

In different circumstances these would have been quite acceptable results but at the stage of the season we are now at, as I have said, these run of draws MUST be turned into wins by hook or by crook.


The effort and commitment levels are there for all to see, the lads, week in week out, are putting in a fantastic shift and at the moment their performances deserve more than the two points we have tallied.

We have spoken many times about the excellent support that we have received both at home and on our travels and we are immensely proud of the effort and expense everyone has gone to in supporting the team in this very important season. There is no doubt that we have some of the best fans in the country especially bearing in mind the turmoil at the club over recent years, and the position we currently find ourselves in.

This emotion was no more evident than at our last home match against Bradford. In a really tight game that was full

of excitement, the support you gave ensured the players gave everything possible until the final whistle. However, it is a shame to report that the actions of a mindless few ruined the day.

It is completely unacceptable for any visitor to Kenilworth Road to encroach on the pitch or to throw things at officials. players or management. We at LTFC2020 are hugely disappointed that the massive efforts we have made to rebuild the reputation of our great club, taking long hours and Herculean effort, have been diminished due to the actions of a very small number of supporters. We must seek these people out, we will use

all powers available to us to identify them and we will take swift and appropriate actions available to us to ensure that this never happens again. We will fully cooperate with the FA and the Police in their investigations, to ensure that the club and the majority of our supporters are not unfairly punished once again for the actions of the few.

We cannot tolerate such behaviour and as such, we will use every method at our disposal to identify, prosecute and exclude the culprits and anyone who aided them.

When we started this journey, it was to restore pride in Luton Town by both supporters and governing bodies, so much so that we often used the term "Beacon Club". We wanted to show the world of football that no matter what sanctions we were given for the actions of past management (none of which are now at the club), we would hold our heads high, we would operate professionally and we would play the game in the only way Luton Town knows. We wanted to show other clubs that our business model is not only good for future financial stability, but that it also ensures supporter and community involvement. pride in our youngsters, and a restoration of the good name Luton Town once had.

Despite all of the efforts of the staff, players and management of the club, a handful of supporters may have damaged everything we have done to date. The pictures beamed across the nation affect not just

the club's reputation, but also those of our honest and well behaved supporters, our sponsors, to whom we are eternally grateful for sticking with us during difficult times, and our investors.

The actions of a foolish minority could have a severe effect on our club and will destroy the improvements we have made to date in repairing our reputation. It impacts the policing and stewarding costs. as is the case for today's match, and the fragile financial stability of the club. It also leaves us exposed to further financial and sporting punishments by the footballing authorities. The repercussions of which could be extensive. Such penalties could be the difference between being able to sign a player or not.

We at LTFC2020 will start the rebuilding work all over again in recognition of the fact that by far the majority of the crowd, whilst hugely disappointed with the result, acted as responsible adults. It



is hugely demoralising to see the successful work we have done to date potentially wiped out in a matter of minutes.


We are determined to make Kenilworth Road a good place to be; a place to bring family and friends, a place to be proud and hold our heads up high. It has witnessed wonderful events and we all





The Hatters share the points and six goals with Bradford City in an incredible game at Kenilworth Road.

After leading 2-o at half time with goals from Asa Hall and Sunday Wasiu, the Bantams hit back with two goals in the first 12 minutes in the second half to equalise. The Town then thought they'd won it when Hall headed Kevin Nicholls' free-kick in injury time but, in a dramatic and controversial twist at the end.

In the Puma Youth Alliance, the Hatters' Under 18s' game with Peterborough was postponed due to a water-logged pitch.



attendance for this fixture, 17864. Hugh Billington wrapped up the points with Luton's second.

The most number of goals in this fixture came in March 1951 when Luton won 4-2.
Bernard Moore scored twice, with Charlie Watkins and Pat McAuley also netting. This was McAuley's only goal for Luton, in his eight appearances, after signing from Celtic.

The only penalty to be converted by Luton in this fixture came on 1st September 1954. Bert Mitchell scored from the spot, with further goals from Gordon Turner and Jimmy Adam in a 3-2 win.

The biggest margin of victory is by four goals, and this came in the 1961/62 season. Gordon Turner was on the scoresheet once more, netting twice, a feat repeated by Alec Ashworth in a 4-0 win.

4633 The lowest attendance for this fixture, back on 4th September 1999, only 4633 fans saw the sides share the points in a 1-1 draw.

Andrew Fotiadis opened the scoring but Bury soon equalised through Lee Richardson, his only goal for the club during a onemonth loan spell.

17 The number of previous league meetings between the two teams at Kenilworth Road. Luton have won 11, drawn four and lost just twice. The Hatters have scored 32 goals and conceded 16.

1 The only player to have been transferred in either direction between the clubs is Samuel Davies who made his debut in 1897 after his move south. Davies went on to make 28 appearances in Luton's first season in the Football League. Davies scored twice, his first coming against Tottenham Hotspur in a 4-3 win in an FA Cup qualifying round match, and the other from the penalty spot in a 6-o league victory at home to Grimsby.

The year in which the sides first met in league action and the visitors won 1-0 on October 2. Although Luton were to get revenge in the return tie winning 4-3, courtesy of a hat-trick from Joe Payne, and one from Billy Redfern.

17864 Redfern scored again the following season with Eddie Connolly also scoring a 2-1 win.

Connolly returned to Kenilworth Road from West Brom in 1946 and on September 14th he scored in front of the largest

Bury arrive at Kenilworth Road on the back of a four-match unbeaten run which has propelled the Shakers back amongst League 2's top three and leaves them four points behind leaders Wycombe.

In fact, their last defeat came at the hands of the Chairboys, in January, but since then they have won three and drawn one of the following four games with all three victories coming in front of the Gigg Lane faithful.

A 1-0 home win over Barnet was followed by a goalless draw against Exeter at St James Park.

And two straight wins on home soil against promotion rivals Aldershot and Bradford has given the Shakers a great chance of holding on to an automatic promotion place.

Today's visitors have only conceded once during their unbeaten sequence and will be looking for their sixth win on their travels at Kenilworth Road this afternoon.

PREVIOUS MEETINGS:

Luton wins: 18 Bury wins: 12 Draws: 8

When it comes to head to head meetings Luton hold a slender lead, having won 18 of the ties, going back to the first meeting between the two sides back in an FA Cup tie in 1923.

However, the win over Bury at Gigg Lane earlier this season was the first time the Hatters had beaten the Shakers since a 3-2 League Cup win in 1973 at Kenilworth Road.

The Town's biggest win over today's visitors was a 4-o victory at Kenilworth Road in 1961.

Bury have beaten the Hatters three times by three goals, all of which occurred in a three-year period, with victories in 1947 (3-0), 1949 (5-2) and 1950 (4-1), all at Gigg Lane.

Last time at Kenilworth Road: Luton Town 1-2 Bury 24th April 2001.

The Hatters were struggling at the bottom of the old Division 2 the last time Bury visited Kenilworth Road in April 2001.

Liam George fired the Town ahead in the seventh minute but the visitors hit back to equalise two minutes later through Chris Swailes.

Swailes' namesake Danny was sent off six minutes before the break, for the Shakers, but Colin Cramb earned the visitors all three points with a goal a

LAST FIVE SEASONS IN FOCUS:

This season is the Shakers' eighth in League Two after their relegation from the old Second Division in 2001.

Since then Bury have quietly gone about their business over the past five seasons, only managing a best of 12th place in 2004.

Between 2005 and 2007 the Shakers finished in the lower reaches of League 2 and survived relegation to the Conference in 2006 by just three points.

Later in 2006 the Bury had the misfortune of being the first professional club to be thrown out of the FA Cup after they fielded an ineligible player in their second round replay match with Chester.

Last season, under the guidance of Alan Knill the Shakers steadied the ship with a 13th place and the former Rotherham Manager has carried on where he left off, steering his side towards automatic promotion.

RIDGE

the manager: alan knill

Alan Knill was appointed as Bury's 35th manager on Monday 4th February 2008 with the former Welsh international leaving Saltergate where he had been assistant manager to Lee Richardson at Chesterfield.

Knill was returning to familiar surroundings at Gigg Lane where he first arrived as a player in 1989.

Bury paid a then record transfer fee of £95,000 to Swansea to secure his registration. Alan went onto make 144 league appearances for the Shakers before signing for Scunthorpe United after a loan spell at Cardiff City.

He began his managerial career with Rotherham following the sacking of Ronnie Moore. He was at the club as a youth coach but stepped into the breach to make a valiant effort to keep Rotherham in the Championship and he was eventually endorsed as manager in December 2005.

star man: andy bishop

The striker signed at the end of the 2005/06 season from York City. Andy quickly adapted to league football and has continued with his goal scoring skills whilst with Bury.

Bishop has finished the last two seasons as the club's leading scorer with over 20 goals to his credit. He started his career with Walsall, but he failed to break into the first team at the Bescot Stadium he was loaned out to Kidderminster Harriers, Rochdale and Yeovil over two seasons. Andy was eventually released from Walsall and signed for York. Another 34 goals came his way at KitKat Crescent before Bury pounced for his signature. Bishop has recently put an end to speculation linking him with a move away from the Shakers by signing an extension to his current contract to keep him at Gigg Lane until the end of the 2011/12 season.

GOALKEEPERS

WAYNE BROWN

Wayne Brown signed for the Shakers during the summer after rejecting a new deal offered to him by Hereford United for personal reasons. Last season brought nothing but success for Wayne with Hereford promoted, the Southampton-born stopper kept 21 clean sheets. Wayne was also crowned as the Bulls' player of the season and his move to Gig Lane surprised many.

MARK TYLER

Peterborough's longest-serving player found first team opportunities at London Road limited during the 2007/08 campaign and ended the season on-loan at Championship side Hull City although a back injury meant he couldn't fully challenge the first-choice shot-stopper at the KC Stadium. Tyler was transfer listed during the summer and was linked with a number of sides, but started the new League 1 season at Peterborough United. He joined Bury at the beginning on January as cover for the injured Wayne Brown.

DEFENDERS

DAVID BUCHANAN

A product of the Shakers youth system, Buchanan joined the Shakers in 2003 as part of the youth team and completed his two-year scholarship with ease. In April 2005 he was given his chance within the Shakers first team after rave reviews from his performances for the reserve side. Known to have scored the odd spectacular goal or two for the second string, David has yet to find the back of the net for the first team. David is a regular for the Northern Ireland U21 side, earning himself 13 caps and two goals.

RYAN CRESSWELL

Rotherham-born Ryan joined the Shakers on a two-year contract during the summer on a free transfer from Sheffield United. Ryan

had been due to join Hungarian side Ferenyacos on a season long loan, but a move to Gigg Lane was a better option for him. A tall powerful central defender, he has gained league experience after coming through the academy system at Bramall Lane.

BEN FUTCHER

Ben Futcher is the latest in a line of 'Futchers' that have played professional football. Son of Paul Futcher, Nephew of Ron Futcher and cousin of Charlton's Danny Murphy. Ben started his career at Oldham Athletic but quickly joined local non-league side Stalybridge. He also enjoyed spells with Doncaster Rovers, Lincoln City, Boston United, Grimsby Town and Peterborough United before he joined Bury in the summer of

STEVE HASLAM

Started his career with Sheffield Wednesday in 1998 as a trainee and went onto make 115 appearances for the Owls over the next six seasons. including 23 games in the Premiership.


Aged just 19, his debut against Liverpool could be described as a game to forget as the Reds hit seven goals in the game. Released in 2004, Steve chose to join Halifax Town and soon became a first team regular for the Shaymen. Signed for Bury for the start of the 2006/07 season after initially agreeing to a new deal at the Shav, but a return to league football was simply too good to turn down.

PAUL SCOTT

Current player of the season, for the second year running, after another very successful season for the Huddersfieldborn defender/midfield player. 'Scotty' joined Bury before the 2004/05 season after successfully applying for a trial at Gigg Lane. Initially offered a short term deal with Bury, the contract was soon extended into a full two year deal. Now one of the club's longest serving players and one of the first names on the team sheet.

EFETOBORE SODIE

Efe Sodje arrived at Gigg Lane in





February 2008, initially on loan from Gillingham. Following his release from Gillingham, Efe signed a two year contract in July with the Shakers as player-coach. A vastly experienced centre-half that began his league career with Stevenage Borough before moving to Macclesfield Town where he wrote himself into the Silkmen's history books by scoring their very first league goal. As well as playing for Luton he has also enjoyed spells with Crewe Alexandra, Huddersfield Town, Yeovil. Southend and eventually Gillingham.

MIDFIELDERS

RICHIE BAKER

Joined the Shakers in July 2006 after his surprise release from Preston North End's youth system and their loss was the Shakers gain. Pace and ability on the ball are just two of Richie's strong points and he has proved to be a valuable asset to the club.

BRIAN BARRY-MURPHY

Cork born Brian signed for the Shakers in the summer of 2004 after being released by Sheffield Wednesday. Barry-Murphy started his career but

made just six appearances for the Lilywhites. Two loan moves to Southend and Hartlepool soon followed before he joined Sheffield Wednesday in October 2002 on a free transfer. Accurate from corners and deadly with free kicks, he has the ability to stun crowds from distance

ELLIOTT BENNETT

Elliott is a fast, tricky and skilful player that is currently on loan from Wolverhampton Wanderers. A product of the youth system at Molineux he made his senior debut in a Carling Cup win over Bradford City in August 2007. A loan move to Crewe Alexandra soon followed but it was another loan spell that really pushed his career when he joined Bury last season. He finished his three-month spell last season with a goal against Macclesfield Town and will be keen to add to his tally for the club whilst at Gigg Lane

STEPHEN DAWSON

A former Irish U21 midfield player, Stephen signed for the Shakers during the closed season after rejecting a new deal from relegated Mansfield Town. He began his career at Leicester City, though despite captaining the Foxes

reserve side, found first team opportunities hard to come by at the Walkers Stadium. Stephen made the decision to drop down the leagues and joined the Stags.

MICHAEL IONES

A product of the youth system at Tranmere Rovers, Birkenhead born lones came through the ranks at Prenton Park and was handed a full debut in the final game of the 2005/06 season. Released at the end of last season, Michael successfully completed a pre-season trial period at Gigg Lane and has recently signed a two-year extension to his contract.

STRIKERS

GLYNN HURST

BURLING

A much travelled and vastly experienced striker and goal scorer that arrived at Gigg Lane initially on loan in September 2006 from Shrewsbury Town. Born in Bamsley, Hurst started his career with his home town club and has had successful spells at Ayr, Stockport, Chesterfield and Notts County. His arrival at Gigg Lane sparked an upturn in the club's fortunes and he began to show Bury fans why his reputation was so high.



ANDY MORRELL

Andy's entry into football is perhaps one of the strangest after his break came from when he started talking to Sky Sports presenter Rob McCaffrey. Rob was helping to write the autobiography of Joey Jones, who was then Wrexham's first-team coach, and Rob arranged for him to have a trial at the club. After a week's trial he was kept on at Wrexham and he scored 34 league goals in 45 games in the 2002/03 season, making him top scorer in all four divisions that year. He moved to. Coventry City and then onto Blackpool before joining the Shakers on the opening day of the new season on a two-year contract.

Highly-rated striker Andy Bishop may have taken most of the headlines this season with his goalscoring exploits, but strike partner Andy Morrell has shone for the Shakers in their last two matches after netting the winning goals on both occasions.

Morrell described his relief at getting back amongst the goals for Bury, taking his tally to five for the campaign, following successive strikes against Aldershot Town and Bradford City:

"It plays on your mind a little bit and I feel like I can contribute without goals, but that's why I was brought here, so it's just nice to get back on the scoresheet and also to be the match winner in two games."

The Shakers now find themselves in third position in League 2 despite a poor run through October and November, a spell which nearly threatened to ruin the club's aim of promotion.

"We had a little bit of a dodgy October — we lost five on the spin at home but we were playing half decent in some of the games so it wasn't the end of the world.

"We just knew we had to raise our game an extra 10-15% and we'd be

back to winning games and that's what seems to have happened."

"It's huge for the club. The last three seasons he's scored 20+ goals, so that in anyone's team is a massive bonus. It shows the club's ambition for the rest


of the squad as well, so we're pleased he's staying."

"All the players stuck to the tasks and jobs we gave them and played their part in a 2-o win and a good performance."







Manager David Pleat had departed to take up the hot seat at Sheffield Wednesday with his place taken by Youth coach Terry Westley, who immediately had to oversee the transfers of David Preece to Derby under freedom of contract and Paul Telfer to Coventry for a tribunal set £1.15 million.

Given much of the Telfer money to spend, Westley set about bolstering the squad with the signings of Gavin Johnson, David Oldfield, Graham Alexander, Steve Davis, Bontcho Guentchev and Darren Patterson. Hardly a day went by without news of yet

another imminent signing! Sadly, a 'three at the back' system initially employed by Westley failed to work and coupled with injuries to key players the Town managed only one win in the first nine games.

The signing of two Danes, Johnny Vilstrup and Vidar Riseth for a combined fee of £300,000 smacked of desperation and with neither helping to turn things around, the season got steadily worse and after a 0-4 thrashing at Portsmouth, just before Christmas, Westley left 'by mutual consent'.

A safe pair of hands was needed at the helm and the Hatters turned to ex-Charlton and Middlesbrough manager Lennie Lawrence, who saw his new players for the first time in a fighting 2-2 home draw with Huddersfield – which came after the Town were reduced to ten men following the dismissal of

Steve Davis. If Lawrence felt that his magic wand was being waved immediately he was in for a rude shock when, in his second game, he watched as the Hatters went down 1-7 at Grimsby in the FA Cup.

Lawrence knew that he had a decent spine in the side with Westley's last signing lan Feuer in goal, Steve Davis at centrehalf, Gary Waddock as a good holding midfielder and the quicksilver Dwight Marshall up front. All that was needed was self belief.

A week after the Grimsby debacle, the Town were up against a Southend side that had not lost in eight games and won convincingly 3-1.

They followed this up with a battling 1-0 win at Norwich and suddenly the clouds enveloping Kenilworth Road began to lift.

If the Hatters were in a poor position then arguably the Blades were in even worse shape having gone ten League games without a win, although they had beaten Arsenal in the F.A.Cup in the middle of this run. The game had originally been set for New Year's Day but a heavy frost had meant a postponement. The rearranged game was fixed for a Wednesday evening, which was not the usual mid-week choice for the Town, and on a bitterly cold night only 6,995 turned out for this important Division One fixture.

Darren Patterson made a rare appearance at full-back in place of the suspended Julian James and midfielder Ceri Hughes was back on the bench after a six week lay-off through injury. Sheffield United were much quicker off the blocks and took the game to the Town from the start, pumping ball after ball

into the box. Recognising, after the Grimsby debacle, that the emphasis needed to be on not conceding goals, Lawrence had drilled his back four into a solid unit who now handled everything thrown at them with ease.

The balance of the team did not appear to be upset when both Marvin Johnson and Scott Oakes had to retire injured after 30 minutes and, in fact, the Town took the lead soon after.

United's defender David Tuttle fouled Tony Thorpe ten yards outside the box and Bontcho Guentchev bent a sublime freekick around the wall and into the far corner of the net. The Blades continued to dictate play but could not break down the stubborn Luton defence leaving new manager Howard Kendall to moan, "We dominated most of the game, but Luton sat back in numbers and we found it difficult to create chances."

Lennie Lawrence was relieved to make it three wins in a row and lift the Town off the bottom. "It was not a classic by any stretch of the imagination, but it was a game we did not want to lose."

"I can drop deep into midfield and pick up the ball and run at players and I can hold the ball up quite well,



What's the ground like?

Known to many as the Crowd Ground, Stanley's stadium remains on the small side with a capacity of just over 5,000. It is set in a picturesque area. with views over fields and hills behind the Coppice Terrace at one end of the ground. The Main Stand, which at first glance looks like one stand, is actually comprised of two small stands. They sit on either side of the half way line, with an open gap between the two. Opposite is a very small covered terrace, which comprises of only three rows of terrace. At either end are fairly new sections of terracing, of which the home end is covered, while the opposite is open to the elements.

What's it like for away supporters? Luton fans have been allocated the Coppice Terrace at one end of the ground, where around 1,500 supporters can be accommodated. Additionally Hatters fans can also

access part of the Whinney Hill terrace at one side of the pitch. This is useful in poor weather, as the Coppice Terrace is open to the elements. Otherwise in the Coppice Terrace the facilities are basic with some rather old toilets!

Food and drink

The usual football favre of pies, hot dogs, burgers and range of hot and cold drinks are available from the kiosks.

As far as finding a pre-match pint is concerned, there is a Club Bar at the ground, however, this is for home fans only. The nearest pub is the Crown, which is just behind the ground on the main Whalley Road. which welcomes all supporters. A little further down Whalley Road (five minutes walk in the direction of the motorway), is the Greyhound pub.

How to get there by car.

M1, M6, M65, Leave the M6 at Junction 29 and take the M65 towards Blackburn, Continue past Blackburn towards Accrington and leave the M65 at lunction 7. Then take the left hand exit at the roundabout onto the A6185 towards Clitheroe (this is in the opposite direction to Accrington). At the first set of traffic lights turn right onto the A678, towards Padiham, and then at the next traffic lights, turn right onto the A680 towards Accrington. After about half a mile along the A680 you will pass the Crown pub on your left. Take the next left into Livingstone Road and then an immediate left for the Club car park.

Car parking

The club car park at the ground is of a reasonable size and is free, however as you would expect it fills up pretty quickly. Otherwise street parking is widely available.

Travel details:

Both the Bobbers Travel Club and the Luton Town Supporters Club are running coaches to Accrington.

The Bobbers leave Cranfield 8am at with pick-up points along the way before a gam departure from Kenilworth Road. The fare is £23 for adults and £20 for juniors and seniors. For bookings telephone 01234 856542.

LTSC leave the Maple Road car park at gam with a stop at Newport Pagnell service station 30 minutes later. The fare is £21 for adults and for £19 concessions. Under 7's can travel free when accompanied by a full paying adult. For bookings telephone 07960 567465.

Tuesday will see the return of former Town manager Mike Newell to Kenilworth Road, as his Grimsby Town side take on the Hatters in a

After picking up just two points in their opening six matches in League 2, Alan Buckley was handed his P45, and Newell was handed the difficult job of trying to steer the Mariners away from the threat of relegation.

Even under the trusty leadership of the former Town manager, Grimsby continued in their struggle to pick up a win, until they faced Bury away in mid-November, a much needed 2-o win remains their most emphatic scoreline so far during this campaign.

However, two more wins, the first against promotion chasing Shrewsbury Town in December and then even more impressively against league leaders' Wycombe Wanderers away at Adams Park just a fortnight ago, has brought a fresh wave of optimism over everyone associated at Blundell Park.

Last Saturday's 1-0 victory over Wycombe was the first time the Chairboys had suffered defeat on their home ground this season - a statistic sure to have the Hatters wary of their opponent's credentials, despite the fact Grimsby would have been bottom of the league had Rotherham United, Bournemouth and Town started the season on zero points.

The most recent meeting between the two sides came in October at Blundell Park when a brace from onloan striker Tom Craddock earned the Town an important point in Newell's third game in charge of the Mariners.

On the scoresheet that day for the home side was 18-year-old defender and Captain Ryan Bennett. His second half goal put the Mariners ahead for the second time in the match, and Bennett will be one-to-watch again this Tuesday with his impressive aerial prowess.

Although no player in the Mariners squad has managed to score over three goals this season, Adam Proudlock scored every one of his three goals during December after joining on-loan from Darlington. Proudlock put pen-to-paper on a permanent deal last month, and on his day, the 27-year-old is a handful

for any defence in the league.

Former Hull City striker Stuart Elliott is another player for the Hatters to be wary of after he signed a one month loan deal from Doncaster Rovers. He enjoyed several prolific seasons with the Tigers before their rise to the Premier League.

The two clubs have met 40 times in total, with the first meeting taking place in 1897 - that match resulting in a comprehensive 6-0 win for the Hatters.

Overall, the Mariners have a slight edge with 15 wins to their name, Luton have won 12 times and the game has ended in stalemate on 13 separate occasions.
