## Fans turn on Luton boardi cash ro

UTON chairman Bill Tomlins will today take the unprecedented step of of publicly explaining where his board has spent around £9 million of transfer income — and he will need to be convincing.

Fury among Luton fans reached new heights as their side slid closer towards a return to League One following a sixth

successive defeat.

Police rushed into the main stand at Kenilworth Road to quell supporters — them middle-aged many of - who turned angrily on the directors' box after substitute Matt Richards had scored Ipswich's second goal on 62 minutes.

At the back of the stand another 60 Luton fans tried to force their way past stewards to Tomlins and his fellow directors angrily chanting 'Where has all the money gone?'

Tomlins left his seat before the final whistle and organised a police escort from the ground.

The only hint as to what today's statement might include came in his programme notes in the wake of last week's sacking of manager Mike Newell for speaking out about the club's 'sell, sell, sell' policy.

He wrote: 'Until we relocate to a new stadium, we will always have problems attracting or holding on to players as our revenue base cannot compete with most clubs in this League.

'Our football operating costs alone will this season exceed our total income (excluding transfers) and that is before we take into account all other operating costs.'
