The visitors continued to have plenty of good possession with a Morgan cross forcing Stuart Nelson to tip the ball over the crossbar. The subsequent corner saw Keith Keane halve the deficit as he steered home a half clearance from 10 yards and the goal seemed to lift Luton who visibly raised their game.

An Efe Echanomi effort was then somehow deflected wide by a combination of Hutchison and Keane after Brill had been beaten.

And then Orient wasted another good chance as Boyd's close-range cross from a tight angle was cleared away to safety.
