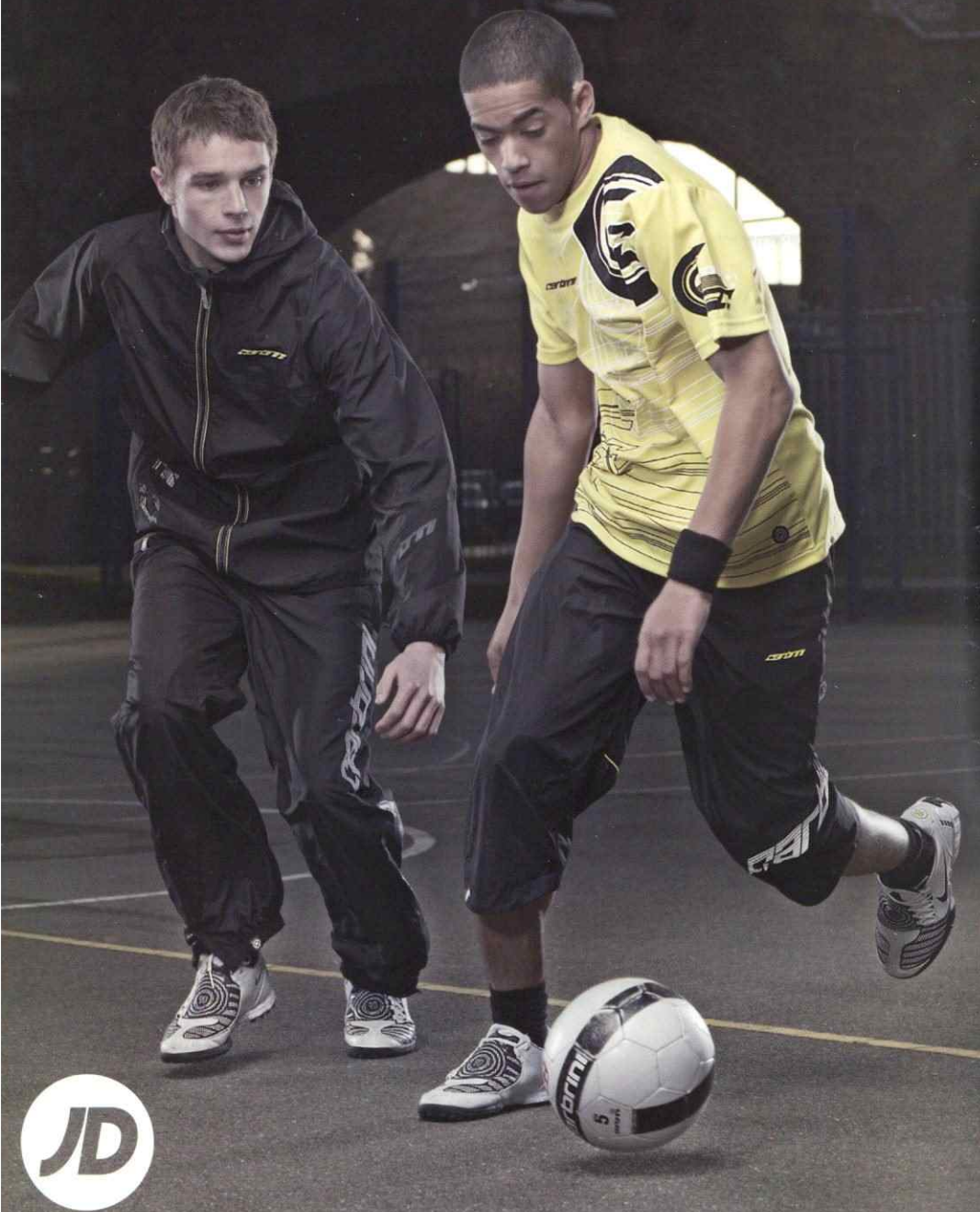

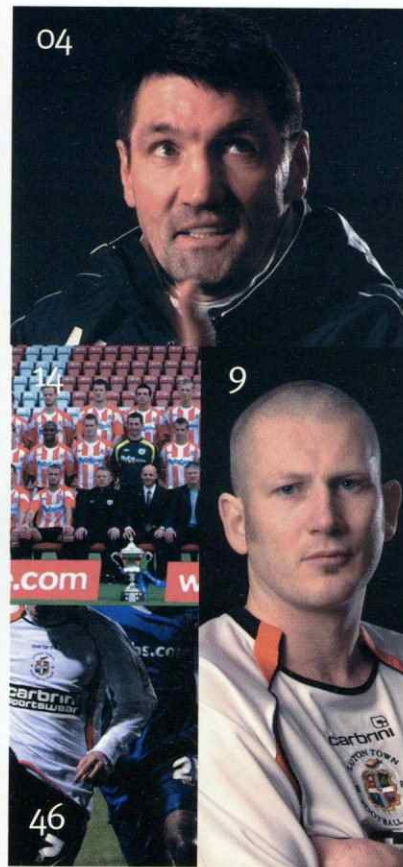

We are currently waiting for Football League clearance to sign David Button from Tottenham. David is a young goalkeeper who will push Dean for a starting place.

We now find ourselves in the midst of an extremely tough fixture list of eight games during March which will ultimately decide our fate. You cannot build a successful team overnight, but I believe we now have the balance right and have the players capable of amassing enough points to retain our league status.

This great club, with its history and tradition, deserve to be playing professional league football every year, so it would be completely unjust if we do not retain our league place having been unfairly punished by the authorities.

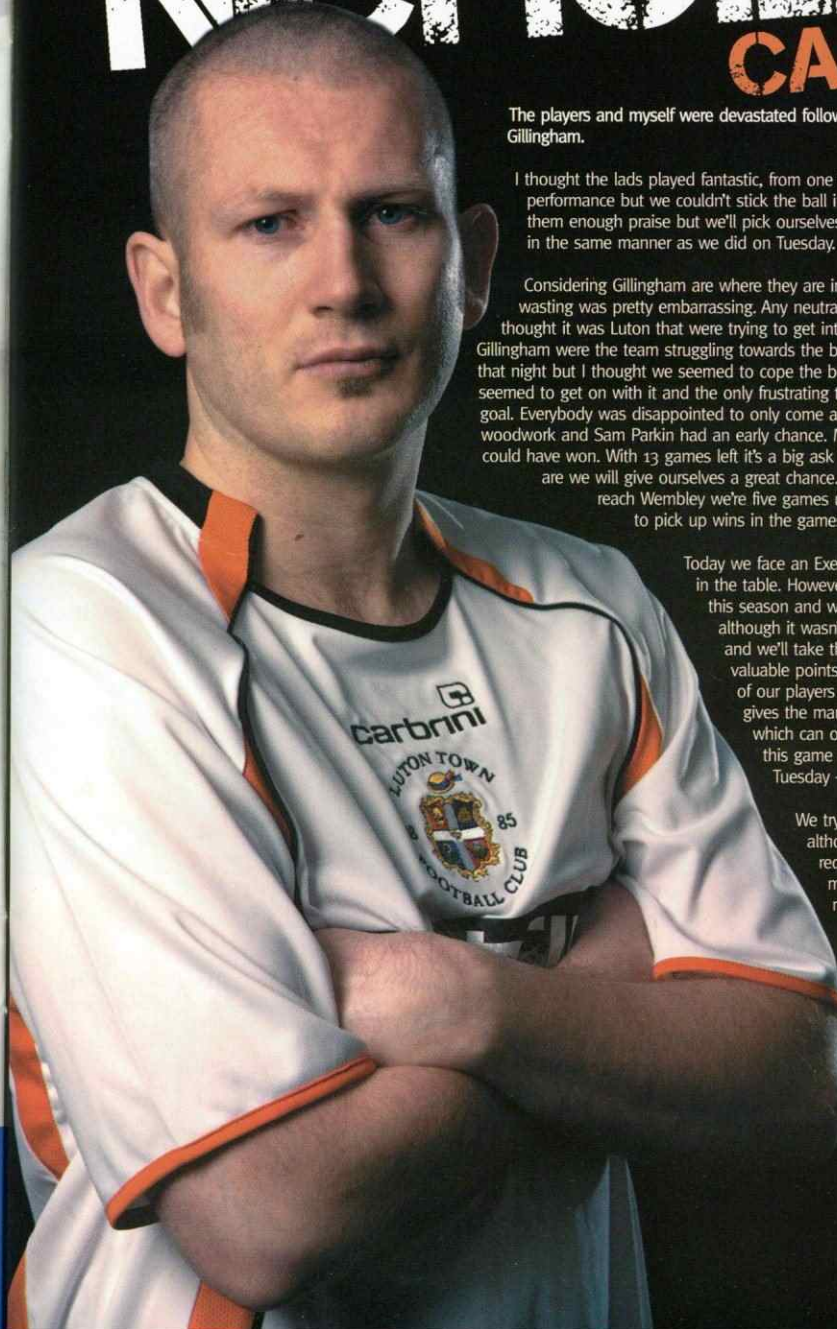

12,409 The biggest crowd for this fixture were unfortunate to witness the only goalless draw between the sides, in March 1968.

21 The number of previous league meetings between the sides at Kenilworth Road. Luton have 14 wins, and Exeter two, with five matches ending as a draw. The Hatters have netted 57 goals to the visitors 20.

4 Luton kept a clean sheet in the opening four encounters between the sides, winning 3-0 in 1920/21, 4-0 the following season, 6-0 in April 1923 and 1-0 six months later. The run came to an end in September 1924 as the sides drew 1-1, with John Shankly scoring for Luton.

9 The most goals scored in this fixture, and they came in a 6-3 Luton win in October 1931. Andy Rennie scored three, with Jimmy Yardley netting twice and George McNestry also getting on the scoresheet.

5 There have been five Luton hat-tricks in this fixture, with Andy Rennie scoring two of them. Ernie Simms scored the first in the 4-0 win in September 1921, with Ralph Hoten scoring his only Luton hat-trick in the 6-0 win the following season. Archie Clark scored his first Luton goal in January 1929, but it was Rennie who stole the headlines with a hat-trick in another 4-0 victory. Rennie repeated the feat, as already mentioned, in the 6-3 victory in 1931/32. Jack Ball matched Hoten's record with his only Luton hat-trick also coming against Exeter City, in 1934/35.

1 Luton have converted only one penalty in this fixture, and that came in 1926/27. The match ended in a 2-2 draw, with Joe Pointon scoring before Bob Graham netted from the spot. This was to be the

4 The most common scoreline for this fixture is 4-0, and it has happened four times. As already mentioned, three of these matches have seen a Luton player score a hat-trick, the other game to finish with this score was in 1966/67. Gordon Riddick opened the scoring before Gerry King, Graham French, and Keith Allen netted further goals.

34 The number of years which passed between the 0-0 draw in 1967/68 and the next league meetings between the sides in 2001/02. Steve Howard scored a goal in each half and Matthew Taylor added a third as Luton won 3-0 and got closer to confirming promotion from the basement division.

Exeter arrive today at Kenilworth Road on an seven match unbeaten run, sixth in the League 2 table and just three points off an automatic promotion spot.

Tuesday's draw at fellow promotion chasers Shrewsbury continued that fine going which includes four wins and three draws. All four of those victories have come at St. James Park in successes over Barnet, Macclesfield, Aldershot and Darlington. On the road, however, the Devon side have only once since October, and that came courtesy of a 2-1 win at Dagenham on 20th January. The Grecians' good form saw manager Paul Tisdale nominated for the League 2 Manager of the Month award for February.

PREVIOUS MEETINGS

Luton wins: 25 Exeter wins: 9 Draws: 12

The Hatters hold a remarkable record of dominance over the Devon side winning 25 of the 46 encounters going back to the first meeting in 1921. As mentioned elsewhere in today's programme there have been a number of high scoring results involving the two teams including a nine goal thriller when the Town came out on top in a 6-3 win at Kenilworth Road in 1931. The Grecians have only tasted success against the Hatters nine times the last coming in February 1967. Two of those nine victories have been at Kenilworth Road, the last a 2-1 win in September 1964

The Hatters were in a rich vein of form the last time the two sides met at Kenilworth Road when Joe Kinnear's side were recorded a comfortable 3-0 win on their way to finishing runners-up in Division 3 in 2001/02.

Two goals from Steve Howard and one from Matthew Taylor earned the Town their seventh straight league victory in a 3-0 victory.

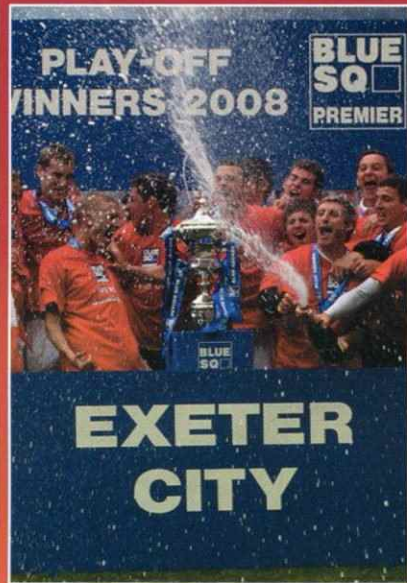
A further five successive wins broke a club record of 12 and the Hatters eventually finished the season on an unbeaten run of 14 games culminating in promotion.

LAST FIVE SEASONS

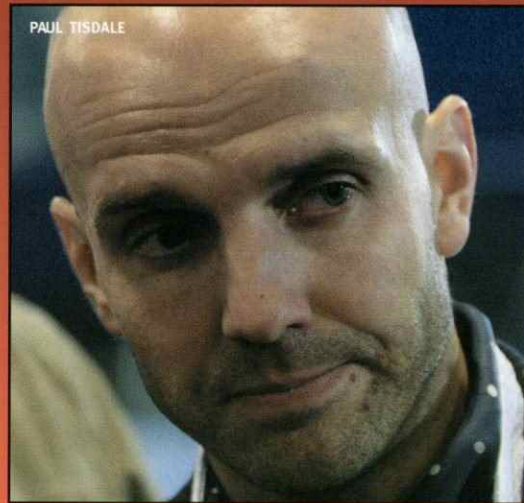
This season Exeter have continued from where they left off last season after winning promotion from the Conference with a playoff final win over Cambridge United at Wembley.

Relegation from the Football League in 2003 was followed by several seasons of near misses in the Conference where two straight sixth place finishes was followed by a seventh place finish in 2006.

They took a further step towards achieving promotion the following season, but after finally making the playoffs in 2007 they lost 2-1 to Morecambe in the final at Wembley.

the manager: paul tisdale

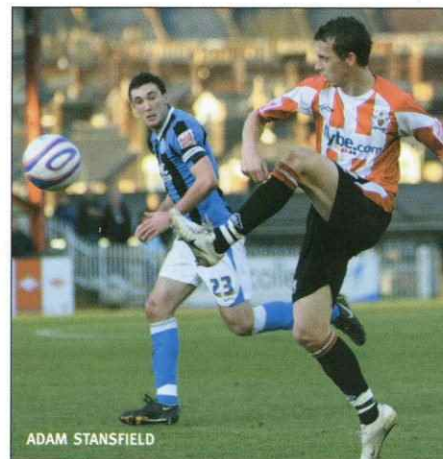
Paul was appointed manager of Exeter City in June 2006 and led the team to the Conference Play-off Final at Wembley in his first season (losing to Morecambe 2-1) and again in 2007-08 guiding the team back to the Football League following a 1-0 win against Cambridge United.

Paul is a former England Schools international player, who spent 11 years at Southampton. He also has experience at four other English league sides, including Exeter City as a loan player, and has played at Premier League level in three European countries.

star man: adam stansfield

Adam returned from Hereford United to his native County of Devon to link up with Exeter City on a free transfer in June 2006, having previously been a prolific goalscorer with Cullompton Rangers and Elmore. He got a chance to sign for Yeovil Town in November 2001 and made his debut in the Conference 24 hours later against Southport.

He continued to regularly hit the back of the net for Yeovil, the sort of form that won him a place in the England semi-pro team. He signed for Hereford United at the start of the 2004/05 season, where he helped the Bulls into the Football League, as he had at Yeovil, and now at Exeter.

GOALKEEPERS

PAUL JONES

Jones teamed up again with former City boss Alex Inglethorpe, after signing for the Grecians on loan in November 2004. The deal was later made permanent after City paid a five-figure sum for his transfer. He was formerly a member of Alex's youth team at Leyton Orient. Made his Grecians debut as substitute at Dagenham & Redbridge in December 2004, and the first thing he did was save a penalty. Voted Player of the Round after the third round FA Cup tie at Manchester United in January 2005.

DEFENDERS

RONNIE BULL

Began his career as a youngster at Fulham, before moving to Millwall where his career took off, breaking into the first team in 1999 aged 18, going on to make 50 appearances for the Lions before signing for Grimsby Town in the summer of 2004. After 27 appearances and two goals for the Mariners, he spent a time with the New Zealand Knights, Ronnie moved back to England in January 2006 and enjoyed spells in non-league football. He signed a short-term contract with Exeter City at the start of the 2008/09 season, before joining Hayes & Yeading in October 2008. He resigned for the Grecians in January.

ROB EDWARDS

Rob originally signed a two-year deal at Exeter in August 2006, following his release from Blackpool at the end of 2005/06. The 6ft defender won four full caps for Wales and made more than 400 appearances in the Football League. Voted the Exeter City Player of the Year in 2006/07, he moved into a player-coach role in December 2007 and was an ever present in the first team throughout 2007/08, capping a fine season by scoring the only goal in the Blue Square Premier League Play-off final at Wembley.

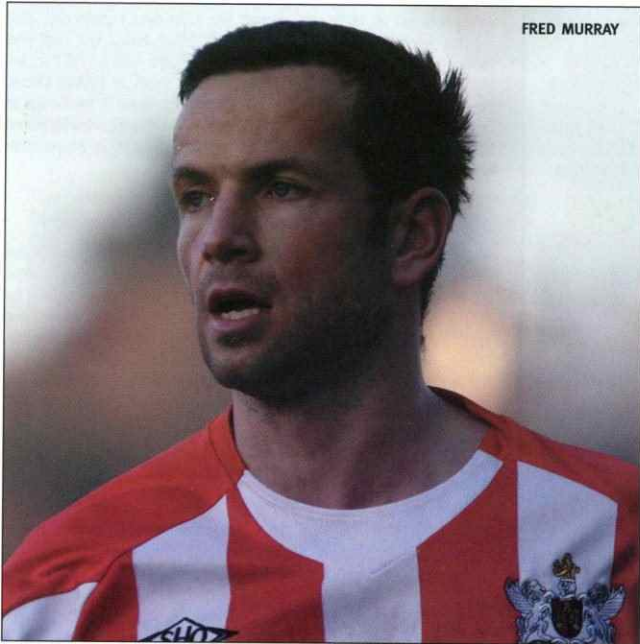

DEAN MOXEY

Dean made his debut while still a trainee and went on to feature regularly in the squad with a string of consistent and impressive displays, as well as notching his first senior goals. A foot injury kept him out of action in the second half of the 2004/05 season, but fought his way back and regained his first team place.

FRED MURRAY

This Irish-born defender was signed on a three-month contract in September 2008 after impressing in a trial with the club. Commenced his career with Blackburn Rovers before moving onto Cambridge United. After signing for Northampton Town, he had a long run in the first team and was seen as a solid left-back who could also play at centre-half. He joined Stafford Rangers in August 2007. He then moved to Stevenage Borough in the January 2008 transfer window, but was released at the end of the season.



FRED MURRAY

DANIEL SEABORNE

Signed his first full professional contract in May 2005, after successfully completing a spell as a trainee. Made his senior debut for the Grecians in a Gladwish Land Sales Cup tie at Aldershot Town in February 2005. Made his Nationwide Conference debut for the Grecians in the 3-1 home win over Dagenham & Redbridge in April 2006.

MATT TAYLOR

Matt arrived at Exeter City from Paul Tisdale's former club, Team Bath, in July 2007. He had just the one season with the Students, having moved to them in the summer of 2006 after three seasons with Burscough, one with Matlock and one with Guiseley - as a goalkeeper! Played in goal in Burscough's 2003 FA Trophy final win over Tamworth at Villa Park. The midfielder was named Exeter City Player of the Season last season.

STEVE TULLY

Steve has returned to Exeter City in

January 2007 to start his second spell with the club. Began his career with Torquay United, but he was released in 2002 after scoring three goals in 106 league outings. He went on to join Weymouth before enjoying a short spell at Exeter towards the end of the 2004/05 season. He returned to Weymouth for a second time but was back at Exeter in time to score from the penalty spot in the semi final of the Conference Play-Offs in 2007, which took the club to Wembley.

MIDFIELDERS

MATTHEW GILL

Signed from Notts County on a free transfer in January 2006, Matthew began his career with Peterborough United as a trainee, earning a full contract in March 1998. He went on to feature in 169 matches for the Posh, before moving to Notts County in June 2004. Made his Grecians' debut in a 2-2 draw at Morecambe on 21st January 2006 and scored his first goal for the club in a 3-1 home win over Dagenham & Redbridge. Exeter City Players' Player of the Year 2006/07.

RYAN HARLEY

Ryan was signed from Blue Square

of the 2006/07 season, Ryan did spend a short time on trial at Exeter prior to the 2007/08 campaign, only to sustain an injury. He then linked up with Weston-Super-Mare, and has now signed a longer term contract with the Grecians.

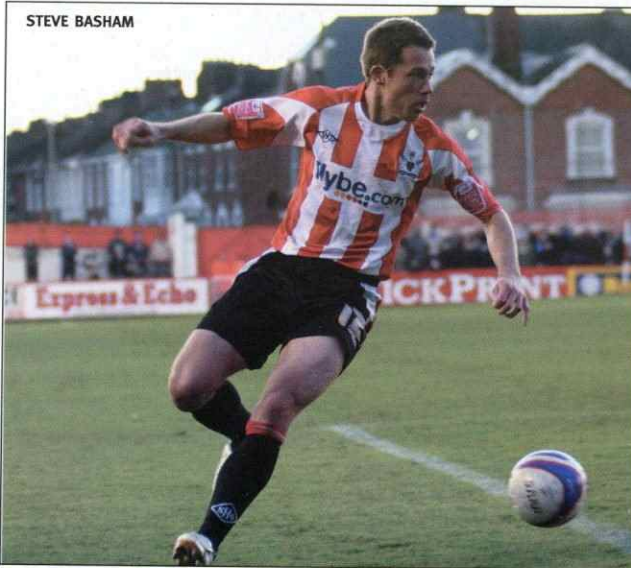
CRAIG McALLISTER

Rob Edwards has already experienced promotion with Exeter City, helping them back into the Football League via the Play-Offs in May, now they are well placed to do it all again but he's not taking anything for granted:

"The table is looking good but we know it soon changes and we know it will be a tough game on Saturday because Luton, despite being where they are in the league, have got some talented players.

"There are a lot of games at the moment with teams playing two games a week so if you can put a run together you can move yourselves up the league very quickly and get yourselves out of trouble or get yourselves into the Play-Off picture."

The former Carlisle, Bristol City, Preston and Blackpool defender spent his entire career in the Football League, before joining Exeter in the summer of 2006 and he admits life is easier back in the League for the Grecians: "I am in

my third season now and when I came down here there were a lot of players who had played in the league already here and the Manager Paul Tisdale has added to the squad.

"The club should never really have dropped down to the Conference; it is a League club so we needed to get out of the Conference as quickly as we could because we knew we would do well in League 2, we are pleased with how things have gone but there is still a long way to go.

"Some of the grounds you go to in the Conference and some of the pitches you play on and teams you play against make it difficult if you want to try and play football the way that we do.

"At least teams in the League will come out and play against us and we have had some good games of football. Most of the teams in League 2 this year try and get the ball down and play the game properly rather than play route one which I have been pleasantly surprised by."

Paul Tisdale's side currently sit just three points off the automatic promotion places and confidence is high, understandable as they are now seven games unbeaten but after already losing to Luton this season Edwards isn't getting carried away:

"We're expecting a tough game, I know a lot of the Luton players and they are talented players they have got a good manager, who has been there and done it so we are expecting a tough game."

KEITH KEANE



The Hatters fourth away win of the season last Saturday against Port Vale saw the club move onto nine points in the league, and vice-captain Keith Keane was delighted that his team-mates showcased their fighting spirit once again after coming back from being a goal down to win at Vale Park:

"In these situations, especially our one, you've just got to keep your head up and keep playing. There isn't any pressure on us, as everyone expects us to go down anyway, so we might as well just keep our heads up and keep playing. We kept on going today and it worked out well for us."

The 22-year-old defender believes things are going well at the minute for the Town, but slip-ups such as the 0-0 draw against Accrington Stanley have to be avoided if the club are to keep their League 2 status:

"If we didn't have the minus 30 points you would say we were doing quite well. The problem is that we're drawing too many when have to win every game. Normally it wouldn't be so bad but because we have to win even a draw looks bad for us."

Keane felt that the 3-1 away win was the perfect response to the "terrible game" against Accrington four days earlier, as the Town strikers settled the match with some clinical finishing:

"We played badly but we still should have won and today they had a couple of chances and they put that right and they scored. We know we've played good football lately but unfortunately the pitches we've played on haven't had much grass on them and I think that's been our main problem, we've got to adapt to that and change the style of play."

"We tried to use the big pitch to our full advantage and when we got the ball down and played quickly it worked really well and we looked quite dangerous on the attack."

Keane also reserved a special mention for the Hatters defence, and singled out Dean Brill as being "up there with the best goalies in the league":

"Even when we are under pressure there's plenty of communication at the back and everyone covers for each other and everyone pulls their own weight at the back. Everyone feels comfortable and they know what each other's going to do. So there's a good understanding and we looked quite solid."

The first team had the toughest possible test on their return to league action visiting Welwyn Garden City.

In a hard fought and physical encounter there were few early chances, the closest either side came to a goal coming from a near post header from Fay Howell which narrowly flew over the bar. Town took the lead midway through the half when Nicky Livingstone lifted the ball into the path of Rebecca Kane and she let the ball bounce before striking a powerful volley high into top corner. City were fortunate to draw level just before half-time when a speculative shot was misjudged by the Luton keeper and skipped just inside the post for an equaliser.

The second half was an open affair with the play flowing from end-to-end but it was Luton who regained their lead as once again Kane turned her marker to smash a shot inside the near post to make it 2-1.

Town goalkeeper Nikki Duncan atoned for her earlier error by making two fine saves to keep Luton in front and Kane was unlucky to not complete her hat-trick

forcing a fine diving save from the City keeper. An excellent rearguard action in the last 15 minutes ensured a narrow but deserved win for the Town who remain in contention for promotion.

The previous week brought County Cup success in a more comfortable manner as Luton totally overran Offley Women in the Semi-Final tie, running in 13 goals without reply. Rebecca Kane scored five, there was a hat-trick for Laura Day, Micky Taylor and Michelle Byrne both scored twice and Nicky Livingstone added the final goal. Town now meet Arlesey Town in the final after they pulled off a shock beating the now defunct Bedford Town Bells by 3-2 in the other Semi-Final.

The Reserve squad fielded perhaps their youngest squad ever with nine of the squad under 17 but the inexperience proved no barrier as they overcame London side Manford Way 2-1 after initially trailing. Clare Howe equalised with a superbly struck free kick and Kirsty McIntosh fired the winner.

There was a treble success for the youth teams in the County Cup with the Under

14, 15 and 16 squads all progressing to the Semi-Final stage. The Under 16's defeated Crawley Green 8-0 with Candice Davies scoring a hat-trick, Stephanie Anes notching twice and further strikes from Jasmine Hall, Leyah Maddix and Clare Howe. They now face AFC Kempston.

Home Counties League rivals St Martins stood in the way of the Under 15's but not for long as their high tempo football gained the Town a 4-1 interval lead. A further four strikes in the second half gave Luton an 8-1 victory and they must now face the older Under 16 St Martins squad in the Semi-Final. Goalscorers were Katie Davis (4), Mirella Tambini (2), Jessica McKay and Holly Sheridan.

Woburn Lions were the Under 14's opponents in their first ever meeting with the Town running out 4-0 winners. Teighlor Pearson scored an excellent individual goal, Rachel Kosky struck her own spectacular effort and Lauren Porter and Georgia Hardy completed the scoring. They also reached the Quarter-Finals of their League Cup by completing an excellent 2-0 away win to higher placed Enfield Town.



After years of injury-free campaigns two serious injuries this season has left centre half George Pilkington one of the most frustrated players in the Hatters squad.

After breaking a metatarsal in the September victory over Aldershot, his return in December was curtailed by medial ligament damage. That ruled the former Everton trainee out until he made his comeback in the Town's reserves against Ipswich on Tuesday.

"The reserve game was a nice shock to the system after three months out," explained the 27-year-old.

"It was good to get a run-out although I was a bit rusty as you'd expect, but it was more about concentrating on my fitness.

"I felt more and more confident as the game went on, especially in the second half.

"It certainly blew away a few cobwebs so

it was a good starting point. I just have to take it from here."

The injuries to the Rugeley-born defender has limited his appearances in a Town shirt to just 11 in a season in which he describes as "hellish".

"I've not been injured for five years so I have rarely missed games. In fact I've probably missed out five games in recent years," he said.

"It's unusual for me to be injured for so long and disappointing coming to a new club.

"To be honest I've been fed up watching football as it's always frustrating sitting in the stand especially when you know you could be out there fighting the cause."

With games coming up thick and fast, and the Hatters desperate to amass league points to preserve their league status, Pilkington admits he's not quite ready to challenge for a first team place but praised the recent form his team-mates have shown over the past few months.

"The lads have been going really well," he said.

"It takes the pressure off me which means I don't need to throw myself in the deep end and risk re-injuring myself.

"We've been excellent in recently games with Keith Keane dropping into centre half with Mark Bower and we're looking solid at the moment with a good line and keeping a clean sheet against Gillingham is pleasing.

"There is competition for places all over the pitch so there are going to be a lot of disappointed players around looking to get back into the side, me included.

"I'm not quite at that level yet where I'm pushing for a place. I've just got to get my fitness up and not risk myself as this past week has been my first week of contact training.

"Another week of training and another reserve game will help, so I'm not far off."

And the defender was delighted with last weekend's impressive 3-1 win at his former club Port Vale where he was seen being put through his paces in the warm-up. "It was just to reintroduce myself and get back into the swing of things," he said.

"I've missed a lot of football so it was nice to travel with the squad and to do something on a Saturday afternoon rather than watching the scores come in.

"It was great to be a part of it and it was a fantastic result.

"I've got a lot of friends at Port Vale so it was nice to be back but it was even better that we managed to win."

And after facing one of his former clubs last week, he faces another one today in the shape of Exeter where he spent a time on-loan during the 2002/03 season which enabled him to pick up some useful experience.

He said: "I spent a couple of months there before I moved to Port Vale. It was good as I made my league debut with them and played in an FA Cup game against Charlton when they were in the Premier League.

"I thoroughly enjoyed my time there and it was a bit of an eye-opener to the world of competitive football."

With the Grecians flying high in the League 2 table the defender believes although the Hatters face a difficult challenge, there's no reason why they can't take all three points against the Devon club this afternoon.

"Exeter will be a tough game as they are in the Play-Off positions at the moment," he said.

"Their forwards interchange well and have good movement so we'll have to be on top of our game but we've got no-one to fear in this league.

"We're as good as anybody and now I think we're beginning to show that now."

Club Historian Roger Wash looks back to a previous clash with the Grecians

With the Town finding themselves back in the football basement in 2001, for the first time in 33 years, it could be understood if everyone around Kenilworth Road was feeling a little sorry for themselves.

There was no chance of this though, as Manager Joe Kinnear and his number two Mick Harford wheeled and dealt over the summer with players coming and going at alarming speed, leading to five new players making their debuts in the opening day win at Carlisle and two more the following week when Cheltenham were overturned at Kenilworth Road.

Despite these two victories the Hatters did not go steaming away at the top of the table and after a string of draws plus a defeat at Bristol Rovers, it was only the introduction of Jean-Louis

Valois in late September that ignited the season.

The mercurial Frenchman put "bums on seats" in the words of Kinnear and on his day was unplayable with his ball control, close skills, vision and a terrific eye for goal, especially from long range.

Despite all this the Hatters were still on a roller coaster ride with some outstanding victories interspersed with unexplained and totally unforeseen defeats. As such, they were always playing catch up with leaders Plymouth who had become remarkably consistent.

The Town enjoyed an eight game unbeaten run over Christmas and into the New Year to prove their doubters wrong, before another one of those unforced defeats, this time at

Darlington, took the wind out of everybody's sails once more.

The defeat came at the worst possible time as next up were Plymouth at Kenilworth Road in an eagerly awaited top versus second clash which everyone thought would be a solid pointer for the rest of the season and a potential title decider.

As it turned out the Hatters were worthy winners against Plymouth in a bone-jarring thriller but they then spoilt all the good work with a defeat at Rochdale and a home reversal against Scunthorpe.

The supporters could now see the season unravelling, but the players were urged to make a big push in the final third of the campaign and they responded in style starting with a home game against Bristol Rovers on a cold,

wet February night. The Pirates were swept aside 3-0 with no-one realising that this was the start of a remarkable run of victories over York, Lincoln, Torquay, Leyton Orient and Rushden and Diamonds before the visit of the Grecians.

THE GAME

Luton Town 3 Exeter City 0
12th March 2002

In the days leading up to the clash with mid-table Exeter, the talk around Kenilworth Road was of Premiership clubs sniffing around, with most casting envious eyes on attacking left full-back Matthew Taylor. The 20-year-old had been at Luton for six years and his partnership down the left with Valois was one of the main reasons why the Town were flying high.

Taylor had laid on both goals in the important 2-1 win at Rushden and manager Kinnear was heard to say afterwards, "I hope to get £2 million for him!"

A crowd of 6,327 turned up at Kenilworth Road to see if the Hatters could extend their run to seven straight wins but it was Exeter who were first to show when Christian Roberts sent in a volley which Luton goalkeeper Carl Emberson saved comfortably.

Hatters top scorer Steve Howard then blazed over on the turn at the other end before Adrian Forbes headed narrowly wide from a Kevin Nicholls free-kick. The goal the expectant crowd demanded eventually came on 27 minutes when Howard netted his 15th of the season from another pin-point Nicholls set-piece.


At the interval Valois was brought off leaving Taylor to move into left midfield where his energy, speed and crossing ability would hopefully provoke more urgency in the Luton forward line.


The change worked as it became one-way traffic in the second period with Matthew Spring hitting a post and Forbes denied by Grecians goalkeeper

Arjan Van Heusden before Howard doubled the Hatters lead after 65 minutes when he stabbed the ball home following a corner from Nicholls.

The Town made it three with ten minutes to go when the overlapping Taylor looped a header from a floated free-kick from Nicholls over the head of Van Heusden.

Howard was then desperately unlucky not to register his first hat-trick for the Hatters when his 20 yard strike narrowly cleared the crossbar.

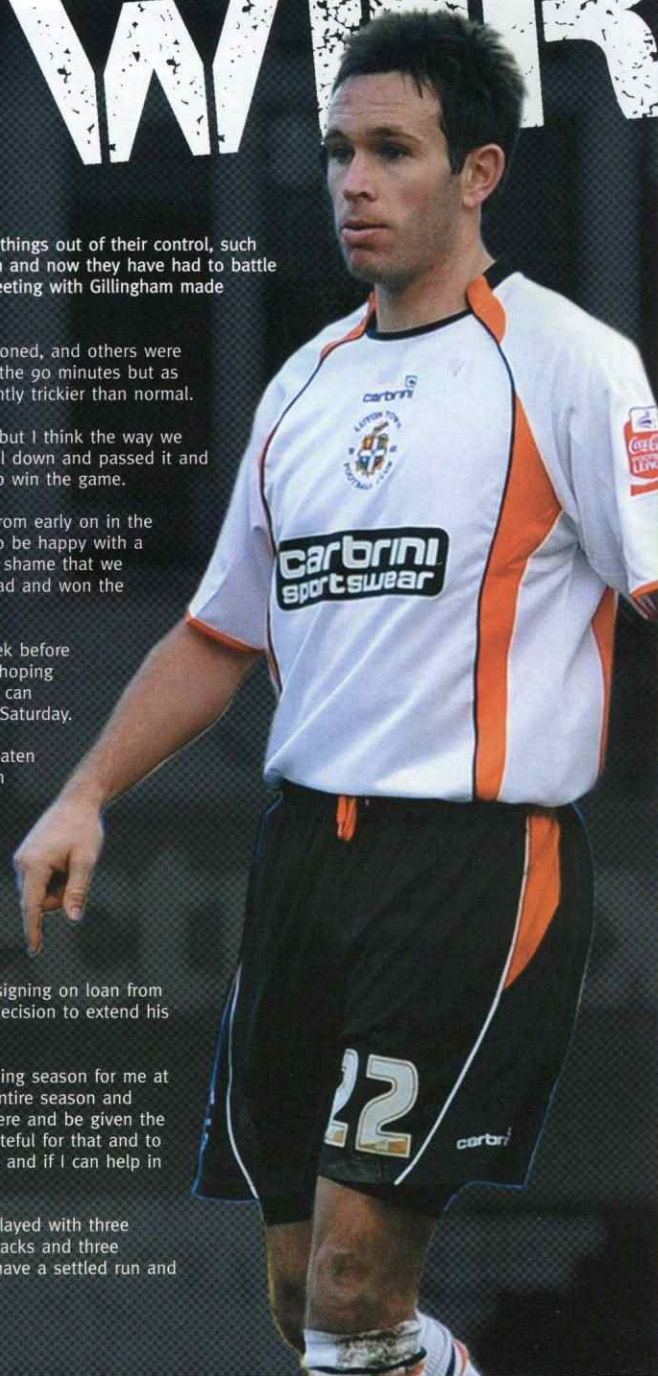
"It's frustrating but it is another game unbeaten and if we draw and then win like we did on Saturday then we'll keep doing that.

Mark Wright is hoping someone can come in to help the club soon or he fears for their future.

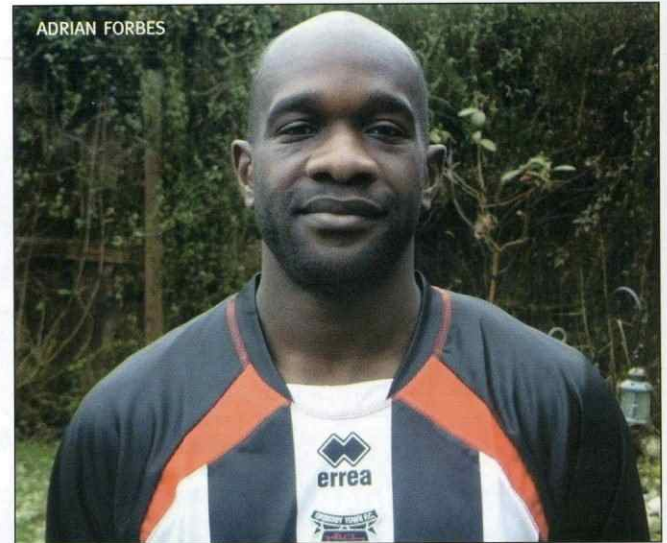

Adrian Forbes is hoping to make his stay at Grimsby Town a permanent one but only if they stay up.

The former Hatters winger is on loan at Blundell Park from Millwall and would be keen on staying if the Mariners remain in the Football League:

"If Grimsby were to stay up, which is what we are trying to do whilst I am here, then I would definitely be interested in moving here on a permanent basis."

"In the meantime I am just concentrating on the job at hand and doing what I can to keep Grimsby up."

I attend the majority of home games, travelling by train, only missing the occasional midweek match. Unfortunately I don't attend many away games as I have a wife and daughter at home who don't share my enthusiasm!

GOALKEEPER LES SEALEY

He was a legend, who was a regular during our most successful period, although he missed our Littlewoods Cup victory due to injury. A very vocal keeper who dominated his goal area and left his defenders in no doubt as to what he expected of them he went on to play for Man Utd.

RIGHT BACK TIM BREAKER

A strong and fast attacking full back who was able to put in perfect crosses from impossible positions, but was also a reliable tough-tackling defender. Another regular in our best ever team, he played in every league and cup game in our brilliant 1987/88 season. Just gets the nod ahead of Kirk Stephens.

CENTRE BACK STEVE FOSTER

Captained the team and dominated nearly all the strikers he came up against. Commanding in the air and rarely beaten on the deck, formed a perfect partnership with Mal Donaghy. A good organiser,

he lead by example but he didn't need to do a lot of shouting with Sealey in goal!

CENTRE BACK MAL DONAGHY

In my view the most consistent Luton player I've ever had the privilege of watching. He complemented Foster perfectly with his reading of the game and always seemed to be in the right place at the right time. Hardly missed a game in over 10 seasons and left eventually for Manchester United.

LEFT BACK STEVE BUCKLEY

A virtual ever-present during three or four years in the 1970's. He was a strong overlapping full back, very pacy with a good left foot. He gets in the team ahead of Richard Money by virtue of his attacking qualities, but was also a solid and reliable defender.

RIGHT MIDFIELD RICKY HILL

Probably the most skilful Luton player ever, great vision on the ball, deceptively quick with a brilliant range of passing, he could also beat players with ease and scored his fair share of spectacular goals. What more can you say about the guy?

CENTRE MIDFIELD DAVID PREECE

A wonderful playmaker who made the game look easy without doing anything flashy. Controlled the tempo of the game and rarely wasted a pass or gave the ball away. Only 5 feet 2 inches tall but the heart of a lion.

CENTRE MIDFIELD BRIAN STEIN

As this is a Dream Team I'm including Bruno as an attacking

midfielder instead of the ball-winning Brian Horton. He was one of the earliest exponents of playing 'in the hole', with great technique, vision, and was a remarkably composed finisher. Second only to Gordon Turner in total goals scored for the Town.

LEFT MIDFIELD DAVID MOSS

Brilliant left-winger, quick with a magical left foot who scored as many goals as he created and was a lethal dead-ball specialist. You always expected something to happen when he received the ball and entertained the Hatters' faithful during his seven years with the club. One of my all-time favourites.

STRIKER MALCOLM MACDONALD

Built like a tank but exceptionally fast and was a nightmare for any defender he came up against. Lethal goalscorer with a powerful shot and equally good in the air.

Sadly was only with us for a couple of years but, even though that was almost forty years ago, I still have a vivid memory of some of his performances for the Town. Just pips Paul Walsh for a place in the team.

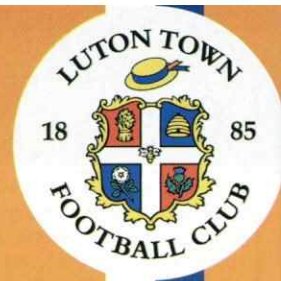
STRIKER MICK HARFORD

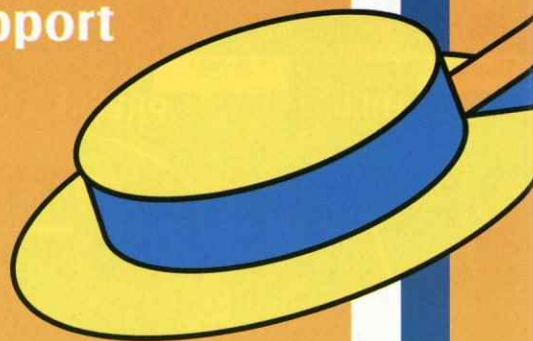

What's the ground like?

The ground is in a pleasant setting with plenty of trees visible around its perimeter. This is particularly so at the High Street End of the ground which is an open end. Some of the trees there are almost as tall as the floodlight pylons of the ground. Opposite is the East Bank. This is a covered terrace that has a barrel shaped roof and a number of supporting pillars running across the front of it.

On one side is the North (Main) Stand, which was built in the late 1930's. This partly covered stand (to the rear), is slightly raised having small sets of steps in front of it, so fans can access it. It was once all terrace, but a number of seats have now been added to the middle portion of the stand, with terrace still present on either side. Opposite is the South Stand, which is another covered seated stand, which looks a lot more modern than its age suggests (it was built in 1929). This stand only runs for around the half the length of the pitch, sitting astride the halfway line.

What's it like for away supporters?

Luton supporters will be housed in the South East corner of the ground, where there are 212 covered seated places available in the South Stand and space for a further 888 in the East Bank Terrace. This stand is shared with home supporters. However in good weather the area shouldn't feel cramped as access remains to the uncovered terrace on the South side. There are a number of supporting pillars in the East Bank, which could obstruct your view. Although the stand is showing its age, at least it does allow a good atmosphere to be created. Despite the club having done significant work to improve facilities for away supporters, they remain pretty basic.

Food and drink

The typical football fayre is available to supporters inside the ground, including burgers, hot dogs, pies and hot and cold drinks.

Away fans are treated to their own bar underneath the South Stand called Walley's Bar. Otherwise the ground is located only a

five minute walk away from Aldershot Town Centre where there are plenty of pubs to be found

How to get there by car:

Leave the M3 at Junction 4 and take the A331 towards Farnborough/Aldershot. Continue towards Aldershot passing the North Camp turn off. At the next junction (Aldershot South) turn right at the roundabout towards Aldershot Town Centre (A323). Keep straight on this road and after going under a railway bridge, the ground is visible on your right.

Car parking:

There is little parking available at the ground itself. Most fans tend to park in one of the many pay & display car parks, located around the town centre.

Luton's last visit:

The Hatters will be making their first trip to Aldershot in 41 years. The last time the two sides met at the Recreation Ground was on 20th March 1968 during the Town's Division Four Championship campaign. A solitary goal from Ian Buxton gave the Hatters both points at a time when Aldershot were also gunning for promotion. It was the Shots' first home defeat of the season and the 9,724 was their largest league gate in seven years.

Travel details:

Both the Bobbers Travel Club and the Luton Town Supporters Club are running coaches to Aldershot

The Bobbers leave Cranfield 8.30am at with pick-up points along the way before a 9.30am departure from Kenilworth Road. The fare is £15 for adults and £13 for juniors and seniors. For bookings telephone 01234 856542.

LTSC leave the Maple Road car park at 9.30am. The fare is £13 for adults and £11 for concessions. Under 7's can travel free when accompanied by a full paying adult. For bookings telephone 07960 567465.

Next up at Kenilworth Road will see the return of former Town manager Mike Newell, as his Grimsby Town side take on the Hatters in a crucial relegation six-pointer.

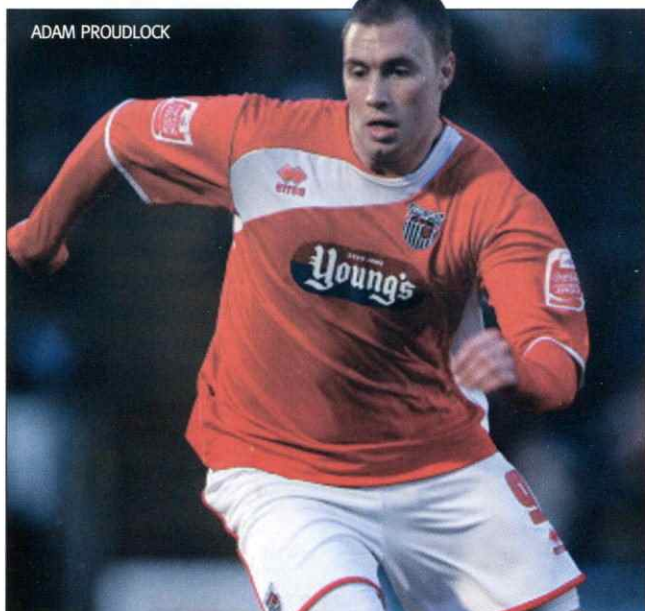
After picking up just two points in their opening six matches in League 2, Grimsby manager Alan Buckley was subsequently handed his P45 and Newell was called-up to steer the Mariners away from the threat of relegation.

Even under the leadership of the former Hatters manager, Grimsby continued in their struggle to pick up a win, until they faced Bury away in mid-November and recorded a much needed 2-0 victory.

Three more wins, first against promotion chasing Shrewsbury Town in December, then even more impressively against league leaders' Wycombe Wanderers away at Adams Park in January, was followed by a comprehensive 3-0 win over Rotherham a week later and brought a temporary wave of optimism over everyone associated with the Mariners.

This was short-lived, however, as the club then slumped to a retched winless streak. February came and went with Grimsby failing to pick up a win and has left them looking over their shoulders.

The Hatters faced Grimsby last October in their most recent meeting; a dramatic brace from Tom Craddock earned the Town an important point at Blundell Park in Newell's third game in charge of the Mariners. Peter Bore fired the home side ahead with just a minute on the clock, only for Craddock

to equalise 23 minutes later. 18-year-old defender and Captain Ryan Bennett then scored a second half goal to put the Mariners ahead for the second time in the match, before Craddock grabbed a point in injury time.

Goals have been fairly hard to come by for Newell's side who are without a prolific goalscorer in the squad.

At the time of writing, Adam Proudlock is the leading scorer with five goals. The former Wolves striker scored three of his goals during December after joining on-loan from Darlington in November. He then put pen-to-paper on a permanent deal in January, and on his day, the 27-year-old is a

handful for any defence in the league. The Blundell Park side also have former Hatters winger Adrian Forbes in their ranks after he signed on loan from Millwall last month, and the 30-year-old scored three times in his first month with the club.

The two sides have met 40 times in total, with the first meeting taking place in 1897 - that match resulting in a comprehensive 6-0 win for the Hatters.

Overall, though, the Mariners have the most wins to their name in previous encounters with 15. Luton have won 12 times and draws have occurred on 13 separate occasions.

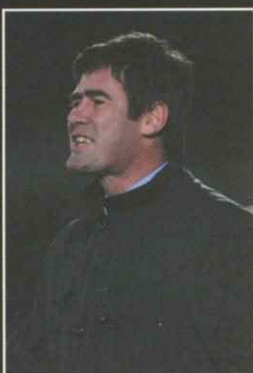
