FORTE'S FORGING **PARTNERSHIPS**

The old adage that strikers are a selfish bunch might ring true in nine out of 10 cases, but with Jonathan Forte we have an exception to the rule.

The on-loan Scunthorpe frontman added two more goals to his tally during our last home outing against Bradford, but was delighted fellow frontman Delroy Facey scored the third rather than him.

Although Forte could have been forgiven for wanting to go on and claim his second hat-trick of the season against the Bantams, and steal the headlines, he was delighted strike partner Facey got his rewards.

He explained: "I always want Del to get on the scoresheet because the sheer amount of effort he puts into every game is unbelievable and sometimes goes unappreciated.

"He's been instrumental this season in getting the other players around him goals. His hold up play and the amount of balls he wins in the air is phenomenal and allows the likes of myself, Myles Weston, Matt Hamshaw and Jamie Forrester to feed off him.

"I was obviously thrilled to get a brace against Bradford, and be on for another treble was a nice feeling, but it wasn't to be and it was important Del got his rewards that afternoon because he's been a real workhorse for us."

Facey's goal in first half stoppage time was his seventh of the campaign, putting the former Gillingham targetman already two goals better off than his 2007-08 goal haul.

And Forte is confident there are plenty more goals to come from the pair of them, with the 'driving buddies' forming an understanding on and off the pitch. He said: "With Del living in Huddersfield, he swings by Sheffield each morning to give me a lift to training, so we've developed a good understanding on and off the pitch and that's how top partnerships are formed."

The fleet-footed wingman played an integral part in inspiring us to a 3-1 triumph against Bradford at our last home game, having a hand in all three goals.

That performance took him level on assists for the season with fellow winger Matt Hamshaw, but Weston isn't satisfied just vet.

He explained: "I think last season I only got the odd assist so to have seven at this stage of the campaign is brilliant and just shows that my game is moving in

the right direction and that all the hard work behind the scenes is paying off. "My confidence is now sky high, and although it dipped for a few games back in December, I believe I'm now mentally stronger and can deal with situations a lot better."

According to official Football League statistics the former Charlton trainee currently tops our club rankings in having the most amount of shots off target, but has been working on adding more goals to his game in extra training sessions. He added: "I've been peppering Kevin Pilkington in nets from all angles in extra sessions to try and add more goals to my game, so let's hope it pays off."


want to be improving in your position and since I've been at Notts I feel like I'm





Nottingham Rugby's clash with Otley at the weekend was the first of five games to be played on our green stuff over a hectic 10 day period.

That congestion includes our home fixtures against this evening's visitors Luton, Accrington Stanley on Saturday and the re-arranged clash with Gillingham on Tuesday March 17. It's a tall order for Greg and his team, but a challenge he believes is not beyond them.

He said: "We are used to quick turnarounds by now with all the back-toback matches we've had this season, but Trevor Hutchinson and I thought we



were beginning to ease down before this glut of games came along.

"At this time of the year the pitch always begins to go a little, but in my opinion it's in a better shape now than it was at this stage of the season last year.

"That's testament to the investment the Club saw fit to put into the playing surface during the summer when we had a complete overhaul and it's paid off. "It's not just about the pitch though. And the fixture congestion is not all doom and gloom for Greg, as he explained: "Meadow Lane is becoming a fortress for both teams at the moment and we want to play our part in helping them continue that trend, and at least it gets me away from the mother-in-law on Mothering Sunday. So every cloud!"





MARK WELLS

The tough-tackling midfielder was a member of Neil Warnock's squad as a youngster after graduating through our ranks, turning professional in July 1990. His first-team debut came in the ZDS Cup second round tie at Sheffield United in October 1991, where he scored in the triumphant penalty shoot-out. He made two substitute League appearances prior to joining Huddersfield Town in August 1993, scoring the winner on his debut at Rotherham. Moving to Scarborough in July 1994, he was blighted by successive injury problems, then played for Gateshead, Worcester City, Harrogate Town, Hinckley United and Pickering Town.




JEFF WHITLEY Northern Irelan

Northern Ireland international midfielder who had two loan spells with us from Manchester City. Signing professional with the Citizens in February 1996, he played alongside his twin brother Jim and appeared in their 1998-99 Second Division Play-off Final triumph. He then helped them regain top-flight status before being loaned to Wrexham, then to us in March 2002 and October 2002, playing 18 League games overall while at Meadow Lane. Moving to Sunderland in August 2003, he featured prominently in their 2004-05 Championship title triumph, then joined Cardiff in August 2005 and has since had spells with Stoke and Wrexham.

DEVON WHITE

TIME

Towering striker who headed our winner in the 1995 Anglo-Italian Cup Final. He had spells with Arnold, Lincoln City, Boston United, Grantham and Shepshed before joining Bristol Rovers in August 1987. Helping them win the Third Division title and reach the Leyland/DAF Cup Final in 1989-90, he then moved to Cambridge United in March 1992. He was reunited with Gerry Francis at QPR in January 1993 and joined us for £110,000 in December 1994. Sold to Watford for £100,000 in February 1996, he returned to Meadow Lane in March 1997 and netted 17 goals in 55 League games overall. Later with Shrewsbury, Ilkeston and Stafford, he is now an electrician.



MIKE WHITLOW

Experienced defender who captained us during the 2004-05 campaign. He impressed with Witton Albion before joining Leeds United for £10,000 in November 1988 and helped them win the Second Division title in 1989-90 and League Championship in 1991-92. Sold to Leicester City for £250,000 in March 1992, he featured as they twice won promotion and the League Cup in 1997. Moving to Bolton for £500,000 in September 1997, he gained another piece of silverware, winning promotion with them in 2000-01, before joining Sheffield United in July 2003. Reuniting with Gary Mills at Meadow Lane in July 2004, he played 24 League games until injury curtailed his career.

FIRST HALF

Not since January 2007 had we been treated to three first half goals at Meadow Lane.

Despite a bright opening by the visitors, which saw Zesh Rehman head wide from a free-kick, a flowing counterattack gave us the breakthrough. Jamie Forrester swept forward 40 yards before picking out Jonathan Forte, who poked it past the on-rushing Rhys Evans for his first goal at Meadow Lane (top). The Bantams almost replied immediately but Michael Boulding saw his header saved by Kevin Pilkington. Myles Weston continued to terrorise down the left and his cross allowed Forte to control with his chest before

lashing in his sixth goal for us (left). Delroy Facey then completed the rout, turning in Weston's delivery in first half stoppage time (right).



SECOND HALF

After a stern talking to by boss Stuart McCall it was no surprise Bradford were quick out of the traps after the break. The introduction of lively winger Joe Colbeck caused us problems, as did the pace of Nicky Law and Steve Jones, but our backline remained resolute. Jamie Clapham twice made important interventions, hacking a goal bound effort from Law off the line (top right),

then blocking Colbeck's dangerous cross after he'd avoided the off-side trap. It was an uncharacteristic mistake from Clapham though, after misjudging a bounce, that resulted in Peter Thorne steering in a late consolation when he tapped in Colbeck's delivery. His first goal since November was too little too late for Bradford though, as we cruised to our fourth win in five home games, much to Ian McParland's delight.



WEMBLEY TRIP WILL BE LUTON'S CONSOLATION

It's an incredible irony that Luton Town should earn themselves a trip to Wembley at a time when they surely

need to start making plans for life as a non-League outfit.

And the very fact that they are mounting a campaign to take 30,000 fans with them on the short journey south to face Scunthorpe in the Final of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy shows how ridiculous it is that they find themselves in this situation.

It's not that long ago that the Hatters were a real force in English football and their team, packed with internationals, regularly appeared at Wembley in the major cup competitions.

But now they are paying the penalty in the most severe terms possible for going into Administration in November 2007. for the third time since 1999.

An initial 10-point deduction contributed to their relegation from League One and they entered this season with minus 30 points against their name, after failing to reach a Company Voluntary Arrangement with creditors and being found guilty of irregular payments.

It meant that the only way Mick Harford and his players would have any chance of staying in the League this season would be by clocking up something in the region of 80 points.

And although that wasn't a totally unrealistic target, it soon became clear that they wouldn't make it.


A 3-1 defeat at home to Port Vale on the opening day of the season did

nothing to boost confidence, but 10 points from the next available 12 did set people wondering.

It didn't last though, and although Luton have always looked capable of raising their game, they have never shown the consistency to suggest that they could dig their way out of trouble.

The writing was very much on the wall when they failed to win a single game in January and now, it's surely just a matter of enjoying the consolation prize of a day-out at Wembley.

They needed a penalty shoot-out to get past Brighton at Kenilworth Road in the Southern Area Final and goalkeeper Lewis Price wrote a chapter in the club's history books when he saved two spot kicks.





It has certainly perked up the people of Bedfordshire and they're determined to salvage something from this traumatic season by turning April 5 into a very special day.

Given the choice, of course, Harford would have much preferred to avoid the humiliation of having to spend next season playing the likes of Eastbourne, Altrincham and Salisbury in the Blue Square Premier.

And just as Mansfield Town and Oxford United have discovered, you certainly cannot take it for granted when you drop out of the League that you will bounce straight back.

Trying to keep the players motivated once relegation begun to look inevitable must have been a major challenge for Harford but even so, if we think that

means they will be there for the taking tonight, we will be in for a nasty surprise. You only have to look at their last away outing - a 3-1 win at Port Vale - for evidence that.

Kevin Gallen, the experienced former Queens Park Rangers striker, was among the scorers at Vale Park and as he told the club's website: "That was probably the best away performance since I came here in November.

"I thought we easily deserved to win. If we'd taken our chances in the first half it could have been four, five or six but 3-1 away from home is a great win and a great performance."

Yet again, as they have done so often this season, Luton struggled to build on that encouraging result. But although Harford was disappointed with a goalless draw against Gillingham, he dished out lavish praise to his players.

"They were brilliant, and I'm absolutely proud of them," said the manager. "I would actually go as far as to say that it was our best performance of the season so far over the complete 90 minutes.

"I'm disappointed for the players and fans because it was a first-class performance in difficult conditions. We peppered their goal and the only shot Dean Brill had to save was in the fourth minute of injury time."


Harford, who had brief dugout stints with Forest, Rotherham and QPR before taking up the hot-seat at Kenilworth Road in January 2008, was so encouraged by the way his team played last Tuesday, he suggested they still have a chance of avoiding the drop if they play like that in their remaining games. That's surely wishful thinking. But stranger things have happened and providing the players don't get too deflected by thoughts of Wembley, there could still be some late drama this season.

And their hopes of survival were boosted recently when Bradford agreed to extend the loan of experienced defender Mark Bower, who made a big impact during his initial month at Kenilworth Road.

BETWEEN THE STICKS

Healthy competition between the posts at Luton, with two seasoned 'keepers to choose from, has seen a dramatic improvement to the horrendous goals against column which saw the Hatters relegated from League One last season. Luton-born Dean Brill joined his hometown club aged nine and progressed through the youth ranks before winning the number one jersey under former boss Kevin Blackwell. Named 'Young Player of the Season' after his first full campaign in the Championship, the 6ft 3ins shot-stopper has since emerged as one of the most promising glovemen in the lower leagues and attracted his fair share of attention from bigger clubs.

He only returned to first team action in February after missing four months of the campaign where his spot was filled by **Conrad Logan** and **Lewis Price** between the sticks. Both have now returned to their respective clubs, Leicester City and Derby County, meaning Harford has plumped for another loanee as back-up for Brill. England Under-19 international **David Button** joined from Tottenham on an initial one month loan. The 20-year-old has been on loan at Grays and Bournemouth already this season.

FANCY THAT

AT THE BACK

Versatility has been the key to Harford's back four selections this season, with midfielders **Claude Gnapka** and **Keith Keane** featuring heavily.

Frenchman **Gnapka** joined the club in August 2008 after plying his trade with Montpellier HSC, Racing de Santander, Deportivo Alaves and FC Vaduz.

With his combative style, he has settled into his defensive role at Luton well and is comfortable playing at centre back or full back.

The former Peterborough man is often joined in the heart of defence by midfielder **Keane**. As well as being captain, he has been typical of the

adaptive system used throughout the squad, playing centre back and right back.

His never-say-die attitude has seen him become a crowd favourite at Kenilworth Road since graduating from the club's youth system.

Teenage defender **Ed Asafu-Adjaye** has been regularly used at right back since January and is another player to have progressed through the club's youth ranks.

Possessing great pace and power, he was loaned to Salisbury in January 2008 and after some impressive performances for the Blue Square Premier side, he was recalled only two months later.

Completing the quartet is tough tackling left back **Sol Davis** who is fast approaching 200 League outings for the Hatters after arriving from Swindon in 2002 where he was a trainee.

An attacking threat with his marauding runs down the left flank, he was named 'Player of the Year' in 2004-05, but had to recover from a serious stroke during the 2006-07 season.

Harford has plenty of experience in reserve as well with **lan Roper** on the club's books. After climbing through the ranks at Walsall, the no-nonsense defender accumulated more than 300 appearances for the Saddlers during a 13 year stint, winning promotion on three occasions.

He switched to Luton in August 2008 but is sidelined at present after picking up a knee injury in February. Further defensive options include teenage left back **Jake Howells** who made his debut as a second half substitute in May 2008.

This season he has pushed on up the pecking order and made a valuable

contribution to the first team by featuring in more than 20 matches.

While former Port Vale defender

George Pilkington is close to returning from two serious injuries, **Lewis Emanuel** is still sidelined because of

knee ligament damage.

Mark Bower is available tonight though after extending his loan spell from Bradford, where he has more than 230

League starts to his name.

Injuries have deprived Harford of being able to regularly use his inspirational skipper **Kevin Nicholls**. His return to fitness for the last part of the season will be vital if Luton are to stand any chance of beating the drop.


The hard-working midfielder is enjoying his second spell at the club after six successful seasons, from 2001-06, then saw him leave for Leeds in a six-figure fee transfer.

Played for Charlton and Wigan before helping the Hatters to the League 1 title in 2004-05 during his first spell at the club, but returned last summer to be made club captain after things didn't work out at Preston.

Nicholl's absence has seen an unexpected role for Thetford-born striker lan Henderson in the centre of the park. A product of Norwich's successful youth system, he won a Championship medal with the Carrow Road outfit in 2004, but a serious injury two years later curtailed his progress.

Released at the start of 2007-08, **Henderson** was snapped up by

Northampton before switching to Luton in January, where he's moved back into a midfield role rather than his more accustomed striker's berth.





Midfielder Asa Hall, pictured left, is having his most productive season ever in front of goal for Luton, scoring nine times.

Irish midfielder Keith Keane, pictured right, has made more than 100 League outings for the Hatters since joining them in 2003.

Republic of Ireland Under-21 international **Michael Spillane** is another with Canary connections, after he joined Luton on a season-long loan from Norwich in August 2008.

Strong in the tackle and comfortable in possession, **Spillane** adds some steel to the middle of the park and has also weighed in with four goals this season. Luton's left-sided attacking threat **Asa Hall** has been in good form since the turn of the year, registering five goals to take his tally to nine.

He started his football career with

Wolves before signing his first

professional contract at Birmingham in

2004. Named their 'Young Player of the

Year' in the 2004-05, he also received call-ups to England Under-19 and 20 levels, then took in loan spells with Boston, Ashford and Shrewsbury prior to heading to Luton last August.

Versatile winger **Rossi Jarvis** can

play down either flank and is another product off Norwich's production line. Became the youngest ever player to appear for the Canaries reserve team at the tender age of 14, before having loan spells with Torquay and Rotherham after finding first team opportunities hard to come by. Headed for Kenilworth Road in August and has been a regular face in Harford's plans this term, although he's still waiting for his first League goal for the club. Other options include trainee

Scott Sinclair while Ryan Charles has been back on the bench for the last four fixtures.

UP FRONT

Harford has certainly not been short of experienced strikers this season, with four on the books having played at Championship level, so it will come as a disappointment to him that not one has managed to hit double figures.

Chris Martin is currently the closest to breaking that barrier, with the young striker - on a season-long loan from Norwich - currently having nine goals to his name.

Strong and technically gifted, his early promise with the Canaries saw him win recognition in the England Under-19 squad, scoring on his debut against Turkey in March 2007. He struck five times for the first team in 30 games in 2007, before falling down the pecking order, but the pacey forward has rediscovered his goalscoring prowess playing off talisman Sam Parkin. The former Chelsea trainee has a proven goalscoring pedigree after scoring 67 times in 120 appearances for Swindon from 2002 to 2005, before moving on to lpswich where he suffered a serious ankle break.



Former Norwich City frontman Chris Martin scored his first goal for Luton against us in August, and has added eight to his tally since then.

It paved the way for a £340,000 move

to Luton in 2007, where he was brought in to replace the prolific Steve Howard, but a disappointing return of five goals in his first season saw him loaned out to Leyton Orient in October.

Since returning to first team action at Kenilworth Road in January he's weighed in with four goals, but a recent injury crisis in midfield has seen **Parkin** used increasingly on the right flank.

Another loan signing to feature heavily this term is **Tom Craddock**. Originally a defender, he developed into a promising forward while in the reserves at Middlesbrough and impressed the

Hatters enough on loan earlier in the season to warrant a permanent transfer to Luton in January.

He signed a two-and-half year deal and with be looking to add to the six League goals he has so far this term.

Another on the books who knows his way around the lower leagues is veteran marksman **Kevin Gallen**, who established himself as something of a legend at Loftus Road.

He notched up more than 400 appearances, scoring 97 times for QPR in two spells spanning nearly 14 years. Also played for Huddersfield, Barnsley and Plymouth before moving to MK Dons in the summer of 2007, scoring nine goals in 16 League starts before joining Luton on loan in November. Confined mainly to cameo appearances, Gallen has three goals this season. Diminutive Northern Ireland international striker Paul McVeigh arrived at the club at the beginning of last season after more than 200 outings for Norwich. After failing to impress Harford when he took over the reigns he has slowly been pushing himself up the pecking order, last scoring in early December. Other offensive options include teenager Jordan Patrick and former Watford trainee Wayne Andrews, who



ALL ABOUT LUTON

STILL THERE

Luton, formed in 1885 after Wanderers and Excelsior merged, played at two other grounds before setting up home at Kenilworth Road in 1905. Over the years, there have been many schemes drawn up for either re-locating or re-developing the ground but the 10,248 capacity stadium will continue to be Luton's base for the time being.

WHEN THEY WERE UP...

Younger supporters might find it difficult to believe but Luton were once a real power in the English game. They spent 10 years in the top flight from 1955 but within five years of being relegated, they'd slipped all the way down to Division Four.

WHAT A PAYNE

Joe Payne set a Football League record in 1936 which still remains to this day. He became the one and only player ever to score 10 goals in the same game - against Bristol Rovers - and went on to score a staggering 55 goals that season.

COSTLY EXERCISE

Luton became the first fully-professional club in the south of England in 1891.

They had already started paying players

three years earlier, but they were hit by the first of their financial crises six years later when poor attendances and high wages caused them to drop out of the Football League.

MR CONSISTENT

Cultured defender Mal Donaghy was 'Mr Consistency' for Luton during arguably the finest era of their history and it is fitting that he should hold a place in the club's record books. He was their Most Capped Player, making 58 of his 91 appearances for Northern Ireland while he was at Kenwilworth Road.

UP FOR THE CUP

Luton's record in cup competitions throughout the Eighties was quite remarkable. They reached the FA Cup semi-finals in 1986 and 1988, tasted victory and defeat in successive seasons in the League Cup in 1988 and 1989 and were also runners-up in the Full Members Cup in 1988.

THANKS CURTIS

Aston Villa defender Curtis Davies began his career at Luton - and they're glad he did. Davies landed the Hatters a club record £3million windfall in August 2005 when he left to join West Brom.

PLEAT INSPIRED GOOD TIMES FOR LUTON

Think of Luton managers and one name immediately leaps to mind. David Pleat was in charge from 1978-86 and again from 1991-95, and he has good reason to be proud of his achievements at Luton as they consistently punched above their weight during that period. For example, they finished seventh in the top flight in 1987 - their highest ever position - then won the League Cup in 1988 and were back at Wembley as beaten finalists the following year. There's a clear theme running through the list of Luton managers, and that includes current incumbent Mick Harford because they have always been guick to give former managers their chance. Before Pleat, longserving former defender Syd Owen filled the hot seat and John Moore, Jim Ryan, Ricky Hill and Lil Fuccillo are other ex-players who have had spells as manager. The former Luton manager with strongest links with us is Kevin Blackwell, who was a 'keeper here during Neil Warnock's tenure.

FANCY THAT

Luton Museum & Art Gallery is housed in a large Victorian mansion in Wardown Park on the outskirts of the town centre.

It boasts collections of the traditional crafts synonymous to the Bedfordshire region, notably its lace-making and hat-making.



I was with the former Blackpool and Villa man at Bramall Lane for three years. He was unbelievable on the ball and I'm not sure I ever saw him lose possession. Even though he was only 5ft 4in, he would constantly amaze us all by winning his fair share of headers. His leap was incredible.



GK Paddy Kenny

Not the biggest goalkeeper but a tremendous shot-stopper none the less. He's been magnificent over the past couple of years for Sheffield United and I was in the same team as him for four years. Quick off his line and with great distribution skills, he is a real class act. Off the field he's a bit of a loony and a real dressing room joker.



CM Tom Huddlestone

A very laid back character who I met in the England youth set-up. He loved a tackle and was almost impossible to get past in training because of his sheer size... it took an age to run around him. Possessed a great passing range as well and I always remember him being a very focused individual, especially before games. He would be the one in the corner of the dressing room with a steely stare.



Phil Jagielka

A real athlete. He was a nightmare to get past in training because he was strong and quick. 



ICEMAN KEPT US UP BY THE SKIN OF OUR TEETH

It was the dawn of yet another new era in July 2005 when Gudjon Thordarson became our eighth new manager in the space of six years.

And having finished in 19th place the previous season, there were high hopes that the former Stoke City boss would inspire a significant climb up the table. Howard Wilkinson, back at Meadow Lane as a director, had clearly had a significant say in the appointment of Thordarson and between them, they had vast experience to offer our cause. But what was apparent from the 'off' was that the Icelander would have to build a team on the most modest of budgets. That was underlined in the build-up to the season when our list of newcomers was made up of inexperienced youngsters Dan Martin,

Lewis McMahon and Stacy Long, signed on free transfers from Derby, Sheffield Wednesday and Charlton.

And Thordarson also brought in Brian O'Callaghan, a former Barnsley utility player who he'd worked with in Iceland. It all began very promisingly when a goalless draw at Torquay was followed by a 1-0 win over Wrexham - Long scored a dramatic winner in added time and then Steve Scoffham's first goal for 16 months helped us to beat Lincoln 2-1. And even though we went out of the Carling Cup, beaten 3-1 at Watford, we were sitting proudly on top of the table when a Glynn Hurst double gave us victory over Bristol Rovers.

In fact, we remained there for a couple more weeks but sadly it turned out to be a false dawn.

Four successive games in September without scoring a goal did untold damage, and a run of nine games without a win saw us slip steadily down the table.

A hat-trick from Hurst gave us a 3-2 success at Bury and lifted everyone's spirits, and when a debut goal from Adam Tann helped us pull off a shock 2-0 win at Bristol City in the first round of the FA Cup, there was reason to believe the tide had turned.

But Cheltenham then came from behind to win at Meadow Lane and in a way, that summed up our season.


Every time we seemed to get ourselves into a promising situation, the proverbial rug was pulled from under us and inconsistency was a massive problem. Thordarson was very aware of the need to introduce fresh faces but the best he could manage on the tight budget was voung striker Mark DeBolla, on loan from Chesterfield, and midfielder Liam Needham, who joined us on a short-term contract after being released by Sheffield Wednesday. We were sitting in 14th place at the turn

of the year and 2006 began promisingly - especially for Martin because the teenage full back scored in successive games against Barnet and Darlington. In fact, 10 points from a possible 18 was encouraging enough to prompt Thordarson to suggest it still wasn't too late for us to mount a late charge for promotion.

By then, Hurst, Tony Scully and Matthew Gill had all had their contracts cancelled because they didn't figure in the manager's long-term plans, and striker Dan Chillingworth had arrived on loan from Rushden & Diamonds. But instead of pushing on to establish

ourselves among the top 10, February turned out to be a disastrous month.

We lost all five matches - every one of them by the odd-goal - and we were back down in 14th place by the time 9.779 saw us draw 2-2 in an entertaining derby clash with Mansfield. It did nothing to lift the spirits when talented young defender Kelvin Wilson was allowed to join Preston on loan until the end of the season, with a view to a permanent deal.

And try as he could to breath new life into our season, Thordarson was becoming increasingly frustrated about having no money to work with. At least Mike Edwards had cause to celebrate when he took his goals tally for the season to a career-best six in the

1-1 draw with Leyton Orient, and it was something of a coup in April when David Pipe was persuaded to sign a new deal. But all the time, we were steadily sinking down the table and we went into our final fixture - at home to Bury - knowing that defeat could cost us our Football League place.

A dramatic last minute penalty by skipper Julien Baudet gave us a 2-2 draw and when Oxford lost to Orient, a point was enough to secure our safety. Later that week, Steve Thompson, who had been chairman for two years, handed over the reigns to Jeff Moore and before the month was out. Thordarson's spell as manager also came to an end.

NOWLAND: WANTING TO TURN BACK TIME



Interview by David Middleton Action images by John Sumpter While the footballing widows of this world are keenly crossing off the days to the season's end in early May, supporters up and down the country are just wishing there was that little bit longer.

The football calendar may last for just over nine gruelling months, but for all the goalless draws, the derby day hammerings and the early cup exits, when the end of another campaign gallops into view, the footballing fraternity don't want it to stop.

Adam Nowland is no different - although he has very personal reasons for wishing the season could be extended.

The articulate central midfielder has had another stop-start campaign due to injury niggles, but just when he was beginning to rediscover his fitness - and show the Meadow Lane faithful his true calibre - the end of the season seems to be closing in at an alarming rate.

Despite three injury set-backs, which saw him miss the entire September programme, early December and part of February, Nowland has not featured this regularly since the 2003-04 season. Back then he was plying his

trade in the Championship with West Ham, and the team formerly known as Wimbledon.

Having appeared only 11 times in the previous two campaigns - for Stockport, Gillingham and Preston - letting this season go is even harder for our number 25 who has featured in 50 per cent of all our outings. It's meant he's only been able to showcase his true calibre in patches this term, yet when the 27-year-old has been on song he has shown why lan McParland gambled on bringing him out of the footballing wilderness.

There was no better example of his pedigree than in our

There was no better example of his pedigree than in our last home outing with Bradford, in which he dictated the tempo to steer us to a 3-1 success and was unquestionably worthy of his 'Man of the Match' accolade. And now that the hunger and desire are back in his game, after admitting he had become "disillusioned with the industry" following a horrendous spell with hometown club Preston, he's now licking his lips for more pitch-time.

"I can't believe this season is moving into its final throes already," he said. "It feels like the time has absolutely flown by and I just wish there was an extra 15

games on top of the remaining 10 we have left.

"I would love to be able to put a 30 or 40 game season under my belt and that's something I was hoping for this year. Unfortunately, because of a few injuries at various stages that didn't happen, but I feel I'm returning to full fitness now and I'd love to get a run of games under my belt.

"I want to show the cynics who doubted me that they were wrong. I've wasted months of my career without playing enough football and time is passing me by. I understand what a privileged career football is and I want to make up for lost time before it's taken from me.

"It's astonishing how fast the seasons pass you by and I don't want to take them for granted, and suddenly find myself a veteran."

The former Blackpool trainee will be the first to admit that he has spent too much of his precious career on the physiotherapist's table. A double leg break in January 2006 while he was at Deepdale stalled his progress for almost two years, but he's gone some way to resurrecting a career that was nose-diving since linking up again with our commander-in-chief.

Nowland built a solid relationship with McParland at Forest after finding himself in the second string more often than not, despite having arrived for a substantial six-figure sum in 2004.

A regular reserve player for his solitary year, a managerial shuffle saw him left out in the cold when notorious disciplinarian Gary Megson took up the mantle left by Joe Kinnear.

"The gaffer was exactly the type of person I needed to get me back into the game at this stage of my career," he

added. "He has helped me tremendously and if a new contract was put in front of me tomorrow I would sign it if it meant playing for lan McParland and his staff. "The pedigree of personnel he's attracted to this club, and the type of people he has working for him here have been key for me.

"The gaffer knows all about me and my past injury problems, but I'd like to think I proved to him I can still offer something and that's why an extended deal until the end of the season was put on the table in January.

"I don't think there's any doubting my ability and I believe I've adapted well to the rigours of League 2 football. I want to remain a part of this club for the long term because something solid is being built here and I would love to help them to some success, which I'm sure is just around the corner."

And it's more than the "gaffer" Nowland has struck up a firm understanding with. Enjoying being back among the dressing room banter, he's also delighted to be back playing alongside former Forest colleague John Thompson in the middle of the field. The Irishman's industrious nature compliments Nowland's eye for a pass and creative nous superbly, but McParland will want to see it on a more regular basis if he is to plump for Nowland in the long term.

Proving that he's capable is Nowland's aim between now and May, but he'll also have another motive for wanting to get into the action against Luton this evening.

When he was just a 'wonderkid' at Blackpool he became the club's youngest-ever goalscorer despite hardly having hairs on his chin. His first senior goal came at just 17 years 142 days, with the unlucky recipients being the Hatters. It has left Nowland with fond memories of breaking Trevor Sinclair's record almost a decade ago, and having not featured on the scoresheet anywhere in the last 38 months, now would be as perfect a time as any to do just that.

He said: "It's a record I'm happy to still have and whenever I come across Luton the memories of that day just come flooding back. I know Mick Harford from our brief time together at Forest so I'm hoping I put in a good performance and, who knows, maybe a goal will come my way. I'm certainly due one."

The first step would involve sending the Under-12s over to County Clare for a match and hopefully that could open up another avenue to bring in more players in the future.


In addition, he is looking to enter the Under-11s into the pre-season Umbro Cup in Manchester, to give them experience of playing in a tournament.


Pritchard were a top scoring team and rose to 76th spot, while the other 'Notts

They are now in 105th spot, too high to appear in the part of the table shown today, as I'm featuring the basement section. That victory marked the end of February, so it is time to look back over the month. Two postponements meant that it didn't get going until the 14th, but the Macclesfield game was quickly rearranged making it four opportunities for point scoring. And that contributed to making it one of the closest races yet for the monthly prize. Four teams achieved the highest total over those games. The three runners-up were Sarah Pritchard's 'Football Widow', who rose six places to 147th, Ian Gill's 'Bullet-Proof Feet', who stepped up 36 to 69th spot, and A. Jones' 'County Ranger' who soared 37 places to 20th posistion. The best team during February though, certainly punching above their weight, are the 'Shadow Boxers'. The front three of Butcher, Facey and Matt Hamshaw, along with new signing Jamie Clapham, all racked up double figure scores. It meant they moved from 108th position to 70th over the course of the month and made Giles Holt February's 'Magpie Manager of the Month.'

Colin Slater re-lives some of his visits to opposition territory and recalls some of the fascinating football characters he's met along the way.

Whereas it hasn't always been an unalloyed pleasure to visit Luton Town it was, happily, different when Notts went there in August.

The reason was that an old professional colleague of mine had just taken over the daunting challenge as chairman, thereby confirming his lifelong devotion as a Luton supporter.

A lounge at the club was named after him quite a while ago, while another part of the ground honours Eric Morecambe as surely the club's most famous director and fan.

Nick Owen is, I suspect, still best known - at least outside Luton - as a BBC TV presenter and remembered by millions for the four years between 1992 and 1996 when he was one half of the duo who, at breakfast time, presented "Good Morning with Anne and Nick."

The Anne in question is Anne Diamond and the pair have also been associated with other television programmes.

Now Nick finds himself in the Luton

chair that was always hot, and made even hotter when the Football League and FA combined last summer to dock the club 30 points. A 10 point haul was taken off for so-called transfer misdealings, and a further 20 removed for failing to meet stringent rules on coming out of Administration.

From the off it's made Luton favourites

to be relegated to the Conference on the basis that bridging 30 points was, in the view of many, unachievable.

Considering that, Nick was remarkably

chipper when we met at Kenilworth Road on the third day of the season. He had reason to be so.

Having lost their opening League game at home to Port Vale, Luton had then beaten Plymouth in the Carling Cup and won away at Gillingham in the League. Given the unpromising circumstances it was an encouraging start.

Nick and I hadn't met for a few years.





Our last encounter was during the benefit season of Andy Pick, the Notts cricketer, whose wife organised a Ladies' Lunch at which he was the guest speaker and I was the MC. He told some fascinating stories about personalities and events from behind the television screen.

Why, you may wonder, has Luton not usually been one of my favourite football destinations? Two reasons will suffice. One is that car parking is inadequate and, more seriously, the media view is impaired by substantial stanchions in front of the main stand.

The Hatters have also achieved notoriety over the years that presumably they would be happier to forget.

Remember how they were among the pioneers of plastic pitches? Also, does anyone recall how a game against Millwall at Kenilworth Road was abandoned after 14 minutes because of scenes of shocking violence?

Local MP David Evans reacted furiously by proposing a membership scheme to ban away fans altogether, to the fury of supporters everywhere.

It's all a far cry from Luton's circumstances half a century ago. In just seven weeks it will be 50 years to the day since they lost 2-1 to Forest in the FA Cup Final.

Relegation from the League could sadly be confirmed on the very same day, May 2, when their season ends at Brentford, who themselves could be celebrating promotion to League One.

SURVIVAL FIGHT

We welcome all 'Trust in Luton' members and other Luton fans to the game today and wish them well as their club fights for survival.

No Notts fan present at Meadow Lane on September 3, 2003 for our last home League game against Luton will ever forget what looked increasingly likely to be our last League game.

Looking at the familiar surroundings and wondering whether we would ever see them again was an experience we fervently hope never to repeat.

Fans appeared from all over the country to show their support in our time of need and to throw coins into the clanking buckets. Forest's David Johnson even

buckets. Forest's David Johnson even appeared on the pitch to wish us luck and to make a £500 donation there and then, a gesture that will always be remembered by Notts fans.

Luton fans were particularly supportive as they were facing ownership problems of their own, and were also in Administration, although they were not waiting an imminent Football League decision on their future.

One prospective buyer was to promise a stadium built on stilts over the M1, complete with Formula 1 track and multi sports facilities! They were busy starting their Supporters' Trust - 'Trust in Luton'

- soon after we were setting up our own. In November 2007, Luton's third Administration since 1999 earned them a 10-point deduction - as is now regulation - which contributed to their relegation from Division 1.

The deduction of 20 more points for failing to reach a Company Voluntary Arrangement with creditors, which the Football League has demanded since Leicester used the Administration process to their advantage in 2002, and a further 10 point deduction by the Football Association for irregular payments to agents, meant that they started this season on -30, a mountain to climb indeed.

It is this FA imposed 10 point deduction which has most aggrieved Luton fans.

As the Chairman of the Trust in Luton





said at the time: "While the FA are right

to try to protect the game against this

type of behaviour, this particular decision is a massive kick in the teeth to Luton supporters and, we believe, hugely disproportionate to the offences that were found to have been committed. "Even the FA categorically stated on June 4, that no evidence of bungs or backhanders was found. We can only conclude that LTFC - and by extension its supporters - have been punished for technical offences that were carried out by people no longer at the club. "It is easy to see why our members and the wider fan base are saying 'one rule for some, one rule for others', when last vear West Ham were not deducted points for a serious breach of FA rules. "Indeed the panel hearing for that case said that to deduct points would have been 'unfair on supporters' at that stage of the season. Are we to conclude that during the close season, considerations of supporters are not important?"

ACTIVE SCHOOLS SCHEME DELIVERED CITY WIDE

Our 'Active Schools' scheme, which was initially planned to be delivered to 18 city based primary and junior schools, has proved extremely popular over the past five months.

Started last September, its initial success at the educational institutions we visited has paved the way for us to extend the project further. And following the submission of an application to Nottingham City NHS, we have been successful in gaining funding to propel the project to all 72 schools in the city. It means we will be attending no less than 25 schools every week and Activity Development Manager Emma Trent, who

was responsible for designing the scheme of work for the project, was delighted by the proposed expansion. She said: "Its a fantastic opportunity to increase children's awareness of the importance of living a healthy and active lifestyle and by teaching them the various ways they can do this.

"The expansion of the project allows us to reach thousands of children across the city."

The extended programme will utilise indoor rowing machines supplied by Nottingham's Concept 2, and with additional schools now expecting a visit, many more machines will be required -

often being left with the schools for the 10 week duration of the programme. 'Active Schools' has already been run in six schools and early feedback has been positive.

It has shown that more than 80 per cent of the children improved their fitness levels over the course of the programme, while 90 per cent showed an interest in continuing rowing in their spare time.

Other results from the activity sessions indicated the improvement of children's self esteem.

Almost 80 per cent involved said they were more confident to try new things after taking part in the programme.

AFTER SCHOOL SESSIONS RETURN

With the winter months behind us and the nights staying lighter for longer, our after school sessions will soon be up and running again soon.

All the 'Active School' sessions include an after school club for a maximum of 30 children to attend, but the majority of these have taken a break since October. As we enter Spring, delivery of these clubs will be getting underway again at a couple of our old favourites, Lovell House and St Edmund Campion.

A couple of sessions are delivered at

Lovell every Friday, the first working with five and six-year-olds, before providing a more structured coaching session to the Nottingham High Junior school pupils. Campion is an establishment we have been working closely with for more than six years. Over that time we have built up an excellent relationship with both staff and pupils at the West Bridgford based school, delivering sessions to them every Wednesday.

Working with five age groups, starting with reception children as young as four,



the sessions are full of fun activities, often involving our coaches being taught the children's favourite games. Football activities are also run with students in Year 1 through to Year 4, and the after school sessions with both these schools will run until the summer holidays.



MORE DISABILITY COACHING ON THE WAY

Football coaching with disabled footballers across the county has recently been given the green light. It means for the next 20 weeks we will be attending Nethergate Special School in Clifton, as well as running a six-week course with Springwood Dat Centre at Southglade Leisure Centre.

We are no strangers to Springwood students though, having worked with them on various projects in the past and welcomed them on a guided tour of Meadow Lane last year.

Our staff have also been putting on coaching sessions to a group of men with mental health problems at the Wells Road Centre in St Anns.

On the back of our 'On the Ball' project, we have been visiting and delivering sessions to both these institutions and look forward to doing so for the foreseeable future.

CALLING ALL COACHES

Due to the expansion of a number of our programmes, the Football in the Coomunity team is looking to add some qualified coaches to its ranks. The successful candidates will be responsible for assisting and leading coaching activities on all our various projects and must currently hold a 'first 4 Sports' Level 2 Coaching Football Certificate.

Experience of working with and coaching young people, including youngsters with physical impairments and learning disabilities, would also be an advantage. Candidates must have excellent planning, organisational and communication skills.
