


Hopefully you'll bring yours too and get behind the lads from the start.








Left: Craig Dawson gets tight on his man Below: Simon Whaley leaps across the front of a painful-looking Ryan Valentine







But the Bulls woes were not yet over as a second yellow card for skipper Green in injury meant an early end to proceedings for the former Wales international.







IN GOAL

1. MARK TYLER

Mark is a hugely experienced goalkeeper who signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in June following his release from Peterborough. The 32-year old made almost 500 appearances in 15 seasons at London Road and was rewarded for his loyalty with a testimonial against Liverpool in 2007. After falling down the pecking order at Posh, he was loaned out to Bury last season.



13. SHANE GORE

Shane was pressed into action on Saturday just five minutes before kick-off after Tyler suffered an injury in the warm-up. A former Wimbledon goalkeeper, he arrived at Kenilworth Road on a short-term deal on the eve of this season. The 28-year old came through the ranks

when Wimbledon were based at Selhurst Park and he has also played for Barnet and Stevenage.

IN DEFENCE

3. LEWIS EMANUEL

Lewis arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2006 after deciding to leave his hometown club Bradford City, where he had started his career. Aged 26, Lewis signed a new contract with the Hatters in July, although he hasn't appeared since the opening game of this season.

4. KEITH KEANE

Keith made his debut for hometown club Luton as a 16-year old in November 2003. Another of the youth team who regularly appeared for the Republic of Ireland at schoolboy level, he joined the Hatters at the age of nine and made rapid progress through the club's centre of excellence and youth teams.



5. ALAN WHITE

Alan re-signed for the Hatters in the summer, nine years after leaving Kenilworth Road for Colchester. Darlington-born, the 33-year old started his career with Middlesbrough and also appeared for Leyton Orient and Peterborough (loan), before joining his home town club in May 2007. He was sent-off for Darlington at Spotland on New

Year's Day 2008 and also played against Dale in the epic play-off semi-final matches later that year.

6. GEORGE PILKINGTON

George (pictured) is an experienced defender who joined our visitors on a free transfer in from Port Vale August 2008. The 28-year old began his career as an Everton trainee, before going on to play over 200 times for the Valiants.

12. SHANE BLACKETT

Luton-born Shane became former manager Mick Harford's sixth signing in the summer when he penned a two-year contract after leaving Peterborough. Equally adept at centre-back or left-back, the 27-year old began his career with Dunstable before a switch to Arlesey in 2003. His form with the United Counties side alerted the attentions of Dagenham & Redbridge, who signed the 6ft 3in defender in May 2004.

15. JAKE HOWELLS

Jake is a 21-year old left-back who came through the ranks at Kenilworth Road to make his full debut in a game at Bradford last October. His efforts last season then saw him rewarded with a professional contract in May.

18. CLAUDE GNAKPA

Claude, a defender capable of playing centre-back or at full-back, joined the Hatters on a free transfer from Peterborough in August 2008. Having plied his trade across Europe with Montpellier, Racing de Santander, Deportivo Alaves and FC Vaduz of Liechtenstein, Claude (26) moved to Swindon in July 2006. Twelve months later he joined Peterborough and was a regular in their League Two promotion winning side.

20. ED ASAFU-ADJAYE

Capable of playing in any position across defence, Ed graduated to Luton's first team after progressing through the club's youth set-up. The 20-year old has since been on loan at Walton & Hersham and Salisbury to gain further first team experience.

21. CALLUM REYNOLDS

Callum is a Luton-born defender who signed a sixmonth loan deal from Portsmouth in July. Aged 20 yesterday, Callum began his career with Rushden & Diamonds, having been spotted playing for the Crawley Green club in Luton. Despite not making a senior appearance at Nene Park, his promise playing for the Diamonds' youth team alerted the attention of Portsmouth and he subsequently joined Pompey in the summer of 2007.

23. FREDDIE MURRAY

Freddie is a left-footed versatile defender who joined the Hatters on a six-month loan deal from Grays Athletic in August. The 27-year old had only signed for the Essex club in August, having previously been with Northampton, Stevenage and Cambridge. Freddie began his career as a trainee with Blackburn.

The Bedford-born, left-footed midfielder started his career at Nene Park in 1999, coming through the ranks to become a regular in the Diamonds' team that went onto win the Conference title in 2001 and defeat Dale in the Division Three playoffs 12 months later. Aged 28, Andy moved to Oxford in January 2006, but returned to Rushden after 18



14. ASA HALL

Asa began his football career in Wolves youth system before signing his first professional contract with Birmingham in 2004. He won received caps for England at Under-19 and Under-20 levels during his time at St Andrews and also went on to have loan spells

with Boston, Ashford and Shrewsbury. The 22-year old linked-up with Luton in July 2008.

16. ROSSI JARVIS

Rossi came through Norwich's youth system and was the youngest player to appear for their reserve team at the age of 14. He went on to have loan periods at Torquay and Rotherham and after finding first team opportunities hard to come by at Carrow Road, the 21-year old joined tonight's opponents in August 2008.

IN MIDFIELD

7. ADAM NEWTON

Adam, who scored Luton's second goal on Saturday, agreed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in the summer following his release from Brentford. The 28-year old started his career at West Ham, coming through the Hammers' academy, before signing for Peterborough in May 2002. The former England Under-21 international stayed at London Road for six seasons, winning promotion in 2007/08, something he also achieved with Brentford last term.

8. KEVIN NICHOLLS

Kevin began his career at Charlton, before moving to Wigan in 1999. He joined the Hatters in August 2001 and went on to enjoy six successful seasons at Kenilworth Road, captaining the side to the League One title in 2004/05. The 30-year old linked-up with Leeds in July 2006, but a public fall-out with United manager Dennis Wise saw him fall down the pecking order at Elland Road and the following summer he moved to Preston for a fee of £750,000. However, Kevin found his chances limited at Deepdale and he returned to Luton in August 2008, signing a three-year deal and being named as club captain.

11. ANDY BURGESS

Andy is a self-confessed Hatters' fan who joined the club in the summer after being

IN ATTAGE

9. LIAM HATCH

Liam is with our visitors on a season-long loan from Peterborough. Aged 27, he started his career with Herne Bay, before a move to Gravesend & Northfleet in 2001. A successful spell there saw him transferred to Barnet for £17,500, where he helped the Bees to promotion to the Football League in the 2004/05

campaign. Liam's form at Underhill alerted the attention of Peterborough, who paid £150,000 for the striker's services in January 2008. With first team opportunities limited at London Road, Liam was sent out on-loan to Darlington for much of last season.

10. TOM CRADDOCK

Originally a defender, Tom (pictured) has since developed into a forward who did well at youth and reserve team levels with Middlesbrough. A team-mate of Dale's Jason Kennedy in Boro's 2004 FA Youth Cupwinning side, the 23-year old joined Luton onloan from the Riverside in October 2008 and impressed sufficiently for Mick Harford to make the move permanent in January.

17. RYAN CHARLES

Ryan has been at Kenilworth Road since the age of nine and worked his way through the ranks at the club to make his full debut in a game against Carlisle in March 2008, later scoring on his home debut against Oldham.

20. KEVIN GALLEN

Kevin established himself as something of a legend at QPR in the 1990s, going on to play over 400 games and hit 97 goals in two spells spanning nearly 14 years at Loftus Road. Brief stops at Huddersfield and Barnsley preceded a return to West London in November 2001. before the 34-year old drifted down the leagues to join MK Dons in the summer of 2007. He joined Luton on loan last November, with the move being made permanent two months later.

31. JORDAN PATRICK

Jordan is a promising forward who became the youngest ever player to feature for the Hatters when he made his first team bow as a substitute at Grimsby in October 2008 aged 16 years and seven days, setting-up Tom Craddock's for 90th minute equaliser in the process.



Richard Money is Luton's 23rd post-war manager. Here we take a look at some of the others.

Alec Stock

Alec led the Hatters to promotion from Division Three in 1969/70 having previously enjoyed tremendous success with QPR. He later went on to take Fulham to the 1975 FA Cup Final and is thought to be the inspiration for the comedy Paul Whitehouse character, Ron Manager.



David Pleat

David was on the coaching staff at Kenilworth Road when he took over from Harry Haslam as manager in January 1978. He stayed in charge for the next

eight years and in 1981/82 fashioned a side that lifted the Second Division title. After spells at Tottenham and Leicester, Pleat returned to Kenilworth Road in 1991 where he remained for another four years.

Ray Harford

Harford took over as manager from John Moore in the summer of 1987 and in his first season he saw his team lift the Littlewoods Cup with victory over Arsenal. They also reached the FA Cup semi-final, only to lose to Wimbledon. Remarkably, in 1988/89, Harford guided the Hatters to the Littlewoods Cup Final once again, but on this occasion they lost to Nottingham Forest.

Joe Kinnear

Appointed in February 2001, Joe couldn't save Luton from relegation to the

basement division, but he turned things around in 2001/02 when they stormed to promotion, finishing as runners-up to Plymouth despite losing twice to Dale. Kinnear took the Hatters

to a respectable ninth-place finish in the Second Division the following season, only to be controversially sacked by the club's



Rochdale v Luton Town



Rochdale's best ever result against Luton came at Spotland in September 1966 when we won 3-0.

Our best away result against the Hatters was a 1-0 victory in October 2001.

Dale's worst results against Luton came in March 1966 and February 1968 when we went down to 4-1 defeats at Kenilworth Road.

Saturday's 3-3 draw at Kenilworth Road, producing six goals, is the most prolific game between Dale and the Hatters.

The 16 league and cup games between Dale and Luton have produced 50 goals an average of 3.13 goals per game!

Luton Town Football Club and my family have always had an invisible bond.

Back in 1959, my grandfather made his first ever visit to Wembley to watch the FA Cup Final between Nottingham Forest and the Hatters. Thirty-years later, my father and I made our first ever visit to Wembley to watch the Littlewoods Cup Final between Nottingham Forest and the Hatters!

So ironically, three generations of the Coupe family can all claim that their first Wembley appearance featured Luton v Nottingham Forest. With this in mind, it was perhaps fate that back in 1993 I ended up at Luton University.

Of course, being an avid Dale fan, I had no desire to watch any other team than Rochdale. Upon moving down south, I took any opportunity I could to get back up north and watch The Dale. We had made a blistering start to the 1993/94 season and my last match before moving to Luton was a 5-I hammering of Chesterfield. I also made every effort to try and get to Dale matches down south and the supporters coach often picked me up at Toddington service station.

However, it wasn't always feasible to watch Dale and I missed my regular Saturday afternoon fix. At the time Luton still operated a membership scheme that deemed it was necessary for all Hatters' fans to carry a membership card in order to attend matches. The university decided to work in conjunction with the club and asked students to support their new local team, all at discounted prices of course.

I remember buying a ticket from the university bookshop for Luton v Barnsley. Kenilworth Road was one of those grounds I had seen often on TV and at the time Luton were





been relegated to the second tier in 1991/92. Before that, the Hatters had been in the top flight for as long as I can

remember and were, in my eyes, a Premier League team.

Now I'm sure that most Dale and Luton fans will agree that Kenilworth Road is not in an ideal location to watch football. I remember walking to the ground through what seemed like various open air markets. The produce from the local fruit & veg stores spilled out onto the street and the ground seemed to be almost tucked away, hidden around the back between a main road and some terraced housing.

I remember walking up Kenilworth Road for the first time and standing on the terrace; of course, now it is all-seated. After being used to standing on the Sandy Lane terrace, it seemed rather large to me. The match was 16 years ago and I can't remember too much about it, other than the score. Cheating a little here, I have checked my reference books and can confirm that Luton won 5-0.

The Luton team that day contained the names Marvin Johnson, Trevor Peake, Paul Telfer, Scott Oakes, John Hartson and Alan Harper, all of course who went on to have top flight careers in the Premier League. Looking at the Barnsley side, I found the names of Neil Redfearn and Ian Bryson, both of whom would go on to play for Dale in later

The match itself was a stroll for Luton as Barnsley were reduced to 10 men after two minutes when Gerry Taggart was sent-off for a tackle on Julian James. Luton capitalised fully on this and goals from Hartson, James, Houghton and two from Scott Oakes sealed the 5-0 victory, which put the Hatters back on track after a miserable start to the season. (Except for beating Watford 2-1 on the opening day, that is!)

Over the years I have seen more than a hundred matches at Kenilworth Road and take the opportunity to watch Luton if I can't get to a Dale game. I do have a genuine affection for the team and have made many good friends over the

However, for the record, my most memorable match at Kenilworth Road still has to be Dale's 1-0 win in October 2001 which sent us top of the table, replacing the previous incumbents, who just happened to be Luton Town!



Just 60 seconds earlier Dale had taken the lead through Grant Holt, who rose unchallenged to head home Jamie Clarke's corner.

Dale held the advantage until half-time, but just two minutes after the break Konte reacted quickest when the ball bounced off Gareth Griffiths and his clinical finish gave Matt Gilks no chance.

Cambridge enjoyed the better of the game for a spell, but Gilks did well to keep out their best chances.

His goalkeeping earned its reward seven minutes from time when Leo Bertos and Gary Jones combined on the right, with the latter's cross being converted by Holt.

The visitors lost their heads after the goal and Justin Walker became the second player dismissed for a wild lunge at Ernie Cooksey.

Positive Platt gives Rochdale cup goal to savour

Rochdale 3, Burton Albion 0 FA Cup

Dale ended a run of seven home games without scoring with an ultimately comfortable FA Cup first round replay win over non-league Burton.

It took just five minutes for Dale to end the goaldrought, which had lasted over 700 minutes and went back to their opening home league fixture of the campaign in August.

Clive Platt was the man on target, firing home the rebound after Michael Holt had seen his header cleared off the line.

The goal broke Dale from their shackles and they suddenly looked a more positive, confident side than in the previous three months.

They were rewarded two minutes into the second half when Jason Peake's speculative 25-yard shot somehow squirmed under the goalkeeper and over the line. Remarkably, this was Dale's first goal at the Sandy Lane end since April.

Ten minutes from time Julian Dowe rifled in an exocet of a shot from 30-yards to wrap up the tie and clinch a second round trip to Wrexham.

Dale supporters of a certain vintage always recall this game as one of the low points of the late-1980s.

Doncaster, third from bottom of the table at kick-off, came to Spotland and completely out-footballed Dale to chalk up a thoroughly deserved win.

They also had an unlikely goalscoring hero in big centre forward David Jones, who had struggled to find the net all season. In this game, though, he caused untold problems and completed a fine hattrick.

Hesitancy from Keith Welch gave Jones a simple 13th minute chance for the opener and just before half-time, he intercepted Jonathan Hill's poor backpass to make it 2-0.

Wayne Goodison reduced the arrears on the hour from the penalty spot after a foul on Peter Ward, but nine minutes later Jones raced clear of a static defence to clinch his third and take the points back to Yorkshire.

Dale tried to get back into the game, but struggled to make any real impact and Wigan wrapped up the win late in the second half when Peter Houghton nipped in front of Colin Waldron to convert Tommy Gore's cross.

It seemed as though the points would be shared, but Halifax rocked Dale with a late double.

Freddie Hill was left unmarked to score on 85 minutes and as the game entered injury time, Lennard finished off Town's best move of the afternoon to seal victory.

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

Neither squad though will be lacking motivation. Whitley Bay, winners at Scarborough and at home to Preston, want a third League scalp.

And Rochdale are aiming to reach the fourth round for the first time since 1971. Then they lost a replay to Colchester – who went on to conquer mighty Leeds United in the next round.

But Dolan, armed with four separate reports on Whitley Bay, knows all about giantkilling Cup glory.

A year ago, as Bradford City boss, he engineered Spurs' 1-0 FA Cup exit—three weeks after Bradford put Everton out of the Littlewoods Cup.

"Bradford had to be at their best, and hoped to catch Spurs below par," he recalled.

"Now the boot is on the other foot. But I don't mind. I know how it works.

"The third round makes special demands on players. Clubs come into it tired after three holiday matches."


Mickey Mouse!

In the spirit of the FA Cup, Football Round-Up takes a look at some of the ties that took place over the weekend, including some of the major shocks that occurred.

One of the most high-profile exits of the round came from former Premiership side Charlton Athletic. They were beaten 1-0 at Northwich Victoria on Sunday afternoon, with Wayne Riley scoring the winner nine minutes from time to give The Vics a second round tie at home to Chris Sutton's Lincoln City.

Northwich had chances throughout the game against the Addicks and some would say they deserved their spot in round two. The home side could have doubled their lead shortly after their first, but had a good header cleared off the line by Charlton, who must be rueing their recent drop from the Premiership to being knocked out of the FA Cup at the first hurdle.

Another shock came in the form of Dale's former manager Paul Simpson's Shrewsbury side losing 1-0 to Blue Square South side Staines.

Staines, most famous for being the hometown of Ali G, travelled to Shrewsbury knowing they had a good chance of an upset after they knocked out Stockport County two seasons ago. Ali Chaaban scored the goal for the Staines Massive after 21 minutes which proved to be the winner.

Chaaban, now known as Ali C, sent the hundreds of travelling Staines fans wild as they toppled a team 51 places higher than them in the footballing pyramid. Perhaps it was no surprise that Simpson (pictured) chose to blame his players rather than himself, by saying, "Our performance was disrespectful to Staines, to the supporters, to the shirts they wear and me." Crewe Alexandra, also of League Two, were a third surprise exit from the competition as they lost 3-2 at York City. Dario Gradi's side took the lead twice in the first half and were 2-1 up with four minutes of normal time remaining, but an equaliser from Richard Pacquette and a winner two minutes later from Richard Brodie sealed an unlikely victory for the Blue Square Premier side.

Two League One teams also lost out to non-league opposition, with Yeovil and Hartlepool going down I-0 to Oxford United and Kettering Town respectively.

Oxford, who sit eight points clear at the top of the Blue Square Premier, scored ten minutes into the second half through Jack Midson. Yeovil are all-too familiar with the giant-killing concept, having beaten many a league team in their days as a non-league club, but they were on the other end of the magic of the FA Cup at the Kassam Stadium as their dreams were ended at the first hurdle.

Hartlepool also lost out to a high-flying Blue Square Premier side when Kettering won I-O at Victoria Park, with Moses Ashikodi scoring the winner after fifteen minutes. God was certainly on their side as they rode their luck to come out on top against a Hartlepool team who sit mid-table in League One.





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

watching Joe Thompson bag a wonderful late brace which takes his career stats to 11 goals in 80 games. Not bad for a teenager born and bred in the town and plucked from nowhere by Keith Hill when he was in charge of the Youth set up here a few years ago.

Mind you, there are other local lads playing well for the team too. Buckley and Dawson both hail from the OL postcode area and are helping to demonstrate that locallyproduced talent is indeed more rewarding rather than risking the wrath of the bank manager by purchasing ready-made talent.

If I ever see the day where a Rochdale team lines up completely made from home-grown talent I

think I'll die a happy chappy. I suppose in the olden days players were traditionally sourced from the surrounding area just like support is. Sadly though. Rochdale-born talent like Earl Barrett, for example, would look to the bright lights of Manchester for a career in football.

But now, the club can rightly point to the players on the pitch and declare to the town's aspiring footballers that their future lies with Rochdale and not necessarily elsewhere. When I was growing up I wanted to play for Rochdale too, but I was in a minority impersonating Steve Johnson on the playground whilst others were Bryan Robson or Kenny Dalglish!

You could argue that home should be where the heart lies. Current skipper Gary Jones has clearly adopted Rochdale as his second home and happily returned here when his move to Barnsley didn't work out. He has since gone on record as regretting the move to South Yorkshire, realising that this club can provide him with the ambition and drive that is reflected in his game.

Steve Parkin too could have been written into the stone walls of the Town Hall had he stayed in 2001 when we were top of the division looking a certainty to go up. He found the grass wasn't really any greener elsewhere and ended up back at Spotland.

David Perkins is another example of a player who could have had it all, but jumped ship too early. He is now out on loan at Chesterfield, along with Alan Goodall. Glen Murray has been in the cold at Brighton, although we couldn't really turn down the £300,000 we were offered to be fair.

The underlying point is that in the past Rochdale was

a stepping stone to either a bigger club or to a career in the nonleague. The club has undergone such a shift in where it sits in football's pantheon, that we should be viewed now as a club to step up to. The chemistry of the club is one of excitement and ambition like I have never known and the comeback at Luton was just another example of what this crop of players and management can achieve if they resist the myth that the grass is greener elsewhere.

I'm actually struggling to think of somebody who has left Spotland in the last 20 years to go on and have a wonderful career elsewhere. I suppose Alan Reeves and Paul Butler fall into that category, but

even that was about 15 years ago now.





Steve Parkin signed him from Chester in 1999, where he'd been a regular. He started off brilliantly in his first game away at Cheltenham, where I remember him rugby tackling their

mascot! Flickers was always good for a laugh.

After four good years at Dale, he decided to leave and join Macclesfield when Alan Buckley wasn't sure whether or not to offer him a new contract. However, his last season at Dale had been by far his best, with amazing performances against Preston and Coventry in the FA Cup sticking out in the memory.

He's now back and doing a rather magnificent job as our player/assistant manager.



Leo Bertos

Leo was brought in by Alan Buckley after being released by Barnsley. He was a very quick and skilful right winger who was also a New Zealand international.

His first season was excellent and he was up alongside our top scorers with ten goals as we narrowly avoided relegation. For some reason, though, he really struggled in his second season and only managed three goals and his performances weren't great either.

We released him at the end of 2004/05 and he went to join Chester before dropping into the non-league scene with York and Worksop Town. He then headed over to Australia with Perth Glory and he's currently doing well at Wellington Phoenix in New Zealand while also continuing to represent his country.



Lee Cartwright

Cartwright was brought in by Steve Parkin in what looked to be a third or fourth choice signing for that right-wing position. He was knocking on a bit, but had been a legend over at Preston before signing for Stockport, where we got him from.

He had no pace, but when he eventually got

in a position to cross a ball, he could do that quite well, although he also had an annoying tendency to cut inside.

Cartwright only played about half the games in 2005/06 and couldn't maintain a first team place and was released at the end of that season.



Darrell Clarke



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



There are two very good reasons why you are sat here at Spotland tonight and they both arrived courtesy of Dale's Joe

Thompson.

His late two-goal salvo at Luton on Saturday completed a stunning comeback in the first round proper of the FA Cup and a 'proper' cup tie it was.

It was a true fairground affair with Dale on the roundabouts while Luton played on the swings and vice versa. Alas no one took a goldfish home, although at three-nil down it looked like the Hatters were going to the pet shop for fish food!

"We have shown we can do it before in the game against Morecambe," said Thompson. "There is a strong belief among the lads that we can turn things around should we start badly. Perhaps we should start each game believing we are losing 3-0 and see where that takes us!

"There isn't much time for recovery for the lads, especially those carrying injuries at the moment. Kenny Arthur looked like the Tin Man at times on Saturday, but he pulled off some really good saves, particularly in the second half. It is a team effort and those carrying the injuries are doing for us all, players and supporters."

Keith Hill switched Joe to attack, going three up front in a bid to get something from the game and while many class the young winger as the hero of the hour, Thompson was a little more modest.

"To be fair they were both excellent crosses that were begging to be put into the net. I was in the right place at the right time and didn't realise it was so late on. You just get caught up in the game.

"I prefer to play out on the wing, although the first half seemed to pass me by on Saturday. I just didn't get the ball often enough. The home supporters noticed too because they were giving me grief about it, telling me that my team-mates weren't passing it to me because I was no good!

"Then I got switched to striker later on and scored two of the goals that helped us earn a

replay! I felt like doing something similar to Tom Kennedy's celebration when he scored against Bury by running down the wing when we equalised, but changed my mind; the goals were my payback!

"We change around quite a lot, it keeps us on our toes and more importantly it gives the opposition something else to think about. Nobody gets confused; if one goes long, cover comes in behind; if one goes wide, one comes inside. All the lads are good footballers and the systems Keith Hill and Dave Flitcroft have in place help us to adopt play patterns that are very unpredictable.

"We are going well in the league at the moment and we are delighted with the way things are going. I know there's a long way to go, but I'd rather be at the top mixing it up with best in the division than scrapping away at the bottom. We are all enjoying life at Rochdale, the players, the management and the fans and long may it continue."



Chesterfield will come to Spotland on Saturday afternoon in a position where they can now "concentrate on the league".

The Spireites suffered a 3-1 home defeat by Bournemouth in the FA Cup last weekend, which was revenge for the Spireites' 2-1 league victory at Dean Court last month.

However, with the game in injury time Dale won a free-kick on the edge of the area. Ward deliberately delayed the kick being taken and received a second yellow card for his troubles. Justice was then duly served when Tom Kennedy floated the ball into the top corner to give Dale a dramatic 2-1 win.



That win 14 months ago was Dale's first over the Spireites at Spotland since the mid-1990s and brought us level on 18 league victories each on this ground.

This follows on from a dreadful run of results here for Chesterfield, who lost six times in seven league visits from December 1984 to August 1994.


Going further back in time, the Spireites were the hapless victims when Dale recorded their best ever win in December 1926, Albert Whitehurst scoring five times in an 8-1 success.
