





BILLY WALIGH

News of the death, at the age of 87, of former Hatters favourite Billy Waugh reached Kenilworth Road last week.

Bom in Edinburgh, Billy had his mind set on joining his boyhood favourites Hearts but the advent of war and his subsequent call-up to the RAF put a stop to that.

Billy was stationed in Bicester during the war and his father wrote to Luton alerting them to the promising player on their doorstep and as a result he was invited for successful trials at Kenilworth Road in 1944.

This was the start of six years of virtually unbroken service for the Hatters with Billy becoming the first Luton player to crack 100 League appearances after the war. A superfast winger, Billy earned the nickname 'rabbit' as he tore through defences and set up many goals for the likes of Hugh Billington.

Subsequent spells with QPR and Bournemouth were followed by stints with several non-League clubs and then 30 years as general secretary of the Electrolux Sports and Social Club.

Billy was a welcome guest of the club in 2005 for the Kenilworth Road Centenary celebrations and regaled the audience with his tales of Kenilworth Road in the early post-war years.

Luton have won eight times, whilst Rotherham have won twice, there has also been two draws. The Hatters have scored 25 goals and conceded 14.

Just one player has moved from Luton to Rotherham, and that was Peter Holmes in the summer of 2007. Holmes made 127 appearances for Luton, and scored 12 goals after signing from Sheffield Wednesday in August 2000.

Holmes has made only a few appearances for Rotherham this season, and has been on-loan to York City, his only goal of the season came for the Conference side at Stevenage in a 3-3 draw.

23,565 The biggest attendance for this fixture saw Jack Taylor score in a 1-1 draw, in the first meeting between the sides, in November 1951.

Gordon Turner scored in three consecutive League matches against Rotherham at Kenilworth Road! He scored both goals in a 2-1 win in August 1952, and then scored again in the 1-1 draw in Janaury 1954. The following season he netted twice again, as the Hatters won 4-0 in February 1955. John Groves also scored, whilst Williams of Rotherham netted an own goal.

As well as Turner, two other players have scored a brace in this fixture. Jack Lornie's two goals in August 1962 were in vain as the visitors netted three in their first

victory at Kenilworth Road. Six years later and Bruce Rioch repeated the feat, scoring twice in the first fifteen minutes of the match. Rotherham pulled a goal back before Brian Lewis restored the two goal advantage before half time, and 3-1 was how it finished.

7 The most goals in this fixture saw Luton come away 4-3 winners in Decemeber 1961. Alec Ashworth, Tommy McKechnie, Harry Walden, and Alwyn McGuffie were the scorers for the Hatters.

1981 In Luton's Division Two Championship winning season of 1981/82 Rotherham were beaten 3-1 in November 1981. Steve White opened the scoring before ex-Hatter Rodney Fern equalised. Two goals in as many minutes, from Mal Donaghy and Brian Stein, wrapped up the points for Luton.

The number of seasons that have past since Rotherham were last visitors to Kenilworth Road. In April 2001 Chris Sedgwick scored the only goal of the game in the second half to give Rotherham only their second League victory at Kenilworth.

This match also had the lowest attendance for this fixture, just 4854.

WELCOME TO THIS EVENING'S VISITORS

Of the three sides that were deducted points at the beginning of the campaign, Rotherham quickly and decisively pulled away from the relegation zone following a flying start to the season.

The Millers currently lie in 15th place with 45 points but tonight's visitors would sit in sixth place in League 2 if you add the 17 points they were docked. Tonight's fixture for Rotherham is their first away from home in five matches after four consecutive home matches. In those the Millers won one, lost one and have drawn two. Their last two fixtures were both drawn – against Accrington and Bury with the win coming over Chesterfield and defeat coming against Aldershot.

However, the South Yorkshire outfit are unbeaten in their previous four away games including three victories over Rochdale, Chester and Lincoln.

PREVIOUS MEETINGS:

Luton wins: 13 Rotherham wins: 9 Draws: 8

Despite holding a slender head-to-head advantage over Rotherham, Luton have failed to record a win the last three matches with the Millers. The Hatters last tasted victory over today's opponents in April 1997 when Tony Thorpe notched a hat-trick in a 3-o success at Millmoor. Rotherham won on their last visit to Kenilworth Road which was their third success on Bedfordshire soil, having won 2-o in a League Cup tie in 1983 and 3-2 in a Division Two match in 1962.

LAST FIVE SEASONS IN FOCUS:


Rotherham's fortunes on and off the pitch over the last five seasons almost mirror that of the Hatters.

After finishing in 17th place in the Championship in 2004 the Millers have endured two relegations and docked a total of 37 points - 17 of which were deducted at the beginning of this season.

Following a rock-bottom finish in the Championship in 2005, Rotherham just survived in League 1 the following season finishing two points clear of relegated Hartlepool and MK Dons.

However, after being deducted 10 points after applying for a CVA to save the club from liquidation in the 2006/07, the Millers were relegated to League 2 ending up 13 points from safety.

Rotherham's financial troubles continued in the following campaign but, after entering administration again and being docked another 10 points, they ended up finishing in a creditable ninth place, 14 points shy of the Play -Offs.



LAST TIME AT KENILWORTH ROAD:

There were contrasting fortunes for both sets of supporters on a rain-soaked evening at Kenilworth in April 2001.

A goal 14 minutes from time from Chris Sedgwick was enough to give the Millers all three points in a game that also saw Joe Kinnear banished to the stands.

The result meant the Hatters were relegated to Division Three while the win for the visitors helped them on their way to securing promotion to Division One eventually finishing two points behind champions Millwall.

Mark Robins, who is now in charge of the Millers played up front that day, alongside Ritchie Barker, who is back at the club for a second spell.

The Manager: Mark Robins

Fans' favourite Mark Robins took the managerial reins in March 2007 and has made a successful start to his coaching career.

He is well known to Millers supporters from his playing days when he became a club legend scoring 49 league and cup goals in three-and-a-half year spell before returning to the club firstly as youth team coach.


As a player, Robins began his career at Manchester United and will best be remembered for scoring the winning goal in an FA Cup tie against Nottingham Forest which allegedly saved Sir Alex Ferguson his job.

He went on to play for Norwich, Leicester, Ourense, Panionios, Walsall and Shefffield Wednesday. Since taking over the manager's post with the Millers, Robins guided his team to the brink of promotion last season but a points deduction ended any hopes of an instant return to League One.

This season the club has been hit with another points deduction but a positive start has seen the Millers wipe out the minus 17 points and progress through to the Fourth Round of the Carling Cup resulting in Robins being rewarded for the club's progress with a new four year contract.

GOALKEEPERS DAVID STOCKDALF



ANDY WARRINGTON

Andy made the move from Bury to the Millers in May 2007 and in his first season with Rotherham he proved to be a very reliable last line of defence. He played in every single league game of the 2007/08 campaign and his consistent performances made him a huge hit with the Millers fans. Andy is a very experienced 'keeper who boasts a professional career dating back to 1994.

DEFENDERS IAN SHARPS

lan is a tall powerful central defender who has been a mainstay of the Millers defence for the last two seasons. He joined the club from Tranmere Rovers in August 2006 and was made captain in his first season, going on to make 38 league appearances. Ian was one of few survivors of the 2006/o7 team that was relegated to League Two, and last season he showed why he was kept on with several solid and consistent performances.


MARC IOSEPH

Marc is a very experienced and versatile defender who can operate anywhere across the backline. He signed for the Millers in July 2007 and slotted comfortably into the right back position, making his debut last season in the League Cup defeat to Sheffield Wednesday. Later in the campaign Marc was forced to operate as a left back and in the centre of defence, but this change of position did nothing to alter his excellent performances. He capped a good first season with a stunning volley in the 3-2 victory over Lincoln City and in total made 36 league

Star Man: Reuben Reid

Reuben has made a fantastic start to his Millers career which included a debut goal in the home game against Lincoln. The 20-year-old turned his back on a career as a cricketer with Gloucestershire, having played for their second XI.

He signed after being released by Plymouth Argyle in the close season and brings experience at this level after a series of loan spells with the likes of Rochdale and Wycombe.

appearances. Marc started his career with Cambridge United and has also played for Peterborough United, Hull City and Blackpool.

PABLO MILLS

Pablo initially joined Rotherham as a central defender but played the majority of last season in central midfield, with great success. He started his career at Derby County and made over 50 appearances in four years at Pride Park. After loan spells at MK Dons and Walsall. he signed for the Millers in July 2006 and was a regular in his first full season with the club. At the start of the 2007/2008 season he was loaned out to Crawley Town but returned to play a vital role in the Millers' season.

IAMIF GREEN

Jamie broke into the Millers' first team at the end of the 2007/08 season making some impressive displays at left back. He is another product of the Rotherham United youth set-up and he looks to have a very bright future with the Millers. He made nine league appearances last season and scored his first senior goal

on the last game of the 2007/08 season in the 1-0 win over Barnet.

MARK LYNCH

Mark signed for the Millers in May 2008 after his release by Yeovil Town. The full back began his career as a trainee at Manchester United but failed to make the grade at Old Trafford and moved to Sunderland in 2004, after a loan spell at St. Johnstone. Mark struggled to break into the first team at Sunderland and moved to Hull City after just one season, but after just 15 league appearances for the Tigers, he joined Yeovil in 2006.

ANDY NICHOLAS

Mark Robins moved to sign Andy after a spell without a club following his release from Swindon Town, Andy has settled straight into the side making a number a solid displays and his long throws have become a vital weapon in the Millers attacking armoury. The left back started as a trainee with Liverpool but left in 2003 for regular first team football with Swindon where he made over 125 appearances in a five year spell.





MIDFIELDERS DALE TONGE

Since making his league debut for Bamsley in the 2003/04 season, Dale found it hard to break into the Oakwell first team on a regular basis, and took the opportunity to sign for Rotherham in May 2007. In his first full season at Millmoor Dale became a first team regular making 31 starts at either full back or in a more advanced midfield

DANNY HARRISON

Danny signed from Tranmere in May 2007 after making over 100 appearances for Rovers and made an instant impact at the heart of the Millers midfield. He scored his first Millers goal in a League Cup tie against Sheffield Wednesday and also netted a brace in the away victory at Dagenham and Redbridge. Danny started 44 league games for the 2007/08 campaign falling just short of being ever present.

MARK HUDSON

Mark is an athletic central midfielder who has impressed with his all action displays and his eye for a goal. He joined the club in June 2007 after leaving

Huddersfield Town but had to sit out the opening of the 2007/08 season through injury. Once fit Mark made an immediate impact and went on to play over 30 games, scoring an impressive nine league goals. After starting out as a trainee at Middlesbrough Mark has also represented Chesterfield Huddersfield Town.

MICHAEL CLIMMINS

The experienced former Port Vale and Darlington midfielder signed for the Millers in May 2008, after two years playing at Darlington. He began his career at Middlesbrough but made just two senior appearances for Boro. He left the Riverside to find regular first team football and signed for Port Vale on a free in March 2000. Michael made over 250 appearances for Vale in six years before joining Darlington in May 2006.

STRIKERS

MARK BURCHILL

DREWE BROUGHTON

Mark has joined the Millers for a second spell on a free transfer after ending his contract with Scottish second division outfit Dunfermline Athletic. The former Scotland international striker had his first spell with the Millers in 2004 when onloan from Portsmouth, and scored once

in three appearances before re-joining Pompey. Mark started his career in Scotland with Glasgow Celtic, and in just over four years he scored 24 goals in all competitions.

RICHIE BARKER

Back with the Millers for a second spell after joining initially on a three month loan from Hartlepool United, he made the move permanent when the transfer window reopened in January. 
IAMIE CLARKE



The 27-year-old was just as mystified as the Hatters' opponents with regards to the penalty decision, but explained how his team-mates worked tirelessly to break down Keith Alexander's side and deserved their good fortune on the afternoon:




and had a long journey.

Following a marvellous 3-1 win at Norwich on 28th December 1981 the Town were so far ahead at the top of the old Division Two that a return to the top flight seemed a nailed on certainty.

With a gap of eleven points over the fourth placed side, plus a game in hand, the Hatters were romping towards the title with an exquisite brand of fast, smooth and freeflowing football and it seemed impossible for any team to catch them up.

The players had not, however, made allowances for the weather and with only two League games played in January other teams began to catch

up. Also, whereas earlier in the season the Town had been winning away with ease, those victories on their travels turned to draws after Christmas.

Although only one loss was suffered during the period between Christmas and Easter, a 4-3 defeat at Barnsley, it seemed like a disaster at the time with seven away draws giving the chasing pack a chance and for a short period our friends from Watford actually knocked us off top spot.

Normal order was soon resumed, though, as the games in hand were won and in a vital week a tough Blackburn side were seen off, as was a Norwich outfit coming up fast on the rails and when Newcastle attempted to protect a 2-o lead at Kenilworth Road only to be beaten by a Brian Stein hat-trick everyone started to relax once more.

Next up were previous season's Division Three champions Rotherham who were hoping to make it back to back promotions. After a faltering start to the 1981/82 campaign the Millers had suddenly gone into overdrive at the beginning of February and had won 12 of the next 17 games including a run of nine victories in a row.

This run of form had obviously lifted them up the table and they were now up to fifth spot with the third automatic place, held by Sheffield Wednesday, firmly within their sights.

THE GAME

Rotherham United 2 Luton Town 2 24th April 1982

The game was seen as a potential clash of styles with the Miller's hustle and exuberance, typified by player-manager Emlyn Hughes, against the thoughtful, more composed, game of the Town.

Sadly, the Town were to be without giant goalkeeper Jake Findlay, injured during the previous outing at home to Chelsea, and in his place stepped 21 year old Alan ludge making only his fourth start of the campaign.

The match started in frenetic fashion with ex-Hatter John Seasman heading over from three yards while at the other end mercurial winger David Moss, back in the Luton side after injury, went on a dazzling run through the Millers defence but was forced wide before he could pull back the trigger.

Gradually, the Town began to dominate and took the lead in the



12th minute through Lil Fuccillo who took advantage of a clever through pass from full-back Kirk Stephens and calmly stroked the ball home. Stung by this, Rotherham moved onto the offensive and with tricky winger Tony Towner causing problems on both flanks they penned the Town back. It therefore came as no real surprise when they levelled on 28 minutes with Ronnie Moore heading home another Towner cross.

With the Town's Brian Horton and the Miller's combative Gerry Gow cancelling each other out in midfield the game seemed to be heading towards a stalemate but in the 64th minute Moore headed down a Towner centre into the path of Seasman who atoned for his

earlier error by slamming the ball into the net.

A minute later full back Richard Money, a March purchase from Liverpool to replace the unfortunate Mark Aizlewood, took a Brian Stein pass in his stride and hit home a scorcher from 25 yards. "The ball sat up nicely for me," said the defender afterwards.

The game continued at a rapid pace with both goalkeepers called to make smart saves but with 90 minutes gone the sides appeared to have settled for a draw.

Deep into stoppage time Rotherham's Billy McEwan tried to send the ball goalwards but it hit Hatter's central defender Clive handball and signalled for a penalty which was awarded by the referee after consultation.

All the arguments and protests were made superfluous a few seconds later when Judge smothered Gow's spot kick and with it virtually assured promotion.

Shrewsbury Town's Grant Holt has been awarded the League 2 Player of the Year award after excelling in his first season at the Prostar Stadium.





What's the ground like?

On one side of Sincil Bank is the large allseater Co-Op Community Stand, This large single tiered covered stand opened in 1995 and has a capacity of 5,700. Opposite is the Lincolnshire Echo Stand. a small old looking covered stand. It is seated, but only runs half the length of the pitch, straddling the half way line. One gap has now been partly filled by a tiny covered Family Stand. Both ends are small covered affairs. The Imps Stand is all seated and has a row of executive boxes running across the back. The other end is the Stacey West, an all-seated, covered stand, for home supporters. It was named in memory of the two Lincoln supporters who lost their lives in the Bradford City Fire at Valley Parade in

What's it like for away supporters?

Hatters fans have been allocated part of the Co-Op Community Stand on one side of the pitch. The normal allocation for away fans is 1,900 and this stand is

divided between home and away supporters. The facilities and view of the pitch are good. There is a good atmosphere at the ground, with plenty of noise being created by the local band in the Co-Op Stand.

Food and drink

There is a great range of food available, including the pies, burgers, Lincolnshire sausage and bacon rolls.

For a pre-match drink away supporters are admitted in the Supporters' Club bar - Centre Spot - located behind the South Park Stand. There are plenty of good pubs to be found if you head along the High Street towards the town centre. Including the Golden Eagle on the High Street, which is listed in the CAMRA Good Beer Guide. There is also The Ritz and the Anchor on the High Street, both almost next door to each other.

How to get there by car:

Lincoln is not the easiest place to get to,

as it is not situated next to a motorway. However, the ground is now well signposted around Lincoln. Follow the A46 into Lincoln (which leads onto the High Street) and the ground is indicated from there. If you follow the signs for 'away coaches' then this leads you onto the A158 South Park Avenue, where there is plenty of street parking to be found (although it is a 10 minute walk around to the ground). Otherwise the signs lead you to the ground.

Car parking:

If you arrive early then you can park behind the Stacey West Stand otherwise. the other option is street parking.

Luton's last visit:

The Hatters will be making their first visit to Sincil Bank in seven years after they last left Lincolnshire with all three points in February 2002 Joe Kinnear's side only needed a solitary strike from Matthew Taylor three minutes before half time to seal the points. The Town have won three and drawn one of their four previous visits to Lincoln.

Travel details:

Both the Bobbers Travel Club and the Luton Town Supporters Club are running coaches to Lincoln. The Bobbers leave Cranfield at 9.30am with pick-up points along the way before a 10.30am departure from Kenilworth Road. The fare is £17 for adults and £14 for juniors and seniors. For bookings telephone o1234 856542.

LTSC leave the Maple Road car park at 10am stopping at Newport Pagnell service station 30 minutes later. The fare is £17 for adults and £15 for concessions. Under 7's can travel free when accompanied by a full paying adult. For bookings telephone 07960 567465.

By the time the Hatters next walk out at Kenilworth Road against Chesterfield on Easter Monday, the team could have been crowned the 2008/09 Johnstone's Paint Trophy winners.

However, even if the Town emerge victorious at Wembley, celebrations will be short-lived as the focus shifts back to League 2 survival in the Town's third to last home game of the season.

While the Hatters are battling for their lives the Spireites are looking to make a late surge on the Play-Off places and they move into the penultimate month of the campaign in a rich vein of form. A seven match unbeaten streak from mid-february to the middle of March moved the team from Saltergate into the top half of the table.

Manager Lee Richardson has seen his side enjoy several emphatic victories this season. A 5-1 home win against Aldershot Town in October was followed up six days later with an even more impressive 6-1 demolition over promotion chasing Exeter, and this led to Richardson being nominated for the October League 2 Manager of the Month award.

And it's been away from home where the Spireites have enjoyed the majority of their success this season. A 1-o win over Brentford a fortnight ago was the Bees first defeat in 10 matches, and Chesterfield could have made it a double-salvo over the clubs bidding for promotion had Jon-Paul Pittman not struck a leveller in the final minute for Wycombe 10 days earlier.

The Hatters know all about late equalisers against the Saltergate side, though. Ian Roper's dramatic header — a full six minutes into stoppage time —





rescued the Town an unlikely point in Boxing Day's 2-2 draw.

On the scoresheet for Richardson's side that day was Jamie Ward, who remains the Spireites second top scorer despite being sold to Sheffield United in the January transfer window.

The one man above him in the club's top scorer chart is 33-year-old Jack Lester. The striker has been prolific since his move from Nottingham Forest two years ago, and has 17 goals in all competition

to his name this season at the time of writing.

Scottish striker Martin Gritton was brought in from Macclesfield Town to replace Ward and the 30-year-old seems to finally be finding his feet at the club, scoring twice earlier this month, one of which was the winning goal against table toppers Brentford. The Hatters have faced Chesterfield 37 times in total and have won on 16 occasions. The Spireites have 11 wins to their name and 10 matches have ended all square.
