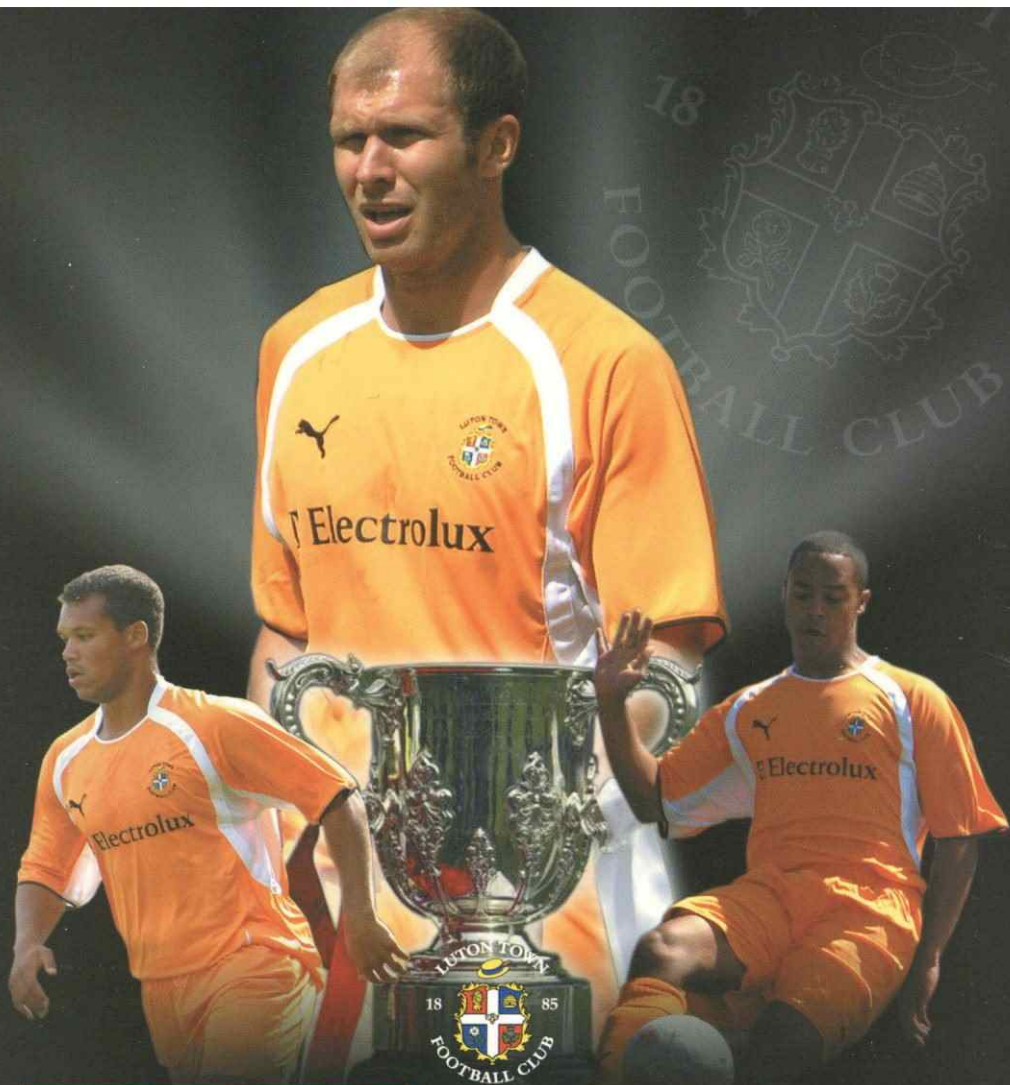

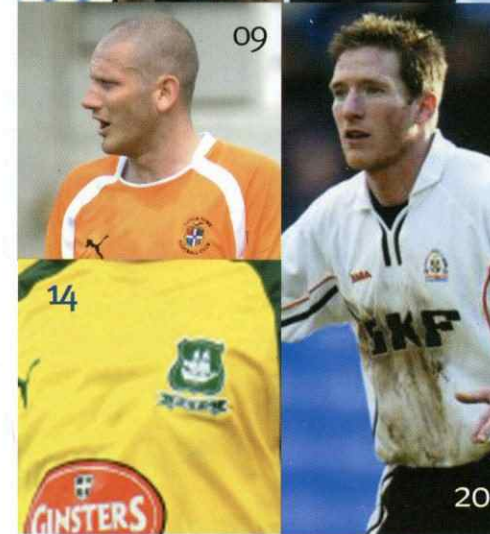

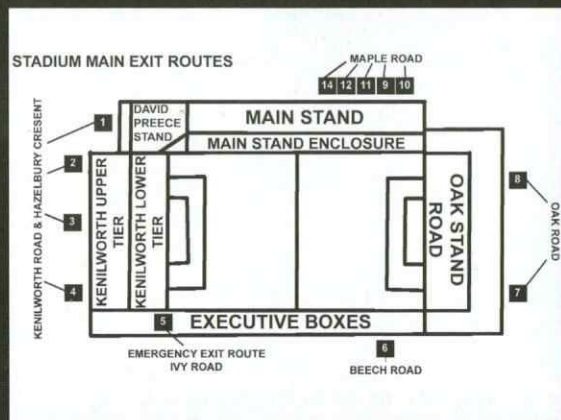

In the event of any emergency in the stadium, Luton Town FC and the emergency services have agreed on an evacuation procedure which is designed to ensure the safe and controlled evacuation from the area, to allow the emergency services to carry out their tasks.

In the event of an evacuation from all or part of the stadium, you will receive instructions over the public address system on how you should leave. In an evacuation of the main stand you will be instructed to use the pitch. Stewards will direct you to the nearest exit. It may be that your normal exit route will not be available.

On leaving the stadium, you will find some roads closed to pedestrians, to enable swift and unobstructed access for the emergency services. Please leave the area of the ground as quickly as possible, by the route directed. Your co-operation will be much appreciated.

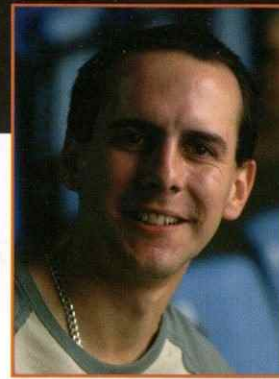

Simon Pitts looks back at previous League Cup encounters

second competitive match to be played on this date at Kenilworth Road. The other was a league match in 2000 when, in Ricky Hill's first game in charge, the visitors Notts County, were 1-0 winners.

after Emmerson Boyce had scored an own goal, and the win was wrapped up with goals from Courtney Pitt and Steve Howard.

Luton have only entertained 1 Plymouth Argyle once previously in this

competition. Steve Claridge opened the scoring in the second round match in 1992 before the visitors took the lead. Claridge equalised with just ten minutes remaining. Plymouth were in control in the second leg when they took a 3-0 lead. Steve Claridge netted again just past the hour, and David Preece scored to make it 3-2 but the Hatters couldn't find the net again in the final 22 minutes.

1 There has only been one goal-less draw in the League Cup 1st Round when Luton have been the home side, and this was against Peterborough United in a 1st Leg match in 2000.

4 The most number of goals scored in a 1st Round tie by Luton and it was back in 2003 when Yeovil were the visitors. Kevin Foley opened the scoring with his first goal for the Club. Tony Thorpe restored the lead

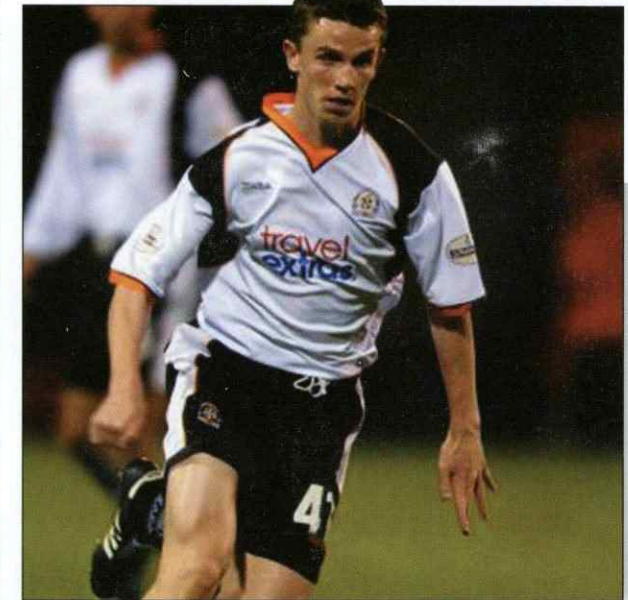
14 The number of first round League Cup matches previously played at Kenilworth Road, nine of these matches were when it was a "two-legged" round, whilst Luton are unbeaten in the other five matches, winning three and drawing two.

20 The number of goals scored at Kenilworth Road in the fourteen 1st Round matches, although in fact these goals came in just eleven matches as the Hatters have failed to score in three of the encounters.

20,167 The biggest attendance for a 1st Round fixture, and it came against Watford in August 1968. The Hatters won 3-0 courtesy of a brace from Mike Harrison and a goal from Brian Lewis.

3 The number of penalties scored, two of these were by Graham Alexander in the 1st Leg match against Oxford United in 1998, that the visitors won 3-2. The other was by Tony Thorpe when the Hatters beat Bristol Rovers 3-0, also in a 1st Leg match, in 1996. Kim Grant and David Oldfield were the other scorers that night.

5 It's exactly 5 years to the day since Luton last played a 1st Round match at Kenilworth Road, when they beat Yeovil Town 4-1. Incidentally that was only the

Welcome to this evenings visitors

In an age of free-falling football clubs, today's visitors can certainly claim to be bucking the trend. Since the Millennium, no other team in the country can match the consistent upward trajectory of Plymouth Argyle, who have improved their league position year-on-year and are now an established force in the Coca Cola Championship under manager Paul Sturrock.

Sturrock is in his second spell at Argyle and holds near folk-hero status among Pilgrims fans. He first arrived at Home Park in 2000 when the club were languishing near the bottom of Division Three and in real danger of dropping out of the League, but the former St Johnstone and Dundee United boss turned things around spectacularly, taking his side to the brink of the Championship before accepting an offer to manage Southampton in March 2004.

Although the Pilgrims did go up that year, the promotion had a slightly bitter-sweet taste for many fans, who were desperately disappointed at Sturrock's departure. His successor, Bobby Williamson, managed to keep Plymouth up the following season, but never quite won over the supporters and was eventually



The Ground: Home Park

The original ground of the professional club at Home Park, was destroyed by German bombers during The Blitz on Plymouth in World War II. Having been rebuilt after the war, Home Park was largely demolished as part of an extensive process of renovation, and the first phase of a new stadium built by Barrs plc was completed in May 2002.

The new Devonport End was opened for the 2001 Boxing Day fixture with Torquay United. The other end, the Barn Park End opened on the same day. The Lyndhurst stand reopened on 26 January 2002 for the game against Oxford United.

Plans are currently under discussion regarding the completion of the refurbishment of the ground with the replacement of the Mayflower stand.

The club is situated in Central Park, very near to the residential area of Peverell. Towards the end of the 2005/06 English Coca-Cola Championship season the club decided to buy the stadium for £2.7 million from Plymouth City Council, releasing the ground from a 125-year lease. This purchase was concluded in December 2006.

In the summer of 2007, Argyle's failure to persuade the UK authorities of the case for retaining a standing terrace decided to add 3,500 temporary seats to the Mayflower enclosure. This is likely to drop the capacity to just under 20,000 from the previous 20,922 (an exact figure is not yet available) for the 2007/08 season.

Away from Home Park, in the 2004/5 the Argyle fanbase, known as the Green Army, were voted as being the best away fans in the Football League, due to both the numbers travelling and the distance that Argyle's geographical isolation necessitates.



replaced by Tony Pulis after a run of six straight defeats. Despite a successful stint at the helm, Pulis had his head turned by former club Stoke and decided to return to the Potteries, leaving ex-QPR boss Ian Holloway to take up the reins in June 2006.

Holloway guided the club to a very creditable 11th place in his second season, but his decision to move to Leicester in November last year left the door open for a near-messianic return by Sturrock, who was at the time managing Swindon after his spells at St Mary's and subsequently Sheffield Wednesday failed to live up to expectations. The reunion has so far proved successful, with the Pilgrims finishing in tenth last season.

Sturrock, who recently revealed that he is suffering from a mild form of Parkinson's Disease, has instilled a neat and efficient style of football at Home Park, and tonight's cup clash will give manager and fans alike the chance to see how well summer signings Simon Walton, Karl Duguid and Jason Puncheon blend into the system ahead of another gruelling Championship campaign.

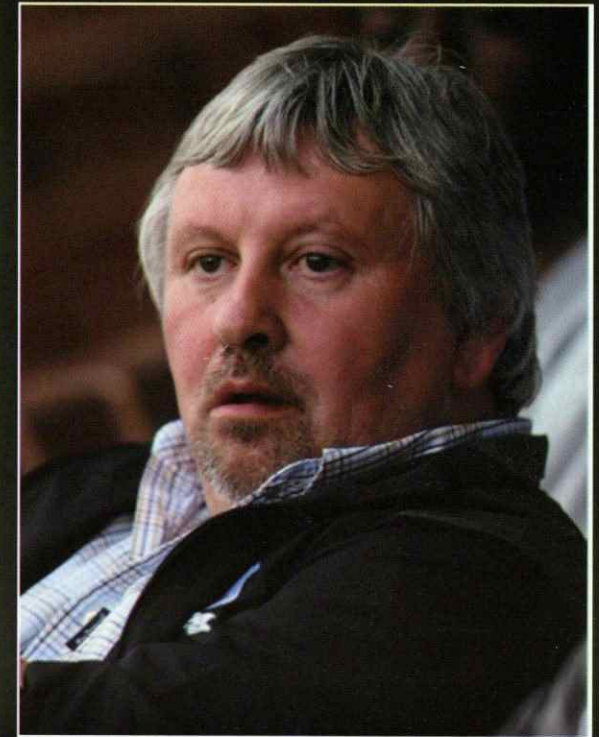
Paul Whitehead Sturrock (born 10 October 1956 in Ellon, Aberdeenshire, Scotland) is a Scottish football manager.

He currently manages English club Plymouth Argyle and formerly managed Sheffield Wednesday, Southampton, Plymouth Argyle, Dundee United, Swindon and St Johnstone.

He was also a Scotland international footballer.

He is known by fans as Luggy (from the Scots language word lugs, Eng: ears).

Sturrock announced in July 2008 that he was suffering from a mild form of Parkinson's disease.

1. ROMAIN LARRIERU

Goalkeeper Romain Larrieu arrived at Home Park in 2000 on a short-term contract from French side Montpellier and is now their longest-serving player. Romain is a veteran of both the 2001-02 Third Division and the 2003-04 Second Division championship-winning teams and has shared the goalkeeping duties with Luke McCormick for the last eight years. Unfortunately, ill-health ruled Larrieu out for the rest of the season but he has since recovered and will be looking to secure his place between the sticks for the 2008-09 season.

2. KARL DUGUID

Experienced and versatile, Karl Duguid ended a 14-year association with Colchester United to become Luggy's second summer signing in June 2008. The former U's captain signed for an undisclosed fee in a deal that will keep him at the club until 2010.

3. JIM PATERSON

The versatile Jim Paterson joined Argyle in January 2008 from Motherwell having spent over four years at Fir Park, making more than 120 appearances for the Scottish club.

4. SIMON WALTON

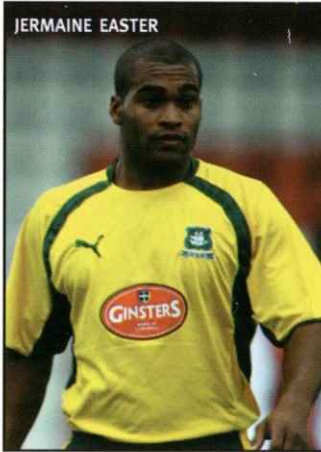
Tenacious midfielder Simon Walton signed for a club-record fee just days before the 2008-09 Championship season kick-off.

5. KRIZTIÁN TIMÁR

Player of the Season in his first full campaign for Argyle, Kriztián Timár, arrived at Home Park in January 2007 on a short-term loan deal from Hungarian side Ferencváros. The deal soon became permanent when he signed for £100,000 the following summer.

6. CHRIS CLARK

Chris Clark was another Scotsman to join in January 2008, after leaving his hometown club, Aberdeen.



JERMAINE EASTER

9. STEVE MACLEAN

The final part of the Scottish tr to arrive in January 2008, Steve MacLean, is a strong striker with a proven record in front of goal. He became Argyle's record signing when he joined from Championship rivals Cardiff City for £500,000.

10. JERMAINE EASTER

Welsh international Jermaine Easter initially joined Argyle on loan from Wycombe in October 2007 before making the deal permanent the following January.

13. MATHIAS KOUO-DOUMBE

French defender Mathias Doumbe will begin the 2008-09 season as Argyle's longest serving outfield player.

14. RORY FALLON

Kiwi striker Rory Fallon arrived at Home Park in January 2007 from Swansea for a then record fee of £300,000. The 6ft 2in front-man is strong in the air and possesses great quality at his feet.



STEVE MACLEAN

The adaptable midfielder signed a three-and-a-half year contact with Argyle after completing the £200,000 switch. Clark had spent his entire career with the Dons before making the move to Home Park and made over 230 appearances.

7. JASON PUNCHEON

Attacking midfielder Jason Punccheon signed for Argyle from Barnet for £250,000 in June 2007.

8. YOANN FOLLY

Yoann Folly was yet another January 2008 arrival, joining from Sheffield Wednesday to link up with Paul Sturrock for the third time in his career.

16. DAVID MCNAMEE

The versatile Scottish defender signed a two-year deal in summer 2008 after deciding not to renew his contract with Argyle's Championship rivals Coventry City.

18. GARY SAWYER

Gary Sawyer is a young and energetic defender who is comfortable at both centre-back and left -back. He won Argyle's Young Player of the Season award in 2007.

19. MARCEL SEIP

Dutch defender Marcel Seip arrived at Argyle in 2006 after being realised by Dutch club Heerenveen. The tough-tackling centre back is renowned for his expert reading of the game and awareness of the danger around him.

20. LUKE SUMMERFIELD

Son of Assistant Manager, Kevin, Luke Summerfield progressed through the Argyle youth set-up to become a regular member of the first-team in 2007-08 season.

21. GRAHAM STACK

Goalkeeper Graham Stack joined Argyle in July 2008 after being released by Berkshire side Reading. The 6'2" custodian began his career at North London giants Arsenal and featured in their run to the League Cup semi-final in 2003-04.

25. JAMIE MACKIE

Enthusiastic striker Jamie Mackie set a club record by scoring just 11 seconds into his Argyle debut. Signed from Westcountry rivals Exeter City in January 2008, Mackie is blessed with fantastic pace and determination. Having won the Blue Square Premiership Player of the Month for December, Mackie chose Argyle over a host of other suitors including Norwich City, Bristol City and Bristol Rovers.

26. YANNICK BOLASIE

Yannick Bolasie joined Argyle in summer 2008 after a successful trial. Bolasie, 19, was offered the chance to sign for Austrian First Division club Sturm Graz, as well

27. LLOYD SAXTON

Young goalkeeper Lloyd Saxton is another product of Argyle's ever-evolving Centre of Excellence. The Cheshire born shot-stopper attended the Bolton, Liverpool and Stoke City Academies as a school boy before signing apprentice forms for us in September 2006.

28. SHANE WHITE

Teenager Shane White signed professional terms with the Pilgrims in July 2008. The young centre-half was awarded the Young Player of the Year award, having captained the Argyle Youth cup side to a very respectable quarter-final last season.

29. DAMIEN MCCRORY

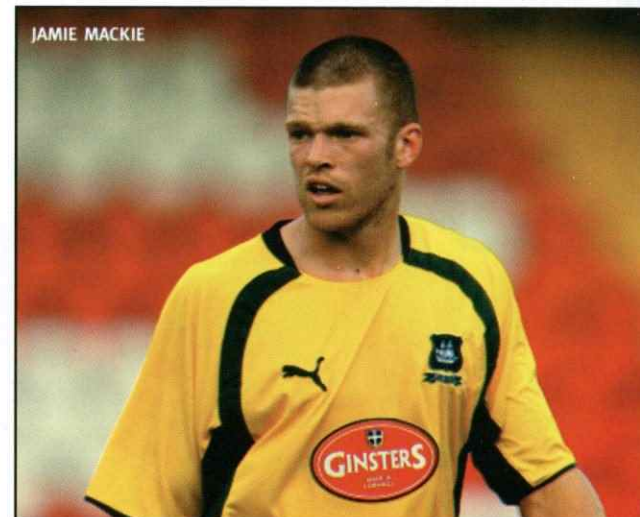
Talented Irishman Damien McCrory signed professional terms with the Pilgrims in July 2008 having progressed through the Centre of Excellence.

The youngster did no harm to his reputation during Argyle's pre-season tour of Austria in 2008, as he came off the bench to bag Argyle's equaliser in the 1-1 draw against German side, Greuther Furth.

Alan Neilson is proof that putting in the hours eventually reaps rewards after returning to Luton Town as Youth Team coach.

The popular Welshman spent three years at Kenilworth Road, making over 50 appearances but now his role is somewhat different as he looks to bring others through who can go onto become equally successful in the first team.

"I've always loved playing football", said Alan.

"And the next best thing is coaching

and hopefully I can pass my experience onto the young lads who are here."

Since leaving the Hatters three years ago the former Welsh international has been playing non-league football with Tamworth and Salisbury, while working for the Luton School of Excellence as he earned his UEFA 'A' Licence which made him an ideal candidate for the role.

He explained: "I heard that Chris Cummins had left so I rang Mick Harford up to find out what was happening and he asked me to send my CV to the club.

because of administration. Then about three weeks ago I came in for the interview and he offered me the job."

"I will be working mainly with the under 18's and hopefully developing them and pushing them into the first team. There's an opportunity for them these days, especially with the club still in administration

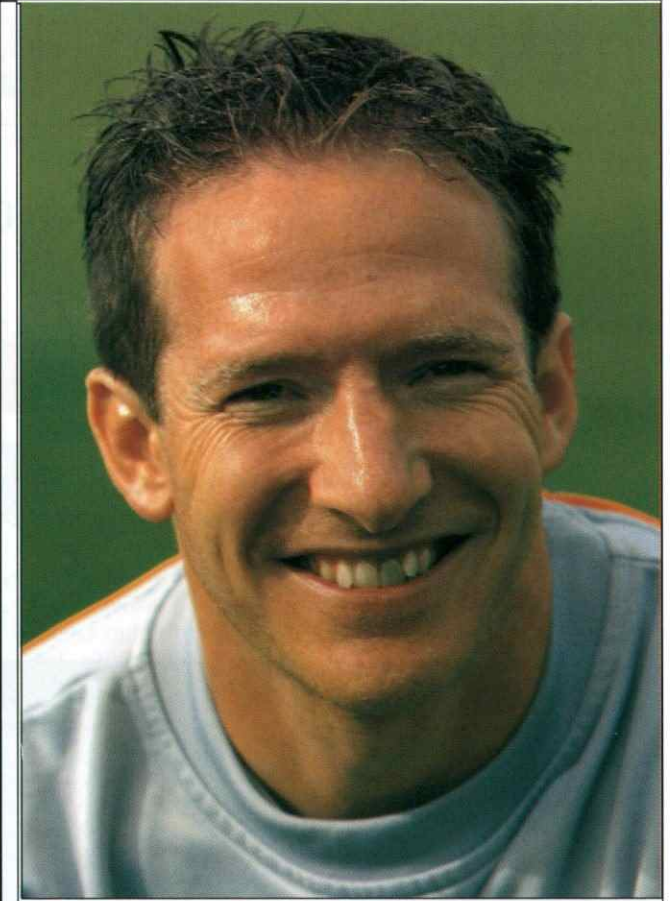
although hopefully we'll be coming out of that very soon."

He may have only been in the job for a couple of weeks but at this stage of the season, there is no time to settle in and he's certainly been busy preparing his players for their big kick-off:

"Our first game was on Monday against Dunstable, then we play on Thursday at St. Neots who have Marvin Johnson, our old youth team coach, in charge and then Saturday we will be away to Bedford Town. Then we've got some good games coming up. We're playing Fulham and then Crystal Palace before our season starts on the 16th August.

"Our pre-season training is slightly different to the first team, especially for the first years that have come in; you can't just push them straight into loads of running because their bodies aren't used to it. The second years are more used to it, so it's varied a little bit with individual training for some. Mainly we try and train more than the first team.

"We were out at 8.30am this morning, then another session at 10am and another session this



afternoon at 2pm. We're trying to build them and get them stronger ready for the first team as soon as we can."

When Neilson was a player with the club between 2002 -2005 he shared the pitch with a number of players who not only made names for themselves at Kenilworth Road but have since gone on to play at a higher level.

Curtis Davies (Aston Villa) and Leon Barnett (West Bromwich Albion) will both be hoping to make their mark in the Premier League this season while Kevin Foley will be aiming to help his Wolves side join them next year.

These three players have been vital to the Club in the past, bringing in over £5million and hopefully Neilson can help unearth another couple of gems!

Club Historian Roger Wash looks back through the years at Hatters' games gone by.

Isle of Wight born Keith Allen signed on for his nearest League side, Portsmouth, in 1962 but was allowed to leave before making his first team debut, forming part of the deal that took Grimsby's Trevor Porteous to Fratton Park.

The move to Blundell Park did not work out particularly well for Keith but his next stop, Stockport, was more to his liking and he became a thorn in the Hatter's side when scoring a hat-trick against the Town at Edgeley Park in 1965/66 and starring in a 3-0 win at Kenilworth Road early in the following season.

"My transfer to Luton came out of the blue," recalled Keith. "It became obvious that Stockport wanted Luton's Derek Kevan and that I was

to go to Luton as part of the deal. Luton manager Allan Brown knew me from our days together at Portsmouth and was aware of my strengths."

Keith hardly had time to meet his new team-mates before being thrust in at the deep end in a home clash with Exeter. "My memories of that game are sketchy but I do remember thinking how come that big winger is playing in Division Four when

he should be turning out at a much higher level. I soon

learnt, though, the reasons why Graham French failed to fulfil his potential when I was told of his partying habits, his drinking, and the fact that he let his club house out to air hostesses!"

"I turned out with lots of decent players over the years but Graham was by far the best. He set up loads of chances for me in my three years at the club which were the happiest of my footballing career."

Keith helped the Town to avoid re-election in 1967, win the Division Four title a year later and then star as promotion to Division Two was won in 1970. A cult hero at Kenilworth Road due to his wholehearted effort and no little skill for a big man, Keith always looks for the Luton result first when scanning the newspapers.

A move to Plymouth followed in 1970, and after hanging up his boots he played a decent level of cricket until well into his 50's as well as working in the area for many years. Now back on the Isle of Wight, Keith keeps himself fit with some gardening jobs for friends as he prepares for his 65th birthday in November.

THE GAME

Luton Town 4 Exeter City 0
11th March 1967

At last the Town supporters could see the light at the end of the tunnel. A dismal season in Division Four, which had seen the Hatters hovering just above the re-election places, was coming to an end and with it hope for the future.

New manager Allan Brown, who took over in November 1966, had taken stock and was now making changes in an attempt to give the side the right mix of youth and experience.

Following hot on the heels of the first away win for nearly a year - a 2-1 victory at Notts County - came the news that

the club had agreed to exchange the immobile 31 year old ex-England striker Derek Kevan with Stockport's sprightly 23 year old Keith Allen.

As well as gaining a forward who was well known to Brown, having been with him at Portsmouth, the Town also picked up £2,000 as part of the deal!

A crowd of 6,046 turned up at Kenilworth Road on a blustery day to see the Hatters dominate from the start. On four minutes, winger Ray Whittaker saw his penalty saved after Gerry King was fouled in the area but eight minutes later the Town went into a deserved lead when Gordon Riddick tapped the ball home after a

cross from the mercurial Graham French caused panic in the Grecians defence.

French, who was in unstoppable form, was giving future Hatters coach George Ley the runaround and from another cross Allen headed in only for the effort to be disallowed for offside by the referee rather than the linesman.

The floodgates opened in the second half, however, with King putting the Town two up shortly after the restart and then Allen heading a picture book goal from another tantalising French cross. It was left to French to complete the scoring with a delicate curling shot into the top corner from out on the wing but not before Allen saw two efforts stopped on the line by Exeter centre-half Ray Harford who was destined to enjoy better times at Kenilworth Road as manager 20 years later. As the fans trooped out of the ground they all knew who had the better of the deal between the Town and Stockport!

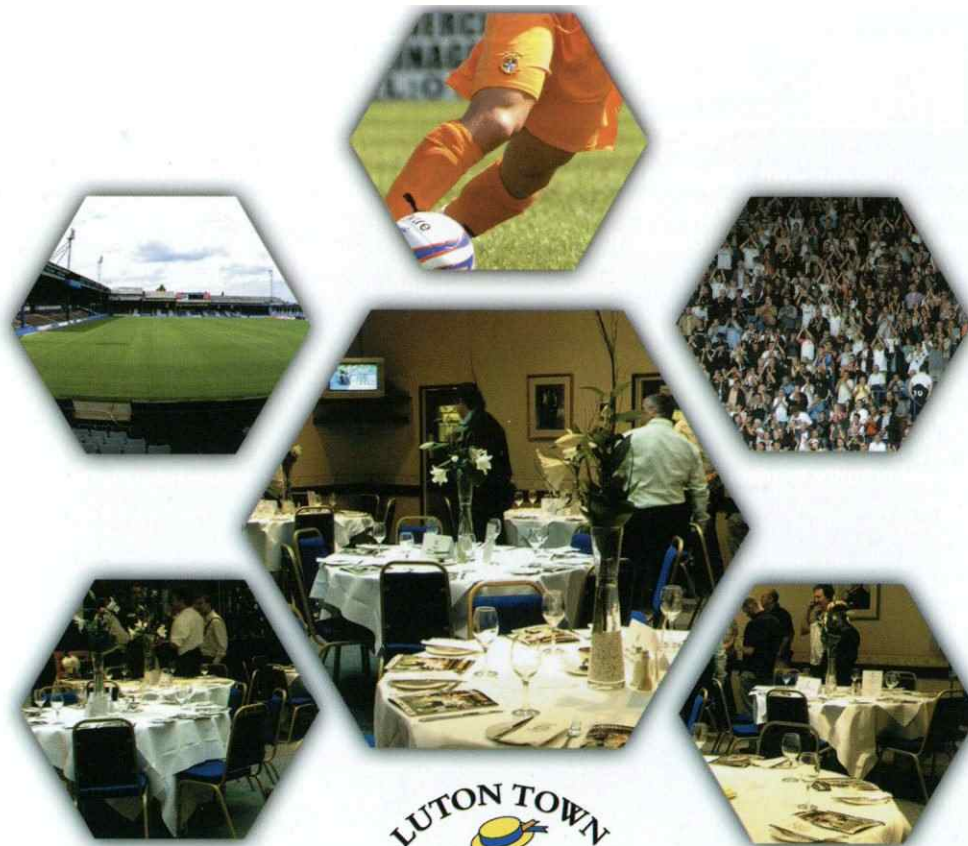

ahead through goals by Jade Doherty and Candice Davies the hosts fought back to equalise but Town stepped up their game and further goals from Leanne Lizaitis, Leyah Maddix and Stephanie Anes.

As I always the case with tours this was a great team building exercise but with high quality and very competitive opposition rather than the normal sporadic quality found in tournaments.

This can only be a good thing as we look to prepare these players for the challenges of senior football in the near future.
