

Welcome to you all for tonight's match against Luton Town, another massive game for us.

Luton have done so well this season to bounce back from their penalty and we have to raise ourselves again. Games against Luton usually are very entertaining and we had a cracker here last season when we scored two late on. Both teams go in to the game needing the points and it's going to be exciting.

I was absolutely delighted with all the boys on Saturday. I thought all eleven and the substitutes were exceptional and there were some great performances out there. We started the game well, but the goal we conceded was a set back. In previous games, conceding a goal has affected us, but it didn't against Wycombe and we carried on in the same vein and showed great mental strength.

Brett scored a fantastic free kick which lifted everyone and then we forced the game. We deserved to be in the lead by half time and we finished the game as well as we started.

I am delighted that Steve Fletcher has come back to us and he was immense on Saturday. He was on to the other players constantly to keep them working. He wants to get Bournemouth out of trouble because he cares deeply about this club, and I think everyone can see that. There have been a lot of changes since he was last here, so a lot of the lads don't know him, but they have taken to him straight away.

The challenge to the players now is to play like that in every game. It is going to be difficult, but the response I got on Saturday was first class in terms of attitude, endeavour and ability. It has been like that in the previous two games, and in my three games so far, we have had one poor half. Against Wycombe though, we got the breaks and got the result that we didn't get in the two away games. They showed that they are good players and they need to show that regularly now in the remaining 20 games.

I was delighted to get my first win as a manager in my first home game in charge and it is a day I will look back at with fond memories. The second half seemed to go on forever, but it was thoroughly deserved and now we can concentrate on tonight because this is another massive game.

We are in a similar situation in many ways to the end of last season when we were a long way from safety, except this time we have longer left, which is important. We went on a terrific run at the end of last season and we need Saturday to be the basis of a similar run now. We need to find the magic ingredients that were the basis of that run, and the main ingredient was belief. It's a shame that you can't bottle it up and sell it! When we went on that run, we got that belief and the confidence within ourselves and we looked a different side.







COACH TRAVEL Coach travel will be available if demand is sufficient. The coach will leave Dean Court at 7.00am and cost is £31.50 per person.

TICKETS Cherries supporters will be on one side of the CO-OP Community Stand. There are no tickets on sale in advance at AFC Bournemouth. On the day, prices are £17 adults, £12 concessions and £6 under 15's. For adult priced tickets, these are £15 if purchased in advance. Early Bird tickets are available by calling 0870 8991976 by 5.00 pm on the Friday before the game using a credit/debit card. A £1 handling fee per card transaction will be charged. Alternatively you can buy on line at www.redimps.com/tickets by 12.00 noon on the Friday.

ROUTE Postcode for SatNav users LN5 8LD. Take the A338, A31, M27, M3, A34, M40, A43 and then the M1 north. Exit the M1 at junction 21A and take the A46 signposted Leicester, Newark. Stay on the A46 and follow signs to Lincoln. Once in Lincoln, exit the A46 and take the A1434 at the Halfway House roundabout. At the next roundabout, join the A15 signposted Lincoln. At the next roundabout, take the first exit onto High Street, the B1262 signposted City Centre, Worksop. Turn right in to Scorer Street then right onto Cross Street for Sincil Bank. The ground is around 222 miles from Bournemouth and you should allow four and a half hours for travelling.

TRAIN If you get the 7.22 from Bournemouth, that will get you to Lincoln at 13.14. The station is around a 15 minute walk from the ground, so that will give you plenty of time to get the 17.28 from Lincoln and that will get you back to Bournemouth at 23.16.

DISABLED SUPPORTERS INFORMATION There is parking available nearby with good access to the ground. Supporters can use the Mundy Stand which is partially covered. Please call 01522 880011 or email lcfc@redimps.com for further information.

ROUTE Postcode for SatNav users RM10 7XL. Take the A338, A31, M27 and M3, leaving at junction 2 and joining the M25 signposted Gatwick. Join the A282 signposted Dartford Toll Tunnel. At Lakeside, take the A13 signposted Barking. Branch left then at roundabout, take the 4th exit signposted Dagenham East, at next roundabout, take the 1st exit signposted Dagenham East, Hornchurch. At traffic lights, turn left on to the A1306 signposted Dagenham. At next traffic lights, turn right onto Ballards Road signposted Dagenham East. At the roundabout, take the first exit onto the A1112 signposted Becontree Heath, Dagenham East, Go past Dagenham East underground station and turn left in to Victoria Road for the ground. The ground is 144 miles from Bournemouth and you should allow at least three hours travelling time. There is a car park at the ground, which does fill up quickly, but there is street parking.

TRAIN You need to get the train to London and then the underground to Dagenham East, which is on the District Line and takes around 45 minutes to get to from Waterloo. The tube station is a five minute walk from the ground and signposted.



Luton Town

In focus

This evening we welcome Luton Town to Dean Court. The Hatters have done superbly to wipe out their harsh 30 point deficit and entered positive points on Saturday when they drew 3-3 against Bradford City, but were denied three points due to a controversial penalty awarded against them deep in to time added on.

The Cherries win over Wycombe and Grimsby's 3-0 win over Rotherham means that Luton found themselves 19 points from safety, but while there is a chance, Luton will battle every inch of the way in their bid to move out of the bottom two. They know that a win tonight will put them to within six points of the Cherries, a massive incentive.

Manager Mick Harford has been a terrific leader of the Hatters this season, having to virtually assemble a squad from scratch at the start of the season, attracting a good calibre of players despite the perilous situation at the club.

Like Bournemouth, Luton went down last season after entering administration, and even before they heard the verdict of how many points they would be deducted after coming out of admin prior to this season, had already had ten points taken off because of irregularities.

Luton are a proud club with a great history though and the people of the Bedfordshire town have rallied around and really backed the team. The reward for their loyalty will hopefully be a trip to Wembley in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy. On 17 February. They face Brighton at Kenilworth Road with the game standing at 0-0 after the first leg.

In the league, they would be more than comfortable if not for the massive points loss. Since the exhilarating 3-3 draw between the two clubs at the start of December, Luton have only tasted defeat once with an uncharacteristic 5-1 reverse at Darlington in their last away game.

They have enjoyed some excellent results away from home this season, winning at high flying Gillingham, Exeter and Bury. They have also picked up draws in their travels to Bradford, Grimsby, Wycombe, Chesterfield and Chester.

At home, they have picked up 19 points, beating Aldershot, Dagenham & Redbridge, Barnet and Lincoln as well as drawing against ourselves, Notts County, Chester, Morecambe and on Saturday against Bradford City.

They have had some tricky games in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy and after a win over Brentford, have beaten League 1 sides Walsall and conquerors of Bournemouth, Colchester on their way to the area final. They also enjoyed an excellent win over Plymouth in the Carling Cup before going out to Reading. In the FA Cup, overcame Altringham before losing in the second round at Southend.

For the Hatters, draws are simply not enough now as we are in the second half of the season, and Harford regularly employs a number of forwards in the game. Games between Bournemouth and Luton generally produce high scoring affairs and they will come here tonight desperate to secure three points to give themselves hope. There is a tremendous amount of spirit in this Luton side and it is set to be a tense and exciting affair.

GOALKEEPERS

CONRAD LOGAN

Irish keeper who is currently on loan from Leicester City. He has also had loan spells at Boston and spent last season at Stockport where he put in a string of fine displays and helped Stockport to promotion via the play-offs at Wembley. Conrad had his loan spell extended earlier this month.

DEAN BRILL

Locally born keeper who came through the youth ranks at Luton to sign professional in 2005, Tall and commanding keeper, he had a spell on loan at Gillingham in December 2006.

DEFENDERS

IAN ROPER

Solid defender who joined Luton in the summer from Walsall. He came through the ranks with the Saddlers and gave sterling service to the club. He signed as a professional in 1995 and went on to make 325 league appearances for the club. He has quickly become a crowd favourite at Luton and has also popped up with some important goals.

LEWIS EMANUEL

Talented left back who started his career at Bradford City and went on to make 139 league appearances for the Bantams. He moved to Luton in July 2006 and has become an important part of the side. Lewis scored in the 2-2 draw at Chester that helped Luton move out of negative points.

GEORGE PILKINGTON

Talented defender who started his career at Everton. He first enjoyed senior football in the 2002-03 season during a loan spell at Exeter before signing for Port Vale where he made over 250 appearances, captained the side and twice picked up the player of the year award. George joined Luton in August 2008.

KEITH KEANE

Keith came through the ranks at Luton, making his debut in 2003 aged just 16. A highly versatile player, he can play anywhere along the back and also in midfield. A highly dependable player who has been a regular in the Republic of Ireland Under 21 side.

CLAUDE GNAKPA

French defender who possesses great pace and is strong in the tackle. He served a number of clubs in France before coming to England and joining Swindon from FC Vaduz. Last season he was part of the Peterborough side that gained promotion and in August, signed a two year deal at Luton.

SOL DAVIS

Long serving left back who joined Luton in 2002 from Swindon. A big crowd favourite at the club with his wholehearted displays.

GEORGE BEAVAN

Young defender who made his Luton debut last season against Bournemouth at Kenilworth Road. This season has seen him have a loan spell at Salisbury.

JAKE HOWELLS

17 year old player who can operate either as a left back or left winger. A highly rated player, he made his debut at the end of last season and has continued to impress.

ED ASAFU-ADJAYE

Quick full back who is a product of the Luton youth system. He signed professional forms at Luton in 2007 and has also served Walton & Hersham and Salisbury City on loan.

MIDFIELDERS

KEVIN NICHOLLS

A big favourite at Kenilworth Road, Kevin is in his second spell at the club. He started his career at Charlton and had a spell at Wigan before signing for Luton in 2001. His terrific form saw him a big part of the Luton side that gained promotion to the Championship and in July 2006, he moved to Leeds for a £700,000 fee. After a short spell at Preston, he rejoined Luton in August 2008 on a three year deal and was immediately named club captain.

ROSSI JARVIS

Midfielder, who can also play in defence. Rossi started his career at Norwich where he made his debut for their reserves aged just 14. He had loan spells at Torquay and Rotherham in 2007 and joined Luton in August 2008 and he has established himself as a regular. Rossi has won eight England Under 18 caps.

MICHAEL SPILLANE

Michael is currently on loan at Luton from Norwich. A Republic of Ireland Under 21 international, he has shown great maturity since joining the club and scored a number of important goals.

ASA HALL

Asa can play in midfield or defence and has won international honours for England at Under 19 and Under 20 level. He started his career at Birmingham and had loan spells at Boston, Ashford Town and Shrewsbury Town before signing for Luton in August 2008.

FORWARDS

KEVIN GALLEN

Striker who has played against Bournemouth twice this season, once for MK Dons in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy and for Luton against Bournemouth in December when he was on the scoresheet in the 3-3 draw with a free kick. An experienced striker who has enjoyed two long spells at QPR and also played for Huddersfield, Burnley and Plymouth. He initially joined Luton on loan from MK Dons before signing permanently.

SUNDAY-AKANNI WASIU

Recent signing for Luton on loan from Colchester United. The 24 year old joined Colchester in the summer from St. Albans City and has scored twice in 13 appearances for the U's.

TOM CRADDOCK

Striker who is on loan at Kenilworth Road from Premier League side Middlesbrough. He has previously been at both Wrexham and Hartlepool on loan in his career. He initially joined Luton for one month in October and has shown great form, scoring three goals in four games that earned him an extension of the loan spell.

CHRIS MARTIN

Striker who is on a season long loan at Luton from Norwich City. He turned professional in 2006 and has made a number of Championship appearances, scoring four goals. He has enjoyed a good season for the Hatters with a good goalscoring record.

PAUL McVEIGH

Former Tottenham and Norwich player who joined Luton in 2007. Paul has won 20 full caps for Northern Ireland in his career. He scored his first goal for the club this season in the 2-1 win over Dagenham & Redbridge. He also found the net against Bournemouth from the penalty spot in the game at Kenilworth Road last month to gain a point for the Hatters in the 3-3 draw.

IAN HENDERSON

Former England Under 20 striker who joined Luton from Northampton in December. Ian started his career at Norwich City and is an excellent addition to the Hatters squad.

RYAN CHARLES

Young striker who can also play on either wing. Ryan has been at the club since he was 9 years old and has also gained experience during a loan spell at Hitchin Town. Last season saw him awarded the young player of the year accolade.

DREW TALBOT

Former Sheffield Wednesday striker who joined Luton in 2007. His form attracted the attentions of a number of clubs, before he sustained a serious injury in March 2008 against Cheltenham.

JORDAN PATRICK

Jordan became the youngest player ever to play for Luton when he came on in October in the 2-2 draw at Grimsby and helped to set up the last minute equaliser. Jordan is just 16 years old.

14. Luton Town

10 Things you never knew

Ten things you may not know about Luton Town...

- Luton is situated in Bedfordshire, 32 miles north of London. The population of the urban area of Luton is around 202,000.
 The town was founded in around the 6th century and was recorded in the Domesday Book as Loitone or Lintone.
- 2. Luton Town FC were formed in 1885 when local clubs Wanderers and Excelsior merged. They became the first professional club in the south in 1891 and joined the league in 1897, but left after three years, due to the high costs and the fact that most league clubs at the time were situated in the north. They rejoined the league in 1919 and by 1955, were in the top flight. They went up and down the leagues and enjoyed their greatest day in 1988 when they won the league cup. They were last in the top division in 1992 and since then have played in all the other three divisions, gaining more promotions and suffering more relegations that most clubs have in their histories.
- 3. The main industry in Luton from the 18th century was hat making, hence the clubs nickname, The Hatters. The population grew with the growth of the railway industry, with many families relocating to the area, particularly from the south west of Scotland.
- 4. In the 1980's, Luton were one of the clubs who used a 'plastic pitch', along with Oldham, QPR and Preston. They have since been banned by the FA.
- 5. The Luton Carnival is the largest one day carnival in Europe. It takes place in May and regularly attracts crowds in excess of 150,000.

- 6. Current Wimborne Town goalkeeper Mark
 Ovendale played for both Bournemouth and
 Luton Town. He signed for Bournemouth in
 May 1998 and he made 89 league appearances
 before Luton bought him for £425,000. Other
 players who have turned out for both clubs
 include Steve Robinson, Warren Feeney,
 Garreth O'Connor and Russell Perrett.
- Despite coming from Lancashire, Eric Morecambe was a great supporter of Luton Town. He has a suite named after him at Kenilworth Road and was once president of the club.
- Luton is twinned with three Germany towns and cities, Bergisch Gladbach, Berlin-Spandau and Wolfsburg. It is also twinned with Bourgoin-Jallieu in France and Eskilstuna in Sweden.
- Luton airport is one of the busiest in the country. It was opened in 1938 and has grown significantly in recent years. New terminals were added in 1985 and 1999 and also a new railway station has been opened.
- 10. Tonight is the 54th league meeting between Bournemouth and Luton. Bournemouth have won 21 and Luton have won 19. The last four games between the two clubs have yielded 22 goals! The first meeting between Bournemouth and Luton came on 1 December 1923 at Kenilworth Road, Luton winning 6-2. A week later, Luton won 3-2 at Dean Court. The following season, Bournemouth completed the double with 2-1 and 2-0 wins. The clubs have met in 57 competitive matches, and only three have finished 0-0.














Hold on to your hats!

It's Cherries v Luton





Straight away I will apologise if this article means that tonight finishes 0-0! But... when Bournemouth meet Luton, it is usually one of the most entertaining games of the season!

Both ourselves and Luton have been through the mill in the last couple of years with the two clubs having 67 points deducted between them. The ten points taken away from Luton last season saw them fall away and get relegated, while for ourselves, we came so close to staying up. This season there was relief that both Bournemouth and Luton survived to kick a ball again, but tempered by the heavy points deductions that has seen both clubs in the bottom two all season. Both clubs though have now got rid of the deduction and can really push on in the second half of the season.



Over recent years though, there has been something truly remarkable about Bournemouth v Luton games, more so than any other fixture. For Bournemouth supporters, we have had to travel to



Luton more than they have had to come to Dorset as well as we have had a game called off when the teams were in the tunnel because of a frozen pitch, and then of course this season when after a few minutes, the game was abandoned because of the snow!

There have been a lot of high scoring games between the two sides over the years. In more recent memory, we won 3-2 at Dean Court on New Years Day in 2001 when Jermain Defoe scored in the last minute.

in an amazing eleven minutes and at half time, it was 4-2! Still Luton wouldn't give up and on the hour made it 4-3 before two goals in five minutes made it 6-3 with 25 minutes left to play! Somehow, there weren't any more goals in that game. Later in the season, future Luton player Warren Feeney scored for Bournemouth as the sides drew 1-1 at Kenilworth Road

The following season was an odd one for the fixture as there were only two goals to talk about, both falling to Luton as they won both 1-0 and went on to win the league. The talking point at the home game was the sending off of Russ Perrett, who was to later join Bournemouth. After a couple of years apart, the two teams



locked horns again last season and when Luton travelled to Bournemouth on 22 January, they had already been docked ten points because of administration. Bournemouth had vet to enter administration, but were bottom of the table and three points behind Luton who were in 22nd place. Gareth Stewart had sustained an injury against Southend on the Saturday and young Ryan Pryce was handed his debut in goal. This one was another absolute thriller with plenty of twists throughout the game. We took the lead with our first attack through Max Gradel and looked to be coasting it when Jo Kuffour made it two on 31 minutes. However, just before the break, Russ Perrett was judged to have pulled a Luton players shirt and Matthew Spring scored from the spot. That so obviously affected the confidence of Bournemouth, but they still went forward. Luton though got back level on the hour through Dean Morgan. To their credit, Bournemouth kept pushing forward, but with 11 minutes left, it looked all over as Paul Furlong completed the Luton comeback. Many people decided enough was enough and left the ground, but those who did missed a brilliant comeback from Bournemouth. Sam Vokes scored arguably his best goal for Bournemouth in the last minute from distance and supporters could celebrate a brave point. Or could they? Four minutes in to time added on Lee Bradbury crossed for substitute Brett Pitman to head in to spark wild celebrations and a 4-3 win!



Just four games later, we travelled to Luton and after having overtaken them in the table, were dumped back to the bottom as the club entered administration and were back to the bottom of the table. This game was dubbed 'the administration derby' and it was undoubtedly Bournemouth's day as we shrugged off the disappointment of the ten point deduction. It was a fantastic first half for the Cherries with Sam Vokes and Jo Kuffour giving the side a two goal lead before Max Gradel scored an absolute worldy. Luton hit back early in the second half but six minutes from time Kuffour scored his second of the game to wrap up a 4-1 win in another high scoring match.



And so to this season and more Luton v Bournemouth drama! After the postponed game, there were goals aplenty once again in a thriller at Kenilworth Road. An own goal gave Luton the lead before Mark Molesley scored two excellent goals to put Bournemouth ahead. Back came Luton with a Kevin Gallen free kick and then back came Bournemouth as Matt Tubbs made it 3-2. It wouldn't be a true Luton v Bournemouth game if there wasn't a twist in the tail and just as the Cherries were hoping to move in to positive points, a late penalty made it 3-3!

So in 2008, Bournemouth and Luton shared 18 goals, surely some record! We are now in 2009 and both sides can look back at a simply horrible year and both be stronger for the experience and who knows what will be in store tonight!



Interview

STEVE FLETCHER - HERO'S RETURN

Saturday was a very special day at Dean Court. The legend that is Steve Fletcher returned to the fold the day before to give everyone a massive lift and he was part of a tremendous team performance that ensured the side gained three valuable points against Wycombe in Eddie Howe's first home match in charge.

As soon as Fletch stepped foot on the Dean Court turf, he received a heroes welcome, something that he was delighted with, but more delighted with the three points, "It was amazing! The reception I got from the supporters made the hairs stand up on the back of my neck. I was fully focussed on the game though, I didn't want it to be the Steve Fletcher show, all I wanted to do was to go out there and do the business for the team and hopefully that's what I did because we came away with a great result."

It was an emotional day for Fletch to pull on a Cherries shirt again, something he never thought would happen, "I thought my playing days here were gone. I was here for 15 years and I'm sure there will still be people saying that you should never go back. But why wouldn't I want to go back to somewhere that makes me happy? Don't get me wrong, I had a happy time at Chesterfield and Crawlev. But, happy times or fantastic times? There is a big difference and all my fantastic times have been here at AFC Bournemouth. I'm not coming back here because it's easy for me, I've come back because I love it here and you will get the best out of me here. That is the only reason that Crawley manager Steve Evans let me go. He said to me that if it was any other club, he couldn't contemplate letting me go. He knows how much Bournemouth means to me and I can only thank him for letting me go. He told me that in his 20 year managerial career, he has never done that for anyone before and would probably never do that again."

Of course Saturday created a new club appearance record for Fletch, and every game he plays will now bring him that accolade! "Yes I broke my old one! I'm getting close to 500 league appearances for Bournemouth and my 700th career appearance for Hartlepool, Bournemouth, Chesterfield and Crawley. If someone told me when I was 18 years old that I was going to play 700 games and nearly 600 of them for one team, I'd say they were dreaming! All I can do now is to take every game as it comes. I can't guarantee that I can play week in and week out, but if Eddie starts me, I will give him everything I've got. If I have to be an impact player at times and come off the bench, then I'll do that and I think that's why Eddie brought me in. He knows I won't be able to play 90 minutes in every game from now to the end of the season, but he knows that if I come off the bench, I can change things and give him an option that he never had."

Steve played under manager Eddie Howe on Saturday, and he was full of praise for his friend and former team mate, "His preparation for the game was superb and he's very professional. Eddie has played under some great managers in Mel Machin, Sean O'Driscoll and Kevin Bond and he has learnt a lot from all of them and taken something from all of them and added his own bits to that.

"He is very methodical in his approach. He knew exactly how Wycombe were going to play and he drummed it in to us how we were going to play and that's what we need because we are in a situation where we know we can't go out there and play off the cuff, we need to know what we're doing in every situation. All the boys stuck to their task well, we were immense at the back all the way through to Brett and myself. We need that every game now, we can't just have that as a one off."


Fletch has always had a special relationship with the Cherries supporters, and he had praise for them after the game on Saturday, "What was brilliant on Saturday was that when we went one down, they didn't lose faith. They got straight behind us because they could see it was just a mistake that can happen in anyone's career. We started well and with the help of the supporters, we thankfully got back in the game and that's what we need in every game from now until the end of the season, whether we are fighting to come from one behind or fighting to hold on to a lead, we need everyone behind us. We have a lot of young players here and it gives them an unbelievable lift when the supporters are right behind them. We need everyone for tonight's huge game. We can't relax after the performance against Wycombe. Eddie and Jason will make sure that doesn't happen as I will too."

The majority of the Cherries points have come at home this season, and Steve knows that the side need to start winning away, and with his vast experience. Knows what it takes to do that, "Whether you are fighting for promotion or battling against relegation, you need to be winning your home games and not being beaten away. We can be lifted by our crowd more at home, so away from home, we have to be mentally strong when we haven't got our crowd lifting us when we have to go to a horrible place and have to grind out a result. That is where we have to become strong.

"The Wycombe game will go a long way for the young lads in the squad. They need to take all the positives on board and capitalise on it. We have a couple of tough away games coming up, but all games are tough in this league. We need to be mentally strong and start getting points on the road as well as winning our home games and if we can do that, then we can be ok. I'm just delighted to be back and part of one of the biggest challenges of my career, and one I am more than up for."

You've had to wait a while this season, but you must be pleased now to be getting a chance in the first team.

Definitely. I'm just a young lad and like anyone of my age, I just want to get in and around the first team. It has taken me a while and I saw Josh in the team and Prycey has been in the team and I felt like I was the one not involved. I kept plugging away and luckily got my chance and now I just hope I can keep a place in the squad.

There can't be many players of your age who can say they have been picked by three different managers at the same club!

I've not looked at it that way before! It's a good way at looking at it and I'm pleased I've made an impression on all three of the managers.

It shows just what a tough world professional football is.

It has done yes. It is something I have always wanted to be involved in my whole life and I've been introduced very quickly to all different sorts of situations. Hopefully I have learnt from everything and will continue to learn as I get older.

We're playing Luton tonight and that will bring back some good memories for you!

It does yes, I will always remember Luton because that was my first game in the first team. I came on and it was a great win away from home. I remember Max Gradel stuck one in the top corner and Vokesy got one too.

You went on to be involved in the first team quite a few times for a spell after that?

I was yes and that was good because I was still a youth player. Once you get a taste for it though, you always want a little bit more and then hope that the little bit more turns in to a start. At the time, I was happy to be involved. We were struggling a bit at the time, and as a 17 year old, you can't expect to be in the team. We had injuries and the circumstances meant we couldn't bring players in and I was doing alright in the youth team. I then started training with the first team, which was the first step and then getting in to the squad at the weekends.

We can't talk about last season without mentioning Swansea away!

That was one of the best days of my life and hopefully there will be a few more like that. I had a lot of family and friends up there that day and some of my friends weren't too happy with me as we stopped them going up! There was a huge crowd there and I scored with almost my first touch! I didn't know what to think at the time and I went a bit nuts! I remember Lee Bradbury taking the mickey out of me on the way home because I stuck my tongue out when I was celebrating! I remember that it was Darren Anderton's first game back after being injured and he lasted about 85 minutes and it was amazing that he lasted that long. I had the feeling that I might be coming on, but never thought that I would come on and score. It was the weekend of my birthday as well, so all the family were down on the Sunday, so it was good that they were there and they were all

chuffed for me. At the time, we were in a similar position to where we are now in many ways and we just started to pick up some results and it was so important that we got something to keep giving ourselves a chance to stay in League 1. It gave us a great boost as a team to win that day, but it was also a big boost to the supporters as well and it was good to share the moment with them.

You must have thought at the time that you had helped the team to a fantastic draw, but we then went and won it!

That's right and a draw would have been a great result in such a big game. We were then defending a throw in and we managed to clear the ball and Brett Pitman ran up the wing and crossed it for Jo Kuffour. I tried to get on the end of that one as well, but Jo got there first! That's what dreams are made of and you couldn't have written a better script.

That was the last time you came on last season, did you find that frustrating?

I was on the bench a couple of times and then got a bit of an injury, so I wasn't involved. It was still nice to be in and around the first team because of my age. As I said though, once you get a taste of it, you want more. I wouldn't say I was upset, but I was a bit gutted that I wasn't involved a little bit more after the Swansea game.

You started off at Portsmouth before you came to Bournemouth didn't you?

I did yes and I joined them when I was nine when I was spotted playing for Gosport & Fareham schools. I got released when I was 16.

It's always been your dream to be a professional footballer, did you think the chance had gone when you were released?

I'm not sure really. It was hard for me to take as I had been at Portsmouth for so long and I used to go to the Pompey games with my dad. All I wanted to do at the time was to play for Portsmouth. Looking back on it now, it was a blessing in disguise. I wouldn't be any where near the Portsmouth team if I was still there. I can look back and although it was a bad thing for me at the time, everything happens for a reason and luckily Joe Roach picked me up and it's all gone from there. I came to Bournemouth on trial and had

a couple of games for the Under 16's and did alright and then played a couple under Joe Roach for the Under 18's. After I played the first game, I was out for a couple of months because I'd broken my ankle at school. Thankfully Bournemouth kept faith in me and let me come back and play and I was offered a place.

As a youth player, it went well for you here.

It did yes, I had a great time with the youth team. I made some really good friends and the ones who didn't get any terms are doing alright now and I still keep in touch with some of them,

At the end of last season, with so much going on at the club, did you think you were going to be offered a pro contract?

Because I'd been involved with the first team, I hoped I would get a contract. I didn't play after the Swansea game though and I was starting to think, 'what if?' Thankfully, Kevin Bond took a risk on me and gave me the contract. There was of course the worry as to whether the club would still be here, so it was a tough time for everyone. Luckily the club got sorted out and is now starting to pick up behind the scenes.

You've been busy because you have been with Wales at a number of age groups too.


I have yes, I've played for the Under 15's, 16's, 17's and 19's and hopefully now I can play for the Under 21's. My mum is from North Wales and speaks the language and near enough all my family on my mums side are from there, so I have always been aware of that. At Portsmouth, they gave guides out and there was a box to tick if any of the lads had any Welsh in them. I sent that back saying that my mum is Welsh and was invited to go and play a trial game. I went there with 20 or so lads in the same situation as me and luckily I did alright and scored in the trial game, got picked for the team and stayed in.

So you've made more international appearances than club ones!

I think I have yes, but I'm not too sure how many I've made! When you go away with Wales, you tend to have two or three games every time. There was a stage after I was released from Portsmouth where there was the transition from Under 16 to Under 17, so I didn't play for a while for Wales. I didn't get picked because I didn't have a club. Luckily for me,

Joe Roach spoke to Brian Flynn while I was in the youth team and he got me the chance to be able to show him what I could do and I got back in the side.

You had your final appearances for the Under 19's recently?

Yes, I went to Turkey in November. It was a good season for me with Wales because I was captain for the whole time. It was a great honour to do that. We had mainly the same group of lads for the whole season and had a decent team. I've always enjoyed it when I go away with Wales because they are a great bunch of lads and I get on well with all the coaching staff. I'm going to miss being with them and being captain, so the aim now has to be the under 21's. I've spoken to Brian Flynn and I think he likes me. I know that the more I play in the first team at Bournemouth, the better I will get and that will stand me in good stead if I do get called up for the 21's.

While all your international football was going on, you weren't involved in the first team here, but then in December you got a chance.

I'd come on a couple of times briefly earlier in the season, but I did really well in Turkey and Jimmy Quinn spoke to Brian Flynn and he told him how well I'd done. It was a big confidence boost playing for Wales and I did well in training and got a couple of games in the reserves and fortunately for me it went from there.

After coming on at Rochdale, you played nearly the whole game at Blyth, which was a massive disappointment.

It was a big disappointment. I've been through quite a lot of situations even though I'm still young and that was probably the lowest I've felt in football. I was thrown in at the deep end when Shaun Cooper got injured, but I just wanted to go on and do well, but it wasn't our night and nothing went for us and it's a night that will always stay with me and when I think

about it, it just drives me on to do well. Although it was one of the worst feelings I've had in football, it will always drive me on to succeed.

Just to show how quickly football can change, within a few days, you were on a high again with your first start and first home goal!

Yes, football is a funny old game isn't it! That will always happen and you have to take the highs and lows. For every good game I have, I'm sure there will be some bad ones, but as long as I always give 100%, then that's all I can do. It was great for me to start the game and to get a goal. I'm only young, so it's great to get a goal and see my name in the paper and people start to recognise who you are. It was really nice to get a goal and even nicer to get the win after the result at Blyth. All the lads were on a high after that, and that's something we have to get back to.

You were in the squad last season that got so close to getting out of trouble and we need that same spirit again now.

Yes and it can be done, we all know it can be done. We have been working hard as a team. We have had sessions with the people from the boxing club and they have told us that we need to be like a family. We are sticking together as a team and the more we do that, the more we pull together in the same direction and if we do that we can get out of the mess we're in.

Eddie was on the coaching staff during that great run, so he knows what it takes.

He does and the backbone of that team are still here, so we all know we can do it and we all believe it's only a matter of time when things start going our way, but we know things have to pick up quickly. Things just haven't been falling for us, like at Darlington where we had chances to put the game to bed and at Rotherham where we had a number of late chances. On another day, those chances may have gone in and things would look a lot different now. We only have ourselves to look at and we have to believe in ourselves and that we will get up the table.

You're already popular with supporters, so you know exactly what this clubs means to them. I do yes and we have a great set of supporters here

I do yes and we have a great set of supporters here who are very passionate about the club. All everyone wants is for the team to do well and that's all we want too. I know some supporters complain about the team and we can all understand the frustrations of people because of the results. All the lads give absolutely everything in every game and we want to do it for the supporters who have been through so much here. We want to stay in the football league and if we can get everyone pulling in the right direction, the supporters, the players and the background staff, then I'm sure we can get ourselves out of it.

Overall, you're enjoying the experience?

I am yes, this is what I have wanted to do since I was about four! Being a professional footballer has always been my ambition. All I want to do now is to do my best to help keep Bournemouth in the football league and that is all that is on my mind at the moment.




Seasons Past 1974-75

The programme summed up the decline in fortunes at the club. It was identical to the previous seasons issue, except it had gone down to A5 in size. The cover was the same as the season before and the layout had few changes. It was 24 pages for 10p and the main thing that was lacking was any photos. It was black and white throughout and featured all aspects of the club. It used all the available space and remained one of the better programmes of the time.

After the disappointing end to the 73-74 season, hopes were not too high of a promotion push, but no one tipped Bournemouth for a relegation battle. Prior to the season starting, five directors resigned from the board. Despite the fact that all the 'big time' players had left with John Bond, the side started the season well and picked up nine points in their first six games, a great record considering that it was two points for a win. The fact that the side had such a gruelling start to the season in the league cup took its toll and a 5-2 defeat at Preston was the start of a downward spiral.

Goalscoring proved to be a major stumbling block throughout the season and after the defeat at Preston, the side only scored in one of their next six games. That was an extraordinary result too, coming with a 4-0 thrashing of fallen giants Crystal Palace. That wasn't enough to halt the slide down the table though and by Christmas, Bournemouth were in the



bottom four, with promotion challengers Plymouth Argyle winning 7-3 at Dean Court on 11 January.

That heavy home defeat though was followed by a 2-1 win at fellow strugglers Aldershot and many felt that it could be the start of a decent run. It proved to be a false dawn. Les Parodi's goal against Preston North End on Saturday 15 March, a tap in from a couple of feet out, was the only goal the side scored in nine games.

An amazing win at promotion pushing Charlton at the start of April again gave hope, but again the side couldn't build on it and went in to the final two games needing to score eight goals to have any chance of staying up. Bitter rivals Watford came down on the last scheduled day and the Cherries went 4-0 up thanks to a scintillating display. The side even had two goals disallowed and when Watford scored late on, the battle against the drop was almost over. The result did mean that Watford were down.

Ten days later, Peterborough visited for a re-arranged game and Bournemouth needed to win 6-0 to overtake Aldershot and stay up. Aldershot could have already been safe, but had been deducted a point for fielding an illegible player. The side did everything they could, going 2-0 up and again having two goals disallowed. Time ran out though and Peterborough's late goal meant nothing. In fact the only thing to cheer in the second half was the game being held up as a dog ran across the pitch! It meant that Bournemouth finished in

21st place on the same number of points as Aldershot, but with an inferior goal difference and were relegated.

The Peterborough match, played on Tuesday 5 May, was the last time that the wooden part of the South End was ever used at Dean Court. The club needed the space just a couple of seasons before, but now it just made the small crowds look even smaller as the depressing season came to a close.

Many felt that it was the League Cup that cost Bournemouth because it caused such a fixture congestion at the start of the season. In those days, League Cup games were played until there was a winner, and if a game was drawn, it was extra time and then a replay. It meant that from 17 August to 28 September, the Cherries played an incredible 14 games. Seven of those came in the league cup, with Bournemouth only reaching the second round! After two 1-1 draws against Gillingham, the sides met at Griffin Park, Brentford with the Cherries running out 2-1 winners to set up a second round tie with Hartlepool. Games ended 1-1, 2-2 and 1-1 to set up another hike up country to Hartlepool where they finally won the game 1-0 and end the seemingly never ending journeys!

In the FA Cup, Sussex League minnows Southwick visited Dean Court. Bournemouth brushed them aside with a 5-0 win, with Howard Goddard scoring a hat trick. In the second round, Bournemouth drew 0-0 at non league Wycombe. In the home game though, all was going well until keeper Kevin Charlton sustained an

injury and was replaced at half time by John Wingate and Wycombe went on to take full advantage and win 2-1.

It was a very disruptive season and no players were ever present. Trevor Hartley was the manager, the youngest in the league and he used Keiron Baker, John Benson, Steve Buttle, Kevin Charlton, John Delaney, Harry Falconer, Howard Goodard, Brian Greenhalgh, Neil Hague, Trevor Howard, Gary Jones, Doug Livermore, Neil Merrick, Keith Miller, Stuart Morgan, Mark Nightingale, John O'Rourke, Les Parodi, John Parsons, Clive Payne, Harry Redknapp, Derek Rickard, John Rudge, Wayne Talkes, Alan Welsh and John Wingate.

Top scorers were Howard Goddard and Trevor Howard who both scored ten goals in all competitions.

Crowds fell alarmingly from just a couple of years before. The biggest crowd was 10,307 for the visit of Crystal Palace while the lowest was 4,116 for the match against Chesterfield.

It was also a relegation season for Luton Town. They were in the top flight and finished in 19th place. They went down despite a fantastic run in the second half of the season. By just before Christmas, they had won only one game all season, but turned it round to make a real fight of it. On the last day of the season, they needed to better what ever Tottenham did. Spurs won 4-2 at home against Leeds while Luton came from behind to draw 1-1 with Manchester City which meant Tottenham finished on 34 points and were safe while Luton finished on 33 and went down.

Derby County won the First Division. finishing two points ahead of Liverpool and Ipswich. Relegated were Luton, Chelsea and Carlisle.

Division Two saw the biggest increase of attendances in the country as Manchester United were in that league. Along with Aston Villa and Norwich City, they won promotion. Going down were Millwall, Cardiff City and Sheffield Wednesday.

While the Cherries struggled in Division Three. Blackburn, Plymouth and Charlton all gained promotion. Going down with Bournemouth were Tranmere, Watford and Huddersfield

The four sides were replaced by Mansfield. Shrewsbury, Rotherham and Chester. Darlington, Swansea, Workington and Scunthorpe all successfully applied for re-election.

West Ham won the FA Cup, beating Fulham 2-0 in the final. The main story of the FA Cup though was of non league Wimbledon. Keeper Dickie Guy was their hero as they managed a 0-0 draw at Leeds in the Fourth Round, finally bowing out 1-0 in a replay played at Selhurst Park.

Other giant killers were fourth division Chester who made it all the way through to the League Cup semi final and came so close to reaching Wembley. They faced higher league opposition in every round, beating the likes of Leeds and Newcastle to get to the semi final where they met Aston Villa. In the home leg, they drew 2-2 and were so unlucky to go out after the second leg. where they lost 3-2 at Villa Park. They gained promotion at the end of the season by fourhundredths of a goal, the first time they had ever been promoted in their history.

Jaws was released in the cinemas and became the top grossing film of all time.

In the League Cup final, there was a lot of interest in Bournemouth on the game as Aston Villa beat Norwich 1-0 at Wembley in a game played between two teams from outside the top flight. Mel Machin, Phil Boyer, Tony Powell and Ted MacDougall all played for Norwich, managed by John Bond.

Richard Nixon became the first President of the USA to resign over the Watergate scandal.

Leeds United reached the final of the European Cup. losing 2-0 to Bayern Munich in Paris. Dynamo Kiev won the Cup Winners Cup, beating Ferencyaros 3-0 in Basel and Borussia Monchengladbach won the Uefa Cup. In the first leg at home, they drew 0-0 against Twente Enschede and in the away leg, recorded a terrific 5-1 win to lift the trophy.

Mohamed Ali beat George Foreman in eight rounds to regain the heavyweight title in Zaire, a bout known as the Rumble in the Jungle.

Alan Mullery was the PFA Player of the Year.

Top selling singles were Lonely This Christmas by Mud, Down Down by Status Quo and I'm Not In Love by 10CC. Top selling albums included Altlantic Crossing by Rod Stewart, Born to Run by Bruce Springsteen, Crisis? What Crisis by Supertramp and Physical Graffiti by Led Zeppelin.

Prior to the season starting, the World Cup was held in West Germany with the hosts beating Holland 2-1 in the final.

Lee Bradbury, Hilary Swank, Tim Henman, Sol Campbell, Louise Redknapp, Leonardo DiCaprio, Paul Scholes, Natalie Imbruglia, Gary Neville, Drew Barrymore, Robbie Fowler and David Beckham were all born during the season.

Jake Thomson

Interview



Making an eye catching home debut on Saturday was on loan midfielder Jake Thomson. Jake is here initially for a month from Southampton and capped a fine display with the vital third goal. A young player with a huge enthusiasm for the game, he can't wait to get out there tonight for the massive game against Luton Town.

He capped his display with the goal, but in the greater scheme of things, he knows the three points were more important than his individual success, "It was a great game and a great performance from the lads. For me personally, it was nice to get the goal, but the most important thing was to get the win and it doesn't matter who scores the goals. Everyone now has to get together and build on it because there would be no point in winning on Saturday if we do nothing tonight."

It was a very different sort of game from Jake's debut at Rotherham, one of the more unusual experiences for supporters and players, "It wasn't nice at Rotherham. It felt like there were no supporters at the game and almost felt like a training match. It's a very difficult place for any visiting player to go to, so it was really good to play at Dean Court."

It was a slightly delayed home debut for Jake, but he found the experience a very enjoyable one, "It was great to play here and the atmosphere was superb. There was the added boost of Fletch coming back and that gave a lift to the whole club. We conceded an early goal and from what I've been told, the lads find it hard to recover from that, but we had a perfect response. You can't ask for more quality than Brett's free kick and then Pearcey was 50/50 with the defender at the far post, but he showed great determination and it ended up in the back of the net. Then I happened to get the one that took us out of reach of them. It was brilliant to have all the supporters right behind us, even when we went a goal down. Football at the end of the day is about entertainment and that's what we aim to do. We want to get more people down here to watch us because this team is definitely good enough to play some fabulous football and beat anyone in this league."

One thing's for certain, Jake knew exactly what he was doing with the goal and it was a very difficult skill to execute, which he did with aplomb, "There wasn't enough space for me to get my foot round the ball to send in a cross, so it was my only option. I always look to see where the keeper is, I do that during the game and if he stands out, then if the opportunity comes, I know what to do. He always left a bit of his goal open so I thought if I put it to the back post then either someone could run in or it would go in. Fortunately enough for me, it went in."

After all the effort of Saturday, the side have to do it all again tonight, but that doesn't bother Jake in any way! "This is what we all want to do, I'd love to play every day, but maybe the legs wouldn't let me! There is enough time between Saturday and tonight to get ready. The adrenalin is running through us now and the supporters can really help us again. There is no doubt that this a a massive game for us and I think there is enough in the changing room to be able to get the result we want."

It is a huge game against a Luton side who have done magnificently this season and this is the only game that Jake is looking at, "I don't think we can look further than the next game. We can't worry about what happens around us with other teams, it's all about us. If we win all our games, we stay up, it's simple. We just have to go from game to game. I play for Bournemouth now and that's my team and all I want to do is well for Bournemouth and firmly focussed on that. Southampton will obviously be in the back of my mind, but I'm 100% for this club. I have six games left and if I can contribute more to the team, then that's what I aim to do."

Jake may be on loan, but he is totally committed to the cause at Dean Court and is loving the experience, "It's great being here. I haven't played loads of games in my career, so it's a great feeling to be here and involved in a great performance on my home debut and getting a goal. The supporters were fantastic, so I just hope it can be the same tonight."

SHREWS ARE THE NEXT TEAM IN COURT

The next visitors to Dean Court will be Shrewsbury Town, who arrive on Saturday, 7 February for their first visit since April 2003, when Bournemouth won 2-1 thanks to goals by Scott McDonald and Wade Elliott. However, they are set to be without broken leg victim midfielder Kevin McIntyre, who suffered a double fracture of his right fibula in their 1-1 draw at Port Vale 10 days ago. Boss Paul Simpson explained: "The specialist has said there's a possibility he could



be back in training in six weeks - we hope to get him back before the end of the season." The Shrews face two sets of Bees this week - visiting Barnet this evening, before hosting Brentford on Saturday.

TWO FORWARDS AND A KEEPER FOR DALE

Rochdale boss Keith Hill has been busy in the transfer market since the turn of the year - and his first move was to make Cambridge United striker Lee McEvilly's move permanent following a loan





for two years," Hill explained. "Once we knew he was back from Northampton and available, we moved to recruit him." However, leaving Spotland has been striker Jon Shaw, who has joined Crawley on loan until the end of the season.

CARLTON & GERKEN JOIN QUAKERS PROMOTION PUSH

Darlington were unbeaten in six games going into Saturday's game at Shrewsbury, and manager Dave Penney has recently replenished his squad by signing Carlisle striker Danny Carlton on loan for the rest of the season, and Colchester keeper Dean



Gerken on a month's loan. Gerken made his debut in their recent 5-1 thumping of tonight's visitors Luton, although French winger Sebastien Carole - who came on as a substitute in that game - has left the club after less than two months in Darlington's colours. Carole had previously played for West Ham, Brighton and Leeds. Meanwhile, down the coast from Darlington, Grimsby have completed the free transfer signing of Barnsley defender Rob Atkinson following a successful loan spell.

VALE'S TUDOR FORCED TO RETIRE

Port Vale winger Shane Tudor has been forced to retire from football at the age of 26 because of a persistent knee injury. Tudor began his career at Wolves, but made just one substitute appearance before moving on to spells at Cambridge United and Leyton Orient. He joined Vale in the summer of 2007, but has started just 11 league games for them. "I've had six cortisone injections, two operations and have an eight-inch scar down my leg," Tudor explained. "Sometimes you just have to accept defeat, but I'm saddened that the fans have never seen me play to the best of my ability for Port Vale." Meanwhile, Vale have beaten local rivals Crewe to complete the permanent signing of Stockport defender Gareth Owen, who had a loan spell at Vale Park in December. And former Vale manager Lee Sinnott, who lost his job back in September, has been named as the new manager of non-league side Bradford Park Avenue but is now taking legal action against Vale over compensation which he claims is owed to him.

BRASS REPLACES ALLISON AT GIGG LANE

Bury have filled their vacant assistant manager's position by promoting Chris Brass to be boss Alan Knill's new number two. Knill's previous assistant Chris Wilder had left Gigg Lane just before Christmas, the day after Bury's 2-0 defeat here at Bournemouth, to take over as manager of Oxford United. Wilder had initially been replaced by veteran ex-Chesterfield striker Wayne Allison, who joined the coaching staff on a voluntary basis, but Knill admitted: "It didn't guite work out as we had hoped." Allison has now left the Shakers - who have now turned to Brass, who had first joined them in January 2006 as a player. However, he took over as centre of excellence manager in the summer of 2007, and had a spell as caretaker manager last year following the sacking of Chris Casper. In other news from Gigg Lane, midfielder Michael Jones has signed a twoyear contract extension.

SINCLAIR MAKES MACC MOVE

Macclesfield boss Keith Alexander has signed Nottingham Forest striker Emile Sinclair on a month's



loan, after he impressed the Macc manager in a reserve game. Sinclair has recently returned from a loan spell at non-league side Mansfield, and Alexander explained: "While Emile is learning his trade, he has bags of potential. We saw at close quarters what he is capable of when he played against the reserves earlier this season, but he also has great pace, which is an asset at any level." However, leaving Moss Rose has been teenage striker Nick Blackman, who has joined Premier League side Blackburn on a two-and-a-half-year deal.

BOLASIE IS NEWEST FACE AT BARNET

Barnet have continued to move players in and out of Underhill (see Wycombe programme) as they look to move up the table. The latest new arrival is teenage Plymouth winger Yannick Bolasie, who has arrived on a month's loan - having just returned from a similar spell at Rushden & Diamonds. Moving out of the exit door at Underhill has been utility man Ashley Carew, who has made 13 appearances for Barnet this season - including one here at Dean Court in December - but has dropped into Blue Square South for a month-long loan spell at Eastleigh. Boss Ian Baird explained: "I made contact with Barnet manager Ian Hendon and he told me Carew would not figure in his side - as there is no reserve team, it suits both parties." Hendon has also extended the loan spell of Arsenal defender Abu Ogogo, who also played in Barnet's win here in December, until the end of the season.

LINCOLN

This Saturday sees us make our first trip to Lincoln since 2002, and a repeat of our 2-1 win that day certainly wouldn't go amiss!

It's quite a straightforward trip to Sincil Bank, straight up the M1, on the A46 from Leicester to Lincoln and the ground is signposted. It's about a four and half hour drive. Once there, there is a car park at the ground which charges £4 per car, or side street parking and a large free car park about a 15 minute walk away.

The ground is all seated with the away section being on the side, giving a decent view of the game. It's a large stand that is relatively new and gives unobstructed views of the pitch. Opposite is the main stand, that only runs half the length of the pitch. There are plans in the pipeline to extend this stand to run the whole length of the pitch, but the capacity of the stadium is certainly more than adequate now. To the right of the away section is a small stand behind the goal with executive boxes and opposite is a larger stand. One thing that you will notice if you haven't been to Lincoln before is that even though it's a large ground and there are plenty of empty seats, the atmosphere is always good!

There is not a great deal to do in the immediate vicinity of the ground, but the supporters club (Centre Spot) which is next to the away supporters entrance, does admit away followers. If you want to be a little more

adventurous, it's definitely worth going along the high street to the city centre. Lincoln is a city steeped in history, with the cathedral being the focal point of the whole area.

There are also a number of decent pubs in the town. Popular with real ale buffs is the Golden Eagle, which is on the High Street and there is also The Ritz, which is a Wetherspoons and next door to that is The Anchor.

Lincoln in years past have been an almost permanent fixture in the League 2/Division Three play offs. Last season was the first time since 2002 that they haven't been involved. This season has seen them very much entrenched in mid table. They will of course be looking to complete the double over the Cherries after their 1-0 win at Dean Court earlier this season when they were on a fine run of form. That was one of four consecutive games that they won and talk was of another stab at the play offs, but their form has tailed off and they have won two of their last eleven and also been knocked out of the FA Cup in an ill tempered affair against Kettering. They have been held to a number of draws at Sincil Bank and go to Chester today looking for their first win in 2009.

It's a tough place to go to, but one where we need to gain revenge for the defeat here in October and also look to gain three vital points.



DAGENHAM & REDBRIDGE

A week today, we have another new ground to add to the list this season as we travel to Dagenham & Redbridge. Now in their second year as a Football League club, The Daggers were tipped to struggle this season, but have enjoyed a fine campaign.

They play at Victoria Road, which was the home to just Dagenham, but a number of non league clubs have merged with them to form the present club. It is a compact but tidy ground that has undergone a number of improvements in recent years. The main stand is small, but does have a separate section now for visiting supporters, offering the only cover for Bournemouth supporters. The away end is a narrow uncovered terrace behind one goal and there is another uncovered terrace behind the opposite goal. Along the side is a small covered terrace.

We do have tickets on sale here at Dean Court and it is worth buying them in advance as you can save money.

The ground is somewhat tucked away, but not too hard to get to. There is a car park at the ground, but this is usually full around 45 minutes before the game. If you arrive after this, there is street parking.

If you are going by train, you need to get on the tube and the District Line to Dagenham East, which does take quite a while to reach! If you are going this way, have a look out for the Big Brother house that the tube train passes! Once at Dagenham East, the ground is signposted from the station.

For a pre match drink, there is a supporters club at the ground that admits away supporters for a small fee. There are three pubs within walking distance of the ground, The Eastbrook, The Railway and The Bull.

Dagenham's direct style has given them a great deal of success this season and they certainly know where the net is and have hit six on two occasions this term. Bournemouth though travel to East London knowing that a win will complete the double over the Daggers. Back in October, goals from Lee Bradbury and Brett Pitman helped to set up a 2-1 win and a repeat of that would be very welcome indeed! Until Exeter won there a week ago, they had only lost once at home all season. The Grecians 2-1 win meant that the Daggers six match unbeaten run, that helped to earn John Still the manager of the month award, was over.

They make the long trip to Grimsby tonight, so lets hope they can win there and then we can win at Victoria Road next week!
