THE MANAGER

A big welcome back to Griffin Park for tonight's FA Cup 1st Round Replay against Luton Town, It seems an eternity ago since that draw at Kenilworth Road which also followed a League defeat from the previous Saturday. However, the loss at Macclesfield was nothing compared to the hammering at Peterborough three days ago. It has been difficult to write this article as the painful memories from that match are still very fresh and raw. It was mission impossible after Simon Brown's first minute sending - off and the converted penalty that resulted from his challenge, as Peterborough scented an early kill and the three points. There is no doubt in my mind that Darren Ferguson's side will be in the top three at the end of the season, as it ranks with MK Dons as the best two teams in the Division. It was, obviously, a shell-shocked coach journey home, after the game, but this match tonight represents an immediate opportunity to get back on to the pitch and channel all the frustration, anger and disappointment into putting on a performance that truly represents Brentford FC. It's similar to getting back on to a bike after a bad fall. I have never lost a game by seven goals either as a player or a coach, but I was at Ipswich in 1978 (as a Reserve) when Aston Villa defeated Bobby Robson's team by the same score line at Villa Park on the last Saturday of the season. Virtually the same players then went on to lift the Cup in the Final, the next weekend, with a Roger Osborne goal defeating the favourites, Arsenal.

FA Cup football is, at the moment, a welcome diversion from the three points of League Two, and, as there has to be a winner on the night, it gives us a chance to erase the bitter recollections of the weekend. There have to be changes in the side tonight as several loan players are not Terry

allowed to play because they were signed after the initial game at Luton, but everyone in the camp is feeling the hurt from Peterborough and is very determined to produce a display that can give all of us a much needed boost.

Luton travel to London tonight following a great win against Southend, which gave Kevin Blackwell's side some good news after the Club had gone into Administration. I have great sympathy for Kevin, as I was in the same boat at Motherwell, five years ago, although the Club had already sacked 19 players by then. It is extremely difficult to plan anything, especially for the January transfer window, as the Administrator is in control of every financial decision. Yet, the situation can also bring together the remaining squad, and, judging by Saturday's victory, it would appear that the players have certainly responded. Kevin and his staff are excellent characters and will definitely work hard to keep everyone focused and there are some outstanding professionals on the playing side to ensure that the Club will climb away from the bottom of the table. Yet we have to believe tonight that destiny is in our own hands and that Griffin Park is once again a very difficult place to visit.



You're aware that we are a Club who are largely (in fact, over) dependent upon revenue from match day attendances and therefore, have the need and the desire to encourage others to come along and join us at Griffin Park.

A look at the latest Profit & Loss sheet for our Club shows that we are overall 'on track' versus Budget and that we're slightly ahead on attendance revenue. Now that's mainly because we tried to build-in a relatively 'safe' figure and then (with extra matches like tonight, for example) we might be able to do even better. So far, so goodbut, room for improvement.

As we think about taking any action (like special promotions) to secure higher attendances, we are certainly aware that those of you who are our most loyal & committed season ticket supporters may feel left out. You may consider that your support is being taken for granted.

So, we have been looking for innovative ways in which we can offer you something exclusive which is not available to anyone other than Season Ticket holders. In addition we want to do this in a way which can build attendance further. Hence the season ticket holders amongst you should expect an Exclusive Offer to drop through your letter box soon. We think you'll be very interested.

For those of you who are Brentford Football Club shareholders and are attending our Annual General Meeting tomorrow evening, you'll see that our Club is reporting a 'bottom line' loss of £61,000 for last year. In perspective, this compares to BFC's reported losses across the past 6 or 7 years of £692,000 on average each year. Also, this compares to Deloitte's Annual Review of Football Finances, May 2007, which shows the average loss for a League 1 Club at £700,000.

Supporters have the opportunity to gain a perspective upon this and other Club matters at the Fans' Forum, which is schedule for later the same evening. The event will be hosted by BIAS (Brentford Independent Association of Supporters) and Greg Dyke, Terry Butcher, Brian Burgess and myself will be in attendance to answer your questions.

As previously announced, we also have a change in Directors of our Club underway. A very warm welcome to Alan Bird and David Merritt, who bring both high calibre 'heads' and Brentford 'hearts' to our Board.

A massive thanks to Brian Burgess (who moves to lead our new stadium project) for all the work that he's undertaken for BFC and, to Joe Bourke who has freely provided his financial expertise across recent years. The real value of their endeavours has not often been apparent, but has none the less been critically important to the survival of our Club.

We also anticipate making an announcement soon regarding taking a big step towards building a brighter future.





Good Evening and welcome one and all to tonight's FA Cup First Round Replay against Luton Town.

Should tonight's tie remain level at the end of 90 minutes play, there will be an additional thirty minutes extra time played. Should the scoreline still remain level, the tie will be decided by penalties.

The winners of tonight's replay will play host to the winner's of the Nottingham Forest versus Lincoln City replay, which is also taking place this evening. The Second Round tie will take place this coming Saturday, 1st December.

In the event that Brentford progress, Saturday's game would kick off at 3pm and would not be All Ticket. The admission prices would be £15 for Adults, £10 for Seniors and £5 for Juniors. However should Nottingham Forest be the apposition there will also be a further reduction for Season Ticket holders which will equate to £12 for Adults and £8 for Seniors. (SIR) BILLY COTTON JUNIOR

This evening we are delighted to welcome someone whose lifetime contribution to televised light entertainmen and variety has very few equals.

Sir Bill Cotton, maybe known to many as Bill Cotton Junior, was one of, if not the, most influential people ever to work at the BBC (our own Chairman apart).

In the 31 years he spent at the Corporation, commencing in 1956, he went from being a producer on such as Six-Five Special, to becoming Head of Light Entertainment, Controller BBC1 and eventually Managing Director of Television.

It was he who was responsible for launching such iconic shows as Monty Python's Flying Circus, The Two Ronnies and Morecambe & Wise onto the unsuspecting British public, and indeed the world.

In 1998 he received a BAFIA Fellowship award for outstanding achievements in the Arts and has also been awarded a CBE and a Knighthood.

However not so generally known is a fact about his father Billy Cotton Senior. He was a Band Leader of great renown who had his own Radio and TV series, "The Billy Cotton Bandshow" which ran for twenty years and opened with his catch phrase: "Wakey, Wakey". But maybe of more interest to the Bees fans here this evening is the fact that Billy (Snr) played in goal as an amateur for Brentford during the early 1920s in the London Combination.

We warmly welcome Sir Bill Cotton CBE here to Griffin Park this evening.

BEES UNITED

The Brentford Supporters' Trust

The new chairman of Bees United has called on all Brentford supporters to back the trust as it looks to secure the Club's future for future generations. Dave Merritt was elected as the new chairman of the trust last Monday, November 19th, replacing Brian Burgess in the role, and has encouraged everyone to get involved. He said: "My message to members and to those considering becoming members is to join up, let us know your views, and help."

Dave has been quick to pay tribute to his predecessor and the work he has done in taking the Trust to their current position as majority shareholder of the club, but he has emphasised that Bees United (BU) will be moving forward and has outlined four areas where he feels the trust needs to work: BU's relationship with the Club (including its funding commitments); the relationship with members (both existing and potential); interaction and fundraising with the community; and making the Trust run efficiently. He said they needed to attack them in parallel. "It would be easy to say the Club is the most important, or the members are, but they are all priorities," he said. "We need to work out the issues in each area and how we are going to resolve them."



Dave was co-opted onto the Bees United board earlier this year and said he made came up with these four targets following that spell. He added that the Board was also looking at improving the transparency of the trust, a subject raised at the recent BU AGM, but admitted this had to be done in the context of running a professional organisation dealing with sensitive commercial interests. "The point being made was that members have to know who they are voting for, which I agree with, but we also have to make sure that BU is seen by everyone – members, the Club, investors, large corporations – as a serious professional organisation."

He stood for election this autumn and was confirmed in the position at the BU AGM ten days ago.

He has also been nominated to sit on the Brentford Football Club board, which should be confirmed tomorrow (Wednesday) at the Club's AGM. It will mean a change for the trust, with Brian Burgess no longer in the chair, Bruce Powell standing down from the BU board and Joe Bourke no longer on either the trust or Club board, and Dave feels it means the introduction of a new phase in BU. "We have been reliant on a few people because they have been willing to put in the time" he said. "Bees United is in a good state and can achieve a huge amount going forward, but most people involved have full time jobs and we need to come up with a new way of working."

"I don't want Bees United to be a talking shop – all of us need to achieve something and I'm looking to support the idea of direct ownership of issues by board members."

Dave is well aware of the challenge he faces meeting his four targets but said he is looking forward to the task, and of being on the Club board, should he be approved.

"I am not doing the job because I want to be patted on the back, I am doing it because I think it needs doing," he said. "I've spent the last few weeks teaching my 4-year old daughter the "red/white ribbon" cup song, and I want to ensure the football club is around for her to come and watch when she has children. I think the role of Bees United is critical, and if I can help I want to do so."

Being a long-standing Brentford fan Dave is anxious to see success on the pitch, but made it clear he would be very uncomfortable gambling with the Club's future in the hope of short-term improvement.

"Football is an entertainment business and people don't enjoy it when we are losing," he said. "Results on the pitch are absolutely critical, but we have to balance how we achieve that. I would rather have 20 years of competitive football in Leagues One and Two than two or three years pushing for the Championship, failing and going bankrupt. If someone comes along who can truly transform the finances of the Club I would be ecstatic, but in the meantime my job is to make sure Brentford Football Club is here to stay."







TO TRAIL CHE

Luton are going through a torrid time off the pitch at the moment.

Just under a fortnight ago the club were issued with over 50 charges by the Football Association in connection with alleged breaches of rules.

Then five days ago they were deducted 10 League points after going into administration. The decision left them bottom of the League One table seven points adrift of safety before Saturday's game with Southend.

LUTON AND THE FA CUP

Luton have a good record in the FA Cup - reaching the final once and the semi-finals twice.

Their Wembley appearance in the 1958/59 season as an old Division One club came after they beat three other top flight teams, Leeds, Leicester and Blackpool, but in front of a capacity crowd of 100,000 at Wembley they lost 2-1 to Nottingham Forest.

Luton had a superb time in Cup competitions in the 1980s - winning the League Cup and finishing runners-up the following season, reaching the Simod Cup final and that decade also saw their two runs to FA Cup semi-finals.

In 1984/85 they lost 2-1 after extra-time to Everton at Villa Park - their eighth game of that season's competition. They beat Stoke in a replay and then saw off Huddersfield before finally overcoming local rivals Watford at the third attempt in round five. They then beat Millwall to reach the last four.

Three years later it was Wimbledon who ended their hopes of reaching the final with a 2-1 semi-final win at White Hart Lane. The Hatters had beaten Hartlepool,

Southampton, QPR and Portsmouth to reach that stage.

PREVIOUS FA CUP MEETINGS

This is the third season in which we have faced Luton in the FA Cup.

The first occasion turned into a marathon fourth round tie in 1951/52 when we were both in the old Second Division. The first game at Kenilworth Road saw the Bees hit back from a two-goal deficit to earn a 2-2 draw and then the sides shared a goalless draw here in the replay before Luton edged the second replay at Highbury 3-2 in front of nearly 38,000 people.

Our other FA Cup meeting was in the third round three seasons ago and goals from Chris Hargreaves and Jay Tabb in the final 19 minutes earned us victory.

THE MANAGER

Kevin Blackwell was appointed as Luton boss in March, replacing Mike Newell.

The Luton-born manager was previously in charge at Leeds, who he led to the Championship play-off final two seasons ago, and was also a coach at Sheffield United, where he worked alongside Neil Warnock.

In his playing days he was a goalkeeper for Barnet and Scarborough and then followed Warnock to Notts County, Torquay, Huddersfield, Plymouth and Bury before hanging up his gloves at Bramall Lane.




tonight and there is unlikely to be a substitute keeper on the bench.

The back four is likely to feature the experienced Chris Perry (5) (ex-Wimbledon, Tottenham, Charlton and West Brom), at right-back, and summer signing Richard Jackson (12) (ex-Scarborough and Derby) at left-back. The central defenders should be club captain and former Brentford loan player Chris Coyne (6) (ex-West Ham and Dundee), who played eight games for us in 1998, and on-loan Bolton defender Jaroslaw Fojut (31). Left-back Alan Goodall (3) (ex-Bangor City and Rochdale) and full-back and ex-trainee Keith Keane (21) are likely substitutes but Paul Underwood (24) (ex-Enfield and Rushden), and Sol Davis (26) (ex-Swindon) are both injured.

The make-up of tonight's midfield will depend on whether on-loan duo Marc Wilson (33) from Portsmouth and Anthony Grant (34) from Chelsea are allowed to play.

David Bell (8) (ex-Rushden) should be on the right while Northern Ireland international Steve Robinson (14) (ex-Tottenham, Bournemouth and Preston), Dave Edwards (16) (ex-Shrewsbury), who made his senior Wales debut





in Germany last week, former Scotland international Don Hutchison (4) (ex-Hartlepool, Liverpool, West Ham (two spells), Sheffield United, Everton, Sunderland, Millwall and Coventry) and former trainee Matthew Spring (25) (ex-Leeds and Watford), in his second Luton spell, are competing for places in the centre along with Wilson and Grant.


Darren Currie (10) (ex-West Ham, Shrewsbury, Barnet, Wycombe, Brighton and Ipswich) should be on the bench but Richard Langley (22) (ex-QPR (two spells) and Cardiff) is injured and ex-trainee Stephen O'Leary (15) unlikely to feature.

Former Northern Ireland international Paul McVeigh (28) (ex-Tottenham and Norwich) and ex-trainee Calvin Andrew (20) form the likely forward line, although Paul Furlong (29) (ex-Enfield, Coventry, Wafford, Chelsea, Birmingham and QPR) may be in contention after injury. FA CUP ROUND ONE REVIEW

As Round One nears its conclusion, here is how teams outside League Two fared in the First Round of the FA Cup

Blue Square Premier Torquay took pride of place by beating League One Yeovil 4-1, after Marcus Stewart had put the visitors ahead. Braces from Chris Todd and Danny Stevens set up a memorable triumph for the Gulls.

Blue Square North BARROW (right) held League One AFC Bournemouth to a 1-1 draw; Kevin Rapley opened the scoring for the hosts after 19 minutes, but the Cherries equalised through Jem Koracan on the stroke of half-time. The replay was the shock which got away as Nick Rogan and Jason Walker gave the visitors a lead which they held going into stoppage time, only for Max-Alain Gradel to convert a levelling penalty, and the hosts to win it 3-2 right at the end of extra time, through Danny Hollands.

Division One colleagues Cheltenham and Brighton tried again after a 1-1 draw; Adam El-Abd and Dean Hammond putting the Seagulls through 2-1 after their last-gasp leveller in the first game. Leyton Orient also drew 1-1 with Bristol Rovers, whilst it was all square at Boundary Park too as Oldham lost a two goal lead with a James Hayter brace earning Doncaster a 2-2 draw. Darlington and Northampton shared a 1-1 draw, but the Cobblers progressed 2-1 in the replay through Andy Kirk and Bradley Johnson.

In games featuring Non-League sides, Ryman Premier Billericay took a first-half lead but visiting League One Swansea won 2-1 whilst Blue Square Premier Altrincham went ahead on the stroke of half-time through Chris Senior, but Millwall replied through Alan Dunne's penalty, which saw Alty reduced to ten men. Will Hoskins got the Lions' winner.

Biggest winners of the day were Hartlepool, who won 6-0 at Blue Square North Gainsborough.

There will be several Non-League sides in the Second Round, though, alongside Forest Green, Torquay and Rushden, making it nine in total from the Blue Square Premier. Cambridge United are among them as they came from behind to beat ten man colleagues Aldershot 2-1. Weymouth progressed too, following a 4-0 win at Blue Square South Eastbourne Borough, where Stuart Beavon

scored a hat-trick in seven minutes, earning the player of the round award. Exeter overwhelmed league rivals Stevenage 4-0, whilst Burton claimed the same scoreline at Halifax thanks to doubles from Daryl Clare and John McGrath, and Oxford United beat Northwich 3-1.

Ten man Kidderminster triumphed 2-0 at Ryman One North Ware. Blue Square South Havant & Waterlooville are the only representatives left from their league, following a 1-0 win at York, whilst Ryman Premier Horsham are in the Second Round for the first time ever as they beat Blue Square South Maidenhead 4-1 helped by Lee Carney's brace, whilst two other names who hit the headlines in recent seasons are back, sharing the distinction of being the lowest ranked sides remaining. Harrogate Railway Athletic of Unibond One North beat a Droylsden side three levels above them, 2-0, whilst Southern One Midlands Chasetown won 2-0 at a Team Bath side in the league above them.

Meanwhile, here we have a run down on our fellow League Two sides in the competition.

HAPPY HEREFORD

Hereford pulled off one of the biggest shocks in this season's FA Cup first round when they won 1-0 in their replay at Leeds last Tuesday.

The Bulls had held the former winners to a goalless draw in the televised first leg at Edgar Street and Lionel Ainsworth's third minute strike at Elland Road proved to be enough to win the tie.

Delighted Hereford boss Graham Turner said: "When we look back at the record of Hereford's cup exploits, it is another big scalp in its fairly illustrious history."

STOCKPORT SHATTERED

Stockport crashed out five nights ago when they suffered a 4-3 penalty shoot-out defeat at Staines after a second 1-1 draw between the sides.

It is the first time our near non-league neighbours have reached the second round in their history.

MISERABLE MILLERS

By contrast the same night proved a sorry one for Rotherham, who were dumped out of the competition by Blue Square Premier (Conference) side Forest Green. The Millers had hit back from 2-0 down in the first leg to earn a 2-2 draw and the replay but the non-leaguers made no mistake the second time around as they secured a comfortable 3-0 triumph at Millmoor.

WINNERS AND LOSERS

A total of nine League Two clubs have secured their place in the second round - while two more (us and Lincoln) have the chance to join them.

Apart from Hereford, other giant-killers were Grimsby and Barnet.

The Mariners beat then League One leaders Carlisle 1-0 in another of last week's replays, with a second half goal by Gary Jones, after a 1-1 draw in Cumbria.

Barnet only needed one game to see off Gillingham, overturning a half-time deficit with second half goals from Ismail Yakubu and Liam Hatch to win 2-1.

In the all-League Two ties Peterborough hammered Wrexham 4-1 and Bradford beat Chester 1-0 but the other four winners all comfortably saw off non-League clubs.

Bury found things easiest as they swept aside Workington 4-1 while there were 3-0 wins for Mansfield over Lewes, Notts County against Histon and Dagenham & Redbridge at Hampton & Richmond.


Meanwhile Macclesfield were the victims of a Cup shock when they slumped to a 3-1 defeat at ex-league club Rushden & Diamonds.







Poole curled a free kick narrowly over and had a shot blocked and Ide had another effort deflected away minutes later.




It was not proving to be Brentford's day; substitute Alan Connell couldn't find a way to convert a Thorpe nod down and Ide screwed the follow-up wide.


And when Stockdale produced a brilliant double save from Thorpe with less than three minutes remaining Brentford were pretty much resigned to their fate.




Brentford endured a day to forget at London Road as an inspired Peterborough United side made use of playing almost the entire match with an extra man to inflict a heavy defeat.

Peterborough did get their second goal just before the quarter hour when a nice interchange of passes led to Boyd feeding Jamie Day on the left, his cross was met by McLean, who met the ball with a scissor volley which bounced over Masters and in to the corner.

The hosts were beginning to pepper The Bees goal, Masters saved well from Charlie Lee, Boyd fired wide and Masters produced another brilliant save when Lee's effort Micah Hyde shot well over.

McLean was the main danger and Masters denied him with a fine low save after a sharp turn but the Peterborough striker missed a great opportunity for a third goal just before the half hour.

A penalty was awarded against Glenn Poole when he was adjudged to have deliberately handballed a Claude Gnakpa cross but McLean hit the crossbar with his effort from 12 yards.

Masters denied him again with a fine tackle 25 yards from goal when he looked set to race clear and Lee fired across the face of goal before Craig Pead blocked another McLean shot.

But the Posh striker did claim his hat trick minutes before half time rounding off a fine move involving Boyd and Mackail-Smith with a lashed effort into the top corner.


Masters saved brilliantly from Boyd and Lee chipped an effort just over before Whelpdale added a fourth, converting from close range after Lee drilled the ball across.

Boyd scored the fifth soon after the break, firing powerfully in from a tight angle, and Mackail-Smith capitalised on a deflected pass from Day to race clear and slot home the sixth.

looked set for the top corner and denied substitute Howe from eight yards as the visitors failed to clear.

Brentford did have some efforts of their own, Poole lashed a shot in from 30 yards that flew narrowly wide and Lee Thorpe fired over from a corner.

But at the other end Whelpdale fired over and Mackail-Smith had an overhead effort saved before Howe added the seventh when substitute Dean Keates picked him out with an intelligent pass.



Howe headed a Boyd cross against the crossbar minutes later and Whelpdale was denied his second goal of the afternoon when Mr Armstrong adjudged that Masters had been fouled before the wide man put the re-bound in.

Keates shot into the side netting and Whelpdale lashed over before Poole fired over at the other end and John Mackie looped a header onto the top of the net. Howe came close to a goal before the end but Masters saved well again from his low shot before Mr Armstrong brought proceedings to a close.

BRENTFORD THROUGH TIME

The London Challenge Cup was inaugurated in 1908 and contested by the Capitals professional teams. Played in midweek, the competition obviously struggled to attract decent crowds and as time passed its importance was downgraded as clubs resorted to fielding a mainly reserve eleven. Later it was spiced up by the inclusion of a few senior amateur sides with the four semi finalists from the previous seasons London Senior Cup awarded a ticket.

he opposing captains shake hands

Those teams generally came from the Isthmian (top tier) or Athenian (second tier) southern based amateur leagues but in 1952 the mould was broken when Corinthian (third tier) champions Hounslow Town made the cut.

Formed five years before Brentford in 1884 their progress eye on the game against Brentford.

had been slow and only in recent years had they made an impact, winning the Spartan League in 1945-46 and the Corinthian League in 1949-1950 and again two seasons later. And as we shall see later the Red & Blacks were to achieve greater glory as the decade progressed.

Meanwhile, back to October 1952 when the first round draw in the LCC paired them with Brentford at Griffin Park.

Bees manager Jimmy Bain did not take the game lightly,

especially with local bragging rights at stake, and apart from Billy Dare, who took Tommy Lawton's place at centre forward, it was the same side that won 2-0 at Doncaster Rovers in a Second Division encounter two days earlier.

Hounslow had flexed their muscles by thrashing Grays Athletic 8-1, Derrick Page contributing five of the goals.

A 5 o'clock kick off did not deter a crowd of 4,017 assembling at Griffin Park, although the Hounslow contingent were given a surprise when Bert Finch took the field at left back. He had been retired for three years and was only there to spectate, but was called into service when skipper and left back Ernie Emmins phoned at the last minute to say his boss was refusing to let him off early.

Finch, who spent his career as an inside forward, was the only alternative and even then had to borrow a pair of boots from Brentford!

Despite this late change of plans
Hounslow got off to a bright start and
subsequently matched the Bees all
over the park to thoroughly deserve a
second bite at the cherry following a
0-0 draw.

Before the replay took place a week later Brentford disposed of relegation bound Southampton 3-0, all the goals arriving in the final ten minutes from Tommy Lawton, Fred Monk and Leslie Smith, while Hounslow surprisingly lost 3-1 at Maidstone, the excuse given that they had one eye on the game against Brentford.

A large Denbigh Road crowd of 3,500 plus was augmented by a bevy of managers and scouts from other clubs, there to run the rule over Brentford's transfer listed former skipper Ron Greenwood who replaced lan Dargie at centre half.

The man he was set to face, Alan King, was one of the most prolific marksmen of the day, indeed he went on to score 77 of Hounslow's 150 goals the following season topped off by selection for England against France.

However, Greenwood showed the form that had earned him recognition for England "B" a few years earlier and blotted the Hounslow livewire out of the game. It proved to be Greenwood's swansong as a week later he was sold to Chelsea in exchange for Irish International Seamus D'Arcy and a cash adjustment in Brentford's favour.

Even without the cutting edge of a rampant King, Hounslow continued where they left off at Griffin Park and gave Brentford a run for their money. But with time and the light running out young amateur Ayres settled the issue in Brentford's favour with a perfect strike.

The Bees went on to beat Wealdstone 3-1, and Charlton Alhletic 2-1 before losing 2-1 to West Ham United in the final at Chelsea.

The attendance of 994 (£52) is explained by a pea-souper fog which blanketed London that afternoon, a regular winter occurrence until the Government brought in the Clean Air Act to alleviate the problem.

It was also responsible for the absence of Bill Sperrin.

The bus from his Edmonton home gave up the ghost at Turnpike Lane leaving "Sparrer", as he was nicknamed, to continue on Shanks's pony. This, too, met with disaster when it came to light that he was heading in the wrong direction and found himself in Chingford!

Fortunately Brentford had taken twelfth man lan Dargie to Stamford Bridge and he filled in.

So what became of Hounslow Town?

Well, they continued in fine fettle and won the Middlesex Senior and Charity Cups but missed out on the Corinthian League title after losing 2-0 to the eventual winners Carshalton Athletic in a photo finish.

The London Charity Cup found its way to Denbigh Road in 1953-54, a campaign in which they attained a place in the last eight of the FA Amateur Cup.

The following year the Red & Blacks reached the semi finals of the FA Amateur Cup where they went down 2-1 to Hendon in front of a crowd of almost 20,000 at Tottenham. In a truly magnificent season Hounslow

became the first club whose first and second teams tasted Corinthian League glory in both their respective divisions and for good measure they contested the first round of the FA Cup for the first time, the second half of the 4-2 defeat at home to Hastings United going out live on Television. There were 6, 139 present at the game and such was the success they were enjoying, their gates were not far short of Brentford's at one juncture.

A further rise in the rankings came in 1955-56 as an unblemished home record enabled them to finish runnersup in the Athenian League, a competition Hounslow won in 1959-60.

Then in 1962 came the greatest day in the club's history when it graced Wembley in the final of the FA Amateur Cup.

100/1 shots at the outset, Hounslow's victims along the way were Clapton, Dulwich Hamlet, Finchley, Bromley and in the semi's ten times winners Bishop Auckland who succumbed 2-1 in front of more than 13,000 at a far from neutral Griffin Park.

There were 43,000 for the game against Crook Town on football's biggest stage which ended 1-1. The replay at Middlesbrough seven days later represented a bridge too far and the Northerners won 4-0.

A measure of the club's strength at this time is that five of the team were capped by their country while on the books: Derrick Evans and Bill Creasy (England), and Geoff Taylor, Ken MacDonald and Tom McHattie (Scotland).

Hounslow were exempted until the first round of the FA Cup the following season and were then drawn at home to Mansfield.

The Red & Blacks held a two goal advantage until the dying minutes but then ran out of puff just as a giant killing seemed on the cards, as Mansfield came back to draw 3-3. The replay saw Hounslow pummelled 9-2.

The Glory days now faded and the club set off on the road to oblivion, Gates sunk to a few hundred at best and after flirting briefly with the Southern League, Hounslow were contestants in the Hellenic League when the end came in 1991.

Struggling under a mountain of debt they were evicted from Denbigh Road by the local Council, who wanted to build a school on the site, and they merged with Feltham to become the junior partner of Feltham & Hounslow Borough FC. RIP.

BEES V LUTON IN THE FA CUP

We first played Luton Town in the FA Cup back on the 20 November 1909 in a 4th Qualifying Round match played at Griffin Park.

"By far the most interesting contest in the English Football Association Cup competition on Saturday was the meeting of Brentford and Luton at Griffin Park. The records of the two clubs in the Southern League are very similar in character, Luton having a slightly better average on points. The match in question was seriously regarded by both clubs, and R Hawkes, the visiting left half back, who was selected to play in the amateur international, excused himself from playing, preferring to assist his club. Brentford were at full strength, and were fairly confident of winning with the advantage of ground.

The afternoon was not an ideal one from a spectator point of view, a ground mist descending over the playing pitch rendering it somewhat difficult to follow the play during a portion of the game. The match started before a fair crowd, which included a good contingent of Lutonians, and after Stansfield and Moody had worked the ball down to the "Bees" end Rhodes transferred to Bartlett, and a pretty piece of play between McCafferty and the right winger ended in a fine centre, which Reid popped past Fry with lightning speed, and the "Bees" secured the lead two minutes from the start

Following this Luton accrued several corners, and played up in dashing style, but their forwards failed to steady themselves before shooting, and Ling was never seriously troubled excepting for two really fine shots from Stansfield and Quinn. About twenty-five minutes from the start the visiting halves set their forwards going, and a clever piece of play resulted in Smith equalising with a fast shot. Both sides should have increased their lead after this, but unsteadiness in shooting was very prevalent with both lines of forwards. Just before the interval Brown, the visitors' right winger, slipped past Buxton, and Smith found himself in possession with only Ling to beat. He was hotly pursued

by Riley, however, who was not quite fast enough to catch him, and a score seemed imminent, when Smith was badly brought down about twenty yards out. The trainer attended him, but he left the field, and beyond a short period in the second half, took no further part in the game. Riley was cautioned by the referee, and it was very unfortunate for the visitors to be handicapped by the loss of so clever a player as Smith. On the journey back to Luton in the evening Smith had a relapse, and Mr Lawson, the chairman of the club, deemed it advisable to stop the St. Pancras express at Kentish Town for the player to be medically attended. To return to the game, the interval arrived with the score one all. The second half was obviously in favour of Brentford, and many chances fell to them to add to their score. After fifteen minutes' play Reid had little difficulty in scoring from winning point.

Brentford deserved their win, for they were slightly better all round than the visitors. Rhodes played a sterling game at back, and Buxton, who started poorly, finished in fine style. The half backs worked very well together, Riley getting through some quiet but telling work. The forwards gave a good show, Bartlett being the best forward on the field. His dashes and centres were quite a feature of the game, and the two goals obtained by the "Bees" were mainly due to him. Hollinrake was responsible for a fine solo effort towards the close, his shot just grazing the upright. The visitors, however, played with rare pluck, but Smith's absence in the second half was responsible for the somewhat tame exhibition supplied by the Bedfordshire men. The left wing was in fine form in the first half, but the honours went to the right wing after the interval. The Brothers Hawkes and McCurdy were always trying to turn the tide for their side, and put in a lot of work to this end. Fry, who deputised for Jarvis in the Luton goal, gave, a fairly even display, and could not be blamed for the two goals against his side." About 7,500 spectators watched the game, and the gate realised £212 11s. 3d.

The next encounter was in 1951-52 season when after three attempts Luton ran out winners by 3-2 in a 2nd Replay at Highbury in front of a crowd totalling 37,269. Details of this match appeared in the Luton programme. However, our last encounter with Luton in the FA Cup was a third round tie on the 8 January 2005.

A report appeared in the next Brentford Home programme compiled by Chris Wickham...

Brentford made three changes from the team that defeated Walsall five days previously. Sam Sodje was suspended, Alex Rhodes injured and Jay Tabb started the game on the bench. Brentford were able to welcome back Stewart Talbot into the starting line-up, Ben May and Scott Fitzgerald also came back into the team. The first half was not a great spectacle. Both teams were anxious to win the midfield battle and neither was able to do so. Brentford played three central


midfielders to nullify Luton's attacking potential and they did that to good effect. Deon Burton playing as a lone front man had the game's first shot on 5 minutes but it was off target and at the other end Steve Howard had a left footed shot that was off target.

The Luton front man had another shot blocked by Fitzgerald and headed wide as he showed just why he has scored so many goals this season. It was ex-Brentford striker Rowan Vine who came closest to breaking the first half deadlock in the 23rd minute; he wriggled free inside the area and shot across Stuart Nelson, who turned

the ball past the post. From the resulting corner Howard had the ball in the net, but referee Mariner deemed that he had fouled Chris Hargreaves and disallowed the goal. Much of the rest of the half was contested in the middle third with neither team able to create any clear-cut chances.

The second half started in a similar vein with neither team able to dominate the other. Steve Robinson fired in a shot that dipped just over the bar and Burton had a shot saved by Marion Beresford. Brentford took the lead in the 71st minute, Luton defender Curtis Davies slipped and presented the ball to Isaiah Rankin, he danced around Chris Coyne and got in a shot that was saved by Beresford. Ben May was first to react and he knocked it to Hargreaves who drilled it into the top corner. Talbot almost added a second when Beresford came rushing from his goal and punched only as far as the Bees captain. His shot was off target with the goal gaping. Luton came close to an equaliser two minutes later when Ahmet Brkovic cannoned a shot off the cross bar, but it was Brentford who got the game's second goal with a minute left of the ninety. Ben May controlled a long clearance and turned Coyne. His through ball found Tabb (who had come on for the injured Jamie Lawrence eight minutes earlier) clear and he made room before shooting low past Beresford to send the Bees into Round Four.



CRIMINAL



Known as Tercao, he plays with his son Enio, for Goiandiva Esporte Clube, for whom he has been playing right wing since he was 60 and is a retired farmer. He is, however, according to his son, a greedy player as he does not pass the ball much. Tercao claims that he can not hear his team mates calling as he removed his hearing aid before matches!

AGE

Brentford's oldest pre War player was James Hodson who was 4 months short of his 41st birthday when he made his final appearance in May 1921 (lost 0-1 away to Plymouth). The oldest post War footballer was Dai Hopkins, the Welsh International, who was 39 years and 4 months old on his final game against Arsenal in May 1947 (lost 0-1). However one must not forget that Eddie Lyons, the Bee's Trainer, played in his own testimonial match against Chelsea in May 1984 at the ripe old age of 63 and Brentford lost 6-3. Nice one Eddie!






