Hunt confident he will be fit for Saturday

STEPHEN Hunt is confident he will be fit to face Accrington, despite hurting his ankle against Luton Town last night.

The Magpies' defender had to have his left ankle strapped-up in the first half of the 2-0 defeat, after twisting it in a challenge. He managed to play the full 90 minutes - but was in some discomfort.

After missing most of the season through injury, he is desperate to keep his place in the side for Saturday's game at Meadow Lane.

He said: "I pressed their wide man and I stepped on his foot and rolled my ankle. I had it strapped-up and it was a bit painful. I had it re-strapped and iced at half-time and it felt like I had a plaster-cast on my foot because it was so tight. Luckily we didn't have a great deal to do in the second half.

"It shouldn't be a problem. Obviously

we will see how it is over the next couple of days. I think it will be sore for 48 hours but I think I'll be fine for Saturday.

It was only Hunt's fifth start of the season in League Two. "I am still quite rusty but I feel better than I did after Saturday (against Shrewsbury)," he

"I am not at my peak fitness because I haven't played a great deal of football but over the last two games I feel I have been fairly solid and that was my aim.

It would be nice to play every game until the end of the season now because I have missed a fair bit of the season. I don't want to finish with just a few starts."

Hunt felt the Magpies' performance merited greater reward than a defeat but admitted they conceded two poor goals in the first half.

"I don't think they troubled us for the

best part of the game, which is why it's disappointing to lose," he said.

"I don't think we deserved to lose on our performance but we gave away two rubbish goals, cheap goals which could have been prevented.

"I think Tanny (Adam Tann) knows he shouldn't have gone to ground in the penalty area because the lad was going nowhere and they didn't have many players in the box.

"It's always hard to get two or three oals back. We had a few chances, Del (Delroy Facey) had a header. But if you don't score goals you don't win games, it's as simple as that. They sat back in the second half. They knew we were going to try and hit Delroy with longer passes and play off him.

was a rash, ill-judged, tackle and there was only ever going to be one outcome.

So many times this season the Magpies have conceded bad goals and caused their own downfall. Until they cut out their costly mistakes at the back they will always struggle to win

Hamshaw was almost alone in being impressive. After making a substitute appearance in the second half at Shrewsbury, he started for the first time since he injured his hamstring at Bury on February 21 - and he was the Magpies' chief threat.

He jinked his way brilliantly past two defenders and into the penalty area on 12 minutes but when his cross fell to Myles Weston he headed tamely straight at Luton keeper Dean Brill.

The visitors' replied five minutes later with Craddock forcing Pilkington into a good save at full-stretch to his right with a low drive from 20 yards. After falling behind, Hamshaw then tried to lead the Magpies' response just

after the half-hour mark, lifting a cross into the penalty area for Richard Butcher. But the goalscoring midfielder was crowded out. Hamshaw then teed up Delroy

> the far post - and he should have made it 1-1. But instead of directing a header at goal at the far post, he tried to nod it back to Butcher on the edge of the six-yard box. Facey's selflessness seemed to surprise him and he was unable to react quickly

enough. It was the best chance Notts created.

Instead, the visitors went on to double their lead and then protected it resolutely in the second half. They abandoned all attacking intent to stifle the Magpies.

It was hardly surprising, given they are fighting for their Football League lives.

There was a flurry of attacks early in the second half, with on-loan striker Jonathan Forte prodding wide from close-range. Weston too, blazed over. But that was it. It was hardly stirring stuff.

Facey flicked on a long ball forward from Stephen Hunt into the flight path of Forte on 77 minutes, as his pacy strike partner broke into the penalty area. Forte did well to control it at pace but his effort was blocked.

Hamshaw then had a shot blocked at the near post and Weston flashed a cross dangerously across the face of goal in injury-time but no one got on the end of it. It would have been little consolation.

It is now seven months since the Magpies last won a midweek game - when Weston memorably scored an extra-time winner against Championship outfit Doncaster Rovers in the Carling Cup.

They will hope to bring an end to that abysmal record against Gillingham at Meadow Lane next Tuesday night.
