"I have had to be patient as I have just had an operation. I have been out for five to six weeks and it is difficult because we know the history with my knee but I have had to bite my lip.

"How could I complain when the lads have been putting in performances like Nottingham Forest? I wouldn't have had a leg to stand on."

While Roberts' mazy dribble and powerful finish will take all the headlines. Town's defensive rearguard, especially debutant Pat Kanyuka, can also take huge credit from the deserved victory.

Skipper Hasney Aljofree led by example in the heart of the defence, until getting taken off to have six stitches in an eye wound, while Kanyuka showed maturity beyond his years to slot in alongside him, despite also taking a hefty whack on the head that left his needing stitches as well.

Team ethic working a treat as Maurice savours start

MAURICE Malpas has hailed his Town's side's collective spirit insisting any successful play-off push will not be based on just a few "superstars", writes ANDY CRYER.

Christian Roberts' brilliant 52nd winner earned Malpas his first away win as Town manager at Luton but he was to keen to hail the uglier side of his team's display.

Defenders Hasney Aljofree and Pat Kanyuka received six stitches in the head each for their efforts but, just four games into his reign, Malpas is excited by his team's togetherness.

He said: "Our back four was tremendous. Our team does not have any so-called superstars. Our biggest thing is our teamwork, our comaraderie and being together.

"The best way for us to win is to work our socks off and if we produce performances like that we will win far more games than we lose.

"It is credit to Patrick for coming in and doing so well and big credit to Hasney Aljofree as well. He talked Patrick through the game so I can't speak highly enough about them.

That is what we need. Corr came in and needs the games but he worked his tail off. If they work their tail off collectively there is nothing more to ask from them."

The win leaves Town within touching distance of the pack chasing a play-off place in League One and, with Northampton at home next up on Saturday, Malpas is keen to continue his impressive league

He said: "That was a fantastic three points. It was a difficult match with the first half quite scrappy because both sides were determined to do well.

"In the second half we were far better, got the goal and had a couple of other chances to finish the game off. I thought the defence was fantastic and the midfield made it easy for them by defending well in front of them.

"People have criticised us for getting too many draws so it was important we got something.

"We knew it would be difficult but it want to get near the play-offs it is games like these we have to start WINDING.

The inclusion of recent signing Kanyuka was a surprise but, with Jerel Ifil suspended, Malpas insists it was not a difficult decision.

He said: "We took a chance by throwing Pat Kanyuka in. The lad has hardly trained, he has only been at the club for a few days. We felt he was the right one to play and for an hour he was great.

"For the last half hour I don't think he knew where he was or what he was doing after getting a knock on the head but he was up and wanted to play on. A big credit to the boy

I don't think it was difficult but my only concern was how long he was going to last. He kept going though and we will wrap him in cotton



Two mins: Town started on the front foot and Moses Ashikodi raced clear onto Jon-Paul McGovern's through ball but could only drag his shot wide of the target, via a deflection

Three minutes: Skipper Hasney Aljofree hit a speculative 35-yard shot tamely wide while Lee Peacock flicked Roberts' left wing free kick agonisingly wide of goal.

13 mins: Luton's David Bell almost stole the lead against the run of play, shooting wide of the post after a powerful run.

16 mins: Another long-range Bell strike looked to have handed the hosts the lead, after Drew Talbot tapped home the rebound from Peter Brezovan's parry, but was belatedly flagged for offside.

23 mins: The lively Ashikodi should have handed Town the lead with just goalkeeper Dean Brill to beat from eight yards, but he leaned back and blazed wildy over the bar.

32 mins: Talbot looked certain to score from close range after an inviting Bell cross, but Miguel Comminges threw himself in to clear.

37 mins: Roberts made ground down the right and cut the ball across but Corr's attempted chip sailed harmlessly over the bar.

52 minutes - GOAL (Roberts): Jon-Paul McGovern cleverly switched play from right to left, with Christian Roberts easing past Alan Goodall as he ghosted into the area. The Welshman then cut inside Chris Perry before hammering the ball into the bottom corner past Brill.

56 minutes: Roberts again beat Goodall on the right before standing a cross up, which Peacock headed goalwards but it was easily blocked.

75 minutes: Struggling to get into the game, ex-Town man and Luton sub Sam Parkin's clever onetwo with Paul Furlong ended in the latter skewing his shot well wide.

81 minutes: Skipper Hasney Aljofree was taken off with a head injury, replaced by Andy Nicholas at left back with Jamie Vincent shuffled into the middle and despite having to play through an astonishing seven minutes of injury time, Town held out.
