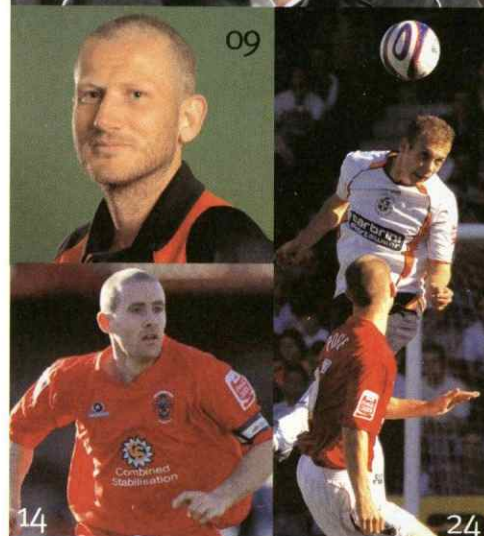

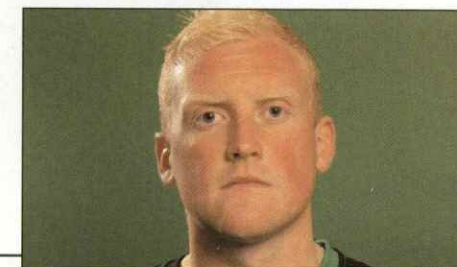

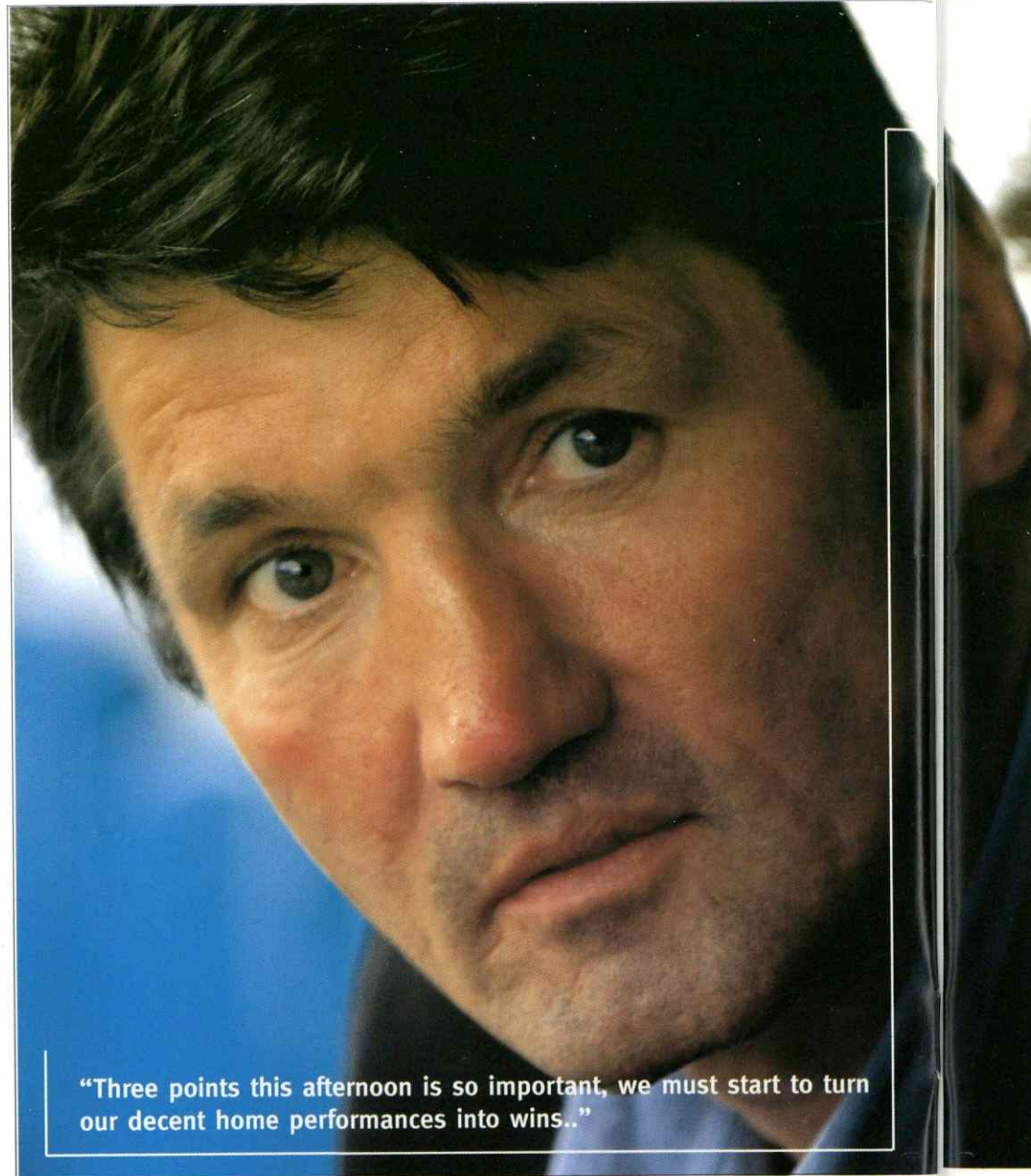

We just really need to get some of the experienced players back sooner rather

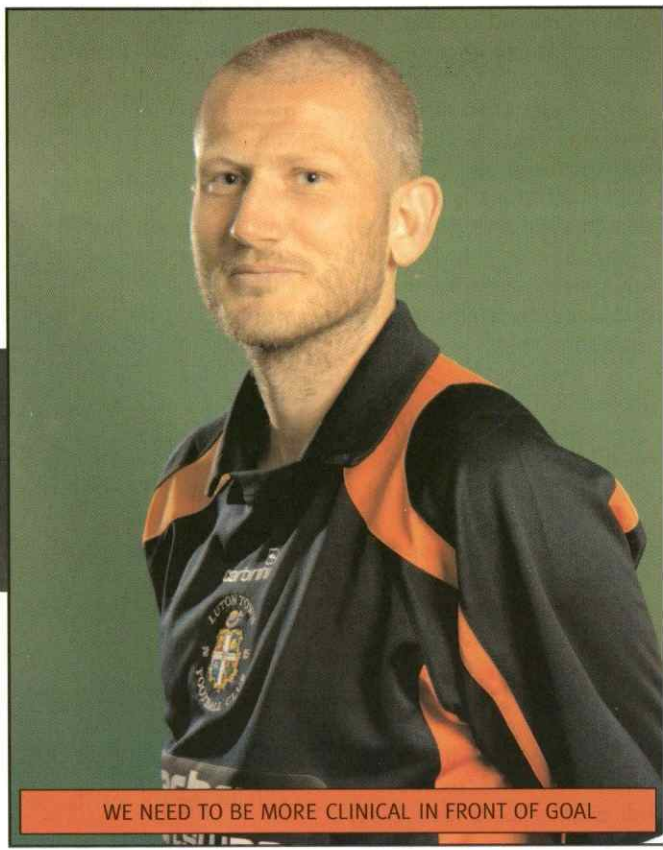
than later.

WE NEED TO BE MORE CLINICAL IN FRONT OF GOAL

Upon reading Rob Hadgraft's excellent book, "Staring into the Abyss", which tracks the many crises encountered by our great club over the last 50-years it is clear that this 'cat' has certainly had more than its fair share of nine lives.

Finishing this there is an emotion of huge relief that we have somehow managed on each occasion to battle through the various problems and still come out the other side with the club in tact.

Many constant themes strike through each episode and while we will all be more than familiar with the reasons that have led to the three administrations between March 1999 and November 2007, similar chords were also struck with financial problems through the 50's, 60's and 70's.

However, the latest problems have been exacerbated by increased regulations which not only acted as a catalyst to relegation last season but also saw an unprecedented point penalty imposed on the club. This was made even worse with the FA adding a draconian 10-points for irregularities committed years before by the previous custodians. All of this has undoubtedly

led to the greatest threat in the history of the oldest professional club in Southern England in maintaining its status in the Football League.

With the new owners, LTFC 2020, inheriting a wage bill appropriate for a Championship club drastic surgery was needed and the proverbial revolving doors have certainly been busy as older, bigger-earning players depart whilst new younger players arrive.

One thing that has been very noticeable from the touchlines has been the strong nucleus of young players coming into the Club. First off we welcome them all.

Not only in coming to Kenilworth Road but also showing the professionalism and nerve to come to a Club that had its backs against the wall from day-one.

There were certainly no easy options being taken here and this is an attribute that is extremely appreciated in this day and age where there are so many players lacking ambition, happy to sit in the reserves and take a wage that many fans sitting in the stands can only dream of.

When Loyal Luton started working with LTFC 2020 one of the investment cornerstones we immediately bought into was the emphasis on youth.

This club has for so long had an enviable track record of developing players through the youth set-up that have gone on to play on a bigger stage and no doubt we have all taken great pride when we've seen those who have developed at Luton go on to play in the Premiership or at international level.

This is obviously an attraction for young players coming to Luton and the likes of Curtis Davies, Matty Taylor, Emerson Boyce, John Hartson and Mitchell Thomas are all perfect examples of what can be achieved through hard work, application, discipline, good training and that most important ingredient of good fortune.

Last Saturday witnessed the latest to roll off this gravy train in Jake Howells.

In starting the game with fellow youngsters Ed Asafu-Adjaye, Micky Spillane and Harry Worley this surely made the case for the youngest defence in the club's history for a

league match and with only two outfield players older than 21 there wasn't too much experience ahead of them either.

This is obviously very encouraging for the future, however, on the flip side it also brings along its own issues with the lack of some cool and wise heads during difficult or frustrating periods in games so the return from injury of Nico can't come quick enough to help provide the guidance and reassurance the younger lads need.

However, as fans we all have a huge part to play here as well.

None of the young players out there wearing the Luton shirt want to make mistakes and understandably still have plenty to learn.

The stakes at risk are desperate, however, these players all need encouragement to bring out their confidence and

hence their undoubted talents which attracted Mick Harford in the first place to their potential.

As we are all in this together let's remain patient and try to keep the criticism to the bars and internet chatrooms before and after matches.

The atmosphere at many games has been extremely impressive and we should all do our best to keep this up.

This is a long season and it won't be ultimately determined by a win, draw or defeat in any one match.

We all have to stay firm in our belief and strong support to the bitter end and hopefully we can all help stop that "fat lady from ever singing".

With this in mind we should also go back to all the crises detailed in "Staring into the Abyss" as ultimately we need to look at the bigger picture

here and first and foremost be thankful we still have a club to come and support while having new owners, a management team and group of players ready and willing to get us out of the current desperate situation.

Welcome to Today's visitors

In 1968, six years after Accrington Stanley left The Football League, the club was reformed by a loyal band of supporters and two years later joined The Lancashire Combination.

In only their second season they completed a superb treble of The Championship, League Cup and Combination Cup.

Over the next seven years, Stanley won both The Championship and The Combination Cup on two more occasions.

The 1979-80 season saw Stanley move into the much stronger Cheshire League, finishing runners-up in their first season and winning The Second Division Championship a year later.

With the formation of The North West Counties League, Stanley were placed in Division One and marked their first season by reaching the final of the County Cup for the first time, unfortunately losing to South Liverpool.

In 1986-87, the club ended their last NWC campaign as Runners-Up, joining the newly formed Northern Premier First Division the following season.

Stanley was promoted to The Premier Division in 1980-81 and two years later reached The Second Round of The FA Cup, losing to Crewe at Ewood Park.

Midway through the 1994-95 season, the former Stanley Manager, Eric Whalley took over as Chairman and from then it on things really began to improve.



The Ground: Fraser Eagle Stadium

The Crown Ground, currently known as the Fraser Eagle Stadium for sponsorship purposes (and previously as the Interlink Express Stadium), is a multi-use stadium in Accrington, England.

It is currently used mostly for football matches and is the home ground of Accrington Stanley F.C.

The stadium holds 5,057 and was built in 1968.

It is the smallest stadium in The Football League.

A year later young striker, Brett Ormerod was sold to Blackpool, a transfer that eventually earned the club a quarter of a million pounds.

In the following season Stanley reached their second County Cup Final, though again they were beaten, this time by Southport at Deepdale.

Meanwhile, under Eric Whalley's Chairmanship vast improvements were carried out and even relegation in 1999 proved to be only a blip, for this was followed by the appointment of a new management team of John Coleman and Jimmy Bell, who built a side which achieved promotion in their first season.

Two years later Stanley won The NPL Challenge Cup, The NPL Challenge Shield and The Marsden Trophy (County Cup).

In 2002-03 The Unibond Championship was won, with Stanley finishing 16 points in front of second placed Barrow and The NPL Challenge Shield was retained but much more importantly promotion to The Nationwide Conference was achieved.

Stanley ended their first Conference season in a creditable 10th position and enjoyed their best ever FA Cup run, beating two League clubs before losing in a Third Round replay. They also reached the final of The County Cup, losing narrowly to Morecambe.

In 2004-05 season Stanley again finished in 10th position, having been amongst the challengers for almost all the season and again brought home The County Cup.

Then in 2006 Stanley won The Championship of The Nationwide Conference, finishing eleven points clear at the top of the table.

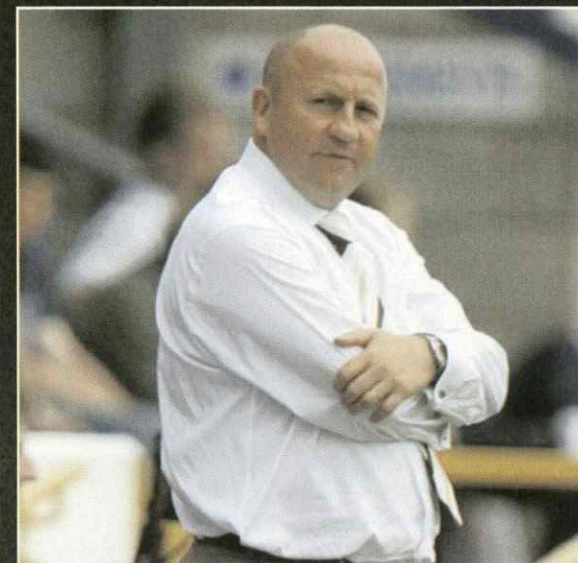
So after a gap of 44 years the name of Accrington Stanley once again competed in The Football League.

The first season was, as expected, a difficult season but having come through are confident that things will be better this term.

Last season Stanley improved their final placing and though the improvement was modest, it continued the amazing run that has seen Stanley improve every season for nine consecutive seasons.

The Manager

Now in his tenth season at Stanley and is easily The Club's longest serving Manager and one of the longest serving in The Football League. Since his appointment, the club has won three Championships and five cup competitions, making him by far Stanley's most successful manager. John was previously Player-Manager at Ashton United where his side narrowly missed promotion, though they did win the First Division Cup twice. In his long playing career at Kirby Town, Burscough, Marine, Southport, Runcorn, Macclesfield, Rhyl, Morecambe and Lancaster, he fully justified his reputation as one of the most prolific goal scorers in non-league football, scoring well over 500 goals. His many honours include England Semi-Pro caps as well as several Player of the Year awards. He was deservedly voted The Conference Manager of the season after leading Stanley to The Championship. John has seen Stanley end each of his nine seasons in charge in an improved League position and very few managers can better that.

KENNY ARTHUR

Prior to joining Stanley in May 2007, he had spent his entire career at Patrick Thistle. He was signed as a professional in June 1997 and made his first team debut the following November and from then on was the first choice keeper.

JAMES BELL

Jay is a young defender, the son of the club's assistant manager. He is in his first season as a professional and made his first team debut at right back, while still a scholar in April last season at Wrexham, after being an unused sub several times.

ALAN BURTON

Alan, a talented midfield player, is now a second year scholar at Stanley after being

on the books at Blackpool as a schoolboy.

PETER CAVANAGH

Stanley signed him in August 2001 after being released by Liverpool. Appointed Stanley's youngest ever captain on joining the club, he collected five trophies in his first two years at the club.

JAMIE CLARKE

Jamie is a young striker, who spent time with both Man United and Liverpool before being offered a scholarship by Blackburn Rovers.

IAN DUNBAVIN

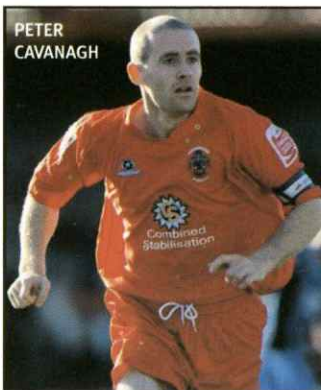
Started his career at Liverpool, where he was the substitute keeper in The 1996 FA Youth Final and then joined Shrewsbury. He moved to Stanley in July 2006.

PHILIP EDWARDS

Came originally to Stanley on loan in October 2005 from Wigan Athletic, where he played regularly in the reserve side and where he had been given a first team squad number. He signed for Stanley on a permanent basis in January 2006.

ROBERT GRANT

Was given a professional contract half way through his second year scholar at Stanley. During last season though he did play with both the youth team and the

reserve side, he ended the campaign playing regularly in the first team.

TERRY GORNELL

Terry is an 18 year old striker who was signed on loan from Tranmere Rovers in September, having impressed in a reserve game against Stanley the previous week.

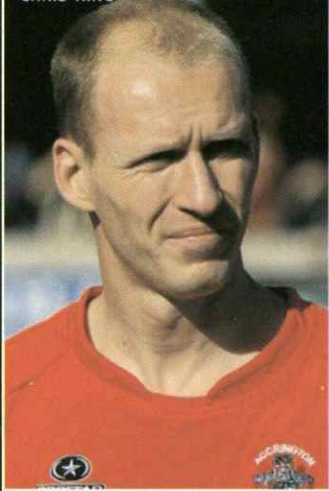
ROSTYN GRIFFITHS

Rostyn is a young midfielder who came on loan in September from Blackburn Rovers, after impressing in a trial game here. Australian born, he has already represented his native country at Youth Level.

The younger brother of Stanley Striker, Paul, John is much more experienced in League Football who joined Stanley in July 2008.

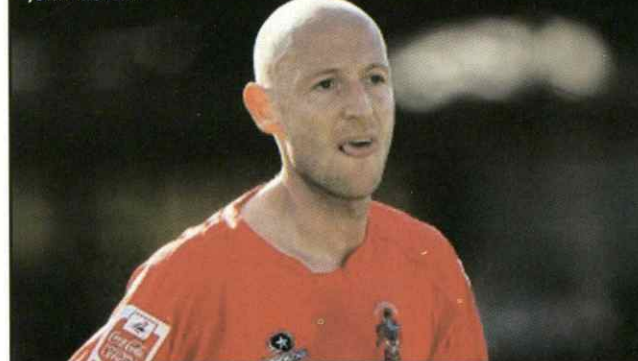
PAUL MULLIN

First joined Stanley in the summer of 1995 but after making his first team debut in September, he was surprisingly allowed to leave. He then played for Darwen, Trafford and Clitheroe before joining Radcliffe, where he was a huge success. After signing again for Stanley in August 2000 he finished the season as leading scorer and Player of the Year, a feat he repeated a further five times.

COLIN MURDOCH

Powerful Irish International

centre back, who was Stanley's first signing in the summer. He started his career at Man United and though he never made the first team, he commanded a six figure fee when he moved to Preston North End in 1997.

PETER MURPHY

Peter is in his first season as a professional and usually plays at full back, though he made his first team debut at the centre of defence in April 2008 and he played in several positions in the youth team.

ANDREW PROCTOR

Signed by Stanley in February 2002 from neighbours Great Harwood and though he was only 18 years old, he soon adapted to the higher standard of football. After missing two England National Game XI call-ups because of exams, he finally won his first cap against Iraq in May 2004.

LEAM RICHARDSON

Leam is now in his fourth

season at Stanley after starting his career at Blackburn Rovers, where he played one first team game before being transferred to Bolton Wanderers.

JAMES RYAN

A strong midfield player, Jimmy was signed in early August after an impressive time on trial. He started his career at Liverpool, first as a schoolboy, then a trainee and finally as a professional. However he appreciated that his chances would be limited at Anfield and he chose to leave, joining Shrewsbury Town a year ago.

ANDREW SMITH

Andrew is a young striker who made his first team debut when he came on as sub against Barnet in April 2008.

CHRISTOPHER TURNER

Chris was signed as a professional in the summer of 2008 after completing two seasons as a scholar. He made his first team debut, when he came on as sub against Wycombe Wanderers in February 2008.

ROBBIE WILLIAMS Now in his eighth season at Stanley he is the clubs longest serving player. He joined Stanley from top Liverpool side St Dominics, who have produced so many fine players. He was Stanley's Young player of the season in his early days at the club.



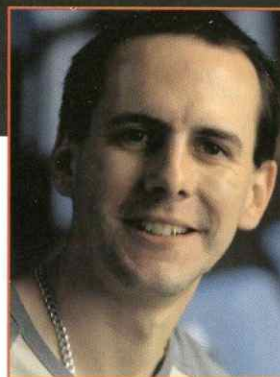

The Numbers Game

Simon Pitts looks back at the Hatters previous fixtures on this date



1972 In this year Portsmouth took a 2-0 lead within 20 minutes, but by half time the Hatters had levelled as the sides shared the points. Bobby Thomson had scored an own goal after just three minutes, before Peter Price increased the lead. On the half hour Vic Halom pulls a goal back, before a superb equaliser from Viv Busby just before half time. It was Luton's third consecutive 2-2 home draw!

from Brian Chambers, his first for Luton, settled the tie.

1 One point each for Luton and Shrewsbury in 1980. The visitors player manager Graham Turner opens the scoring just before half time, with Steve White equalising with fifteen minutes to go. This was the only time in the season that White scored and Luton didn't win! His other six goals all came in victories for the Hatters!

6 It really was a "game of two halves" when Luton entertained Norwich in 2005. A Championship fixture saw the Hatters cruise to a 4-0 half time lead courtesy of goals from Warren Feeny, Carlos Edwards, Peter Holmes and Steve Howard. The Canaries came out for the second half with only pride to play for and scored twice through Dean Ashton and Ryan Jarvis, brother of current Luton player Rossi, who was on the bench for that game.

7 The number of previous League matches played at Kenilworth Road on this date. Luton won four of these, drawing two and losing just once. The Hatters have scored 16 goals, and conceded 10, meaning an average of nearly four goals scored per game!

24,864 The biggest attendance for a fixture on this date saw Luton beat Chelsea in 1958. Alan Brown and George Cummins scored in a 2-1 victory.

7,367 The lowest crowd is likely to be beaten today, but currently it was for the match played in 1930 when Bournemouth came to Kenilworth Road. Andy Rennie scored twice, but it wasn't enough as the visitors scored three times.

3 The biggest margin of victory came in 1952 when Sheffield United were beaten 4-1. Bernhard Moore, Jesse Pye, Bert Mitchell and Charlie Watkins were the Luton goalscorers.

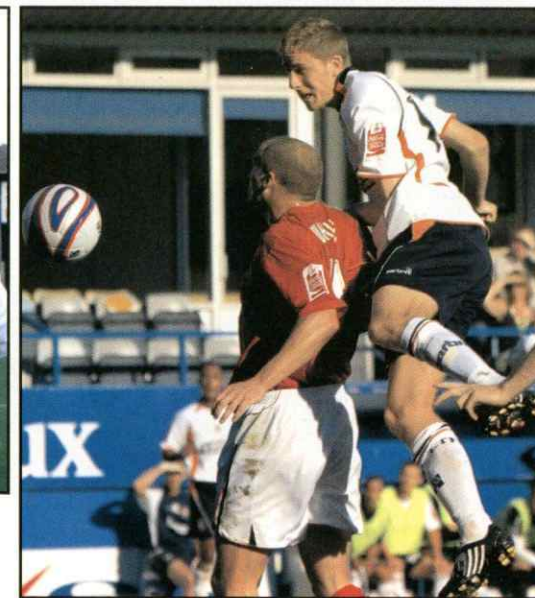

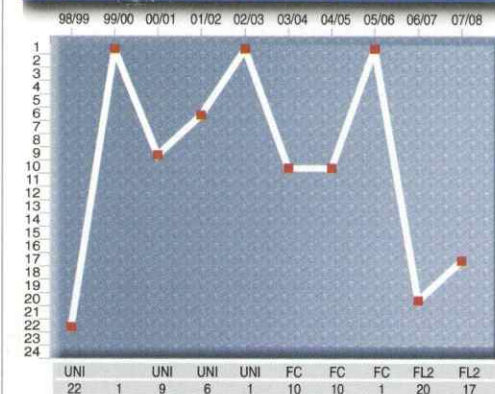

Good afternoon and welcome to today's game.

Our Girls Centre of Excellence Season is now well under way. All four age groups have now played 7 games as part of the F.A Girls COE Programme.

They have played fixtures against Aston, Villa, Colchester, Watford, Birmingham, Ipswich, Cambridge and Northampton.

The start was slow with new players getting to know each other and players having to learn new systems of play.

As the weeks have passed the progress in the players has been remarkable, results are now overall very positive and the players are starting to understand the technical demands that are being made of them at this level and the coaching is starting to pay dividends.

To make this improvement possible we have introduced a challenging syllabus; we understand that it is boring for the players to turn up and work on one particular element of the game non-stop for an hour and a half.

Therefore we have adopted a similar syllabus to the one used in the boys Centre of Excellence where the players work on 5 different areas of Development during the one and a half hour training session.

The logic behind this is that with players of this age the ability to concentrate only lasts between 15 and 20 minutes; therefore it is essential to vary the activities to keep the players challenged and motivated.

Our syllabus includes 5 different elements that the players work on, these are, Ball Manipulation, Physiological, 1 v 1 Attacking / Defending, A Technical Practice and a Small Sided Game.

These elements are all taught allowing the players the opportunity to learn in their own specific

manner.

Players learn in 3 ways; by having something explained, by seeing it none, or by doing it themselves, each player will favour one of the 3 approaches so it is vital that the coaches recognize this and ensure that their teaching methods incorporate all 3 methods.

The most noticeable and satisfying result so far is that the players are becoming uninhibited, without the pressure of having to achieve 'A Result' the players are happy to take risks and make mistakes; and take great pleasure in trying the new tricks and turns they have learnt in training in the competitive game environment without fear of being reprimanded if it costs the team a goal.

There is still plenty to work on; we will always strive to improve the players we work with; the opportunity is always there for girls displaying the right attitude and ability to move into the Centre.

It hasn't taken long for the excellent reputation of our Centre to spread and we have now have many girls traveling the maximum allowed 1 hour to be part of our Centre.

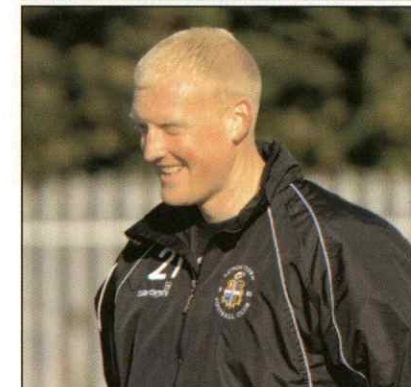
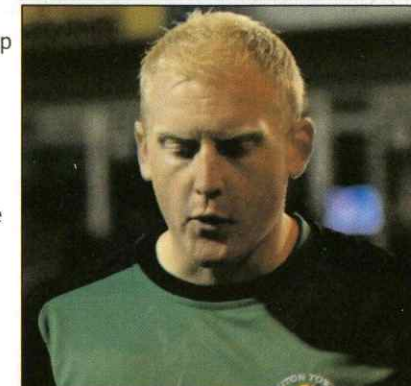
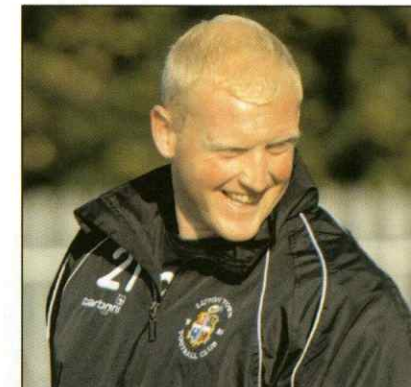

Club Historian Roger Wash looks back to the last time an Accrington side visited Luton

Founder members of the Football League in 1888, Accrington Football Club started reasonably well in the newly formed Division One but by the end of the 1892/93 campaign they were running on empty and having lost in a peculiar play-off arrangement against Sheffield United faced relegation.

A Second Division had now

been started and when Accrington realised that travel to such far-flung places as Newcastle and Woolwich Arsenal needed to be undertaken they resigned, giving the Football League their first major crisis.

Joining the Lancashire League in 1893, Accrington continued to tumble down the divisions and by the time of their visit to Luton on Christmas Day 1895 they were in the Lancashire Combination and had more or less folded having played their final League fixture over two months before.

completeness in this history lesson, a junior side had, by this time, been formed in Accrington taking its name from the Stanley Street area of the town – this was the club that eventually joined Football League Division Three (North) in 1921 before being unceremoniously dumped from the League mid-season in 1962.

The current Accrington Stanley club was formed in 1968 and started in the Second Division of the Lancashire Combination two years later.

THE GAME Luton Town 9 Accrington 0 25th December 1895

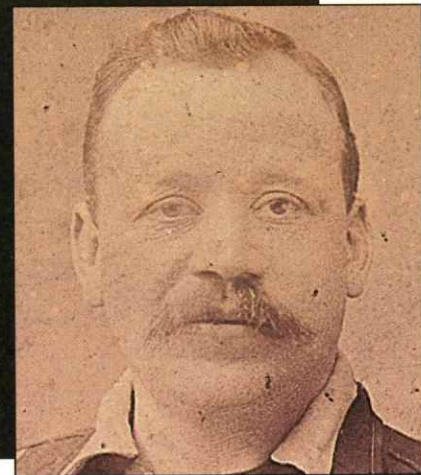
In direct contrast to Accrington, the Town were on their way up.

After playing a succession of friendlies throughout their formative years they became founder members of the Southern League in 1894 and in their first season finished runners-up to Millwall.

By Christmas 1895 they were again second in the table to Millwall although eight points behind their fierce rivals.

As there were only ten

Given that they had complained over the costs of travelling two years before, travelling from Lancashire to Luton over the Christmas period could not have been cheap and it is assumed that the financial guarantees given by the Town and the other clubs on their mini tour of the south made it all worthwhile.

teams in the Southern League at the time, the Town had to fill in empty dates with a programme of supposedly attractive friendlies.

Given that Accrington was presumably still a big name in the football world, they had been invited to Luton for a prestigious friendly at a snow covered Dallow Lane where a crowd estimated to be between 1,200 and 1,500 tore themselves away from their Christmas dinners, or more likely the washing up, to see if the Town could crack 100 goals in all matches for the season.

As we now read, and the Luton supporters were to find out, this Accrington side was not a patch on the side from their Football League days and once

James Coupar opened the scoring it was completely one way traffic.

'The Reds' of Luton played in white so as not to clash with Accrington and had brought the score up to 6-0 by the interval with Bob Parkinson (2), Jack Dimmock and William Brown adding to another by Coupar.

The second half was even more one-sided and it came as a surprise that it took 30 minutes for Brown to net number seven.

Defender, and future Hatters manager, John McCartney scored number eight, and goal 99 for the season, leaving James Docherty to bring up the century in the final minute.

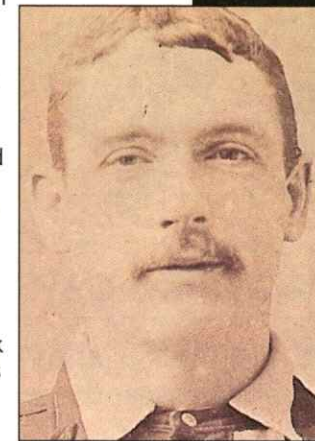

We would like to welcome Luton Town's Centre of Excellence Under 16 squad to today's game.

The Under 16 squad is made up with boys from the Under 15's and Under 16's. They are coached by Wayne Turner & Jon De Souza, they train twice a week at Baldock Arena and play every Saturday morning in the Football League Fixture Programme.

The Under 15/16 year group is a very difficult one for the players as they have to cope pressures academically, socially and in football that are completely new to them. We have to be careful as a club to manage these pressures carefully and to prevent players becoming burnt out.

This is a very strong age group for the club, and already 9 of the players listed above have tasted action playing for the Under 18's. In addition a majority of the group have been granted day release from their schools on a Monday, allowing them to come in and train with the Under 18's and to prepare for life as a scholar.

The boys have now played seven fixtures as part of the Football League Fixture Programme, against Cambridge, Wycombe, Peterborough, Rushden, QPR, Brentford & Colchester. They have outplayed and gained positive results against six of these clubs, with the only blip being the game away to QPR where individual errors cost the team dearly. More importantly than results however, is the individual progress of the players which with the hard work put in by Jon and Wayne has been significant so far this season.

Jon De Souza commented "We have spent September working on the boys defensive responsibilities, especially in terms of midfielders tracking runners and communication amongst the back four. In October we have switched the emphasis to playing through the strikers, improving the quality of their runs and play with their backs to goal. Overall there are a lot of strong individual players within this group and the question is not whether they make it, but can they make it to the highest level?."

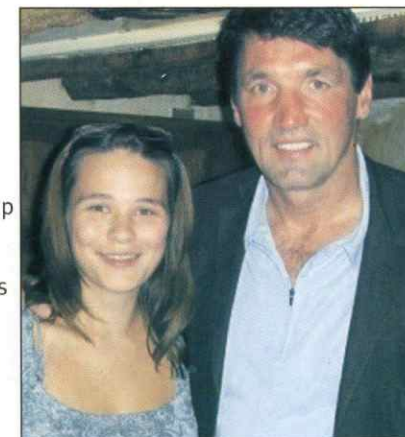

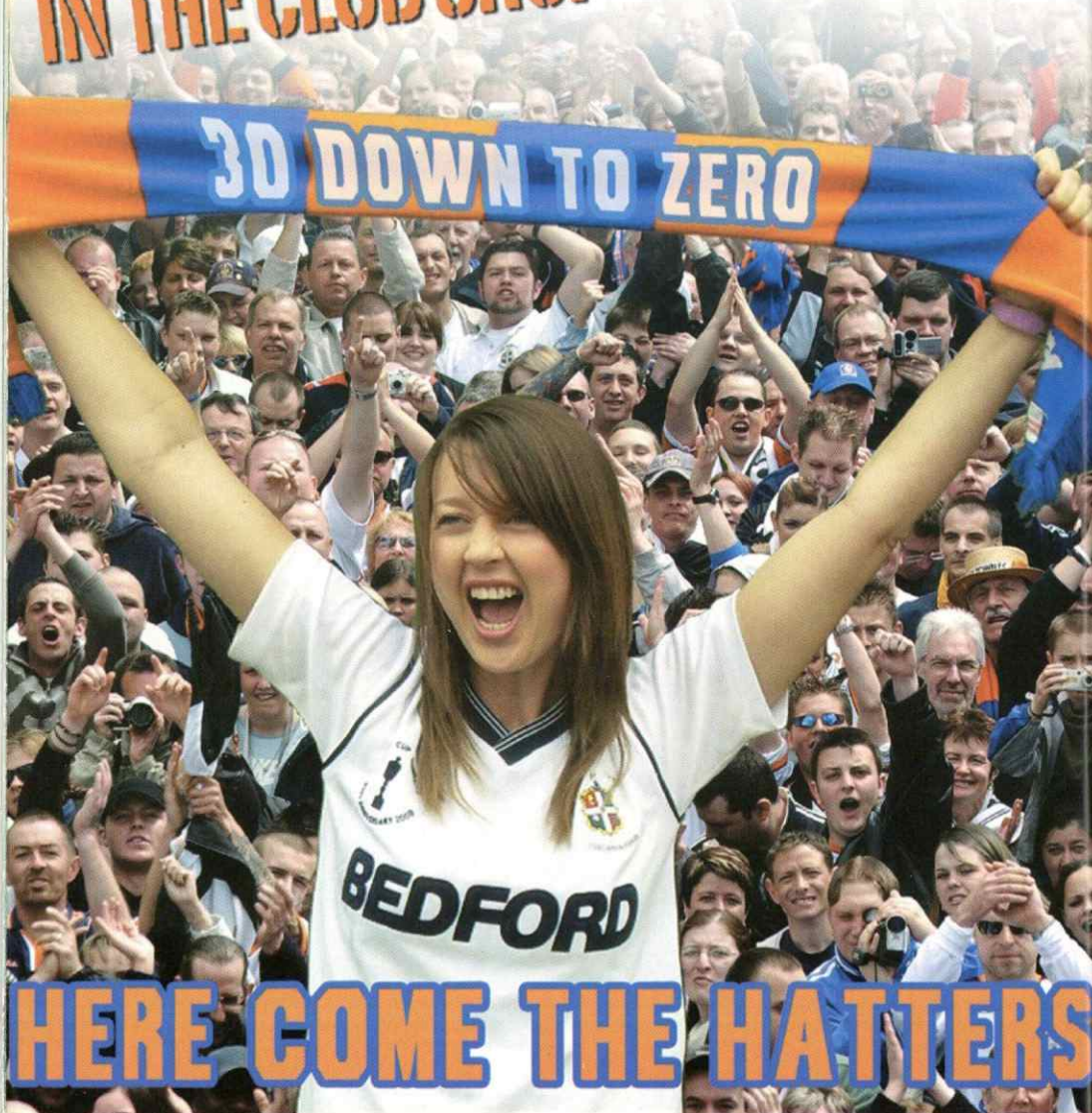

GOALKEEPER

Jake Findlay
Big Scot Jake had all the attributes needed to be a top keeper. Height, weight, exceptional reflexes, courage and agility were his main strengths. Signed from Aston Villa in the summer of 1978 for £100,000 he turned in many match-winning displays during his time with the Hatters.

RIGHT BACK

Kirk Stephens
Tigerish full-back with bags of determination who always gave 100% for the cause. Tenacious in the tackle and quick on the overlap down the right wing. He will be remembered by many fans for his late headed winner at Watford on Boxing Day 1979.

CENTRE BACK

Steve Foster
A dominating and imposing figure, Foster was an inspirational leader and captained the side on their finest day a 3-2 victory over Arsenal in the League Cup Final at Wembley on 24th April 1988. Gained England honours in his career, and formed a formidable partnership with Mal Donaghy in central defence.

CENTRE BACK

Mal Donaghy
A reliable and consistent servant to the club, Mal played from 1978 to 1991 in Hatters colours. His speed and reading of the game were the perfect foil alongside Steve Foster in the glory years of the late eighties. A Northern Ireland international whilst at the Town, he later played for Man Utd and Chelsea.

LEFT BACK

Richard Money
Cultured left-back who

oozed class, was a fine tackler, and very consistent and effective with his distribution. A good athlete with an exquisite left foot, many will recall his 25 yard screamer of a goal on Match Of The Day at Rotherham in April 1982. Other clubs he played for included Liverpool and Fulham.

RIGHT MIDFIELD

Ricky Hill
Probably the most talented midfielder to have ever played for the Hatters. Hill had the perfect physique and balance, supreme ball skills and passing ability. Blessed with a wonderful temperament, he could unlock the tightest defences with sublime intricacy and scored some crucial and spectacular goals along the way.

CENTRE MIDFIELD

Brian Horton
Horton was an inspiring skipper during the Second Division title winning season of 1981-82. A fine and accurate passer of the ball, he led the Hatters to the Championship crown with several outstanding displays in the engine room. He was a fierce tackler, very competitive and a great reader of the game.

CENTRE MIDFIELD

Bruce Rioch
Bruce Rioch was an influential player during his time at Luton, he scored several memorable goals with his powerful left-foot shots and was a powerhouse in midfield. As a youngster his ability stood out from other players. He went on to play for Aston Villa after the Town, and gained international honours for Scotland.

LEFT MIDFIELD

David Moss
Mercurial David Moss was a wing wizard during his spell with the Hatters. Two-footed he was a dead-ball expert, and a reliable penalty taker. Moss was probably the most single important component in the title winning team of 1981-82. In total he played 221 league games for Luton scoring 88 league goals, an enviable strike rate for a wide player.

STRIKER

Paul Walsh
A gifted dribbler with quick feet and a wonderful turn of pace, Walsh was a livewire forward who lit up Kenilworth Road with his dazzling skills and trickery. With blistering speed and superb ball control he bamboozled defenders and scored many unforgettable goals, including a fantastic hat-trick at home to Notts County in September 1982. He also played for England in what was a glittering career.

STRIKER

Mick Harford
Super Mick terrorised defences with his aggressive style and robust leadership of the front line. A tall and angular striker Harford was lethal in the air and for a big man highly-skilled with the ball at his feet. Difficult to mark out of a game, during the 1984-85 campaign he netted an incredible 15 league goals from just 22 league appearances guiding the Town to safety in the top flight. He is at the moment the current Hatters manager, hoping his young squad can retain Football League status.

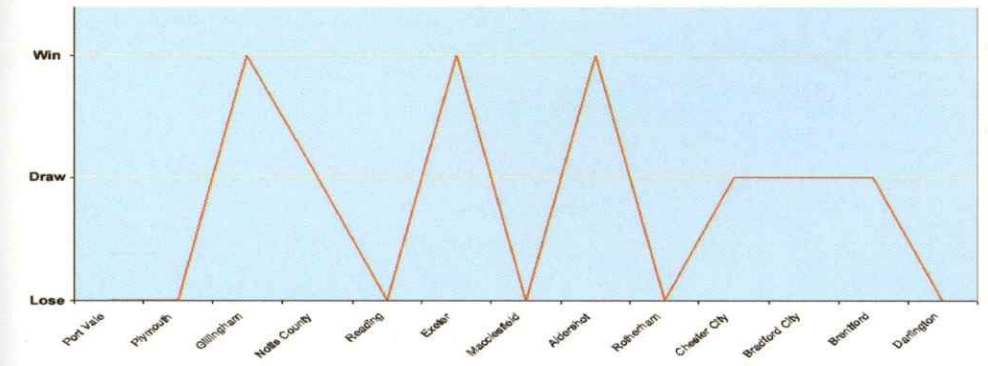

What's the Ground Like?

At one side of the ground is the Carlsberg Stand, which is the tallest stand and is two tiered and covered. However this stand only runs half the length of the pitch, straddling the half way line. Opposite is the old Main Stand, which is a small covered all seated stand and has a large number of supporting pillars running across the front of it. Part of this stand dates back to 1901, possibly making it the oldest surviving stand in League football. Both ends are small covered affairs. Home fans are located in the Pontoon Stand at one end, away fans at the opposite end in the Osmond Stand.

What Is It Like For Visiting Supporters?

Away fans are located in the Osmond Stand, at one end of the ground, where 2,200 supporters can be accommodated. One downside of this stand is that there are a number of supporting pillars which could impede your view of the game.

Where To Eat & Drink?

There is not much choice for a pint for away supporters close to the ground. The Rutland Arms is recommended for both home and away fans to mingle, however this is some distance from the ground and doesn't allow in

children. There are a number of pubs along Cleethorpes sea front but this is around a 20 minute away. The Imperial pub by the ground is not recommended for away fans.

How To Get There By Car?

The first thing to remember is that the ground is not actually in Grimsby, but the neighbouring town of Cleethorpes. Take the A6 towards Bedford. Continue on the A6 until you reach the A421, here merge onto the A421 and then join the A1 signposted The North. Continue onto the A1(M) signposted The North, Peterborough. Branch left, then at roundabout take the 1st exit onto the A46 signposted Lincoln, Sleaford. Continue on the A46, following signs for Grimsby then Cleethorpes. At Isaac's Hill Roundabout take the 1st exit onto the A180. Turn right onto Neville Street, then turn left onto Harrington Street and then left again.

Car Parking

There is no car park at the ground, therefore only street parking. As you drive along the A180 towards the ground, the home end appears first, then after the McDonalds is the away end. From there, continue towards Cleethorpes and try any of the side streets to the left or preferably the right and you should find a parking spot okay.

Like the Hatters, Bournemouth were left facing an uphill struggle in Coca-Cola League 2 before the season had even started, after receiving a 17 point deduction as a result of their failure to emerge from administration.

After picking up just two points in their opening four league matches, manager Kevin Bond was dismissed at the beginning of September, despite coming agonisingly close to pulling off an incredible great escape in League 1 last season.

Former Northern Ireland and Bournemouth striker Jimmy Quinn was named as Bond's immediate successor, subsequently being handed the unenviable task of leading the Cherries out of their League 2 predicament, whilst former defender Jason Tindall was appointed assistant manager.

Since the change in management, things have steadily begun to improve for the The Fitness First based side. A well deserved 3-1 win over Bradford City at Valley Parade inflicted the Bantam's first home defeat of the season, and the victory injected some much welcomed confidence into Quinn's side.

However, another 3-1 win, this time over Darlington, was then followed by a comprehensive 3-1 defeat at the hands of table-toppers Wycombe Wanderers.

The Cherries' indifferent form continues, but an impressive

victory against MK Dons in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy at the beginning of the month proved the club are more than capable of winning tough matches.

Bournemouth will be looking to their vastly experienced duo of Darren Anderton and Sammy Igoe to pull the strings in midfield, but it's the younger players who could pose a greater threat to the Hatters when they visit Kenilworth Road in ten days time.

19-year-old Marvin Bartley was plucked out of non-league football in 2007, and has established himself as a first choice player at the heart of the Cherries' midfield this season. The combative Bartley scored his first goal for the club in last month's win against Darlington.

Upfront, the Cherries have signed Michael Rankine on a loan deal this month from Rushden & Diamonds. The striker scored 14 goals for

the Diamond's last year and will provide some stern competition for Bournemouth's long-list of forwards.

Whilst 20-year-old forward Brett Pitman seems to be coming of age this season, putting in a series of impressive early displays, and will undoubtedly pose a threat to the Hatter's defence if selected.

The meeting will be 58th in total between the two sides. Last season the two matches between the clubs produced 12 goals, with the Cherries coming out on top on both occasions, putting eight past Dean Brill over the two games.

However, the previous season produced two comparatively less entertaining games, with the Dorset club on the end of a double defeat at the hands of the Hatters, losing both matches 1-0.
