A final six-minute blitz with late goals from Tomlin and substitute Mark Byrne left Money with an early headache to contend with as the boos rang around Kenilworth Road.

Star of the show Tomlin will surely be on his way in January with Rushden certain to cash in.

Luton Coach Kevin Watson said: "We've had a long meeting in the dressing room and we've aired a few things with Richard.

"The second half was not good enough and for some reason we dropped 40 per cent. It's a disappointing way to hand over.

"He sat upstairs and he made a few decisions but we were very easy to play against after half-time and that isn't

good enough."

fans expecting the offside flag.

The assistant referee's arm didn't go up and Craddock was clear but inexplicably went for the small gap between goalkeeper Nathan Abbey and his near post instead of going across goal. His shot hit the post.

Craddock did find the net later, but the goal was ruled out as strikepartner Kevin Gallen had strayed offside and interfered with play.

With 20 minutes gone the former Luton keeper Abbey made a complete hash of a clearance. The ball fell to Gallen 30-yards out, only for him to miss with his lobbed effort.

But it was far from one-way traffic.

Neil Cousins's cross was missed by Ed Asafu-Adiave and found Tomlin who was inches away from scoring.

Abbey kept denving Craddock and the former Middlesbrough attackers' miserable first half was complete when he was booked for attempting to fist the ball into the net from a corner. Even that went over.

Rushden were always in charge of the second half as Town's failure to put together two decent halves of football showed again.

Luton goalkeeper Tyler was tested three times from distance with Aaron

First, substitute Byrne's shot was spilled by Tyler. Tomlin was waiting for the loose ball but his effort found advertising boards instead of the net.

Tomlin was involved again six minute from the end, and this time scored. Luton skipper Nicholls, the last man, slipped on the halfway line and Tomlin stole the ball from under his feet. With the Hatters hopelessly outnumbered he raced clear and slotted into Tyler's far corner.

Byrne lobbed home after Max Porter's raking ball to seal the points O'Connor at the heart of the action. in classy style in time added on.
