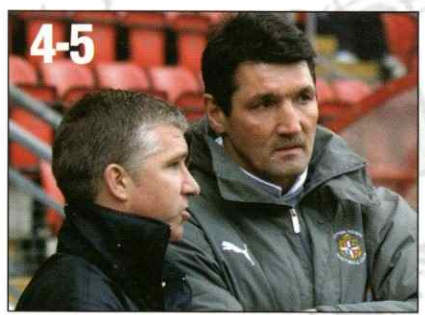

And we will be looking to put our performance against Bournemouth last week firmly behind us with a win today.

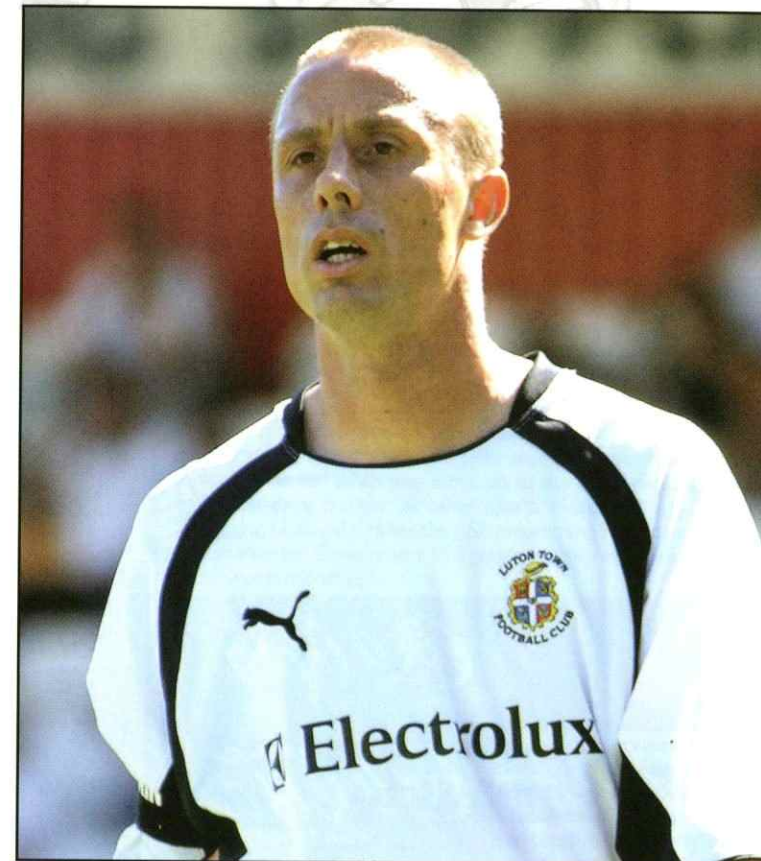
We may be short on numbers, but there can be no excuses for the manner in which we were beaten by Bournemouth.

Happy Birthday Eleanor

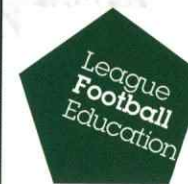
Luton Town Football Club would like to wish a special 85th Happy Birthday to Eleanor Bostock

England's Apprentice Week



Throughout the country and across a wide range of industries, Apprenticeships are gaining both importance and popularity as the Government seeks to raise the credibility, relevance and status of this type of qualification.

Funded by the Learning and Skills Council, League Football Education is a partnership between the Football League and the PFA.

LFE are currently responsible for the management of Apprenticeship in Sporting Excellence (ASE) programme across Football League clubs.

The ASE programme is specifically designed to support Apprentices in relation to their football development, however it is also there to provide them with transferable skills that will assist them within football, or as and when they move on to alternative careers. Now embraced by a number of other sports including Rugby Union, Swimming, Golf and Cricket the ASE programme has real value and importance for Government as a way of highlighting best practice within Apprenticeships.

By 2015 the Government is to change the education leaving age to 18 and they want a suitable apprenticeship place to be available for every young person by 2013. This will involve raising the number of Apprenticeships nationally from the current level of 180,000 to 400,000, something the ASE will play a strong part in.

The ASE scheme involves 16 to 18 year old footballers doing a football specific NVQ, a level 2 football coaching qualification, a college course related to sport and key skills in numeracy and literacy. This is all designed to compliment the technical development work being carried out by the football coaching staff to produce a skilled and educated youth group. The success of the scheme has already begun to prove positive. Last season 76% of Football League Apprentices achieved the full framework of qualifications whilst the majority of those remaining obtained elements of the programme.

ASE apprentices may go on to get professional contracts, play abroad, play semi-professional football, go to university/college or go directly in to alternative employment, but whatever route they take the Apprenticeship they have followed provides them with transferable skills for life.

For the Government to hit its targets it needs other Apprenticeships to be developed. Employers such as the National Trust, Royal Opera House and BT are alongside LFE helping change the image and relevance of Apprenticeships and bring them to the fore as a viable educational option. Cissy Harrowell

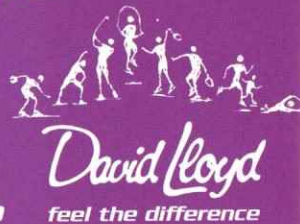

TODAY'S MATCHES

With a full programme of fixtures on Tuesday, the League One table has seen plenty of movement over the past week and it's the race for the play-offs which are being closely fought.

New LEEDS (7th) boss Gary McAllister is still searching for his first win and faces a massive task this afternoon as they travel to inform DONCASTER (2nd).

Sean O'Driscoll's side have been on an impressive run of losing just once in their last 11 games and not conceding a single goal in their last 360 minutes of football played.

It's that form that seen them open up a four point cushion over nearest automatic promotion rivals CARLISLE (3rd), who will be looking to rectify their atrocious away record against CREWE (18th)

Carlisle haven't won on the road since late October, a run of ten games and take on a Crewe side that gained an impressive away win at LEYTON ORIENT (8th) in

midweek.

But the Railwaymen haven't been in the best of forms themselves with their win against Orient being their first in the last eight.

Two teams with play-off ambitions go head-to-head when OLDHAM (12th) host YEOVIL (11th) at Boundary Park.

Oldham will need to turn around their home form if they are going to make a bid for promotion with only four wins all season.

They have however rediscovered their home form with back-to-back home wins although Yeovil are fresh from a 1-0 win over NORTHAMPTON (14th)

Yeovil themselves will need to get back to that winning mentality on the road having won once in their last seven games away from Huish Park

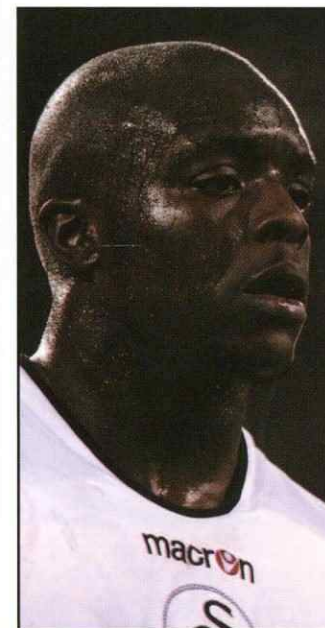
At the bottom end of the table it's a massive day for MILLWALL (20th) who lie just one place above the relegation zone and GILLINGHAM (21st) who slipped into the bottom four in midweek.

Both teams have tricky away games with Millwall travelling to inform TRANMERE (6th), who have only lost once in their last eight games at Prenton Park.

Gillingham make the trip to Northampton, who have rediscovered their goalscoring touch in front of goal with former SWANSEA (1st) striker Adebayo Akinfenwa scoring in the Cobblers last two games.

Today also sees bottom take on top with PORT VALE, who let a two goal lead slip in midweek to HARTLEPOOL, (17th) play Swansea.

Vale looked destined for relegation while Swansea have opened up an eight point gap at the top of the division.

In our continued looked at the backroom staff at Kenilworth Road, today we speak with Kit Man Stewart Bannister, who has enjoyed a colourful career starting at Slough Town and eventually moving onto Chelsea. Stewart speaks to today's matchday programme and talks about his career, characters within the game he has worked with and the difference between working at Luton and Chelsea.

Stewart, thanks for taking time out to talk to the matchday programme. First of all can you tell us a little bit about your career to date?

I started at Slough Town in 1981 and my first manager I worked under was David Kemp. It was a good place for me to start out at and I enjoyed my time there immensely. I also worked under Brian McDermott at Slough before I left to go to Chelsea. I then came to work here at Luton.

How did you get into the job?

Slough Town never had a kit man and when David Kemp was appointed he was their first proper manager and he wanted to do things in a professional way. I knew the physiotherapist really well at Slough and he put my name forward to David and things happened from there.

How did the opportunity to go to Chelsea come about?

When Gianluca Vialli took over at Chelsea he wanted his own staff in at the Club so the kit man at Stamford Bridge, who was doing the reserves and youth, was promoted to the first team and I was brought in to do his job. I was doing that job for about three years and then I had half a season

working directly under Claudio Ranieri before working under Jose Mourinho.

So you have worked under some very high profile people?

Yes I have. It was a good for me at Chelsea, but it's a job that you just get on with. You meet new people all the time doing this job and I was just happy to be given an opportunity to work at a big club like Chelsea.

What is a typical working week for you?

It's hard to talk about all the things you do because the job changes from week to week, depending on the football fixtures. Firstly I go to Kenilworth Road everyday to collect the training kit to take it to the training ground. I then lay it out and then come back to Kenilworth Road if any of the players need anything. I then go and pick the training kit up to be washed for the following morning. Obviously things change when you have a matchday, but there is a lot of travelling involved as well getting to and from games.

How did you end up coming to Luton?

I arrived here through John Carver. He phoned me up and I came down, had a look at the place and wanted to start straight away. It's a good place to work and



there are so many friendly people based at the Club. I was chauffeuring at the time for a company called First Class who were involved with the FA and I used to do the kit truck for a lot of the England games, including Germany, Russia and Israel.

What do you remember most about working within football?

It has to be when Chelsea won the Premiership the first time around and I was the first person out on the pitch. Jose wanted all the staff out for the presentation and it was a special moment for me to be the first person to walk out of the tunnel.

Who do you remember most from your time within football?

There has been so many people I have met from doing my job and so many people come across in

different ways. I am good friends with Carlo Cudicini and I still keep in contact with him. Steve Clarke is still a close friend of mine and I am still in contact with Boudewijn Zenden.

What are the major differences from working at Chelsea to someone like Luton?

I find at Luton that everyone is a bit more helpful and there is a more friendly atmosphere. The players here are more involved in taking care of their own equipment rather than, at the top level, where everything is done for them. When your at the top level at lot of the professionals expect things to be done for them but at Luton you all work together and it is a slightly different environment.

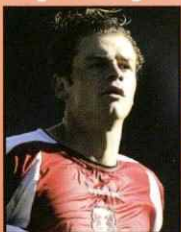
WELCOME TO LEYTON ORIENT

The LEYTON ORIENT Story

Beginnings: 1881

Leyton Orient's roots can be traced back to 1881 when members of the Glyn Cricket Club formed a football team for the purpose of keeping fit in the winter months. In 1888, on the suggestion of a player who worked for the Orient Shipping Line, the club took the name of Orient. The club changed its name in 1898 to Clapton Orient in order to try and gain support from the affluent residents of Clapton, London, whilst 1937 saw them move to their current home in Leyton. The end of World War II found Orient in financial trouble. A fighting fund was set up to alleviate these problems, and yet another name change followed, this time to Leyton Orient.

Top Player: Lockwood



Matthew Lockwood was signed by Leyton Orient from Bristol Rovers in 1998 where he became an integral part of the first team. In 2006, Lockwood was named as the 47th best player outside of the Premier League in a study by FourFourTwo magazine, which named him as the best player at left back and the fourth best player in League One.

Two, Lockwood was Leyton Orient's second leading goal scorer in the 2006-07 season, where he scored 11 goals despite playing at left-back all season. He was named in the PFA League One Team of the Year for 2006-7.

Top Manager: Bloomfield

After arriving as a player in 1968 from Plymouth Argyle, Jimmy Bloomfield became Orient's player-manager a year later, and won the Third Division title in his first season. His immediate success with the Londoners saw him move to Leicester City, who had just gained promotion to the top flight. For six years he kept the Foxes in the top flight before he returned to Orient in 1977. His second spell at the Club was also successful as it included a run to the FA Cup semi-finals in the 1977-78 season, where they were defeated by Arsenal. Bloomfield later became a coach at Luton, until his sudden death in 1983, from cancer at the age of 49.

Top Game:

Oxford United 2 - 3 Leyton Orient
League Two
May 6, 2006, Kassam Stadium

This game is probably still fresh in the minds of many Orient fans. A win would guarantee Orient promotion to League One, which would have ended an 11-year stay in the bottom division. Promotion was only secured in the final minutes of the final game of the season, away at Oxford United. With the score tied at 2-2 and Orient seemingly destined to miss out yet again on promotion, news came through of a late goal scored against promotion rivals Grimsby Town, that would potentially promote Orient. However, with the Orient fans were still celebrating this news, Lee Steele scored to confirm Orient's promotion and as a result consign Oxford to the Football League Conference.

After narrowly avoiding the drop last season, few Orient fans thought a promotion challenge was on the cards this time round.

Yet, despite Tuesday's home defeat to lowly Crewe making it five games without a win for the east-Londoners, Martin Ling's tenacious young side remain in eighth position and well-placed to re-launch a play-off push as the season draws to a close.

The club famously bought for a fiver in 1995 by boxing promoter Barry Hearn is now a combative force on the pitch, and, with former Hatter, Adam Boyd, leading their attack this afternoon, today's encounter should be a spicy contest.

Already a popular figure for his achievements as a player for Orient in the late 1990s, Ling took over at Brisbane Road in 2003, and secured promotion to League One three years later with a draw at Oxford United on the very last day of the season.

Orient's success - and Oxford's relegation on the same day - would have been particularly galling for the hosts given Ling is a former Swindon stalwart, and a member of Glen Hoddle's side that reached

the Premiership in 1993.

This promotion was the club's first in eleven years, and, after a difficult first season back in League One, Ling has now fashioned a compact, hard-working side that are strong in all areas of the pitch.

The spearhead of the team, however, is undoubtedly Boyd, who joined the O's on a free transfer from the Hatters last summer following a year of frustration at Town, where he notched two goals in 23 appearances.

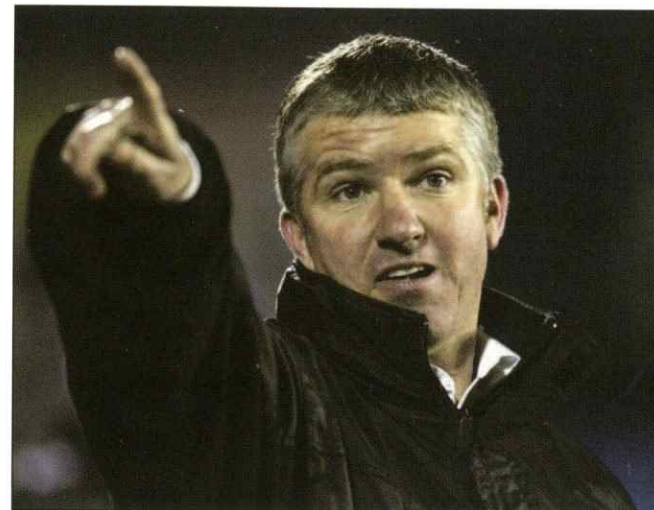

However, the striker has been in inspirational form for Orient this season and has quickly established himself as a

popular player amongst O's supporters.

Boyd, who scored for Orient when Luton were at Brisbane Road last month, has scored a further twelve in all competitions so far this term, meaning he will not be lacking in support from the O's faithful.

Boyd is normally supported up front by former Wimbledon striker, Wayne Gray, or long-standing Orient favourite, Jabo Ibehre. Fiery Tottenham forward, Andy Barcham, could also feature after extending his loan deal from White Hart Lane



until the end of the season.

In midfield, Paul Terry is notable for his tough-tackling displays as well as his famous younger sibling (namely Chelsea and England captain, John), whilst youngster Jason Demetriou's fine form has recently been rewarded with a new contract.

The captain, Stephen Purches, has been the mainstay of Orient's defence this season, but O's supporters will desperately be hoping Malawi-born centre-back, Tamika Mkandawire, has recovered from the injury sustained in the Crewe defeat. The former England semi-professional international

has been superb this term, and

Ling will be keen to have him back in the side as Orient search for their sixth away win of the season.

Orient, who currently lie two places outside the play-off spot, have largely relied on their home form this season, losing just four of their 16 games played at Brisbane Road.

It's their struggle on the road that has ultimately seen the O's slip outside the top six having not won their last seven away outings.

And despite the league difference between the two sides, Luton will undoubtedly start as favourites in this encounter as Orient have not won at Kenilworth Road since 1962 - a stretch of 15 games.

How has this season gone?

After struggling in the league last season, I think many Orient supporters were facing up to the prospect that we might be facing another struggle this time around. However, Martin Ling has done a fantastic job, with limited resources, to get us to where we are in League One at this time in the season. The start we made to the campaign was fantastic and Martin has built a squad which is certainly capable of finishing in the top six. It's going to be an interesting second half to the season, but I firmly believe we can do it.

What are Orient's aims this season?

We have enough in the squad to finish in the top six, but it might be a big ask when you compare the depth of our squad to some of the other teams which are currently in the top six. Our home form will be key because it has generally been good, so if we can keep that consistency then we will have a chance. It's very tight among the play-off places so it will probably go right down to the wire.

Who is your key signing?

Adam Boyd has been brilliant for us this season and if he can stay fit for the remainder of the season then that will certainly help our chances of finishing inside the top six. I was also pleased that the Club decided to sign Sam Oji because I think he will become a good player for us. We also brought in Wayne Gray over the summer and he has enjoyed a good season.

Who will be your star players?

Tamika Mkandawire, who came from Hereford in the summer, has for me been our best player this season. He has been a consistent member of our squad and has quickly become very popular amongst the fans.



Who will win the League One title?

I think Swansea are almost there and I believe Carlisle United will join them. Nottingham Forest looked strong when they played against us earlier in the season, but the big clubs seem to fall behind in the second half of the season. I hope we will be in the play-offs this season and if we can finish in the top six then I wouldn't rule ourselves out of promotion.



The Captain

Stephen 02 Purches

A versatile defender who became Orient's first summer arrival ahead of the 2007/08 season, putting pen-to-paper on a two-year deal. Stephen Purches joined Orient from Bournemouth, where he had played a major role in their League Two promotion campaign in 2002/03, scoring in their play-off final victory over Lincoln City. He continued to impress at Bournemouth as the Cherries established themselves back in League One and he was again a regular in the Cherries' team last season. He made a total of 273 appearances in Bournemouth colours, scoring 12 goals. Most comfortable at right back, former West Ham junior Purches can also operate further forward or on the left hand side.



Goalkeepers

Stuart Nelson

Former Brentford and Doncaster goalkeeper who was snapped up by boss Martin Ling following the departure of Glyn Garner in the summer. Began his career with non-league side Cirencester Town and also spent a short time in the United States.

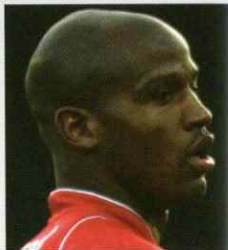
Glenn Morris

A promising goalkeeper who has proved himself to be a very able understudy to former goalkeeper Glyn Garner. He was the first choice goalkeeper in the 2003/04 season and won the Young Player of the Year award that year for the second successive season.

Defenders

Alton Thelwell

Former Tottenham defender who joined the O's on an initial loan in October 2006 as manager Martin Ling looked to solve the club's defensive problems. Began his career at the highest level with Tottenham Hotspur, he made several Premiership appearances during the 2000/01 season. He went to join Hull City and helped the Club win back-to-back promotions.



Tamika Mkandawire

Orient manager Martin Ling finally landed former Hereford United defender Tamika Mkandawire in June 2007 after a 12-month pursuit for his services. Started his career at West Bromwich Albion, but struggled to make the breakthrough at the Hawthorns and he moved to Hereford United on loan during the 2003/04 season to gain first team experience.

Adam Chambers

Adam Chambers signed a new two-and-a-half year deal in February 2007 after becoming an integral part of the O's team during the 2006/07 season. He had originally joined the club on a trial basis during the summer of 2006. Chambers, who can either play in the centre or on the right hand side of midfield, began his career with West Bromwich Albion before going on to Sheffield Wednesday and Kidderminster

Samuel Oji

Orient took this 22-year-old Birmingham City defender Sam Oji on loan from the St Andrews club at the end of August 2007. Oji began his career with Arsenal.

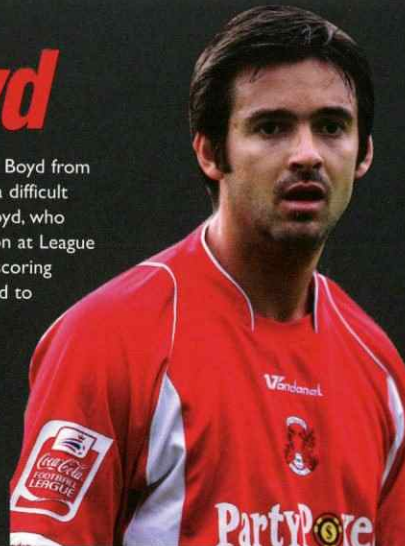
Jason Demetriou

An extremely versatile player who is capable of playing in central midfield as well as right back. Jason Demetriou has progressed through the youth and reserve teams.

Top Scorer

Adam 18 Boyd

Orient moved to sign Adam Boyd from Luton after the striker had a difficult spell at Kenilworth Road. Boyd, who possesses a deadly reputation at League One level following his goalscoring exploits for Hartlepool, failed to establish himself at Luton, but has found a new lease of life at Brisbane Road. He wasted little time in showing O's fans his talents, scoring a spectacular dipping volley against West Ham in his first match in Orient



colours, and then following it up with another friendly goal against Tottenham a week later. Boyd began his career with hometown club Hartlepool United, where he made 144 league appearances and scored 53 goals. He shot to prominence with 29 goals in the 2004/05 season and left for Championship football at Luton a year later.

Midfielders

John Melligan

Former Ireland U21 international John Melligan was one of several new arrivals at Brisbane Road prior to the 2007/08 season, opting to turn down the offer of a new contract at Cheltenham Town. Melligan began his career at Wolves before spending time at Bournemouth, Doncaster and Kidderminster



Sean Thornton

Former Sunderland midfielder who joined Orient on a two-year contract during the summer of 2007. Sean Thornton had just been released by Doncaster Rovers after two seasons with the Keepmoat Stadium club, before signing for Orient. Thornton began his career in English football as a youngster with Tranmere Rovers before earning a move to Sunderland.

Wayne Corden

Impressed sufficiently whilst on loan with the O's for the last six weeks of the 2005/06 season to earn a permanent move from Scunthorpe United. Wayne Corden started his career at Port Vale before moving to Mansfield and, following his spells at Scunthorpe and Chester, he has now racked up over 300 career appearances and scored more than 40 goals.

Paul Terry

A central midfielder, who signed for the O's in June 2007 after recovering from a cruciate ligament injury that cut short his 2006/07 season. Paul, the brother of England captain John, made his first senior appearances for Dagenham & Redbridge. He remained at Victoria road for four years, playing 130 games for the Daggers as they came close to promotion to the Football League. Paul moved to Yeovil Town in August 2003 as the Glovers made their debut in League Two, and he was a vital part of the team that won promotion the following year.



Strikers

Charlie Daniels

Tottenham youngster who joined Orient on a season-long loan on the eve of the 2007/08 campaign. Charlie is awaiting his full Tottenham debut, but he has league experience from a loan spell with Chesterfield at the back end of last season.



Wayne Gray

Martin Ling swooped to bring this popular striker back to his home city for an undisclosed fee from Yeovil Town in July 2007. The pacy and strong frontman spent a spell on loan with the O's during the 2001/02 season. Wayne Gray began his career at Wimbledon, where he made a total of 75 league appearances in the top two divisions. The striker enjoyed loan spells at Swindon, Port Vale and Brighton, as well as the O's, but it wasn't until a summer 2004 move to Southend that his career really took off. He bagged 22 goals in 98 appearances for the Shrimpers - of which 33 came as a sub - before moving to Yeovil last summer. A further 12 strikes followed, despite Gray spending much of his time at Huish Park on the right wing.

Andy Barcham

Tottenham youngster who joined Orient on loan from the White Hart Lane club in November 2007. Andy Barcham has one senior Spurs appearance to his name, in a Carling Cup victory over Port Vale last season. Barcham has been a regular in Tottenham's reserve side in recent years.

Jabo Ibehre

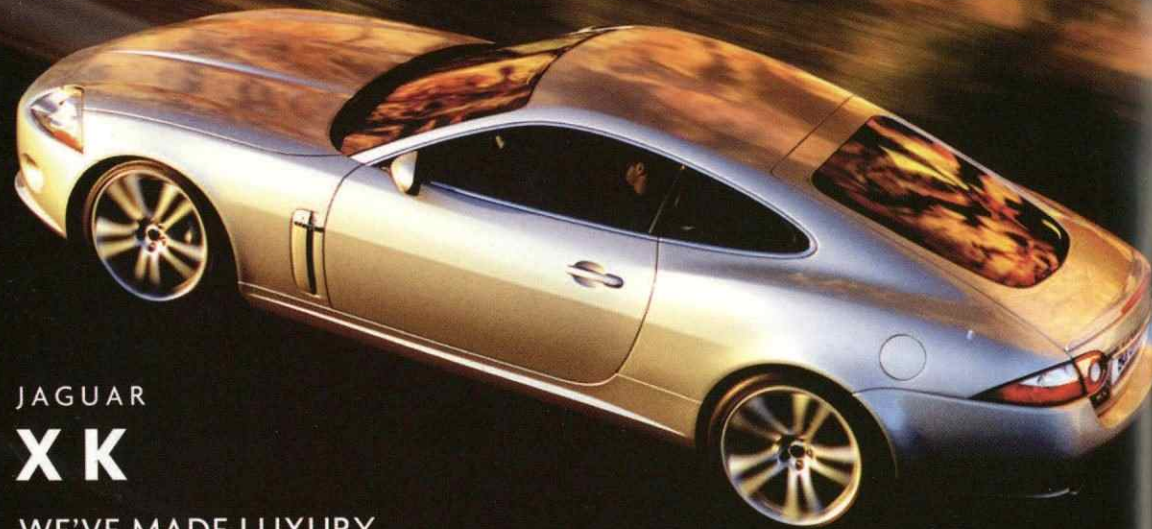
Jabo Ibehre endured another injury-hit campaign during 2006/07. He chipped in with eight goals during the 2005-06 season to finish as the club's joint second highest scorer, and the flamboyant striker was rewarded with a new two year contract.

Efe Echanomi

Husband proves the doubters wrong

John Aston (11) and Peter Anderson move in to congratulate hat-trick hero Jim Husband as the £70,000 striker finally showed Luton supporters what they had paid all that money for.

Husband had been signed from Division One side Everton in November 1973 and with his pedigree and goalscoring ability it was hoped that his experience would help the Town to promotion back to the top flight for the first time since 1960.

By his own admission, Husband had not done himself any favours when putting on seven pounds through over-eating out of boredom whilst being holed up in an hotel after joining the club. Since moving to proper digs though, his landlady had forced a strict and sensible diet on him leading to the ex-England under-23 international soon being back to his best fighting weight.

The home clash with Orient on 16th March 1973 had been eagerly

anticipated for weeks given that the Town were in second spot in the table with the 'O's one place behind.

A best of the season crowd of 17,045 turned up to see if the Hatters could put some daylight between themselves and third place as well as avenge a 0-2 defeat at Brisbane Road the previous October.

Turning in his best performance since moving from Merseyside, Husband ably supported by the livewire Barry Butlin were more than a handful for the Orient central defensive pairing of Phil Hoadley and Tom Walley. It was therefore no surprise when Husband jabbed home a clever lay-off from Butlin after six minutes but it was not in the script when Hoadley drove in the

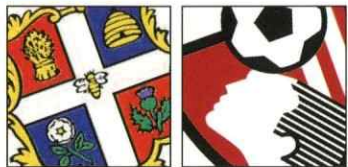
equaliser from outside the box ten minutes later.

The Town continued to have more of the play but could not convert their dominance into goals until Husband broke the deadlock with 15 minutes left when he rammed home Butlin's cross. The game was then made safe with ten minutes to go when Husband headed in his hat-trick goal from a John Ryan centre.

Although the Town subsequently made hard work of it, they did manage to win promotion back to the First Division with Orient narrowly missing out by finishing fourth in the days before play-offs.

Jim Husband weighed in with a further four vital goals as the season drew to a close to demonstrate to the Luton supporters that he had been worth the investment after all!

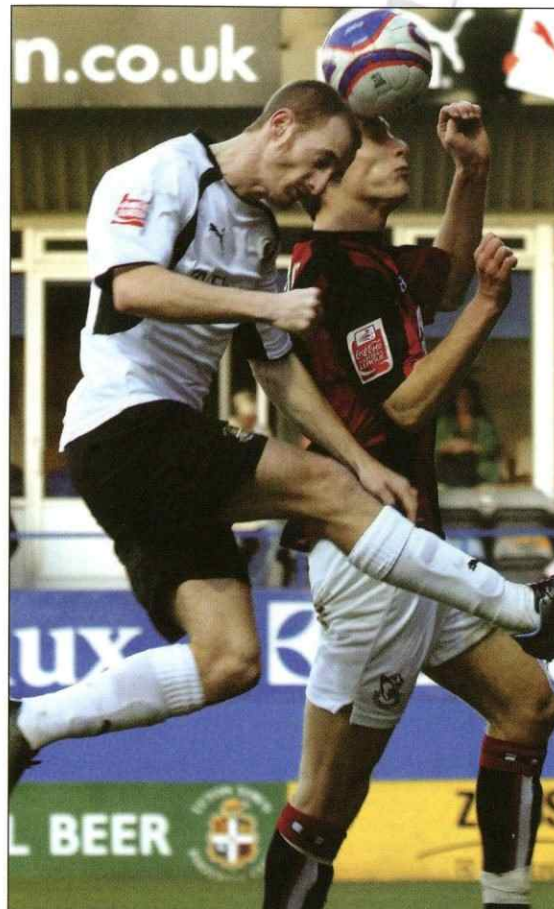

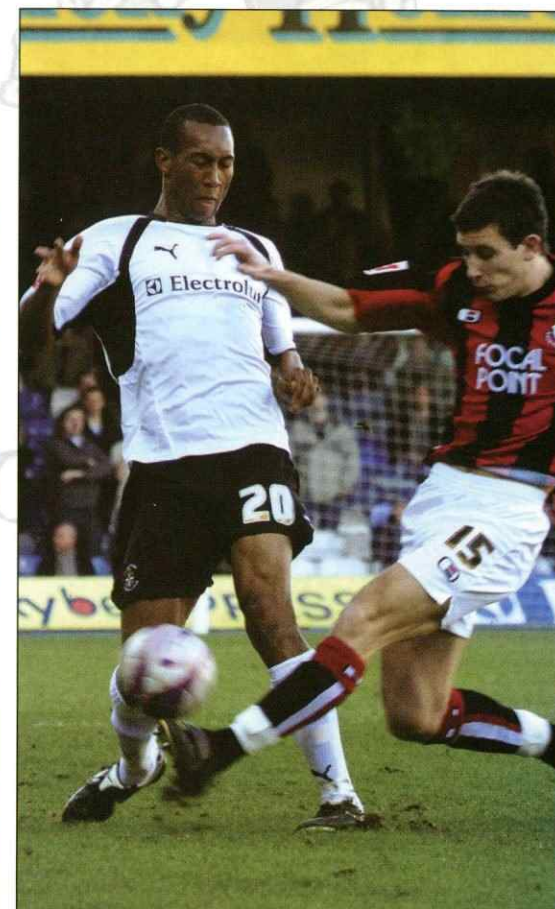
But it was 3-0 a minute before the break when Max Gradel latched on to Vokes' header down and gave Brill no chance with an instant 30-yard volley into the top corner.

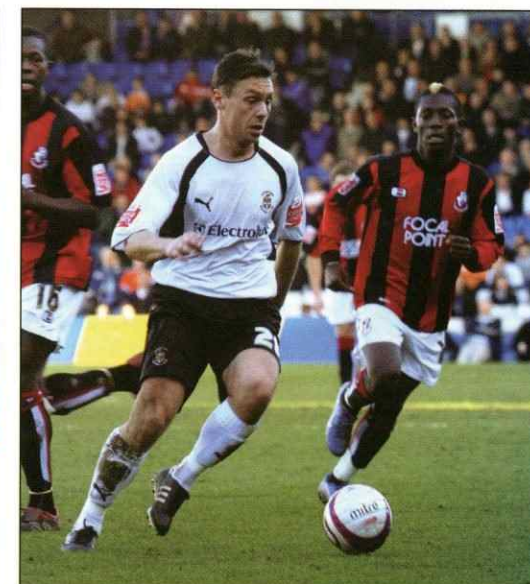

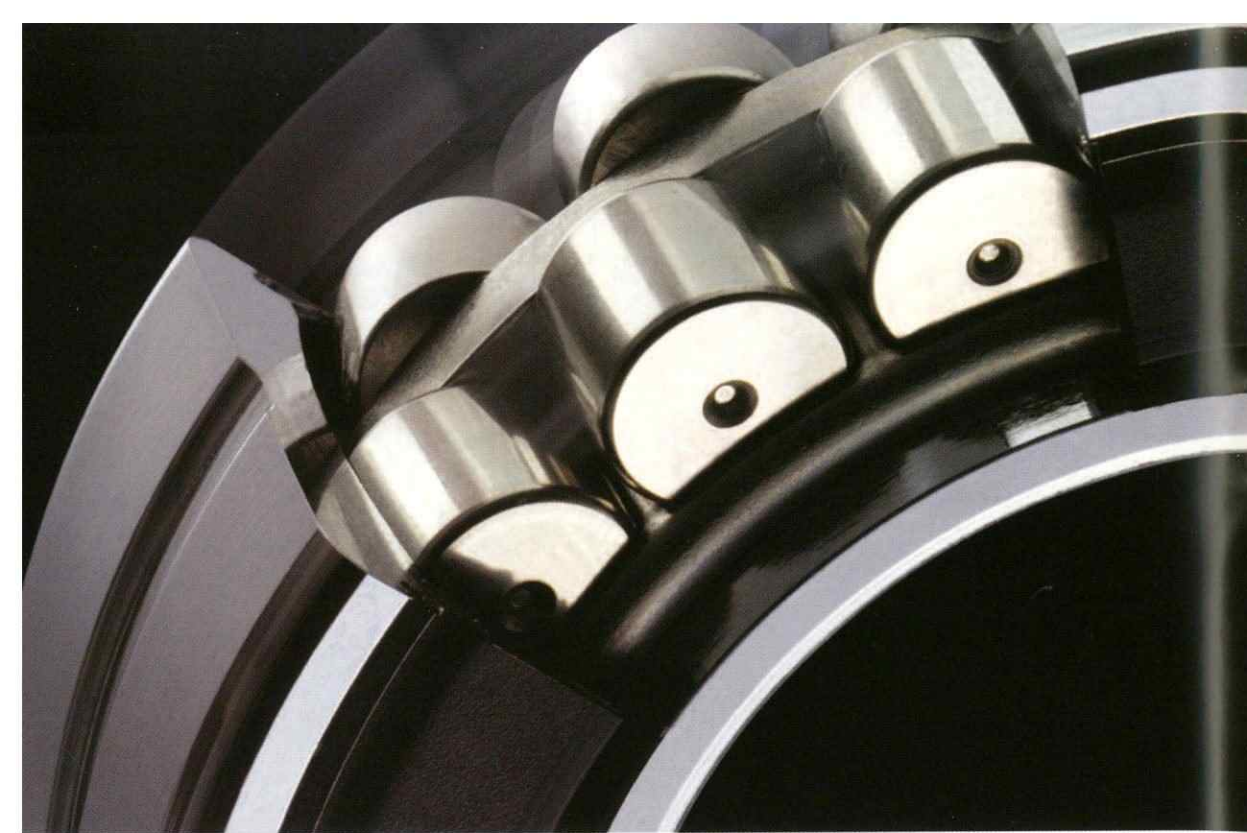

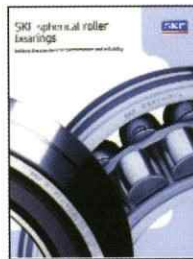

24 The number of league matches between the two sides at Kenilworth Road. The Hatters have 17 wins, with Orient winning five times, whilst there have been just two draws. Luton have netted 47 times whilst today's visitors have 24 goals, an exact goal per game ratio!

4 The biggest win for either side is by four goals! Clapton Orient, as they were known then, won 5-1 in January 1932 whilst the Hatters were 4-0 winners in September 1970. Alan Slough scored twice in the first half, and Malcom MacDonald netted a brace after the break.

5 The most number of goals scored by one player in this fixture. Willie Boyd scored eleven goals in just thirteen Luton appearances, and five of these came against Clapton Orient in a 5-3 win in December 1935! There has been one other hat-trick by a Luton player in this fixture, as Jimmy Husband netted all three in a 3-1 win in March 1974.

1 The sides have only met once before in February, and ironically it was the same weekend as this fixture, as they played on the 17th in 1934. Luton won 2-0 with goals from George Martin and Tommy Bell.

14 The current run of undefeated matches for the Hatters in this fixture. Orient's last win came in April 1962 when Bob Morton scored in a 3-1 defeat. Since then Luton have won 12 times, whilst the only draws have come in 1972/73 and 1976/77, the latter being the only game to end goal-less.

4 The number of consecutive home league games against Orient that Ricky Hill scored in! In March 1979 Orient took an early lead before Chris Turner equalised. Hill netted a superb goal with just a few minutes remaining to complete the comeback and give Luton maximum points. Just five months later and the sides met again, and once more Hill scored Luton's second in a 2-1 win, after Bob Hatton had opened the scoring. A year on and some things don't change as for the third season running Luton are victorious by the same scoreline, and yet again it's Hill who scores the decisive goal, even later in the game than he had in March 79! In 1981/82 and Luton keep a clean sheet in a 2-0 win, but yes it was Hill who scored the second! David Moss scored the opening goal from the spot after Brian Stein had been fouled.

2,174 The number of days since Leyton Orient's last visit to Kenilworth Road for a league match, when Luton won 3-0. The visitors had the better of the first half hour, but Chris Coyne opened the scoring for the Hatters after 36 minutes. Dean Crowe adds a second soon after the break and Luton are comfortably in control at this stage. Adrian Forbes completes the scoring to wrap up the victory. Luton finish the season as runners up with 97 points, whilst Leyton Orient finish 18th with 52.

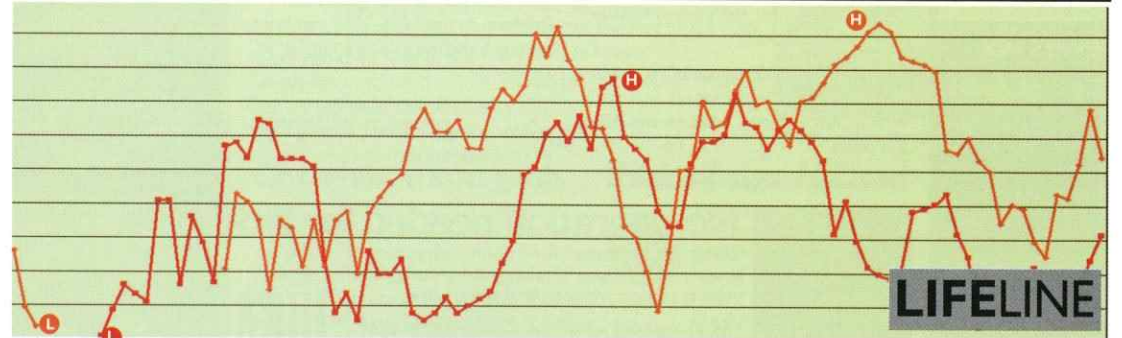
Each way movers

12 The number of players to have moved from Orient to Luton. Bill Fellowes, John Finlayson and Jimmy Yardley all made over 100 appearances for the Hatters after their moves in the 1920's and 30's, with Yardley falling just short of 100 goals in his time at Kenilworth Road. Of the six players in the last 70 years only Ahmet Brkovic has passed the same milestone for appearances. Ted Phillips made just ten appearances during the 1964/65 season before a move onto Colchester, whilst George Ramage made just seven the following season. Tony Grealish played in two seasons for Luton from 1979-81, making 86 appearances and scoring twice. Billy Jennings made just two substitute appearances in Luton's Championship winning season of 1981/82. Brkovic first featured in a promotion winning team as well, after his move in the summer of 2001. It was a double swoop for then manager Joe Kinnear in the summer of 2001 as Carl Griffiths also joined from Orient.

6 The number of players who have left Luton to join Orient. James Bradley moved after just five appearances in the 1920/21 season. Harry Higginbotham also featured during this season, and a further two more, making over 80 appearances and scoring 29 goals. Norman Thomson featured for Luton for two seasons before his transfer. Eddie Connolly had two spells at Luton after re-joining from West Brom in 1946. He made 90 appearances and scored 24 goals in total for Luton before his move to Orient in 1948. Murdoch Morrison made just one appearance in goal for Luton in 1946/47, and let in four goals at Barnsley, before his transfer. Adam Boyd is the most recent player to transfer between the Clubs. After a big money move from Hartlepool, Boyd scored just twice in 23 appearances last season.

out wide and is extra midfielder and forward cover to an injury hit squad.

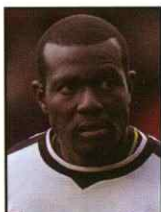
Bowditch played four games for Brighton in the 2006-2007 campaign, netting a memorable late winner at Bradford.

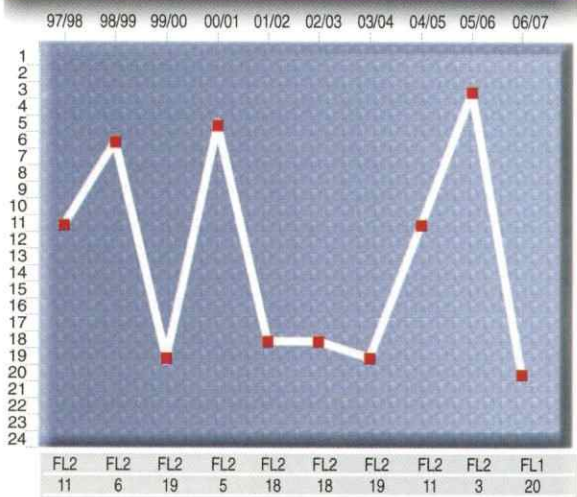

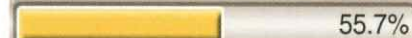

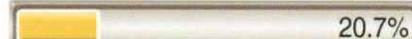

Luton Town v Charlton Athletic Football League Division One Saturday September 9 1989

I remember being about eight when my dad took me to my first football match. He took me down to Dunstable Town FC to watch them in action at Creasy Park against Leamington.

It didn't take long for football to be in my blood and I became a regular visitor to Dunstable, watching their games in front of a couple of hundred spectators getting used to the buzzing atmosphere.

Of course at that time I thought Dunstable Town were the team that could potentially win the FA Cup, so when my dad decided to take me down to Kenilworth Road for my first Luton game - it left me a little bewildered.

I have to be honest, I didn't really want to go. I remember Dunstable were playing away that weekend and I was more concerned about staying at home in front of the TV.

But I went to Kenilworth Road where Charlton were the visitors. Some of my family members are huge Charlton fans so it was a family occasion as we took our seats in the Main Stand.

At the time, many of my mates had travelled to watch Luton in their recent two Littlewoods Cup Final outings so when I got to the ground I began to feel the excitement - going to Dunstable already seemed a distant memory.

Earlier that season, Luton had held Liverpool to a 0-0 draw and had beaten Sheffield Wednesday 2-0 at Kenilworth Road so they had made a decent start to the season.

What I remember about the Charlton game was two things. The

size of the stadium struck me instantly. At Dunstable your free to move from one end of the pitch to the other - at Luton you had to remain seated.

The second thing that struck me was the atmosphere. Nearly 9,000 spectators were inside the ground that day, which was largely helped by a big travelling support from Charlton, who had gone unbeaten since the start of the season.

The game itself was settled when Danny Wilson struck the only goal of the game from the penalty spot after Roy Wegerle went down inside the area following a challenge from a Charlton defender.

It was a pretty scrappy game but for Luton it was their fourth consecutive clean sheet of the season and lifted them to seventh - their highest place in the division that season.

A month later, my dad took me back to Kenilworth Road to see my second game. It was a 7-4 win over Mansfield Town in the Littlewoods Cup. My third Luton game was a 4-1 victory over Norwich - by now I was completely hooked.

An interview with

GEORGE BEAVAN

When Mick Harford arrived back at Luton Town Football Club he was quick to point out that a major part of the Club's future lay within the youth structure.

It didn't take long for the Hatters boss to watch our youngsters in action when he observed the youth teams 2-0 win over Northampton Town recently, a number of players caught his attention.

For George Beavan a unique opportunity materialised during last week's match against Bournemouth when he was thrown straight in at the deep end, making his debut as an eleventh minute substitute for the injured Keith Keane.

It was an opportunity that may have come quicker than anticipated, but the 18-year-old defender turned in a solid performance at the heart of the Hatters defence.

Although the final result dampened his dream day, Beavan, who has been a consistent member of the youth team squad this season, thoroughly enjoyed his first team experience.

Speaking after the Bournemouth match, Beavan said: "The last couple of weeks I have been training really hard and trying to push into the first team squad.

"Mick Harford took me to one side recently and spoke to me about training with the first team and I managed to get a couple of reserve team games under my belt as well.

"I feel like I have been playing well for the reserves and the day before the Bournemouth game the squad list went up on the wall and I was lucky to see my name on it.

"I have had to take it in my stride and I am just concentrating on working hard and taking it from there."

With the nerves unsurprisingly running through Beavan's system, the defender showed great maturity beyond his age to turn in a

Man of the Match performance against the Cherries.

He continued to keep plugging away despite Bournemouth taking a two goal lead just moments after replacing the injured Keane.

He added: "The only thing that was going through my mind at that point was to stay positive and to put what had just happened to the back of my mind.

"You have to drive on and keep going all the way. I want to take this opportunity with both hands and I

really enjoyed every moment being out on the pitch.

"I was nervous just sitting on the bench. But that is part and parcel of being a young footballer – I think everyone goes through it once in their career.

"Obviously when I saw Keith Keane was going to come off I got the signal from the bench to go and warm up and obviously the nerves started to increase.

"The gaffer just spoke to me and told me to treat it as a normal game, as though it was any other match.

"I have to say the gaffer has really helped me since he has come in at the Club. He has been really helpful and I think he wants to give the youngsters a chance.

"The experienced pros have also been brilliant towards me. They have helped me develop my game and they speak to me in a really constructive way."

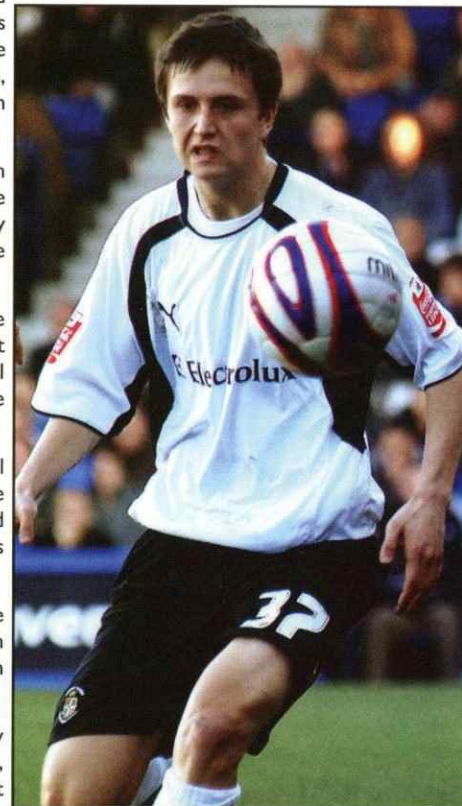
And Beavan admits that his debut has fulfilled one of his early career ambitions and hopes he can continue to play a part in the remainder of Luton's season.

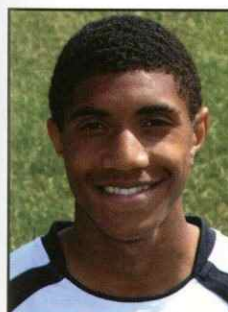

Charles double keeps Luton on winning track

Luton kept up the pressure at the top of the Youth Alliance Division with an impressive win over Brighton.

Goals in each half from promising striker Ryan Charles fired Luton to a comfortable victory and leaves them just six points behind league-leaders QPR.

He said: "It was a decent and positive performance from the boys. We were desperate to get a game under our belt after all the bad weather we had been experiencing.

"It was a match we were very comfort-

able in and it could have easily been five-nil at half-time but we didn't take our chances.

"Their lad in goal made some good saves, but there was also some poor finishing on our part which was disappointing.

"We just need that bit of extra quality in and around the box, but overall I thought our general level of play was excellent."

The Hatters still have their sights of finishing top of the table come the end of the season, and Cummins is hoping for a strong finish to the season.

He added: "It's all about developing players to play in the First Team at youth level, but winning games does a lot for confidence.

"It will be a big ask to catch QPR, but we are playing some good football and we will never give up chasing the title."

Imre VARADI

The product of a Hungarian refugee father and an Italian mother, Imre was born in Paddington but brought up in a charitable institution. Turned down by various League clubs, he joined Letchworth and was training at Luton two evenings a week when he was invited to Sheffield United by ex-Hatters manager Harry Haslam.

This was the start of a long footballing career that took the quick and deadly striker to 12 Football League clubs and seven non-League before he finally finished playing just short of his 40th birthday.

Scoring goals wherever he went, Imre had a brief spell on loan at David Pleat's Luton in March 1992 and scored on his debut in a 2-1 home win over Wimbledon.

Imre now lives in Sheffield and is a players agent.

Rowan Lewis VINE

Born in Basingstoke, Rowan joined Portsmouth from school but found it hard to win a regular place at Fratton Park leading to season long loans at Brentford and Colchester before moving to Luton on a similar basis in August 2004.

Virtually ever present as the Hatters won the championship of League One in 2004/05 the fleet footed and unselfish striker weighed in with some vital goals leading to him signing permanently.

When his strike partner Steve Howard was sold in 2006, Rowan blossomed as a striker in his own right which alerted scouts and led to the inevitable big bid from Birmingham in January 2007 which was accepted much to the disappointment of the Luton supporters.

Rowan is now starring for QPR following his recent move to West London.

Johnny Pederson VISTRUP

Johnny had played 150 games for Danish top division side Lyngby, helping them to two titles, when Luton manager Terry Westley was alerted to his availability.

Despite competition from Premiership clubs, Westley got his man for £205,000 in September 1995. A goalscoring midfielder with the reputation of having the hardest shot in Danish football, Johnny failed to enhance his reputation at Kenilworth Road, albeit in a poor Luton side destined for relegation.

A change of manager saw him out of favour and after six months he was back in Denmark with AGF of Aarhus, initially on loan, who he immediately helped to the Danish Cup final earning rave reviews along the way!

Johnny now owns a massage and acupuncture clinic in Copenhagen.

Gary Patrick WADDOCK

After joining QPR as an apprentice Gary went on to make over 200 League appearances for the West London club and becoming a crowd favourite for his hard work and tough tackling as a defensive midfield player.

It all came to a grinding halt in November 1985 when Gary received a career threatening injury leading to insurance money being paid out. Gary refused to accept the medical diagnosis and fought back to fitness although had to play his football for Charleroi in Belgium while the insurance problem was sorted out.

Back in this country, Gary enjoyed spells at Millwall and Bristol Rovers before joining Luton in September 1994 and eventually becoming club captain following many superb displays where he led by example.

When Gary eventually hung up his boots he returned to QPR as academy coach which led to him taking over the manager's job in 2006 albeit short-lived. Gary is now in charge of Conference leaders Aldershot.

Robin Keith WAINWRIGHT

Local boy Robin signed for Luton as a professional in December 1968 having joined the apprentice ranks a year before.

A skilful midfielder with a languid style, Robin made his League debut while on loan at Cambridge in March 1971 but had to wait until the following campaign before making his first start for the Hatters in a home clash with Preston in Division Two.

Robin went on to make 16 appearances that season but found himself out of favour under new manager Harry Haslam and so moved to Millwall, where he was again in the reserves, and finally to Northampton.

After finishing with League football, Robin played for John Moore's Dunstable and Barry Fry's Hillingdon before spending many years at Wealdstone who awarded him a testimonial against Luton in 1985.

Robin works for Active Luton.

Harold (Harry) Bertram WALDEN

Fast and clever winger Harry came to the attention of Luton when he was starring for Southern League club Kettering Town. After signing for the Hatters in January 1961 he was thrust into the first team almost immediately and was a revelation in a 1-2 defeat at Norwich but an elbow injury then cut back his appearances over the remainder of that season.

Harry was back with a bang in 1961/62 and was regarded as the Town's regular right winger with this form following into the next campaign when many said that a bad injury suffered by the flanker in March 1963 was a major contributing factor to the Hatter's relegation from Division Two.

Harry moved on to Northampton in 1964 in exchange for Billy Hails plus £3,000 and helped the Cobblers into the top flight a year later.

After finishing his career back at Kettering, Harry became a school caretaker in Northampton and is now semi-retired basking in the knowledge that he still has an unofficial fan club at Kenilworth Road!

Dennis George WALKER

Spennymoor born Dennis was picked up by West Ham as a youngster and after serving his apprenticeship signed professional forms in May 1966.

After failing to make the breakthrough at Upton Park, Dennis was released a year later and signed a short term contract at Luton just as the Hatters were about to embark on their record breaking Division Four championship winning campaign.

Dennis' twelve minutes of fame came during the Town's first home game of the season, against Barnsley, when he replaced injured full-back Fred Jardine but was not tested as the Hatters ran out comfortable winners.

Dennis moved on to Stevenage Town, Cambridge City, Dunstable, Corby and Lockheed Leamington in a long career in non-League and was, for a time, manager of Rothwell Town.

William Horace (Horace) WALLBANKS

Horace came from a footballing family with four of his brothers turning out in the Football League at one time or another.

Starting off his own career with Northfleet, the Tottenham nursery team, he moved on to Carlisle as war broke out and then guested for Aberdeen, Luton and Grimsby before signing permanently for the Mariners in 1946.

In need of a right winger, Luton remembered their war-time guest player and signed Horace in May 1947 just in time for him to play, and score, in the final day 6-3 win over Newport.

Horace could not repeat that feat and made only three League appearances in 1947/48 before signing for Weymouth. Horace finished his career at Bedford and then settled in Hull.

Paul Anthony WALSH

Plumstead born Paul joined Charlton from school and was only 17 when he became the youngest player to net a hat-trick for the Addicks in a senior game.

Hard-up Charlton were forced to accept a £250,000 bid, plus Steve White, from top flight new boys Luton in 1982 and the seriously talented forward soon became a terrace hero at Kenilworth Road with his twisting runs, close control and goalscoring ability.

Sadly, a bid of £700,000 from Liverpool was accepted for the, by now, England international in 1984 and he went on to grace Anfield for almost four years during which time he picked up a League championship medal. Moving on to Tottenham where he won an FA Cup winners medal, he then signed twice for Portsmouth with a spell at Manchester City sandwiched in between.

Paul's playing career ended with a knee injury in 1996 and he is now a pundit on Sky TV.

Peter WALSH

Signed by Luton from Dundalk in August 1949, after appearing against the Hatters in a friendly the previous year, Peter came to Kenilworth Road with a sound reputation as a centre-forward who knew where the goal was.

After being carefully nurtured in the Hatter's reserve side, Dublin born Peter made a dream League debut, alongside another debutant George Stobbart, when he scored the only goal of the game in a Division Two home clash with Leicester in October 1949.

Keeping his place, the quick striker seemed set fair for a long Luton career but lost his place following a 0-3 home defeat at the hands of Hull six weeks later.

At the end of that season Peter drifted off to Brighton, where he failed to win a first team place, before finishing his career at Hastings United and then returning to his home city of Dublin.

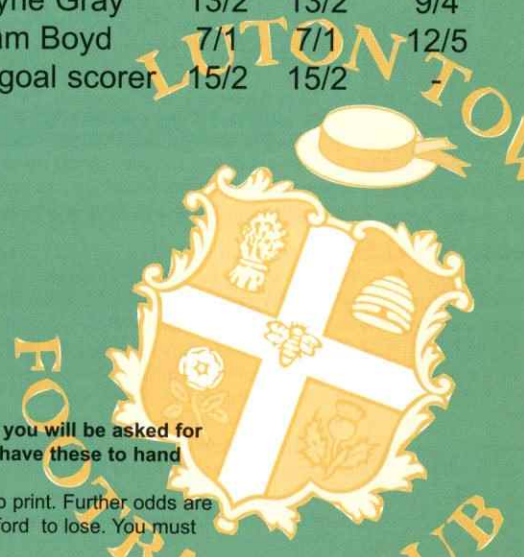

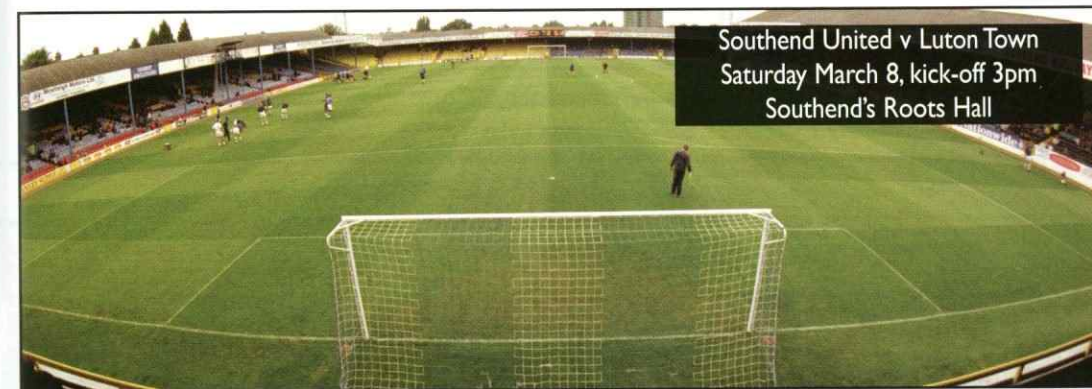

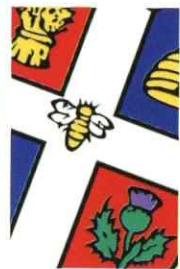

It looks as if another 'six pointer' is soon around the corner as Millwall are the next opponents at Kenilworth Road in a rearranged fixture.

Millwall look as though they will come to town with a less-than-impressive recent form which has seen them slip into the bottom half of the table.

With only one win in their first 10 matches, manager Willie Donachie was sacked with Richard Shaw taking over temporarily.

On November 6, Manchester City reserve team coach Kenny Jackett took the reins at the New Den, charged with stabilising the club and moving them up the table.

Jackett had mixed fortunes in his first two games in charge. First he saw his side come from behind to beat 10-man Altrincham 2-1 in the FA Cup. Then they led at Bristol Rovers for 70 minutes before conceding two late goals to give Rovers their first home win of the season.

Since then he has suffered a pattern of inconsistent results which has resulted in the Lions unable to break away from the relegation threatened pack.

The last couple of years at the Den have been turbulent both on and off the pitch, with changes in management as well as a plethora of new signings and loan deals to strengthen their squad.

Times were already tough for the Lions on their last visit to Kenilworth Road back in August 2005 when Luton beat the Londoners 2-1, with goals from Warren Feeney and Curtis Davies. Millwall won a tough and competitive return fixture by the same margin.

Jackett made some changes in the January transfer window, bringing six new faces to the Dell including former Hatter Ahmet Brkovic and former QPR defender Marcus Bignot.

The on-form player for goals at the moment is defender Alan Dunne. The Republic of Ireland man had a frustrating time at the start of his career at Millwall with recurring ankle injuries, but has blossomed into a capable and solid player since.

Andy Frampton commands the midfield for the Lions after signing in the summer from Brentford whilst striker Gary Alexander leads the way in terms of goals with seven for the season.

Jackett certainly has enough strength within the squad to pull the Lions out of trouble and keep the Club out of the third tier of English football.
