A Word From The Manager A land the Manager A

Good afternoon and welcome back to Gigg Lane for this afternoon's game with Luton Town

This is our second home game in a week and hopefully we can get back to winning ways today having lost our last two.

Our opponents today Luton are another team that have started with a point's deduction. Mick Harford has put together a strong squad and are more than capable of reducing the deficit, so it will be a very difficult game.

We have been guilty of giving away early goals in our last two home games and it is something that we have to address quickly. You just can't give teams a goal or like Tuesday, night a two goal start and expect to come back and win.

Two goals killed us, it's pretty obvious. You can't score three goals to win the game. Two goals in ten minutes is a pretty poor start, and I have to say it - but it's been coming.





SCOUTS at Gigg Lane watching highly-rated keeper Paddy Kenny witnessed a display of shot-stopping so brilliant they will be advising their clubs to write out a blank cheque pronto. The cash won't be for Kenny though, but for Luton number one Nathan Abbey, who had the game of his life.

He was a one-man barrier against Bury and, in particular, Nick Daws and Ady Littlejohn, who both watched in astonishment as the Luton number one pulled off a dozen breathtaking saves. Shakers' boss Andy Preece said: "The keeper made some freakish stops. Some of them were out of this world. 'On a skiddy surface the one Daws hit along the ground, I just can't believe he kept it out. This was a pulsating match which went into overdrive when Bury took the lead a minute after the break. Dean Barrick won a tackle on the left, poked it through to Littlejohn and the livewire striker finished superbly with his left foot curling it around the advancing Abbey.

For a moment there was silence, such was the shock that the Luton keeper had been beaten. In the first half he had been magnificent, palming away a point blank Daws header and stopping a powerful Steve Redmond volley on the line amid a sea of players. The best was a truly great save from a Daws 20 yard piledriver.

The ball appeared to have gone past Abbey but he leapt low to his right and somehow scooped the ball away, then stood up to block Paul Reid's follow up volley onto the bar though the second effort was ruled offside. Littlejohn's goal was a vital breakthrough but it seemed to make the Shakers nervous and they went on the back foot

Ten minutes of Luton pressure followed and it was no surprise when the visitors equalised. Finnish international Petri Helin -- who played against England last month in the World Cup qualifying 0-0 draw -- holding off Dean Barrick and bundling the ball past Kenny on his debut.

From then on it was great end-to-end football as both defences went AWOL.

Bury had the best chances, nearly all of them falling to Littlejohn who had a personal duel with the Hatter's keeper, cutting inside and smashing left foot drives at Abbey half a dozen times. The one time he did get the ball past Abbey on 77 minutes, the Bury striker's chip towards goal was headed off the line by Norwegian defender Kent Karlson, also making himself a hero on his debut.

In the final two minutes, both team's had great chances to win. Luton substitute Rocky Baptiste missed a sitter from six yards out and Baichung Bhutia strangely delayed shooting when put clean through, instead opting to slide the ball back to Littlejohn whose drive was saved by Abbey.

Introducing LUTON TOWN FOOTBALL CLUB

The Gaffer -

Mick Harford: Born in Sunderland, Mick Harford joined Lincoln City in 1977. He was at Lincoln for just over three years before he moved on to Newcastle United in a £180,000 transfer. After just 19 appearances and eight months at Newcastle, Harford moved on

again, this time to Bristol City for £160,000 in August 1981. Seven months later, Harford had impressed enough to gain a move to Birmingham City for £100,000 in March 1982.

Harford continued to impress at Birmingham and in December 1984, then Luton Town manager David Pleat added Harford to his side for a £250,000 fee. In his time at Luton, Harford earned himself two England team caps, making his international debut against Israel in 1988. He also

featured against Denmark in the 1989 fixture

Harford was part of the side that won the Littlewoods Cup in 1988 for Luton against Arsenal. He is often voted the best ever Luton Town player, such is the regard he is held in at Kenilworth Road. He was a key player at Luton until his transfer to Derby County in January 1990 for £450,000. Even after his transfer, Harford managed to help the Hatters in their fight against relegation, as in the last game of the season Derby County played Luton Town, and Luton needed the win to stay up. Harford managed to head the ball from outside his own box, past England goalkeeper Peter Shilton, into his own net as Luton won the game and avoided relegation. Harford then rejoined the Hatters in September 1991 for £325,000, despite competition from Manchester United. Harford managed a credible 12 goals from 29 league games as the Hatters were relegated from what was about to become the Premier League.

Following Luton's relegation, Harford moved on again, this time to Chelsea for £300,000 in August 1992, but despite being the top scorer at the club, Harford was surprisingly sold on again in March 1993, to

his hometown club Sunderland in a £250,000 transfer deal. He lasted just four months at Sunderland, before moving to Coventry City for £200,000 in July 1993. Despite being at the club for 13 months, Harford only made one league appearance, as a substitute, and despite scoring he never featured for the club again.

In August 1994, Harford made his last move as a footballer. He joined Joe Kinnear's Wimbledon side, for £50,000. Harford would go on to make 60 appearances for the Dons, many in midfield, before he moved into a coaching role at Selhurst Park.



Making his move into coaching with Wimbledon, Harford developed his skills before following his old manager Joe Kinnear, back to Luton Town following Luton's relegation to Division 3. Harford helped master-mind the successful promotion season of 2001–02, as Luton stormed to promotion back to the Second Division. Following the 2002-03 season, the club was sold to a new consortium, and Harford and Kinnear were then sacked. Harford was to be offered his job back, but he refused to work under that board. After the owners were forced out, Harford returned to the club as Director of Football, as well as being the first-team coach. Harford helped new manager Mike Newell to a 10th place finish, and his value was proved by then Nottingham Forest manager Joe Kinnear's attempts to make him his assistant manager at Forest. Harford initially rejected the move but in November 2004, despite the contrast of fortunes both sides were displaying, with Forest fighting relegation in the Championship and Luton running away with the League One title, Harford moved onto the City Ground.



Kinnear was to last only a few more weeks at the club before the clubs poor form forced him to leave the club. Harford was then appointed care-taker manager, and he performed admirably despite the problems at the club. Gary Megson was then appointed manager full time in January 2005, and Harford left the club. Out of work for only a short while, Harford teamed up with Andy King at Swindon Town in February 2005, in a deal that was due to run until the end of the 2004–05 season. In April 2005 however, Harford was appointed the new manager of Rottherham United, whose relegation from the Championship at the end of the 2004–05 season had already been confirmed. Harford had an impressive start to his managerial career, but was sacked in

December after a run of 17 games without a win. He was replaced by Alan Knill. Harford finished the season at Millwall, coaching the strikers at the club before their relegation from the Championship at the end of the 2005–06 season.

Harford then joined his former Derby County team-mate Geraint Williams at Colchester United in the summer of 2006, becoming the club's assistant manager. Harford was linked with another return to Kenilworth Road following the sacking of ex-Luton Town manager Mike Newell, but the job instead went to Kevin Blackwell. He left Colchester to become assistant manager at Queens Park Rangers in June 2007, before becoming caretaker after the departure of John Gregory. Harford left QPR after the appointment of Luigi De Canio. In January 2008, Harford was unveiled as the new manager of struggling and cash-strapped Luton Town until the end of the season. He committed to stay at Luton despite the club being docked 30 points in the break before the 2008-09 season

Dean Brill: Luton-born goalkeeper Dean Brill is another young player of whom big things are expected. Dean won the goalkeeper's jersey when boss Hatters boss Kevin Blackwell took over the managerial reigns at Kenilworth Road and despite the Club being relegated from the Championship, he was named Young Player of the Season. Brill joined his hometown club at the age of nine and has progressed through the Centre of Excellence, representing Luton Schools and Bedfordshire County Schools at a variety of age groups. He kept a clean sheet in his Under-19 debut as a 15-year-old in April 2001 and his impressive displays alerted the attention of several bigger clubs, but Luton fought off the competition to secure his signature. A tall, commanding goalkeeper standing at six foot three, Brill is a great organiser whose voice will always be heard throughout a game.

Claude Gnakpa: Claude Gnakpa is a defender capable of playing centre back or full back, who joined on a free transfer in August 2008. Having plied his trade across Europe with Montpellier HSC, Racing de Santander, Deportivo Alaves and FC Vaduz, Claude moved to English side Swindon for a brief spell, before being taken on in July 2007 by Peterborough United. He was a regular in the League 2 promotion winning side, starting 25 league games.

Sol Davis: It was a huge disappointment to Swindon Town, and a coup for Luton, when the highly-rated defender decided to leave the County Ground after his contract expired at the end of the 2001/02 season. Swindon boss Andy King failed in attempts to persuade him to sign a new deal, and Luton swooped for the tough-tackling left back. Davis had joined Swindon as a trainee in the summer of 1998, and made rapid progress through the youth and reserve teams to become a regular in the Nationwide League. Sol scored his first ever goal in professional football during the clubs win over Wrexham in November 2004. He scored again later that season, his only other goal to date, in a win against Bristol City in March 2005. Sol was unfortunately involved in a serious incident during the 2006/07 season when he suffered a stroke on the team bus prior to the Club's visit to Ipswich Town. He was taken into the specialist unit at Addenbrookes Hospital in Cambridge. The squad had been on their way to the Belstead Brook hotel in Ipswich on Saturday when Davis lost feeling in his left side and this was affecting his speech. Sol however made a mirraculous recovery and despite being told by doctors it will take months for him to return, he was back in action and started in the game against Cardiff City on New Years Day, 2007.

Keith Keane: Having made his debut as a 16-year-old in November 2003, Keith Keane went on to enjoy an extended run in the side from February onwards whilst Kevin Foley was out injured. Such was the contribution he made that the return of Foley didn't signal the end of his involvement at first-team level and he finished the season with fourteen appearances under his belt, all this whilst still in the first year of his scholarship. Another of the youth team who regularly appears for the Republic of Ireland at schoolboy level, he joined the Hatters at the age of nine having been scouted in local football, and has made a rapid progression through the club's centre of excellence and youth teams, demonstrating enough potential to convince Mike Newell to give him his first taste of senior action. Keith has featured most prominently on the right of midfield, bursting forward to great effect to provide many goals for himself and his team-mates.

lan Roper: Ian Roper is a central defender with bags of experience

who signed a contract at Luton in August 2008. Roper climbed up the ranks while at Walsall, gaining a reputation of being a tough, no nonsense defender. He made 325 appearances during his 13 year period at the club, where he won promotion on 3 occasions, most recently in 2006/07 as a League 2 champion. George Pilkington: George Pilkington is a highly experienced defender who joined the club on a free transfer in August 2008. Having began

George Pilkington: George Pilkington is a nignly experienced detender who joined the club on a free transfer in August 2008. Having began his career as an Everton trainee, George joined Port Vale in June 2003, after a loan spell at Exeter City, Having started 223 league games for Port Vale, George was highly regarded at the Staffordshire club being named player of the year twice and club captain.

Kevin Nicholls: Kevin Nicholls needs no introduction to most Hatters fans. The hard-working midfielder enjoyed six successful seasons at Kenilworth Road between 2001 and 2006, captaining the side to the League One title in the 2004-2005 season. Nicholls began his career at Charlton Athletic, before moving to Wigan Athletic in 1999, where he made 28 appearances in two years. He moved to Luton in 2001, and in the next six seasons went on to appear 175 times, scoring 30 goals. Following Luton's successful first-season in The Championship and the spirited FA-Cup performances, Nicholls was a player very much in demand. He moved to Leeds United for £700,000 in July 2006 and was made club captain by then boss Dennis Wise. However, his very public fall-out with Wise saw him fall down the pecking order at Elland Road, and the following summer he moved to Preston North End for a fee of £750,000. His time at Preston began encouragingly, however a change in the management team saw his first-team opportunities limited. Kevin was delighted to re-sign for Luton, signing a three-year deal in August 2008 and being named as club captain.

Sam Parkin: Ex-Chelsea trainee Sam Parkin is a forward with a prolific goalscoring record, and choose Kenilworth Road as the place to further his career in August 2006 despite strong interest from other Championship clubs. Unfortunately, Sam's career at Kenilworth Road has yet to get going after a serious injury meant he played only eight games since signing under former boss Mike Newell. After signing for League One side Swindon Town in August 2002, Parkin set the Football League world alight, scoring 67 league goals in 120 appearances. Naturally, his goalscoring talents captured the attention of the bigger clubs, and Parkin signed for Ipswich Town in the summer of 2005 for £550,000. Unfortunately, a broken ankle forced him to miss much of his time at Portman Road, although he still managed to score five goals in 17 Championship appearances during his first season. Following Joe Royle's departure at the end of last season, the new Blues boss Jim Magilton made it clear that Parkin would not get regular football at Portman Road, leaving the player to weigh up his options. After fees were agreed with both Preston and Luton, 25-year-old Parkin had a straight choice of two Championship clubs, but signed a three-year deal at Kenilworth Road, costing the club £340,000. Coincidentally, Parkin arrives at a club to replace an outgoing Steve Howard for the second time in his career, having previously played for Northampton on-loan after they sold Howard to Luton in 2001.

Ryan Charles: An energetic striker who has made a huge impact at Kenilworth Road over the last two seasons. Charles, who has been at Kenilworth Road since the age of nine, had worked his way through the ranks at the Club before scoring 17 goals in his debut season for the Luton Town youth team. He has followed that form up by scoring 12 goals for the youth team this season and his exploits during them two campaigns earned him his first team debut as a second half substitute at Southend in March. He was given his full team debut in the following game against Carlisle before scoring on his home debut against Oldham. Charles had turned down the chance to join local rivals Watford as a youngster

Lewis Emanuel: Lewis Emanuel arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2006 after deciding to leave his home town club Bradford City, the place where the defender started his career. Lewis is a pacy full-back but can also play on the left side of midfield, a position where he started on his league debut for the club. Lewis made over 150 appearances for Bradford in six-years at the club, scoring four goals. In his first season at Kenilworth Road he made 40 appearances, scoring twice.

Asa Hall: Asa Hall is a versatile player capable of playing in midfield or defence. Hall began his football career in Wolverhampton

Wanderers youth system, before signing his first professional contract with Birmingham City in 2004. While at Birmingham he was a regular in the reserve team and was named young player of the year in the 2004/05 season. He also received caps for England at Under19 and Under20 levels. He went on to have loan spells with Boston United, Ashford Town and Shrewsbury Town, starting 13 games for the latter.





Kevin Watson: An experienced central midfielder who joined the Hatters on a free transfer in August 2008 after being released by Colchester United. Watson started his career with Tottenham, making a handful of first team appearances and spending time on loan at Brentford, Bristol City and Barnet. In 1996 he moved to Swindon Town, where he helped assure their Division 1 status, from the County Ground Watson went on to spend three successful years with Rotherham United, where made 109 appearances and captained the Millers to two successive promotions. His influence was noted by then Reading manager Alan Pardew who took him to the Madejski Stadium for a £150,000, where he won yet another promotion. He then joined Colchester United where he started 132 league games and added a fourth promotion to his list of achievements.

He burst into the first team in 2007, and his performances quickly saw him become a fans' favourite at the club. He is strong for his age and technically gifted, and his early promise saw him win call-ups for the England Under-19s squad, scoring on his debut against Turkey in March 2007.

Drew Talbot: Drew Talbot signed

for Luton Town in a £250,000 deal in January 2007 from Sheffield Wednesday as former Hatters boss Mike Newell looked to strengthen his ontions in attack. He made an immediate impact, making one and then scoring the winner against his old club at Kenilworth Road on his home league debut. Originally on the books of Barnsley, Talbot drifted out of football after injury but came back with Sheffield Wednesday's academy in the 2003/04 season. Often coming off the substitutes bench he scored goals in Wednesday's 2004/05 promotion season including one at Cardiff in the League One play off final against Huddersfield. The following season proved a disappointment for Drew as a back injury ruled him out. After his impressive first full season at Hillsborough, he was not to play again until September 2006, where he made a substitute appearance against Derby County in a 2-1 home defeat. During the January 2007 transfer window, Talbot signed a loan-contract with League One promotion-chasers Scunthorpe United before signing at Kenilworth





Paul Underwood: Luton Town fought off competition from a number of clubs to complete the free transfer signing of Paul Underwood from Rushden & Diamonds on transfer deadline day The Wimbledon-born defender



George Beavan: A highly promising central defender who was spotted by former Youth Team coach Marvin Johnson, who initially gave him a trial at the Club.

He impressed tremendously and soon became a consistent member of the Luton Town Youth team during the 2006/07 season. Good in the air and strong in a tackle, George was promoted into the reserve team and a combination of injuries and player sales saw him given an unexpected debut against Bournemouth when, after just six minutes. he came on as a substitute as Keith Keane hobbled off injured. George is predicted to have a bright future in the game by many at Kenilworth

Richard Jackson: Richard Jackson, one of nine summer signings made by Kevin Blackwell prior to the start of the season, had a distinguished career at Derby County. The full-back was the longest serving player at Pride Park prior to completing a signing a two year deal at Kenilworth Road. Jackson joined Derby in March 1999 from Scarborough after playing only 24 senior games for the Seaside club. He made a few Premiership appearances for Derby before he made more of a breakthrough in 2002/03. He became a more permanent player in the side the following year. Jackson was hampered by injuries in the 2004/05 season, but still remained a popular figure at Pride Park. He started five games last season before being released from his contract this summer.

Dean Morgan: Dean Morgan became an instant favourite with Luton fans after his 90th minute winner in the 3-2 victory over Southampton in August 2005. Morgan moved to Kenilworth Stadium from Reading in July 2005 after seeing his opportunities limited at the Madjeski Stadium. The former Colchester striker scored three league goals in 13 starting appearances for the Royals. Morgan, who once had a trial with the Hatters earlier in his career, came through the ranks at Colchester where he scored six goals in 25 appearances, including a 35-yard screamer against Cardiff City at Ninian Park. Dean is a skilful midfielder who likes to get forward at every opportunity.

Paul McVeigh: The capture of Paul McVeigh, the ninth and final signing of Kevin Blackwell during pre-season, came somewhat of a surprise to many Luton Town. At the time of his signature, Luton were in desperate need of a centre-half and talk in the local media was linking defenders with a move to Kenilworth Road. However Blackwell managed to sign this free scoring striker to add further competition to his forward line. McVeigh, who signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road, started his career at Tottenham Hotspur where he made three appearances, before he enjoyed a successful career with Norwich. He joined Norwich in March 2000 on a free transfer and although he took a few years to really establish himself, in the 2002-03 season he was the club's top scorer with 15 goals. McVeigh helped Norwich win promotion to the Premiership the following season and although he played few games for the Canaries at the top flight, he did get on the score sheet at Old Trafford. In the 2005/06 campaign, he was voted Player of the Month for December & January, in a season where he scored eight goals in total. McVeigh began the 2006-07 season on the substitute's bench, though an injury to Darren Huckerby briefly gave him an opportunity to play in the starting line-up although he eventually fell out of favor with boss Norwich manager Peter Grant. During his spells at Tottenham and Norwich, he was capped by Northern Ireland 20 times in total





Shakers History

Shakers in action on....

25th October

1890.... Bury's first recorded game on this day was a Lancashire League fixture played away against Fleetwood Rangers. Goals from Tommy Cooper (3), Bob Conway, George Bourn and Arthur Fielding gave the Shakers easily their best ever result on this day, with a 6-1 victory. **1902....** Bury, missing regular forwards Charlie Sagar and Joe Leeming, lost 1-0 on their away trip to Stoke City. **1913....** Billy Peake grabbed a hat trick for Bury in their 3-1 home win over Bristol City.

1919.... Ted Rodgerson and Billy Ritchie scored the Bury goals in their 2-1 home win over South Shields.

1924... Bury continued their steady start to the season with a 2-1 home win over Notts County, that saw goals from Wally Amos and John Ball.

1930... Bury defeated Preston North End 3-0 at Gigg Lane, with strikes from Robert Pugh, Dave Robbie and John Reid Smith.

1947.... Birmingham City were on their way to winning the Division Two title and on this day beat Bury 2-0 at St. Andrews. Australian cricketer Ken Grieves, who was also the Lancashire wicketkeeper, made his debut in goal for the Shakers, following an serious injury sustained by regular keeper George Bradshaw the previous week, in a collision with Newcastle United's Jackie Milburn.

1950... In a Lancashire Senior Cup game, Bury won 4-1 at Liverpool, with goals from Dave Massart (2), George Hazlett and Harold Bodle.

1952.... Bury manager John McNeil made four changes for the trip to Huddersfield Town, but it had no effect as the Shakers went down 2-0.

1958.... Exactly 50 years ago today Bury played Accrington Stanley at Gigg Lane. Eddie Robertson and Don May made their first appearances of the season as Bury won 3-1, with goals from Don Watson (2) and Tommy Neill.

1960.... Accrington Stanley were again the visitors, this time for a Lancashire Senior Cup game, in which Geoff Tonge scored the only goal of the game for Bury.
1969.... George Jones (2), Ian Towers and Roy Parnell all scored for Bury in a 4-0 win at home to Barrow.

1975.... Making his debut for Bury in their goalless home game with Halifax Town, was on loan striker Malcolm Smith from Middlesbrough.

1977.... Bury drew 1-1 at Millwall in the League Cup 3rd Round, with Ian Robins scoring.





Feature Hang on to this Programme!

The editor of "Programme Monthly & Football Collectable" magazine explains the joys – and financial rewards – of collecting football programmes.

Perhaps the biggest scourge of the hobby of programme collecting – and of many other collectible hobbies too – are reproductions. The existence of fake copies of sought-after and expensive programmes undermines the foundations of the hobby, and presents a real problem for those innocently starting up in the pastime.

eBay has not helped in this respect. While providing new collectors with an easy and cheap method of obtaining programmes, and allowing everyone with an item to sell and an eBay password the opportunity to become – however fleetingly – a programme dealer, there is an inevitable downside to the modern internet-based trading platform.

Having been driven out of the conventional market, many rogue traders have found a refuge in eBay, the ease of moving identities making the auction site's sanctions against miscreants quite ineffective. The other major problem is that items are purchased on the evidence of a scanned image, which often fail to distinguish reproductions from the originals. Of course, eBay's returns and complaints policies provide some comfort, but not everyone will recognise a reproduction when they receive it, and there must be hundreds, if not thousands, of collectors who have purchased items, at considerable expense, without realising that they are reproductions.

The most famous, and expensive, is the 1966 World Cup Final programme. There were two programmes published for the Finals held in England all those years ago; a tournament brochure, with a predominantly green cover, which is quite commonplace and will cost between £15 and £30 today. The programme issued for the final, however, is very much sought after and, naturally, was printed in smaller quantities as it was on sale at only one match (plus via WH Smith's and on mail order) unlike the tournament brochure which was sold at every match prior to the final. As a consequence, the Final programme, in good condition, now sells for around £150.

There are upwards of six known reproductions of this programme. Some of them are marked as such, not always very clearly, at the bottom of the back page. (Watch out for evidence of attempts to erase the tell-tale print in this area.) There was a substantial reprint a few years after the final, shamefully organised by a prominent programme dealer of that

era. The march of time has led this to become quite noticeable, however, as the printer used a quantity of red ink in the mixture of the blue background to the front page, and through time these programmes have adopted a distinctly pink-ish tinge; the originals are in "Chelsea blue"

The most difficult to identify, are two reprints, several years apart, authorised by Wembley Stadium, the official publishers of the original programme. The latter was printed on slightly thinner paper, resulting in a less bulky product than the original, but unless you have an original, it is difficult to identify the imposter.

The saving grace is that there is one characteristic of every single reproduction of this programme; the pattern on the Earl of Harewood's tie (the portrait photograph of the President of the FA is on page 4) is indistinct, while in the original, a pattern can be seen on the "knot".

There are, of course, many other programmes from famous matches which have been reproduced down the years, and only experience and the opportunity to compare original with fake will allow collectors to learn to discriminate. General advice, however, is to decide whether the programme "feels its age"; is the paper 40, 50, 60 or more years old? If it feels quite modern, the chances are it is a reproduction.







Luton Town

Shooting Stars by Leigh Edwa

GORDON TURNER: Long-serving inside-forward Gordon Turner holds Luton Town's all-time goalscoring record. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in March 1950, he featured in Luton's 1951-52 FA Cup run and 1952-53 promotion near-miss. He was leading marksman seven times, including 1954-55 when ever-present as they won promotion to the top-flight, also representing the Football League. Netting 243 goals in 406 League outings for the Hatters, he briefly reunited with Jesse Pye at Wisbech Town in July 1964, then played for Kettering Town, Dunstable and Bletchley. He lived and worked locally until his death in December 1976.

RON DAVIES: Welsh international striker Ron
Davies was Luton Town's leading marksman in
1962-63. Initially with Chester, he twice topped
their goalscoring charts and moved to Kenilworth
Road in October 1962. He impressed with his aerial
strength in a struggling side, netting 21 goals in 32
League games for Luton before joining Norwich
City in September 1963. Moving to Southampton in
August 1966, he was top scorer three times prior to
joining Portsmouth in April 1973. He played for
Manchester United, Arcadia Shepherds, LA Aztecs,
Tulsa Roughnecks and Seattle Sounders, becoming
a soccer coach in Florida.

JOHN O'ROURKE: England U-23 striker John O'Rourke was Luton Town's top scorer in three successive seasons. Initially with Arsenal, he moved via Chelsea to Luton in December 1963 and netted 64 goals in 84 League games while at Kenilworth Road before joining Middlesbrough in July 1966. He starred as they regained Second Division status at the first attempt in 1966-67, then had spells with Ipswich Town, Coventry City and QPR in the top-flight, moving to AFC Bournemouth in January 1974. Later with Poole Town, Johannesburg Rangers, Weymouth, Dorchester Town and Poole again, he has since been a newsagent in Highcliffe.

MALCOLM MACDONALD:

Ace marksman Malcolm Macdonald was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he joined Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Kenilworth Road in July 1969.



He was Luton's top scorer in two consecutive seasons including their 1969-70 promotion success and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before being sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974, he joined Arsenal for £330,000 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury ended his career. He managed Fulham and Huddersfield Town and now works in the media.

BARRY BUTLIN: Striker Barry Butlin was leading marksman as Luton Town regained top-flight status in 1973-74. Signing professional for Derby County in January 1967, he had limited opportunities under Brian Clough and was loaned to Notts County prior to joining Luton for £50,000 in November 1972. He netted 24 goals in 57 League games while at Kenilworth Road before moving to Nottingham Forest for £122,000 in October 1974. Reunited with Clough, he featured in their 1976-77 promotion campaign and joined Peterborough United in August 1977, then played for Sheffield United. He is a financial adviser, living in Chellaston.

BRIAN STEIN: England international striker Brian Stein scored twice in Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading




marksman in Luton's 1981-82 Second Division success and also starred as they were FA Cup

semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991. Voted their 'Player of the Year' for the second time in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall before joining Barnet in August 1992, helping win promotion in 1992-93. His brother Mark also played for Luton.

PAUL WALSH: England international striker Paul Walsh was capped five times while at Luton Town. Signing professional for Charlton Athletic in October 1979, he starred in their 1980-81 promotion success and moved



MICK HARFORD: England international striker Mick Harford played for Luton Town in consecutive Littlewoods Cup finals including their 1988 Wembley triumph. Signing professional for Lincoln City in July 1977, he had spells with Newcastle

United, Bristol City and Birmingham City prior to joining Luton in December 1984. He starred as the Hatters were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88, moving to Derby County in January 1990 and returning to Luton in September 1991. Joining Chelsea in August 1992, he then played for Sunderland, Coventry and Wimbledon. He has since been coach and now manager back at Luton.

TONY THORPE: Striker Tony
Thorpe was leading
marksman as Luton Town
qualified for the Second
Division play-offs in 1996-97.
A former Leicester City
trainee, he reunited with
David Pleat at Luton in August
1992 and was also top scorer in

1992 and was also top scorer in
1997-98. He joined Fulham for £800,000 in
February 1998 and helped them reach the play-offs
that season. Sold to Bristol City for £1,000,000 in
June 1998, he was top scorer three times prior to
rejoining Luton in July 2002 after two loan spells.
He netted 70 goals in 164 League games overall
before moving to QPR in August 2003, then
Swindon, Colchester, Stevenage, Grimsby and
Tamworth.

STEVE HOWARD: Striker
Steve Howard topped Luton
Town's goalscoring charts in
five successive seasons.
Initially with Tow Law, he
joined Hartlepool United in
August 1995 and moved to
Northampton Town for
£120,000 in February 1999. He

starred in their 1999-2000 promotion campaign, joining Luton for £50,000 in March 2001. A key figure as the Hatters won promotion in 2001-02, then the League One title in 2004-05, he scored 95 goals in 212 League outings before being sold to Derby County for £1,000,000 in July 2006. He helped them win promotion in 2006-07 and joined Leicester City for £1,500,000 in January 2008.

concentrate and assess their own individual performance because they think they are doing things right. To Bury fans of a certain age, Steve Johnson is a player with a vintage quality about him. Like his contemporary Craig Madden, he was plucked from non-league and went on to adapt to the rigours of the professional game with ease.

"I'd played in a pre-season game for Altrincham against Bury. The club asked if I'd been offered forms by any other clubs and said that if I hadn't then I shouldn't accept any," he says.

"I was a French polisher by trade but it wasn't a difficult decision to give it up and go full time. It was something I'd wanted to do ever since I was a kid.

"There were a lot of scousers in the team like Alan Woolfall and Brian Stanton. We all used to travel over together for the week then go back to Liverpool on Saturday nights," he reveals.

The first football season to end in the 1980s wasn't all that memorable for Bury. A disappointing campaign saw the Shakers relegated from the third division. Two of the few bright spots came in the consecutive games against already-promoted Blackburn in April and May.

STEVE JOHNSON

Johnson hit a goal often referred to as the hardest shot the fan telling you the anecdote has ever seen in one of the matches. At Ewood Park he bagged the brace to beat the eventual runners-up as Bury fought tooth and nail to avoid the drop. It was a task which was ultimately futile.

Three years later and the Shakers were a win away from reclaiming their place in the third tier. Failure to win against another already-up side, this time Wimbledon, saw Bury fail to clinch what looked a certain promotion place.


"Wimbledon were just the better side on the day but the result was my catalyst to leave, really," he now admits

"I'd enjoyed my time at the club but I didn't always see eye-to-eye with [then-manager] Jim Iley. They were a great set of lads though – me and Craig Madden played well off each other," he explains of the 52 goals he scored in 154 games wearing the V-shaped badge.

Steve's immediate port of call after Gigg Lane was Rochdale. He also went on to star for Wigan before a personally disastrous transfer to Bristol City ("I knew it was a mistake as soon as I signed. I couldn't settle").

A host of spells at other clubs, including two more at Rochdale, followed. In 1989, a short spell in Sweden during England's summer break was an unlikely move brought about by a desire to keep fit. "Their season starts in April so I went for the summer. I made some good friends out there who I still see," he reveals.

Still living in Bury and working at Albany International in Pilsworth, Steve admits he finds it hard to watch football as an ex-pro. "You're kicking every ball out there, I've never lost it. But Bury is the first result I always look for – after Everton!" he concludes.

Supporter's Direct Conference 2008 Report (part 1)

This year's conference took place on Thursday 16th October 2008 at the Queen Elizabeth II Conference Centre in Westminster, London and was sponsored for the third year running by Virgin Media. The conference was attended by over 220 delegates from 107 organisations. The main speaker in the morning plenary was Conservative Shadow Sports and Olympics Minister Hugh Robertson MP, at lunch it was the turn of Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport Andy Burnham MP and in the afternoon Broadcaster and author David Goldblatt, Lord Triesman, the Independent Chairman of The FA and Oliver Scheel, Elected Director of Hamburg

Dave Boyle, the new Chief Executive of Supporters Direct, opened the conference and announced that the Executive Summary of "What is the feasibility of a Supporters Direct Europe?" was to be launched at the conference and also UEFA had continued with the financial support for the next stage in the process. He also stated that Supporters Direct was also on the verge of partnerships with the Rugby League and the Cooperative Movement. It was important in the current economic climate that the trust movement spoke with clarity to achieve real concrete suggestions and solutions, which football authorities could work on. He also stated that he hoped when we met again in twelve months time, what was talked about tody would be happening.

Before introducing the Conservative Shadow Sports and Olympics Minister Hugh Robertson MP, Brian Lomax the Supporters Direct Chairman stated that although some people think Supporters Direct was a product of the Labour Party, it was not aligned to any party and at the last election it had all party support. Supporters Direct was democratically based and welcomed support from all supporters.

Hugh Robertson MP stated that he was the first Shadow Minister to speak at the conference and thanked the organisation on what they had achieved in a short time and encouraged us to go further and faster. He then went on to give a brief résumé of his career in the army before becoming an MP in 2001 and then the Shadow

Minister in 2005, when he took over the post from Colin Moynihan. Since becoming the shadow minister he had visited both Australia and Canada to see how sport was run in both countries. He summed up the work achieved by John Bloomfield, who had been responsible for developing the Australian Sport's Policy as "A good sports policy should be based in sport and not government and that it should not flounder and should be community based" He also said that he wanted to bring together all departments involved in sport together to form one body based on the Australian Model, as currently any sport which wanted to stage a major event had to make presentations to various government departments. He also stated that he wanted to build on the National Lottery and return the funding to the original four causes, which would then lead to an increase in the funding available for community sport.

On the football side he reiterated the cross party support for the work done by Supporters Direct and that he was 100% behind the FA drive for a Fit and Proper Person Act, to ensure that football was run right from the top downwards and back up to the top. Although he broadly supported the idea that a supporters representative should be on all club boards, he stated that it was down to the football authorities to implement it as people in parliament should not run football.

Delegates then attended one of four breakout sessions aimed at improving the services and support offered by Supporters Direct.

How could it be seen as anything else? Such a punishment would have had a detrimental effect before a ball was kicked, and results to date would indicate that the club does not have the ability to overcome such a deficit

All well and good that with Bournemouth and Rotherham United also given a 17 point deduction at the same time, the League has acted in an unprecedented manner, and with that, some hope that the Hatters could still plot an escape route. However, Rotherham look more than capable of picking up the points, as we well know from Tuesday, although Bournemouth less so, and whereas there will always be clubs struggling as the season progresses, the vast gap at the bottom would appear to indicate that unless today's visitors go on an amazing run, this season will end in relegation to the Blue Square.

Whilst most observers will feel for the club, in some ways they have been treated more leniently than others in the past. To quote just two examples, not too long ago, Swindon Town were on the verge of making it into the top tier, only for their financial irregularities to see them demoted to level three, whilst back in the 1960's, Peterborough United were found guilty and told that no matter where they finished in the old Division Three, they would be relegated at the end of that campaign to Division Four.

Those miscreants who created all the problems at Kenilworth Road have long since ridden into the sunset. It could be argued that they should be the one's to be punished. Maybe so, but it was done to ensure that the football club strove to perform at the highest level, so natural justice would suggest that it is the club that should be made to pay the price. Sounds tough, but it is a relevant

The manager at the time is no longer there. The vast majority of the players have moved on, and the aforementioned Directors are nowhere to be seen. Are they suffering? Doubt it

The real victims of this farce are the supporters. It is they who deserve our sympathy. If relegation does occur, then recent demotees will readily confirm that to bounce back into the League is no simple task.

A tough time lies ahead for all Hatters fans. May you all look back on this in a few years time with a slightly different attitude.

Suddenly we are confronted with loads of clubs calling themselves "AFC". What's going on?

Then along pops the newly formed fans club, AFC Liverpool. How on earth Liverpool FC gave their blessing, I do not know


