

LATE LUTON FOIL KIDDY

MANAGERLESS Luton Town By Chris Oldnall grabbed a dramatic lastminute winner through super sub Ryan Charles in an action-packed clash in which both teams had a player sent off.

Kidderminster went ahead during the first half through Matthew Barnes-Homer before the hard working Hatters equalised on 76 minutes with a goal from Adam Newton.

Luton then capped a splendid second half display when Charles snatched his last-gasp winner in a showdown which exploded just before the interval when each side were reduced to ten men

Firstly, Hatters' midfielder Rossi Jarvis was dismissed. Shortly afterwards Kidderminster striker Robbie Matthews followed him into the dressing room.

Luton's caretaker manager Alan Neilson said: 'We had a man sent off which I didn't think was a red card, but I didn't think theirs was a sending off either.

It opened up the game in the

second half so we changed formation as we knew we had to go for it. All I asked was for the lads to do

their best and they were superb. The first goal knocked the stuffing out of us but the subs that came on in the second half had an effect on the game.

Kidderminster boss Mark Yates said: "The big turning point was our sending off. We were 1-0 up and it should have been two or three. We were the only team in the game for the first half and it changed the complexion of the

match completely." Harriers, locking horns with Luton for the first time since 2002 when both clubs were in the Football League, went ahead on 13 minutes when Duane Courtney set up the opportunity for Barnes-Homer to chest the ball down before firing past goalkeeper Mark Tyler from just inside the area

It was his seventh goal of the season and just the tonic Harriers were looking for after the visitors had earlier seen shots from Ben

Wright, Tom Craddock and Jarvis fail to hit the target.

Shortly before the half hour mark Tyler pulled off a splendid save to keep out a header from Brian Smikle following a cross by Courtney.

Luton, however, duce some useful approach play but were prone to letting themselves down when they got in

sight of goal. The game, however, took a dramatic twist just before half time when Jarvis was dismissed after a foul on Chris McPhee who, despite trying to carry on, was soon replaced by

Gavin Caines. Then, two minutes into first half winner with a neatly executed flick stoppage time, Matthews was by Charles which flew past Coleharshly given his marching orders man following a cross from Hall.
