THE TOWN'S CARETAKER MANAGER IS LOOKING FOR WIN NUMBER FOUR TONIGHT.

Good evening and welcome to Kenilworth Road for tonight's match with York City.

I would like to extend a warm welcome to Martin Foyle; his staff, the players, directors, staff and supporters of York who have made the long journey south for this rearranged fixture.

Martin has created a dynamic side that is enjoying success this season which was shown on Saturday when they came close to beating Oxford United.

They sit directly below us in the table so we know, like all games we play, that we will be in for a tough game.

We have had York watched so we are fully aware of their capabilities, strengths and weaknesses, but like I have said before, I am only interested in what we do as a team on the pitch.

If we concentrate on our strengths rather than worrying about those of the opposition, with the quality we have in our squad, we shouldn't fear anybody in this league.

Since my last notes the players have responded brilliantly to the task in hand since Mick's departure which has seen us pick up maximum points from the three games played. Against Tamworth I thought we played very well in the first half and were good value for a 2-0 lead.

Although we allowed them back in the game in the second half I thought we defended well and I was particularly impressed with the work-rate of all the players.

The victory at Kidderminster the following week was richly deserved after a dominant second-half display.

We felt we were unfortunate to be behind and even more disappointed to be a man down following Rossi Jarvis' sending off.

However, the character the players showed in the second half was similar to that seen at Cambridge and two fantastic strikes from Adam Newton and Ryan Charles earned us all three points.

On Saturday we picked up our third straight win and our second away from home with a solid and deserved win at Altrincham.

After weathering an early storm we got the ball down, played some good football and created numerous chances.

We got our noses in front thanks to Tom Craddock's penalty two minutes after Mark Tyler had pulled off great another penalty save to keep the score goalless.

Once again I was impressed with the team's determination and enthusiasm and once we were ahead only some fantastic goalkeeping kept the score down to 1-0.

The coaching team and myself have enjoyed working with the players and they have responded in the best possible way with hard work and fluent football that has resulted in three wins out of three.

In the last two games in particular we have showed a superb level of fitness and I think that has shone through where we have finished the game really strongly.

This is a team effort and together with Kevin Watson, Dmitri Kharine and Harry Scott-Stackman I believe we have prepared the team in the best way possible and that is to go out and win football matches.

All the players and coaching staff appreciate the support you have given the team in recent matches, especially in the last two away fixtures.

Please continue to back us again tonight as we all well know the special kind of atmosphere that can be created at Kenilworth Road.

Welcome to Kenilworth Road!

Tonight we play host to York City and we welcome them to Luton Town in this rescheduled fixture.

Many will remember that the original game was postponed with disruption due to an unapproved march. On the advice of the police, we agreed with York to change the date of the game, and we are grateful that they supported this new date so that the club and our supporters could work together with the local community and local authorities.

So, on to tonight's game. Martin Foyle and his side have started the season very well and have an impressive home record. The Minstermen were unlucky not to win at the weekend against league leaders Oxford United so we know we will be in for a tough test tonight.

As ever, we the fans can make a huge difference and ensure that we create our famous Tuesday night atmosphere to help the Hatters get a vital result to keep us firmly in the promotion chase. After three fantastic wins on the trot, two of those away from home, we look forward to a good game of football against another serious promotion rival.

Behind the scenes the staff have been very busy. Obviously there has been a lot of time spent on recruiting a new first team manager and the news on this front is very encouraging.

We delayed the closing dates for applications until last Friday (originally it was Wednesday) because we wanted to ensure the maximum exposure of the opportunity on a respected football vacancy website. This proved very useful with some applications coming in just before the deadline.

We have been delighted with the number of applications for the post, which numbered over 60, and from all the applications received to date we have narrowed the final shortlist down to under a dozen candidates.

We will now take the process forward by holding interviews with the preferred candidates before we come to a final decision. As soon as that decision is made, the successful applicant will be informed and introduced to the players.

From that we will advise all supporters who the next manager of our great club is.

Originally we set ourselves a tough target of trying to make an announcement regarding the identity of the new manager tonight.

However, with the quality of applications we have received, it is

right that we take the time we need to conduct the process professionally rather than rush into a decision to match our original deadline.

Of course our intention is to select someone who can work with everyone at the club and take the club forward and up the leagues.

We want a person who can grow with us and has the ability to not just see us get promoted from this tough league, but also from League 2 and ultimately League 1.

This is a big challenge and a wonderful opportunity for the right person to make their name in football. We will all be working hard to make sure the chosen candidate is completely capable of taking our club to where we want to go, and do so in the 'Luton way'.

Whoever is successful, he will inherit a fantastic squad that is full of talent.

We are a team in a promotion play-off place who have had a good start to this campaign but now we need to push on and be a real challenger for that top spot.

Alan Neilson and Kevin Watson have done fantastically well to clock up three wins out of three and it is this kind of form that will see us cement our place at the head of the table.

We all know this is a very difficult league so to play Tamworth, Kidderminster and Altrincham – who are all challengers in their own right – and get a maximum of nine

points is a testament to the management of the first team.

Everyone on the board sincerely thanks them and hope we will be cheering the team on to add a fourth win in 17 days.

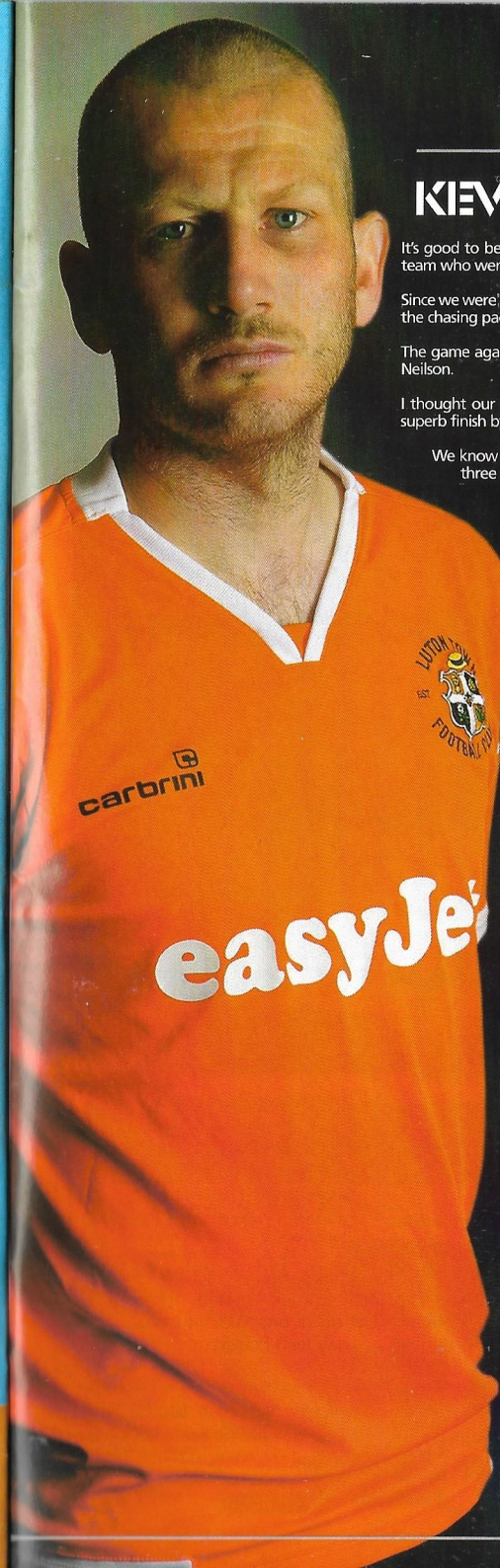

It's good to be back at Kenilworth Road tonight for an important game against a York City team who were by all accounts unlucky not to beat Oxford United on Saturday.

Since we were last here we've picked up three wins with excellent results to keep us in amongst the chasing pack in the table.

The game against Tamworth was pleasing for obvious reasons as it was our first under Alan Neilson.

I thought our first half display was really good and we scored two great goals including a superb finish by Ben Wright on his full debut.

We know that there was plenty of room from improvement but it was important to get three points off the back of the game with Stevenage.

We followed that victory up by earning back-to-back wins for the first time since August with another great away-day comeback at Kidderminster.

To go a goal down and a man down was disappointing and in all honesty I thought we didn't start that badly but we came out in the second half with quality, desire and hunger that produced a fantastic display.

We were told at half-time that we could win the game and I think that showed in the second period. We penned them in and put in a performance worthy of all three points.

We completely dominated the second 45 minutes and although we took our time to score, we knew if we kept knocking on the door we would get our rewards and we got it with two fantastic goals.

I'm not sure which was the better goal. Adam Newton's volley to pull us level or Ryan Charles' winner. Both goals were technically brilliant and thoroughly deserved.

We had to thank Mark Tyler for his penalty save to keep the score at 0-0 and I think it would have been a travesty had we lost that game.

After we took the lead through Tom Craddock's penalty we could have scored three or four more goals but their goalkeeper has pulled off some unbelievable saves.

If we're being critical, we know that we have to be more ruthless in front of goal because in football you never know what will happen.

The opposition could get another a penalty and equalise and we're then left to rue our missed chances and undo all the hard work.

Tonight's game in hand represents another massive opportunity for us to close the gap on the teams above us.

It's the start of three consecutive home matches where we've got to keep winning.

TUESDAY 13TH OCTOBER

SATURDAY 17TH OCTOBER

A penalty save from Mark Tyler and a penalty scored by Tom Craddock earn the Hatters their third straight victory under Alan Neilson.

The Town goalkeeper saved Colin Little's spot-kick while Craddock bagged his fifth of the season after Ryan Charles had been fouled two minutes later.

However, the Under 18s were defeated in the Youth Alliance, going down 2-0 against Wycombe Wanderers.

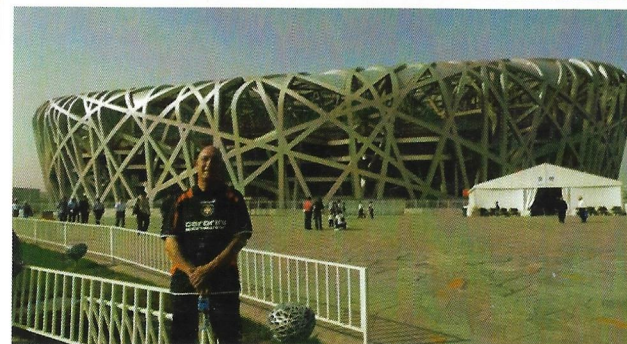
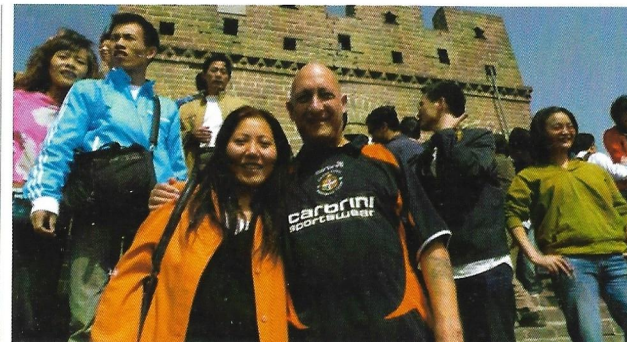
MEMORABILIA WANTED

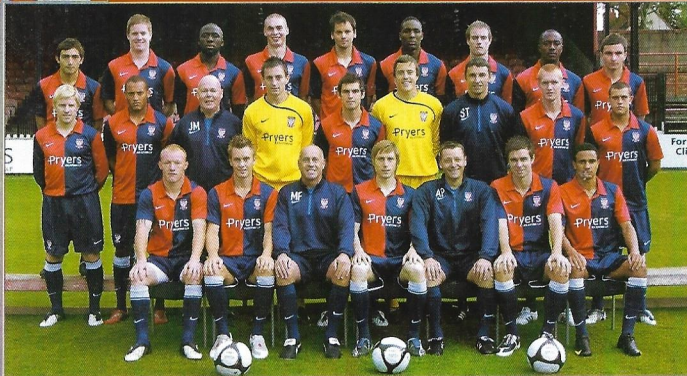
SATURDAY 2-4TH OCTOBER

PREVIOUS MEETINGS:

The Hatters hold a healthy advantage in meetings with the Minstermen with 10 victories from the 15 past encounters – including doing the double the last time the two sides met in 2001/02.

The match at Bootham Crescent, a 2-1 victory, was probably best remembered for Steve Howard's missed penalty – missing twice after he was allowed to retake the

spot kick by the referee.

Of the seven fixtures between the clubs at Kenilworth Road, the Town have won all seven.

York's only league victory came in the two sides' first ever meeting in March 1967 at Bootham Crescent. That was followed two months later when the Hatters beat City by the same scoreline at Kenilworth Road!

RECENT HISTORY:

After being founded in 1922 and joining the Football League seven years later the Minstermen finally lost their status as a League club following relegation from League 2 in 2003/04. Their relegation that season was down in no small part to the fact they failed to win a

league game in their final 20 matches of the campaign.

After a 17th place finish in their first season in the Conference they missed out on the Play-Offs by three places in 2005/06.

The following season, however, the Minstermen did make the end-of-season lottery but lost at the Semi-Final stage to Morecambe, who went on to win promotion themselves.

In 2007/08 City failed to replicate the form of the previous campaign and ended up marooned in mid table, eventually finishing 14th.

Last season saw another frustrating league campaign in the Conference for the Bootham Crescent faithful when finishing in 17th place, narrowly avoiding the drop with a late resurgence in form, towards the tail end of the season, helping them survive.

It was a different matter in the cup competitions, and Manager Martin Foyle did guide the club to Wembley in the FA Trophy, but the Minstermen lost 2-0 in the Final to Stevenage Borough.

FACT:
York's Bootham Crescent ground is official known as KitKat Crescent and has been since January 2005 following the club's sponsorship with Nestlé, who are based in the city.

THE MANAGER

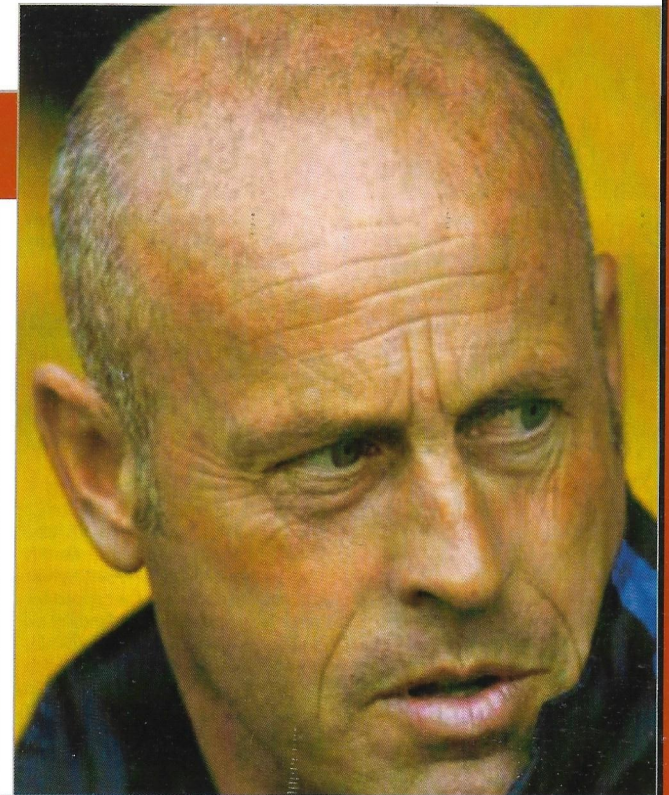
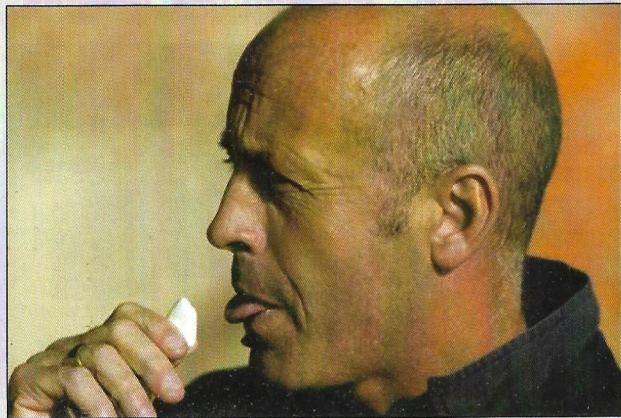
MARTIN FOYLE

Foyle was appointed manager at KitKat Crescent in November 2008 following the dismissal of Colin Walker.

He started his career with Southampton in the early 1980's and went on to play for Aldershot, Oxford and Port Vale netting 155 goals in 533 Football League games.

On finishing his playing days he was Youth Team Coach and then the Manager at Vale Park from 2004 to 2007.

Before moving to York Foyle also had a spell as assistant boss at Wrexham.



Like Luton, York City are a team that have suffered the heartache of being relegated from the Football League in recent years and Martin Foyle knows too well that the Blue Square Premier is one of the toughest and hard fought leagues to get out of.

The Minstermen have started the season well and at the time of writing they sit just two points behind the Hatters:

"The team has played tremendously well so far and have just ended a 10-game unbeaten run which we will be looking to achieve again," said Foyle.

"I don't think people realise how difficult this league is, there is hardly any difference between the two leagues and it wouldn't surprise me if a few of the conference teams turned over Football League opposition in the FA Cup this season."

Foyle, who spent three years in charge

of Port Vale, brings his confident side to Luton tonight and feels there is no need to change the approach for the meeting at Kenilworth Road:

"We are confident and we will go into the match looking for a win but Luton are one of the sides in the league that have quality and everyone that goes there will be wanting to claim a major scalp."

With both clubs searching for promotion to Coca-Cola League 2 this season the York boss thinks that his former club Oxford United are the team to beat but has also highlighted that it will be a long season so anyone has a chance of the title, he said:

"Chris Wilder is doing a great job there and his experience in non-league is really paying off, he has a very big and strong side which is the reason they

are doing so well, but anything can happen in this tight league.

"It won't be a case of playing pretty football week-in-week-out because there will come a time in the winter when you have to play on boggy pitches and rely on strength to get you through games."

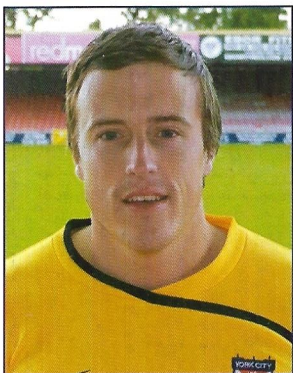
"Although there are so many good sides around us I do believe we can be amongst the top five at the end of the season.

MICHAEL INGHAM

MICHAEL INGHAM

In his second season with the club having signed from Hereford United in the summer of 2008 and was virtual ever present last term. He has won two full caps for Northern Ireland and whilst with Sunderland had a spell on loan with City in 2003 making 17 Football League appearances for the club. He also had loan spells at Carlisle United, Darlington and Doncaster Rovers and moved to Wrexham in 2005 before moving to Edgar Street.

JOSH MIMMS

Son of former City, Everton, Tottenham Hotspurs and Blackburn Rovers goalkeeper Bobby Mimms, Josh signed a permanent deal in January 2008. Made four senior appearances in 2007/08.

DEFENDERS

DAVID MCGURK

The longest serving player on the club's books having first played for City in 2004/05 on-loan from Darlington. The following campaign he had a full season on-loan from the Quakers before signing for the club in August 2006. In 2006/07 he helped City reach the promotion Play-Offs and last term the FA Trophy Final. Clubman of the Year in 2007/08 he

had 187 senior appearances to his credit at the start of the present season.

ANDY McWILLIAMS

Has graduated through the club's youth system and made his senior debut towards the end of the 2007/08 campaign. He turned professional in the summer of 2008 and last term made 26 league and cup appearances.

DANIEL PARSLow

Now in his fourth season with City, Daniel joined the club from Cardiff City in the summer of 2006. Whilst with the Bluebirds he was capped for Wales at Under 21 level and in his time at York has captained the Wales non-league side. Helped the club reach the promotion Play-Offs in 2006/07 and during last season took over the captaincy leading the side out at Wembley in the FA Trophy Final against Stevenage Borough.

BEN PURKISS

Joined the club, initially on loan, from Gainsborough Trinity in March 2007. A trainee with Sheffield United, he had moved to Trinity in 2003. As at the start of this season he had made 101 senior appearances for the club. A law student who represented Great Britain in the World Student games which were held in Belgrade during the summer.

ALAN O'HARE

Joined the club in the close season having spent 2008/09 with Mansfield Town. He started his career as an apprentice with Bolton Wanderers and then moved to Chesterfield in 2002. He made a total of 170 appearances for the Spireites before joining Mansfield in the summer of 2008.

JAMES MEREDITH

A close season signing capture, the Australian-born left-sided defender started his career as a youngster with Derby County. James had a loan

period at Chesterfield and a spell with Irish club Sligo Rovers before moving to Shrewsbury Town in 2007/08. He spent last season on loan with AFC Telford United.

DJOUJIN SANGARE

Equally at home at right back or centre of defence he joined the club during the summer. Born in France he played in the French League for Wasquehal before coming to the UK. After spells at Lewes, Grays Athletic and Stafford Rangers he spent 2008-09 with Salisbury City

ANDREW FERRELL

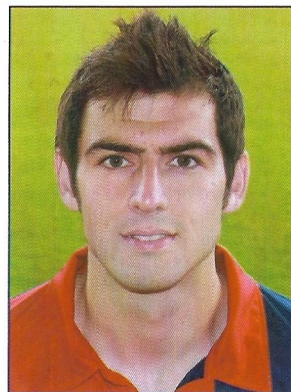
A close season signing from Kidderminster Harriers after spending two seasons at Aggborough. A trainee with hometown club Newcastle United he moved to Watford in 2004. The following year he transferred to Hereford and helped United win promotion to the Football League in 2006.

LEVI MACKIN

Having had a successful loan spell from Wrexham in the second half of last season helping City reach the FA Trophy Final, Levin signed a permanent deal in the summer.

ALEX LAWLESS

Capped for Wales at Under 21 level he joined Wrexham from school and spent six seasons at the Racecourse Ground. Had a spell on loan with Droylsden in 2007/08.

ALEX LAWLESS

Another close season signing from Forest Green Rovers having spent the last three campaigns at the New Lawn. A former Fulham trainee and Welsh Under 21 international, Alex has also been on Torquay United books. A utility player who is equally at home at full back or midfield.

NEIL BARRETT

Joined City from Ebbsfleet United this summer, Neil is an England schoolboy international and started his career as a youngster at Chelsea. He moved to Portsmouth in 2001 and made 26 Division One (Championship) appearances for the Fratton Park club. He later had spells with Dundee, Livingston and Woking before moving to Ebbsfleet in 2007 and in his first season there helped Fleet win the FA Trophy.

ADAM SMITH

Joined the club midway through last season from Gainsborough Trinity initially on loan. Adam

joined Chesterfield from school and turned professional in 2004 and made a number of senior appearances for the Spireites. He had a loan spell with Lincoln City in 2007/08 before being released by Chesterfield at the end of the season.

CRAIG NELTHORPE

A left winger who is another newcomer this term. Doncaster born he joined his local club from school and had been on the fringe of Rovers' successful first team as they rose from the Conference to the Championship. Dominican international Richard

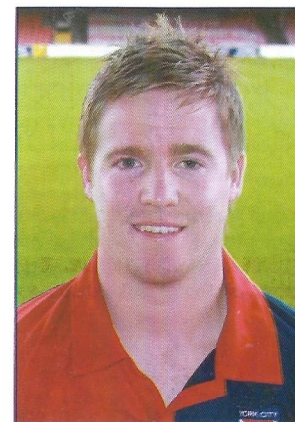

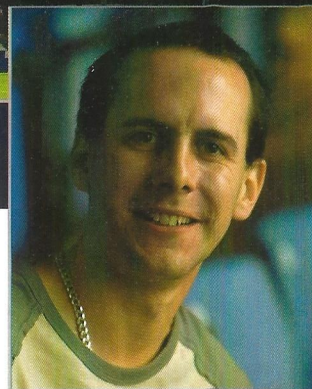

The number of league meetings between the sides at Kenilworth Road. The Hatters have a perfect record against the Minstermen with seven victories and have netted 21 goals and conceded four.



The most goals scored in one match was the 5-1 victory to Luton in May 1967, the first time the sides met at Kenilworth Road. Bruce Rioch scored a brace with Keith Allen, Fred Jardine, and an own goal making up the rest of Town's tally.



Bruce Rioch netted twice again when the sides met just four months later in the reverse fixture. City were looking for revenge and took the lead through Ted McDougall. Rioch scored the equaliser before a Ray Whittaker penalty gave Luton the lead. Rioch scored his second goal, and fourth in two matches against York, to wrap up the points for the Hatters.



The biggest margin of victory came in November 1975 when the Hatters won 4-0 courtesy of goals from Jimmy Husband, Alan West, Andy King, and Peter Anderson. This match saw the biggest attendance for this fixture, 7,982, which was just five more than the fixture eight years earlier.



Luton have scored two goals in this fixture three times and the first occasion was in December 1996. Dwight Marshall and Tony Thorpe were the scorers in a 2-0 win as Luton started a run of four consecutive league victories.



It was three goals without reply when York came to Luton in April 1998. Graham Alexander opened the scoring from the penalty spot and David Oldfield netted the second before half-time. Phil Gray scored a third late in the game as York

eventually finished the match with nine men. Mark Tinkler was the second visiting player to see red after debutant Graham Rennison had been given his marching orders for a handball that led to Alexander's successful spot kick.

The lowest attendance for this fixture came on 6th April 1999 when the Hatters

won 2-1. York's Caretaker Manager Neil Thompson opened the scoring for the visitors in the first-half but Matthew Spring equalised early in the second. Stuart Douglas was the Luton hero as his injury-time goal won it for Luton.

Steve Howard scored twice in February 2002 as Luton won 2-1, again after coming from behind. The visitors took the lead in the 17th minute through Michael Proctor before Howard netted the equaliser two minutes later. His deflected winner came in the 50th minute and was the striker's fifth goal in seven games for the Hatters. This fixture saw a debut appearance for Alan Neilson, after he'd joined from Fulham, and it was also Luton's second victory in a club record run of 12 consecutive league victories.

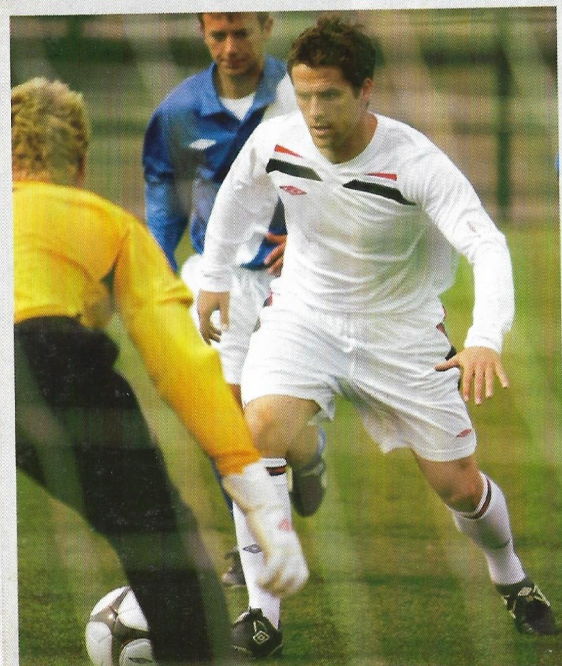
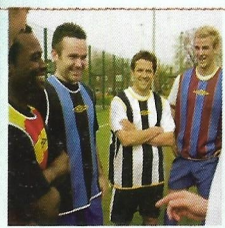
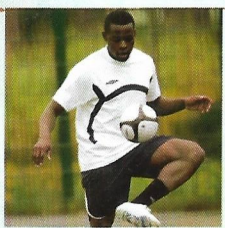

Two goals in the space of five minutes got the post-Mick Harford era underway with a victory against Tamworth at Kenilworth Road.

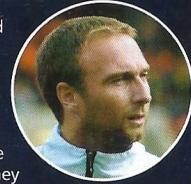
"It was a hard game. We had a game plan and in the first-half we went out there, played at a high tempo and scored two very good goals.

Other individuals who got on the score sheet were Rebecca Ferris, Rebecca Vass, Micha Curtis-Waddle and Chiara Meola.

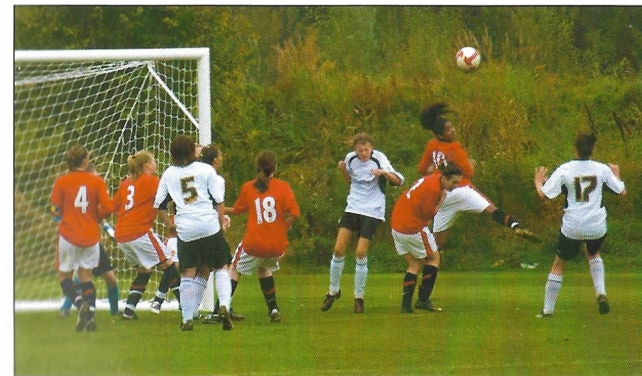
The stand out team of the day were the under 10s who, after a brave performance, went down 8-4.

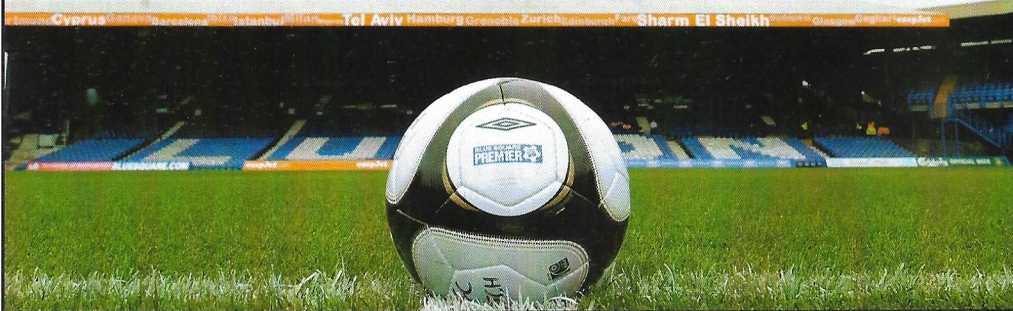

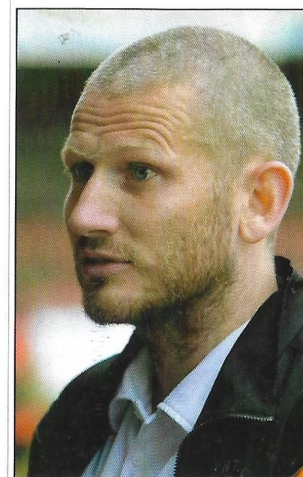

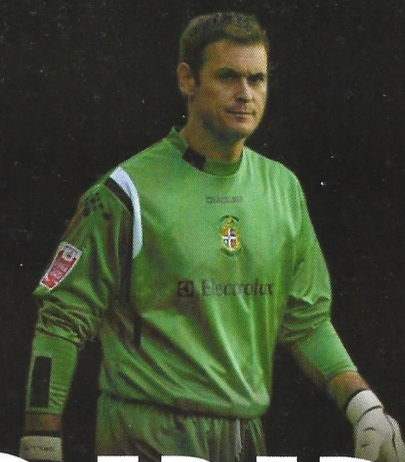

MARLON BERESFORD



Most ex-professional players are still keen to remain in football in some capacity but with former Town goalkeeper Marlon Beresford a total change in career was too hard an opportunity to turn down.

The Lincoln-born stopper made over 100 appearances for Town in the final years of his playing career and has since hung up his gloves and turned to accountancy.

Along with two very good friends he has set up academies in Malta and Belfast for training students to help pass their Association of Certified and Chartered Accountants (ACCA) and also the Chartered Institute of Management Accountants (CIMA) examinations as Beresford explains:

"As my career came to an end I did look at moving into football coaching at one point, but then I was approached by a good friend who encouraged me to get involved in the accountancy teaching profession. I jumped at the chance.

"Based on Richard's experience and reputation within the profession it seemed too good an opportunity even though I don't have an accountancy background."

He has taken up the role of Operations Manager for The Richard Clarke Academy (www.richardclarkeacademy.com) and is

very pleased with the idea and future prospects of the business:

"We opened in Malta just over a year ago and have started lecturing in Belfast and so far have had a great response, we are now looking to expand even more with the opening of our Edinburgh Academy due February 2010.

"We are looking at setting up ACCA/CIMA all over England and Scotland in the next eighteen months to two years, so watch this space."

Although it is taking up a lot of his time the former Burnley keeper is enjoying every minute of his new role away from football:

"I'm really enjoying being involved in helping run the business; it seems to be taking up so much of my time at the moment.

"I can't really get involved with much of the coaching side of football unfortunately because of the business venture, although I am enjoying the challenge as this is something completely new."

But recently he has found in his somewhat hectic life to get involved

with the game he loves so much but unfortunately not on the training ground.

He has recently been involved in commentating on his former club Burnley where he made over 200 appearances in the Nineties. Marlon believes it is a great opportunity for him to get back into football on a part-time basis:

"A friend of mine, Paul Weller, does the radio commentary for Burnley but he struggles to cover the games in London so the radio station asked him if he knew anybody who lives in the south of the country and he instantly recommended me."

Marlon is enjoying being back in football and although his experience of commentary was limited ironically the only other game involved two of his former club:

"I've only done this once before, funnily enough it was a Burnley game against Luton Town."

"I'm really enjoying it though, you can never get football out of your system and this is a nice way for me to stay involved."

Burnley now in the Premier League will be visiting some big clubs in the south so Beresford is pleased he will be able to experience some good days out:

"There are some great stadiums in this country, and some of those are in

the Capital so I'm looking forward to the excellent hospitality at places like the Emirates and Stamford Bridge."

Beresford who played in the Premier League with Middlesbrough still keeps a keen eye on the Hatters after enjoying his time at Kenilworth Road and he'd love to see the team get back to where they belong in the Football League:

"From the playing point of view it's a real shame what has happened at the club, from beginning to establish ourselves as a championship side to the current situation has been an unbelievable downturn in fortunes."

"I sincerely hope the club can pick itself up from where they are now, they are in good shape this season and will be strong contenders to go up, I wish them all the best."

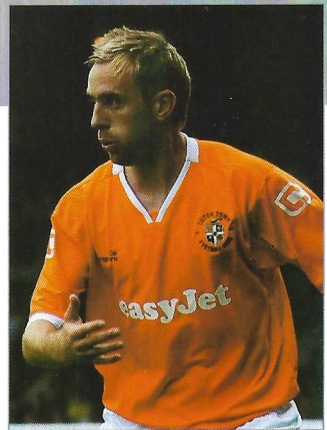

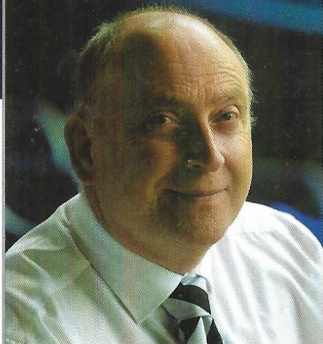

David Pleat had not enjoyed his first full season in charge at Kenilworth Road.

His new look side had suffered injury crisis after injury crisis and by the spring of 1979 the Town looked odds-on to be relegated to the old Division Three after a spell of nine years away.

Only the return to the side of a semi-fit David Moss and a string of own goals kindly

conceded by the opposition as the season drew to a close, enabled the Hatters to struggle clear of the drop at the death.

Pleat had always said that the job of stabilising the side was likely to be a three-year exercise and having survived his first 12 months he wanted to push on, praying that he would enjoy a more injury free campaign.

Several fringe players were allowed to leave over the summer of 1979 leaving spaces for a couple of big money signings by Luton terms.

Big centre-half Mike Saxby came from Mansfield for £200,000 and Republic of Ireland midfielder Tony Grealish was picked up from Orient for £150,000.

Orient had originally wanted £350,000 for their star player but the canny Pleat, in one of the first transfer tribunals, played the system to his advantage which he was to do many times over the coming years.

The new season did not start particularly well with a two leg defeat at the hands of Gillingham in the League Cup and a dull home draw with Cambridge on the opening day.

Three days later came a 3-2 defeat at Bristol Rovers, with soon to be a Hatter Steve White scoring twice for the Pirates, and many Luton supporters were fearful that it was going to be another season of struggle.

Orient were then seen off 2-1 at Kenilworth Road in non too convincing fashion before the Town faced a trip to bogey side Leicester, scene of a 3-0 hammering the season before.

Those Luton supporters who travelled to Filbert Street were amazed by the sudden transformation.

Future champions and early pacesetters Leicester had taken the interest of the Match of the Day cameras but it was the Town who took the nation's eye with a commanding performance and a resounding 3-1 win.

After a 5-0 home win over newly promoted Swansea the following week the Town sat proudly on top of the old Division Two table. At last David Pleat could feel vindicated regarding his attacking style of football although he would have been the first to agree that a settled, injury free squad helped his cause!

Although a couple of draws knocked the Hatters off top spot, fine home wins over Bristol Rovers, with wily veteran Bob Hatton netting a hat-trick, and Sunderland, with David Moss putting in a master show in front of the cameras, kept

the Town in the chasing pack.

What was sure to be a stern test was next up with a visit to highly fancied West Ham where the Hatters had not won in the League since 1953.

The Hammers were on a six-game unbeaten run, and a crowd of 25,079 gathered at Upton Park to see if the run could be extended. While the Hammers were without the likes of Trevor Brooking and Alan Devonshire the Town were missing the injured Hatton with Godfrey Ingram given a rare run out in his place.

Without an outlet up front, the Hatters needed to keep the ball on the floor at speed and for the first 45 minutes the passing was smooth and accurate and cut the West Ham defence to shreds.

Full-back Kirk Stephens, on the overlap, went close with an angled drive as the Town marked their early superiority before the lead was taken in the 16th minute.

A corner from Moss was sent to the far side of the penalty area where it was knocked back by Paul Price to Brian Stein who hooked in his first goal since the

previous April. Ingram then headed narrowly wide, before the lead was doubled on 35 minutes when a free-kick from Moss was headed home by Saxby who had lost his marker.

As expected, West Ham started the second half like an express train and put the Luton defence under a fair amount of pressure but just as the Hammers seemed to be running out of steam Paul Allen cracked in a spectacular drive for the home side from the edge of the area.

With everyone in the ground expecting West Ham to throw the kitchen sink at the Luton defence it was the Town who regained control and although the Hammers fans did not approve of the constant back passing the two points were safely won and with the victory a place back at the top of the table.

After his 15 years at Peterborough United ended with him being cast out on-loan as Posh rose through the divisions, goalkeeper Mark Tyler is delighted to have settled in at Kenilworth Road.

The Hatters' number one has been in terrific form between the posts this season helping the side to five clean sheets in their quest for promotion and, back in August, he went 488 minutes without conceding a goal.

At this point in his career, though, after a period of uncertainly having temporarily been posted to Watford, Hull and Bury, Tyler is clearly enjoying the game and relishes the unique challenge of getting the Town back in the Football League:

"After going out on-loan and not knowing where or when I'd be moving on I'm happy to be playing and be involved in first-team football week in, week out," says the 32-year-old.

"The reason I came here was not only for the football but for the challenge and hopefully we're now starting to show why we were so highly fancied, at the start of the season, to return to the League."

With the Hatters sitting in fifth place in the division at the time of writing, the goalkeeper believes the club still stand a great chance of winning promotion this term despite the difficult start to the campaign.

"Ideally we'd like to be a bit higher in the table," he says. "But you can't win leagues in October."

"We're on a good run of form at the moment and if we can continue that for the rest of the season then there's no reason why we still can't achieve what we set out to do in August."

With the Town very much the team everyone other club wants to beat this season the players have had to deal with the added pressure and expectation of supporters as well as their opponents raising their game.

And, as Tyler points out, super comebacks at Cambridge and Kidderminster have given the side the belief that they can win any game, whatever the circumstances.

"We've got to earn the right to play and have to respect teams but we should be afraid of anyone in this league," he says.

"Every game is difficult, no matter who the opposition are, but I think the quality in our squad has shone through like it did at Kidderminster."

The stopper has often been left a spectator in some matches this season but when he has been called into action its more often that not a crucial save at an important time, with his sprawling save at Aggborough – when the score was 1-0 – a perfect example.

So how difficult is it for a goalkeeper to keep their concentration when the team in front of him are dominating and there isn't much to do?

"It used to be hard when I was younger," Tyler says. "I always wanted to get involved in the game when I didn't see much of the ball but nowadays it's much easier for me."

"I try to look after the back four, communicate well and make sure they are ok and on their toes."

"Like all goalkeepers I'm maturing with age and the more games you play the more things you still learn. Having said that I'm still young for a goalkeeper!"

It was former manager Mick Harford that finally persuaded the Norwich-born goalkeeper to sign at Kenilworth Road after years of chasing his signature.

And Tyler believes the defeat to Stevenage – that ultimately led to Harford's departure – could be a blessing in disguise.

"Obviously everyone was sad and sorry to see Mick leave, he was a



great person but these things happen in football.

"The Stevenage game was a turning point. We were not entirely happy about how we started the season but we're now getting a settled back four and we know that if we keep clean sheets we're more than capable of scoring goals and winning games."

"We've got to make Kenilworth Road a fortress now starting with the game against York and then against Grays in the FA Cup and Rushden back in the league a week later."

Although he still has many years of his career ahead of him the

goalkeeper is already looking to the future when he decides to hang up his gloves.

"Every footballer wants to stay in the game when their playing days are over and I'm no different," he says.

"I'm going to start my coaching badges next summer as I want to be a goalkeeping coach."

"Our goalkeeper coach Dmitri Kharine has been brilliant and it's always nice to pick up new ideas."

"I'm enjoying my time here and enjoying my football again which is the main thing."

"I think for 25 minutes we didn't play well and the goal knocked the stuffing out of us.

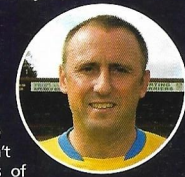
"The second half opened up with two men less on the field so we changed formation a little bit because we needed to go for it.

chance to stake a claim and make it difficult for the caretaker manager to leave him out.

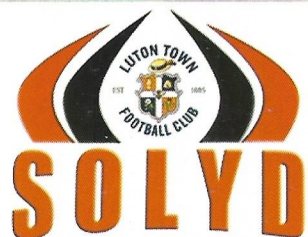
Charles said: "With me scoring the winner in the Kidderminster game it will hopefully give Alan a selection headache ahead of the next vital games which can only be a good thing for the team.

In my last article you might have noticed the photographs we included of Alan Neilson challenging some of the pupils from Denbigh Junior School at speed stacking.

The competitive side of Alan has seen him visiting the study centre on a number of occasions over the last to weeks, sneaking in a bit of extra practise and I can confirm that his time has improved.

What is speed stacking then? Some of you with children may already be aware of the international phenomenon that is hugely popular in some parts of the country.

Put simply, speed stacking involves the stacking and unstacking of 12 plastic cups. Sounds simple, but in reality it can prove to be almost impossible for some people.

The idea behind speed stacking is to help improve hand-eye co-ordination. There are a huge variety of ways in which you can

stack and unstack the cups from a single pyramid right through to a set of four pyramids.

Last week we had several player appearances at the study centre. On Monday, George Pilkington and Asa Hall joined in the session with Denbigh Junior School, and on Thursday Ryan Charles and Jake Howells enjoyed the after school session with Sundon Park Junior School.

One of the exciting parts of the after school study programme is when the players join in the sessions which has proved to be a huge success.

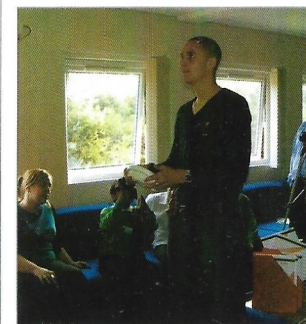
The pupils are able to work with their football heroes on an informal basis and see that they are just like the rest of us.

REPLICA KIT ON SALE SOON

DUE IN THE CLUB SHOP IN NOVEMBER

The Club would like to reassure supporters that the Hatters' new replica kit will be available to purchase at the club shop by the second week of November.

Kit manufacturer Carbrini have admitted that a change in the factory used to manufacture the kits has led to the delay in the arrival of the new strip.

In a statement sent to the Club, the company have apologised for the inconvenience caused to the thousands of eager Town fans waiting to get their hands on the shirts.

It read: "Carbrini Sportswear, part of the John David Sports Fashion Group, would like to apologise to Luton Town fans for the delay in the delivery of the new replica kits.

"The group are very keen to maintain high standards throughout the business both in terms of product quality and its responsibility regarding high standards of environmental and human behaviour.

"J D Sports endeavours to comply with all the relevant laws in order to meet that duty and responsibility wherever it operates.

"On this occasion the group have decided to move the production of the Luton Town kit to a supplier that can provide the level of quality and service that we expect.

"This decision has caused a delay in the delivery, however, we feel that Luton Town Football Club and Carbrini can only benefit from this in the future."

Town managing director Gary Sweet said: "Like all supporters we are very disappointed that the new shirt is not available to buy in the club shop yet as this is a very important revenue stream that we can't take advantage of.

"Due to the relegation from the Football League and following the signing of our fantastic sponsorship agreement with easyJet, it meant we were unable to order kit in the timescales manufacturers usually work to.

"Carbrini were the only manufacturer that was able to assist us at such short notice.

"We were then obviously disappointed at the news that there would be further delays caused by the changes in the factory in the Far East.

"Whilst we placed the order on time to receive deliveries in September, we were not informed of the change of factory.

"The Club looked at every available alternative in trying to obtain kit earlier, including replacing Carbrini altogether.

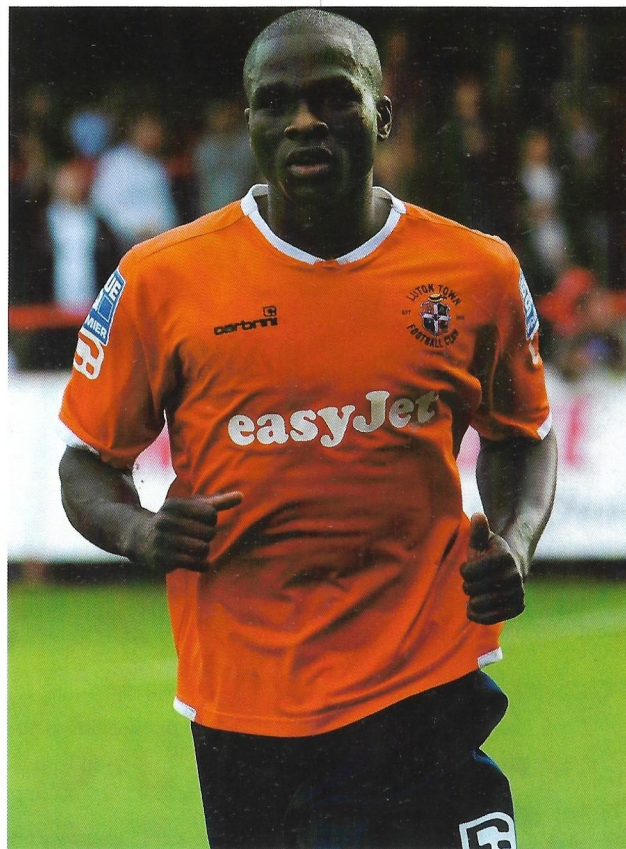
"However, Carbrini remained our best option for both the Club and the supporters and deliveries for kit have now been firmly established for both this season and next."

Training wear is expected to arrive within the next 2-3 weeks, while a new range of merchandise including scarves, hats, gloves and calendars will all be available in time for Christmas.

The Club, disappointed and frustrated by the set-back, would also like to apologise to supporters for any inconvenience and ask for their patience until the stock arrives.

It should also be noted that the Club have absolutely no intention of changing kit manufactures and that the same kit design and colours will still be in force for the 2010/11 season.

We will of course update with any changes on lutontown.co.uk, in our match programme and through the local press, including details of how to pre-order the shirt.

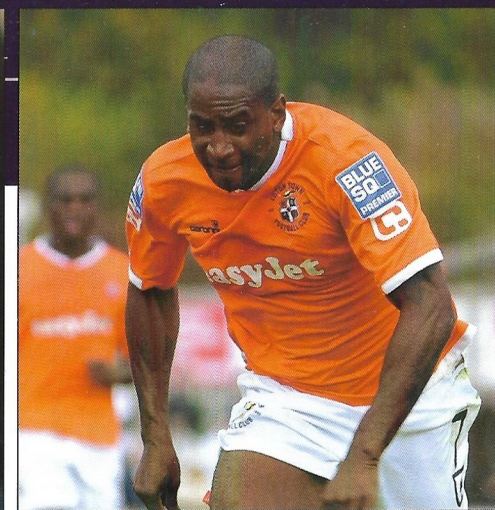
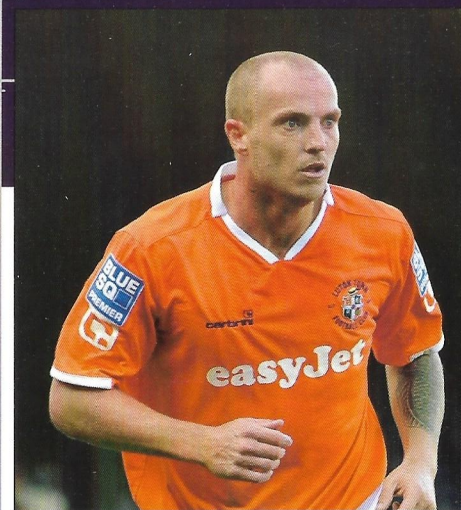
