

can put on the back burner for now, but look forward to a challenge that will give us an opportunity of getting to a Wembley final.



Our first ever meeting with Morecambe Football Club inevitably makes many of us think of our most famous supporter, the comedian who took his stage name from the town of his birth, the one and only Eric Morecambe.

For those of our fans too young to know, Eric Morecambe was one of the greatest comics this country has known, if not THE greatest and certainly my favourite. One internet poll voted him the funniest person of the twentieth century.

Around twenty million viewers would watch his shows with his partner Ernie Wise and their "Morecambe and Wise Christmas Specials" were the highlight of the festive season. His constant references to Luton Town FC were pure magic, as far as I was concerned.

He came to live in Harpenden in the sixties and, with his young son Gary, wanted to watch some football. It wasn't long before they were hooked on nearby Luton Town, so much so he was invited to become a director of the club in 1970 and the good he did for our image is beyond price. To this day, people still largely identify us with the name of Eric Morecambe.

Eric was here in the era of some mighty names in the history of Luton Town. To give you just a few:
Anderson, Aston, Busby, Butlin, Faulkner, the Futchers, Givens, Husband, Hatton, Halom, Macdonald, Nicholl, Jim and John Ryan, I could go on for ever!

We frequently had crowds of over 20,000, played some exhilarating football under Alec Stock & Harry Haslam and had one testing season in the top flight. Eric left the board in 1975, but remained a supporter until his death in 1984.

Personally, I met him on a few occasions, but I have particularly happy memories of a wonderful morning I spent with him on ITV breakfast television, TV-am, in 1984. He was with us for the best part of two hours and he was pure gold. It started off with my handing him the previous night's programme from our game at West Ham, because I knew he hadn't been.

"Thanks," he said, "I shall treasure that!" and then lobbed it over his shoulder in a superb show of disdain! After about three quarters of an hour on the show, I asked him, on air, if he was happy to stay a bit longer. "Stay a bit longer?" he said. "I could marry you!"

And so it went on, a hilarious morning, though there was also the more sombre side, as we talked about his long-standing heart problems. He'd had a heart attack 15 years previously when he was only 42 and then open heart surgery in 1979, but now he seemed absolutely fine. So tragic then that he collapsed on stage only about a month after our interview and died later that night, May 28th, 1984, aged just 58.


One of the country's greatest referees, Jack Taylor, who was in charge of the World Cup Final in 1974, told me a lovely story about Eric. Jack was hit by a flying penny from the crowd as he left the pitch after one match at Kenilworth Road. It cut his face and he had to have six stitches. Eric went to see him to asked if he was OK and made sure he wasn't going to report us. "Good, "said Eric." Now can I have my penny back?"

As we welcome our visitors to Kenilworth Road today, we treasure happy memories of the great man who grew up there. How he would have loved this fixture!


I know a bit about Morecambe from my time with Preston, we used to play them preseason and we also played in them in the League Cup — when they beat us — so I know what they are about.







Morecambe visit Kenilworth Road today in 17th place in the League 2 table having taken 21 points from their 20 matches this season.


Their 1-0 victory over Darlington last Saturday was only their fourth of the campaign and their third at Christie Park.

The Shrimps had failed to win in their previous three matches prior to the victory over the Quakers, having lost 1-0 away to Notts County and getting two draws, one away to Bournemouth and the other at home to Exeter.

Prior to their three-match winless streak they achieved their first away victory of the season with a 2-1 win at Chester.

LAST TIME OUT: Today's match will be the first time the two sides have met.





LAST FIVE SEASONS:

Morecambe today visit Kenilworth Road for the first ever meeting between the two sides after the Shrimps' first ever campaign in the Football League culminated in a respectable 11th place finish in League Two last season.

The Shrimps were only promoted to the Conference in 1996 and had always been one of the league's most consistent clubs which led to them finishing runners-up in 2003, a year before the Conference introduced the playoff system.

Two seventh place finishes on the bounce saw the club miss out on the new play-off format by three points in 2004 and one point a year later.

The following season however, Morecambe made the Conference play-offs, finishing fifth, but there was heart break for the Christie Park faithful when they lost out to Hereford United 4-3 on aggregate in the semi-finals.

Their disappointment was short lived, however. The following season a third place finish ensured more play-off drama.

After defeating York 2-1 on aggregate in the semi-finals the Shrimps came from a goal down to beat Exeter 2-1 in the final at Wembley to elevate them to the Football League for the first time in their history.

TheShrimps

Sammy McIlroy began his managerial career at Macclesfield Town in August 2007 guiding them into the Football League as Conference Champions in 1997. A season later they were promoted again to the old Third Division.

The former Manchester United man then went on to manage his home country Northern Ireland and later Stockport County, before he took over as Caretaker Manager at Christie Park in November 2005 following Jim Harvey's sudden heart attack. He guided them to the Play-Off's at the end of the season winning their last five games of the

season, before losing in extra time to eventually promoted Hereford United in the semi finals. He took the job permanently and the following season he became only the second manger to take two separate teams into the Football League – following John Still's achievement with Maidstone and Dagenham.

In a nail-biting season, Morecambe squeezed out Exeter City in a dramatic final at Wembley and last season saw Sammy help the Shrimps achieve a creditable mid table finish, and he will be looking for more progress this season.

Goalkeepers Barry Roche

A goalkeeper who joined the Shrimps in the summer after opting to leave Chesterfield. He was an almost ever present for the Spireites for the past two seasons after moving to Saltergate in 2005 after six seasons with Nottingham Forest. The 26-year-old followed in the footsteps of his Dad to play for Bray Wanderers in the League of Ireland and after impressing at an early

age, Barry joined Leeds United as a schoolboy and was due to sign as an apprentice until Paul Hart moved to Forest and asked him to go with him. He has played every game so far this season.

Defenders Danny Adams

Danny started his career at his home town club Altrincham before being signed by Sammy McIlroy, when he was manager of Macclesfield Town in September 2000. He went on to make 169 appearances for the Silkmen, scoring 2 goals, before moving to Stockport County and then onto Huddersfield Town He made 77 appearances at the Galpharm Stadium before being re-united with his former boss McIlroy in the Shrimps' promotion season. He has proved to be an excellent signing as his experience, tough tackling and often under recognised ball skills made him one of the club's most consistent performers at left back.

David Artell

David joined Morecambe in the

Summer of 2007 on a free transfer after being surprisingly released by Chester City He's an experienced centre half who has played more than 200 Football League games. The 6ft 3ins tall Rotherham-born player began his career at his home town club before moves to Shrewsbury, Mansfield and the Deva Stadium.

Jim Bentley

Morecambe's inspirational skipper who has become a huge fans' favourite since signing from Telford in 2002. lim learnt his trade as a trainee at Manchester City before moving to Telford United at the start of the 1997/1998 season. Bentley spent five seasons at Telford before moving to Morecambe in 2002 and has been an influential figure on and off the field ever since. As well as being a defensive rock he is know to score a share of goals with seven goals last season.

Adam Yates

An attacking full back who can operate on both the left and right, Adam began his career at

Crewe Alexandra and spent time on loan at Halifax Town in the Nationwide Conference. before moving to Leek. He joined Morecambe from Leek Town just before the start of the 2006/2007 season and proved to be the find of the season.

Andy Parrish

A versatile young defender. Andy had been a local college student on non-contract terms with Bury for three years until September 2005 when his life suddenly changed. He was offered a two year professional contract and a week later he was making his full league debut. He played more than 20 games for Bury last season and it was a shock when he was released in the summer. Sammy McIlrov always admired his ability to play almost anywhere along the back and was quick to snap him up on a two-year deal in the summer.

Henry McStay

The former Leeds trainee signed a two-year deal for the Shrimps in April 2008 after some impressive performances in the second half of last season, when he joined on a short term basis. After leaving Leeds he had a spell with Halifax Town in the Conference before spells with Portadown and Antwerp. Henry has unusually played for both the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland junior sides. As well as playing centre half he can also play at right-back.

Ryan McCann

Versatile player who made his name as a member of the Queen of the South team that stormed into the Scottish Cup final against Rangers last season. Ryan started his career with Celtic and was at Parkhead for five years before joining Queens. He turned down the chance to play in Europe to join Morecambe, saying he had "unfinished business" in England after a spell at Hartlepool didn't work out for him earlier in his career.

Midfielders


Fraser McLachlan (below)

The midfielder joined from Mansfield Town on loan during March 2006 and made his move permanent in the close season. Previously played for Stockport County where he made 47 appearances before playing 25 games for Mansfield Town. Last season Fraser's campaign was wrecked by a broken leg, his only start after that came in the final game of the season.

Joined from Hereford United in the summer of 2006 after being an integral part of Hereford United's promotion winning team in 2005-2006, playing in both Play-Off Semi Finals against the Shrimps. Craig started out as a trainee at Walsall before playing for Raith Rovers and Telford United, before joining the Bulls in June 2004. He has been a regular in Morecambe's central midfield for the past two seasons.

Neil Wainwright

An experienced winger, who was snapped up by Sammy McIlroy after being released by Darlington in the summer. The Warrington-born player began his career at Wrexham and despite only making 12 appearances he was signed by Sunderland in a £100,000 move in 1998. After a frustrating period with the Black Cats. where he made only three appearances, he moved to Darlington in the summer of 2001 and went on to make more than 200 appearances for The Quakers.

Stewart Drummond

Drummond started his career with the Shrimps in their Conference days where he came through the junior ranks to become regarded as one of the best players outside of the Football League and was a regular member of the England Non League squad. He finally made the move into league football in 2004 with Mark Wright's Chester City, who had won the Conference that season. He went on to play for Shrewsbury before rejoining the Shrimps in the summer, which delighted the fans.

Michael Carr

IIM BENTLEY

The 24-year-old midfielder joined the Shrimps on a twovear deal from Northwich, Carr is a former Macclesfield player who has spent the last four years at Northwich, playing for the England National

Game XI in his time there. The midfielder has played in League 2 before with Macclesfield, and had a debut he will always remember as he was booked after just 32 seconds and then sent off against Darlington.

Strikers

Wayne Curtis

Morecambe's longest serving player who has been granted a testimonial this season. Wayne was signed from Barrow-based Holker Old Boys towards the end of the 1997/1998 season and scored on his debut away at Dover in that season. Since then has become a regular and consistent member of the squad who has chipped in with some valuable goals.

The striker spent a similar spell with Rochdale last season, scoring scored nine goals in less than 20 appearances, but was left disappointed following Dale's defeat in the Play-Off Final.

The 22-year-old started his career at Bedford Town before moving to Kettering Town and then on to the Posh. He scored a goal for Morecambe on his debut in pre-season and has gone on to score a further six league and cup goals.

When Barry Roche left Chesterfield for Morecambe in the summer, a few eyebrows were raised, after all the Spireites finished just one place off the Play-Offs but he knows it was the right decision:

"I know a lot of people who I spoke to prior to moving doubted what I was doing and didn't necessarily agree with it but I can honestly say it was one of the best decisions that I made.

"I wasn't happy at Chesterfield and unfortunately at times that showed in my performances but since I have moved to Morecambe I have been really enjoying my football again, I am loving going into training every day and I think that has shown in my performances too."

Morecambe currently sit 17th in the League 2 table but just 11 points off the top seven and after losing to strugglers Notts County and then beating high flying Darlington, Roche believes only a lack of consistency is their problem:


"Both performances were chalk and cheese. Against Notts County we were absolutely terrible and we didn't deserve anything from the game but against Darlington, who are a top six team, we could have won by two or three.

"There's no one in this league for the teams to be afraid of. You've seen from the results over the course of the season that anyone can beat anyone, if you can win four or five games on the bounce then you find yourselves nicely set up for the play-off positions.

On paper today's visitors should be favourites but the 26-year-old believes this season the points deductions means the form book has been thrown out of the window. "We know we are going to be in for a very tough game at the weekend and that they are a very good side. We know we have to go there and firstly aim to not lose to make sure that they don't make up any ground on us.

"It's been strange with the teams deducted points because if you look at it and those points hadn't have been deducted then we would find ourselves in a real relegation dogfight.

"If the points hadn't been taken away then I think those three teams would have been vying for the Play-Off places."





The o-o draw away to Wycombe Wanderers will be largely remembered because of a superb performance by Hatters' goalkeeper Conrad Logan.

The 22-year-old, on loan from Leicester City, made several vital saves to help secure a point for Luton away at Adams Park and spoke after the match about his delight at keeping a clean sheet against the league leaders:

"We're happy with o-o, especially myself and the defenders, if we keep a clean sheet away at a place like this then it's all good.

"We all thought we did very, very well. Attacking we could have had a couple of goals and I thought our defending was pretty solid considering they are top of the league."

Despite the Hatters' league position, the team managed to give a good account of themselves, threatening on several occasions and even looking like they might take all three points at one stage. Logan explained how close the team came to snatching a win:

"I think in the first half especially we created a few chances, second half as well we put a few balls across the box and it just needed someone getting onto the end of it or a touch or something.

"Wycombe are a good team. They didn't go 18 games unbeaten in the

league for nothing, but we've got to believe that we're as good as anyone in this division.

"We're at the bottom of the league because of the points deductions but we've got to be matching the teams around the Play-Offs and at the top of the league to get out of it and that's what we're trying to do, and I think we did that today."

The Hatters now go into the busy festive period, high on confidence after several impressive recent performances, and Logan spoke of his optimism of Luton progressing in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy, with the club now within touching distance of a showpiece final at Wembley.

Logan commented, "To get to Wembley would be brilliant. I think everyone deserves it.

The fans especially deserve it as well after what they've been through so hopefully we can push on and get to Wembley."

Although the Irishman looks likely to return to the Walkers Stadium at some point next year, it appears he's struck up a strong bond with the Hatters' faithful, and the goalkeeper was impressed with their support against Wycombe.

Logan said, "They were brilliant, magnificent, they made more noise than the "Wycombe fans and they only had one stand so fair play to them."



The assessment procedure is very thorough and gives the girls information twice a year on the areas that they are performing well in and also provides them with clearly defined information on areas they need to work on to improve.

As is the case with the boys Centre of Excellence and all of the Club's Development Centres the girls are assessed on the TIPS Criteria; which is

Technique Insight and game play Personality Speed and athleticism

Within each of these categories there are a number of more specific sections. For example technique would include receiving, passing, attacking, defending and again within those categories there will be 2 or 3 sub sections. For example; defending would include 1 v 1's, cover, balance and support and tackling.

In total the girls are marked in 36 different areas; their target is to achieve an overall 7 out of 10 in the end of season assessment. The procedure is progressive, so any player that falls short of the required level in the Christmas assessments has the relevant guidance to give them the best possible opportunity to improve and achieve the required marks by the end of the season.

All players within the Centre are provided with their written assessment at our assessment evening where each of the players along with their parents have a 15 minute meeting with the coach to discuss their way forward. The players are encouraged to talk to the staff and be prepared to discuss any areas of the report they are unsure about.

Reports were delivered to all of the groups this week and the feed back so far has been very positive.

The match was played out on a boggy pitch that didn't enhance Luton's style of football, but this is still a match that should have produced a more positive result.





He said, "It's exactly like a Friday or any normal day before a game, whatever the normal routine is that's exactly what we do."

The versatile defender joked, "You've got to be careful with what you eat or you won't be able to move the next day."


Despite the influx of new players at Kenilworth Road this season, Keane described how the club has a warm atmosphere around it:

"I've put it in my mind that that's what happens and I've got used to it, it's just normal routine to me really."



Relegated from the old Division One at the end of the 1974/75 campaign, the Town started off the following season fairly brightly and after four games a place in the leading pack promised much, and hopes were high for an immediate return to the top flight.

Injuries to full-back Steve Buckley and striker Ron Futcher then upset the balance of the side and, when Adrian Alston was sold to Cardiff, the League position deteriorated and by the end of November alarm bells sounded.

Rumours of severe financial problems behind the scenes, due to the players still being on lucrative Division One contracts, as well as the drop in attendances following relegation, started to grow. Talk of the electricity supply being cut off at Kenilworth Road and threats by creditors spread through the streets of Luton.

Strangely, it was a relief when it was finally confirmed that the Town owed their bankers £350,000, although the additional news that a large injection of cash needed to be raised within 28 days or the club would go into liquidation was extremely worrying.

Director Eric Morecambe resigned from the board citing pressure of work, with three others including Chairman Len Hawkins walking out. Manager Harry Haslam was then left with the unenviable

task of needing to sell a player when every other club knew why!

The off-field problems seemed to spur the players into action though, as Orient were beaten 1-o at Kenilworth Road followed by an amazing 5-1 win at Charlton with Peter Anderson, watched by a deputation from Antwerp, scoring twice in what was to be his swansong.

Anderson was the lewel in the crown and a bid of £200,000 from Aston Villa had been turned down the previous season. Now the club were desperate sellers, and Haslam accompanied the player to Antwerp where a bid of £105,000 had been tabled, which was being gradually reduced as the sorry tales of the club's financial position gradually unravelled.

Haslam was under awful pressure, with both hands tied



behind his back, and it was to his credit that he managed to eventually secure a cash deal of £53,000 which effectively saved the club. The fans rallied round with messages of support, and a fighting fund was set up with promises of financial help coming from far and wide including high profile ex-favourites such as Malcolm Macdonald.

The players were also in defiant mood and the next visitors to Kenilworth Road were high flying West Brom, who had won five of their previous six games.

Although the Baggies suffered an early blow when playermanager John Giles was dismissed, they were still a formidable side destined for promotion and it was to the Town's credit that they won an end-to-end contest 2-1.

The game Hull City 1 Luton Town 2 20th December 1975

Confidence was spreading through the playing side and, whereas earlier in the season a trip to Hull would have signalled a nailed on home win, there was now a siege mentality and a never-say-die attitude. The Town took the lead on 24 minutes when skipper Alan West started a move that saw the ball moved slickly through to lim Husband who made no mistake with a firm and accurate left foot shot.

Luton looked comfortable for the remainder of the half and it therefore came as a shock when Alf Wood levelled for the home side just after the interval. Racing 40 yards on to a long free-kick, Wood threw himself at the ball to head home in spectacular fashion.

Stung by this goal the Town surged forward and did not take long in getting back into the lead again. West again started the move, releasing a

brilliantly weighted pass through to winger John Aston who sent over a perfect centre for Andy King to head in. Although Hull stormed forward in search of an equalizer, the Luton defence with Paul Futcher and John Faulkner outstanding, kept everything out and in the last five minutes it was the Town who were pressing forward in an attempt to add to their lead.

It was now four wins in a row for the Hatters who went on to make it seven before suffering a reversal. They had done enough, though, to banish the thoughts of any fear of relegation.

With new owners in place and a squad of players who are proud to wear the shirt and fight for the Luton cause, the future is most certainly bright.

The year began with the club in administration and deducted 10 points but on the pitch the players and fans were all looking ahead to an FA Cup Third Round match with Liverpool at Kenilworth Road.

The then Assistant Manager Sam Ellis described the game as a "godsend for the finances and also for the players, a marketplace for them to show themselves in." With players having not been paid in full and Manager Kevin Blackwell forgoing his own wages so the Youth Team players could buy Christmas presents the full house was much needed, as was the 1-1 draw.

Peter Crouch may have opened the scoring but it was more than Rafa Benitez's side deserved, who

were outplayed for large periods of the game. The home side got their just rewards when John Ame Riise put through his own net, under pressure from David Edwards to earn a replay at Anfield.

"We made a good Premier League side look poor," said Blackwell.

The game proved to be a fantastic advert, not only for the Club but also for the players. By the time of the game at Anfield administrator Brendan Guilfoyle had revealed a deal has been agreed with a consortium. fronted by television presenter Nick Owen, to buy the club.

But the Hatters went into the game on Merseyside with the Manager serving his notice and the sales of Chris Coyne (Colchester) and

David Edwards (Wolves) The return to form of Liverpool, and more importantly Steven Gerrard, ended Luton's hopes. A hat-trick from the Reds skipper along

with goals from Babel and Hypia gave Liverpool a 5-o win. However, Luton's travelling army of over 4,500 showed the kind of support that a club in crisis needs, vocal for the full 90 minutes, they outsung the 5-times European Champions even at 5-0 down. Despite the scoreline, every Hatter walked away from Anfield with a sense of pride.

Manager Kevin Blackwell was releived of his duties just a day later, despite the former Leeds Manager and his staff due to leave on February 9th but there was better news in the boardroom.

The newly formed Luton Town Football Club 2020 Limited made an immediate loan to the administrator and aimed to buy the club the following month. Owen said: "The initial bid revolves around a figure of £10 million, but in the long term the funding is there in a big way.

"In a sense it's a loan then a buy-out and it's a very exciting time. Stability is the first thing - we need to

In came a new manager as well, as Mick Harford returned to Luton for the fifth time.

After two spells at Kenilworth Road as a player Harford has twice had spells on the coaching staff, initially as Assistant Manager under Joe Kinnear and more recently as Director of Football for Mike Newell. Despite the new optimism, a horrendous run of results followed which saw Luton lose 12 games between lanuary and March, a 2-1 reverse

at Carlisle on March 11th leaving them second from bottom of the league. 12 points from safety.

But that was quickly extinguished as six defeats followed and spelt





Brighton came out for the second half in determined mood but the Town defence held firm and the counter attacking continued, as Luton now looked favourites to win the tie.






Despite their draw with the Hatters on Saturday, Wycombe moved six points clear at the top of League Two as all of the Chairboys' nearest title challengers were defeated.



with the mood of the night and the fans were treated to a display of attacking football with goals flying in from all angles.



The score was an incredible 3-3 at half-time with Sunderland taking the lead three times with rocket shots from outside the area and the Hatters responding in kind. It is difficult to believe but both goalkeepers, Graham Horn for the Town and Jim Montgomery for Sunderland, played blinders pulling off at least half a

dozen breathtaking saves each to keep the score down!

The second period did not let up and what it lacked in goals it made up for with fine saves from both goalkeepers once more, as well as many near misses.

The only goal of the half was completely out of keeping with all that had gone on before, with ex-Hatter Vic Halom scuffing a shot past Horn. He looked suitably embarrassed but if



he thought he had spoilt the party he was mistaken as at the end of the game the supporters stormed on to the pitch and would not go home until their heroes had appeared in the main stand to take a bow.

It was then on to the relatively easy task of throwing Eric into the bath!







What's the ground like? At one end is the Spion Kop, a covered terrace for home supporters. Opposite is the small, open Cross Street End terrace. The covered Main Stand is medium sized, and unusual in having its seating area raised above the pitch. The other side, the Compton Street Side, had a lot of work carried out on it during 2002 and this former terrace has now been made all seated. It has an unusual television gantry perched on its roof. It was originally constructed in the early 1920's.

What's it like for away supporters?

Luton supporters will be primarily housed in the uncovered Cross Street Terrace at one end of the ground, where 1,400 supporters can be accommodated. There are also 450 seats available to Luton supporters in the covered Main

Stand. The seats allocated to away fans in the Main Stand are in fact wooden.

Food and drink

Inside the ground you can find the usual football fayre of pies and hot dogs, which are available from the refreshment areas.

Chesterfield has plenty of eating and drinking places within easy walking distance of the ground. For a pre-match pint, Luton supporters have plenty of choice. The Barley Mow in Saltergate and The County across the road come highly recommended along with the Market Tavern in Chesterfield town centre and the Chesterfield Arms, which is a minute walk from the away end.

How to get there by car.

Leave the M1 at Junction 29 and

take the A617 towards Chesterfield. On reaching the edge of the town centre go straight across the first roundabout and then the next, passing the famous Chesterfield Church with the crooked spire on your left. As the road divides, keep to your left, going around an open car park. This road leads into Saltergate, where you will pass the Barley Mow pub on your left and the Town Hall car park, before reaching the ground on your right.

Car parking

There are plenty of car parks in the town centre to choose from, including at the Town Hall (approximately £2.40 for four hours).

Luton's last visit

The Hatters last visit to Saltergate was on Boxing Day in 2004. Enoch Showunmi's late goal earned the Town a 1-0 victory on their way to clinching the League One Championship.

Travel details:

Both the Bobbers Travel Club and the Luton Town Supporters Club are running coaches to Chesterfield.

The Bobbers leave Cranfield at 10am with pick-up points along the way before an 11am departure from Kenilworth Road. The fare is £17 for adults and £14 for juniors and seniors. For bookings telephone 01234 856542.

LTSC leave the Maple Road car park at 11am stopping at Newport Pagnell service station 30 minutes later. The fare is £15 for adults and £13 for concessions. For bookings telephone 07960 567465

However, this successful period has been sandwiched in between two months of poor performances and a failure to pick up points at home or away, has left the Imps in midtable, despite Jackson's pre-season hopes of leading the club to promotion this year.

In a dramatic contrast in fortunes, and a poor run of form which seemed to add weight to the rumour that winning the Manager of the Month award is actually a 'curse', November saw Lincoln fail to pick up a single win in their four league matches. To add insult to injury, the Imps were also knocked out of the FA Cup on home soil against Blue Square Premier outfit Kettering.

Jackson was appointed manager of Lincoln in October 2007, at a time when the club were rock bottom of the Football League. Along with the help of his assistant - and brief caretaker after he was diagnosed with cancer, Iffy Onoura - the Lincolnshire club climbed the table and managed to finish last season in 15th place.

With the Imps struggling to score goals on a consistent basis this season and still searching for an out-and-out goalscorer, their relatively stern defence could be the club's biggest strength on their visit to Kenilworth Road.

In midfield, the club boasts an array of talent sure to ask questions of the Hatters own midfield and defence. Former Leicester City and Wycombe Wanderers man, Stefan Oakes joined the Imps in the summer, and his range of passing is likely to pose one or two problems if their strikers can latch onto the end of his searching balls.


Lee Frecklington is currently the club's joint top-scorer. The 23-year-old central midfielder possesses bags of skill and an eye for goal, and was named in the PFA Team of the Year in 2007.

Upfront, Romanian striker Adrian Patulea is now back from injury after missing several games because of a hamstring problem, and Imps fans will be hoping the 24-year-old will prove to be the goalscorer they've been crying out for. As the current joint top-scorer and an impressive start to his career in England, he might just well be.

Lincoln last travelled to Kenilworth Road in September 2001. It ended 1-1 that day, but the last meeting between the two clubs ended in a 1-0 victory for the Hatters, with the winning goal coming from Matt Taylor, in February 2002.

Over the years, Luton have tended to get the better of their opponents from Sincil Bank, with the Hatters winning in the league 13 times against the Imps, and losing just six league matches.
