It was the best run of the season and all signs pointed to Cheltenham becoming the first team this campaign to lose to Luton at home.

Robins' keeper Shane Higgs clearly hadn't read the script as three times

The early goal, scored by Andy Lindegaard after just two minutes, ultimately proved the decider, but it was a goal and a result that flattered Cheltenham who just weren't at the races for the first 45 minutes.

Luton's away day woes seemed to be abating when they fought tooth and nail at Oldham for a thoroughly deserved draw.

This was an altogether more stylish performance, made more impressive by some enforced changes.

Out were rock-solid Bolton loanee Jaroslaw Fojut and fan-favourite David Bell. Goal hero against Nottingham Forest, Calvin Andrew, was put on the bench after Blackwell had spent the week saying he was reluctant to put so much pressure in leading the line on his young shoulders.

But disaster struck when Lindegaard appeared on two minutes to poke home Shane Duff's flick from David Bird's long throw.

The Luton of a few months ago might well have buckled but there's a new impetus now because points mean survival.

There was no shellshock just calm methodical play that saw Cheltenham forced back into their own half for long periods.

If not for Higgs, Luton could have had at least three goals by the break. Youngster Marc Wilson tested him on six minutes when he rose to head Darren Currie's corner.

He then twice denied Matthew
Spring in outstanding fashion from
fierce long range efforts on nine and

25 minutes respectively.

At the other end Dean Brill was only called into action when, wrong footed by Damian Spencer's tame 25-yard effort, he stuck out a leg to black and watched gratefully as Steven Gillespie and Guy Madjo got in each other's way to try and steer the rebound home.

All the while the pace, pressure and passing in their approach play kept the Robins at bay and cried out for a final product that frustratingly didn't come.

Cheltenham were more dogged in the second half and nearly scored when Gillespie produced a solo run and shot on 49 minutes. It wriggled through Brill's legs only for Richard Jackson to clear.

Blackwell threw what was left of the kitchen sink at Cheltenham by bringing on Anthony Grant, Drew Talbot and Andrew in the last ten minutes – the latter going agonisingly close to being the hero for the second game running.

Right at the death he met Spring's deep cross, sending his header looping into the far corner only for Higgs to prove Luton's nemesis with a top drawer save.

The two teams may neighbour each other in the league table. To the home side, it was a case of a sixpointer as they're not accustomed to winning.

Unfortunately, on the road, nor are Luton, but you can't help thinking that if the Hatters continue to play as well as this then the elusive away win will soon arrive – a little bit of luck permitting.
