New boy is Wright man for the Hatters

IT is an unwritten rule in football that under-performing teams will nearly always win their first game under a new manager.

Tamworth were supposed to be the sacrificial Lambs for Luton caretaker boss Alan Neilson's spell in charge of the Hatters.

Instead his side's fragile confi-dence was still evident as they followed up a commanding first half display where they raced into a two-goal lead with a second that was so shaky it nearly allowed Tamworth a share of the spoils.

Asa Hall and new loan signing Ben Wright had the home fans smiling again after the departure of Luton legend Mick Harford as boss midweek in a opening 45 minutes where Hatters were ram-

But Alex Rodman pulled a goal back for the Lambs on the hour mark and only some wasteful finishing and desperate defending could preserve the three points for Neilson's team that moved them back into the BSP play off

There were two changes from Tuesday night's demoralising defeat to Stevenage as Luton's recent Peterborough United link was on show up front. Liam Hatch was joined in attack by fellow loanee from London Road, Wright for his first home start and out-ofsorts Tom Craddock was dropped. Jake Howells also had to make do with a place on the bench.

The boos and jeers of midweek at Kenilworth Road were replaced with a tremendous reception for Neilson and coach Kevin Watson as they made their way to the dug

out recently vacated by Harford. Under the new stewardship Hatters certainly began brighter than they have in recent games. Within five minutes Wright and



Danny Alcock and Hatch was leading from the front, chasing down every loose ball as Luton searched for an early goal.

The breakthrough finally came on 19 minutes courtesy of a lovely one-two between the Posh duo. Hatch's dogged run down the right couldn't be halted and he fed the ball to Wright in the box. With a sublime back heel into the path of Hatch, Tamworth were finally cut open. A last ditch sliding tackle thwarted Hatch but the ball stumbled straight to the feet of Hall who calmly slammed his shot beyond the reach of Alcock.

Luton's afternoon got even better five minutes later when Wright marked his first start with an absolute peach of a goal. When Kevin Nicholls' challenge in the middle of the park left the Lambs exposed, Hatch raced clear alongside Wright and only two Tamworth defenders for company. Hatch held the ball up perfectly for his strike partner to run Rossi Jarvis had both drawn clear and shape up for a shot just decent saves out of Tamworth's inside the area. He cut inside and

Gnakpa. The Frenchman moved to right wing and Adam Newton slotted into right back. Neilson also made a change up front with Hatch, who suffered a clash of heads with a Tamworth defender just before the break, making way for Craddock.

The Teessider almost got his name on the score sheet on 71 minutes when another quality knock down from Wright set up a chance. Craddock got inbetween his markers to loop the ball over keeper Alcock

The substitutes combined on 74 minutes when Gnakpa cut out a pass and galloped for-ward. Only Craddock was in support and the striker did well to control the ball and get a shot at goal after Gnakpa's heavy pass almost curtailed

the move. Minds were quickly reverted to defence four minutes later however when Tamworth spurned the chance of the game. Jake Sheridan's deep free kick flew into a packed penalty area and somehow Pritchard rose undetected. Thankfully his free header from six yards out lacked accuracy and Hatters escaped

unpunished. Ryan Charles continued his stitute appearance ten minutes from time, replacing the impressive Wright.

But by now it was defenders Luton needed on the pitch as Tamworth ploughed forward at every opportunity. In the dying seconds of the game Hatters were penned back, desperately clearing every attack. The hard work was almost undone when Rossi Jarvis appeared to handle inside the box, but the referee was consistent and just like before turned the appeals for a
