

I have seen our beloved football club play at Wembley five times now and I have to say that, for me, because of the context, Sunday 5th April 2009 was our finest hour.

Last Sunday's victory in the final of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy was a brilliant day.

Playing at Wembley is what dreams are made of and being captain and leading the team out was an immensely proud moment for me and for my family.

But winning the game was the icing on the cake and lifting the cup was an amazing feeling. I thought my team-mates were brilliant. It was a massive performance and a massive achievement. I have always said we're a team, there are no individuals. Considering what we've been through this season I thought we thoroughly deserved to win the cup and tournament. It's been a fantastic run and the lads fully merited their winners' medals. The fact Scunthorpe are a good side and riding high in League 1 and will probably be back at Wembley in the Play-Offs goes to show what a good result it was.

We went into the game knowing it was going to be tough and they started the better of the two sides and looked lively early on. However, after they took the lead we showed the character and courage to comeback and our equaliser was a result of a brilliant cross-field pass by Rossi Jarvis and the ball into Chris Martin from Tom Craddock was inch-perfect. What a feeling it must have been for Chris to grab the equaliser and from that point we were back in the game. Then we took the lead when further patient play resulted in Tom's goal. He took the goal really well, showing great touch and technique. To be two minutes away from lifting the cup only to see Scunthorpe equalise was galling but going into extra-time I knew the lads were strong enough to come through it.

I've been saying all season that we're in this together and the spirit and belief we have in the squad is fantastic. Claude Gnakpa realised his dream of playing and scoring at Wembley in what turned out to be the winner and I still don't think it has sunk in yet. Maybe it will at the end of the season or when we watch the DVD but I can tell you it was an unbelievable feeling.

When Claude was put through he probably wasn't favourite to reach the ball first ahead of their left-back but he had just come on and those fresh legs of his proved to be the difference. I was delighted for you, the fans, too, because you have had three relegation battles to content with in the last three seasons but it shows how much the players care to win a trophy considering what we've all had to put up with in the league this season. No disrespect to Scunthorpe but nobody remembers the losers in a final. No-one remembers the Luton team of 1989, they remember the team of '88. And now they can remember the team of 2000. I must admit I am

not usually the kind of captain that issues a full-blown rallying cry on the pitch, but with five minutes to go I said to the lads 'we're five minutes away from going down in history'.

Thankfully, we got over the finishing line and when the final whistle was blown it was a phenomenal feeling. I must take my hat off to Mick. He played at Wembley for Luton and England but he had never led a team out before as a manager. You can see at the end of the game how much it meant to him.


It's a massive achievement for Mick which is something he can now proudly put on his CV. Everyone could see what it meant for him to be leading the club he loves so much. I'd also like to praise Kevin Watson and Alan Neilson for the work they have both done since coming in to assist Mick; Dmitri Kharine has been fantastic; Harry Scott-Stackman, our physio, has had a tough season dealing with all the injuries we've had and Stuart Bannister, our kit man, has probably worked as hard as myone.

Then there are all the people behind the scenes at the club who deserve an awful lot of credit for their hard work into the run up to the final. I hope you all enjoyed your day on Sunday. Finally I would like to congratulate my team-mates. If we went to Wembley without the kind of team spirit we would have never won the cup.

Today we're back into league action and due to printing deadlines I write these notes prior to our match at Lincoln on Saturday. Easter is always an important time of the season and it gives us the chance to take six points in the space of three days. We need to put the euphoria of winning the cup final to bed for a while as we need to concentrate on our bid to stay in the Football League. Make no mistake, we will need to be at our best, but we are we are more than capable of winning both games so we can keep going right until the end of the season.

On behalf of all the lads thank you for your unbelievable support at Wembley and get behind us again this afternoon.

Saturday 31st March



The Hatters' three match winning run came to an end following a 4-2 defeat to Rotherham United at Kenilworth Road.

Rotherham raced into a two-goal lead thanks to goals from Rueben Reid and Drewe Broughton before a Chris Martin header brought the Town back into contention before half time.

However, the Millers added a third to restore their two-goal cushion before Asa Hall again reduced arrears but the visitors clinched victory with a killer fourth goal three minutes from the end.

Sunday 5th April

The Town came from behind to lift the Johnstone's Paint Trophy following a thrilling 3-2 victory over Scunthorpe United at Wembley in front of 40,000 Luton supporters.

Gary Hooper put the Iron ahead inside 20 minutes but the Hatters came storming back to take the lead following goals

from Chris Martin and Tom Craddock.

Two minutes remained when Grant McCann broke the Hatters hearts by netting a superb equaliser for Scunthorpe but five minutes into extra time substitute Claude Gnakpa ran on to Keith Keane's pass to net the winner and seal the Town's first major trophy success in 21 years.

Tuesday 7th April

It was back to reality with a bump for players and staff as the Hatters reserves hosted lpswich in the totesport.com Combination at Kenilworth Road.

lan Roper put Ipswich ahead heading into his own net but after the visitors were reduced to 10 men and the Town came roaring back to score four second half goals to earn all three points.

Saturday 11th April

The Hatters were back in League 2 action at Lincoln City.

DIARY

Saturday 18th April

Luton make their first visit to Underhill for a competitive match when they take on Barnet in a crucial League 2 encounter. Kick-off 3pm.

Meanwhile the Under 18's entertain their counterparts from Dagenham and Redbridge in the Puma Youth Alliance. Kick off 11am.

Monday 20th April

The Town reserves are back in action once more when they travel to Southend United in the totesport.com Combination. Kick off 2pm.

Tuesday 21st April

Promotion-chasing Wycombe Wanderers visit Kenilworth Road for a League 2 game in which both

sides will be chasing the points for very different reasons. The Chairboys have only ever beaten the Hatters once in 16 meetings. Kick off 7.45pm

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18 The number of previous League meetings played at Luton. The Hatters have won eleven and lost three while four have ended all square, scoring 29 goals and conceding 13.

The only of these games not to be played at Kenilworth Road was back on Boxing Day 1899 when the visitors won 3-o. This was one of only two encounters where Chesterfield have kept a clean sheet. The other was in September 1996, when they won 1-o courtesy of a penalty from Tom Curtis after Marvin Johnson handled in the area.

The number of draws, and they have all ended 1-1! The first came in 1937/38, followed by 1946/47, and 1949/50. The most recent was on Boxing Day 1999 when Adam Locke opened the scoring in the first half, only for David Reeves to net an equaliser after the break.

The biggest margin of victory and also the most goals scored by Luton in this fixture. Hugh Billington netted four in December 1938 as the Hatters won 5-o. George Stephenson netted the other Luton goal.

The largest crowd for this fixture who saw Mel Daniel net twice in a 2-1 win in November 1947. Daniel had also scored in the 1-1 draw nine months earlier.

Luton have scored exactly three goals four times against Chesterfield. The first was a 3-0 win in March 1951, and this was followed by a 3-2 victory in December 1966. In April 1998 Chesterfield's Mark Williams opened the scoring, unfortunately it was into his



own net! Rory Allen and David Oldfield added further goals after the break to seal the points for Luton. The 3-o scoreline was repeated for the third time in August 2002. Russ Perrett opened the scoring, before there were further goals from Steve Howard and Dean Crowe.

4,287 The lowest crowd at Kenilworth Road for the visit of Chesterfield, in April 1999 when a

solitary Tony Thorpe goal was enough for all of the points.

Chesterfield have failed to score in their last three visits to Luton, since the 3-0 win in 2002/03 the Hatters have won the last two meetings 1-0. Steve Howard scored the only goal in November 2003 and Rowan Vine netted in September 2004, his first goal at Kenilworth Road.

Going into Easter weekend Chesterfield found themselves in eighth position in the League 2 table, level on points with Shrewsbury in seventh who occupy the final Play-Off place. After 0-0 draw with Darlingon on 28th December the Spireites were in 13th place, seven points off the League 2 play-off positions.

But since the turn of the year the Spireites have been one of the division's form sides having won nine and losing just three of their 18 fixtures since 2009 began, shooting them towards a tilt at the end of season lottery. The Saltergate faithful have seen their side claim some fantastic results, none more so than earning a 1-0 win at table-topping Brentford on 17th March. They hosted Darlington on Saturday and barring defeat, they will arrive today at Kenilworth Road on a six match unbeaten run.

PREVIOUS MEETINGS

Luton wins: 16 Chesterfield wins: 11 Draws: 10


In the 37 meetings the two sides have contested since the first back in 1899, the Hatters hold the upper hand with 16 victories Eleven of these wins have come at Kenilworth Road with the Hatters victorious in the last three meetings played in Bedfordshire. The Spireites have won three times from previous visits to Kenilworth Road. The first came in a 3-0 win during the clubs' first meeting and their last was a 1-0 success in September 1996. Chesterfield's last victory over the Town was on the final day of the 2002/03 season when the Spireites came from a goal down to record a 2-1 victory which ensured they avoided relegation to Division 3.

LAST FIVE SEASONS IN FOCUS:

This season is the Spireites second in League 2 following their relegation from League 1 in 2006/07 when they finished four points from safety.

Last season the North Derbyshire outfit finished one place outside the League 2 play-off positions, missing out by nine points on the end-of-season lottery.

Before the Spireites' relegation in 2007 they had survived three seasons in League 1 with 16th and 17th finishes in 2005 and 2006 respectively before surviving by one point in 2004 after beating the Hatters on the final day of the season, sending Grimsby Town to League 2 at their expense.



LAST TIME AT KENILWORTH ROAD:

Luton Town 1-0 Chesterfield 11th September 2004

The Hatters were on an unbeaten start to their 2004/05 campaign when Chesterfield were last at Kenilworth Road. After a goalless first half the Hatters were quick out of the traps in the second period when Rowan Vine struck what turned out to be the winner four minutes after the break.

The Spireites were indebted to goalkeeper Carl Muggleton to keep the score at 1-0 but later had Steve Blatherwick and Shane Nicholson sent off in the final 15 minutes.

TOMMY LEE

Lee signed in the summer after a successful trial. A schoolboy and a pro at Manchester United before moving to Macclesfield Town, initially on loan. He played in their great escape from relegation under Paul Ince. Had a successful spell on loan at Rochdale last season for whom he played at Wembley in the play-off final.

DEFENDERS

GREGOR ROBERTSON

Now in his second season after joining from Rotherham United, Gregor is a left sided player, either a full-back or midfielder who began his career with Nottingham Forest, with whom he won most of his 15 Scotland U21 caps. Edinburgh-bom, he's a good crosser when going forwards and is quick at tracking back. Played for the renowned Celtic Bovs' Club.

KEVIN AUSTIN

Kevin was a summer capture from Swansea City despite having a year left on his contract at the Liberty Stadium, where he was a regular in their promotion season last term. A latecomer into league football, he joined Orient aged 20 from Saffron Walden Town. Has also played for Lincoln, Barnsley, Brentford, Cambridge United and Bristol Rovers. Made a single International appearance for Trinidad & Tobago against Panama in 2000.

ALAN GOODALL

Had an excellent pre-season trial game against Sheffield Wednesday and was snapped up within a few days. The left-back came into league football aged 22 with Rochdale, whom he joined

Summer 2007 capture from Nottingham Forest, where he had two spells either side of a couple of seasons at Sheffield United. Jack began at Grimsby Town and also had a loan spell at Doncaster.

Turned down several offers from higher level clubs but chose to sign for the Spireites. Had a stunning debut season bagging 27 goals, the best total for the club for over 50 years.



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from Bangor City. Alan spent three years at Spotland before moving to the Hatters from where he was released mid-contract. Was a Tranmere Rovers youngster before joining Cammel Laird.

AARON DOWNES

Former player with the Australian Institute of Sport, Aaron played in most of Australia's Olympic qualifying matches but he didn't make the final squad for Beijing. He joined the Club. initially on a short-term deal and, in 2006/07 and swept the board at the end of season awards. A centre-half with excellent ball skills, he had spells at Bolton and in non-league with Frickley Athletic.

DANNY HALL

Versatile defender, primarily a centre back, who played for Stalybridge Celtic before joining Oldham Athletic as a trainee. Danny had a short loan spell as a young player at Scarborough before eventually

moving to Shrewsbury Town, Moved North to join Gretna in January 2008 but was a victim of their winding up order with Chesterfield stepping in to offer him a 12-month deal.

IARED WILSON

Right-back signed on loan from Birmingham City in January 2009. Jared has been with City from the age of 12 and made one appearance in the Championship at QPR in October 2008. Will be at Saltergate for the rest of the season.

MIDFIELDERS

IAMIE LOWRY

In his third year as a pro, Jamie's a tall, elegant full-back or midfielder from Comwall who came to the attention of the Club when his Grandad, a Chesterfield resident, recommended him for a trial, which was successful and he was awarded a scholarship. Was a key member of the successful youth team three seasons ago.



DEREK NIVEN

Combative, box-to-box midfielder signed from Bolton Wanderers in March 2004 after spending two months on loan with the Spireites. Derek was a youngster at Raith Rovers before moving to the Reebok Stadium for a substantial fee after less than 10 minutes first team experience as a 17-year -old. Bagged a few goals over the last few seasons, including the Goal of the Season winner against Man City in 2006/07.

DARREN CURRIE

Midfielder who looked set to sign for Brighton in the summer from Luton but Lee Richardson engineered a coup to nick him on a three-year deal. Nephew of ex-Blades and Leeds legend Tony Currie, he's played for West Ham, Shrewsbury, Plymouth, Barnet, Wycombe, Brighton, Ipswich and the Hatters amongst others.

LLOYD KERRY

LLOYD KERRY

Signed on loan from Sheffield United in March 2006 and then on a two year permanent deal in the summer. A

combative midfielder, born in Chesterfield, who had a spell on loan at Torquay in 2007 that ended prematurely when he injured a foot. Bagged a brace against Lincoln last season.

PETER TILL

Winger on loan until the end of the season from Grimsby Town, Peter ioined the Mariners from Birmingham City. Also played on loan at Scunthorpe and Leyton Orient. A tricky player who can play on the right or left. Signed in January 2009.



STRIKERS MARTIN GRITTON

Signed in January 2009 after scoring two goals for Macclesfield at Saltergate the previous month. A Sports Science Graduate, the Glasgowborn target man has also appeared for Plymouth, Yeovil, Shelbourne, Torquay, Grimsby, Lincoln and Mansfield.

DREW TALBOT

Signed on loan until the end of the season from Luton in January 2009. Was a youngster with Bamsley before packing in the game after two broken legs. Tempted back by Sheffield Wednesday, for whom he scored in the 2005 play-off final ahead of a season out with a back injury.

A loan spell at Scunthorpe was followed by a move to Kenilworth Road and another injury, this time a cruciate ligament problem cost him eight months before returning to fitness this season.

Losing your star striker during the January transfer window is most managers' worst fear but for Lee Richardson he believes the departure of Jamie Ward to Sheffield United has been key to Chesterfield's excellent form since the turn of the year.

Taking nothing away from the Republic of Ireland international, who the Spireites boss dubbed "the best player at the club" but since the turn of the year they have lost just three times, a far cry from the first half of the campaign which saw them lose on nine occasions:

"We had to make a decision on Jamie Ward in January, Jack (Lester) and Jamie were quite a handful as a pairing and Jamie was probably our best player but he was out of contract in the summer and a number of clubs showed an interest in taking him so we decided to cash in on him.

"The Chairman and the board allowed me to reinvest in three or four players, one of whom you'll know very well in Drew Talbot and all the players we bought in January have made an impact. "We weren't a million miles away at the beginning of the season. In footbal there is a narrow margin that is often talked about between success and failure and that was very true. We knew we needed to improve and I think we have done that. We have still got enough time left and we're hopeful that we can finish on a high."

Despite losing only once in their last 13, at the time of writing, Chesterfield still sit outside the Play-Off places on goal difference but as the inform team, Richardson who was named Manager of the Month for March, is confident they can get there:

"We are level on points with the team in the last Play-Off place and we still have an outside chance of taking one of the automatic promotion places, if we win the majority of our remaining games but probably a more realistic is a Play-Off spot.

"Everybody is playing each other so three wins out of the last five games might be enough for us to get in there, it is going to go down to the wire so we've just got to keep going.

"If we could finish one place above where we finished last season then that would be a success and it would mean that we had done enough to get into the Play-Offs and then it's anybody's so last season's disappointment is certainly a driving force for me and the players that were here last season and hopefully we can achieve it this season."






Good afternoon and welcome to this afternoon's game. I would like to tell you about the experience of a lifetime for our Under 8 Development Centre players.

These players are fighting hard to earn Centre of Excellence contracts within the club's Under 9 group for next season.

Two weeks ago we took the boys away for the weekend to play fixtures against Everton and Manchester United. While away, the boys also had the opportunity to go and watch the first team at Morecambe and to participate in a ground tour of Old Trafford. We run these trips for two reasons. The first being the opportunity for the boys to have the chance of playing against such high profile clubs and to have an experience that they will remember for the rest of their lives. Secondly we give them the chance to be independent and take on responsibilities that they might not normally have the chance to undertake. Children of this age are much brighter than we give them credit for and are capable of doing many things that are not expected.

Giving them these responsibilities means we can learn more about them in 48 hours than we can learn in a year's worth of coaching sessions. Over the weekend the boys had to manage the following tasks: First of all on arrival at the hotel we booked them a table in the dinning room which was full of adults eating there meals and then asked them to go in, order their meals and then sit and eat their meals in a manner that was conducive to their surroundings. They had to do this with no adults present, although the coaching staff were sitting just around the corner taking notes at their efforts to talk quietly and not to get too excited. They achieved this with no



This they again achieved without a problem and this was followed by the reverse procedure the following morning which included getting themselves down to breakfast on time. On the field we played an eight-a-side game against Everton on the Saturday at their incredible first team training ground and on the Sunday we played a series of five-a-side games against Manchester United at their historic 'Cliff' training ground. This venue has seen the likes of George Best, Bobby Charlton, David Beckham, Gary Neville and Ryan Giggs come through it and the excitement of thinking that they might be sitting



in the same seat as Beckham once sat was such a buzz for the boys.

Overall the weekend was an amazing success. On the field we showed the quality to compete on a par with these two huge clubs and off-thefield the boys conducted themselves magnificently and were a credit to the club, the staff, their parents and themselves.

Luton were dealt a blow at the beginning of the second half when Orient's forward, who was at least five yards offside, was allowed to play on and slot home.


The players once again reacted well to conceding, and equalised after 71 minutes.



Last Sunday's win at Wembley meant the world to everyone who was there, you could tell from the players' reaction to the final whistle just what they thought of picking up the Trophy and for Keith Keane it was a dream come true.

The former trainee has been there, done it and bought the t-shirt when it comes to Luton Town and now he's finally had something to smile about.

Times have been tough for everyone but after growing up and dreaming of the big time with the Hatters, he's had more disappointment than things to celebrate, so he was making the most of it:

"It's one of the best days of my footballing career so far. We've got to enjoy it, it was a good day out and everyone's enjoying themselves now.

"Obviously it was a sucker punch when they scored but I think we started off nervous as you'd have expected – it's the biggest stage all of us had ever played on - and we got punished for it but I think if anything it calmed us down. We got back into it and I think we looked the better team right the way through.



"It was a massive kick in the teeth with two minutes to go and you go and concede. It just shows that you have to go on until the final whistle. A few of us didn't have much left in the tank so when it went in we didn't feel ready for another half hour but we dug in, kept going and it paid off."

The Irishman's versatility has been key this season, featuring in a variety of positions but one thing is always constant, his performance level. Keane featured in the heart of midfield at Wembley and was certainly key to the result.

"Nico and I have an understanding, with Asa as well, I think that helps when you regular play with someone and have an understanding with them. We did the usual thing and it paid off today, some days it doesn't but I thought the whole team played well. When the whole team's playing well they make you look good.

"We've conceded a lot of goals this year but I think our strength has always been attacking and we showed that today. I was glad to get an assist and provide for Claude to put it away."

After starting the season on minus 30 courtesy largely to a 20 point deduction by the Football League, some would say it was fate that the Hatters should reach the final of one of their competitions. Especially when we received a bye for the first round but as far as the players are concerned they got there through hard work and good play, to give the fans and themselves a fantastic day out:

"When we started out no-one even expected us to get to Wembley. I think we got here on merit and we beat three teams in the league above, including Scunthorpe who are in the Play-Offs. I thought we deserved to win and it doesn't matter that we're the bottom of League 2 and that we started on minus 30 points – we've done it because we've played well and beat them so I think we fully deserve it."

More than 38,000 Luton fans made the 30 mile journey to the capital and certainly played their part:

"It was like playing a home game only at a better stadium. The fans really helped us and they were like the 12th man and that's what you need sometimes when things aren't going right for you. Scunthorpe came here as favourites and the fans got behind us as they usually do and that just helped."









Following the Town's promotion to the old Division Two in 1937, the team spent a season of consolidation in their new surroundings before making a concerted attempt to gain further glory, just as war clouds were gathering over Europe.

Terrace favourite and phenomenal goalscorer loe Payne had left the club, after much newspaper speculation, in a transfer to top flight Chelsea, and, after his departure, goals were at a premium with various permutations tried with minimal CHECOCC

The Club's directors were sure they had the makings of a decent side to challenge the best, but the lack of a goalscorer in the Payne mould was proving an increasing frustration as the 1938/39 campaign moved from autumn into winter.

Hugh Billington

The answer to the problem lav at the club's doorstep though, with the discovery of local lad Hugh Billington who was turning out for Waterlows.

Introduced to the side in a game at Tranmere on 5th November 1938, Billington was an immediate sensation, scoring twice in a 3-2 win and then following it up with three more goals in the next four games.

When Chesterfield came to Kenilworth Road at the beginning of December, the footballing public had begun to sit up and take notice of this new goalscoring find, and he did not disappoint when netting four in a 5-0 mauling of the Spireites.

The press corps was full of praise for the tall centre-forward, who scored the only goal of the first half and then went to town in the second, ploughing through the thick mud to completely demoralise a Chesterfield side who had managed a 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road the previous year.


That was probably the turning point in the season, as from then on the goals came thick and fast with Billington taking the lions share and building up a reputation that brought the scouts flocking to Kenilworth Road.

From a position of just below halfway in the table the Town came in on the rails and by Easter stood with an outside chance of promotion.

Easter has, over the years, proved a gravevard for the hopes of Luton supporters but 1939 proved to be an exception.

A home game against Fulham was sandwiched between two clashes with Southampton in a crowded holiday programme, and in the first of the trio the Saints were soundly beaten 6-2 at Kenilworth Road with Billington helping himself to a hat-trick.

Fulham were seen off in a tight game the following day with Billington, inevitably, on the scoresheet in the 2-1 win, but the icing on the cake was provided on Easter Monday at the Dell, Southampton.



According to the reports, the Hatters' 4-o victory was as close to perfection as possible on another muddy pitch with the performance having 'promotion' written all over it.

The players hit peak form together and, helped by another hat-trick from Billington, were 4-o up after an hour.

Whether the last 30 minutes would have remained scoreless if goals had been urgently needed was a moot point according to 'Chiltern' in the Luton News, but the home side were so totally outclassed they had to resort to a damage limitation exercise as the game wore on, and made little effort to pull a goal back.

Promotion was now a distinct possibility and a large Luton following made its way to Chesterfield for the next game, swelling the Saltergate crowd to 14,925.

The Spireites still had something to play for as well and had their own eves on promotion from their position just below the Town.

For once Billington was upstaged with Bill Redfem scoring both goals in a 2-1 victory, cancelling out a strike from Walter McMillen. The Town were now up to second position and, in view of their late run, strong favourites to keep that place until the end of the season.

Unfortunately, the story ends in disappointment as, with only one point gleaned from the final three games, the Hatters lost out at the death.

Sadly, one of the strongest sides in the Town's history could not mount another challenge the following season as, with only three games played and the Hatters in pole position, war was declared with the careers and, in some cases, the lives of the players being cut short.

"I think all the goals were fabulous, there were five tremendous goals. Their first goal we felt we could have dealt with better but then we equalised through a fabulous move and we believed we'd won it with three or four minutes to go. Then Grant McCann scores a terrific goal that you can't blame anyone for – it was just an unbelievable piece of skill and technique. You would have thought we'd get deflated by that because the momentum was with Scunthorpe going into extra time."

"It was nerve-wracking. A lot of the boys would never have experienced anything like that before, I certainly haven't. Our support was magnificent, you hear we're going to have 40,000 people and you don't quite believe it. Then you come out and see the crowd and it brings a lump to your throat."

Rossi Jarvis:

"The fans gave us such a lift. We were tired, their goal goes in but the fans cheering helped us get our heads up and we went and won the game. We were disappointed to concede two minutes



from time but we kicked on in extra time and we deserved it.

"We knew it would be a tight game because they're a good side. But so are we, even though they're near the top of League 1 and we're bottom of League 2."

George Pikington:

"It was tough at the end but we concentrated very well. It's hard to maintain that concentration over 120 minutes or more but the lads did really well.

"It was a tough game but I think the best

team won. Scunthorpe have come from the Championship so that's the quality they've got throughout the side. It's a great day for Luton Town Football Club."

Asa Hall:

"To get the third in the style that we did was fantastic. Both teams had spells when they were on top, but to score as many as we did was brilliant. It was unbelievable. There were mixed emotions all the way through."



Ed Asafu-Adiave:

"I think it's great we can give something back to the fans. We've had a very tough season and we can give them something to be proud of."

First Team Coach Alan Neilson:

"It was absolutely fantastic. Before the game even started, from when we got our suits to walking out on the pitch, the hairs were standing up on the back of your neck. Normally in the league we have to attack teams straight away, but today we sat back a bit."

Hatters manager Mick Harford:

"I feel sheer pride in the players, each and every one of them. It was a fantastic team



performance. There were some brilliant individual performances firstly from the players and secondly from the fans who all got behind the team. They had highs and lows and experienced every emotion going, just as I did. But they stuck with the team, got behind them and again the support was absolutely first class."

Scunthorpe manager Nigel Adkins:

"The story of our season has been giving away poor goals and we gave away three (today). We have not performed to the levels we would have liked to have done. Credit to Luton, I congratulate Mick Harford and his team, but we have to learn from this negative experience and use it in a positive way. I made sure they will remember this because it's not nice. There are a few tears because we have lost a cup final."

Goalscorer Claude Gnakpa:

"Today it is still a dream and this dream came true and it's great. I believed in me and the team and, when Nico gave me the first pass I didn't score, but I kept believing because I knew today was the final and we had to win.

"When the second opportunity came the left-back was in front of me, but I said Claude you have to believe, you have to believe and I scored."

Hatters Chairman Nick Owen welcomes a special guest at Kenilworth Road today on the anniversary of Joe Payne's 10 goals against Bristol Rovers in 1936.



Today marks the 73rd anniversary of Joe Payne's stupendous feat of scoring an astonishing 10 goals when the Hatters thumped Bristol Rovers 12-0 on this very ground in the old Third Division

It was an Easter Monday too, and, by further coincidence, loe came originally from Chesterfield in Derbyshire. So, as we take on the Spireites today, it is our great pleasure to welcome loe's nephew Trevor to Kenilworth Road this afternoon.

Trevor and his wife Margaret have travelled down with the Chesterfield team and he's been telling some fascinating stories about his uncle Joe. For instance, did you know that Joe scored

hat-tricks in five consecutive games for Bolsover Colliery immediately before he joined Luton Town?

He came to us as a striker, but it didn't work out too well, so he moved to the half back line and played for our then nursery club, Biggleswade Town for two years. When he returned, as many of you will know, he got his chance when our two shoved in as a striker at the last minute

An official went round the pitch before kick-off with a board announcing team changes, as they did in those days, and Luton fans were asking themselves 'so who's this J. Payne then?"

Well, they soon found out, and so did Bristol Rovers, as Joe rocketed into the record books. He stayed on in Luton after he retired and died in 1975 when he was only 61. Before he moved to Luton, loe worked at a coalmine (at a coalmine not down it!)

His local pub back in Derbyshire, the Miners' Arms in Brimington Common, is in sight of the famous twisted spire of Chesterfield, where a plaque in his honour was erected three years ago. It's interesting to reflect that we were grabbing the national headlines for the right reasons in April 1936, as we are again in April 2009.

Let's hope we can do the same next month for the great escape.

Unusual to find a striker with such pace but he also had astonishing heading ability. A very direct player who wrote a book called: "Never afraid to miss". Oh ves and he could shoot from any angle. I will never forget his hattrick at Hillsborough in October 1970.

BRIAN STEIN Poacher extraordinaire who

also set up his fellow strikers. Brian had this uncanny knack of being in the right place just in front of goal but he was always modest, brave and elusive. He knew that to score goals loitering near the penalty spot was a good idea; he was another great find from non-league football.




Schools involved in the programme contact myself and arrange for a special assembly to kick-off the project.

What's the ground like?

Underhill is at long last seeing some much needed investment with the building of a new South Stand at one end of the ground. The new covered stand will provide seating for 1,000 spectators. The Main Stand situated on one side of the ground is quite small and straddles the half way line, running barely half of the pitch. This stand which was built in 1964. is seated with a capacity of 800. Opposite is the covered East Terrace which runs the full length of the pitch and is given to away supporters. On the North side of the Main Stand is a small terrace, while on the other side is a small all seated Family Stand, At one end is the North Terrace, This end is so small that it has a large mesh fence at the back of it, to prevent footballs hitting the houses that sit on the other side of Westcombe Drive. Although the slope of the pitch is not as bad as it once was, it is still fairly noticeable, running down the length of the pitch from North to

What's it like for away supporters?

Hatters fans are housed on one side of the

covered East Terrace, towards the North End of the ground. This area accommodates around 1,000 supporters. If demand requires it then the open North Terrace can also be allocated, increasing the allocation to 1,500. Normally a relaxing and enjoyable day out, although when you view the slope of the pitch, you almost think that it must be an optical illusion, as it is at quite an angle.

Food and drink

The typical football fayre is available to supporters inside the ground, including burgers, hot dogs, pies and hot and cold drinks. For a pre-match drink there are number of watering holes around Underhill, with the Old Red Lion a favourite with a away fans as it lies just behind the north entrance to the ground. There is also the Moon Under the Water and the King John located at the top of Barnet Hill, while at the bottom of the hill are the Oueens Arms and the Weaver

How to get there:

By car: Leave the M25 at J23. Take the A1081 towards Barnet. Follow this road for about three miles. Continue towards Barnet as the road becomes the A1000. The the ground is at the foot of Barnet Hill near to the junction with Station Road

By tube/train: The nearest tube station is High Barnet which is on the Northern Line. There is only five minutes walk down Barnet Hill to the ground. Alternatively you can take a guicker train to New Barnet railway station, which is a 15 minute walk away from the ground. This station is served by trains from London Kings Cross and is a shorter journey time than the tube, taking around 20 minutes from Central London

Car parking:

There is a car park at High Barnet Underground Station, which is well signposted around the area. The only other option is street parking around the

Luton's last visit:

It will be the Hatters' first visit to Underhill for a competitive fixture.

Travel details:

Both the Bobbers Travel Club and the Luton Town Supporters Club are running coaches to Barnet.

The Hatters' penultimate home game of the season comes against a Wycombe Wanderers side that appeared destined for automatic promotion after spending the majority of the campaign in pole position, only for the club to suffer an untimely blip during the last two months.

Peter Taylor's men lie in fourth position at the time of writing but have games in hand over their rival promotion challengers. After only winning one of their seven matches in March - picking up seven points out of a possible 24 - the Chairboys' form must improve if they're to end the season inside the top three.

Wycombe's steely defence was the main reason why they occupied top spot for so long. With clean sheets in almost half of their league matches and the best defensive records at both home and away from Adams Park, Taylor's men have only lost on six occasions this season, and had only lost once before January.

It's in the final third where the Buckinghamshire club have been less effective. Matt Harrold is the current top scorer but he is still looking to make it double-figures for league goals. The rest of the goals have been split evenly amongst Wycombe's large squad of players but the Chairboys have rarely looked lethal in front of goal during this campaign.

The Hatters last met Wycombe back in December at Adams Park, where Mick Harford's side earned a credible goalless draw against the club when they were riding high at the top of the league.

Scott Shearer earned Taylor's side a clean



sheet that afternoon but will miss this match because of an ankle injury. Despite this, the Chairboys have two very capable replacements in the form of either Jamie Young or highly-rated 19-year-old goalkeeper Marek Stech. The Czech youth international is currently onloan from West Ham and could be between the sticks at Kenilworth Road next week.

Elsewhere, John Akinde will be a threat if his loan is extended until the end of the

season. The striker from Bristol City scored three goals in four matches last month, while Chelsea have allowed another highly-rated 19-year-old join the club, in the form of attacking midfielder Lee Sawer.

The two clubs have met 16 times in total. The Chairboys are looking for only their second ever win over the Hatters. Luton have won on eight occasions and seven matches have ended all square.


