.
"This is another defeat and it's difficult

to take too many positives out of this one although the second half was better than something but there is a lack

of confidence in the squad. "But we must look forward, not feel sorry for ourselves and keep trying to play the

football we are capable of.
"I tried to bring in three or four on-loan players on deadline day but all I've managed is one and we have one of the smallest squads in the divi-

Burley, convinced it was a penalty, said: "It was definitely handball. I thought their player was attempting to play basketball with it.

the stronger side in the first half and should have been well ahead by the interval.

But Luton came back strongly after the break, pulled a goal back through Russell Perrett and came close to snatching an equaliser.

Luton had the game's first real opportunity in the 11th minute when Ahmet Brkovic set up a chance which Warren Feemey turned against the post from close

Luton had on-loan goalkeeper Dean Kiely in goal and the Portsmouth player produced some important saves over the afternoon.

But, after 14 minutes, he could have done better when Chris Baird headed goalwards from a centre by Gareth Bale. Kiely got his hands to the ball but could not prevent it falling behind him into the net.

Southampton went further in front in the 36th minute when Barnett was adjudged to have handled under pressure from Rasiak and the Polish striker got up to score from the penalty spot for his 11th of the season.

Kiely kept Luton in the match with saves from Rasiak and Rudi Skacel before Luton surged back into contention with a goal in the 66th minute.

Lewis Emanuel took a free-kick on the left and, as former Luton goalkeeper Kelvin Davis advanced from his line, Hampshireborn Perrett headed over him and into the

Kiely once more came to Luton's rescue when he tipped over a Skacel free-kick from long distance before the Hatters mustered one frantic last attempt at an equaliser in the three minutes added on for injuries.

Fortunately for Southampton, Portuguese midfield player Pele came to the rescue with a crucial header as Warren Feeney threatened to finish off another Emanuel cross.
