Bees sting Town

A SPIRITED second-half showters from a narrow defeat against Brentford at Kenilworth Road last night.

Luton boss Mick Harford had made his side fully aware of how important it was to start winning at home and they started brightly, with

Moments later though, a defensive slip let Charlie MacDonald in on goal and keeper Conrad Logan had to make a decent save to stop Brentford taking an early lead.

On 11 minutes, an attack saw Asa Hall dart into a dangerous position inside the final third and, after pulling the ball back to Howells, the youngster fired a shot that needed Bees stopper Ben Hamer to save low to his right

Luton were certainly giving a good account of themselves, but they were almost left to rue some sleepy defending on 22 minutes.

MacDonald was left completely unmarked on the right-hand edge of the penalty area and was unlucky to see his shot flash across Logan and just wide of the far post.

But just before the half-hour mark yet more poor defending by the Hatter was punished as Brentford this time took the lead.

Dean Bowditch cut free down the right and, with Town's marking all at was headed into the net by Elder.
