





sure as Wiggy must be 60 now....lol




From the GAFFER



Good Afternoon. Today we welcome a club with a common link. Eric Morecambe. Our town is always linked with this wonderful comedian by the very nature of our name, and that he adopted his home town name as his stage name.

Luton Town are linked by his tenure as a Director of the club. So we both have a common bond. Eric Morecambe was passionate about his football, and I am sure that today with so much at stake for both clubs that the football will be passionate. We still have to keep winning, as teams in a more favourable position than ourselves might drop points, and we have to be in a position to take advantage or increase pressure if that happens. Luton, whilst euphemistically behind the eight ball, still have to believe. They have to believe because their Football league life depends on gaining more points than Chester and Grimsby Town. If you add back the 30 point deduction, they would have 49 points, which would be 3 points behind us, so on results, today's game should be very close. The game should have been on the Saturday but on a police request it was brought forward so as not to clash with the Preston v Blackpool game as this occupies a lot of Lancashire Police's manpower. The kick off time was agreed with Bradford who preferred 15-15 as 15-00 on Good Friday is of significance in a religious manner. As I am sure supporters are aware, the Car Wash Terrace has been made available to the Bradford City Supporters, on an all ticket basis. There will be no cash admittance to this area on the day. Home supporters will be able to gain entrance to the North Stand through turnstiles 5 and 6(cash and season tickets) 7, 8 and 9 cash only. Main Stand and Paddock as normal. However supporters in the Main Stand (cash payers) will be issued with a ticket and the seat, block row and seat number will be printed on the ticket. That is the seat you will have to occupy. Introducing LUTON TOWN

The Hatters' Johnstone's Paint Trophy final appearance at Wembley next weekend will see them backed by a record following from one club, whilst they remain in with a chance of staging one of the most dramatic escapes from relegation, but will realistically need at least six wins from eight, and the patchy form of Grimsby and Chester, to continue.

Loss of key players from the squad last season contributed to Town's slide from play-off outsiders to the foot of the table, and there were more departures of the end of a traumatic season. That meant that, once approval was made for new signings, manager Mick Harford made a flurry of signings on the eve of the season, with paper inserts required to introduce the new faces, who gelled encouragingly in the early weeks of the campaign.

Brighter news in early August saw the return of inspirational midfielder Kevin Nicholls, from Preston. There was a host of transfer activity just before the opening game, as Harford captured defenders Claude Gnapka from Peterborough. George Pilkington from Port Vale and Ian Roper from Walsall. In midfield, Kevin Watson switched from Colchester, alongside Birmingham City's Asa Hall. Alongside this, a large number of loan signings were made as Chris Martin and Michael Spillane switched from Norwich, alongside Rossi Jarvis' permanent move. Josh Klein-Davies, from Bristol Rovers, and Tristan Plummer, from Bristol City, were later followed by another temporary signing in Leicester keeper Conrad Logan. Keith Keane and Lewis Emanuel extended their deals with the club. Dean Morgan was loaned to Leyton

Town have used the loan system to good effect, with Leicester defender Harry Worley joining in September, and the following month saw striker Tom Craddock arrive from Middlesbrough in a deal which was later made permanent, and fellow forward Kevin Gallen from Milton Keynes. Former Burnley midfielder Gareth O'Connor and Coventry striker Wayne Andrews also joined the club, but Paul Underwood was released and Sam Parkin joined Leyton Orient on loan. Action in the transfer window brought in Colchester striker Sunday-Akanni Wasiu, Bradford City defender Mark Bower and Derby goalkeeper Lewis Price, but forward Drew Talbot signed on loan for Chesterfield and Andrews was released. Recently, goalkeeper David Button has arrived on loan from Tottenham Hotspur.

The opening day saw the new arrivals give a dominant display in the first half against a clinical Port Vale, who recorded a 3-1 win despite Sam Parkin's goal. However, the Hatters provided the perfect response as Jarvis and Plummer set up an excellent 2-0 home win over Plymouth Argyle, and Parkin was on hand to make the first dent in the points deduction with the only goal in the 1-0 win at Gillingham. Town let the lead slip in their

next home game, against Notts County, as despite Martin's goal, it finished 1-1. 20 years after their famous League Cup against Arsenal, dreams of a repeat were halted as the Hatters lost 5-1 at Reading. An excellent 1-0 win was earnt at Exeter by Parkin to complete an encouraging opening month.

However, September proved to be more subdued, opening with a 2-1 loss at a Macclesfield Town side tipped to struggle, but Spillane, Hall and Martin contributed in a 3-1 home win over Aldershot Town. There was a costly 1-0 defeat at Rotherham, another side to suffer a points deduction, and a 1-1 home draw with Chester, in which a lead provided by Hall was lost. October got off to a better start as Spillane equalised in the 1-1 draw at Bradford City, and the start of a Johnstone's Paint Trophy run which has taken them to within a game of Wembley began with a penalties victory at home to Brentford. A double home defeat to Darlington and Accrington Stanley was a blow, but Craddock equalised twice in the significant 2-2 draw at Grimsby, a side performing so poorly they would have been bottom if not for the points deductions suffered by other sides.


Ironically, a number of Town wins have come against sides further up the table, the pick being the 2-1 success at Bury earnt by Craddock and Roper, before a 3-0 reverse at Shrewsbury Town. Seemingly relishing the freedom of the Trophy, Jarvis netted the only goal in the 1-0 win at Walsall, but the Hatters were held to a surprise 0-0 home draw by Blue Square Premier side Altrincham in the FA Cup. Dagenham & Redbridge were beaten 2-1 at Kenilworth Road in mid-November thanks to goals from Sol Davis and Paul McVeigh, whilst the Cup replay at Altrincham was won on penalties. Consistency continued to elude the Bedfordshire club, though, as a 2-0 defeat at Rochdale was followed by a single goal reverse at home to Brentford and a Cup exit at Southend United.

December suggested a turning point, with an eight match unbeaten run in all competitions. The eagerly awaited home clash with AFC Bournemouth ended 3-3 through an own goal, Gallen and McVeigh, in a game which really needed to be won. However, the 3-1 home win over struggling Barnet, thanks to another own goal, McVeigh and Martin was vital, and an encouraging 0-0 draw was collected at Wycombe before Colchester were ejected from the Trophy, 1-0 at Kenilworth Road, through a Gnapka goal. Morecambe's visit provided a 1-1 draw, in which

Spillane netted, whilst Craddock and Roper were on target in the 2-2 draw at Chesterfield on Boxing Day, by which time Town had reached -4 points. This was reduced to -1 by a 3-2 home win over Lincoln City, brought by a Martin brace, and one from Roper.

Since that win at the end of December, they have not tasted victory, as a two goal lead at Chester provided by Martin and Lewis Emanuel was lost in the 2-2 draw, this was followed by a 5-1 thrashing at Darlington, and a 0-0 draw in the first leg of the Trophy Area Final at Brighton. Hall netted twice, alongside Wasiu in the controversial 3-3 home draw with Bradford City, whilst they failed to hold a lead provided by an own goal in the 1-1 draw at AFC Bournemouth. Suffering back to back 2-1 defeats at home to Bury and at Dagenham looked to have put an end to survival hopes, but then mid-February brought the penalties victory over Brighton in the second leg which secured a Wembley date. Craddock netted in the 1-1 draw.

In the nine league games which have followed, five brought victories, two were draws, with only a pair of losses, trimming the gap with safety to eleven points. The fine run began appropriately with a 3-1 home win over Shrewsbury Town, with Craddock, Parkin and Hall all on target, ahead of a 0-0 draw at Accrington Stanley. February ended with the Hatters now 14 points from safety, as Hall, Gallen and Martin earnt a recovery from a goal down in a 3-1 win at Port Vale, whilst March began with a 0-0 home draw with Gillingham. The momentum slowed following a 2-1 home loss to Exeter City, but the 2-0 success at Notts County meant the margin from safety was reduced to 13 points, with Martin and Craddock scoring, but it widened again with a 2-1 loss at Aldershot Town. Town faced a crucial home game with Grimsby in which defeat would have put a virtual end to hopes of a Football League future, but Bower, and a dramatic late winner from Hall. That was built on by last Saturday's 1-0 home win over Macclesfield in which Craddock converted a penalty.



1. DEAN BRILL Born Luton 02.12.85

Luton-born goalkeeper Dean Brill is another young player of whom big things are expected. Dean won the goalkeeper's jersey when boss Hatters boss Kevin Blackwell took over the managerial reigns at Kenilworth Road and despite the Club being relegated from the Championship, he was named Young Player of the Season. Brill joined his hometown club at the age of nine and has progressed through the Centre of Excellence, representing Luton Schools and Bedfordshire County Schools at a variety of age groups. He kept a clean sheet in his Under-19 debut as a 15year-old in April 2001 and his impressive displays alerted the attention of several bigger clubs, but Luton fought off the competition to secure his signature. A tall, commanding goalkeeper standing at six foot three, Brill is a great organiser whose voice will always be heard throughout a game.

2. CLAUDE GNAKPA Born Marseille 09.06.83

A defender capable of playing centre back or full back, who joined on a free transfer in August 2008. Having plied his trade across Europe with Montpellier HSC, Racing de Santander, Deportivo Alaves and FC Vaduz, Claude moved to Swindon Town for a brief spell, before being taken on in July 2007 by Peterborough United and was a regular in the League 2 promotion winning side, starting 25 league games.

3. SOL DAVIS Born Cheltenham 04.09.79

It was a huge disappointment to Swindon Town, and a coup for Luton, when the highly-rated defender decided to leave the County Ground after his contract expired at the end of the 2001/02 season. Swindon boss Andy King failed in attempts to persuade him to sign a new deal, and Luton swooped for the tough-tackling left back. Davis had joined Swindon as a trainee in the summer of 1998, and made rapid progress through the youth and reserve teams to become a regular in the Nationwide League. Sol scored his first ever goal in professional football during the clubs win over Wrexham in November 2004. He scored again later that season, his only other goal to date, in a win against Bristol City in March 2005. Sol was unfortunately involved in a serious incident during the 2006/07 season when he suffered a stroke on the team bus prior to the Club's visit to Ipswich Town. He was taken into the specialist unit at Addenbrookes Hospital in Cambridge. The squad had been on their way to the Belstead Brook hotel in Ipswich on Saturday when Davis lost feeling in his left side and this was affecting his speech. Sol however made a miraculous recovery and despite being told by doctors it will take months for him to return, he was back in action and started in the game against Cardiff City on New Years Day,



4. KEITH KEANE Born Luton 20.11.86

Having made his debut as a 16-year-old in November 2003, Keith Keane went on to enjoy an extended run in the side from February onwards whilst Kevin Foley was out injured. Such was the contribution he made that the return of Foley didn't signal the end of his involvement at first-team level and he finished the season with fourteen appearances under his belt, all this whilst still in the first year of his scholarship. Another of the youth team who regularly appears for the Republic of Ireland at schoolboy level, he joined the Hatters at the age of nine having been scouted in local football, and has made a rapid progression through the club's centre of excellence and vouth teams. demonstrating enough potential to convince Mike Newell to give him his first taste of senior action. Keith has featured most prominently on the right of midfield, bursting forward to great effect to provide many goals for himself and his team-mates.

5. IAN ROPER

Born Nuneaton 20.06.77

Central defender with bags of experience who signed a contract at Luton in August 2008. Roper climbed up the ranks while at Walsall, gaining a reputation of being a tough, nononsense defender. He made 325 appearances during his 13 year period at the club, where he won promotion on three occasions, most recently in 2006/07 as a League 2 champion.

6. GEORGE PILKINGTON Born Rugeley 07.11.81

Highly experienced defender who joined the club on a free transfer in August 2008. Having began his career as an Everton trainee, Pilkington joined Port Vale in June 2003, after a loan spell at Exeter City. Having started 223 league games for the Valiants, the highly regarded defender was named player of the year twice and club captain.

7. IAN HENDERSON Born Thetford 24.01.85

The Thetford-born striker joined the Hatters at the end of December 2008 following his release from Northampton Town. Also able to play a role on the right side of midfield, Henderson is a product of the Norwich City youth academy where he made the grade to make 79 appearance for the Canaries. After breaking into the first team at Carrow Road he won a First Division championship medal in 2004 and was featuring regularly for the England under-20 side. A serious injury sustained in 2006 kept the striker out of action for eight weeks with ligament damage and after falling down the pecking order at Norwich, Henderson was sent on-loan to Rotherham. At the beginning of the 2007-08 season, Henderson was released by the Canaries and was snapped up by Northampton. During his time at Sixfields, he largely came off the bench, but failed to score in the 33 appearances he made for the Cobblers.

8. KEVIN NICHOLLS Born Newham 02.01.79

Kevin Nicholls needs no introduction to most Hatters fans. The hard-working midfielder enjoyed six successful seasons at Kenilworth Road between 2001 and 2006, captaining the side to the League One title in the 2004-2005

Nicholls began his career at Charlton Athletic, before moving to Wigan Athletic in 1999, where he made 28 appearances in two years. He moved to Luton in 2001, and in the next six seasons went on to appear 175 times, scoring 30 goals.

Following Luton's successful first-season in The Championship and the spirited FA-Cup performances, Nicholls was a player very much in demand. He moved to Leeds United for ?700,000 in July 2006 and was made club captain by then boss Dennis Wise. However, his very public fall-out with Wise saw him fall down the pecking order at Elland Road, and the following summer he moved to Preston North End for a fee of ?750,000. His time at Preston began encouragingly, however a change in the management team saw his first-team opportunities limited. Kevin was delighted to resign for Luton, signing a three-year deal in August 2008 and being named as club captain.

9. SAM PARKIN **Born Roehampton 14.03.81**

Ex-Chelsea trainee Sam Parkin is a forward with a prolific goalscoring record, and choose Kenilworth Road as the place to further his career in August 2006 despite strong interest from other Championship clubs. Unfortunately, Sam's career at Kenilworth Road has yet to get going after a serious injury meant he played only eight games since signing under former boss Mike Newell. After signing for League One side Swindon Town in August 2002, Parkin set the



Football League world alight, scoring 67 league goals in 120 appearances. Naturally, his goalscoring talents captured the attention of the bigger clubs, and Parkin signed for Ipswich Town in the summer of 2005 for £550,000. Unfortunately, a broken ankle forced him to miss much of his time at Portman Road, although he still managed to score five goals in 17 Championship appearances during his first season. Following Joe Royle's departure at the end of last season, the new Blues boss Jim Magilton made it clear that Parkin would not get regular football at Portman Road, leaving the player to weigh up his options. After fees were agreed with both Preston and Luton, 25-yearold Parkin had a straight choice of two Championship clubs, but signed a three-year deal at Kenilworth Road, costing the club £340,000. Coincidentally, Parkin arrives at a club to replace an outgoing Steve Howard for the second time in his career, having previously played for Northampton on-loan after they sold Howard to Luton in 2001.

11. LEWIS EMANUEL Born Bradford 14,10,83

Lewis Emanuel arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2006 after deciding to leave his home town club Bradford City, the place where the defender started his career. Lewis is a pacy full-back but can also play on the left side of midfield, a position where he started on his league debut for the club. Lewis made over 150 appearances for Bradford in six-years at the club, scoring four goals. In his first season at Kenilworth Road he made 40 appearances, scoring twice.

14. ASA HALL Born Sandwell 29.11.86

Versatile player capable of playing in midfield or defence. Hall began his football career in Wolverhampton Wanderers youth system, before signing his first professional contract with Birmingham City in 2004. While at the Blues he was a regular in the reserve team and was named young player of the year in the 2004/05 season. He also received caps for England at Under-19 and Under-20 levels and went on to have loan spells with Boston United, Ashford Town and Shrewsbury Town, starting 13 games for the latter.



Ed Asafu-Adjaye is in his first year as a professional footballer having made significant progress through the Club's youth set-up. The full-back, who spent a short time on-loan at non-league side Walton & Hersham, made the breakthrough into the first team under former boss Mike Newell, when the Club was stretched to the limits through injury and suspension. Although the youngster was an unused sub for three matches, Youth Coach Marvin Johnson gave Ed a glowing reference to incoming boss Kevin Blackwell, who gave him a one-year contract.

16. ROSSI JARVIS Born Fakenham 11.03.88

Adaptable player who can play on the left or right hand side of defence or midfield. Jarvis came through the Norwich City youth system, becoming the youngest player to appear for the reserve team at the tender age of 14. He went on to spend loan periods at Torquay United and Rotherham United and after finding first team opportunities hard to come by Jarvis joined Luton Town in August 2008 on a free transfer.

18. CHRIS MARTIN Born Beccles 04.11.88

Currently on a season-long loan from Norwich City in August 2008, Martin is a young striker who has played 30 times for the Canaries, scoring five times. He burst into the first team in 2007, and his performances quickly saw him become a fans' favourite at the club. Strong for his age and technically gifted, his early promise saw him win call-ups for the England Under-19 squad, scoring on his debut against Turkey in March 2007.

22. MARK BOWER Born Bradford 23.01.80

Bradford-born Mark joined the Hatters from his home-town club on a month's loan in January

The centre-half made his Luton debut against Bournemouth at Dean Court on 27th January, just three days after being on the bench for the Bantams against the Town. Bower made 252 appearances at Valley Parade scoring 13 goals in all competitions after making his debut against Norwich City in 1998. He had two loan spells with York City at a time when Bradford were playing in the Premier League but he eventually returned to fight for a regular first team place.

Mark was named as City captain by caretaker David Weatherall in 2007, but he found it difficult to dislodge Graeme Lee and Matthew Clarke at the heart of the defence at the start of the 2008-09 campaign. Therefore, with injuries and suspensions racking up at Kenilworth Road, the 29-year-old signed a one-month deal with the

20. MICHAEL SPILLANE Born St Helier, Jersey 23.03.89

The Irish youngster joined the club on a seasonlong loan from Norwich City in August 2008, and is equally at home in defence or midfield, having playing in both positions in recent seasons for the Canaries. The Republic of Ireland U19 international is tipped to have a bright footballing future ahead of him.

24. TOM CRADDOCK **Born Darlington 14.10.86**

Originally a defender, Tom developed into a promising forward who has done well at youth and Reserve team levels with Middlesbrough. He was the eighth member of Boro's 2004 FA Youth Cup-winning side to progress to first team level. following James Morrison, Tony McMahon, Andrew Taylor, David Wheater, Matthew Bates, Adam Johnson and Jason Kennedy. He joined the Hatters on-loan from the Riverside in October 2008 and scored twice on his debut in a 2-2 draw with Grimsby Town. Two further goals followed in the games against Bury and Chesterfield and once his loan expired Mick Harford moved quickly to snap up the striker on a permanent basis.

A £80,000 bid was accepted by Middlesbrough and Tom signed a two-and-half year contract in January 2009. He has previously spent spells on loan with Wrexham and Hartlepool United.

32. KEVIN GALLEN Born Hammersmith 21.09.75

Kevin became Paul Ince's first signing in the summer of 2007 when he joined the club from Queens Park Rangers in early July. A Shepherds Bush native, Gallen established himself as something of a legend at Loftus Road. He notched up over 400 appearances and hit 97 goals for the R's in two spells spanning nearly 14 years. Gallen joined Huddersfield 2000 and after 10 goals in 30 starts for the Terriers, Gallen moved across Yorkshire to join Barnsley the following summer, but the call of West London saw him return to QPR within a few months. He scored nine goals in 16 league starts for MK Dons before joining Luton on loan.




A photo appearing on my facebook page and a video on Youtube from my days at Red Rose Radio provided the following idea

Bishop tested Roche with another 25yarder but the Morecambe keeper got down to save.



WAINWRIGHTS DIARY





The Beautiful Game **SHIFTING THE GOALPOSTS (AGAIN?)**

You just get used to one rule change don't you and then there's the prospect of more in our lovely game! Don't FIFA realize how difficult it is explaining the off-side rule for the umpteenth time to a companion you've taken along to the match.

They (the FA) always seem to be 'shifting the goalposts' so to speak with the rules of the game? At the recent AGM meeting of the IFAB (International Football Association Board) various changes to football law were discussed. The proposals on the agenda (with NONE of the these submitted by the English FA) were the use of additional referees, the use of 'sin bins', introducing goal-line technology, extra time substitutions, the length of the half time break and even the colour of the tape around a players

It's nothing new though is it? The rules of football, as with everything else in life, have to evolve in order for progression to take place, especially within the modern day game. However, although you may find it hard to believe, the 17 basic laws of the game have only changed marginally over the last century. The key element of football is seen as essentially a simple game, and as such its laws must be so that they can be applied in a consistent way at all levels of the game, whether it's a Sunday league match or a World Cup Final. As supporters, we generally adapt well to the changes and accept any change guite well. When you think of the modern day game and how we view it, and compare it to that of our older relatives, for such a 'simple' game, there have been so many changes, not necessarily to the rules and laws but to other aspects of the game such as the field of play, the safety and lay-out of stadiums and even the players' kits!

We take so much for granted during the 2-3 hours we spend in the ground scrutinizing the game of football don't we? Take something as simple as the corner flag for example. They're not just there for the strikers to dance around after scoring! We tend to think they've been around from day one? But no, although they've been around for a long time they were only introduced to football so that the officials could deem where the pitch ended. This was a long time before white-lining the pitch was introduced. The corner flags back then were also over twelve feet high!

Take the yellow card as another example [this would be used in conjunction with the 'sin bin' if the Irish FA submission to the IFAB is successful], the yellow (and red) cards were only introduced as late as 1970 for the FIFA World Cup in Mexico. It was English referee Ken Aston who was inspired by the traffic lights in London that suggested the : the kits back then, not even the player names. In idea of the colour coded cards to FIFA. More about the Men In Black? - no. not the movie! I mean the referee. Up until 1891 the ref was only allowed to stand at the side of the pitch along with the 'umpires' who became known as linesmen and who we now know (so fondly) as referees assistants. Up until the turn of the Century, the referees wore black trousers, a blazer and a dickey-bow tie. Can you imagine if that was the case nowadays, don't they get enough stick from us lot as it is! 1891 was also the year that the penalty kick (or 'the kick of death' as it was known back in the day) was introduced to the game. There was no need for them prior to this point in time as it was assumed that 'Gentlemen would never intentionally foul'. - No incidents of diving in the box back then obviously!

So, what of the players 'uniform'? One of the recent submissions to the IFAB (by the Scottish FA) is for players to use the same coloured tape as their socks to hold shin pads in place. Incidentally, the FA current rules state that any undergarment i.e. long sleeved top under the shirt or under shorts under the shorts, must be of the same colour as the shirt or shorts. How often do we see this rule broken? And they now want to dictate the colour of the tape on players' socks?? There's no mention of woolly gloves being part of the players attire either in the FA rules! There were no sponsors splashed all over

fact it wasn't until 1939 that shirt numbers were made compulsory and numbered 1 - 14 too. There was no number 39 or whatever back then. In the very first international football match between Scotland and England back in 1872, players even wore bobble hats or caps as part of their kit. The head dresses were a standard part of the football kit well into the 20th century. suppose heading one of those early footballs would require some form of extra padding on the

Hitting the crossbar was not even a possibility until 1875 as they simply didn't exist. A goal could be scored at any height as long as the ball went between the sticks or posts. A piece of tape was used to 'close' the goal during the early matches before the crossbar replaced it. Talking of goalposts, nets weren't introduced until 1890 and up until 1912 the goalkeeper could handle the ball anywhere within his own half! Since then of course there have been many amendments to the rules. Three points for a win instead of two (1981), the Bosman ruling (1995) and no doubt, there'll be more to come

As God is my witness and football my mistress let's embrace any change and keep this game beautiful - Enjoy!

The project started back in October 2008, Aaron Matthews and myself Sam Hamblett were on the Eric Morecambe bus and as we passed Christie Park Aaron turned to myself and said what a great idea it would be to have a Morecambe FC bus livered in the same way as the Eric Morecambe bus.

I remember turning to Aaron and saying what a fantastic idea it would be. Aaron then set up a group on Facebook called "Morecambe FC deserves its own bus" it all started just as a distant dream the response we got on Facebook was phenomenal we did not think we would get more that 500 members little over a week had passed and we broke 1000 with a current total of 1300. We then decided to have a meeting with the chief executive who was also very impressed with the idea and wanted to see it work he also pledged that the club would help in any way they can.

The next stage was getting more awareness for the project so this got us thinking more and more and we then decided to arrange a signature day at the Morecambe vs Aldershot game. We decided that it would be a great idea to get t-shirts printed for the volunteers so I started seeking someone to sponsor the shirts, thanks to James Fletcher of Jessop's Estate agents in Morecambe who sponsored the t-shirts. We also decided on getting some flyers printed to hand out at the next home game these were sponsored by Jessop's Estate agents and Ma Murphy's Irish Pub also a thank you must go to Baytype who have been fantastic with there support in printing flyers, posters and also raffle tickets. There will also be a raffle, tickets costing a pound with any additional money raised above the required amount being donated to charity. There will be some fantastic prizes up for grabs. After 10 minutes of disastrous defending caused a 3-1 defeat to Macclesfield the previous week Morecambe set about rectifying this at the long trip to Port Vale.

With Poole returning from injury and trialists Craven and Dunne in the starting line it was hoped Morecambe would display freshness, lacking in recent weeks. A bright start saw Morecambe attack from the kick off Poole chasing a Richards through ball but shooting wide. With Craven showing great pace and trickery on the right Morecambe looked a threat.

In a strange first half it was Morecambe who created the better chances but Vale who went in ahead. Sloppy defending allowed a harmless cross from the left drift across the Morecambe box, which allowed a simple tap in at the back post for Andrew Osei-Siribour. Morecambe responded in well and in a goal mouth scramble Poole had a close range effort well saved the follow up by Dodwell was cleared of the line and Dunne miscued from 3 yards when it looked easier to score. But then a sucker punch on the break, a Morecambe corner saw the home side counter with pace and when the ball was fed to James Beeston on the edge of the box he side stepped Clark before slotting home.

The second half started brightly for both sides Bee was called into action twice early on, saving bravely at the feet of Sam Lovatt on both occasions. Poole looked sharp returning from injury and stung the keeper's hands with sharp effort from 18 yards. The game appeared to be drifting into obscurity until the introduction of Barrowclough on 70mins. His energy and enthusiasm was infectious and immediately Barnes released Poole, his effort was parried across goal and Craven forced the ball home from a tight angle 2-1. Morecambe struck again 2 minutes later, Barrowclough won a free kick, and Poole delivered a training ground set-piece for Barnes to nod home from 6 yards.

Not content with a point Morecambe could smell victory and with 5 minutes left the winner came. Barnes again influential on the left, his flick released Preston, whose cross was spectacularly volleyed by Trippet and as it struck the inside of the post Poole was on the spot to head home unmarked.

Morecambe survived one scare late on but were saved by an offside flag to record at one time an unlikely looking victory.

Fans Profile MARTIN SHAW

Today we take time out to speak to Morecambe FC fan Martin Shaw on all things Morecambe....

• What was your first Morecambe game? May 11th 1985. Morecambe Reserves v Everton "A". Morecambe won a thriller 6-4 in front of a crowd of about 20 if that. A couple of memories from the game, firstly an old guy coming around the Main Stand with a collecting bucket asking for donations (admission was free back then) and also the somewhat rickety nothing more than scaffolding steps to get into the Main Stand. Game and day was overshadowed on return home watching World Of Sport and the horrific scenes from Valley Parade, Bradford. My first First Team Game was in January 1986 at home to Bangor City. Won 1-0.

- · What's your earliest Morecambe memory? The above match. Also I well remember watching the Grandstand Vidi Printer one dark evening early in the 1981/82 season when the result came in that Bangor City had whooped Morecambe 9-0 at Christie Park.
- Favourite Morecambe player of all time and why? Got to be lan Cain. Fantastic servant, a bargain buy at just £7,500 from Fleetwood Town. His runs down the wing and spectacular goals were really something special.
- Your current favourite Morecambe player and why? Jim Bentley - for obvious reasons. A true captain, an inspiration to others, and a mighty fine Central Defender. Also, Neil Wainwright. After a slow start and some unjustified criticism from certain guarters Neil has shown over the past few months exactly why Sammy brought him here. My Man Of The Match against Brentford here recently. A fantastic performance and boy did he skin those Bee's! Ran 'em ragged.
- Most memorable Morecambe match?

Probably an away game at Barrow in the 1993/94 season. We were 1-0 down for a while but an injury time header by Ollie Parillon (how high did he climb to reach that ball ??!!!) gave us a fantastic 2-1 win in front of a pretty hostile Barrow support. The 50 of so Shrimps fans had a good journey home down the A590 that night! And also that same season, all the FA Trophy games (v Northwich, Slough, Southport) and of course the Lancashire ATS Trophy Final win at Burnden Park over Southport! Brilliant. Memories of their 'keeper Paul Moore (Morecambe Reject) looking at the Morecambe fans in disgust (and in tears !!) at the end of the game will live long in the memory!

• Where do you watch the games from? From the North Stand mainly with my Son and Nephew. From the paddock though midweek

when neither of the 2 lads can attend with me.

- What's your pre match ritual? Nothing in particular. Arrive about 2.15, into the Club Shop for a programme and browse round, into the North Stand and purchase my pie and gravy!
- · If you had 2 million pounds to spend who would you bring in to the squad? Probably Robbie Savage. One of my favourite players! A midfield maestro! We never really see quality players drop down the leagues nowadays like we used to in years gone by. Will never forget the day Alan Kennedy got onto our team coach in March 1991 on our way to Bishop Auckland !!
- Favourite other ground and why? Non League days it has to be either Barrow (great atmosphere) or perhaps Fleetwood Town. In the League, Deepdale, Preston last season will take some beating! Working as I do with a load of North Enders, the following day was pretty memorable!
- Funniest memory of watching the shrimps home and away? Not particularly funny from my point of view but it did give my fellow travellers and even the home fans a laugh. Away at Colne Barleymows in January 1990, Cainy, I think it was (could even have been Stuart Connerton) had a shot which hit the side netting. We were 0-1 down at the time and everyone inside Holt House knew it had hit the side netting. Apart from me. I celebrated a goal. Like a nob. Also, away at Hyde once I remember Kipps going to retrieve a stray ball, walking up to their keeper to give it back to him holding it out in his hard. Their 'keeper said "thanks mate", at which point Kipps threw the ball over his head and on their plastic pitch it bounced and bounced and bounced ... nearly back to the Half Way Line !!! And we had a game on their pitch us Shrimps fans at half time! In

fact, a lot happened at Hyde. Who remembers Gilly plane watching ???!!

- Favourite shrimps goal of all time? A couple of contenders, both from the Non League days. Firstly, a fantastic solo goal from Marvin Ali in March 1990 in a Lancashire ATS Challenge Trophy game at home to Blackpool Mechanics. Also, some years earlier, a flying header from Tibor Szabo at Christie in March 1986 as we beat Champions Elect Gateshead, 2-0. Also, in 1988/89 I can recall a 5-2 home win over Gainsborough. Our future manager, Billy Wright, scored with a diving header which literally knocked him out cold with its force !
- If you could invite 4 past or present shrimps players around the dinner table who would they be and why? Barrie Stimpson (for the Geordie humour), Jim Harvey (to thank him). Ian Cain (for nothing more than him being a legend) and Ben Lavelle (another great servant and a gentleman). In fact, I'm inviting 6. John Coleman too. What needs to be said about Coley? Legend. Stewart Drummond too is also a true Shrimps Legend.
- What's the greatest length you have gone to in order to see the shrimps play a match? Doing sickies from work twice a few years (few ???!!!) to enable me to attend. Firstly, going home "ill" from work at Lancaster Uni to enable me to catch the Team Coach on its way to Gateshead for an NPL Cup Semi Final tie at Gateshead (we lost 1-3) and secondly in the 1991/92 season, again I pulled a sickie to enable me to attend the Hull City home game.
- Name your all time shrimps X1 in 4 4 2 formation? Peter McDonnell, Graham Jones. Keith Kennedy, Steve Brooks, Kenny Gordon, Dave Woodburn, Jimmy Thornton, Peter Sayer, Keith Galley, Graham Gill, Vaughan Williams!!!! Pretty much the static line up for the duration of the 1985/86 season when I started watching week in week out!!

MALCOLM MACDONALD

Ace marksman Malcolm Macdonald was capped

Striker Steve Howard topped Luton Town's goalscoring charts in five successive seasons. campaign, joining Luton for £50,000 in March 2001. A key figure as the Hatters won promotion in 2001-02, then the League One title in 2004-05, he scored 95 goals in 212 League outings before being sold to Derby Leicester City for £1,500,000 in January 2008.

What is the ground like?

The stadium which was opened in 2003, is impressive looking and is of a good size. It is completely enclosed with all the corners filled with seating. All the stands are single tiered and of an equal height. There is a perspex strip that runs around the stadium, beneath the roof, to allow more light to reach the pitch. The stands look virtually identical apart from the South Stand, which has a row of executive boxes running across the back of it. In the South East corner of the stadium is a Police Control Box, whilst in the North East corner, there is a large video screen.

What is it like for visiting fans?

Away fans are housed in East Stand at one end of the stadium, where around 3,000 supporters can be accommodated. 'It's a nice stadium and there seems to be plenty of parking (although I heard several grumbles about the £5 charge!). The usual food and drink are on offer inside from well run & well staffed outlets and the view from the away end is very good. I hardly noticed the stewards (which is good), but the atmosphere was a little subdued on my visit. No surprise really with just over 3,600 fans sitting in a stadium that

can seat over 20,000'. Although I'm not that tall at six foot, I found the leg room to be one of the tightest that I have come across at a new stadium. I was so uncomfortable that I seriously thought about leaving before the end'.

Although the stadium is conservative in its design and shows little character, the acoustics inside are very good as well as the facilities on offer. It also has the best display of pies that I have ever come across at a football ground. Like going into your local bakers, glass cabinets display the rows of different hot pies that are available. These included pork pies (served hot), minced beef & onion and steak and kidney all at £1.30 each. plus as Tim Porter informs me they also now offer 'a steak and gravy pie with mushy peas and mint sauce for £2'. This 'Aladdin's Cave' of pies certainly had the desired effect on myself and my colleagues as we promptly ate a pie before the game started and another (or two) at half time (it did help our appetite though, that it was bitterly cold day!). However the downside was that teas and coffees were only available from a vending machine (which also had soup, crisps & chocolate), which meant queuing for a second time. The atmosphere was boosted somewhat by the presence of a drummer in the home end.

Pre match drink

The stadium is located on the outskirts of Darlington and there are not that many pubs in the vicinity. There is the Copper Beech Pub on Neasham Road, a ten minute walk towards the town centre. Otherwise there is the Tawny Owl Pub, a Vintage Inn which is about a guarter of a mile the other side of the A66 roundabout. This though is more of a restaurant than pub, but decent enough for lunch'.

It may therefore be an idea to drink in the town centre, where there are plenty of pubs to be found. For the real ale buffs there is the Number Twenty 2, in Coniscliffe Road. A large spacious pub, that offers food as well as a good range of beers. Mick Hubbard a visiting Aston Villa fans adds; 'We ducked down a little side street called Mechanic's Yard (which is opposite the indoor market, near the big train sculpture) and discovered a gem of a pub called the 'Quaker House'. The small bar was an Aladdin's Cave of real ales, having ten on tap. It was a fantastic place and also has a separate cafe upstairs'. There is also a Wetherspoons outlet situated on Skinnersgate.

At the stadium itself there are two bars: one called 'Bar 66' and the other called the 'Corner Bar'. Both admit away fans, however as you would expect they get very crowded. Otherwise alcohol is available on the concourses inside the stadium in the form of Fosters Lager & John Smiths Bitter.

There is a fair sized car park at the stadium which



costs £5 per car. Although the stewards do their best to let the cars get away guickly at the end of the game, it is almost and impossible task, with supporters also walking through car parks to leave the area, so expect some delay. If you continue on past the stadium towards Darlington, then there is some street parking to be found. although this can be guite a walk from the stadium as there is a residents only parking scheme in operation on matchdays in the streets nearest to the ground.



Whatever you think of Stanley's ground it


