opening to the second s

manager dean glover talks to dave johnson

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Luton Town manager Mick Harford, his players, directors, staff and of course the Hatters' supporters who have made the journey to Vale Park for this afternoon's fixture.

These notes were prepared before our game at The Moss Rose on Wednesday evening and so I have no idea how we performed against Macclesfield Town, but hopefully we will have got something from the game.

Looking back at our previous match, the home game against Lincoln City, we are all obviously very disappointed with the way the game went and it hurts everybody concerned.

We were to blame for the goal we conceded and I have watched the DVD several times since last Saturday. We conceded too many set-pieces in the first half, which encouraged Lincoln to get the ball into our box, and that was perhaps the main difference and it helped them get the goal.

It is clear on the DVD that we had a lot of possession of the ball, but we didn't really hurt them as much as we would have liked. It was disappointing, because if you look at the whole game, they only had two shots on target and that is what is so frustrating.

They have got a big side, with a big presence, with pace in the right areas to run people into the channels. That's where we fall down, as we haven't got enough pace to hurt the opposition, so we have to try to pass the ball around people because there isn't enough pace

or presence to go forward. That was the big difference with the Lincoln game.

We dealt with the majority of their setpieces well and it was just one of those things where we get frustrated and obviously the supporters get frustrated as well. This is understandable because we are the home side and we should be imposing ourselves more on the opposition, but we are not doing that enough at the moment.

Lincoln were strong and had experienced players. If you look at the sides at the top in this division, the likes of Bury, Wycombe, Bradford and Gillingham, they all have a fair amount of presence in the side, and with ours being a young outfit, our younger players are still growing and will fill out in time, but it is hard work at the moment. We just have to keep working and believing it will happen.

We missed Marc Richards because he is a good target man and our leading goal scorer. We missed Dave Brammer too because he is a leader and an experienced pro — if the pair of them were back in the team it might be a different story, but right now it's not happening for us.

Now we must try to get three points against Luton Town, who on paper are a very good side. If they hadn't had those


points taken from them they would be in the middle of the table. They have done extremely well considering they had a thirty point deduction. We can't worry about them though, we have to try to implement our own game and hope something falls for us and we get a bit of luck for a change.

At the moment these lads have the opportunity to have a career in football and it is only through hard work and a good work ethic, both as individuals and as a team, that they will get better and in time get stronger for it, mentally as well as physically.

There is no patience in football any more, the game is ruthless. Nobody has any intentions of letting people down in a game of football. Things go against you and there is a very fine line between doing alright and struggling.

I always knew coming into this position we were never going to be play-off contenders and we are fighting to get people on board again.

I haven't got a magic wand, and I am no miracle worker. I am just a lad who has had his heart in the club for eighteen years and I am just hoping I can be part of a consortium of people who can turn it around and take the club forward.



To lose at home against Lincoln was another body blow. If you look at the game they didn't create many chances but neither did we which was very disappointing. Once again. we are having the same problem as earlier in the season, conceding a goal from a set piece. At some point the penny has got to drop and we have to understand our responsibilities individually and as a team of what's required to try and keep clean sheets. If you can shut out the opposition you always have a chance of nicking the game onenil and I can't remember us winning too many games by that score line this season. It's like winning and losing you can get in a habit and we need to do that with clean sheets. It's an aspect and a drill we need to keep doing day in, day out as tedious as it is for players to do it on the training ground, I think it's really important.


Figures show 85 per-cent of goals scored at this level are from set pieces or from the second ball from a set piece so it's vitally important at any level that players are switched on.





Although this season has been disappointing so far the players here are good enough. We just have to believe in ourselves more as we can beat anyone on our day. In this league there isn't much of a form guide - it's the winning mentality of a team which makes the difference and I think we're lacking in that department.

We simply need to string a couple of results together and taste the feeling of success over an extended period which I don't think many of the young players at the club have ever experienced.

When we went to Brentford the other week I was upset at the way we played. Towards the end of the first half I thought we were the better team as we were moving well and putting them under pressure, but we lacked the cutting edge. Unfortunately we conceded just before half time - which killed us - and subsequently in the second half we just didn't turn up.

I don't think Brentford are anything special, but they have a great team ethic and work hard to grind out results, which is what we need to try and implement into our game. I hate losing in any situation and I'm always trying to improve on aspects of my game that I feel need work. I think my strongest attributes on the pitch are my passing, creativity and never-saydie attitude.

I started my career at Everton aged 8 and went on to complete a YTS apprenticeship alongside Wayne Rooney, but left in 2004 when David Moyes was appointed manager. The highlight of my time at Everton was definitely the two-legged FA Cup youth final in 2002, which was my first real taste of a big game, and I scored the winner in the away fixture. When I was released from Everton I was gutted, but I knew a fresh challenge would do me good and I moved to Bristol City where I stayed for three years before joining Cheltenham.

As a youngster I also played for England from under-15 level right through to under-20 level. My most memorable match was against Brazil in 2001, which was covered by Sky Sports. We were beaten 2-0, but it was a quality game as they had some brilliant technical players on the park, like Diego.

On a personal level this season I still feel I haven't reached my best form

since my injury in 2007, which kept me out for 18 months. I fractured my tibia and fibula in a collision with a team mate whilst playing for Cheltenham and it was a complete nightmare.

Before I had the operation doctors were telling me that I would be lucky to play again so I feared for my future in football.

Thankfully the surgery went really well. I was told I would need to be patient and do everything by the book to give myself the best chance of getting back on the pitch. It was a long road back, but it worked, and now I want to play as many matches as possible to keep progressing in my career. I've missed a lot of football, so with each game I play things are slowly clicking into place and hopefully I'll return to the level of football I know I am capable of, I am grateful that Dean Glover brought me to the club and will do my very best to help the team climb the table.






Apart from the time-honoured and conventional sources — dealers' catalogues, programme fairs, eBay, "Programme Monthly", and those few remaining programme stalls at football grounds — football programmes can turn up in many other walks of life, often unexpectedly.

Most Car Boot sales will have some football programmes present, and collectors' shops (stamps, antiques etc) will invariably have a box of programmes, as will the antiques and collectors fairs which still operate in our major towns and cities on a weekly or monthly basis. Keen and experienced collectors live in the hope that the lack of specialist knowledge at such venues will mean that the occasional 'gem' is not recognised, and is put on sale at a fraction of its value.

Unfortunately, the opposite is likely to be true. The hobby is now well established, and several decades of publicity in the media of genuine rarities being sold at auction for substantial sums of money has made most antiques and collectables traders aware of the potential value of programmes. Accordingly, they tend to price programmes from famous games, or bearing famous names, as if they are genuine rarities.

The classic example is Manchester United programmes from the 1960s. There is undoubtedly something attractive about a programme which contains the names, and often photographs, of Best, Law and Charlton. If they are playing Tottenham, you will probably have Jennings, Mackay, Greaves and Gilzean in the opposition line-up; Liverpool will have Hunt, St John, Yeats and the other greats of the early Shankly era, and the Leeds team will contain Bremner, Giles, Gray and their esteemed colleagues in Don Revie's great side.





Such was the stellar quality of English football in those days that crowds flocked to the games, and thereby hangs the problem with the programmes, for they were printed in huge quantities, on better quality of paper than their predecessors, and they have survived to this day in prodigious quantities. They may be objects of desire, but they are extremely commonplace, and therefore worth a few pence, rather than several pounds.

The real rarities, and valuable items, from that and any era are programmes which had low print runs, from comparatively obscure matches. Friendly games, often abroad or at non-league grounds; reserve team matches; midweek cup replays; county cup ties — none of them guaranteed to be rare or valuable, but there is more chance of that happening than with a programme for a League match at Old Trafford which was watched by 60,000 spectators, most of whom will have bought, and retained, a programme.

"Programme Monthly and Football Collectable" magazine contains at least 160 pages each month covering all aspects of football memorabilia collecting. 





dislocated shoulder injury explained

A Dislocated Shoulder is a common shoulder injury in contact sports such as rugby, football and martial arts. Shoulder dislocations are characterized by severe shoulder pain and hospital treatment is required to restore normal shoulder anatomy.

The shoulder is a ball-and-socket joint that has a large range of movement but not a lot of stability, which makes the shoulder joint prone to dislocation. The shoulder is particularly unstable when it is rotated outwards and the arm cocked back or 'abducted'. Any additional force in this position will cause the head of the Humerus (arm bone) to come out of the joint in a forward direction. This is referred to as an anterior dislocation.

The shoulder joint is enclosed by a fibrous capsule which is strengthened by ligaments that provide a reinforced thickening of the capsule. The joint also has a labrum - a fibrocartilage lip that increases the stability of the joint. In the case of a dislocation due to trauma (such as a fall or collision), the joint capsule and ligaments are usually torn, and the labrum may also be damaged.

dislocated shoulder signs & symptoms

The most obvious symptom is shoulder pain. A person with a dislocated shoulder will be unable to move the affected shoulder and will hold the arm protectively against the chest. The

normal rounded appearance of the shoulder will be replaced by a more squared-off edge because the head of the Humerus bone drops downwards. If a dislocation is suspected, an x-ray should be taken to confirm the damage.

dislocated shoulder treatment

It is important that a shoulder dislocation is seen quickly by a doctor who can put the joint back in place. This is because the position of the Humerus in a dislocated shoulder joint can cause damage to the Axillary nerve.

This can lead to a loss of sensation and muscle strength in the affected arm. Pain relieving medication prescribed by a doctor can help to relieve the shoulder pain.

> Ice Packscan be applied to the injured shoulder for 20 minutes every two hours (never apply ice directly to the skin). Ice can relieve pain and reduce bleeding in the damaged tissue.

Once the shoulder has been put back in place it is immobilised using a sling. The sling is kept on for about 2 to 3 weeks, during which time it is important that the elbow, wrist and fingers are kept moving to prevent them stiffening up.

Active rehabilitation is started as soon as possible but overhead arm movement and sporting activity should be avoided for at least 6 weeks. Gentle range of movement exercises under the supervision of a Chartered Physiotherapist can be started once the sling is removed. Strengthening exercises for the Rotator Cuff muscles should be started as soon as they can be done without pain. These can be

done at home using therabands (resistant bands)

Because of the damage to the structures surrounding the shoulder. there is a high chance of recurrent dislocation. Surgery on an unstable shoulder is usually required after four dislocations.

Following a shoulder dislocation and shoulder surgery, many people find that a Neoprene shoulder support helps to provide added reassurance. They also assist with shoulder stability by providing sensory input that improves shoulder proprioception.

dislocated shoulder prevention

Once there has been a dislocation of the shoulder, the joint will have a degree of instability and will be more likely to dislocate again, or become subluxed (where it moves slightly but not fully out of joint). This is because the ligaments, capsule and labrum are damaged and cannot restrain the humeral head and prevent dislocation. In order to prevent dislocation, the Rotator Cuff muscles that surround the humeral head should be strengthened.

The Rotator Cuff muscles (Subscapularis, Supraspinatus, Infraspinatus and Teres minor) are small muscles situated around the shoulder joint. Although they have individual actions, their main role is to work together to stabilise the humeral head (ball) in the shoulder socket. Exercises using a theraband can be very effective at strengthening the Rotator Cuff and maintaining shoulder stability.

a day in the life of... SCOTT brown

Midfielder Scott Brown was born on 8th May 1985 in Runcorn. At the time Vale were in the old Fourth Division and had one more league game to play that season. It took place two days later and Vale drew 3-3 at Scunthorpe United to finish in 12th place. Our goals were scored by Ally Brown, Colin Tartt and Oshor Williams in front of a crowd of just 1,867. Karl Austin was the Vale custodian that day, his only senior appearance for us.

On the day that Scott appeared into the world for the first time the then Vale manager John Rudge completed the signing of a striker for £3,000 from Rhyl by the name of Andy Jones. He went on score 37 goals for us in 1986/87, won international caps for Wales and was eventually sold for £350,000, so not a bad bit of business.

In more general football news, Everton, ironically Scott's first club, won the League Championship with a 2-0 home win over OPR. Stoke had been relegated from the top-flight ages before with a record low points total from a 42 game season, just 17.

On 11th May though, came one of the saddest events to

ever occur in football, when a fire at Bradford City's Valley Parade ground killed 56 fans. They were playing




last week's visitors to Vale Park, Lincoln City, and the game was abandoned at half time and never replayed.

This afternoon's visitors Luton Town finished 17th in the Old First Division, staying up on goal difference on the last day of the season with a 3-2 win at Derby County whilst their relegation rivals Sheffield Wednesday lost 3-0 at home to Nottm Forest.

The number one single in the UK at the time was '19' by Paul Hardcastle. It gained its title as being the average age of American soldiers in Vietnam and was more of a rap record about that war, and it was his only number one.

In general news of the time, Arthur Scargill announced the end of a year long strike by the miners, the longest industrial dispute in British history, and also the most pointless. Mikhail Gorbachev became the new Soviet leader and English football clubs were banned from



and Juventus.

Europe for 5 years after 39 people died following riots at the European Cup final in Belgium between Liverpool

He actually joined the Vale on trial and played in a couple of pre season friendlies, but no firm contract was on offer and he joined Bristol City. He made his debut for them in Aug 2004 as a substitute in a 1-0 win over Peterborough in an LDV Vans Trophy tie. The Bristol side contained Clayton Fortune, and the Peterborough team had three more with Vale links, Danny Sonner, Leon Constantine and Andy Clarke.

18's and under 19's followed but he couldn't break into

the first team at Goodison Park and was released on a

free transfer at the end of the 2003/04 campaign.


He soon held down a regular place in the side, and appeared in a couple of home wins over the Vale before scoring his first senior goal in Oct 2005 in a 4-3 defeat at Oldham Athletic. He marked his first appearance at Vale Park with a goal in a 2-0 victory in Sept 2006 and won the PFA League One player of the month before sustaining a hamstring injury against Doncaster Rovers.

In Jan 2007 he was loaned out to Cheltenham and when the move was made a permanent one, ironically his first game was back at Ashton Gate. Cheltenham won 1-0 but the bad news for Scott was that he suffered a broken leg after only a quarter of an hour. That meant a long spell on the sidelines and he did not return to first team action until December 2007 as a sub at Tranmere. Adnan Ahmed was a sub for Tranmere that day.

The arrival of Martin Allen as manager of Cheltenham led to a spell out of the side, and in November 2008 he joined the Vale on loan. He made an impressive debut and scored a good goal in our 4-2 defeat at Wycombe Wanderers and has since settled in to be a regular member of the team.



Last month the deal was made a permanent one, until the end of the present season.



It is becoming increasingly difficult this season to write about football in general and Vale in particular in a positive manner. The team running away with the Premiership has turned from playing exciting, expansive football into little more than a well-organised outfit which grinds out 1-0 wins. The team which was running them closest for the title has proved to be a paper tiger without their charismatic captain. The artists from North London have trouble winning a raffle and the least said about the quality of football produced by the teams in the lower half of the table the better.

Closer to home, Vale have continued to struggle to put anything like a decent run of results together. Injuries and suspensions have taken their toll it's true, but we shouldn't hide from the fact that performances have been well below the standard we had hoped for this year.

The season began with such optimism. Supporters returned to Vale in their droves expecting to see a successful team but events on and off the pitch have meant that the gulf between expectation and reality has been enormous.

We have had a number of Vale players expressing their views on why this has happened and from some, negativity from the terraces has been held up as a reason why the team has not performed as well as they should have done. I have had concerns about the so-called "boo boys" myself in the past but I think this season would have tried the patience of a saint, so I can understand why some supporters have expressed their dissatisfaction with events in a rather vocal fashion.

What disappoints me, however, is that it seems to me the frustration of the crowd is being used by some as an excuse for poor performances. Yet on many occasions this season the supporters have been extremely patient and indeed, very supportive of the efforts of the players. At Bury, just as an example, the large Vale following sang virtually non-stop throughout the first hour of the game and were rewarded for their efforts with a performance that was little short of disgraceful.

Sadly, there seems to be a lack of unity, not just on the pitch but between players and fans which is contributing to our dire season.


There is no sense of "we're in this together" at all – we simply have fans getting more and more frustrated and players blaming them in turn.

This has to stop. Events off the field are beyond the control of players or supporters but what happens on the pitch is down to manager, players and fans working together to achieve success. Whilst the fans continue (understandably it has to be said) to show their disappointment so forcefully and the players/management seek to blame them for their own deficiencies, we will not make progress. The Stoke-on-Trent coat of arms declares Vis Unita Fortior – united strength is stronger. Is it too much to hope that such a motto could be adopted by all connected with the club for the remainder of the season?

The primary reason why we support a football team is for the moments of glory that make it all worthwhile...the goals.

Every supporter remembers different goals for different reasons, although some are so good that they stay in everyone's memory. Here is a look at some of my favourites.

Let's start with the absolute screamers - the goals that live in the memory simply for being such magnificent goals.

Two such strikes came in the same game during the promotion season of 1993/94 at Griffin Park, Brentford.

With the Vale having gone a goal down in what was a very tricky fixture, something special was required. In Robin Van Der Laan's thunderbolt equaliser, we certainly got it.

In my 16 years watching the Valiants it was the most powerfully struck goal of the lot; and directed perfectly into the bottom corner.

If a Bees defender had got in the way, it may well have killed him.

But as the home side took control again it seemed that the Dutchman's moment of brilliance would probably be in vain.

Brentford missed some gilt-edged chances and they were made to pay by a wonder-strike from Nicky Cross.

Struck from fully 30-yards and from an acute angle, it was probably the best goal of Vale's promotion season.

A Friday night left foot thunderbolt from Alan Tankard ran it close, however, securing a third round tie against Premier League Southampton.

A sledgehammer left peg was one of Tankard's trademarks, although it was perhaps a little underused.

His goal in the televised game against Tranmere the following season was also one to remember, not least because it came during an outstanding performance that showed the nation that Port Vale aren't so 'plucky' after all.

Another goal that deserves a mention for its sheer quality is Lee Matthews' 45-yarder in a 2-2 draw away at Hull.

The KC Stadium was certainly stunned and that moment was a frustrating reminder of how good the man we signed from Bristol City could be.

Unfortunately a string of injuries limited Matthews' 45-yarders to one and he, in fact, only managed ten goals in his Vale career.

It was a massive shame for a man whose brittle body just wasn't strong enough to match the talent at his disposal. There is always, however, an element of luck about such a long distance strike. Smashing one from that kind of distance is always something of a hopeful punt.

There was nothing hopeful, however, about the exquisite lob scored by Marc Bridge-Wilkinson during a 5-1 mauling of Grimsby Town in January 2004.

I remember that goal fondly because Vale were outstanding that day. It was champagne football, epitomised by that goal.

Bridge-Wilkinson was the closest thing to a footballing genius we have had in recent years and he scored some sublime goals. That lob was the pick of them.

There are also the goals that, although they may not be the most amazing strikes, they remain in the memory because of the situation in which they arrived

Adrian Littlejohn's long rangers home and away against Sheffield Wednesday in 2003/04 were special because they came in the face of supporters who were abusing him due to his previous affiliation with United.

Steve Brooker's winner at Hillsborough that year was also a fantastic moment because it gave us an away win at such a historic ground. It also came at a time in my life when I really needed cheering up. Boy did that goal do the trick.

Brooker's winning goal in the LDV Vans Trophy Final against Brentford will also live long in the memory for obvious reasons, but it is the goals against Stoke that meant the most.

How great it is that we can still see lan Bogie latching onto Lee Glover's dummy and smashing home an opener within 12 seconds against our rivals and Robin Van Der Lann rising to power home that header at the Victoria Ground.

The great thing about Van Der Laan's goal was the fact that it came when Vale had been under the cosh and it brought a massive sense of relief as well as delight.

Michael Cummins' goal in our most recent meeting with the Potters was one of the scrappiest goals I've ever seen. It was still, in its own way, one of the best.

Then there is Steve McPhee's beautifully planted header at Vale Park that same season, Bogie squeezing one in at the front post at the Vic and Foyley sliding through the surface water in celebration after securing the FA Cup tie at Vale Park.

Memories like that can never be taken away. That's why we all love football.

kevin gallen

Off the Steve shaw

Gallen is another member of League Two's impressive band of experienced strikers.

The 33-year-old was considered a prestigious talent when he blazed his way through QPR's youth system.

While playing in the youth ranks Gallen notched 153 goals in 110 appearances for the R's, which broke Jimmy Greaves's long-standing record at that level.

He didn't do too badly for QPR's first team in scoring nearly 100 times for the club in more than 400 appearances. His exploits at Loftus Road were achieved during two stints over a 14-year period.

He also went on to earn three England under-21 caps after signing professional terms with the club.

After scoring three goals in two games at the start of the 1996/97 season his progress was stunted when he suffered a serious knee injury after scoring the winning goal against Championship rivals Portsmouth.

The injury, sustained in August 1996, ruled him out for the rest of the campaign.

Gallen eventually left QPR to sign for Huddersfield Town in the summer of 2000, before a free transfer to Barnsley beckoned a year later.

However, he found himself back at Loftus Road just a few months later in November 2001.

On his second debut for his boyhood club he scored one goal and set another one up in QPR's emphatic 4-0 triumph over Swindon Town.

Gallen was back on the up and went on to make another 200plus appearances for the R's including a further 57 goals.

He also earned the club captaincy and helped guide QPR back to the second tier of English football.

He switched to Plymouth in January 2007, before linking up with Paul Ince at MK Dons in the summer of the same year.

Gallen joined the Hatters on an initial one-month loan spell in November last year and scored a solitary goal in nine league appearances.

His impressive link-up play prompted Luton boss Mick Harford to sign him up on a permanent basis in January.

ned liddell

Ned Liddell managed Luton Town to the Third Division (South) title in 1936-37. A former centre-half, he played for Whitburn, Southampton, Gainsborough, Clapton Orient, Southend United and Arsenal before rejoining Southend as manager in April 1919. He was appointed QPR's boss in April 1920 and guided them to the FA Cup quarter-finals in 1922-23, then scouted for Fulham before becoming their manager for two years in May 1929. After a period scouting for West Ham, he managed Luton from August 1936 until February 1938, then scouted for Chelsea, Portsmouth, Brentford and Spurs. He died in November 1969.

dally duncan

Former Scotland international winger Dally Duncan managed Luton Town to the top-flight in 1954-55. Signing professional for Hull City in August 1928, he moved to Derby County in March 1932 and featured in their 1946 FA Cup final success. He became Luton's player-boss in October 1946 and steered them to eighth place in the top-flight in 1957-58. Appointed Blackburn Rovers' manager in October 1958, he led them to the 1960 FA Cup final and remained in charge at Ewood Park until sacked in June 1960. He later scouted for Luton and ran a guest-house in Brighton, residing there until his death in January 1990.

syd owen

Long-serving England international centre-half Syd Owen was both a player and manager at Luton Town. Signing professional for Birmingham City in October 1945, he moved to Luton in June 1947 and starred in their 1951-52 FA Cup run, 1952-53 promotion near-miss and 1954-55 promotion success. He was voted 'Footballer of the Year' as Luton were FA Cup finalists in 1959 and netted three goals in 388 League games

before becoming manager for a year in May 1959. Later Leeds United's chief coach under Don Revie until October 1975, he then coached at Birmingham, Hull City and Manchester United. He died in August 1998.

allan brown

Ex-Scotland international inside-forward Allan Brown managed Luton Town to the Fourth Division title in 1967-68. He was a Scottish Cup finalist with East Fife shortly before joining Blackpool in December 1950 and moved to Luton in February 1957. Appearing in the 1959 FA Cup final, he netted 51 goals in 151 League games for the Hatters prior to joining Portsmouth in March 1961. He helped win the Third Division title in 1961-62, then had a spell as Wigan Athletic's player-boss and was Luton's manager from November 1966 until December 1968, later managing Torquay, Bury, Nottingham Forest, Southport and Blackpool.

alec stock

Alec Stock managed Luton Town to promotion in 1969-70. He was a forward with Charlton and QPR before becoming Yeovil Town's player-boss, plotting their epic 1948-49 FA Cup run. Appointed Leyton Orient's boss in August 1949, he led them to the FA Cup sixth round in 1953-54 and Third Division (South) title in 1955-56, returning from spells at Arsenal and Roma. He became QPR's boss in August 1959, taking them to the top-flight and League Cup glory, then managed Luton from December 1968 until April 1972. Guiding Fulham to the 1975 FA Cup final, he later managed AFC Bournemouth and died in April 2001.

harry haslam

Popular manager Harry Haslam guided Luton Town back to the top-flight in 1973-74. Starting with Rochdale, the full-back played for Oldham Athletic, Brighton, Leyton Orient, Guildford City and Hastings United, then managed Eastbourne United, Barry Town and Tonbridge before becoming Fulham's chief scout. He assisted Alec Stock at Luton prior to succeeding him as manager in May 1972, remaining in charge of the Hatters until leaving in January 1978 to manage Sheffield United. He scouted for England under Bobby Robson and died in September 1986. His son Keith was Mansfield's managing director.

david pleat

Articulate manager David Pleat managed Luton Town to the Second Division title in 1981-82. A former winger, he played for Nottingham Forest, Luton, Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough before becoming Nuneaton's player-boss. He rejoined Luton as coach in July 1972 and became manager in January 1978, guiding the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals in 1984-85. Taking charge of Spurs in May 1986, he led them to the 1987 FA Cup final, then managed Leicester City before rejoining Luton in June 1991. He took the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals again in 1993-94, leaving in June 1995. Now working in the media.

ray harford

Ray Harford plotted Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. A centre-half with Charlton, Exeter, Lincoln, Mansfield, Port Vale and Colchester, he was appointed youth team coach at Layer Road. He joined Fulham in a similar capacity in June 1981 and was manager for two years before moving to Luton as assistant-boss in July 1986. Becoming manager in June 1987, he also guided them to the Simod Cup Final and FA Cup semi-finals in 1987-88, then the 1989 Littlewoods Cup final. Sacked in January 1990, he later managed Wimbledon, Blackburn Rovers, West Brom and QPR. He died in August 2003.

joe kinnear

Former Republic of Ireland international right-back Joe Kinnear plotted Luton Town's 2001-02 promotion success. Initially with Spurs, he helped them win the FA Cup in 1967, League Cup twice and UEFA Cup in 1972. He moved to Brighton in August 1975, then coached overseas before assisting Dave Mackay at Doncaster. Joining Wimbledon as coach in September 1989, he became manager in January 1992 and led them to the semi-finals of both the FA Cup and League Cup in 1996-97. He left after a heart-attack, then managed Luton from January 2001 until June 2003, Nottingham Forest and now Newcastle United.

mike newell

Ex-England U-21 striker
Mike Newell managed
Luton Town to the
League One title in
2004-05. Initially with
Liverpool, he moved via
Crewe to Wigan Athletic
in October 1983 and
scored in their 1985
Freight Rover trophy
final triumph. He played
for Luton, Leicester City
and Everton prior to



joining Blackburn Rovers in November 1991, helping win promotion in 1991-92 and the Premiership title in 1994-95. Later with Birmingham City, he became Hartlepool's boss in November 2002, plotting their 2002-03 promotion success. He rejoined Luton as manager from June 2003 until March 2007 and is now managing Grimsby.

gordon turner

Long-serving inside-forward Gordon Turner holds Luton Town's all-time goalscoring record. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in March 1950, he featured in Luton's 1951-52 FA Cup run and 1952-53 promotion near-miss. He was leading marksman seven times, including 1954-55 when ever-present as they won promotion to the top-flight, also representing the Football League. Netting 243 goals in 406 League outings for the Hatters, he briefly reunited with Jesse Pye at Wisbech Town in July 1964, then played for Kettering Town, Dunstable and Bletchley. He lived and worked locally until his death in December 1976.

ron davies

Welsh international striker Ron Davies was Luton Town's leading marksman in 1962-63. Initially with Chester, he twice topped their goalscoring charts and moved to Kenilworth Road in October 1962. He impressed with his aerial strength in a struggling side, netting 21 goals in 32 League games for Luton before joining Norwich City in September 1963. Moving to Southampton in August 1966, he was top scorer three times prior to joining Portsmouth in April 1973. He played for Manchester United, Arcadia Shepherds, LA Aztecs, Tulsa Roughnecks and Seattle Sounders, becoming a soccer coach in Florida.

john o'rourke

England U-23 striker John O'Rourke was Luton Town's top scorer in three successive seasons. Initially with Arsenal, he moved via Chelsea to Luton in December 1963 and netted 64 goals in 84 League games while at Kenilworth Road before joining Middlesbrough in July 1966. He starred as they regained Second Division status at the first attempt in

1966-67, then had spells with Ipswich Town, Coventry City and QPR in the top-flight, moving to AFC Bournemouth in January 1974. Later with Poole Town, Johannesburg Rangers, Weymouth, Dorchester Town and Poole again, he has since been a newsagent in Highcliffe.

malcolm macdonald

Ace marksman Malcolm Macdonald was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he joined Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Kenilworth Road in July 1969. He was Luton's top scorer in two consecutive seasons including their 1969-70 promotion success and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before being sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974, he joined Arsenal for £330,000 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury ended his career. He managed Fulham and Huddersfield Town and now works in the media.

barry butlin

Striker Barry Butlin was leading marksman as Luton Town regained top-flight status in 1973-74. Signing professional for Derby County in January 1967, he had limited opportunities under Brian Clough and was loaned to Notts County prior to joining Luton for £50,000 in November 1972. He netted 24 goals in 57 League games while at Kenilworth Road before moving to Nottingham Forest for £122,000 in October 1974. Reunited with Clough, he featured in their 1976-77 promotion campaign and joined Peterborough United in August 1977, then played for Sheffield United. He is a financial adviser, living in Chellaston.

brian stein

England international striker Brian Stein scored twice in Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading marksman in Luton's 1981-82 Second Division success and also starred as they were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecv back to Luton in July 1991. Voted their 'Player of the Year' for the second time in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall before joining Barnet in August 1992, helping win promotion in 1992-93. His brother Mark also played for Luton.

paul walsh

England international striker Paul Walsh was capped five times while at Luton Town. Signing professional for Charlton Athletic in October 1979, he starred in their 1980-81 promotion success and moved to Luton in July 1982. He was 'Player of the Year' in 1982-83 and leading marksman in 1983-84, netting 24 goals in 80 First Division games for the Hatters prior to joining Liverpool in May 1984. Helping to win the League Championship in 1985-86, he joined Tottenham Hotspur in February 1988 and was an FA Cup winner in 1991. Later with Portsmouth and Manchester City until injury ended his career, he is now a football

mick harford

England international striker Mick Harford played for Luton Town in consecutive Littlewoods Cup finals including their 1988 Wembley triumph. Signing professional for Lincoln City in July 1977, he had spells with Newcastle United, Bristol City and Birmingham City prior to joining Luton in December 1984. He starred as the Hatters were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88, moving to Derby County in January 1990 and returning to Luton in September 1991, Joining Chelsea in August 1992, he then played for Sunderland, Coventry and Wimbledon. He has since been coach and now manager back at Luton.

tony thorpe


Striker Tony Thorpe was leading marksman as Luton Town qualified for the Second Division play-offs in 1996-97. A former Leicester City trainee, he reunited with David Pleat at Luton

in August 1992 and was also top scorer in 1997-98. He joined Fulham for £800,000 in February 1998 and helped them reach the play-offs that season. Sold to Bristol City for £1,000,000 in June 1998, he was top scorer three times prior to rejoining Luton in July 2002 after two loan spells. He netted 70 goals in 164 League games overall before moving to QPR in August 2003, then Swindon, Colchester, Stevenage, Grimsby and Tamworth.

steve howard

Striker Steve Howard topped Luton Town's goalscoring charts in five successive seasons. Initially with Tow Law, he joined Hartlepool United in August 1995 and moved to Northampton Town for £120,000 in February 1999. He starred in their 1999-2000 promotion campaign, joining Luton

for £50,000 in March 2001. A key figure as the Hatters won promotion in 2001-02, then the League One title in 2004-05, he scored 95 goals in 212 League outings before being sold to Derby County for £1,000,000 in July 2006. He helped them win promotion in 2006-07 and joined Leicester City for £1,500,000 in January 2008.











Chelsea's refusal to take part in the first European Cup competition after winning the League in 1954-55 meant that the honour of being England's first representative in the competition fell to Manchester United after they won the League the following season. United had won the title in style, finishing 11 points ahead of Blackpool and Wolves and managed to get as far as the semi-finals of the European Cup before losing out to Real Madrid over two legs.

With a youthful side at his disposal, United boss Matt Busby was soon to have another crack at the competition after topping the table again the following season.

Players such as Bobby Charlton, Tommy Taylor, David Pegg, Eddie Coleman and Duncan Edwards were developing nicely and the future was looking bright for United.

Edwards was an extremely talented young man with the world at his feet. He made his United debut at the tender age of 16 and soon had two Championship medals in his possession with his first England cap in the bag by the age of 18.

Edwards was seen by many as United's jewel in the crown. Tragically, he and many of his team-mates were to lose their lives following an accident on a Munich runway after their plane had stopped to refuel.

A 5-4 victory at Highbury kept them in contention as they sat second in the League and a hat-trick of Championship successes was realistically on the cards.

United took a break from domestic football when they travelled to Belgrade a few days later to face Red Star, protecting a 2-1 first-leg lead. A 3-3 draw ensured a semi-final place for the 'Busby babes'.

On the way home the plane touched down in Munich to refuel. In atrocious conditions two take off attempts were thwarted and it was decided to try for a third time. The decision was to prove fatal and 23 people lost their lives as a result.

Seven United players were

included in those who died and two weeks later, Edwards himself lost his battle to survive. Busby eventually recovered after weeks in hospital, but the mental scars that stayed with the survivors would never go away.

Despite everything, a patched up United went on to reach the F.A. Cup Final that season but were beaten by two Nat Lofthouse goals for Bolton.

They were forced to play a European Cup semi-final match against AC Milan, but went out of the competition 5-2 on aggregate – they would be back!



overview of the stadium:

The ground is quite small, set in a picturesque area with views over fields and hills behind the Coppice Terrace at one end of the ground. The Main and Thwaites Stand is along one side of the ground, sitting each side of the halfway line, with a gap between the two. They are both seated and covered and have a row of flood lights at the back. Because of the slope of the pitch there are less seats in the Thwaites Stand than the main Stand!

The opposite side of the pitch has the very small covered terrace called the Whinney Hill Terrace, just 3 rows of terracing.

Behind one goal is the home end, called the Clayton End, a covered Terrace

Away Fans are housed in the Coppice Terrace which is open to the elements and as the ground is pretty exposed be advised and wrap up!



where to drink:

The nearest pub is the Crown, just behind the ground on the main Whalley Road, where all fans are welcome. It has memorabilia donated by fans of many clubs, a beer garden, and sports screen TV.

The Oaklea Tavern, 2 minutes from the ground towards the town centre, serves freshly cooked food and has plasma screen TV, but no track suits or base ball caps are allowed.

There is a large car park at the ground. but the council one on the other side of the dual carriageway offers a quicker get away.

overview of the stadium:

The Dean Court site opened in 1910 and has seen much redevelopment since then. The Stadium now has three new permanent stands with the fourth a temporary stand behind one goal which ingeniously can be removed to allow for a stage and all the paraphernalia of a pop concert. This stand is used by youngsters admitted on promotion schemes.

To the left of the open 1,100 seater stand is the Spire (Main) Stand which has the executive boxes and dugouts. Behind the other goal is the Fleet (North) Personnel stand - neat single tiered. used by the home fans.

Finally the East Stand, which reflects the other two stands, accommodates both home and visiting fans.



where the valiants will be housed:

The Valiants who make the journey to the south coast will be seated in the East Stand, in the section nearest the open end, with space for 1,500 fans all seats having an excellent view of the

pitch. As would be expected of a new stand there are adequate refreshments available. A kiosk outside the away turnstile is now available to purchase tickets.



where to drink:

If you prefer an alcoholic drink to a trip to the chippy there is a pub, called the Queen's Park, close by, Walk past the main stand out to the road, turn left travel to the end - where you will see the pub. A pub called The Cherry Tree, behind the main stand is reserved for the home fans.



where to eat:

The usual food is offered at kiosks at the ground. But for those wanting more choice there are alternatives near by. To reach the Frying Squad, the closest chippy to the ground, leave the ground by Kings Park Drive and turn right onto Kings Park Central Drive and then left onto Ashley Road, right onto Tower Road and finally left into Palmerston Road where you will find the chippy. Alternatively if you take the track that runs past the ground and the car parks. a few minutes walk will get you to the main road, turn right and another few minutes walk will take you to Boscombe town centre where most Saturdays there is a street market and plenty of choice of food outlets.

Following promotion from the non-league ranks the season before, survival was the main aim for the Daggers at the start of last season. The season proved to be one endless struggle with relegation more than just a possibility up until the dying embers of the season. The first nine games produced three wins, three draws and three defeats, representing a solid start to the campaign at the higher level.

Unfortunately, the next nine games were to yield only two points, leaving them in 21st spot. The low point of the season in terms of league position came on 9th February when the Daggers lost 4-1 at Hereford which left them in 23rd place. The next five results were astonishing and inexplicable: 6-2, 4-1, 2-0, 1-0 and 2-0, all of them victories, pushing them to the relative security of 18th place.

Just to demonstrate their inconsistency they promptly went the next nine games without a win. Finally, a win at Darlington in the penultimate game secured their status for another season. They also won the final game and ended in 20th position. Strevens found the net fifteen times in league games and added another five in cup competitions.

Manager John Still likened their retention of league status to a Ford

Since the end of last season out have gone Chris Moore to Chelmsford, Dave Rainsford to Chelmsford (and to continue his teaching career), Sam Sloma to Grays, Jamie Taylor to Grays, Dominic Green to Peterborough and Marlon Patterson to Histon. In have come Solomon Taiwo from Sutton United, Mark Arber from Stevenage, Magnus Okuonghae from Weymouth, Wesley Thomas from Fisher and Mark Nwokeji from Staines.

This season the Daggers have surprised everyone, themselves and the bookies included. The fact that their promotion odds were 50-1 in August and are currently 4-1 speaks volumes about their achievements this season. Manager John Still, in charge in this (his second) spell since April 2004, has done a fine job on a low budget with average gates of just under 2000. So far at home they have beaten Barnet 2-0. Chester 6-0. Chesterfield 3-0, Gillingham 2-0, Grimsby 4-0. Luton 2-1, and Rochdale 3-2. They have drawn with Accrington 0-0, Vale 1-1 and Rotherham 1-1. They have lost to Bury 1-3, Darlington 0-1, Exeter 1-2, Notts County 0-1 and Wycombe 0-1. Away they have won at Aldershot 2-1, Lincoln 3-1, Macclesfield 4-0. Morecambe 2-1 and Rochdale 2-0. They drew at Barnet 1-1, Bradford 1-1, Bury 2-2, Grimsby 1-1 and Rotherham

1-1. They lost at Bournemouth 1-2, Brentford 1-2, Darlington 0-3, Luton 1-2, Shrewsbury 1-2 and Wycombe 1-2. In the Carling Cup they fell at the first hurdle, by 1-2 at home to Reading. In the Football League Trophy (JPT) they beat Barnet 4-2, then won at Peterborough 1-0 before bowing out by 0-5 at Shrewsbury. In the FA Cup they drew 0-0 at Hereford, won the replay 2-1 but lost at Leicester by 2-3 in Round Three. The leading scorers are Paul Benson with fourteen in the league plus three in cup competitions while Ben Strevens has followed up last season's goalscoring exploits with another ten league goals and one in cup competitions.

Two other points are a little unusual about the Daggers. Firstly, their ground has the long-winded name of The London Borough of Barking and Dagenham Stadium. Secondly, their shirt sponsor is West and Coe, who just happen to be funeral directors!!

This is the first league encounter between the two clubs at Vale Park. When the two teams met in Essex last August I don't think Vale fans would have expected to be so far behind the Daggers at this present stage of the season. A win is essential for Vale if the poor home record is not to continue while Dagenham will be seeking valuable points to help them reach the play-offs.
