A warm welcome to The Arena to Luton Town manager Mick Harford and his team.

They are battling hard to avoid relegation, a situation that they are in not because they are a poor side, but because of the huge points deduction they have faced.

To recover from a position of starting a season on minus 30 points, when it would be easy to crumble, you not only have to show a lot of ability, but also a great deal of character.

Luton have shown both of those qualities, and are therefore in a position where the deficit has been wiped out and they can now push on to try and catch the teams above them.

We pipped Luton 2-1 earlier in the season with a last minute goal from Gregg Blundell. It was a game that could have gone either way, and we learned at first hand that Luton are a good side, who will give us a hard game today.

We go into the game after a fortnight's break following the postponement of last week's fixture at Accrington. What made it particularly disappointing was that the game looked set to go ahead until a hard frost the previous evening.

We weren't the only victims of the weather, so have not lost much ground in the table.

The upshot is that we play today on the back of our home win over Bournemouth a fortnight ago. another game where we snatched victory at the death.

We have won points and lost points right at the end of games this season, and that shows what a tough division this is with teams capable of competing from start to finish.

What pleased me against Bournemouth was the character we showed in never giving up despite being behind for most of the match. When we were awarded the last minute penalty, several players wanted to take it. It was Rob Purdie's job and he put it away, but I was pleased that so many players were prepared to step up to take a crucial kick. In the weeks ahead we will need that character, and desire to take responsibility in games.

Our performance in that game, and in the winless run we had before that, was not of the standard we want, or that of which we are capable.

I think that there are a number of factors behind that apart from the obvious one that finding consistency throughout a long season is very difficult. The pitches are not at their best at this time of year when the winter weather and the length of time the covers need to be on is not conducive to a perfect surface.

But I also think we suffered from having so many loan players who didn't know what their fate would be when their spell here ended. They gave their all for us, but it is a

distraction when you don't know who you will be playing for in the next game - or whether you will be playing at all.

It is an uncertain time of year - just ask Liam Hatch. He played against Bournemouth knowing it may be his last game for us, and also not knowing whether Peterborough would keep him or whether he would move on, and perhaps be playing against us for another League 2 side.

In the event he came back here, an outcome which delights us and pleases him, for he now knows where he will be for the remainder of the season. That stability can only benefit Liam and the team.



You've got to hand it to Luton, they're fighting hard to stay in the Football League.

Our last visitors to the Arena,
Bournemouth, were handed a 17 point
penalty before the season kicked off, but
Luton were given a 30 point penalty.
While the reasons for the penalties are a
bit too long winded to explain here, many
thought that a 30 point punishment for
illegal payments to agents and for
breaking CVA rules was a little too harsh
on Luton, especially as they are now
under the control of a brand new
company, headed by television
personality Nick Owen.

Certainly, the new board thought so, and after they were handed the punishment, they posted a statement on the club website. "It's quite clear that we have made a mistake. We placed our faith in the footballing authorities. We have tried to do everything openly and honestly. Once again, the club suffers from the mismanagement of the past. Once again the faithful supporters are left high and dry. Once again a policy of honesty is not at all recognised by the football authorities who claim they want to clean up the game."

The FA responded; "The deduction was a heavy sanction, as it was intended to be, but was not excessive as a reflection of the seriousness of the breaches and the need to deter such conduct within football clubs."

It would have been too easy for them to shrug their shoulders and meekly await relegation to the Conference, but under manager Mick Harford, they have battled away this season, and they've still got hope in avoiding the drop, especially after beating Lincoln in a thriller at Kenilworth Road at Christmas. They are unbeaten in eight league and cup games coming into today's game.

Harford told BBC Three Counties Radio; "I was really pleased with the effort and commitment of our players, and some of our football was better than the level we're playing at. If we continue to put in performances like that, showing the same commitment allied with the skill we have in the side and with the crowd behind us, then we can still get away from the bottom."

And they reached a psychological landmark on Tuesday night when their 2-2 draw at Chester meant that in terms of points they are now out of the red, and are on zero points for the season, but still fourteen points adrift of safety.

something to shout about, as they reached the southern area final of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy with a 1-0 win over Colchester, to set them up for a two legged game against Brighton. You've got to admire the supporters as well for staying with the club. Even though the Hatters have never been

Conrad Logan, keeper

Conrad is on loan from Leicester City and has been a regular this season in the Luton starting line up. He was on loan last season at Stockport County for whom he made 38 appearances and helped them defeat Rochdale in the League Two play-off final at Wembley.

Dean Brill, keeper

Luton-born Dean won the goalkeeper's jersey when previous Hatters boss Kevin Blackwell took over the managerial reins at Kenilworth Road and despite the club being relegated from the Championship in 2006-07, he was named Young Player of the Season. Dean joined his hometown club at the age of nine and progressed through the Centre of Excellence, representing Luton Schools and Bedfordshire County Schools at a variety of age groups.

Claude Gnakpa, defender

Claude is capable of playing centre back or full back, and joined the Hatters on a free transfer in August 2008. Having plied his trade across Europe with Montpellier HSC, Racing de Santander, Deportivo Alaves and FC Vaduz in Liechtenstein, Claude moved to Swindon Town for a brief spell, and then to Peterborough United in July 2007 where he was a regular in the League 2 promotion winning side, starting 25 league games. He scored Luton's goal in the 2-1 home defeat by Darlo.

Sol Davis, defender

It was a huge disappointment to Swindon Town, and a coup for Luton, when the highly-rated defender decided to leave the County Ground after his contract expired at the end of the 2001/02 season. Sol scored his first ever goal in professional football during the club's 5-1 win over



Wrexham in November 2004. After suffering a stroke in 2006, he made a miraculous recovery and despite being told by doctors it would take months for him to return, he was back in action and started the game against Cardiff City on New Year's Day, 2007.

Ed Asafu-Adjaye, defender

Ed is in his second year as a professional having made significant progress through the club's youth setup. The full-back, who spent a short time on-loan at non-league side Walton & Hersham, made the breakthrough into the first team under former boss Mike Newell, when the club was stretched to the limits through injury and suspension. Although the youngster was an unused sub for three matches, youth coach Marvin Johnson gave Ed a glowing reference to incoming boss Kevin Blackwell, who gave him a oneyear contract.

Ian Roper, defender

lan is a central defender with bags of experience who joined the Hatters in August 2008. Ian climbed the ranks at Walsall, gaining a reputation of being a tough, no-nonsense defender. He made 325 appearances during his 13




year period at the club scoring eight goals. He won promotion on three occasions, won the Player of the Year award in 2003 and won a League 2 championship winners medal after the Saddlers' success in 2006/07. He scored in successive games against Chesterfield and Lincoln at Christmas.

Lewis Emanuel, defender

Lewis arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2006 after deciding to leave his home town club Bradford City where he started his career. Lewis is a pacy full-back but can also play on the left side of midfield, a position where he started on his league debut for the club. Lewis made over 150 appearances for Bradford in six years at the club, scoring four goals. In his first season at Kenilworth Road he made 40 appearances, scoring twice.

George Pilkington, defender

George is a highly experienced defender who joined the club on a free transfer in August 2008 from Port Vale. Having begun his career as an Everton trainee, he joined Port Vale in June 2003, after a loan spell at Exeter City. He made 223 league starts and 11 goals during his time at Vale Park where the highly-regarded defender was named Player of the Year twice.



Michael Spillane, defender

The Irish youngster joined the club on a season-long loan from Norwich City in August 2008, and is equally at home in defence or midfield, having playing in both positions in recent seasons for the Canaries. The Jerseyborn Republic of Ireland U19 international is tipped to have a bright future ahead of him in the game and is highly thought of by the Carrow Road coaching staff.

Jake Howells, defender

The young left back made his first team debut as a second half substitute in May 2008. This season he has pushed on and has been an important part of the first team squad, making his full debut in the Hatters' 1-1 draw at Bradford City.

Keith Keane, midfielder

Keith made his debut as a 16-year-old in November 2003, and went on to enjoy an extended run in the side finishing the season with 14 appearances under his belt, all in the first year of his scholarship. Since then, he has become a regular in the side, and has now made over 100 appearances for the club.

Rossi Jarvis, midfielder

Rossi is an adaptable player who can play on the left or right hand side of defence or midfield, and joined the Hatters in August 2008 following his release from Norwich City. The midfielder came through the Canaries' youth system, becoming the youngest player to appear for the reserve team at the tender age of 14. He went on to spend loan periods at Torquay United and Rotherham United before coming to Kenilworth Road, where he has been a regular.

Asa Hall, midfielder

As a joined the Hatters on a free transfer in August 2008. He began his

football career in Wolves' youth system, before signing his first professional contract with Birmingham City in 2004. While at the Blues he was a regular in the reserve team and was named young player of the year in the 2004/05 season. He also received caps for England at Under-19 and Under-20 levels and went on to have loan spells with Boston United, Ashford Town and Shrewsbury Town, starting 13 games for the Shrews.

Kevin Nicholls, midfielder

The midfielder enjoyed six successful seasons at Kenilworth Road between 2001 and 2006, captaining the side to the League One title in the 2004-2005 season. He began his career at Charlton Athletic, before moving to Wigan Athletic in 1999, where he made 28 appearances in two years. He moved to Luton in 2001, and in the next six seasons went on to appear 175 times, scoring 30 goals.

He moved to Leeds United for £700,000 in July 2006 and was made club captain by then boss Denis Wise. However, his very public fall-out with Wise saw him fall down the pecking order at Elland Road, and the following summer he moved to Preston North End for a fee of £750,000. Kevin was delighted to resign for Luton, signing a three-year deal in August 2008 and being named as club captain.

lan Henderson, striker

The Thetford-born striker joined the Hatters in January 2009 following his release from Northampton Town. Ian is a product of the Norwich City youth academy where he made the grade to make 79 appearance for the Canaries. After breaking into the first team at Carrow Road he won a First Division championship medal in 2004. A serious injury sustained in 2006 kept him out of action for eight weeks with ligament damage and after falling down the

pecking order at Norwich, was sent on-loan to Rotherham. At the beginning of the 2007-08 season, he was released by the Canaries and was snapped up by Northampton.

Ryan Charles, striker

Ryan has made a huge impact at Kenilworth Road over the last two seasons. He worked his way through the ranks at the club before scoring 17 goals in his debut season for the Luton Town youth team, and then another twelve the following season. He made his first team debut as a second half substitute at Southend in March 2008, and scored on his home debut against Oldham a week later.


Chris Martin, striker

Chris is currently on a season-long loan from Norwich City, Martin had played 30 times for the Canaries, scoring five times. He burst into the

first team in 2007 and his early promise saw him win call-ups for the England Under-19 squad, scoring on his debut against Turkey in March 2007. Up to the end of the year, he had scored six goals for the Hatters, including two in the win over Lincoln City.

Drew Talbot, striker

Drew signed for Luton Town in a £250,000 deal in January 2007 from Sheffield Wednesday as former Hatters boss Mike Newell looked to strengthen his options in attack. He made an immediate impact, making one and then scoring the winner against his old club at Kenilworth Road on his home league debut. Often coming off the substitutes' bench, he scored several goals in Wednesday's 2004/05 promotion season including one at Cardiff in the League One play off final against



Hartlepool. During the January 2007 transfer window, he was on loan to League One promotion chasers Scunthorpe for three games before moving on to Kenilworth Road.

Wayne Andrews, striker

Wayne began his career with Watford, making his debut for the Hornets in 1996 where he went on to make 28 league appearances scoring four goals. He was released in 1999 where he moved into non-league football with spells at St Albans City, Aldershot Town and Chesham United before being spotted and signed by lain Dowie for Oldham Athletic in the summer of 2002.

Spells at Colchester, Crystal Palace, Coventry, Sheffield Wednesday, Bristol City and Leeds followed, before he was released in the summer. In October 2008 he signed for Luton and made his debut against Accrington Stanley.

Tom Craddock, striker

Originally a defender, 22 year old Tom developed into a promising forward who did well at youth and reserve levels with Middlesbrough. He was a team mate of Darlo's Jason Kennedy when Boro won the 2004 FA Youth Cup and progressed to first team level. He has previously had spells on loan with Wrexham and Hartlepool United.

Paul McVeigh, striker

Paul, who signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in 2007, started his career at Tottenham Hotspur where he made three appearances, before he enjoyed a successful career with Norwich. He joined Norwich in March 2000 and in the 2002-03 season he was the club's top scorer with 15 goals. He began the 2006-07 season on the subs' bench, and eventually fell out of favour. During his spells at



Tottenham and Norwich, he was capped by Northern Ireland 15 times in total.

Kevin Gallen, striker

Kevin established himself as something of a legend at QPR, scoring 97 goals for the R's in two spells spanning nearly 14 years. He joined Huddersfield in 2000 and after 10 goals in 30 starts for the Terriers, he moved across Yorkshire to join Barnsley the following summer, but the call of West London saw him return to QPR within a few months.

He scored nine goals in 16 league starts for MK Dons before joining the Hatters on loan in December 2008.

Mick Harford, manager

Since hanging up his boots, 49 year old Mick Harford has twice had a spell on the coaching staff at Luton, initially as assistant manager under Joe Kinnear and then director of football for Mike Newell.

During his first spell at the club he helped mastermind the Hatters'



promotion back to the Second Division in 2001/02 and as director of football and first team coach he played his part in building the side that secured promotion to the Championship, running away with the League One title during 2004/05.

He left the Hatters in November 2004 to be reunited with Joe Kinnear at Nottingham Forest. After Kinnear's departure, he left Forest in January 2005, and had an eight month spell in charge of Rotherham United. He had a short spell coaching the forwards at Millwall before he linked up with his former Derby County team-mate, Geraint Williams at Colchester United in summer 2006, as his number two, a position he held for a year before the opportunity arrived to join John Gregory - again as an assistant manager - at Queens Park Rangers in June 2007. Following the dismissal of Kevin Blackwell in January 2008, Mick returned to Kenilworth Road to take charge of first team affairs.

Good afternoon and welcome to this afternoon's game. I'm Raj Singh, the vice chairman, and through this column, I'd like to give you a regular insight into some of the things that are going on at the Arena. and what we're doing to improve the club, not only on the field, but off it as

I've been watching Darlo now for over a year, and I must admit that supporting Quakers has gradually grown on me. Maybe I'm not as hardened as some of you veterans out there, but in the last year I've certainly experienced the highs and lows of supporting the club. Hopefully, we'll have many more highs than lows in the next few months, and I'm sure you'll agree that we'd love to end the season on a high by winning promotion to League One.

I'm working hard with Dave Penney to strengthen our squad for a promotion challenge. Dave and I have had several chats about which areas of the team to strengthen, and one breakthrough Dave has managed to make is to persuade Peterborough United to let us have Liam Hatch on loan for the rest of the season.

Peterborough were hoping to sell Liam to other clubs during the transfer window, but we persuaded them that it would be best for all concerned if Liam. finished the season with us on loan.

There is still a fortnight left of the transfer window - it doesn't close until February 2nd - and we will try and back Dave as much we can, whether he is seeking loan or permanent signings. From a personal point of view, I'm determined to enjoy success here at the Arena, and end our long spell in the bottom division. Many fans will remember the last time Darlo were in a higher division way back in 1992, and I'm sure that you would love the club to return there.

We are also working on several projects off the field to increase our commercial income. It's a much used cliché, especially here at the Arena, but the club has to maximise its facilities as much as possible, not just on matchdays, but also on every other day in the week.

We believe that our commercial revenue is well below what it should be, and we're working on different strategies to increase it. We have some excellent conference and banqueting facilities for many different occasions - for example, only recently we hosted an engagement party and a conference - and those facilities are also competitively priced.

No matter what the occasion, event or celebration is, we believe that we can supply the facilities.

We are strengthening our off the field team also. Christine Balford, our commercial director, intends to appoint two more people to her team. whilst we have also brought in Graham Fordy, who has accumulated a huge amount of commercial football experience from his Middlesbrough days, and hopefully he can pass it on to us in some way.

We are also planning for next season, and we're working on different levels of sponsorship packages. The club doesn't have enough sponsors in many ways - for example, executive boxes, programme advertising, matchballs - and that is something we have earmarked as one of our top priorities.

We're also taking on board your responses to the season ticket surveys, and we hope to announce something on that topic soon.

Enjoy the game, and let's hope for three points today.

There were certainly plenty of talking points after Quakers twice came from behind to draw 2-2 against the second placed Shakers at Gigg Lane.

There was plenty of confusion as well with some of the refereeing decisions, and on top of that, those people watching for the latest scores were confused by an early scoreflash which read "Bury 0 Darlington 1 -Brown" which made some Darlo fans at home think that keeper Simon Brown had somehow put Quakers into the lead.

Instead, it was an uncharacteristic clanger by the keeper, when he carried Efe Sodje's lob over his goalline on 31 minutes, that gave Bury the advantage. But Darlo were unhappy with an incident just before that, when referee Graham Salisbury overruled his assistant and gave Bury a free kick that led to the goal.

Quakers levelled on 44 minutes, when lan Miller, who slotted in well at the back in place of the suspended Alan White, charged into the six yard box to head Seb Carole's perfectly flighted free kick past Bury keeper Wayne Brown for his first goal of the season.

There was also a large degree of sympathy for Miller ten minutes after half time, when he raced back into his own box, and in the eyes of many spectators, appeared to cleanly win the ball from Bury's Glynn Hurst, but instead the referee pointed to the spot from where Andy Bishop scored. Quakers thought there might have been a double whammy as they feared a red card for a professional foul as Miller was the last man, but the referee took no further action.

Quakers deservedly levelled for the second time on 72 minutes when Richie Foran turned quickly on the edge of the six yard line, and volleyed

into the bottom corner for his third goal for Quakers since moving on loan from Southend.

There was plenty of drama after that, with the referee at the centre of it. Bury claimed that a shot by sub Andy Morrell hit the crossbar and bounced down over the line - but with the help of his assistant who was bang in line with play, the ref waved play on - and the home side also had frantic appeals for handball turned down in the last minute.

Both sets of fans made their feelings known to the referee at the end of the game, and Darlo manager Dave Penney certainly would have liked to have made his innermost feelings public, but wisely decided not to. "I can't say too much about the officials, but we weren't happy with a lot of the decisions, even their manager wasn't. But it was a good point, because Bury is a difficult place to go to and we wanted to make sure that we got something."

Bury manager Alan Knill said: "Ten months ago, for us to draw 2-2 against a team like Darlington was impossible. They (Darlington) came here soon after I came here and won comfortably, but now we can compete with the better teams in this league. I thought we were quality against a good Darlington side. They were the favourites to go up, and I thought we were excellent.'






The 16 and 17-year-olds at the club have become one of the first groups in the country to take part in a specially designed driving awareness course aimed at improving the country's footballers' driving skills

All good strikers are greedy - even those who have been out of action for eight months.

So when Pawel Abbott came off the pitch in the last home game having scored his first goal of the season, and set up a dramatic win, he was only partially satisfied.

"I should have had two or three goals," he said. But even so he couldn't hide his delight having finally recovered from a string of injuries that had sidelined him since last April.

The pain and frustration of hamstring, knee and ankle injuries was swept aside when he latched onto the ball just outside the Bournemouth penalty area, made space for himself and clipped a shot inside the far post.

Seven minutes later Rob Purdie popped in a stoppage time winner from the penalty spot, completing a good day for the team, and a day bordering on the great for Pav.

"To score in front of the home fans and go on to win the game is what I have missed for months," he said. "When you are out of action you desperately want to feel that emotion of scoring and winning. You can't

"You go home after the game and it feels like a Saturday night should feel for a footballer.'

But Pav has the experience to stay level headed, and the adrenalin rush is only temporary, for he said: "The main thing is to concentrate on preparing for the next game."

And that in itself is a good feeling, when for so long all he had in his immediate future was long hours in the gym building up strength and stamina.

However as he dealt with the injury and worked on his recovery, even when he was way short of his best physically, he still felt mentally strong.

"There was never any doubt in my mind that after the operation I would be back," he revealed, "I snapped two of the main ligaments that stabilise my ankle. The surgeon said that it would heal itself, but would take time.

"He also said that there would be the secondary problems that go with these injuries, and if the ligaments go again it could be the end of my career. Despite being told that, I was all right mentally.

"Everybody has been reassuring, especially our physio Will Short. He discussed the rehabilitation programme with me, and gave me targets. I started hitting them and that gave me confidence.

"I don't think of myself as injury prone. Before I joined Darlington I had only had one operation, to cure a hernia, and that kept me out for only four or five weeks.

"I have to be careful this time and ease my way back gradually, trying to play a bit longer in each game until I'm fully match fit again."

In his first game back he came on after 74 minutes, and when asked if it was good to get quarter of an hour under his belt, he was quick to point out with a grin: "Twenty minutes including stoppage time!"

Against Bournemouth it was 45 minutes (49 including stoppage time). which is a little more than he expected, though he came through not only unscathed, but with the goal.

"Fozzie came up out of defence, and was hard to pick up. You don't get many centre backs who do that and it split the Bournemouth defence. The ball fell nicely to me and I managed to hit the target.

"Now I want to go on a run. The first goal is always important, but I want to quickly build on that and score several more. It will be down to how quickly I get fully fit, because I don't think that players lose their touch, even after a long spell out of action.

"I had worked with the ball in training for a while before I played in the Chesterfield game, and I never felt that my ability would go. The only way to get match sharpness is to play games, but I always feel that if I get a chance, I can score.'

And while Pay wants to add to his goals tally - he once bagged 27 in a season for Huddersfield - for his own sake, he also wants to repay manager Dave Penney, his teammates, and the Darlington fans.

"The manager has never rushed me, and it helped that he told the media and fans to forget about me until I was back. It was right that I should be out of the spotlight while I got fit.

"The players have supported me, and the fans have been brilliant. To hear the cheer when my name was announced before the Chesterfield game, and when I came on. was special.

"I have a lot to prove to the fans. I want to be their hero, and to do that I have to keep on top of the injuries. stay fit and score goals

"When you miss pre-season it's hard to catch up, and there is always the danger of letting the adrenalin take over and then over doing it. That's why I have to be careful - but I'm getting there."

While battling his way back Pav has never lost sight of the bigger picture, which is trying to win promotion.

"We know what sort of a team we are when everyone is fit. We should be up there at the top and that is what we are aiming for. It's not about the past for me or the team, but the future."



Shrewsbury Town v Darlington Saturday 24th January 2009 3pm

The Shrews' new 10,000 all-seater stadium, the New Meadow ground - or Prostar stadium as it's called commercially - is two miles from the town centre.

The club moved there for the start of the 2007-2008 season, after saving farewell to Gay Meadow after 97 years. The old ground, alongside the Severn, has been sold for housing, although the new residents might have to be wary of floodina!

Away fans are in the North Stand behind the goal and matchday admission for adults is £16, with £11 for OAPs students and disabled, and children £11. £1 off if sold in advance.

How to get there:

town

Junction 9 of the M6, onto the M54. head west then onto A49 for 35 miles, then left onto A41 towards Wolverhampton, join A49 again after a few miles and right onto A5112, left after 1.5 miles, left again onto A528 into the

Alternatively, you can travel towards Chester on the M56, and then take the M53, A55, A483 past Wrexham, and then join the A5 at Oswestry. You follow the A5 to Shrewsbury and the A5112 turnoff is on the left. The postcode of the ground for satnays is SY2 6ST.

Parking: Stadium parking is very limited to permit holders, disabled and supporters' coaches only.

Shrewsbury have advised us that Darlington fans should use the park and ride at the Shirehall Car Park, London Road, Shrewsbury. Entrance to this site is off London Road. From the A5 East and West bound at Emstrey Island, take the A5064 along London Road. Before you reach the roundabout the car park is on your right-hand side. Proceed on foot to the front of the Shirehall where buses will take you to the Stadium.

Buses from this site to the stadium will operate from 13.00, with the last bus leaving at 14.30. Parking at the site is free but a charge of £2.50 per person will be made for the return journey.

Immediately after the match buses will leave from the back of the South Stand for the return journey to The Shirehall.

A shuttle bus service (Tanat Valley) runs from the town's main bus station in Raven Meadows (a short walk from the railway station) in the town centre, starting at 1 pm until 2.30pm costing adults £3 return, children £2 return. The first return service will leave the stadium at 5.05 pm.

There are also service buses from the bus station: number 25 (every 15 minutes, return journey from top of Moneybrook Way), number 16 (every 30 mins, stopping at Hereford Road). number 23 (every 30 mins, to Reabrook), also an hourly 544/546 stopping at BP Garage and Sainsbury's.

Attendances boosted in family areas

The Football League's 'Enjoy the Match' campaign has had an immediate and positive impact upon the behaviour of fans on matchdays. This has helped to produce a significant rise in attendances in family areas between August and December 2008.

Attendances in family areas are up 12%, compared to a rise in total crowds of 3% across League football as a whole. This has generated more than £1.5m in additional ticket sales.

The Enjoy the Match campaign was launched at the start of the 2008/09 season. It aims to encourage even more families to attend matches at their local League club by creating a family

friendly environment at grounds. This includes the eradication of abusive language and aggressive behaviour from family areas. Of The League's 72 clubs, 68 have already pledged their support to the campaign.

Darlington FC fully supports the aims of the "Enjoy the Match" initiative, and encourages families to attend games in a friendly and fun atmosphere. We condemn the use of foul and abusive language and anti social behaviour, not just in our family area, but also in the whole of the stadium.

If you experience anti-social behaviour in our family area, please speak to a steward in confidence.

Recent research shows support for the

campaign is widespread, with 91% of fans agreeing that by eradicating abusive behaviour, Football League matches are more appealing to families, and consequently 95% agreed that the 'Enjoy the Match' campaign is important. 65% of fans who are aware of the campaign feel it has already made a difference to behaviour in family areas.

Commenting on the results. Football League Chairman, Lord Mawhinney, said: "These findings are encouraging. They show that fans support our efforts, both to get more families attending club games, and also to grow the supporter base.

"Our aim is to build the next generation of Football League supporters and this initiative is a positive step in that



"I can categorically state that I have never, whilst I have been contracted to this club, applied for any jobs. I want everyone to know that I am 100% committed to the club, to the board, to the players and to the supporters.

"I would want also to assure everyone that we are totally focussed and working towards our goal of achieving the success that everyone at Rochdale wants.

Football historian Leigh Edwards profiles ten post-war Luton Town goalscoring favourites!

Gordon Turner

Long-serving inside-forward Gordon Turner holds Luton Town's all-time goalscoring record. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in March 1950, he featured in Luton's 1951-52 FA Cup run and 1952-53 promotion near-miss. He was leading marksman seven times, including 1954-55 when ever-present as they won promotion to the top-flight, also representing the Football League. Netting 243 goals in 406 League outings for the Hatters, he briefly reunited with Jesse Pye at Wisbech Town in July 1964, then played for Kettering Town, Dunstable and Bletchley. He lived and worked locally until his death in December 1976

Ron Davies

Welsh international striker Ron Davies was Luton Town's leading marksman in 1962-63. Initially with Chester, he twice topped their goalscoring charts and moved to Kenilworth Road in October 1962. He impressed with his aerial strength in a struggling side, netting 21 goals in 32 League games for Luton before joining Norwich City in September 1963. Moving to Southampton in August 1966, he was top scorer three times prior to joining Portsmouth in April 1973. He played for Manchester United, Arcadia Shepherds, LA Aztecs, Tulsa Roughnecks and Seattle Sounders, becoming a soccer coach in Florida.

John O'Rourke

England U-23 striker John O'Rourke was Luton Town's top scorer in three successive seasons. Initially with Arsenal, he moved via Chelsea to Luton in December 1963 and netted 64 goals in 84 League games while at Kenilworth Road before joining Middlesbrough in July 1966. He starred as they regained Second Division status at the first attempt in 1966-67, then had spells with Ipswich Town, Coventry City and QPR in the top-flight, moving to AFC Bournemouth in January 1974. Later with Poole Town, Johannesburg Rangers, Weymouth, Dorchester Town and Poole again, he has since been a newsagent in Highcliffe.

Malcolm Macdonald

Ace marksman Malcolm Macdonald was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he joined Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Kenilworth Road in July 1969. He was

Luton's top scorer in two consecutive seasons including their 1969-70 promotion success and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before being sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974, he joined Arsenal for £330,000 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury ended his career. He managed Fulham and Huddersfield Town and now works in the media, as well as being involved with

Northern League club North Shields.

Barry Butlin

Striker Barry Butlin was leading marksman as Luton Town regained top-flight status in 1973-74. Signing professional for Derby County in January 1967, he had limited opportunities under Brian Clough and was loaned to Notts County prior to joining Luton for £50,000 in November 1972. He netted 24 goals in 57 League games while at Kenilworth Road before moving to Nottingham Forest for £122,000 in October 1974. Reunited with Clough, he featured in their 1976-77 promotion campaign and joined Peterborough United in August 1977, then played for Sheffield United. He is a financial adviser, living in Chellaston.

Brian Stein

England international striker Brian Stein scored twice in Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading marksman in Luton's 1981-82 Second Division success and also starred as they were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991. Voted their 'Player of the Year' for the second time in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall before joining Barnet in August 1992, helping win promotion in 1992-93. His brother Mark also played for Luton.

Paul Walsh

England international striker Paul Walsh was capped five times while at Luton Town. Signing professional for Charlton Athletic in October 1979, he starred in their 1980-81 promotion success and moved to Luton in July 1982. He was 'Player of the Year' in 1982-83 and leading marksman in 1983-84, netting 24 goals in 80 First Division games for the Hatters prior to joining Liverpool in May 1984. Helping to win the League Championship in 1985-86, he

ipined Tottenham Hotspur in February 1988 and was an FA Cup winner in 1991. Later with Portsmouth and Manchester City until injury ended his career, he is now a football agent.

Mick Harford

England international striker Mick Harford played for Luton Town in consecutive Littlewoods Cup finals including their 1988 Wembley triumph. Signing professional for Lincoln City in July 1977, he had spells with Newcastle United, Bristol City and Birmingham City prior to joining Luton in December 1984. He starred as the Hatters were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88, moving to Derby County in January 1990 and returning to Luton in September 1991. Joining Chelsea in August 1992, he then played for Sunderland, Coventry and Wimbledon, He has since been coach and now manager back at Luton.

Tony Thorpe

Striker Tony Thorpe was the leading marksman as Luton Town qualified for the Second Division play-offs in 1996-97. A former Leicester City trainee, he reunited with David Pleat at Luton in August 1992 and was also top scorer in 1997-98. He joined Fulham for £800,000 in February 1998 and helped them reach the play-offs that season. Sold to Bristol City for £1,000,000 in June 1998, he was top scorer three times prior to rejoining Luton in July 2002 after two loan spells. He netted 70 goals in 164 League games overall before moving to QPR in August 2003, then Swindon, Colchester, Stevenage, Grimsby and Tamworth.

Steve Howard

Striker Steve Howard topped Luton Town's goalscoring charts in five successive seasons. Initially with Northern League club Tow Law, he joined Hartlepool United in August 1995 and moved to Northampton Town for £120,000 in February 1999. He starred in their 1999-2000 promotion campaign, joining Luton for £50,000 in March 2001. A key figure as the Hatters won promotion from League Two in 2001-02, then the League One title in 2004-05, he scored 95 goals in 212 League outings before being sold to Derby County for £1,000,000 in July 2006. He helped them win promotion in 2006-07 and joined Leicester City for £1,500,000 in January 2008.





Frank Tweddle, looks back at the previous visits of today's opponents

We welcome Luton Town to the Arena for the first time this afternoon and indeed this is only their sixth visit to Darlington in total as they have only ever played three league and two cup games here before.

The last time we saw them here in town was in January 2002 (with Joe Kinnear as their manager) when two late goals from substitute Mark Sheeran gave us a 3-2 victory after former Hartlepool striker Steve Howard had given the visitors the lead on thirteen minutes. We equalised through Gary Pearson on the half-hour but French midfielder Jean-Louis Valois. signed from Lille, put the second-placed 'Hatters' back in front. Then goals in the eighty-first and eighty-eighth minutes from super-sub Sheeran gave us our first win of the new year.

Since then, Luton have experienced a roller-coaster ride up and down the Football League after winning automatic promotion in 2002 and spending three vears at the next level, before winning the Division One title in 2005. Then they spent two years in the Championship, finishing tenth in 2006 before being relegated back to Division One in 2007. Last season a ten point deduction saw them end bottom of that league to return to the basement league after six extremely eventful seasons, only to begin this season's campaign with a crippling thirty point deduction which is tantamount to further relegation.

The first ever meeting of the 'Quakers' and the 'Hatters', took place down in Bedfordshire on Easter Saturday 9th. April 1966 in Division Four with both sides pushing for promotion. Luton came out victors by two goals to none but just three weeks later the return game took place at Feethams when we entertained Luton for the first time. There were only five games of a thrilling stun the 'Hatters' with two rapid goals season left when Luton arrived just four points behind us in the Fourth Division table and an expectant crowd of 11,155 packed into Feethams: yet it was only the third best so far with Tranmere Rovers and Doncaster Rovers attracting more! Further details of this epic encounter are revealed in the 'Match to Remember' article on page 54.

The following season we played in the Third Division while Luton remained down in the Fourth having only managed to end in sixth place losing out on goal average to Colchester United. However we suffered immediate relegation and so were reunited with the 'Hatters' in 1967-8 and strangely made two trips to Kenilworth Road as the first on 28th. October 1967 was abandoned after just seven minutes play due to intensifying fog. We returned on 26th. February to try again and this time finished on the end of a 1-3 defeat with Jimmy O'Neill getting the Quakers goal. Again it was within a month that we met at Feethams when Luton were again the winners, this time by 2-1 and again Jimmy O'Neill was our scorer. At the end of the season it was Luton who were champions to return to a higher league and it would be thirtythree seasons before they would drop into the lowest league again to meet the Quakers. However, during this long spell we did manage to be drawn together twice in cup competitions.

The first of these cup meetings was in the second round of the Football League Cup in September 1975 after we had disposed of Sheffield Wednesday on penalties after three games in round one. Then Second Division Luton Town came to Feethams for only the third time and took a firsthalf lead through Ron Futcher but an

incredible late spell saw Darlington from Stan Webb to earn a third round trip to West Ham United. It was twenty-five years before we came together again this time in the second round of the F.A. Cup in December 2000, when we played out a goal-less draw at Feethams before losing the replay at Kenilworth Road 0-2.

The very next season we met in the league for only the third time losing 2-5 away in October 2001 to the second placed 'Hatters' with Danny Mellanby and Neil Wainwright getting our two goals. Our third home league meeting ended in a 3-2 win for the Quakers in January 2002 as outlined in the second paragraph. This season we finally achieved a win at Kenilworth Road (after four straight defeats) when last October a ninetieth minute strike from substitute Gregg Blundell gave us the points after Claude Gnakpa had equalised Billy Clarke's opener in the first-half.

So we look forward to a rare meeting with a team that is only spending a fifth season in the lowest of the Football Leagues in the fifty years since they became national after the abolition of the Third Divisions North and South in 1958.

The return to action of Pawel Abbott brought the biggest cheer of an otherwise forgettable afternoon.

He made his first appearance of the season following injury, coming off the bench for the last 20 minutes as we sought a breakthrough.

He immediately injected a touch of class, but by then Chesterfield were intent on packing players behind the ball to earn their draw.

Earlier they had been lively on the break, with Jamie Ward ever dangerous, though he found it tough to escape the attention of Alan White.

Given that it was Chesterfield's third game of the week after an FA Cup replay with Droylsden as well as a Boxing Day game, they had every right to play a tactical game geared to containment.

And in Tommy Lee they have a keeper who is becoming a thorn in our side. He starred for Rochdale in their penalty shoot win in the play-offs last May, and again he denied Jason Kennedy, this time with a 50th minute save after Curtis Main had put Kennedy through on goal.

Main's full debut, at the age of 16, was something he can take pride in. He put himself about and had a couple of headers saved, and a first half shot blocked as he sought his first senior goal

But frustration is part and parcel of life as a striker, and Billy Clarke, who replaced Main during the second half, missed a last minute chance when he failed to convert Sebastien Carole's cross which wrongfooted the defence.

It was Clarke's final appearance before his loan from Ipswich expired, and he would have loved to sign off with a goal.

And he wasn't the only one. A winner would have been met by a huge wave of relief, for the final whistle sounded with us having now gone eight games without a win - though the last four had all been draws.

Darlington manager Dave Penney said: "Frustrating is the best word to describe it. It was a nothing game in the first half, although we upped the tempo in the second, and had a couple of good chances to win it.

"We made a couple of changes to freshen the team up, yet it was a flat performance. However we can take a plus from the clean sheet because we haven't had enough of them."

Chesterfield manager Lee Richardson said: "We defended very well and looked dangerous on the break. The clean sheet is something for us to build on, because it has been a feature of our season to lose when we should have had points. This time it didn't happen."

Despite their winless run Darlington remain in the thick of the promotion race, and Abbott's return is a massive boost. Evening Gazette.

Darlo's winless run continued, though this time there were no defensive lapses. BBC Tees.





be interested in him. Fair enough you might think but it seems Posh had already agreed to loan him to us before the interest from other clubs emerged. In my mind that should have been it. If a club agrees to a deal with another club then that should be it. If they have shaken on it and agreed then regardless of interest from other parties the deal should be concluded as planned obviously as long as the player is happy with the move.

Instead the offers from two other clubs emerged and it looked like everything was off. I could almost look the other way on that front despite a deal with us seemingly being agreed. However it then emerged that the offers were merely enquiries. It then got worse as both Paul Simpson and Mark Robins both said they would not be taking the deals any further That for me was the real kick in the teeth. certain amount of playing the field going

I am not an idealist. I realise that clubs have a right to get the best offer they can for a player. That said I firmly believe that if a club agrees a deal with another one then they should try and honour it. If other are going and they are probably the clubs had actually made an offer I could accept it but in this situation that doesn't appear to be the case as they were seemingly just enquiries. That is the most annoying thing about it. I certainly wouldn't like to see us turn back on an agreed deal just because someone else decided they might make an offer. If a club thinks other offers might come in for a player during the transfer window then they should wait and see how the

> Maybe it is an indication of the way that football is at the moment. There is not a huge amount of money around at the moment. Even some of the big Premiership clubs are tightening their belts and it will probably get worse over the course of the year. The transfer window obviously has played a part in situations like this developing. The one month opening at this time of the year has created an increased pressure on clubs to conclude deals. I'm sure it is not the last time we'll see it happen.

> The situation must have been difficult for the manager as well. He has remained diplomatic but it could have caught him out. Thankfully we have a man in charge who doesn't put all his eggs in one basket. I am sure if he had decided to end the deal, which I wouldn't have blamed him for under the apparent circumstances, then he would have had someone else lined up. Mostly though it is hard for the player. One moment they think they are set for one place and then another they are going elsewhere. That is perhaps the worst thing about the transfer window and situations like these - even the players don't know where they most important part of any deal.

Thankfully it has all been concluded. Maybe not in the way I would have liked it but at least we have Hatch. He could play a big part in the rest of our season and we all know why. I'm delighted to see him here for the rest of the season The thought of him and Pawel Abbott up front is a mouthwatering prospect.



Our man Dave Penney is now the fifth longest serving manager in League Two following the departure of Barnet's Paul Fairclough at Christmas.

Dave, who was appointed just after the Hartlepool away game in October 2006, is headed in the list by four managers who have guided their clubs to promotion from the Conference - just as Dave did with Doncaster six years ago. Indeed, in terms of service in League Two, Dave is second in the list to John Coleman of Accrington Stanley, as the other three came into the league after Dave was given the job here at the He had guided the club to the Arena.

The exit of Jimmy Quinn from Bournemouth on New Year's Eve - after we'd gone to print on our programme for our game on January 3rd - was the sixth change in the division this season, and the second at Dean Court, as Kevin Bond was in charge when the season kicked off.

Quinn had been in charge for 121 days and for 19 league games, winning five and drawing seven, but the knives were December 28th - and yes you've out after the FA Cup second round defeat to Blyth just before Christmas, which the club reckoned cost them £250,000 in television and gate money.

Director Adam Murry said: "We're at the stage now where it is make or break for the club and we need to be winning games. We need to see some consistency on the pitch. We're trying to breathe new life into the club. We need different tactics and different strategies on the pitch and, at this point in time, we felt things needed freshening up.

Events happened quickly after previous owner Paul Baker, who is based in Chester, decided to sell his 50 per cent stake in the club. "I just felt the football club deserved better than I could possibly give it," he said. "In terms of trying to run businesses 250 miles from another business and the economic climate as it is at the moment, I have to devote a lot of time to those businesses and just thought the football club was getting a short deal from me personally.

Paul Fairclough decided to guit at Christmas, but will stay at the club as director of Barnet Sports Development. Conference title in 2005, and was the ninth longest serving manager in the.

"In football it is ultimately the manager who pays the price for poor results," he said after a run of thirteen games without a win. "My chairman has been supportive but I will not allow him to suffer on my behalf any longer."



from a Mann's View

The winter weather has always been a crux upon the English football fixture schedule.

Indeed the unpredictability of the British climate renders any given Saturday as a potential candidate for postponement.

So why was there such a fuss made about last weekend's cancellations?

Anyone who has any of their major senses about them could not help but be blatantly aware of the atrocious overnight frost that inevitably took its toll at many stadiums across the country. In some parts of the country there were record breaking low temperatures!

Postponements are accepted as an inevitable natural wastage throughout every campaign. That's of course provided you're not a Premiership club.

Portsmouth and Fulham's home games both bit the dust because of the elements and vet this seemed to receive as many column inches as the action that was played over the weekend.

Every lower league supporter must have been spitting feathers at the bigotry and self-importance that the domestic elite aptly indulged in the aftermath of the two postponements. Fans demanding compensating for travel tickets, discounted entry at the rearranged match and apologies!

Granted the so-called best league in the world should have adequate facilities and measures in place to deal with bad weather but both Fratton Park and Craven Cottage are about the only 'traditional' grounds still existing in the Premiership. Nearly every other club has upgraded to a super-stadium within the last decade and naturally comes

with all the mod cons. This is not an excuse for the two clubs concerned but it's not as if they were isolated incidents, barely a game was played in their respective areas of the country.

The Premiership has quickly become God as a league of its own, leaving the Football League behind with its only connection the exchanging of largely the same pool of clubs once a year around May time.

The demands of the clubs and their fans are frankly disgusting and totally disrespectful to the average football fan but are nothing more than a by-product of the over-zealous spending of billionaire foreign benefactors. Take Manchester City for example. A club with unlimited spending power that's been able to attract stars from the international cream and is almost certain to buy itself as much success as it wants in the very near future. It's only natural its supporters should feel a people that this should occur. It's this sense of elitism.

When the Darlington supporters' bus entered Exeter only to be passed by the team coach going in the opposite direction seven years ago were they any major qualms or demands for subsidy? When we parked up at Swansea to be told the match was off. did we cause a stir? And midweek at Torquay, was there any sign of trouble when the match was postponed upon arrival?

The answer to all these questions is no. Why? Simply because certain sectors of the football supporting network are embedded in reality, accept this is going to happen particularly at this time of the year and get on with their day knowing this is all part of the rich tapestry of any part of the season.

The Football League advised clubs throughout the week about being prudent with cancellation times given the adverse forecast for Saturday. Indeed many heeded the warning as a batch of games were postponed Friday evening and some even prepared contingency plans for rearranging games a matter of a few days later - Oldham played Hartlepool on Monday night.

Official supporters' travel clubs have insurance policies in place that allows for full refunds in the event of postponed games, so in the event of suspected dodgy weather there is a convenient travel solution even if some find the idea of coach travel a bind.

The point is it's only the silver spoon merchants from the Premiership who have taken any issue with the weekend's cancellations. It seems almost an alien concept to some attitude that I find a total turn off about supporting Premiership clubs. I've seen Newcastle several times this season and I can never wait to return to the pragmatism and genuineness of League Two. The football might be rubbish at times, the catering might be mediocre and might cost you more than you bargained for, but at least it's respectful, it's friendly and it's a comfortable environment to enjoy the beautiful game away from the snobs, the half wits and misguided rabble rousers.

Besides all of which Darlington has just landed itself potentially the strongest strike partnership it's had for years, and arguably the strongest in the division. Let's all hope that some good weather helps them.

Is it a crime to watch football?

Our friends at the Football Supporters' Federation have joined ranks with Liberty, the Civil Rights organisation, to campaign for the rights of football fans who have been unjustly detained under Section 27 of the Violent Crime Reduction Act.

In recent weeks, the FSF has become aware of the cases of fans from Stoke City and Plymouth who have been served with Section 27 orders, made to miss their team's game, and taken back home under threat of arrest with no compensation for match tickets or travel. In these cases, the police cited "intelligence" reports, despite the fact that the landlords from the pubs these supporters were in said that there had not been any trouble and very little in the way of singing, never mind violence.

We at the Darlington Supporters Trust have long argued that football fans should not automatically be assumed to be hooligans. Ann Fairclough, Legal Officer for Liberty, shares our views and said that "this is a football-loving country and it's not only wrong, but counter productive to treat all fans as hooligans". The FSF, of which the Trust is a member, is taking this issue very seriously. We have no issue with the police or stewards correctly taking action against people who have committed offences; the legislation is designed to allow the moving on of individuals or small groups misbehaving under the influence of alcohol. However, it was not designed so that the police could impose football banning orders at will across entire counties. It seems that, in some cases, the legislation is being used unlawfully and the FSF is taking a firm stance against this. campaigning for compensation for innocent fans, refunds on travel expenses and match tickets, deletion of any records of incidents held on file and Enjoy the game. a written apology.

Interestingly, I attended a meeting with



the Football Club recently and the standard of stewarding was mentioned as one factor that is a serious consideration in fans attending matches. I, for one, recognise that stewards face a challenging task but I do think that there is always room for improvement. Similarly, we are aware of issues - not at Darlington, I hasten to add - where ambulant disabled fans have been arrested on the grounds of being under the influence of alcohol; again, this is an instance where better training, and particularly in relation to disability awareness, would be of great benefit. The recent appointment of Paul Hodgson, from the Trust, as Disability Liaison Officer at Darlington is a positive move forward which we welcome and demonstrates the positive moves the club is taking.

Meanwhile, our parent organisation Supporters Direct, of which I am Vice Chair, is working closely with the Football Supporters Federation in developing a series of proposals on the future of football, in response to the questions raised by the Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport when he spoke at our annual conference in London recently. In particular, we are making a number of recommendations in terms of corporate governance issues and transparency in accounts which we believe to be essential. Luton Town's first ever appearance at Feethams in April 1966 certainly vies with their cup visit of September 1975 as the most memorable of the mere five matches

played in Darlington between the two sides, but it is this inaugural game I

have chosen as it set us up for promotion with just four games of the season left. We lay second and Luton were only four points behind in seventh place when we lined up on a hot afternoon with manager Lol Morgan selecting the same eleven for the tenth game in succession - not surprising as we had won seven of them! It was a tense first forty-five minutes as the teams cautiously probed and tested each other with the visitors happy to contain the game. Then three minutes into the second-half the large crowd erupted as Bobby Cummings soared like an eagle to head Barry

Hutchinson's floated cross past the flailing arms of former Darlington keeper Colin Tinsley in the Luton goal. The Darlington defence then held firm against the 'Hatters' attack, desperately missing the injured 31-goal John O'Rourke (who joined Middlesbrough that summer), and gained the precious win that sent us back to the top of the Fourth Division table with only four games to play and three of them were at home.


